MAHE HOSTS INDIAN OCEAN TALKS

By a special correspondent:

RIGHT of the States encircling the Western end of the Indian Ocean have become so concerned about the growing environmental problems of their coasts that their representatives have held a four-day 'workshop' in Mahe, Seychelles, to discuss ways of utilising, while at the same time protecting, the natural resources of their marine coastal environment.

The meeting was organised by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and funded by the Government of Seychelles.

The governments of Comoros, Madagascar, Mauritius, Mozambique, Seychelles, Somalia and Tanzania are fully aware that the political and economic stability of their countries is heavily dependent on the need to improve the quality of life of their people.

This can only be done if the natural resources are not destroyed nor depleted to such an extent as to seriously affect the development and well-being of their nations.

Some 40 experts, predominantly from the region, decided on an outline for a 'Regional Action Plan' at the Mahe Workshop on the Protection and Development of the Marine Coastal Environment of the East African Region.

REGIONAL PLAN

Development, according to Patricia Bliss-Guest, Programme Officer of UNEP's Regional Seas Programme, must go hand in hand with protection.

"There can be no development on a sustainable basis if the environment isn't protected for the use of people", she declared.

"This is a fundamental concept of our programme which now covers 10 regional seas areas in various parts of the world."

The East African Regional Seas programme is one of the most recent to be sponsored by UNEP.

In October and November last year a mission sponsored by eight international organisations visited all eight countries to consult with governments on the state of environmental degradation in

KENYA AIRWAYS Congratulated By Coast Tour Trade

KENYA Airways have been congratulated for "a vast improvement in efficiency" now that computers have been installed in their new Mombasa Office, also for their extended service to the north coast at Severin Sea Lodge but committee members of the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association when meeting at the Oceanic Hotel.

On asking if this service could also be introduced on the south coast, they were told by Mr T. J. Ouma, Manager of Kenya Airways Mombasa Station, that this was "under consideration".

Mr. Ouma explained that Kenya Airways were doing all it can to bring Moi International Airport up to international

standards, adding "when more employees have been recruited I promise you the very best service".

He also reported that a fortnight's course for KA personnel at the coast had taken place aimed at improving standards of service.

Referring to the new Kenya Airways winter schedule effective from November 1, members had been surprised to find that the 7 a.m. flight Mombasa/Malindi on a Monday had been omitted. They pointed out that this connected with the arrival of KA's international non-stop flight London/Mombasa and had been a great boon for those travelling on to Malindi.

American Finance For Mombasa

COUNCIL OFFERED HUGE HOUSING LOAN

A big American Company has come to the aid of the hard up Municipal Council of Mombasa with an offer of a huge loan to finance the Council's housing schemes and other capital development projects.

The massive loan which runs into billions of Kenya Shillings has been offered by the multinational company, CTC Exports and Imports Inc., of Houston, Texas, U.S.A. towards the Council's current development projects which have been severely hampered by the lack of funds.

The good news first came in June this year when the American company wrote to the Municipal Council of Mombasa indicating their interest in financing capital projects being undertaken by the Mombasa Council.

In a further communication conveyed to the Council in September, the American company offered a financial boost to the Council of a loan amounting to between US \$100,000,000 and \$500,000,000 for housing and other capital projects within the Municipality of Mombasa.

The Council was required to agree to pay interest rate of

11 and half per cent per annum repayable over a period of 20 years and was offered a grace period of 3 years from the time when the loan becomes effective.

In its deliberations last month, the Council gave authority to the Town Clerk Mr. G. S. Ngombo and the Town Treasurer Mr. W. Ogot to negotiate the loan with CTC Exports and Imports Inc., through the Ministries of Local Government and Finance in order to secure the loan from the American company.

'SOCIAL SERVICES'

Among the projects expected to benefit from this new offer from CTC Exports and Imports Inc. are the housing estates schemes in Kisauni, Mombasa Island, Nyalii, Mtopanga and Changamwe.

Other projects include highways and Town planning

projects social services and welfare facilities and Housing development projects which are currently being financed by the World Bank in conjunction with the Government of Kenya.

According to council figures, this loan when finalised will be the biggest loan ever to have been extended to the Council from an international private company.

So far the main international financiers to the Municipal Council of Mombasa have been the International Bank of Reconstruction and Development, the Canadian International Development Agency and the World Bank who have both been financing the Second World Bank Urban Project in Mombasa.

On the local scene, the Government Treasury and several parastatal bodies including local banks and financial houses have been providing long term loans and funds for the Council's capital projects.

New Export Beer Bottle

THE KENYA Breweries Ltd., is introducing a new shape bottle for Tusker Export beer. The change-over to the new shape bottle starts at the Coast this week and will gradually be introduced in other parts of the country later.

"Kenya Breweries would like to inform customers and consumers that apart from the different shape of the bottle, the quality, quantity, content, size, prices, colour and deposit of Export beer remain the same", Mombasa Branch Manager J. N. Kagiri told COASTWEEK.

He said the company has requested beer distributors, customers and consumers at Coast to return the old shape empty bottles of Tusker Export "as soon as possible". They also requested not to mix up the new shape bottles with the old shape bottles in one case, he added.

access road to Shimoni which stretches about 15 kms from the main road to the sea and is a series of "lakes". It is a great deterrent to deep sea fishermen and those visiting the marine park there.

Sometimes a "lake" has been so deep that water has come up to windshield level on small cars, while a driver of a tanker found he was ankle deep in water.

These "lakes" first appeared in May-June this year, and despite letters to the Ministry of Transport and Communications no action appears to have been taken. It was felt that the road urgently needs re-building.

Other roads badly needing attention were those to the Ukunda air strip and to the Shimba Hills Nature Reserve in which self-help bandas opened only recently. The link road between Tsavo and Amboseli was also in urgent need of attention.

It was also reported that a bus load of tourists recently had to spend a night in their vehicle which had got stuck on the road between Malindi and Sala Gate, Tsavo East.

Letters have been sent by the MCTA to the Ministry of Transport and Communication, but there has been no reply. It was pointed out that such roads are causing untold damage to vehicles while attracting much adverse comment from tourists.

Harun Omwenga from the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Coast reported that the chamber is sending a trade delegation to Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Oman in February.

He invited the MCTA to send a representative along to help promote tourism in this area now that Kenya Airways is introducing twice weekly flights to and from Dubai.

The MCTA also congratulated the chamber on compiling a business directory for the coast which they considered to be "a very good idea".

The committee also agreed to send a letter to the chairman of the Code of Conduct working party, appointed by President Moi, indicating its willingness to co-operate in whatever way possible on any subject dealing with tourism at the coast on which the association may be of help.

'Public Toilets'

The MCTA represents all sectors of this very important industry, and government officers are among its ex-officio members.

Members expressed concern at the way in which so many problems taken up with government ministries concerning the tourist industry were left unresolved with not even an acknowledgement of their letters.

In some cases, when a matter had been resolved — they were not advised.

Public toilets in the town were also discussed, and Councillor Aisha Busaidy was asked to approach the Medical Officer of Health to ensure these were maintained to a high standard of cleanliness.

Members also complained about the disgraceful state of the public toilet at the Kilifi Ferry, close to food kiosks there, and hoped that the Provincial Medical Officer was doing something about it.

