JOIN THE FUN!

Kenyan Jaycees Honour

FOR the first time in the history of Kenya Jaycees, the organisation has won world recognition for "outstanding achievement in project activity".

The National Organisation was presented with the "Puerto Rico Trophy" for the "best national public relations programme", and overall handling of Kenya Jaycees public relations both internal and external at the 37th World Congress of Jaycees International in Korea, which ended on November 14.

In addition, Kisumu Jaycees received the Japan Junior Chamber Trophy for the most outstanding chapter project in the field of rendering humanitarian assistance to mentally handicapped persons.

This was presented for Kisumu's outstanding efforts in organising the 4th Special Olympics for Mentally Handicapped Children in conjunction with the society for Mentally Handicapped in October this year.

The Jaycees have been associated with the Special Olympics since 1979 and have hosted it in Nyeri, Nakuru, and Mombasa in the past. The award for Assistance to the Handicapped, first presented in 1976 has been won for the last time by an African country.

The 1982-1984 Major Emphasis Theme, North-South Cooperation programme has been particularly successful for Kenya as the National Organisation Kenya Jaycees received recognition as one of the top ten countries to promote this programme, and the National Theme Director, Salish Shah of Kisumu was recognised as one of the "Top Ten" directors of the world.

SIGNIFICANT

Of special significance was the award presented to Nairobi Junior Chamber, for their proposed programme of expanding the Karatina School for the Mentally Handicapped in Central Province. The chapter was awarded a certificate of merit and \$500 presented by Jean Junior Chamber.

'SAVE THE RHINO' PROJECT SPONORS NEEDED

THE East African Wildlife Society has appealed to individuals and private companies to sponsor the Save The Rhino Walk which is scheduled to begin on December 29.

Mr. Michael Werikhe of Mombasa has volunteered to walk 500kms from Mombasa to Nairobi in an effort to raise funds for use on Rhino conservation in Kenya.

"There has been a reduction of more than 90 per cent of black rhinos in Kenya from ten years ago", says Mr. N. K. Arap Rotich, executive officer of the East African Wildlife Society, "and it is for this reason that we have sponsored Mr. Werikhe to collect funds".

Nairobi companies and individuals are reported to have shown interest in the project but the response in Mombasa is said to have been very low. So far only the Friends of Fort Jesus have come up with contributions towards the project.

Mr. Rotich said that the society is a non-profit making organisation founded in 1956 which has so far spent Kshs 10 million on conservation projects in Kenya.

"Any help given to Mr. Werikhe towards this noble project will be highly appreciated by the society".

THE private sector, as well as government, is doing much to promote tourism to Kenya — now described as the country's largest earner of urgently needed foreign exchange.

Jahn Reisen of Germany — which reports an 80 per cent increase in bookings for the "high season", compared with last year, together with African Tours and Hotels sponsored a week's visit of eight journalists from leading daily newspapers and magazines in Germany here to help further promote Kenya as a holiday destination.

One of the newspapers represented was *Bild* — which enjoys the largest circulation in the whole of Europe.

Gert Kreyszig of *Sued-Deutsche* has been to Kenya five times before, the first visit being 18 years ago.

He said he had been overwhelmed on seeing the many developments that have taken place.

In Nairobi there was a luncheon party to welcome them all at *Milmani Hotel* which was addressed by the Tourism and Wildlife Minister, Elijah Mwangale, and attended by A. T. & H. chairman John Kotite and senior members of the staff.

The Minister spoke of the importance of the tourist industry to Kenya and mentioned that it was now a No. 1 earner of foreign exchange.

Jahn Reisen is a subsidiary of L.T.U. and it was L.T.U. *Tri-Star* which brought these journalists here. During Kenya's high season, L.T.U. is flying here twice a week.

They stayed two nights at *Diani Reef Hotel* from where they visited other hotels on the

south coast. They travelled by train to Nairobi, then enjoying overnight stops at *Metu Mulika*, *Buffalo Springs* and *Mountain Lodges*.

All were most impressed by the attractions Kenya has to offer, including good hotels, lodges, food and service, and will be writing articles about their visit to generate more interest and thereby attract more people to spend a holiday in Kenya.

Jahn Reisen has an office at the Coast HQ of A. T. & H., and Mr. Tom Trajanovic, regional manager for Kenya, Seychelles and Mauritius said they hope the summer season will also show a big increase in bookings, particularly after all the publicity Kenya will be receiving in the German press following the visit of these journalists.

Their tour ended at *Mombasa Beach Hotel* where they enjoyed a superb dinner in *Maxim's Cellar* hosted by Jahn Reisen and met Freddie Trumba, general manager, and were entertained by the *Midnight Savannah*.

Great Favourite

A great favourite among them on the a la carte menu was *Steak Diabla* with lots of garlic, while others enjoyed *Lobster Dumas*, which came jumbo-sized.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Municipal Council of Mombasa will acquire three compacting type of refuse collection vehicles at a cost of Kshs 1,377,360/= and a further ten side loader vehicles expected to cost Kshs 2.4 million to serve areas less accessible to the larger vehicles.

The decision to obtain the vehicles was reached at the Council's monthly meeting where the Municipal Council Medical Officer of Health Dr. A. Mugenyia in a report stated that refuse collection and disposal have not been adequately done.

The compacting vehicles will be used to serve large institutions like hotels and hospitals which have in the past been served three times a week only.

REFUSE DUMPING

In the report the Medical Officer complained that the dumping of refuse could not be controlled due to lack of essential equipment like bulldozers, tipper lorries, floodlights and a fence; although they have always been requested for in the council budget since the mid 1970s.

Reports 'Refuted'

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — A report appearing in one of the newspapers saying that Arab girls were being forced to cut their hair at Kilifi Primary School has been strongly refuted by the town's KANU secretary Mr. Marko Otieno. Mr. Otieno who is also a parent at the school said every educational institution required its students to be clean and neat, and that race was not the determinant factor. He termed the report as divisive, adding that it should not be tolerated in an independent Kenya where all residents lived in harmony under the Nyayo philosophy of peace, love and unity. Turning to the alleged threat, of some parents to transfer their daughters from the school Mr. Otieno said such parents were free to do so if they could find schools that were not run on discipline. Similar sentiments were expressed by the chairman of Kilifi County Council Mr. Shariff Alwi who clarified that the Moslem religion did not forbid the cutting of unkempt hair.

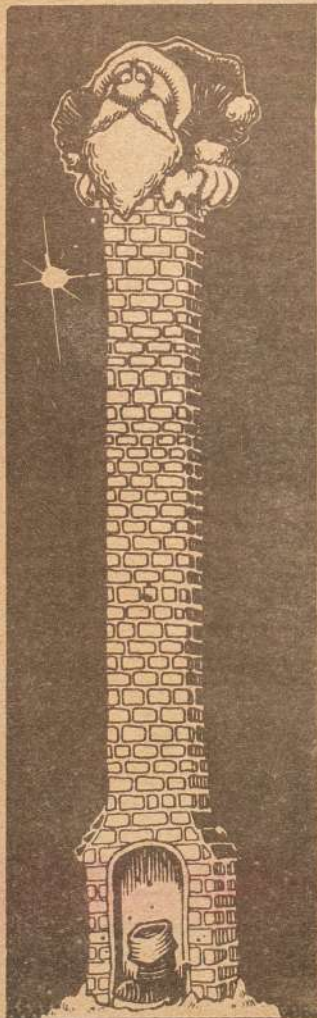

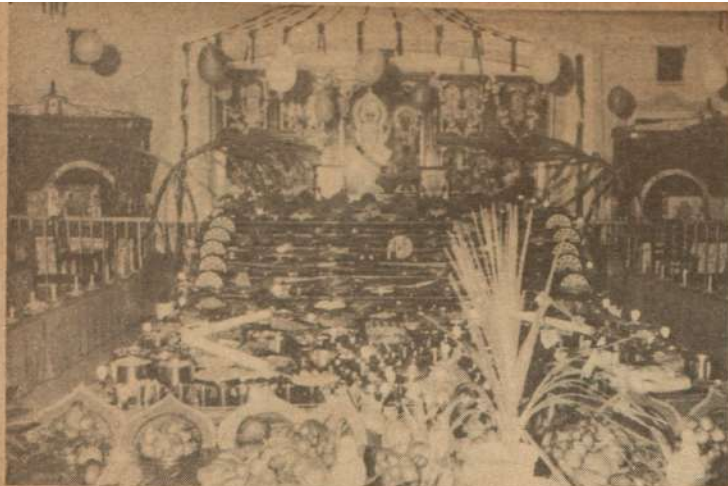

DAVID KOSSOFF

THE British Council has now arranged for two performances at the Little Theatre Club by radio and television favourite, publishing best-seller and now stage Bible story-teller David Kossoff: on Tuesday November 30 at 8p.m. and Wednesday December 1 at 9 p.m.

