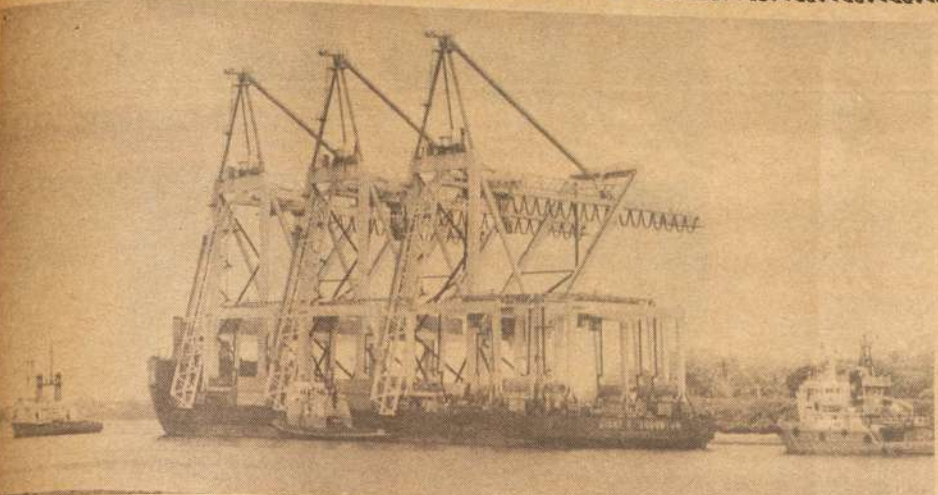

MINISTER OPENS PANDYA CLINIC EXTENSIONS

AN Assistant Minister of Health, Dr. Elton Wameyo has said the Government will continue to encourage individuals and organisations in providing health services to wananchi so as to reduce congestion at government hospitals.

Dr. Wameyo said this when he opened the Pandya Memorial Clinic extensions in Mombasa built at a cost of Shs. 650,000. The Clinic is run by a private organisation.

Monster Container Cranes Off-Loaded

S. 300 MILLION IN NEW PORT EQUIPMENT

A consignment of new port equipment worth Kshs 300 million to handle container ships and cargo has arrived at the port of Mombasa from France.

The barge *Giant Four* chartered by Les Abeilles International Company of Dunkerque, France arrived in Mombasa over the weekend with the equipment, being towed by the tug *Nordzee* under the command of Captain J. Chapel from the port of Le Havre in France.

The equipment aboard the 140 metres long and 36 metres wide barge included three huge cranes to be deployed on the container berth to handle containers off and on ships.

There were also four ship-to-shore gantry cranes to handle containers in the port yard, four pneumatic tyre gantry cranes and two cranes mounted on rails to transfer container onto railway wagons.

ADVANCE PARTY

An advance party of nine French experts headed by Mr. J. P. Kinoo from "Les Abeilles International" Company and Mr. Doudeau from the manufacturers of the equipment, "Caillard Lavage"

of Le Havre Cedex, jetted into Mombasa early last week and have been supervising the off loading and the installation of the equipment at the port.

The equipment which is expected to be commissioned in January next year was handled in France by the SCAC Maritime International whose agents in Mombasa, East African Commercial and Shipping Company, handled the equipment at the port of Mombasa.

MODERNISATION

"We are very proud to have handled such a huge consignment for the port of Mombasa and of our being associated with this great modernisation programme at the Mombasa port," Mr. P. Sikander, the general manager of East African Commercial and Shipping Company, told COASTWEEK.

The East African Commercial and Shipping Company operates under the banner of the Paris based SCAC Transport International Company.

According to KPA sources, the consignment which left the French port of Le Havre on November 10, has been made possible through a French Government loan amounting 133 million French Francs extended to the Kenya Government towards the Mombasa Ports Authority modernisation programme being undertaken at the port of Mombasa.

The Significance Of Christmas Day To The Ancient Believers ...

IT may come as a surprise to many people to learn that the Christian Christmas is held on a day which has been recognised and kept holy by many pre-Christian religions and people and its origins have been lost in the mists of antiquity.

Early Christians settled on December 25 as being suitable, knowing it had been revered throughout the ages as a day of special mystical and spiritual significance and therefore sacred.

The Northern Hemisphere's winter solstice was, according to many ancient and sacred writings and beliefs, the day on which "Avatars" or "Messengers of God" were born on earth to bring their message of love, peace and spiritual understanding to mankind.

We can understand, therefore why the early Christian fathers came to choose this date. This is the date chosen for the "Messenger of God" to be born. He was "conceived by God and born of a virgin mother in humble circumstances". In all cases he was "a Saviour" "Avatar", "Redeemer" and "a great Master" and came at a time when the world was in dire need of his message of peace and love.

Through the ages this day has been celebrated by sacrifices, religious ceremonies, sacred music and feasting.

It was the custom to forgive wrongs and debts, set slaves and prisoners free and to help the poor. People would go from house to house blessing one another and bearing gifts.

A re-examination of Ancient Hindu records indicates that Krishna was born on December 25, but the date was changed in the Middle Ages to July or August.

Buddha, the son of the virgin Maya was also born on December 25 and his birth is celebrated throughout Asia.

The Ancient Egyptians also set this date aside as being sacred to the birth of their Gods.