Biashara Street, a popular shopping area with lots of traffic and no pavements, was discussed. Members again suggested that it should be closed to traffic between the hours of 9.30 in the morning and 6 p.m. at night to make it a safer area in which to walk, as it also attracts many tourists.

Mr. Omwenga, was, asked to approach traders there to ascertain their feelings concerning this proposal.

Members were delighted to hear that a Mosquito Control Inspector had now joined the MOH staff at Mombasa with a view to stepping up this very important work, particularly as there were so many mosquitoes around.

CANINE DISTEMPER

CANINE Distemper (Hard Pad Disease) is an example of one of those contagious diseases which is kept at bay by a strict vaccination schedule. Due to this dog owners rarely encounter an outbreak of this disease and veterinarians seldom report it.

Canine Distemper is a very contagious viral disease principally of young dogs. The disease occurs all over the world, mostly in animals in and around urban areas, especially in institutional dogs eg. Dog Pounds, Kennels etc.

The disease is caused by a virus called Canine Distemper Adenovirus Type One. It is very easily destroyed on exposure to ordinary chemical disinfectants.

Transmission occurs when clean animals eat up food contaminated by urine, saliva, etc., of sick animals and also when clean animals breathe in air that is contaminated by the breathe of sick animals.

The disease starts with a rise in temperature to about 103 degree for about three days. There is subsequently a drop that lasts for about two days followed by a second rise in temperature, one that lasts two days followed by a second rise in temperature, one that lasts about one week. This type of fever is called a Diphasic Temperature Rise.

The dog becomes depressed and loses appetite. There is increased mucous secretion from the nose accompanied by coughing. Occasionally affected animals have diarrhoea.

The eyes become reddened and sensitive to bright light. The animal may recover from the above signs, or succumb

to what is called 'the nervous form of the disease in which the dog is unable to stand and shows paddling movements of the legs or wanders aimlessly.

There is no specific treatment for this disease. Antibiotic injections or capsules are given to keep away any bacterial complications. Antibiotic eye ointment coupled with anti-diarrhoea's like Kaolin are also used.

Owners are advised that dogs which show nervous signs rarely recover.

Control vaccination is the most useful method of control of the disease. The vaccination is available as a multi-vaccination, combined with the other deadly canine diseases, namely canine hepatitis and leptispirosis. The multi-vaccine is commonly known as DHL.

The following vaccination regime is recommended:-

Vaccinate bitches before mating to ensure subsequent protection of pups. Puppies born of such mothers are then vaccinated at three months of age, there is then no need for a booster dose and then annually in areas in which the disease is endemic (common) and after three years in areas in which the disease is rare example Mombasa.

If puppies are born of bitches whose vaccination record is not available the pups should be vaccinated once and then annually as above, if they are over three months.

If such pups are under three months old, vaccinate once, followed by a second dose two weeks later, then annually as above.

Mkomani Project Gets 'Top Marks' From U.S. Expert

BUBBLING over with enthusiasm for the fast growing Mkomani Harambee Health Clinic, Nyali, was Faye Wattleton, president of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America who described it as "a beautiful project which would be the envy of many of my co-workers in the USA".

She was on her first visit to Kenya, spending two days at Mombasa which she described as "a very beautiful place only surpassed by the beautiful people here".

A dinner party in her honour was hosted by Mrs Hayati Anjarwalla, chairman of the Mkomani Health Clinic to give Faye the opportunity of meeting its sponsors, as well as members of the executive committee and others who had given a helping hand.

Faye was accompanied by Dr. Daniel R. Weintraub, chief operating officer and project director of Family Planning International Assistance (the international division of PPFA) and Nancy Harris, FPIA's regional director for Africa.

VIP guests included PC Coast Mr. Luka Galgalo, the

American Consul, Mombasa, Robert E. Cribbin and his wife Connie.

In welcoming the visitors the PC mentioned how very grateful he was to all those who had assisted with the development of the Mkomani Clinic which he described as a "very important project" while noting the coast is reported to have the highest population growth in Kenya.

A very significant aspect of the clinic's work is its family planning programme called "Shaani" which also embraces the surrounding areas. This was made possible by substantial support from FPIA.

Also giving a helping hand has been NORAD (Norwegian Agency for International Development) which donated a Datsun Nissen Urvan to assist with the transportation of family planning field workers and the dispensing of emergency drugs to adjacent villages.

The Rotary Club of Kilindini built a new KShs 250,000 wing for the clinic which will be used mainly for the sterilisation side of family planning, also for minor surgery and emergency births.

It was late 1979 when Mrs. Anjarwalla was approached by FPIA's regional director regarding the setting up of the family planning programme. After visiting Mkomani and observing how efficiently it is run, the clinic was invited to introduce and be responsible for such a programme.

It is also the FPIA which is equipping and furnishing the clinic's new wing which will open as soon as this has been done.

Noting that they had provided funds for the establishment of this family planning programme Faye, in a short speech said "we are honoured to be here with you and shall take back memories of your beautiful coast and people, also of the hot tropical sun which together" she added with a laugh "must have something to do with your high birth rate here".

Continuing she said it had been "exciting to visit Mkomani and to observe the fine work being done there, also to meet all those who had supported and are helping the project".

During their visit there they had learned there was a need

for more equipment and more services to be introduced.

Declared Faye "we shall do everything we can to make your clinic even more successful".

She described Hayati Anjarwalla, who had instigated the idea of such an harambee clinic, as a "lovely lady with a joyous spirit who is bubbling over with enthusiasm to get things accomplished to help the local people".

In recognition of her work "to further the cause of family planning around the world" Faye presented Mrs. Anjarwalla with an award for dedicated services, adding "I wish I could export her to show others in the world what can be done".

In an interview, Nancy Harris FPIA's regional director for Africa, said that the Planned Parenthood Federation of America is the largest private voluntary agency in the USA serving about one and half million women a year with family planning services.

FPIA, the international division of PPFA, was created to assist private voluntary organisations, churches,

women's and self help groups in developing countries. It receives a grant from the US government to help carry out its work.

So far, about Shs. 15 million have gone into projects in Kenya, plus Shs 250,000 for medical equipment and contraceptive supplies.

Its work in Africa is expanding and FPIA now has 35 projects in about 19 countries on the African continent.

Nancy said there had been "a very dramatic increase in demand for family planning

services". She did stress, however, that it is FPIA's belief that the ability to space a family is a basic right of the individual, and that the choice is completely voluntary.

Kenya's population growth now stands at around 4 per cent per annum, which is possibly the highest in the world.

It is in Nairobi where the FPIA's regional offices for Africa are situated.

Added Faye "through the availability of family planning services, couples are able to space their children and decide for themselves the size of the family they wish to have".

While, generally, the world birth rate was declining, Africa was the exception where it continues to soar.

Faye was also visiting Zaire, Senegal, and Sierre Leone before returning to the USA on October 29.

When Kenya's Ministry of Tourism came to hear about their visit they hosted a dinner party in their honour inviting hoteliers and tour operators along for them to meet.

It took place at Africana Sea Lodge and there was a big welcome for them, all from Joseph K. Ndune, Tourist Officer, Coast; Mr. T. K. Muya, Tourist Officer from the Ministry's headquarters in Nairobi and Ali Muhamud, the District Officer (I), Kwale.