David Kossoff trained as a draughtsman and became a top furniture designer at the age of 19. His aim to become an actor was interrupted by the war during which he was "chained to a drawing-board". But he spent every spare moment in an amateur group theatre, where he was "noticed" and given a six-year B.B.C. contract at the war's end: left and shot ahead in TV and films winning somewhere along the way a British Academy Award.

Then came transference of his unique story-telling gifts to stage performances. Some idea of his wit and style may be gained by some quotes:-

Samson: "A bit of a fool with women... but mixed marriages have worked before... he was visiting a lady friend in Gaza: after all, caves get lonely..."

Tobias: "... whose friend's name was now Azarias. It was Raphael, and he was an angel.

An Archangel in fact. A special one, on a special job..."

Ruth: "... who gets top billing, but for me Naomi is the one... You said Boaz was old. He's not old, he's sort of mature, distinguished, adult..."

Abraham: "... and Sarah looked up in the tall man's face, and didn't laugh... 'Alright, said God, thirty'..."

Moses: "I come from Egypt! 'I know," said God, and you're going nack back there... Very fond of a bit of magic the Egyptians are," said God.

David: "A man, as my father used to say, like other men, but in a more fancy chair... Bathsheba wasn't a bad woman, but such things happen..."

Elijah: "Always a bit bad tempered, was Elijah. Mind you, wearing a shirt woven of camel's hair couldn't have helped..."

AGA KHAN MAY ESTABLISH NEW AFRICAN UNIVERSITY

THE PROPOSED AGA KHAN University in Karachi, Pakistan, may establish a Faculty in Africa. His Highness Prince Aga Khan has said in Dar es Salaam.

Hosting a return banquet in honour of President Nyerere at the Diamond Jubilee Hall, The Aga Khan pointed out that the University will be unique in having Faculties in other countries and will address itself to Third World problems.

The University is the largest project sponsored by the Aga Khan Foundation which has seven affiliates in several countries. In Tanzania, it is funding a new primary health care office and

a Director of Primary Health Care will be appointed to liaise with the up-country health centres.

He is expected to inaugurate a Silver Jubilee expansion and renovation scheme for the out-patients department at the Dar es Salaam Aga Khan Hospital to cater mainly for the urban poor.

The Programme will be carried out in phases and is expected to cost more than dollars 25 million when completed.

The Aga Khan who is the spiritual leader of the Shia Imami Ismaili Muslims is visiting Tanzania as part of his tours to various countries where his followers are based to mark the Silver Jubilee of his accession to the Imamate. Besides Dar es Salaam, he also visited Dodoma, Mwanza and Moshi.

HEALTH SERVICES

Prince Karim noted that the broader Aga Khan health and education services were open to all races as they were aimed at complementing national efforts.

Citing figures, he said that 91 per cent of the 213,000 out-patients treated by this year, 70 per cent of the 3,000 students that have been educated and 84 per cent of the teachers are non-Ismaili. The Aga Khan runs 300 educational institutions in the Third World.

Turning to its industrial wing - The Industrial Promotion Services (IPS). The Aga Khan said that in Tanzania it was involved in 11 projects, some in partnership with the State-owned institutions employing a total of 4,500 people.

"Indeed I.P.S. has already gone a long way in utilising local materials to avoid foreign imports", he stated adding that one of its greatest strengths is the quality and flexibility of its management resources.

Prince Karim cautioned the audience not to confuse the Imam's social and economic institutions endeavours with the less desirable aspects of unrestrained capitalism just because they continue to be privately managed.

"The Ismaili Imam has no single home country and so its activities are international and institutional as opposed to governmental".

'THIRD WORLD'

He stressed that all the Imam's activities, agencies and services seek to identify themselves with the objectives of the developing countries and "my intention is that the benefits of their enterprise should be recirculated within the Third World".

Prince Karim reiterated the Imam's declared policy that their followers be loyal to their settled countries - for the most part as minorities.

"I believe that they are demonstrating that loyalty, often in very difficult circumstances, throughout the world".

Later Prince Karim, President Nyerere, Begum Salimah, Prince Ayni (The Aga Khan's younger brother), and Sir Eboo Pirbhaj (The Aga Khan's Representative) and other guests were entertained to Local and Indian dances by school children.

Danish Aid Helps Start Up Three District Hospitals

THE THREE DISTRICT HOSPITALS in Dar es Salaam region have started to work effectively - thanks to aid from the Danish Government. The three hospitals in Temeke, Ilala and Kinondoni will also relieve a heavy burden on the Country's largest hospital - Muhimbili Medical Centre [NMC] also in Dar es Salaam. The hospital began taking in-patients and their services were boosted with the presentation of two VW Golf vehicles.

More vehicles and a rural health cinema van all valued at more dollars 21,000 will be donated next week by the Danish Development Agency [DANIDA].

DANIDA which funded the building of the three units also donated Chloroquine drugs worth dollars 21,500, mosquito spraying equipment - dollars 34,780 and assisted in the building of 36 demonstration toilets worth dollars 19,500.

NMC or Princes Margaret Hospital as it was originally known after the sister of Queen Elizabeth, was initially established as the Country's first consultant hospital in the mid-fifties. But with the lack of a proper hospital in Dar es Salaam, the hospital failed to give proper services to the people.

The opening of two more consultant hospitals in Mwanza and Moshi decreased an influx from the highly populated northern and north-western areas, but there was a great vacuum with regard to the central and southern areas.

The British Government is funding the merger of the Baptist

hospitals in Mbeya Region to cater for the southern highlands regions and a fifth hospital is to be built in southern regions once the Country's cinderella

incorporated the Finnish aided project whose total capital cost is expected to exceed the dollars 21 million mark.

The mine is owned by the State Mining Corporation who have collaborated on a turn-key basis with KONE Corporation of Finland. KONE will provide its own experts for the first five years and Tanzania personnel will receive on-the-job training and overseas training.

At full capacity, MPC will mine about 165,000 tonnes of soft phosphate ore capable of processing 100,000 tonnes of phosphate concentrate. Its reserves are understood to be around 9.8 million tonnes.

In Mbeya region, tapping of carbon dioxide gas at Kyego has started distribution and is expected this week. The Plant has an initial capacity of producing 300 kgs of gas per hour on a single shift and is capable of meeting the Country's industrial demand of carbon dioxide gas for the next two to three decades.

India is to import cement, sisal products, wattle bark, oil seeds and cashewnuts from Tanzania's participation at the International Trade Fair in New Delhi early this month.

The Lions Club of Dar es Salaam [HOST] plans to contribute immensely to the City's environment. It will provide litter bins to be fixed on trees, telephone and electric poles and will plant flowers and trees along the City's main dual carriage-ways.

The Club members have also embarked on informing the public on the hazards of the killer disease - "Diabetes" and how to avert it. The Lions Club of Dar es Salaam [City] is supplying desks to a number of primary schools in the City.

Developing countries are very noted for improper planning - but this one is different. Some 5,000 geese chicks have been imported into the country before the project infrastructure was completed. The UNDP and FAC have jointly financed the proposed integrated geese-fish farming project near Morogoro some 200 kms from Dar es Salaam.

A similar project of importing horses from Australia as a substitute for cheap transportation. Many of the horses fell sick and some died leaving the project co-ordinators to grapple with the remaining horses for other purposes.

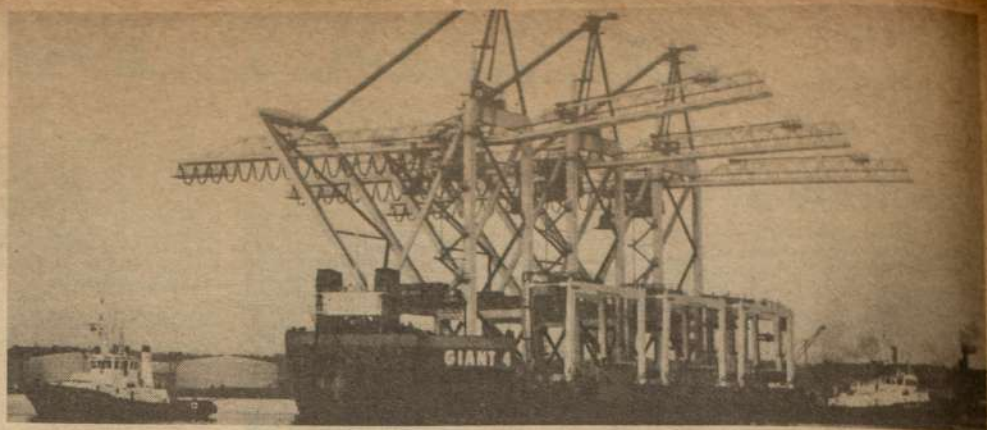

**ANOTHER EXCELLENT
PORT PERFORMANCE**

A NEW 'OUTSIDER' line is coming into the Europe /East Africa trade. The newcomer is the Saudi Europe Line (S.E.L.) which was at one time expected to start up last July. After this delay the first sailing was expected ex Antwerp 16/18 November for Djibouti, Hodeidah, Aden, Mombasa, Dar es Salaam, Tanga, Mogadiscio, Berbera, Moroni and Kismayu. Certainly a wide spread and it will be interesting to watch their performance with their sailings every 20 days particularly as the established lines have to fight for every ton of cargo. Mombasa Agents are presently unknown to me.