Osiris being the son of the virgin named Ceres (or Neith) and Horus, the son of the virgin Isis.

Co-incidentally the Greek Gods Hercules, Bacchus and Adonis were all born on December 25 and the winter solstice was also a time of great significance to the Romans.

The early Persians and the Druids worshipped the God Mithras. His birth too was on December 25 and was celebrated throughout Persia, Ancient Britain and Gaul.

In Britain the Druids would light great ceremonial fires on the top of high hills. They called the day "Nolagh" and the Gauls called it "Noel".

The custom of bringing Mistletoe into the home dates back to early Druidic ceremonies.

In South America the Mayas and Incas, believed to be descended from the "lost Atlanteans", celebrated a feast called Capacrayme meaning "winter solstice".

The early Scandinavians had a God born at this time called Frey. Their feast was called Jul, from which is derived the word 'Yule' and the French (Gaulish) word 'Noel'. This word comes from the Hebrew or Chaldean word 'Nule'.

In ancient Germany the Yule

feast was celebrated at the winter solstice. The 'Yule Log' dates from this time.

At this feast agreements were made or renewed, sacrifices made and Gods were consulted as to the future. There were religious ceremonies, impressive feasts and gay celebrations.

Over the ages, by unspoken consent, December 25 has become a day acknowledged by many nations a holy day. A day on which everyone prays for peace and enlightenment.

It is an unofficial day of World Peace and recognised by millions of people of all races and beliefs as the day a "sacred Messenger came from God to bring peace to mankind and a message of hope for the future".

'Those Dangerous And Horrible Coast Roads'

DURING the past few months, there has been a "considerable drop" in the number of tourists coming to Kenya coast, while the usual "peak occupancy" during the high season does not look as if it is going to materialise.

Committee members of the Mombasa & Coast Tourist Association meeting at the Oceanic Hotel recently, expressed "deep

concern" at these trends.

It was reported that hotel bookings, in some cases from January onwards, are "far below expectation", contributory factors being the "continued restriction on some charters flying here and the current economic recession in Europe".

Consequently, many holiday-makers are now seeking destinations which are both nearer and cheaper, and particularly popular are Spain, Majorca and Gambia on Africa's West Coast, where the air-fare factor is less.

Members were also concerned about "safety" in some of the charter boats being offered to tourists. Some are overloaded, without lifebelts and being operated without the necessary licences.

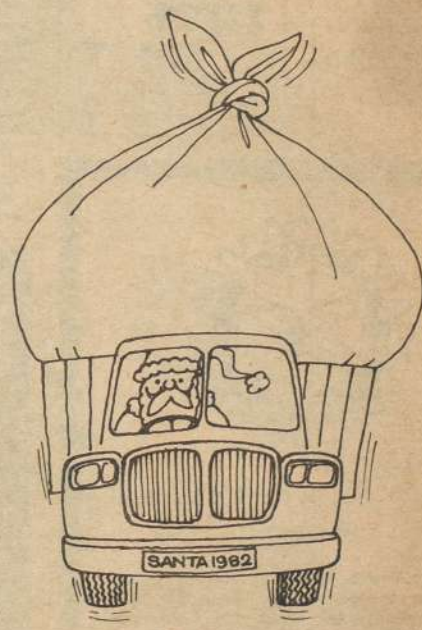
It was felt that such boats should be inspected regularly, also that marine equipment required for the safety of charter boats, including radios, should be allowed to be imported "duty free".

The horrible, and in some cases dangerous state of some of the roads in the Coast Province also came under fire. It appears that letters sent to the authorities concerned, go unanswered.

The Association decided to invite the appropriate government officer along to their next meeting so that he can outline what is being done, or planned, to repair the roads which are causing considerable damage to vehicles.

When Nothing Is Left To Chance ...

NOTHING IS LEFT TO chance when the inhabitants of the underworld are all out to influence the result of a big fight. And in Title Shot opening on Monday at Naaz Cinema, the aid computer makes all the difference - until of course, things try to get out of control and lives are put at stake when it becomes obvious that one of the pugilists is worth more dead than alive.

In this film, which should perhaps see us through next year, Tony Curtis plays the role of Frank Renzetti, a charming, cunning underworld figure who has devised the ultimate computer scam. Together with his beautiful secretary Sylvia, they are able to predict the outcome of any professional athletic event by feeding his network of computers with all the relevant data.

'NEW SUIT OF CLOTHES'

THE purchases of new municipal robes for Mombasa City fathers which two years ago stood at Kshs 50,000 will now cost the council almost Kshs 80,000.

According to latest quotations from M/S Ede and Ravenscroft Limited of London which do not take into account the recent devaluation of the Kenya Shilling, the current price valid until Christmas stands at Kshs 76,540.

Mombasa's Councillors resolved in August 1980 to have a new-look Mayor, but since then the lack of funds has stood in the way between the Mayor and his new wardrobe.

It also meant that the Town

Chairman and the committee's chairman could not go about their business in fashionable glamour.

The new Mayor's robe recommended by the council, comes in sparkling scarlet made of light-weight wool cloth with facings and sleeves trimmed with narrow musquash fur and black velvet.

The hem is trimmed with black velvet, partly lined with white art silk and with shoulder bows.

To match the new attire are

two Lace Jabot with neckband, a cocked hat with a gold loop and two pairs of white cotton gloves.