Hoteliers from the south coast turned up in force. Others present included George Wanjohi, Kenya Airways, Ag. Manager, Coast; Joseph Gitau, manager, African Tours and Hotels, Coast; and Mr. P. M. Ogola, administrative secretary, Catering Levy Trustees.

'PEACEFUL KENYA'

Said Mr. Muya "we are sorry you cannot stay longer, but during the short time you are here you will be able to observe that Kenya is peaceful and learn that the coast was in no way affected by the disturbances of August 1. We hope you will be able to return and see more of our country".

Thomas Westerberg said they were delighted with the hospitality they had received and that the Ministry of Tourism had hosted a dinner party enabling them to meet

members of the tourist industry. He explained that they had been on a week's educational tour of the Seychelles. However said Mr. Westerberg "being responsible for Kenya Airways in Scandinavia and Finland I thought we should not leave Kenya out. This stop-over in Kenya had been made at their own initiative.

While here they would be visiting as many hotels as possible to observe the high standards being offered.

Referring to the economic recession which had also hit world tourism, he pointed out that Kenya is competing with many other holiday destinations. However, "price levels in Kenya remain reasonable, while those in the USA were becoming too expensive".

Heads Of State Meet At Kagera Basin Talks

THE HEADS OF States of Tanzania, Burundi and Rwanda - Nyerere, Bagaza and Habyarimana, and the Uganda Vice-President, Paulo Muwanga, agreed in Arusha last week for the appointment of the Kagera Basin Development Organisation's Secretary-General, on a rotational basis. The four leaders met at the Kagera Basin Development Authority have asked Uganda to nominate a candidate immediately, to fill the vacant post. The successful candidate will hold the position for four years after which Burundi and Rwanda will have their turns.

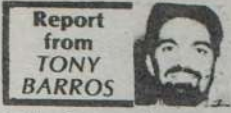
A Tanzanian, Mr. Lwebarua was appointed the first Executive Secretary of the Basin Organisation charged with the task of developing 60,000 square kms. of the Basin which passes through the four countries.

A project write-up for the rehabilitation of the Arid Crop Spraying Unit in the Ministry of Agriculture, has been completed and accepted by the four concerned parties - the Ministry, the Directorate of Civil Aviation [DCA] FAO and the International Report Desert Locust Control Organisation.

The E7.6 million "Kilimg Anga" includes the purchase of two Cessna Husky aircrafts from the United States and qualified personnel. The Unit's main task will be to eliminate the grain-eating birds - Quelea Quelea, in Central Northern and north-eastern areas of the Country.

The first state-owned supermarket is to begin operating in the Temeke District of Dar-es-Salaam region. If this project succeeds, another one will be opened in Dar-es-Salaam, followed by Dodoma.

The first ever duty-free shop

in the Country will also be opened in Dar-es-Salaam this December to cater for diplomats and expatriates who will have to pay for their goods in hard cash.

The Kimikouwa Beadwork Project - a women's co-operative which does traditional beadwork in Dar-es-Salaam, received a "shot" in the arm from the wife of American Ambassador to Tanzania - Mrs. David Miller, with a Shs. 56,400 aid to the project. The money represents a contribution from the Ambassador's self-help fund. The Ambassador Mr. Miller, also presented a repaired gas cooker to the Children's Home [orphanage] in Dar-es-Salaam.

'POLITICAL ASYLUM'

THE two Kenyan non-commissioned Air Force officers private Hezekiah Ochuka and Sergeant Pancras Oteyo Ukumu who claim to have been leaders of the August 1, 1982 abortive coup in Kenya have been granted political asylum in Tanzania.

The Minister for Home Affairs, Brigadier Muhiddin Kimario told the Government owned "Daily News" that the rejection last month of a Kenyan Government request to have them charged for kidnapping automatically qualified them for political asylum.

The two Air Force servicemen arrived in Dar on August 1 from Nairobi aboard a

Two Swedish music researchers - Dr. Krister Malm and Roger Wallis, are studying the general impact of music on the Tanzanian society, as part of a three-years music study project titled: "Music Industry in Small Countries" [MISC]. Their study will also sample music in Kenya, Tunisia, Sri Lanka, Jamaica and some Scandinavian countries.

Bio-gas plants are to develop in the southern regions of Lindi and Ruvuma, in the wake of increased cattle keeping in the region. Bio-gas plants have also been established in seven other regions.

Tanzania has been selected by the Vienna-based United Nations specialised Agency - UNIDO, as a demonstration centre for the continent, as it was the first large-scale user of bio-gas energy in Africa. UNIDO has donated some U.S. Dollars 6,000 to finance bio-gas development in the Country.

Tanzania has established diplomatic relations with the Islamic Republic of Iran. Tanzania had no relations with Iran under the Shah due to his links with South Africa.

A five-man International Monetary Fund [IMF] review team has arrived in the Country at the invitation of the Government - thus paving the way for compromises and concessions. Their visit is in response to an invitation by a Tanzanian team that attended the annual IMF/World Bank talks in Toronto, Canada.

The two Majors returned to Kenya after failing to convince a Dar es Salaam court that they were forced to fly to Dar following the failure of the coup.

Last year, the member of Parliament for Eldoret North, Miss Chelagat Mutai was granted asylum after she appeared in a Nairobi court to answer charges for making false mileage claims totalling 69,345/= to the National Assembly.

Our Heritage of Faith...

THERE were once two boys who were well behaved. They were polite to visitors and helpful when asked to do little jobs. Both boys had good behaviour, but their reasons were quite different.

The first child had a father who was very strict, when the boy did something naughty he would be punished severely. This child was well behaved out of fear of the consequences of any wrong deed.

The second boy however had a father who loved him very much. Accordingly this child tried hard to do as his father wished because of the love he was shown.

The story of these two boys illustrates two different approaches to our relationship with God and our conduct. Some stress fear in this relationship with God and our conduct. Some stress love in this relationship and others love.

Trying to live a good life from fear of the wrath of God leads some people to be blind to his love. God has shown us the depth of his love for all men and women.

Part of our response is to try to live as he would wish. When we act out of fear our actions are cramped and grudging, but in love our deeds are free and gracious.

In the story of the two boys we can see how the first was not happy but the second rejoiced

in his life. It is important for us to get the order right.

Our good deeds come as a response to God's love, the deeds do not earn the love. As Paul wrote God loved us while we were yet sinners.

It is hard for us to understand this free love of God for us his children. Yet it is shown to us in creation and the way God's character has been revealed to us.

Especially we see this love through Jesus Christ. The motivation of Christ's life was not fear of the vengeful God, but joy in serving the Father.

He did not seek only to follow rigid rules of behaviour, but outshone those sticklers for the Law who limited their duty to the Laws demands.

The free response of Jesus to our Father's love demonstrates the drawing power of that love. When those two boys grow into adulthood, the fearful boy may lead a narrow life of outward goodness only.

The second child who understood his father's love will become a generous giver, not setting a limit on his help for others.

God designed the world so that we should grow up in loving freedom like the second boy.

God's love is already here for us to see, our Father awaits our response.