In my notes last week I expressed the hope that the *Beacon* (British Lines) 33,000 tons cellular containers vessel *Barrister* would achieve an equally promising despatch as her consort *Quellin*.

I am pleased to report that the vessel commenced work at 10.15 hrs on 17th and completed at 19.45 hrs on the 19th with a total of 496 containers handled averaging 9.05 containers per gross working hours - an excellent performance by the Kenya Ports Authority.

Unfortunately this achievement was somewhat tarnished by the breakdown of the pilot launch so that the vessel was not delayed for some 14 hrs and did not sail for Felixstowe until 11.30 hrs on Saturday. The daily cost of this vessel is some US dollars 14,000 per day so this delay was to the order of Kenya Shs 90,000.

Seeing the KPA have only one pilot launch at the present time, would it be asking too much for the Authority to bring into action an immediate and contingency plan in the event of breakdown of the pilot cutter thus maintaining the uninterrupted flow of shipping in East Africa's premier port?

Weather in the English Channel and approaches has lately been

boisterous with violent gales. The British Coaster *Nasem* sank with some loss of life off the Scilly Isles whilst on voyage from North Africa to Whitehaven in the North of England. During this period the 26 year Mediterranean Shipping Company's *Diego*, a regular Mombasa caller, whilst outward bound from Antwerp lost 3 full containers overboard; they were subsequently seen to be still afloat by several passing vessels.

Another MSC vessel presently discharging in Mombasa is the 12 year old 14,400 d.w. ton *Valeria* at No. 7 berth ex N.W. Continent and U.K. There was certainly no loss of space on this conventional type vessel with her decks crammed with containers, break bulk cargo and vehicles, in fact several vehicles round the base of the funnel and even a Combi above the bridge. The *Alexa II* is a further MSC vessel at No. 2 berth also discharging ex N.W. Continent and U.K.

Stowaways continue unabated. The Danish Cattle ship *Helene Clausen* which sailed for the Arabian Gulf discovered six Tanzanians who had stowed away in Mombasa, whilst the French CGM vessel *Ville de Nantes* sailed Mombasa 17th November discovered two on the 22nd without papers.

Lykes Lines, whose vessels are regular users of the port, have been in the news in the context of American big business. Some 4 years ago Lykes became a subsidiary of the giant LTV Corporation. However, LTV have evidently not found the returns on shipping so attractive so they have broken away and the Directors have bought themselves out and re-acquired independent status. This was an unusual move in today's world of conglomerates and mergers.

The *Fateh al Khair* one of the permanent residents of Kilindini which has featured regularly in my notes finally sailed for Dubai on November 15th ex No. 1 berth with her full cargo of mangrove poles. For whatever party has to foot the bill, the cost of unloading, re-loading and detention must amount to a considerable sum.

Having occasion to visit Dar es Salaam last week, a familiar looking vessel at anchor off the port had that Clan Line look about her. On enquiry she was

the 8,700 tons gross African Diamond ex Clan Alpine. She had arrived off Dar es Salaam on October 18th to "await orders". She visited Mombasa in April this year as the *African Diamond*. Needless to add she flies the Liberian flag.

When in Dar es Salaam, I learnt that the Harbour Authority have bought a new tug from Holland and that she is now on her way out with a delivery crew.

I understand she will subsequently be coming to Mombasa and whilst here will take in tow the self propelled water-barge, (capacity 300 tons) built by Scope for the Tanzania Harbour Authority and which has been reclining on the shore within the port area since the break up of the E. A. Community, opposite the fire station for some five years. I am glad she is to be commissioned at last.

The number of unemployed vessels laid up now account for some 11 per cent of the world's fleet. The number is now up to 1431 vessels with dry cargo vessels in the majority.

One of the largest tankers ever seen off Mombasa called 'off port limits' on Wednesday morning to embark an engineer and spare parts. She was the Liberian flag LILCC (ultra large crude carrier) *London Trader* of 356,400 d.w. tons in light condition bound from the US Gulf to Yenbo, Saudi Arabia. She is owned by Marathon Tankers, London and built in 1975. Her local agents Mackenzie Maritime Ltd. arranged a rendezvous at day-break some 3 miles from the turning buoy.

GREEK CRUISE LINER

On a day visit on Tuesday at No. 1 berth was the small Greek cruise liner *Atlas* of 15,000 tons. She had about 200 passengers on a round Africa cruise. Her last visit was about two years ago.

She is owned by Epirotiki Lines, Piraeus, a well known Greek shipowning family who operate several cruise vessels.

The *Atlas* was built 31 years ago for the Holland America Line as the *Rijnadam* and was a popular transatlantic passenger vessel. Apart from rivetted shell plating her completely redesigned appearance well disguised her true age.

to Lake Ghala for scenes in 'Tracking Elephants'. For this his plane was painted a dirty mud brown.

The seaplane now repainted, visits Watamu on a Sunday. Apart from short jaunts, he does 'day trips' up the north coast to Kiwitu, and on the south coast to Wasini Island. From the plane passengers can go snorkelling in the beautiful marine park there.

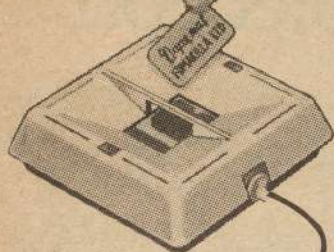

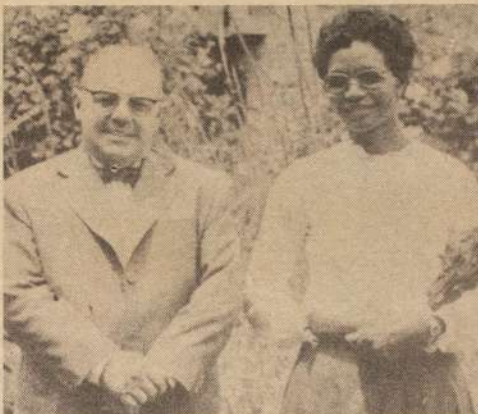

ERROL ON FOOD

CABBAGE is perhaps the most abused of all vegetables. It is more often than not over-cooked, soggy with water and most of its nutrient value destroyed before it reaches the table. This need not be so, with a bit of proper attention cabbage can be delicious.

Cooking will vary somewhat according to type and the amount of stalk and size of leaf involved. But follow the general rule of cooking it in plenty of boiling salted water, so that it re-boils fast once the cabbage is added; alternatively mainly people like to cook it without any water at all (specially white or red cabbage).

The solid white cabbage which we mainly get in Kenya is superb when served in the Italian manner with the simple addition of a little cream and a spoonful of horseradish sauce - making it worthy of any roast meat and so good it could be eaten alone if one was inclined to vegetarianism. The red cabbage goes with ham, turkey, goose or duck making a useful dish at Christmas time.

The Most Abused Of All Vegetables

CAVOLO ALLA PANNA

1 white cabbage
1/2 pint thin cream
salt and black pepper
1 tsp of horseradish sauce
freshly ground nutmeg

Cut one, the cabbage into four and remove the stalks. Shred the leaves across but not too finely. Wash in cold water. Put into a large pan with plenty of boiling, salted water. Simmer for ten minutes. Drain well in a colander.

Return it to the pan and add the cream, horseradish sauce and nutmeg and stir in, cover with a lid and finish cooking over a gentle heat stirring from time to time. If the cabbage

has made more juice, remove the lid when nearly cooked and boil fiercely to reduce the liquor. Excellent with all beef dishes and roast pork.

CAVALO RIPIENO

This stuffed cabbage reminds me of that delicious Polish dish Golompki - but since once cannot get rice here is an appealing Italian alternative.