The deputy mayor's robe is in maroon lightweight wool cloth partly lined with black art silk and shoulder bows, and a matching cocked hat with a silver loop.

The eight chairman's robes are similar but without the fur trim while the Town Clerk would be donned in art silk.

The present Mayor's robe, which councillors claim is old and tattered, was purchased in 1959 and in 23 years has graced three mayors and several civic leaders in Mombasa.

The council has now resolved to seek authority from the Minister for Local Government Mr. Moses Mudavadi to purchase the civic robes from M/S Ede and Ravenscroft Ltd, at the new price and have requested for extra funds to be drawn from the vote allocated to councillors travelling expenses to meet the expenditure.

It is claimed that the increase in the price of the council's new wardrobe has been caused by the sharp rise in the cost of fur trimmings and labour.

MAORI CHRISTMAS

ONCE again men from New Zealand warship visiting Mombasa over Christmas are giving a helping hand in the community by staging a Maori Concert Party at Bamburi Beach Hotel on December 29 at 9.30 p.m.

This time it will be men from HMNZS Canterbury performing, and all proceeds are to help the Mkomani Harambee Health Clinic.

The concert has been arranged by the Rotary Club of Kilindini which has been giving great assistance to this clinic which maintains a high standard of health care to the community around it, thus relieving congestion on government hospitals and municipal clinics.

Another warship from New

Zealand the HMNZS Waikato had raised Shs 7,158 for the clinic by giving a similar performance of Maori traditional dancing at this hotel when visiting Mombasa a few months ago.

An Awe Inspiring Arrival By Sea ...

WEATHER CONDITIONS on the morning of Friday December 23 were perfect for the arrival of the three mammoth Gantry cranes, transtainers and other hardware which arrived from Le Havre France for the KPA. They were transported on Smit barge Giant 4, specially built for such tasks of 24 tons towed by the Smit Tug Noordzee. They arrived off the at day break and were tied up alongside No. 18 berth 11.30 hrs. Local tug assistance was provided by the new tug El Lamy and the Muri tug Bison.

In my opinion this was the most awe inspiring arrival in Kilindini since the Q.E.2 in March 1981, and in the same way as the Q.E.2 this operation appeared to proceed absolutely without a hitch.

Like Mombasa another port which is determined to derive maximum benefit from the containers is Colombo. This port is becoming increasingly popular as a feeder port situated as it is at an important cross roads in the Indian Ocean.

In June this year Colombo handled 5300 boxes whilst last month the figure was 11700 so that by the year's end the number of boxes handled is expected to exceed 100,000. Quite a spectacular growth considering the number handled for the whole of 1981 was only 57,800.

One gantry crane has already been installed whilst two more gantries are expected next April so like Mombasa each port will have three gantries.

'Feeder Port'
There is no reason why the Kenya Port Authority could not make greater use of Mombasa as a container transhipment/feeder port next year when the new equipment is installed and fully operational.

On her first call at Mombasa is yet another *Rafaella* spelt the same way as the ill fated one and not *Raphaella* or *Rafaella I* which is the spelling presently shown for the new arrival.

Like her predecessor she is also operated by Mediterranean Shipping Co. (MSC). She is

three years younger than first *Rafaella* having been built in 1963.

She arrived at "K" anchorage on Sunday to load a sizeable quantity before proceeding downcast and return to Mombasa at the end of month meantime the *Rafaella* remains at SECO Mombasa shipyard and I she may be sold for scrap locally.

A vessel which has been the buoys since 15th Dec 1982 waiting for cargo is the *Libe* flag, Greek owned *Aventure* on charter to Japanese NYK Line. Of 2000 tons d.w., she was built in 1978. She was expected to be earlier this week.

The lines of a British ship are easily identified by shipping enthusiasts, an exception is the current *Brazil* at No. 5 berth. This 23 year old veteran flying the Panamanian flag built by the Burntisland Shipbuilding Company on the coast of England and delivered to Houlder Brothers, a known British liner Company as the *Tewkesbury*, for the American trade.

The wheat discharger *Panormos* at No. 11 berth expected to complete and last Tuesday, having received a fast despatch, in just one week to discharge 15,000 ton cargo.

ERROL ON FOOD

Cooking Italian — Simple And Tasty

SPIRITED Italian cooking is the sort of food you can eat every day but unfortunately most people's idea of Italian food is confined to their experience in restaurant eating alone.

In Italian homes the cooking is different; it is simple, spontaneous and tremendously varied, regular plates of pasta notwithstanding. Nobody, for example does liver better than the Venetians.

The secret of *Fegato Alla Veneziana* is the long slow cooking of the onions so that they become almost caramelised. And by the simple addition of lemon juice to brussel sprouts the Tuscans lift them to different culinary heights.

The same sort of transformation takes place when nutmeg is added to spinach and horseradish to ordinary chopped cabbage. To cook lamb without rosemary would almost be unthinkable to the Roman.

The Italian flare for producing harmonious, decorative and simple food is an enviable quality and may be emulated with patience and enthusiasm not only for their rich buttery and creamy dishes from Bologna but the really unpretentious food hailing from Abruzzi, Sicily and the Mediterranean coast whilst Tuscany has some of the best plain dishes in the world.