Sri Lanken Freighter Still Bears Distinctive British Breeding Lines

DISCHARGING A CARGO of Jute in bales from East Pakistan at No. 1 Berth has been the Colombo registered *Sigiriya* of 8155 tons gross. Her British built lines are quite distinctive and she was in fact built 21 years ago on the Tyne as the *Linkmoor* for Moor Line and one can clearly discern the letter "R" on the funnel for Runciman and Company who managed the vessel.

Subsequently she became the *Eucadia* owned by the Anchor Line, Glasgow, an associate of the Moor Line, and now she finds herself under Sri Lanken ownership. After being well maintained she should still have a few more years of useful employment ahead of her. She was expected to sail on Wednesday of this week.

The sugar ship *Rishi Valmiki* worked well throughout her stay alongside No. 3 Berth and finally sailed last Saturday evening she was however still off the port on Tuesday morning awaiting orders for her

ships Agents in addition to their more familiar guise as C. and F. Agents.

A second vessel the *Mahia* with 500 tons to discharge under Natco Agency is due next Monday.

A fine looking Ro-Ro vessel and very much a newcomer to the Port on a spot voyage is the Yugoslav owned *Aleska Dundic* which has been discharging mainly palletised cargo from the Mediterranean at No. 17. I have no details of the vessel but she looks newly completed.

In the same manner as many of the British short sea cross channel ferries, her whole bow lifts up detaching itself from the hull, unlike the *Lloyd Triestino*, *Manta* and *Messina* regular callers who all work from the stern.

The *Fateh Al Khair* has moved from No. 7 to No. 2 Berth to continue discharging, *HMAS Adelaide* was due to sail on Monday morning but due to operational reasons, her sailing was put back 48 hours and she was expected to move off Mbaraki Wharf on Wednesday.

The 10 years old Mobil tanker *Sachem* was due off the Port Tuesday night/Wednesday morning to embark a technician. She is one of the smaller British flag Mobil tankers of 30,000 d.w. tons only.

Stowaways

Stowaways continue to present major problems to Shipmasters and Shipowners. The parcel tanker *Anco Challenger* which sailed last weekend after loading Molasses at No. 9 discovered when at sea, two stowaways in the Engine Room.

Unfortunately the vessel was too far from port to turn back so they will remain on board until repatriation arrangement are made.

Ltd., on launching its service to East Africa has now I see changed into the hands of Mitchell Cotts (K) Ltd., with two vessels advertised to arrive in November and one in December serving East Africa, Bombay, Colombo and Karachi.

'BANDAG' PROCESS NOW IN MOMBASA

THE growing demand for Bandag 'cold' process retreads at the coast has been met by the installation of production facilities at Car and General's retread factory in Likoni Road, Mombasa. In the past, when a coast vehicle owner required a Bandag retread, the casing had to be sent to the firm's Nairobi factory.

Conventional retreading involves the use of unvulcanised rubber. In complete contrast, the advanced Bandag process uses precured tread which gives a much longer life.

The application of the tread to the casing is carried out at lower temperatures than those required for vulcanising. For the this reason, the name 'cold process' has been applied to Bandag retreads. The final stage of the Bandag process takes place in a giant pressure chamber in which the retreads are cured for over four hours.

The Car and General factory in Likoni Road has the capacity to produce approx. 3,000 conventional and 550 Bandag retreads each month. Mr. Sayed M. Alhabad, the Production Manager, stated that the firm became the exclusive Bandag dealer in Kenya over ten years ago and makes the special tread rubber under

licence.

Mr. Sayed went on to say, "This tough precured tread gives very high mileages. Many Bandag retreads have covered distances of over 56 thousand kms. Strict quality control enables us to give a new type guarantee for all our retreads."

Retreads are gaining popularity in Kenya because of their price advantage over new tyres. Car and General retreads cost between a third and a half of the new tyres and are available in a wide range of sizes and tread patterns.

'BIG SAVINGS'

The Bandag process is more expensive than conventional retreading, but results in substantial savings. Bandags are favoured by the owners of long distance buses and lorries, but the process is also ideal for retreading fork lift truck tyres which are becoming increasingly scarce.

Talking of the need to obtain the maximum life out of tyres in view of their scarcity, Mr. Sayed pointed out that Car and General carries out tyre repair work. Side walls which have been damaged by impacts with potholes can be mended in order to avoid discarding tyres with partly worn treads.

KILINDINI CONTAINER TRAFFIC CONTINUES WITH EXPANSION

THE total dry general cargo handled at the Port of Mombasa in the first nine months from January to end of September, 1982, was approximately 1,752,326 deadweight tonnes.

This consisted of 1,089,279 tonnes of imports and 662,982 tonnes of exports.

The performance for this period reflected a decline in comparison with last year when the port's throughput was 1,961,369 deadweight tonnes in a similar period.

The imports portion of the total dry general cargo for January, to end of September, 1981 was 1,383,292 tonnes and the exports made up 578,077 tonnes.

As compared to 1981 the tonnages of both imports and exports show a poorer performance this year.

'DOWNWARD TREND'

Exports alone have gone down by 84,905 tonnes while the imports reflect a downward trend with difference of 294,013 tonnes or 21.3 per cent lower than last year.

During the month of September, this year the port handled 216,234 tonnes comprising of 111,823 tonnes of imports and 104,411 tonnes of exports.

This throughput was an

improvement over the month of August when 190,078 tonnes of dry general cargo were handled. During the month of August, imports made up 117,254 tonnes and the exports were 72,824 tonnes.

In the month of September a total of 71 general cargo ships called at Kilindini harbour.

In the period of January through September the port handled 43,000 twenty foot equivalent units TEU's of containers.

In the corresponding period in 1981 the port had handled 30,527 TEU's of containers which was 12,473 TEU's lower than this year. For the year 1981 a total of 44,036 TEU's of containers were handled at the port.

Container traffic has been rising since the port started handling them in 1975.

In the month of September alone the port handled a record number of containers of 7,320 TEU's.

land along the shore, tourist development, dynamite fishing and destruction of coral reefs.

What is required, says UNEP Regional Adviser, Moncef Riahi who led the mission around East Africa, is proper environmental management and careful planning at both regional and national levels to be put into action by the affected countries.

"There is a need", says Riahi, "to co-ordinate action on common problems and to exchange both information and expertise. Public awareness campaigns would help to

educate people on the need to protect and manage the marine environment.

The enforcement of appropriate regulations would control the use of toxic chemicals and set limits for pollution. But in all cases there is a lack of trained manpower in this new field of environmental science.

Governments hope that

assistance will come from outside the region and from international organisations.

It is particularly important that governments appreciate the need to back the plan once it has been adopted.

If it is to be a success, like the Mediterranean Action Plan, then the governments of the region must contribute financially. Without financial support from the Governments and international community, the regional action plan won't succeed.

Seychelles, Minister for Planning and Development, Mr. Maxime Ferrari, told the workshop participants and observers that the present state of the world's environment called for outspoken support for UNEP and its work. Four other Seychelles ministers attended the opening.

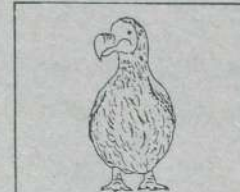
"We who inhabit a fragile ecosystem of isolated islands heavily dependent for our livelihood on a single industry (tourism) which incidentally would not exist but for the quality of our environment, understand well the dilemma".

