MINISTER DEFENDS C.A.B. POLICY ON 'AIR CHARTERS'

'Our Airline Must Have Priority'

Mwangale Optimistic On Continuing Tourist Industry Development

THE Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife has been undertaking very intensive promotional programmes in all tourist generating countries throughout the year and is hopeful that this will have "a very positive affect in the months to come".

This was said by the Tourism Minister, Mr. E. Mwangale, when interviewed by Neta Peal at the Djani Reef Hotel.

At their last meeting, the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association expressed "deep concern" over bookings for 1983 which are reported to be "far below expectation" in some cases from January onwards.

Said the Minister: "We have been doing much more promotional work than in previous years which has included bringing many travel agents and writers here".

He commended the private sector for taking similar action which, he said: "my Ministry will encourage".

He urged other tour operators and hoteliers to invite their business associates from Europe here to see for themselves the many attractions Kenya has to offer, adding that his Ministry can always arrange for Kenya Airways to provide flights either at reduced rates, or possibly "complimentary".

Mr. Mwangale also suggested that "more thought be given to marketing Kenya as a joint effort by government and the private sector".

Referring to potential markets in the Middle East, the Minister said: "We consider this area to be so important that we have appointed a tourist officer and will be opening an office there shortly".

With many from the Middle East taking their holidays between the months of April to August to get away from the searing heat, the Minister said that "if the tourist industry feels

of tourists from the USA "are increasing rapidly". Last year's growth rate had been more than 15 per cent from the American market alone, and this increase had continued through the first part of 1982.

Said the Minister: "We believe the potential in the USA is very high", and mentioned that the total number of American tourists visiting Europe in 1981 was 4.5 million. He asserted that if they came to Kenya they could enjoy three days here for the price of one in Europe.

Recently the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife were among the exhibitors attending the World Trade Fair there. He said: "We need to do much more on the UK market, and to regionalise our promotional campaigns so they will have greater impact".

The Ministry is planning to

start such regional campaigns in the UK before June "so that we can really get into the British market".

Many in the tourist industry attribute the declining number of tourists coming here to the current economic recession in Europe, as well as to the continued restriction on some charters flying here.

Declared the Minister: "The Civil Aviation Board allows all Charters to come into Kenya that meet the specific requirements called for in the interests of the country".

He said that "in some cases there are bi-lateral agreements between international carriers and Kenya Airways which enables the former to operate charters without hindrance". However, he went on: "In cases where no such agreement exists then it is absolutely necessary for Kenya Airways to be involved in the discussions concerning the application to ensure that Kenya really benefits by such operation".

'FOREIGN EXCHANGE'

Said the Minister: "Kenya Airways has to be satisfied that its business as the national carrier will not be adversely affected by such charters. It was also a question of satisfying CAB that charter operations are going to bring a substantial amount of foreign exchange here".

Continuing he said: "The whole consideration revolves around the benefit of these

MICHAEL WERIKHE, 26, armed with three snakes and a rucksack, received a big handshake and lots of good wishes from the District Commissioner, Mombasa, Isaac Lukalo, when he set off from Treasury Square just before 10 a.m. on Wednesday morning on the first leg of his 500 km. walk to Nairobi — all to raise funds to save Kenya's fast disappearing rhino population.

Replying to a question from the DC, Michael said that the walk to Nairobi had been his own idea after hearing that Kenya's black rhino population was now down to around 1,000 to 1,200 'a reduction of more than 90 percent from ten years ago'. He felt some positive action was needed to make people more aware of their plight if rhinos were not to become extinct.

He hopes to reach Nairobi on January 3, as well as his target of Shs. 300,000/— for the East African Wildlife Society, some of which will go towards trans-locating some rhinos into safer areas.

The DC urged wananchi to help Michael should he be faced with any problems en-route.

The Provincial Game Warden, Coast, Willfred Asava, told Michael that officers in game departments along the Mombasa/Nairobi road had

The DC congratulated Michael on his very big effort to help save the rhino, and hoped that the target of Shs. 300,000/— would be reached. He spoke of the ban on hunting and what government was doing to try and preserve Kenya's wildlife. Despite this, rhino were disappearing at a very dangerous rate.

Michael has been working on his 'Rhino' project for more than ten months, which has entailed many trips to Nairobi and a lot of hard work, all at his own expense.