An Italian friend of mine with whom I tasted an unforgettable Pesto — a Genovese speciality embracing garlic and basil — in Porto Fino a couple of years ago, has a house in Tuscany and she puts down the success of the recipes of that region to the wonderful pinkish soil upon which the vegetables are grown — the flavour of which she claims are unequalled in Italy.

GAMBERI AI FERRI COME CANNOCCHIE

Grilled prawns cannocchie style is a most enjoyable if not elegant way of eating prawns — ideal for barbecues and picnics and the general *Al Fresco* style so suited to Mombasa.

- 1 1/2 large prawns in their shells
- wooden toothpicks
- 5 ozs plain dry breadcrumbs
- 6 tbs olive oil
- salt and black pepper

Rinse the prawns without shelling them in cold water. Drain well and pat dry on kitchen paper. Run a single toothpick into each prawn along its entire length, placing it just under the top shell. This will keep it from curling whilst cooking. Put all the prawns into a bowl and add all other ingredients. Be very liberal with both salt and pepper.

Turn the prawns to coat them thoroughly. Let them marinate at room temperature for half an hour at least and up until two hours turning occasionally. Preheat the grill. Even better would be a charcoal grill — again ideal for patio cooking — place the prawns on the grill rack or in a hinged two sided grill.

Whatever you use remember that the prawns should be cooked very closely to the source of heat for 2 minutes on one side and 1 1/2 minutes on the other.

Serve at once with plenty of napkins and finger bowls with lemon. Serves

INSALATA DI ARANCIA

This orange and cucumber salad is bright and refreshing and both ingredients are easy to get all the year round in Mombasa. It is particularly refreshing after a fish dish.

- 1 cucumber
- 1 large orange
- 5-6 small radishes
- A few fresh mint leaves
- salt and olive oil
- Fresh juice of half lemon

If the cucumber skin is edible — the ridged type is — leaves it on. If not peel it. Cut into the thinnest slices possible and place in a salad bowl. Peel the orange taking care to remove all the pith. Cut into thin round slices. Cut these in half if the orange is large, in four sections and pick out the seeds and coarse membrane. Rinse and scrub the radishes.

Cut into very thin rounds. Add to the bowl. Tear the mint

leaves into small pieces and add them to the salad.

Dress with salt, olive oil and lemon juice. Toss thoroughly and serve at once. Serves 4.

ROAST LAMB ROMAN STYLE

- a whole leg of lamb
- 1/2 cup plain yoghurt
- 1/2 tsp soy sauce
- 1 tsp Dijon mustard
- 1 tsp olive oil
- salt and black pepper
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 sprigs rosemary or about 8 leaves dried
- 1/2 cup white wine

Several days in advance prepare the lamb for marinating. Wash, pat dry with paper towels. Combine yoghurt, mustard, soy sauce, olive oil, and pepper in a bowl and coat the lamb with this mixture. Wrap the meat in foil and refrigerate. The juices will settle at the bottom, so turn the lamb after two or three days.

A couple of days before cooking insert pieces of the garlic in slivers under the skin. Wrap the mat in foil again and refrigerate. Before roasting, remove the meat from the foil and let stand at room temperature for a few hours. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Sprinkle lamb with rosemary leaves or if using sprigs, place them in the pan.

Place the lamb on a rack in the pan and add the wine. Roast for 15 minutes at 350 degrees then lower temperature to 300 basting regularly.

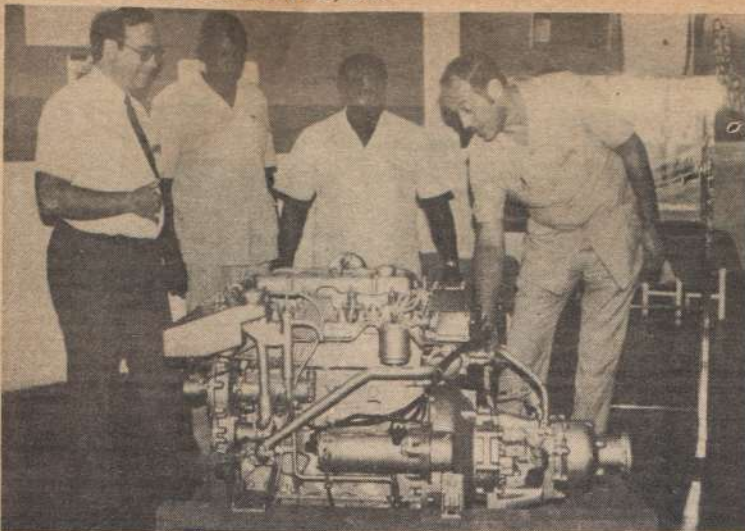

"That is why" he said, "it is essential that new additions to our distributor network are appointed in the knowledge that they are efficient, organised, well-equipped and have the necessary resources to carry out the repair and maintenance to ensure our products are maintained at the optimum desired standards, and the spare parts for all application sectors are available at the correct time, place and price".

He went on: "There is a real interest and potential for Perkins in Kenya, and we consider Gailey and Roberts with their outlets, knowledge and enthusiasm will quickly, subject to import continuity, develop that interest to its full business potential, with particular emphasis to marine application along the coast".

Said Mr. Devaney: "As is well known, Perkins Engines provide diesel power virtually in every form of transport - industrial and agricultural application, automotive and marine. Such is the flexibility of the product that they are currently in operation in almost every country of the world".