NEW CHAIRMAN

Leader of the eight-man Seychelles delegation, David Thomas, Principal Secretary, President's Office was elected chairman of the Mahe workshop.

Godfrey I. Kamukala, Head of Tanzania's Environment Unit, Ministry of Lands, Housing and Urban Development, was elected rapporteur.

Six of the participating eight countries attended — Comoros, Madagascar, Mauritius, Seychelles, Somalia and Tanzania. Absentees were Kenya and Mozambique.



The extinct dodo which inhabited Mauritius 200 years ago was a flightless bird related to the pigeon but larger than a turkey. It serves here as a symbol and a plea to modern man to protect the endangered creatures of his environment and save them from sharing a similar fate.

'MAJOR PROBLEM'

The untreated waste from domestic and industrial sources while not yet considered a major problem, is nevertheless becoming increasingly hazardous to public health. The capitals of six of the eight states are located on the coast and are the hub or urban development within their respective nations.

Although only a small percentage of the urban population is served by sewerage, the bulk of domestic waste, including human waste, is allowed to flow untreated into the sea or accumulates in open ponds and dumping grounds close to the shore.

In some places pit latrines are built directly on the sea front.

Industrial waste is discharged from oil refineries, breweries, slaughterhouses, textile and cement factories, distilleries, sugarcane mills, and pulp and paper industries.

In addition to these three problems, the marine environment is also at the receiving end of insoluble matter transported down rivers, streams and over land.

Chemicals such as DDT sprayed over crops eventually find their way through surface run-off to the coastal waters and into mangroves, lagoons, coral reefs and other marine habitats.

Often they endanger plant and marine life, destroying breeding grounds of commercially valuable fish like prawn and shrimp.

If not carefully sited and managed, even irrigation schemes and hydro-power dams far removed from the Coast could affect the regular fresh water flow to the sea, and during floods bring down tons of mud and silt to the shorelines.

'BUSH FIRES'

Quite apart from pollution, coastal and marine ecosystems are threatened by activities such as over-logging and bush fires, cultivation and settlement overgrazing reclamation of

ERROL ON FOOD

MY fondness for Rabbit Pie was established during the holidays we took in Anglesey, North Wales when I was about eight years old. The young man next door whom I worshipped from a distance used to set out with his gun at dawn each day, returning with rabbits for the pot which often ended up on our table.

It was a great treat when rationing was at its height during the War and equally good stewed or between crumbling pastry. But best of all were the picnics held on the cliffs where we ate hard boiled eggs and rabbit pie prepared by my mother.

Rabbit is quite versatile and though people tend to look on it as a cheap substitute for chicken I personally could not confuse their different flavours.

When choosing rabbit, if it is unskinned, note that the front paws are flexible and the neck short. For roasting the classic way to truss it is to draw back the forelegs, drawing the hindlegs forward to meet them.

The legs are then bound together with string. The head is placed upright and a skewer run through to hold it in this position but for the tender-hearted this gruesome manipulation can be avoided by getting the butcher to cut the rabbit off at the shoulder leaving the meaty legs and back for roasting instead.

Baste the rabbit often during cooking when roasting it — which takes between 45 and 60 minutes depending on size. If

you are casseroiling or stewing it then soak the joints in water for a short time before cooking. To give domestic rabbit a gamey taste use a marinade of wine to make a more exotic dish.

It also makes a wonderful terrine — not too rich and perfect as a lunch time meal with French bread.

RABBIT TERRINE

- 11 ozs rabbit meat diced and equal quantities of fat bacon and belly
- pork with skin removed
- 1 onion chopped finely
- 2 tbs chopped parsley
- a good pinch of thyme ditto nutmeg
- 2 tbs brandy
- 12 Juniper berries (optional)
- 3 tbs red wine
- salt and pepper

Coarsely mince the rabbit meat with the pork and bacon reserving two of the bacon rashers. With a wooden spoon, mix in the onion, herbs and seasonings. Transfer the mixture to a terrine.

Cut the reserved bacon into strips and decorate the top. Cover with aluminium foil or

buttered greaseproof paper and a tight-fitting lid. Stand in a baking tin filled with enough hot water to come halfway up the sides of the terrine. Cook in a slow oven for 1-1 1/4 hours. Leave overnight — chill and when required turn out onto a wooden board. Serve in slices.

RABBIT POLISH STYLE WITH SOUR CREAM

- 1 rabbit
- bacon for barding
- butter
- 2 cups of sour cream
- 2 cups of vinegar
- 2 cups of olive oil
- 1 bay leaf
- 2 cloves of garlic
- 1 chopped onion
- 1 tbs flour
- 3 sprigs parsley
- salt and black pepper

Clean the rabbit in vinegar with olive oil, garlic, onion and parsley for two days. Salt and bard with chopped bacon. Having removed most of the marinade bake in a hot oven with a few pat's of butter on top. Baste frequently with the

marinade.

When it is tender — about an hour — pour over the sour cream mixed with the flour. Return the rabbit to the oven and let it brown lightly. Pour over its own sauce accompanied by a plain green salad.

STEAM BAKED RABBIT

The steam baking ensures that the flesh is white and tender contrasting well with the texture of the crunchy stuffing as a crust.

- 1 rabbit (wild if possible)
- 5 large onions chopped
- stale white bread
- bacon fat, dripping or butter
- 1 tbs fresh or dried sage
- pinch of thyme
- half a lemon rind grated
- salt and white pepper

Join the rabbit and soak in water salted water. Make the stuffing. Cover the onions with water and bring to the boil. Strain. Soak 3-4" hunk of stale white bread in cold water for a moment or so, squeeze out excess moisture.

Tear into small pieces and mix with the boiled onions, herbs, lemon rind and seasoning and whichever fat you choose. Stir well. Grease a baking tin. Do not pat dry but shake excess moisture from rabbit joints place in the baking tin and spread stuffing over the joints.

Cover with foil and bake for one hour tucking in the sides so as the steam cannot escape at Gas 7 or 450F.

Remove cover after an hour and bake for another hour or until stuffing is crisp and brown. Serve with carrots Vichy and parsleyed potatoes.

JAISHREE JAIPAL TO EXHIBIT AT THE 'REEF'

ONE of the Coast's foremost artists, Jayashree Jaipal, is staging an exhibition of her work in the conference room of Mombasa's Reef Hotel from November 5-12.

Her oil paintings and batiks of coastal scenes are much sought after and have gone to many countries of the world including Canada, USA, UK; while many are to be seen all over Kenya and Tanzania.

Jayashree is a very imaginative and talented artist and to give her added strength as well as to increase her creative urge, she spends half-an-hour cross-legged on the floor in meditation very early in the mornings. Said Jayashree, "In silence ideas develop". She finds that to be totally relaxed for a short while helps her throughout the day.

Describing herself basically as a "landscape artist", Jayashree is very versatile in many art forms. Her wall murals in particular are very impact making, as can be seen from the one which adorns the offices of Mombasa Air Services, and another in the Arcade Cafe of Ambalal House.

For two years she has been doing the 25 feet wide wall murals for the E. A. Oil Refineries pavilion at the Mombasa show-ground, and receives a lot of private commissions, mainly for old town scenes.

Among them recently has been a famous chef on Australian television, Bernard King, who collects paintings from different parts of the world, to show with the cuisine he is demonstrating.