1 whole cabbage
1/2 lb chooped cooked spinach
1/4 lb chopped cooked mushrooms
3 egg yolks

salt and black pepper
2 ozs grated cheese
well flavoured stock
2 ozs butter

Cut off the main stalk of the cabbage and remove the leaves. Blanch in boiling salted water for five minutes then drain well. Cut out any thick stalk from the leaves then make each leaf into a small parcel, filled with the mixture of spinach, mushrooms, breadcrumbs, eggs and cheese and seasonings.

Fry each 'parcel' lightly in butter until they just take on a little colour. Pack these parcels into a casserole, pour well seasoned chicken or beef stock over, and braise in a moderate oven for half an hour.

FLEMISH RED CABBAGE

1 red cabbage thinly sliced
4 cooking apples
1 onion thinly sliced
1 dsp castor sugar
3 tbs vinegar
3 tbs water
a knob of butter
salt and black pepper

Remove the coarse outer leaves and the stalk and shred finely. Place this with the sliced onion in a casserole with the water, vinegar and seasonings.

Cover the place in a moderate oven for about an hour. Next add the peeled, cored and finely sliced apple to the casserole, sprinkle the sugar over and return to the oven for another hour.

Check seasoning and add a knob of butter before serving. Serves 6-8 people.

Finally a delicious but very simple way of serving Brussels sprouts, with lemon juice.

The way to prevent their unpleasant smell from permeating the entire house when they are cooking is to place a thick slice of bread on the top of them and keep a lid on.

This takes up all the smell, the same applies to cabbage.

Wash two pounds of sprouts and remove the tatty outer leaves and tough stalk ends. Boil in plenty of boiling salted water for ten minutes. Drain. Toss in a pan with 2 ozs of butter, salt and black pepper and the juice of a whole lemon.

On the Kenya coast they were somewhat dismayed to find so much coral and shells from the sea being sold on the beaches. They had also witnessed a boatman picking up a live starfish, cutting it open with a knife and then handing it to someone on the beach to sell.

Said these two doctors, "Kenya should feel proud of the beauty she has all around her, and not allow it to be taken away. Instead it should be protected for people to enjoy and future generations to see".

They suggested that perhaps more publicity should be given to the preservation of Kenya's marine life and reef. Said Mrs. Schnurer "if tourists do not buy the coral and shells, then such business is bound to gradually disappear."

President's Success As OAU Chairman

AFTER MANY YEARS standing in for Mzee Jomo Kenyatta at OAU Summits and after three years leading his country following the death of the founder of the Kenyan Nation, President Daniel Arap Moi assumed the tough job of being the OAU chairman during the Organization's Summit conference in Nairobi last year. This week President Moi hands over the chairmanship to Libyan leader Mummar Gaddafi after serving so well the African continent during his tenure of office.

In his capacity as the OAU chairman, President Moi spoke effectively for the whole of Africa, strove for peace (a scarce commodity, indeed in Africa) among its nations and helped to advance the liberation struggle in Southern Africa. He was the key man whose personal views and ability were geared to solving numerous problems — no matter how small — which are still up to now facing the African Continent.

For many years President Moi had had a long experience with the OAU as well as the International scene.

As Vice President he represented Kenya in almost every OAU summit meeting in place of the late President Jomo Kenyatta and had the opportunity to share and exchange views with many African statesmen on a wide variety of issues which even today still plagues the continent.

As a result President Moi had acquired the real dress rehearsal as the best possible keyman to steer further the destiny of Africa in those

turbulent times in the entire continent. Opening the 32nd meeting of the Council of Ministers of the OAU as early as February 1978 in Nairobi, President Moi appealed to African countries to avoid wars and observe the sanctity of territorial borders.

After the abortive summit in Tripoli in August, President Moi once again warned African Leaders of the signs of disunity emerging among the African rank and called all members states to attend the reconvened meeting in Tripoli this week.

During the past year President Moi played host to heads of state from both Africa and Asia. During his term of office he made a number of travels within the African Continent in search of peace and settling bilateral disputes in many areas of the continent.

In this respect, the outgoing chairman played a major role in diffusing disputes among member states and helped to spearhead progress in solving the outstanding conflicts and problems in Africa such as the decolonization of Namibia, the removal of the apartheid system in South Africa, bilateral quarrels in Benin and Gabon

Chad, the Western Sahara issue, and the implementation of the Lagos Plan of Action for economic development of Africa.

On the international scene, President Moi as the chairman of the OAU attended international forums such as the UN and the Commonwealth conference to present a collective African position on African Affairs as well as other International matters.

Moi's term of office was more demanding because the OAU had in the past failed to solve many of Africa's problems and time had run out on some of these issues and their nature had changed.

Cases in point are the Western Sahara issue which led to the abortive summit in Tripoli in August and the current row over the Chad representation to the Tripoli summit.

Both disputes splitting the rank and file of the Organisation of African Unity and threatening its very existence, have proved beyond doubt that time is no longer the greater healer of African problems and that the Organisation must once and for all come to grips with its problems and put its house in order.

During his tenure of office, President Moi has shown great understanding and concern for African problems, including courage and abounding energy. In the long run, these are the qualities which will be required of the next statesman entrusted with the destiny of the continent.

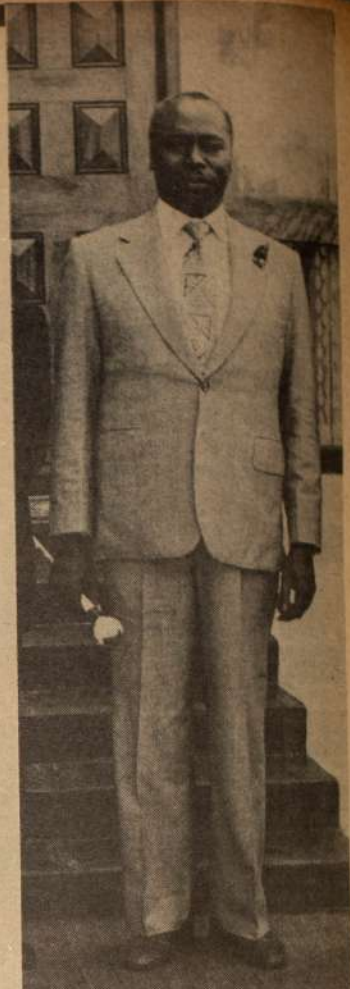

AFRICAN UNITY AND SPIRIT OF THE NYAYO PHILOSOPHY

IT ALL started on May 20th, 1963 when Kenya decided resolutely to join her few African nations to form the organisation for unity. That day thirty one African statesmen of freed African countries converged into the capital of Ethiopia, Addis Ababa to make a wise and well thought decision: That African countries should be united and form a strong and well disciplined institution through which all free African nations would have a common forum to discuss their problems and help each other in solving some of their problems and overcoming their economic, cultural, educational, technological, social and political difficulties.

The year 1963 was the year Organisation of African Unity was born amidst other three main political groupings: Casablanca, the Monrovia Group and the Brazzaville Twelve; a division resulting from serious disagreements over the number of problems of African importance which went back to 1960-61.

AGREEMENTS

Among these were the disagreements over the status of Algeria during her fight for independence and over the policy towards the Congo (Kinshasa), then plunged in disastrous civil war.

The eradication of colonialism, of racial discrimination and the apartheid policy are issues on which African Leaders have always stood firmly united. Now the O.A.U. has grown to embrace over fifty Independent

African States, each of whom piously and faithfully desires to see African Continent achieve all forms of progress and prosperity and indeed all the states feel that could only be brought about if there was genuine and true unity among the African States.

The sentiment of genuine unity is ever expressed in all their gatherings, conferences since that day on May 20th, 1963 and would indeed still be the aspiration of November 23rd, 1982 Summit meeting at the capital of Libya, Tripoli when our beloved President Moi would be handing over the chairmanship to the Libyan leader, Muammar Gaddafi.

Kenya, are indeed proud and happy with the way. His Excellency President Moi triumphantly managed to lead the OAU during his tenure and kept up the good Kenyan image ever brightly shining.

It has been always felt that it was through genuine African Unity that other important factors of co-operation and co-ordination in activities such as common market for Africa, African currently, African monetary zone, African Central Bank and a continental communication system could sustain success if they were to be properly established.

The paramount desire that prevailed that day of May, 1963 was that there should be genuine

trust and respect between and among the African states and acceptance of equality by all the states. No matter whether they are big or small; they are all sovereign nations.

The aims and objects and the purposes of the Organisation of African Unity were spelt out at the Conference which stated in Article II (i) as follows:—

To promote the Unity and solidarity of African States.

To co-ordinate and intensify their co-operation and efforts to achieve a better life for the people of Africa.

To defend their sovereignty, their territorial integrity and independence.

To eradicate all forms of colonialism from Africa.