In his speech, the PC drew attention to the fact that many global economies were crumbling under the weight of energy bills. He congratulated the Perkins group on the research it is undertaking to find alternative cheaper fuels to replace petroleum oil.

He mentioned that Kenya is

annually spending more than one-third of her foreign exchange on oil imports. This was an astronomical figure and any positive breakthrough by Perkins, or anyone else, would certainly be a great relief to this country.

Explaining that Kenya is basically an agricultural country, the PC said: "With the rapid increase in population the need for more food becomes more pressing and desperate. While the government had embarked on a comprehensive food policy to step up food production, the cost of maintaining farm machinery continues to be a big problem.

More Distributors

It is hoped that any cost-effective technique that will succeed in lowering fuel consumption levels should in many ways be able to help the agricultural activity of this country, and the implementation of our food policy".

Continuing the PC said: "The coastal region is no doubt ideal for a wide range of investments considering its varied environment and industrial, agricultural and marine infrastructure. Consequently, we would very much welcome any investment that will open up new development opportunities and accelerate our development momentum, more so in the rural areas where the majority of our people live and where considerable potential lays unexploited, particularly in the marginal agricultural areas".

David Kamau, Chairman of Gailey and Roberts, revealed that they are planning to move to a building on Dar es Salaam Road, early next year. He said that although Gailey and Roberts had changed in many ways, it was important to note that the basic foundation of the business remains the same - that is "the supply and support of agricultural and industrial development in Kenya".

Pointing out that equipment today is expensive and that no one can afford continual breakdowns, Mr. Kamau explained that Gailey and Roberts are committed to reducing this by having an efficient parts distribution network in major towns, as well as a factory standard engine repair and overhaul service.

He also mentioned that "when the Perkins engine population in Kenya is established, by-engine exchange programme will be introduced".

The history of Gailey and Roberts goes back some 78 years, when two engineers, James Hamilton Gailey and D. O. "Robby" Roberts, formed a partnership as estate agents and surveyors, previously they had been involved in planning and building the railway link between the Indian Ocean and Lake Victoria.

Diversification

Later, their business diversified to include farm implements and spares, saddlery and seeds, barrows, picks and paints. Then came agricultural equipment and machinery like tractors, ploughs, engines and water pumps. In 1937 the company was acquired by the then United Africa Company [now changed to UAC International], who provided necessary capital for expansion and vast technical knowledge.

Said Mr. Kamau: "The Perkins agency fits very well into our engine range and fills a gap which has been existing in our present range of Caterpillar and Lister engines".

The PC was presented with a silver tankard by Peter Baker "as a memento of the occasion".

Government Warns Over Ugly 'Smear Campaign'

THE GOVERNMENT has warned Kenya's "enemies abroad" to stop their current "smear campaign" against the Republic.

In a strongly worded statement the Government has said it will take any measures necessary to protect the peace and security of all Kenyans.

The following is the full text of the statement:

"The Government is aware of a smear campaign against Kenya being conducted outside the country by a few disgruntled elements, and enemies of Kenya. Deliberate lies regarding life and events in Kenya are being spread by malcontents based in various foreign capitals.

Consistent with its policies and practice, the Government would have chosen to make no public comments on the malicious propaganda and treat it with the contempt it deserves. But, lest the uninformed international community falls prey to this campaign, the Government finds it necessary to comment on this matter.

Kenya is a free, open and democratic country. The Government has always chosen to tell the truth to all Kenyans and the world at large. We have nothing to hide or fear.

The organisers of the campaign, some of whom have run away from the country after committing crimes, are distorting facts and have stooped to telling outright lies. They have in particular chosen to capitalise on the

recent arrest and detention of a few people, who have been detained as a last resort in the interests of the peace and security of the nation.

The same ill-intentioned people have chosen to blow out of all proportion the number of people killed during the August 1 disturbances.

Kenya, like any other independent nation worth its name, is duty bound to protect the peace and security of its people. The Government will not shy away from this cardinal responsibility.

And regarding the loss of life resulting from the August 1 disturbances, the Government has been open and consistent with the facts. Those parents or relatives who have any persons 'missing' were given every opportunity by the Government to ascertain their fate or whereabouts.

For the benefit of the public and the international community, the Government would like to repeat that the total loss of lives resulting directly from the disturbances was 129 persons.

For this reason the Government and the people of Kenya feel concerned that the international mass media appear to have refused

to accept this hard fact. The claim that 2,000 people died during the disturbances is both malicious and completely unfounded.

The attempt to portray the Government of Kenya as undemocratic and blood-thirsty will no doubt fail. Those who have nothing to say against the way the Government handled the disturbances and the subsequent treatment of those found to have been involved should face the truth and desist from backing the few cowardly, unpatriotic elements now bent on discrediting their motherland."

Ndununi Villagers Get Jamia Gifts

LAMU (K.N.A.) — The Jamia Mosque in Nairobi has donated items worth hundreds of shillings to the Muslim Villagers at Bargon and Ndununi in Lamu District.

The items included paraffin lamp, clocks, mats and books to be used by children during Madrasa.

They were handed over by the Jamia Muslim representative in Lamu Mr. Mahmood Mohamed. Accompanied by the Lamu County Council chairman Mr. Ali Mahrus.