Jayashree is also renown for her superb batiks, although her emphasis is now on oils and water colours.

She also loves painting with acrylic polymer paints which she describes as "great fun to use when the creative urge comes gushing forth". Now about half her work is in acrylic. This she describes as "a very permanent plastic based paint which can be sponged over to keep clean". Another great advantage is that it dries faster than oils.

Said Jayashree: "By using acrylic, one can express oneself very quickly, unlike with oils where you have to wait patiently until one layer dries".

Her new line is portraits; and during her last visit to India Jayashree attended art classes to gain more experience in this field.

However, her present urge is to capture the scenic beauty of

Mombasa. Declared Jayashree: "When this has been fulfilled, I plan to do more portraits for there are so many interesting faces at the coast".

She finds that doing landscapes in the traditional way requires a lot of concentration and discipline. When the work becomes too tedious she finds it good to break away for a short while and do something completely different.

With a nearly 15 year old daughter at boarding school and husband 'Jai' hooked on golf, Jayashree still finds that the day is far too short for all the things she would like to do.

Hence she has a work pattern that sometimes starts as early as 4.30 in the mornings when, for a couple of hours after meditation, she is able to work in peace and with a great deal of inspiration.

She also executes art work for brochures and other publications, and is now doing a range of greeting cards depicting Mombasa scenes.

This will be Jayashree's fourth exhibition. Born in Calicut, India, it was her mother who initially taught her much about art, with Jayashree discovering her great awareness of colour when starting to paint in oils.

"AFRICAN THEMES" It was in 1965 that she first came to East Africa with her husband, a consulting engineer. She then started making batiks based on African themes which proved to be a great success, and which continues for nine years.

In Tanzania, Jayashree was able to sell regularly through the auspices of the Tanzanian Art Society which displayed her work at annual art exhibitions there.

In 1973 she held a very successful exhibition at the Goethe Institute, Dar-es-Salaam. She came to Kenya in 1974 giving her first exhibition in this country at Nyali Beach Hotel two years later, at which everything was sold.

In 1978 there was another exhibition at the New Stanley Hotel, Nairobi.

Of the thirty items Jayashree will be showing at the Reef Hotel, fourteen will be of her commissioned work which she has been able to borrow from clients for the occasion so that a comprehensive range can be seen.

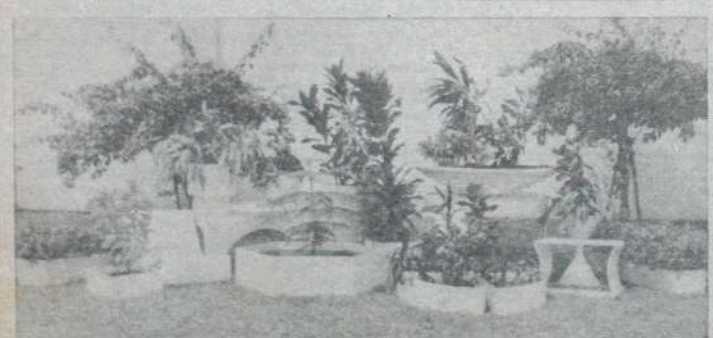

Aga Khan Makes Tour On 25th Anniversary

NYALI, Kenya — Along the shore here, sheltered by palms, there stands a gleaming white villa whose vista leads the eye beyond lawn and garden and surf across the Indian Ocean.

It is the official residence of his highness the Aga Khan, the 49th hereditary imam of the world's Ismaili Moslems, direct descendant of the prophet Mohammed, benefactor and bloodstock breeder whose interests, like the ocean at his door, span Asia and Africa and parts of the Arab world.

This year is the 25th anniversary of his accession to the imamate, or spiritual leadership, of 15 million Ismaili Moslems living in 25 countries, and so the Aga Khan is on tour for a silver jubilee year to visit his followers. Kenya, where those he represents include many of the wealthy Asian businessmen who dominate retail trade, is his first stop.

The West's perception of the Aga Khan's family is generally associated with phenomenal wealth, with thoroughbred racehorses winning the British Derby and the Arc de Triomphe in Paris, and with Oriental potentates having their weight matched in precious metals assembled by their followers.

Yet an hour's conversation with the Aga Khan seems to reveal a man whose concerns focus on issues of development in the Third World, the perceptions by which West judges East and North judges South, and the manner by which the underdeveloped can make the leap to development.

He also appears molded by manifold influences that draw together an Islamic tradition with a Western education in Switzerland and the United States, a reverence for private enterprise coupled with the insistence that the material and spiritual aspects of his leadership complement one another, and a sense of Western urbaneness fused with a personal history rooted in the East.

That the family history should be misunderstood in the West, he said in an interview, results from "the tremendous gap which exists in information on the Third World" in the West, particularly in the 1950s when his grandfather, Aga Sultan Sir Mohammed Shah, laid the foundations of the development institutions that his grandson now administers.

Thus the Western image of the family centered on the magnificent thoroughbreds and the ceremonies, said to be common in India among

the maharajahs of the time, when his followers weighed the old Aga Khan in gold, diamond and platinum. What went unnoticed in the West, he said, was that the funds raised from weighing the previous imam provided the basis for what his official biography terms "major social welfare and development institutions in Asia and Africa."

These include orphanages, health care centers, schools, cooperative banks and insurance companies in India and Pakistan, hospitals, companies, schools and housing programs in East Africa and a 721-bed hospital and medical college under construction in Pakistan. Much of the development program is administered by the Aga Khan Foundation, which, with other institutions, the Aga Khan said, consumes 95 percent of his time, the rest being taken up with personal business interests in racehorses and a tourism development on Sardinia's Costa Smeralda.

The Aga Khan became the Ismailis' spiritual leader on July 11, 1957, at the age of 20, the succession bypassing his father, the Aly Khan, who was Rita Hayworth's third husband from 1949 until they were divorced in Reno in 1954. The present Aga Khan was chosen ostensibly because his grandfather had decreed that he be followed by a "young man who has been brought up in the midst of the new age" that followed the colonial era in Asia and Africa.

The philosophy he espouses is that private initiative provides the basis for development in the Third World since it provides the expertise and financial contributions to establish viable economic institutions that strengthen new nations. As an example, he cites Kenya's Serena Hotels in Nairobi and Mombasa, promoted by an organization, established by him in 1963, called Industrial Promotion Services.

The Serena Hotels brought together major Western airlines and financial institutions and state-run companies in the creation of "a strong tourism group" providing economic growth and employment.

"When you talk about private initiative, that's what I'm talking about," he said, "a collaborative effort among people who are specialized in their particular field and who have a long-term commitment to run a successful business and have as many people participating as possible."

"Whatever the political philosophy," he said, "you have got to be based on good management" for development to succeed.