To promote international co-operation, having due regard to the Charter of the United Nations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership to the Organisation is a right for all African independent states and it can only be accorded to an "Independent Sovereign African State". Each member shall have one vote.

All resolutions shall be determined by a two third majority of the member states and question of procedure shall require simple majority.

With the spirit of Philosophy of Nyayo, the African statesmen attending the Summit would have their wisdom prevailed and the African Unity would be forever remain indestructible.

Improving One's Mental Health At Bamburi Beach ...

INTERNATIONAL forums at Jomo Kenyatta Conference Centre not only benefit the hotel and tourist industry in Nairobi, but at the coast as well, with many delegates taking a beach holiday before they return home.

Doing just that were a 49-strong group from Ireland who were at the 8th World Congress of the International League of Societies for the Mentally Handicapped, officially opened by the Basic Education Minister, Jonathan Ng'eno. They afterwards spent a week relaxing on the Coast.

It was the first time for them to come as a group to Kenya. Among them were many brothers and sisters who are missionaries or nuns in this country.

Leading the group was Patrick Maloney, Chief Executive Officer, St. Michael's House Service for the Mentally Handicapped, Dublin, who described the Congress as "highly successful" adding "it was probably one of the best for the last decade".

Thirty-three stayed at Bamburi Beach Hotel "soaking in the sun" while basking in the friendly service offered by a fellow countryman [now a Kenyan] Sean Gavaghan, the Hotel's General Manager, and his staff.

At Bamburi they went scuba diving, fishing and on sight-seeing tours, having a "very enjoyable and relaxing time in the sun".

A cocktail party to welcome them was hosted by Bamburi Beach to give them all the opportunity to meet, surgeons and doctors, and others interested in the mentally handicapped at Mombasa.

With the group was Jim Sherwin of Irish television who makes some of the best documentary films on the mentally handicapped in the world. The group's visit to Kenya will be incorporated into one of his programmes. Another distinguished visitor was Dr. John Cooney, one of the founder members of the Irish National Society of Mentally Handicapped and founder member of the International League of Societies for the Mentally Handicapped.

There were also Jim Keogh, Chief Executive of the Irish Nursing Board, The Very Reverend Archdeacon Jerry O'Sullivan from Cork and Michael Collins-Powell, a member of the Board of Directors of the Cork Association for the Mentally Handicapped, who is

also the grand-nephew of a famous Irish Republican leader, Michael Collins.

Their Kenya visit was arranged through Rhino Safaris and en-route to the Coast from Nairobi they had an overnight stop at Kilaguni Lodge, the first to be built in a Kenya game park.

They described Kenya as "absolutely wonderful". All were "stunned by the vastness and richness of the Country, and by the softness and courtesy of the people".

Mr. Maloney said that the Congress had gone into such issues as aborting handicapped children before birth, and of the prevention of mental handicaps in countries ranging from the highly developed, such as Sweden, to the developing nations of the world.

The Congress had stressed the need for "partnership" between parents and professionals, also between the state and voluntary organisations caring for the mentally handicapped.

ART FEAST AT GALLERY MASHA'ALLAH

THERE was a feast of art of Gallery Masha'allah with twenty-seven artists of all races exhibiting over one-hundred pictures all selling for under Shs. 1,000 each.

Some 300 guests turned up to the opening of its Christmas Exhibition, and also had the opportunity of seeing the new Gallery Masha'allah which is more spacious and nearer to Fort Jesus Museum in Ndia Kuu road.

Among the artists exhibiting were Daniel Njoroge from Nairobi, who is being promoted by the Firmin Gallery and does some beautiful detailed animals, also Vitalis Oduo of Mombasa with some classical African-style paintings.

There was also some sand paintings by Christopher Adolwa.

There are also some interesting African prints of Livingstone on the Zambesi and Count Telesi from Bruce Trzebinski's collection, as well as some colourful Pokomo mats and traditional Lamu chairs.

international casinos.

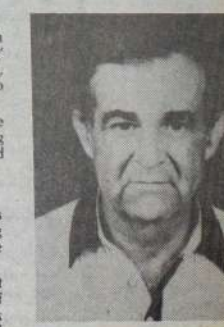
In 1977 he arrived in Kenya as an employee of Tourists' Paradise Investments Limited, in the capacity of casino Inspector in Nairobi.

It's Time Once More For The Ever-Popular 'Dial-A-Disc' Show!

The 1982/83 "Dial-A-Disc" Charity Programme will be beamed over Radio Tanzania from December 9 to January 9. The organisers are the Dar es Salaam Round Table Auction Master Sajid Versi told COASTWEEK that they had been allocated 71 hours broadcasting time as opposed to 76 hours in 1981/82. In 1981/82, the tablers raised an all-time record of 1.6 million shillings thanks to the efforts of all the tablers and their convenor, table Ali Mangungu who died last month in Dar es Salaam in a car crash.

In 1980/81, the tablers raised 800,000/= and the previous year, a total sum of 1.4 million shillings was collected. The tablers could not state how much they hoped to raise but from the current trends, they could well fetch a million shillings.

They have received two Dar-London return air tickets donated by the Belgian Airline Sabena and arrangements are in hand to have two Dar-Bombay air tickets donated by Air-India.

The programme is beamed over the radio's external service mainly incorporating the musical programmes and although the club's "community chest" takes the Lion's share of the pledges for requests, listeners are free to contribute to their National and Dar es Salaam Charitable Organisations.

The Lions Club of Dar es Salaam (city) are also hoping to raise some 600,000/= from the sale of raffle tickets. The first prize is a tractor.

The club will only get a net sum of 350,000/= as some 250,000/= worth of prizes will be given to the winners.

The club hopes to raise the remaining 250,000/= through other means to purchase 1,000



school desks worth 600,000/= to a number of primary schools in the city.

And in Southern Tanzania, the Lions Club offered property and food worth 3,000/= to patients at the Nyangao Hospital. The food will feed about 700 patients admitted daily at the hospital.

The multi-million shillings Kidatu Electric Power Distribution Project to six of the country's regions will start in three months time at a total cost of about dollars 135 million.

The Canadian Government will meet half the costs of the project known as the North-West transmission grid to cover the Iringa, Dodoma, Singida, Shinyanga, Mwanza and Mara regions.

West German Aid

The German Agency for technical Co-operation GTZ will receive some dollars 175,000 for the financing of a two-year Pilot Project in three regions

under the Acute Respiratory Infections ARI.

The funds will be used to meet transport costs for village health workers and other medical staff at district and village level.

Two American Farming experts from Colorado University in the US have arrived in the country to work on a National Farming Research System. They will be visiting research centres and institutes in the country.

The Zanzibar Government has received 6,000 tonnes of wheat from abroad and a further 3,000 tonnes of sugar is due next week. The islanders need 9,000 tonnes of sugar, 18,000 tonnes of wheat and between 25,000 to 30,000 tonnes of rice a year.

Saudi Arabia will import 900 heads of cattle a month. Saudi businessman — Mr. Al Noor Shariff Jamal representing a number of companies in the Middle East, Europe and Australia has signed the contract with the state-owned Livestock Development Authority LIDA.

President Kaunda returned to Zambia, after attending a day's summit of the Tanzania Railway Authority (Tazara) with President Nyerere.

Earlier the council of Ministers meeting in Dar es Salaam was briefed on the problems of transfers of funds between the two countries which had hampered the Railway's operations.

The Tanzanian Minister for

Communications and Transport Mr. John Malecela pointed out that agreements reached by the Central Banks of the two countries had not been honoured.

The Ethiopian Airlines leased Air Tanzania flights from Dar es Salaam to Bombay have run into trouble. This week's flight was cancelled as ATC had not conformed to the Indian Civil Aviation Regulatory requirements.

Air Tanzania resumed its flights to Bombay since November 4, 1982 and so far all the flights have been over-booked. The Central Bank has suspended approving applications to give the airline a chance to grapple with a backlog.

But the irony of it all, is that the Bank has approved some applications of people intending to travel in January and people hoping to travel this month have yet to get approvals.

V.I.P. Cuban Visit

The Cuban vice-president Mr. Juan Almeida Bosque arrived in the country as guest of the vice-president, Mr. Aboud Jumbe. During his stay, he will hold talks with President Nyerere, inspect various Development Projects and view wild game.

A Commonwealth meeting of senior Government officials was held in Arusha to discuss the Commonwealth Secretariat objectives and priorities in the 1980's, and the Secretariat Management Structure. The Secretariat is based in London.

The meeting which is traditionally held in the inter-vening year between heads of Government meetings was opened by President Nyerere and is chaired by the Principal Secretary in the Tanzania President's Office, Mr. Timothy Apio.