'KOREA AND KENYA' TO BOOST BUSINESS

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Coast PC Mr. L. Galgalo has called for the intensification of trading links between Kenya and Korean businessmen.

Closing a one day consultative meeting between Mombasa traders and a delegation of Korean business representatives held at a Mombasa Hotel, Mr. Galgalo said the scope for trade had not been exploited.

He noted that there was still an imbalance in trade in favour

of Korea and called for Kenyans not to relax towards achieving equal trade if not more by including more items than before.

The PC hailed 1981 as a better year for both countries as there was a near balance of trade when Kenya exported goods worth Shs 11 million while Korea brought good worth Kshs 12 million.

He said Mombasa had traders who could directly go into business with Koreans and urged them to pursue this since the government of the two countries had already signed an economic and technical co-operation agreement way back in 1977.

Earlier the Korean Ambassador Mr. S. K. Kang who led his team said his government was interested in followup actions from the agreement hence the decision to have business contacts and discussions.

He said there was a lot of enthusiasm among Korean businessmen in wishing to make several trading links with Kenya and noted if the opportunity was seized it may help both sides.

'BANK OF CREDIT'

Among those present from the Mombasa Branch of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry were Mr. Harun, Mr. Mwenga who is the import committee chairman, Mr. Abdalla Zubedi of Mwanga Coffee Exports Limited, the vice-chairman of the National Chamber of Commerce Mr. Omar Cheka and a Banker Mr. Ronen Pawar.

Mr. Pawar who is also the manager of the Bank of Credit and Commerce International suggested that when it came to individual transactions the Bank may come in to help with guarantees because it had a branch in Korea.

He said that any Kenyan businessman who was seeking information from Korea and any other assistance was welcomed to contact his bank.

NEW MULTI-MILLION KAGERA SUGAR FACTORY COMPLEX

PRESIDENT NYERERE officially inaugurated the 799 million shillings Kagera Sugar Factory in Bukoba Region last week. The plant, which has been built by an Indian firm Walchandnagar Industries, is expected to produce 19,000 tonnes of sugar in the next season.

The Factory, whose construction work began in July 1978 but was halted due to the Uganda war, is expected to substantially improve the national sugar supply.

It will boost annual production from about 16,700 tonnes to 22,300 tonnes. The present national annual demand for sugar is about 24,000 tonnes.

The Kagera plant brings to five the number of sugar plants in the country. Other plants are in Tanganyika Planting Company TPC in Arusha Chini, Mtibwa in Morogoro and Kilombero one and two in Morogoro.

The Swedish International Development Authority SIDA has given Tanzania about 1.6 million shillings for a salt iodisation project as part of the National Goitre Control Programme.

The money will be used to buy an iodisation plant from India to be installed at the Bagamoyo based Coastal Salt Works.

Meanwhile construction work at the Dar International Airport, which had been suspended in July this year, is expected to resume on full scale after Christmas.

The French contractor of the Airport extension project, Messrs Bouygues unilaterally suspended the project following financial disputes which have now been resolved after a meeting between Tanzania and French officials in Paris.

Construction cost of the project which includes the building of a new terminal capable of handling 1.5 million passengers a year will cost about 88 million shillings.

Other work in the project also involves the building of a new freight terminal, a fire station, a control tower, a meteorological observatory, an electrical sub-station, aircraft parking aprons and extension and consolidation of the runway.

CAPITAL FUND

The United Nations Capital Development Fund UNCDF will give Tanzania about 20 million shillings to aid the Capital Development Authority CDA, in a new

housing initiative. The funds will be used in providing an infrastructure and for upgrading various areas in old Dodoma town.

A section of the fund, which is the first to CDA from UNCDF will finance imported building materials and will assist in providing loans and expertise to housing co-operatives in the new capital.

BOMBAY FLIGHT

The National Airline carrier, Air Tanzania which had suspended flights to India has now resumed its weekly flights to Bombay following fulfilment of all civil aviation requirements needed by India.

The inaugural flight from Bombay carried travel agents from India. Air Tanzania uses Ethiopian Airlines Boeing 720 to Bombay and back under a special arrangement reached between the two airlines a few months back.

The Zanzibar Government has signed an agreement for the construction of a 50 million shillings ghee and butter producing plant with the Elianto A.C.G. and the CMB companies of Italy and Switzerland respectively.

The factory will use coconut

oil to make butter and ghee. The projected daily production capacity is 50 tons of ghee and 25 tons each of butter and coconut oil.

Construction is expected to take two years and will be undertaken through a loan payable in seven years at a ten per cent interest rate.

23 men and women who climbed Mount Kilimanjaro for charitable purposes collected Shs 7 million from the expedition. The climb, which was organised by the Moshi Round Table, ended successfully with the possibility that the event may be held on an international scale next year.

Already 20 enquiries from overseas enthusiasts have been received for more information on the expedition.

The vice-president, Aboud Jumbe called on newsmen to adhere to professional ethics and ensure accurate reporting of news. He made this call at the first graduation ceremony of the Tanzania School of Journalism (TSJ) when he presented diplomas to 111 journalists who graduated from the school since 1977.

Tanzanians were faced with another price increase when the National Price Commission announced higher prices for a number of items falling under its control. Prices have been raised of various commodities ranging from beer, soft drinks, cooking fats, textiles, soap, radios, cassettes and pharmaceuticals.