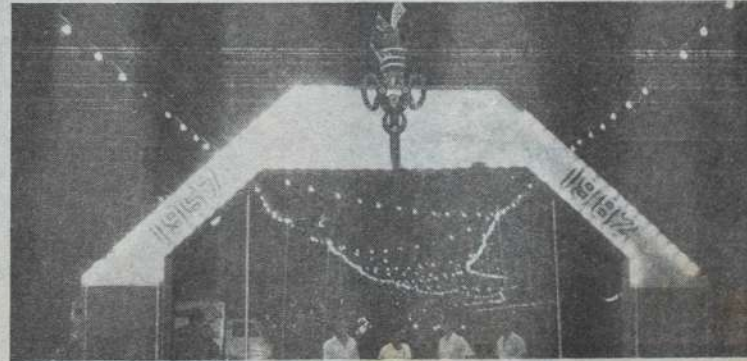

DIE seit einem Jahr bestehende Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge, im Amboselipark und am nächsten beim Kilimanjaro gelegen, wird schon wieder erweitert, schreibt Neta Peal.

Soeben ist ein Vertrag unterzeichnet worden, damit die Bauarbeiten sofort in Angriff genommen werden können, um weitere 14 mit Marula bedeckte Rundhäuser zu erstellen. Sie werden nicht nur eine Minibar, Strom, eine Dusche mit kaltem und warmem Wasser, sondern auch ein Cheminée haben.

Bisher gab es offene Feuerstellen nur in den öffentlichen Aufenthaltsräumen und in den vier Suiten.

Tamsin entschied sich für eine Karriere in der Hotelindustrie, nachdem sie einen Cordon Bleu Kurs und einen französischen Sprachkurs absolviert hatte. Sie ist seit neun Monaten in der Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge im Management Training. Obwohl sie viel Arbeit hat, geht sie so oft wie möglich auf Pirschfahrt. Sie war schon als Kind viel auf Safari und interessiert sich für die wilden Tiere.

Sie malt Landschaften und Sonnenuntergänge und ihr Zimmer ist voll von ihren selbstgemalten Bildern. Sie schwimmt und reitet gerne und möchte eines Tages ihre eigene Lodge oder ein Camp haben.

Ein wichtiger Mann ist Oberkellner Ainea Lugose. Er hat acht Kellner von Grund auf ausgebildet. 36 Arbeiter, die beim Bau der Lodge mitgeholfen hatten, wurden umgeschult und

in der Lodge angestellt, damit sie nicht arbeitslos wurden.

Ainea begann als Koch im Mandarin Restaurant in Nairobi und wurde dann Kellner. Als Kellner kam er ins Hilton und besuchte zwei Servicekurse im Utalii College. 1981 kam er in die Kilimanjaro Buffalo Lodge. Er war zum erstenmal in einem Wildpark, vermißte die Großstadt und fürchtete sich vor den wilden Tieren. 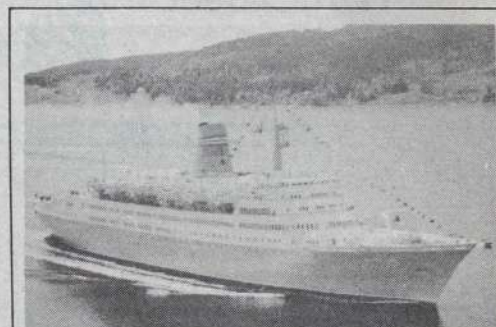
JAGDCAMP

Amos Mdivo vom Stamme der Kamba war Aufseher beim Bau der Lodge und ist nun mit der Administration betraut. Im Amboselipark gibt es immer noch viele Tiere zu sehen, Löwen, Elefanten, Gnus, Giraffen, Zebras und Steppenwild, ab und zu sogar Leoparden.

Die Lodge wurde mit einer Investitionssumme von KShs 25 Millionen gebaut und gehört Mr. N. Murji. Sie soll nach den weiteren Entwicklungsplänen eine der größten Lodgen Kenia's werden. Sie ist jedenfalls für Weihnachten schon ausgebucht.

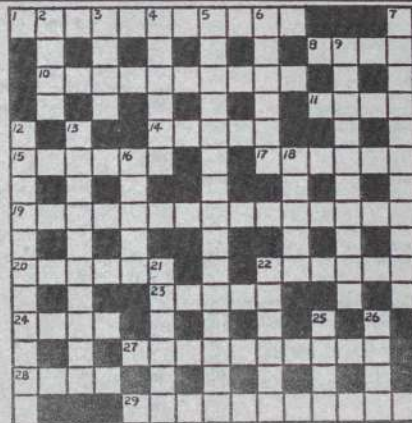

ON OCTOBER 22, 1978, FOUND
Mzee Jomo Kenyatta doing his
usual rounds at the Coast.

A week or so ago he had
visited his entire family to a
reception which was marked
by love and fatherly affection.

On this particular day Mzee
visited extensively Kwale District
and witnessed the
development of several rural
centres as he moved about
concerning up with his foreign
visitors who had called on him
for consultations.

He looked alert and well.
During the day he sipped soda
and chatted with everybody.

A few hours later the
80-year-old leader passed away
peacefully in his sleep in the
hospital in Mombasa
on the Indian Ocean.
It was the darkest moment in the
history of independent Kenya
since its birth.

His death took the whole
nation by surprise. Now a
great nation mourned Africa's
greatest giant, the wise and
loving leader they had ever
known.

He lay in state on a simple
casket in the reception hall of
the House in Nairobi.

Thousands upon thousands of
people surged back and forth to

pay their last respects to the old man.

He lay guarded by four soldiers in red tunics who changed guard in turns. Thousands of messages poured in from all corners of the world. The Voice of Kenya played martial music and the old man's old speeches were replayed.

For the first time cinemas and social spots in the country closed for about a week, flags flew at half-mast for thirty days and shops and public places displayed the portrait of the old man on a background of black cloth.

And then his body placed in a wooden coffin borne on a grey carrier was escorted by uniformed police who walked slowly, thronged by milling crowds to his final resting place.

The four urns placed at each corner of the roofing of the mausoleum where the body of Mzee now lies were lit a day before he was laid there to rest for ever.

They burnt briskly in the hot August sun while the procession and the funeral followed.

Jomo Kenyatta was born at Nyenda in the Gatundu Division of Kiambu.

The 'Mbari' of his father Waigai stood on a spur of land between a fork of the Thiririka River. His mother's name was Wanjau.

No one knew when he was born. Even Kenyatta himself was unable to place the year with any certainty.

Yet this unknown Kikuyu boy was to become President of one of Africa's most progressive states after struggling for more than half a century to free his country from colonial rule, a cause which he was vilified and imprisoned.

From herding his step-fathers' goats and sheep he went on to learn how to write and read in a mission school where after meals washed dishes, learned to mend his own clothes and to help in the mission garden.

During the First World War Kenyatta went through a succession of jobs, became involved with the Kikuyu Central Association as the war ended and later went to England to present the plight of his people to the Colonial Government.

He was to stay there for several months, highlighting through the British press the basic grievances

of the Kikuyu on land, education women's hut tax, representation in the Legislative Council and retention of tribal customs.

He returned home after six months, but a year later Jomo Kenyatta returned to Europe again — and this time he was not to see his homeland for over 15 years.

But his legend did not die. When he returned in 1946 hundreds of men and women welcomed him at Mombasa and thousands of people packed the railway station to carry him shoulder high on his arrival back to Nairobi.

Steadily, Jomo Kenyatta assumed the national leadership seeking the involvement of all tribes in the fight for Uhuru.

The late James Gichuru stepped down to make way for Kenyatta as president of the Kenya African Union. Now white settlers singled him out as their principal enemy and constant efforts were made to discredit him.