'PAN-AFRICA TELECOMMS'

Press Statement issued by the Managing Director of Kenya Post and Telecommunications Corporation on the occasion of 1st African Telecommunications Day, December 7, 1982.

The Managing Director of Kenya Posts and Telecommunications Corporation Mr. Kipng'eno arap Ng'eny wishes to announce that December 7, 1982, has been observed throughout the continent as the first African Telecommunication Day.

This year's celebration coincided with the fifth anniversary of the signing of Pan African Telecommunications Union Convention.

The Pan African Telecommunications Union (PATU) is a specialised Agency of the Organisation of African Unity (OAU).

PATU was formed with the following objectives: to foster and maintain co-operation among Member States for the improvement, development, expansion and rational use of telecommunications networks and services and in this connection PATU's activities have centred on development and modernisation of inter-state links in Africa to avoid using colonial transit centres outside the continent for routing calls destined within the continent.

Other objectives include, to develop and modernise national networks involving rural areas in order to ensure economic viability of interstate links; to harmonise the telecommunications tariff structures to ensure regular maintenance of networks; to undertake

planning of training of senior officials and instructors including establishment of multi-national training centres, to establish an African telecommunications industry and to establish national telecommunications co-ordinating committees.

In its brief history PATU has, pursuant to its objectives, already accomplished a number of projects such as the organisation of a number of seminars some of which have been hosted in Kenya with the help of Kenya Government.

Last month another seminar organised by PATU in collaboration with the United Nations Industrial Development Organisation (UNIDO) was conducted in Algeria.

The theme of the seminar was industrialisation in the field of telecommunications in Africa and Kenya was represented at the seminar.

TRAINING

As regard the future, PATU plans in collaboration with donor agencies to step up fellowships for training in the field of telecommunications.

Furthermore, ATU will continue its co-ordination role in the continents, declared Transport and Communications Decade in order to ensure orderly development of African telecommunications infrastructure.

Other activities include the proposed African Satellite System and the establishment in collaboration with ITU of the African routing plan.

Hitting Back At Heartworm

I was interested to read the article about Heartworm in dogs by a "Veterinarian" (COASTWEEK, November 5-11), and particularly to read that "dog owners are assured that drugs are available to kill both the larvae in the blood stream and the adults in the heart".

Last August, I was one of the group of people who made exhaustive efforts to find a supply of the latter drug on behalf of a friend whose two large dogs were severely infested.

Among us, we contacted all the private veterinarians in the Nairobi area, the Small Animal Clinic at Kabete, and at least one veterinarian in Mombasa, as well as the pharmaceutical company said to be the sole importers of the drug.

All with the same result - only a tiny supply, inadequate to treat even one of the dogs, and long out-dated, could be located.

If these drugs are now available, I would be glad to know both the scientific and brand names, the manufacturers, and the local sources of supply, since in the past I have been asked to locate these drugs for our members living as far away as Nigeria.

*Veterinarian Comments:
Sodium Thiocetarsamide one percent (Filaramide) is available. The drug is manufactured in the USA by Fromm Laboratory, Wisconsin. Complication of therapy are drug toxicity or thromboembolism in the lungs from dead worms. Signs of toxicity are vomiting and diarrhoea. Other drugs for microfilariae are Levamisole, Diethylcarbamazine iodide and Diethylcarbamazine (Caracide). Some very new drugs are awaiting clearance and it is hoped that the problems of heartworm disease will be over soon.

NASSIR WAS RIGHT ...!

I would like to comment on a remark allegedly made by the Honourable Mr. Shariff Nassir, Assistant Minister for Labour and MP for Mombasa. He is quoted as saying that coastal people tended to be idle.

This, as you are aware is a debatable issue and I sympathise with the reactions of several writers in the local press challenging these allegations.

But at the same time I feel that Mr. Nassir is a man of integrity and his remarks were not necessarily malicious. He has, for instance, helped raise funds on several Harambee projects to help our brothers and sisters all over the republic proceed overseas for further studies.

In fact, I think Mr. Nassir has an important message for coastal people. In many fields coastal people may indeed have to work much harder in order to catch up with the other brothers and sisters in the rest of the republic.

After all, the productivity of say a maize farmer may at times be measured by the number of bags of maize harvested per acre.

If we stretch this argument to include the area of Higher Education, we find that the coastal region is performing miserably.

For instance, here at the Kenyatta University College campus where I work, I am about the most senior member of the teaching staff hailing from the whole of the Coast Province - but I am just a Lecturer!

You all know that University teaching positions are ranked upwards beginning from Lecturer, proceeding to Senior Lecturer, Associate Professor and Full Professor in that order.

Of course to teach here, one requires post graduate qualifications and whether we like what Nassir said or not, coastal people grossly lag behind in this area.

Meanwhile, the other regions of the republic are quite well represented. There is indeed the likelihood that sooner or

later, the other regions of the republic will question our ability to perform since our contribution in many other areas remains very minimal.

Furthermore, to the best of my knowledge, not a single woman hailing from the Coast Province had earned a Ph.D qualification.

Yet women Ph.D holders are quite numerous from the other regions of the republic. Perhaps it is time that the Coast

Chapter of the Maendeleo Ya Wanawake organisation encouraged our sisters there to pursue post-graduate studies.

I know how coastal people feel when they are accused of idleness. Yet I think we should regard Nassir's remarks as comparable to those made by a father to one of his naughty children.

Salvage Shows Better Profits

ONE BRANCH of the Shipping Industry which seems to more than hold its own is that of towage and salvage and vessels engaged in the offshore oil industry.

Smit International, one of the most famous names in marine salvage and part of the Nedlloyd Group, has turned in profits nearly double those of last year. This should also assist Nedlloyd who, in common with so many of the world's major shipping groups, is presently finding the going tough with second half of 1982 results expected to be very depressed. It is sometime since a Smit tug visited Mombasa although regular callers are the off shore oil supply vessels presently operating off the Somalia Coast.

The size of the American merchant fleet remains at much the same level unlike the fleets of so many Western nations. Although the fleet has reduced marginally by nine to 712 vessel compared to last year, the actual tonnage and capacity were the same reflecting the larger size of the

newer ships.

The port of Mombasa is going through another sluggish period with vacant berths being in double figures earlier this week, and viewing the forward forecasts there seems little chance of improvement with anywhere near full berth occupancy this side of Christmas.

There has been some increased activity amongst Taiwanese/Korean fishing vessels which are beginning to make regular calls again for repairs, bunkers and water purposes.

SISTERSHIPS

Next week the WEC Line vessel *Gala Del Mar* a sistership to the *Julia Del Mar* arrives from Europe on her maiden voyage. These two sisters, both self sustaining, will be the regular vessels operating WEC Line independent liner service in the foreseeable future.

Arriving on Sunday is the Greek bulk carrier *Panormos* with 14500 tons wheat. On the same day a cargo of 11000 tons bagged sugar is due on the 23 year old Panamanian vessel *Brazil 1* believe the sugar is destined for the Sudan.

MACKENZIE MARITIME CONTRACT

MACKENZIE Maritime Ltd. who number amongst their Shipowner Principals the British Lines full cellular Container Service (Beacon) have announced the appointment of Kenya Container Terminals Ltd. (KCT) as their inland haulage contractors with responsibilities for the tracking, transport, repair, etc., of all containers outside the port area on behalf of the Shipping Lines under their Agency. KCT commenced their new operations as from December 1.

PORT CARGO THROUGHPUT

THE total dry general cargo handled at the port of Mombasa during the month of November, 1982 was approximately 192,393 deadweight tonnes. This total was comprised of 105,101 tonnes of imports and 87,292 tonnes of exports.

During the month of October, the throughput was 175,763 tonnes composed of 108,064 tonnes of imports and 67,699 tonnes of exports. In November last year the performance was 199,017 tonnes made up of 145,189 tonnes of imports and 54,017 tonnes of exports.

A total of 68 general cargo ships called at the port during the month of November.

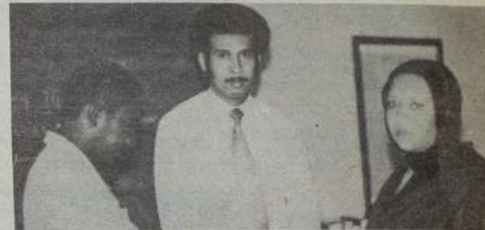

The Great Day When We Won 'Uhuru' From The British

AT MIDNIGHT on December 12, 1963, the Union Jack was lowered and Kenya's new flag unfurled before a huge crowd at Uhuru stadium. It was the greatest day in Kenya's history. The forty year struggle for independence and emancipation had ended and a new era had begun, writes Gray Phombeah.