Emmanuel, God with us, comes in the form of a baby, yet its soft cry can be heard by all who want to listen.

Ingawa tunali tunajivuna na kuona tuko katika hali ya kuridhisha, tunahitajika tukaze mikanda yetu tuone tumeweza kukubiliana na shida na matatizo yatakayoweza kutufikia.

Kila mwananchi wa Kenya ana wajibu wa kufahamu kuwa nchi yetu ina afadhali sana ukiinganisha na wenzetu ambao wameshapambana na matatizo makubwa; matatizo ambayo yamewafanya wananchi wapate taab ya kila aina. Ni juu yetu kutekeleza kwa vitendo mawazo ya busara tunayotolewa na Rais Moi pamojana viongozi kuhusu jambo hilo.

Tukiwa langoni kuuaga mwaka wa 1982 na kuakaribisha mwaka mpya wa 1983, tunahitajika kufahamu kuwa lazima tufanye bidii katika kila jambo ili tuendelee kushi kwa furaha na amani. Matokeo ya Agosti 1 mwaka huu ni jambo ambalo lazima tuliepuke kwani limeleta vifo vingi vya wananchi ambao hawakuwa na hatia; jambo ambalo limewahi kufanyika nchi nyingine na kuleta maovu yaliyo haribu kabisa uchumi wa nchi hizo.

Rais wetu kila wakati anatusisitiza tuishi kwa amani sababu wananchi wa Kenya wote ni ndugu na umefika wakati kila Mkenya ajitambulishwa kama Mkenya badala ya kujiona yeye ni kabila fulani, dini fulani ama rangi fulani. Tujumuike pamoja, tushikane mikono na kufanya kazi kwa juhudi yetu zote kupambana na kila linafoweza kutufikia. Lazima uthabiti wa nchi yetu uzidi kutiwa maanani; uthabiti ambao unatupa wananchi wa nchi hii demokrasia ya kila aina.

Wakenya tuna uwezo wa kuwachagua viongozi tunaowataka, kujifanyia mambo yetu ya kuinua hali yetu za maisha kwa njia za kihalali na hata tuna uwezo na uhuru wa kuabudu dini yetu, jambo ambalo nchi nyingi zimeshindwa kutekeleza. Na yote hayo tumeyapata kutokana na uthabiti ulioko nchini toka Hayati Mzee Jomo Kenyatta alipokuwa Rais wetu na hadi wakati huu ambapo Mtukufu Rais Moi ndiye anashikilia usukani.

Namaliza kwa kuwaomba Wakenya wenzangu tuwe tukifuata kwa vitendo na kwa dhati ya miyo yetu maongozi ya busara ya Baba Wetu wa Taifa, Mtukufu Rais Daniel arap Moi ili tuufanye mwaka wa 1983 uwe wamafanio na maendeleo ya kutosha na tuelekane na vitendo vyovyote vinyavyoweza kuvuruga uthabiti wa nchi yetu.

Deutsche Geschichte in den Taita Hills

DIE Gegend in den Taita Hügeln wurde in der Vergangenheit berühmt als Schauplatz heftiger Kämpfe während des Ersten Weltkrieges und ist heute bekannt und viel besucht als Oase der Ruhe und des Friedens, wo sich in einem einzigartigen privaten Wildpark die luxuriösen Taita Hills und Salt Lick Lodges, unter dem Management von Hilton International, befinden.

Die entscheidende Schlacht wurde im Jahre 1916 am Salaita Hügel geschlagen, bei einer Erhebung, etwa 12 km östlich von Taveta und 30 km westlich von der Taita Hills Lodge an der Straße von Voi nach Taveta an der Grenze Kenia/Tansania. Seither sind genau 66 Jahre vergangen, eine runde Zahl schon allein von der Form her.

Oberbefehlshaber der deutschen Schutztruppen war der legendäre General von Lettow-Vorbeck, von seinen Soldaten tief verehrt und auch von seinen Feinden hoch geschätzt. Deutschland, damals im Besitze der Kolonie Tanganika, sandte seine Truppen nach Ostafrika, um die Aufmerksamkeit vom wahren Kriegsschauplatz in Europa abzulenken und auf diese Weise zu veranlassen, daß möglichst viele feindliche Streitkräfte von dort abgezogen und in Afrika eingestutzt werden mußten.

Diese Ablenkungsstrategie betrieb General von Lettow-Vorbeck mit unglaublich geschickter Strategie. Er beabsichtigte, soweit nach Ostafrika vorzudringen, um die lebenswichtige Verkehrsader und Versorgungslinie, die Eisenbahn von Kenia nach Uganda, am Tsavofluß abzuschneiden. Einmal hätte er sein Ziel erreicht, wenn nicht sein Plan zuletzt am Salaita Hügel gescheitert wäre.

Brigadier General Malleson führte die britischen Truppen im Februar 1916 zu einem ersten Angriff auf den Salaita Hügel, wo man die ganze Ebene bis nach Taveta überblicken konnte. Die Briten stießen auf großen Widerstand, denn die Deutschen hatten ein wahres Labyrinth von unterirdischen Gängen und Stollen in den Hügel hineingegraben. Ein massiver Artillerieangriff konnte der Festung überhaupt nichts anhaben. Offenbar mußte man hier mit schwererem Geschütz auffahren.