The open conflict with settler interests was now obvious.

'EMERGENCY'

On October 20 the Emergency Proclamation was signed and Operation Jock Scott — the arrest of Kenyatta and 182 other named African leaders — swung into action. Kenyatta was detained at mid-night at his house at Githunguri.

The scene was set for the infamous Kapenguria Trial. After a long trial Kenyatta was sentenced in April 1953 to seven years imprisonment with hard labour and indefinite restriction thereafter.

A series of appeals and petitions were unsuccessful and finally Kenyatta exchanged his clothes for the convicts uniforms. His beard was shaved and for several months he wore chains around his ankles.

He went through the hardships of the arid Turkana region, breaking stones, digging, then filling in holes, coupled with deficiencies in diet.

Kenyatta suffered badly from eczema, and sores and swellings broke out all over his body in a violent reaction to a smallpox vaccination.

On May 14, 1960 Kenyatta was elected in absentia President of the Kenya African National Union KANU.

On the morning of August 14, 1961, three light aircrafts of the Kenya Police Airwing took off from Maralal. Seventy five minutes later Kenyatta stepped out at Kahawa Military airstrip. Kenyatta was back. And the march towards Independence was on.

Kenyatta became the first Prime Minister of a self-governing Kenya on June 1, 1963. And Kenya became a Republic within the Commonwealth in December 1964 with Kenyatta as President.

Following his 14 years of rule after the struggle for Indepen-

dance Mzee Jomo Kenyatta laid a firm foundation for his country and despite his old age died in the field of glory while leading his countrymen to more prosperity and happiness.

The struggle for independence was harder and taxing, but more glorious was the triumph when he finally led Kenya on the road to freedom and liberty, making way for an emerging nation which now ranks as the most stable in free Africa.

'TRANSITION'

The peaceful transition from one era to another of which this country experienced was attributable to his wise leadership and stands out as a shining legacy this country had inherited from Mzee.

It is not easy to put a proper price on the selfless service and dedication Mzee rendered to his nation.

From a freedom fighter to a statesman enjoying world acclaim, Mzee Kenyatta laboured so much to build Kenya more than any other mortal in his lifetime. He perhaps deserved his rest.

Countdown On 'Malindi Rally'

WITH just over a week to go to the start of the Firestone sponsored Malindi Rally, officials are busy with the final checking of the route, listing entries and sorting out control officers and their positions.

Now in its twenty fifth year, the Malindi is still a favourite with up-country drivers and locals alike.

Over the past few years, the Malindi Rally has been run from a fixed rally base, with all three legs starting and finishing from a coast hotel. This year, the motto becomes "Give the Malindi back to Malindi". With the start from the Mombasa International Casino at 7 p.m. on Saturday October 30, the first leg of 300 kilometres takes the cars over a variety of roads ending at Driftwood, Malindi, three hours later. This leg counts towards the Standard Production Car Championship event, so that Group One cars will end their rally at Driftwood.

After a rest period of three hours reducing to 30 minutes the main rally will be sent off at two minutes intervals on a route that brings them south and then inland.

The second leg of some 200 kms end at Nyali Sisal Estate, Taru. The leading car is due at 03.00 Sunday morning and refreshments will be available.

At 4.30 a.m. the leading cars will be flagged off on the 'third' and final leg of the rally. Several of the early sections are on private roads and minor tracks allowing high average speeds to be set.

The first car is due at the finish at the International Casino, Mombasa at 7 a.m. Sunday morning.

The majority of service points are along the main tarmac road, between Mazeras and Mackinnon road, but the difficulties of getting service crews across the Kilifi Ferry may make it necessary to use a second service vehicle near Malindi. The full service schedule will be available to paid up entries by this weekend.

The draw for start order in the Malindi Rally will be held at the Bahari Club at 8 p.m. on Wednesday 27th and the briefing of control officers will take place at the same place at 6 p.m. on the following day, Thursday 28th.

FISA, the International Control body for motor sport, have voted to keep the safari in the World Championship, both for makes and drivers.

The 1983 Marlboro Safari Rally, to be run as usual over the Easter Holiday March 31 - April 4 will be the third event in the 1983 International Rally season, one of ten throughout the world and the only one in Africa to count towards both makes and Drivers championship.

Coast Safari addicts will be interested to know that the recent format of Leg 1 to Mombasa and back will be repeated in 1983.

On the way to Mombasa, the Safari will pass through the Taika Hills, the ranchlands near Voi and then use main road Tarmac as far as Mariakani.

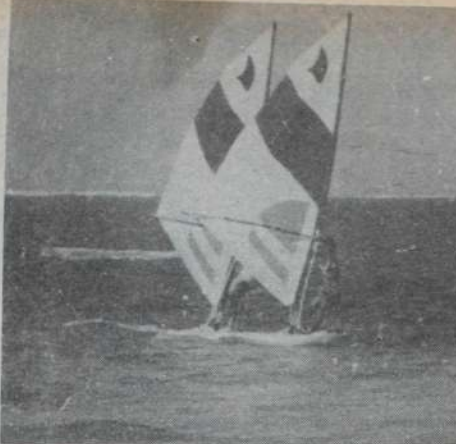
A short but competitive loop through Kaloleni, Mitongoni and Ribe will bring the cars into Mombasa by way off the scenic Maweni Kisauni Road.

The main control will be back in its favourite position on Mama Ngina Drive, so that the cars will travel over Nyali Bridge and along Digo Road, Nkrumah road, before reaching the rest control shortly after sunset on the first night of the rally.

Because of the very high risk of Mwachi River being flooded the Safari will use Likoni Ferry to get to the main South Coast road.

From Mwanguni, the route passes through Kinango and Samburu, before a second loop around the Kasigau area and the Taika Hills.

With both Marlboro as sponsors and FISA maintaining into prestige, the safari continues as the highlight of Kenya's sporting scene.

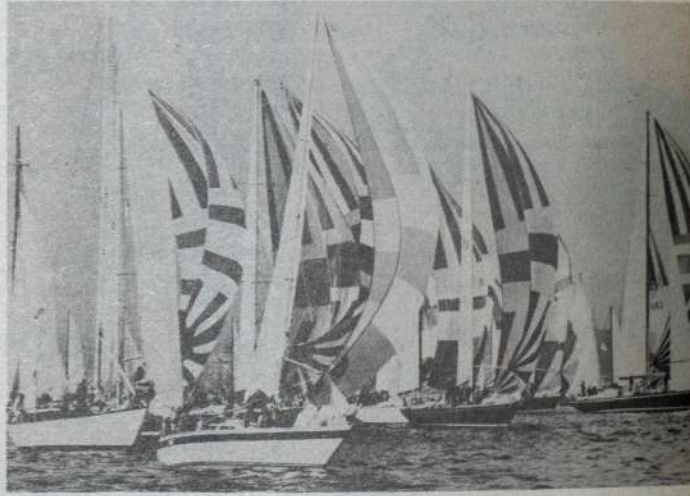
Kafoca's Simon Kitonyo and Municipality's Rashid Khamis were the highest scorers with 171 points each.

Coast Swimming Gala Set For This Weekend

AFTER a last minute postponement, the Coast Amateur Swimming Association is staging its two day Age Group and Relay Championships over Saturday and Sunday.