Many Kenyans still remember the night as Mzee Jomo Kenyatta and the then Governor Malcolm MacDonald walked in unison to the dais for the start of the Independence celebrations as excited and jubilant traditional dancers entertained the crowd waiting to see Kenya's own fly free at the masthead.

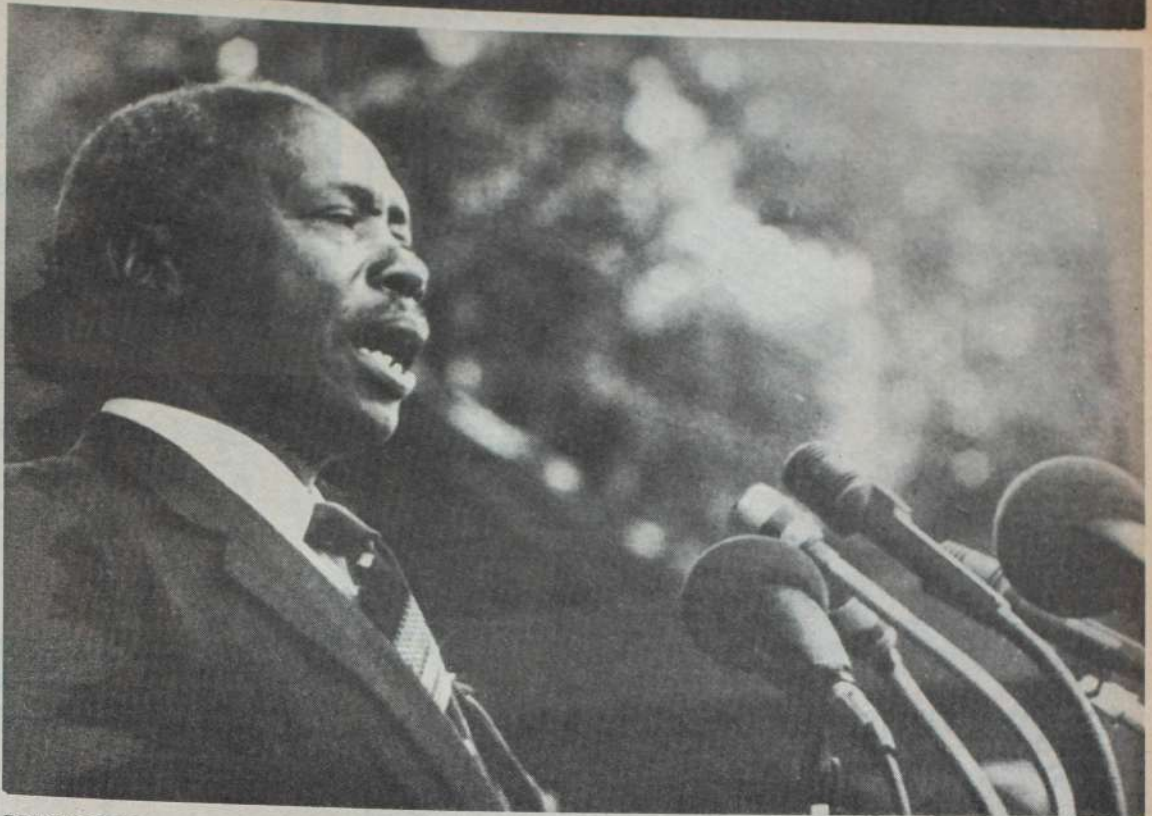
The Duke of Edinburgh represented the Queen at what Kenyatta described as "The greatest day in Kenya's history and the happiest day of my life."

On the morning of December 12, Mzee Jomo Kenyatta received the constitutional instruments from the Duke of Edinburgh and thus Kenya became the 34th state in Africa to gain independence.

Kenya became a Republic within the Commonwealth in December 1964 with Kenyatta as President. Malcolm MacDonald, the former Governor, returned to Kenya as Britain's first High Commissioner.

As Jomo Kenyatta noted in those early days of independence "... only by hard work of all our people under the dynamic leadership of the Kanu Government, can we make a success of our independence."

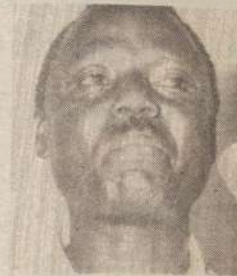

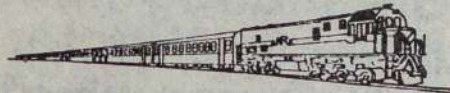

Since then the development of modern Kenya became inseparably linked with his personality and his work. He transformed "Harambee" into a powerful motto of all Kenyans striving to build up their country and develop national self-confidence.

Kenya, under Kenyatta, showed a consistent upward course and unlike many Third World countries, succeeded in creating a sound basis for economic, political and social stability.

The consolidation of these achievements and further advancement of the prosperity in recent years in the result of the dynamic leadership of President Daniel Arap Moi.

He had served loyally and ably during the Kenyatta era spanning fifteen years and

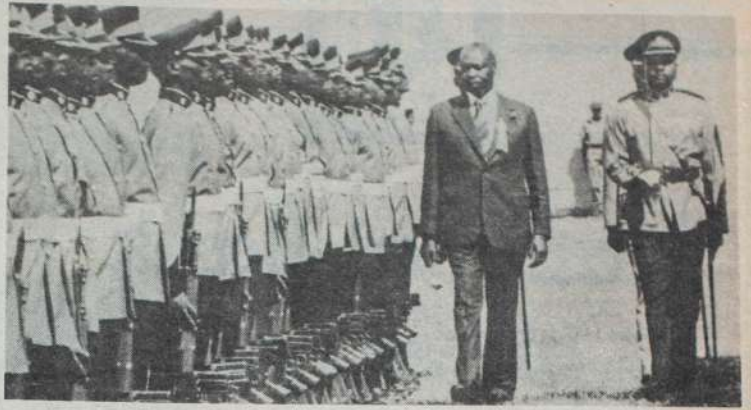
Kenyans celebrating the Jamhuri Day can proudly look back and conclude that under Moi's leadership Kenya has made a big stride towards development

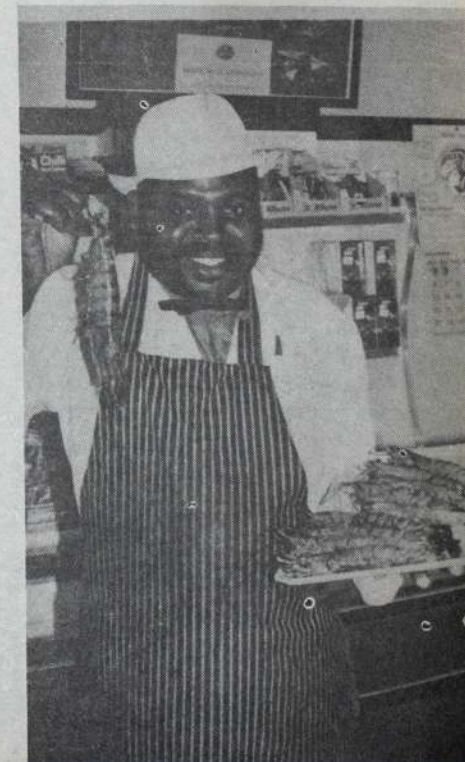

SEVERIN Sea Lodge, situated on the sun-kissed Bamburi Beach just 15 kms away from Mombasa Island, has never ceased growing since its birth ten years ago, spearheading an explosive growth in hotel development on the Kenya coast.

This can be measured by the fact that when it opened there were 92 beds which over the years have increased to 335. They are situated in two similar complexes, each with its own swimming pool and restaurant.

Rooms are spacious, air-conditioned and very well equipped. There is piped music, radio, telephone and "mini" bars, also something of which no other hotel can probably boast - electric hair curlers and hooded hair dryers, as well as weighing scales so that guests can check if they have been tempted to eat too much "weight on" food.

The hotel is surrounded by landscaped gardens in which are more than 500 palm trees. Some of the rooms are in attractive one-storeyed rondavels with makuti (palm frond) roofs.

There are two hairdressing salons, one specialising in exotic "African" styles, and recently opened is the Flame Tree Terrace which is particularly popular around sundowner time when there is also entertainment by Graham Hay on his guitar, or Ben and Tracy. Sometimes local craftsmen are there to demonstrate their craft and to sell their wares.

A mouth-watering range of ice creams are served, a very popular one being "Nut Case". This is a "nut" raisin coupe with honey dipped cashewnuts and rum, also very scrumptious is Coupe d'Ala in which goes slices of fresh mango, banana ice cream and raspberry sauce.

There is also an exciting range of exotic fruit-based cocktails, such as coffee sprinkled with ginger, and passion milk shakes!