INFANTERIE
General Malleson kam zurück mit zwei Brigaden und gab Befehl zu einer schwereren Infanterie-Attacke, doch mußten die Engländer am Ende dieses Tages ihr größtes Fiasco einstecken. Von Lettow-Vorbeck schrieb darüber in seinen Memoiren: "Die zahlreichen

englischen Heubitzern, die Olorobo (Salaita) beschossen, richteten kaum Schaden an, obwohl sie gut gezielt hatten... Der Feind zog sich in großer Verwirrung in den Busch zurück."

Daraufhin wurde General Jan Christiaan Smuts, in friedlichen Zeiten Premierminister von

General von Lettow-Vorbeck trat mit seinen Schutztruppen einen langen 20 Monate dauernden Rückzug an durch Tansania bis nach Mozambique und ergab sich kurz vor Ende des Krieges am 14. November in Abercorn in Rhodesien.

Auf vielen dieser vulkanischen Hügel in unmittelbarer Umgebung der Taita Hills und Salt Lick Lodge findet man noch die Spuren dieses Krieges, Geschützstände, Stollen und verrottete Dosen.

Vom Löwenfelsen hat man eine prächtige Aussicht und kann in urwüchsiger Landschaft die Sonne beobachten, wie sie hinter dem Kilimanjaro untergeht. Der Löwenfelsen war die vorderste Stellung in Britisch Ostafrika, zu welcher General von Lettow-Vorbeck vorgedrungen ist.

GAESTEZIMMER
Die Taita Hills Lodge ist aus Natursteinen gebaut, großzügig angelegt, mit kühlen, hohen Räumen. Die Gästezimmer sind mit allem Komfort ausgestattet; Bars, Speisesaal und Aufenthaltsräume mit eigenwilligem, extravaganter Dekor versehen. Der Swimming Pool ist von einem gepflegten Rasen und üppigen tropischen Pflanzen und Blumen umgeben und an den hohen Wänden

ranken Bougainvilleas in allen Rotschattierungen empor.

Die 6 km entfernte Salt Lick Lodge ist ebenfalls in einem einmaligen architektonischen Stil gebaut - verschiedene Gruppen von Rundhütten auf hohen Säulen auf aufgestapelten und zementierten Sandsäcken, so daß die wilden Tiere dazwischen und darunter frei herumwandern können.

ZUGBRUECKE
Ein Burggraben und eine Zugbrücke garantieren den Gästen Sicherheit und Schutz vor jeglicher Gefahr, die ihnen von Seiten der Tiere drohen könnte. Das einzige Risiko ist ein "Kater" am nächsten Morgen, falls man den vorzüglich zubereiteten Speisen, und vor allem den harten Getränken zuviel zugesprochen hat.

Im gemütlichen Aufenthaltsraum brennt ein offenes Kaminfeuer, das man an kühlen Abenden zu schätzen weiß. An der Salzlecke und der Wasserstelle findet jede Nacht ein anderes Schauspiel statt, das im Scheinwerferlicht von den verschiedenen Charakterdarstellern aus der Tierwelt vorgeführt wird.

Dieses private, sich über 12.000 Hektaren erstreckende Wildreservat, bietet idealen Lebensraum für alle Arten von Steppenwild und den großen Fünf - Löwe, Nashorn, Elefant, Leopard und Büffel - kann man mit etwas Glück ebenfalls begegnen.

In nur 80 Minuten erreicht man im Auto von der Taita Hills Lodge durch den Tsavo-West-Park den Jipese, berühmt für seine Elefanten - die Jipe-Jumbos - und für seinen Vogelreichtum. Im hohen Schilf und Riedgras nisten unzählige Wasservögel; für einen Ausflug auf dem See stehen Boote zur Verfügung.

Die Hilton-Gäste können auf jeden Fall nicht nur im eigenen Reservat, sondern auch gleich nebenan im Tsavopark auf Pirschfahrt gehen.

Vor der Taita Hills Lodge gibt es übrigens noch die Möglichkeit, auf dem Rücken eines Kamels durch die Gegend zu streifen.

Südafrika und ein international geachteter Staatsmann, nach Nairobi gerufen. Er war zuversichtlich, in kürzester Zeit einen leichten Sieg zu erringen. So machten sich im März 1916 4000 Hufo auf den Weg und die Kavallerie ritt unter dem Befehl von General Smuts von Norden gen Salaita.

Da auf der deutschen Seite bereits Munitionsknappheit herrschte, konnte man den umzingelnden Feind nicht abwehren und General von Lettow-Vorbeck beschloß, sich mit seinen Truppen in eine andere Stellung in den Hügeln von Reata und Latema, 8 km westlich von Taveta zurückzuziehen. Dadurch verloren die Deutschen ihre Vorherrschaft an der Grenze von Kenia und Tansania und kam es zum Wendepunkt im ostafrikanischen Kampf.

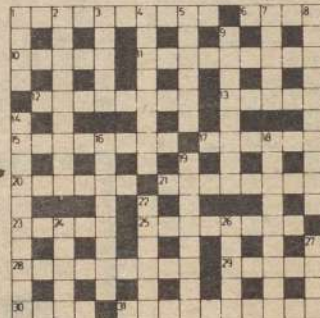