A "sukh" area is nearby in which are boutiques and curio shops leading to the hotel's bustling foyer, or to the Safari bar.

Severin Sea Lodge recently became the Kenya Airways centre on the North Coast. A large Airways desk opens there every Wednesday morning in which bookings on domestic or international Kenya Airways flights can be confirmed. From the hotel Kenya Airways also offers a transport service to and from Moi International Airport, Mombasa.

For the active types there is always something to do, for all



kinds of activities are organised by the full-time sports animator there. There is table tennis, windsurfing, scuba diving, as well as gymnastics on the beach.

Entertainment takes place each day of the week. This includes dancing to a live band - the Mushroomers, Mombasa Roots or the Generation three times a week, while disco takes place twice a week. There are a galaxy of entertainers who also include traditional dancers from all over Kenya. "Professor Juma" and his versatile acrobats, as well as Graham Hay and Ben and Tracy. There are also local fashion shows.

Food is of a high standard, with speciality days making eating even more interesting. Every third Sunday in the month there is Brunch for late-risers from 11.30 in the morning until 2.30 in the afternoon. It includes a very popular offer of champagne which you can buy either by the glass or bottle. The menu includes a mix of breakfast lunch food - doughnuts, Danish pastries, croissant, onion and special Swiss bread (baked at the hotel); all kinds of eggs, prawns, sailfish, hot dishes and fifteen different salads.

This is followed by disco in the evening.

'African Adventure'

During the month an "African Adventure" by the illuminated swimming pool is staged where fifteen local dishes are served straight from earthenware pots kept warm on jikos. Giriama traditional dancers entertain.

Sometimes the Sunday Speciality can be curry, where five tasty dishes are offered, or it can be a Sunday Roast of pork, veal, beef and turkey - this being a great favourite in Europe. These roasts are served with a variety of side dishes.

On some Saturdays a Continental Barbeque takes place complete with a traditional suckling pig and all kinds of exotic meat, seafood and salads.

The hotel also offers an 'a la carte' menu which specialises in seafood. Very popular is Lobster Severin. It is a poached lobster served warm with three tasty dips - cognac mayonnaise, cocktail sauce and garlic butter.

Also a very popular rendezvous is the circular Safari Bar which remains open throughout the day and night.

The hotel is owned by the Severin family who have four factories in Germany producing some twenty-thousand electrical household appliances ranging from coffee-makers to hair-dryers. Hence their thoughtfulness in providing heated hair curlers etc. for hotel guests.

The late Anton Severin's son, also named "Anton", had two daughters. One married Rudolph Schulte and the other Helmut Hoffmann.

Mr. Schulte was a keen hunter (in the days before it was banned) and a frequent visitor to Kenya. His one problem was in finding

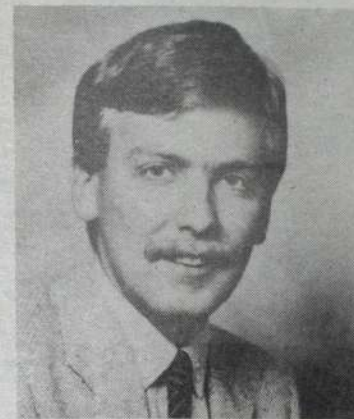

Here the joined chicken is covered in a sauce made from chopped onions, coconut and fresh dairy cream, thickened with a little flour and them steamed. Guests find it very delicious with a strong flavour of coconut which mates well with the chicken.

Another favourite African traditional dish at this hotel is Matoke made from boiled green bananas which are mashed with butter, and served with goulash.

Chege lays great emphasis on subtle flavourings which makes his food more interesting and enjoyable.

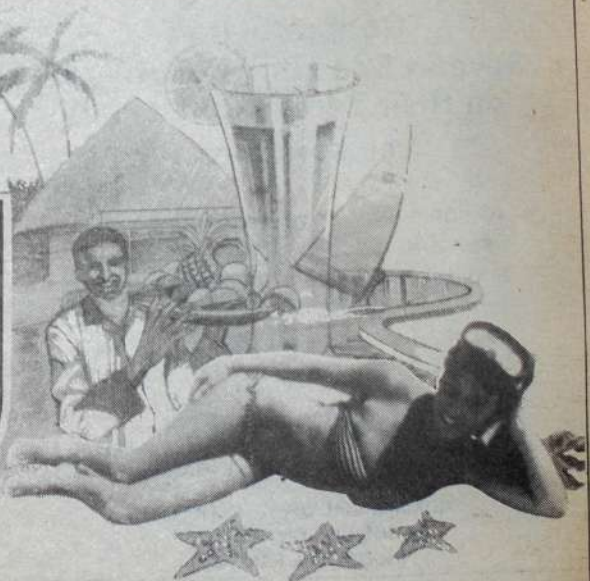
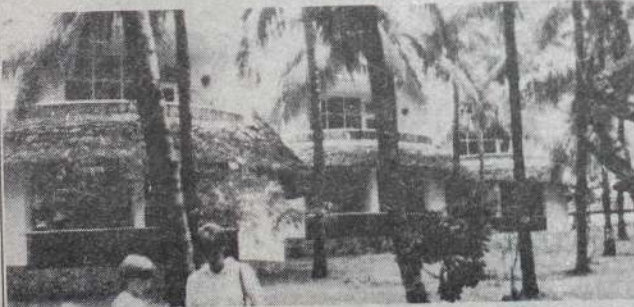

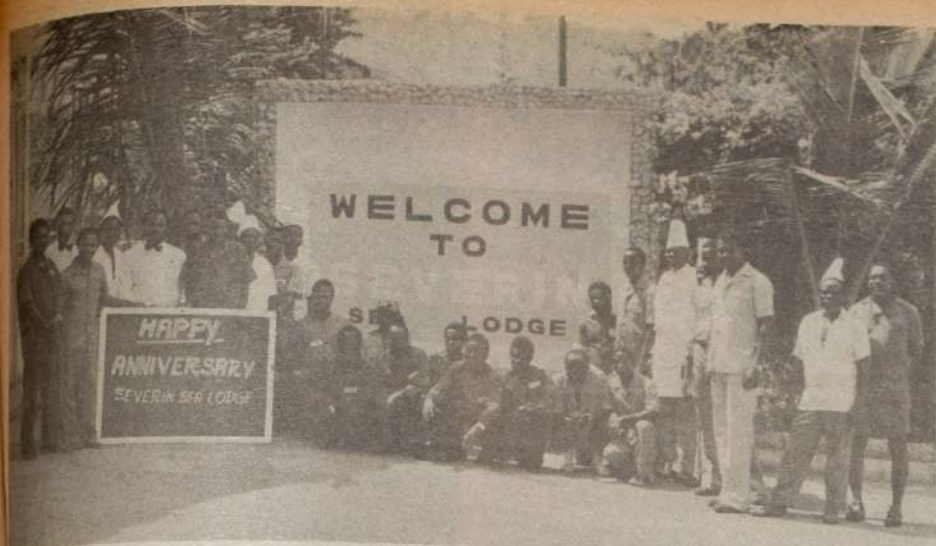

 ... to stay which he really liked. He was thinking of buying a house, when the opportunity arose to purchase the former Lambari Inn with a view to converting it into a small hunting lodge. After work had commenced, he realised it would not be feasible, so instead built a hotel.

He died two years ago. It is his eldest son Severin Schulte and Helmut Hoffmann who are now the majority shareholders of Severin Sea Lodge.

The owners love Kenya, and that their investment in Severin Sea Lodge is a positive one of contributing towards the development of Kenya's tourist industry which is now the country's foremost earner of much needed foreign exchange.

They are confident that tourism here will flourish.

The hotel has 270 employees, many of whom joined the hotel when it first opened ten years ago. They will be receiving special awards during its birthday celebrations.

They constitute about one-third of the original work force.

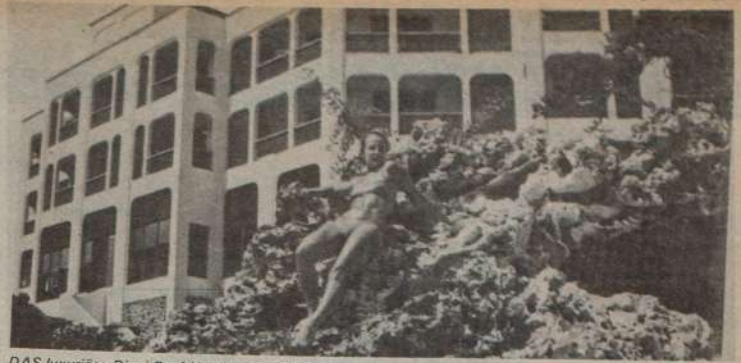