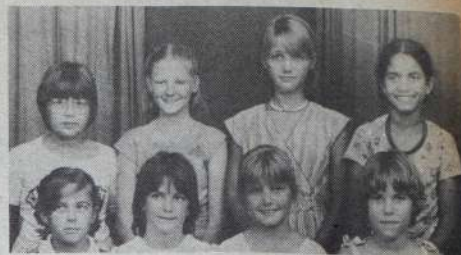

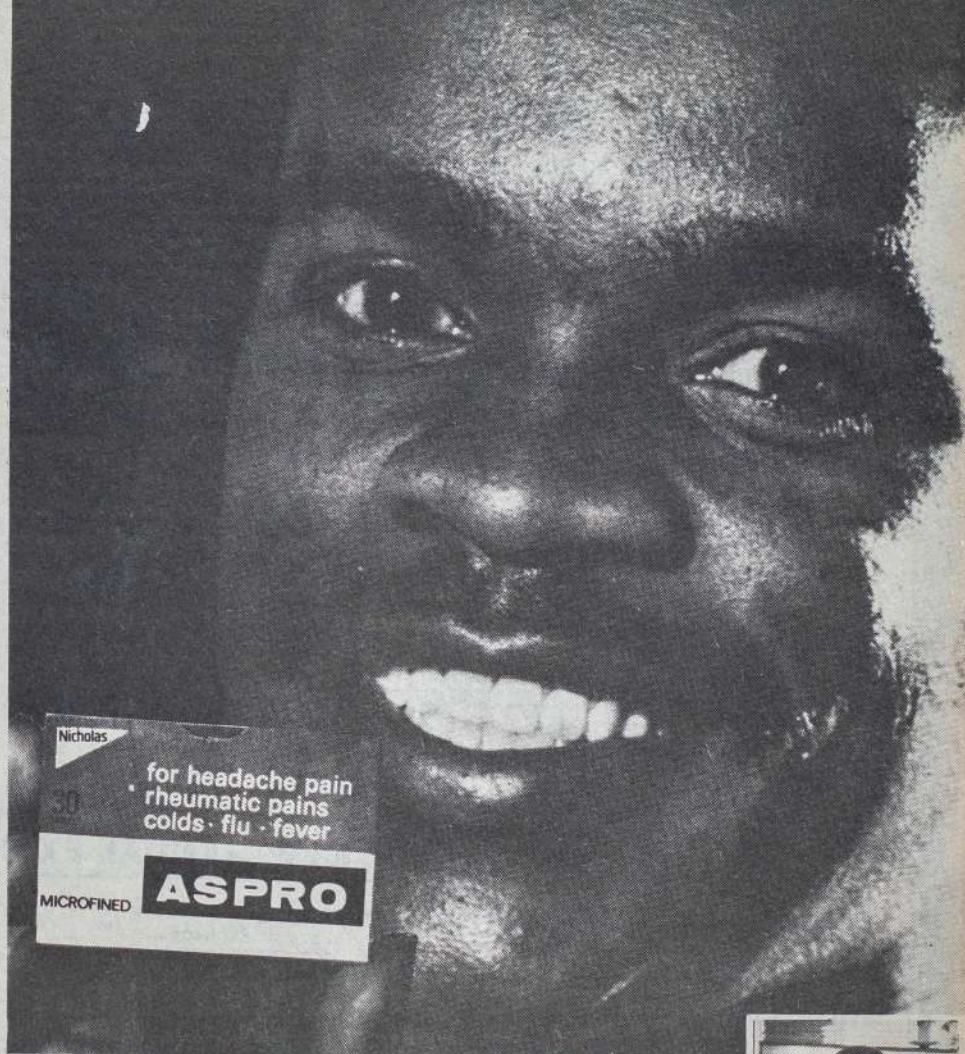

TANZANIA LINKS UP WITH PAN AFRICA TELE-COMMS SYSTEM

TANZANIA TOOK a step forward in the telecommunications field with the inauguration of the Pan African Telecommunications [Panafitel] network. The Tanzanian network was opened by the Minister of Communications and Transport, John Malecela, when he spoke over telephone with counterparts in Zambia and Ethiopia from Dodoma.

In the past calls had to be routed through Europe which meant the services had to be paid for in foreign exchange. Now Tanzania can directly communicate with Djibouti, Zambia, Sudan, Malawi and Ethiopia through this new network.

The implementation of the project was greatly assisted by the governments of Japan and Italy and the C. Itch and Fujitsu companies. A representative of the International Communications Union [ITU] Mr. Besta, who attended the opening ceremony in Dodoma, said that all African capitals would be connected to Panafitel by the end of 1984.

The Iranian Government will open an Embassy in Tanzania early next year. A four man delegation of the Islamic Republic visited the country last week to finalise arrangements.

The delegation was led by Dr. Mohamed Lawassan who is the Director General of Political Affairs for Asia and Africa in the Iranian Foreign Ministry. Talks were held with the acting Minister of Foreign Affairs, Ali Mwinyi, the Prime Minister, Cleopa Msuya, The Principal Secretary in the Ministry of Water and Energy and officials of the Ministry of Lands, Housing and Urban Development.

Arrangements for the Embassy opening were set off when top level delegations from the two countries met in September this year after the United Nations General Assembly in New York.

The Iranians said that the move to establishing the Em-

bassy was to forge closer cooperation between Iran and Third World countries. The Iranians are also opening Embassies in Madagascar, Ghana, Zimbabwe and Sierra Leone.

The Tanzibar Livestock Corporation has signed an agreement with a Dutch Firm to construct Shs. 13.5 million worth of hatcheries on the Island at Mbweni.

Construction is expected to begin early next year and is expected to take about six months. After completion, the hatcheries are expected to produce some 70,000 chicks a month.

A successful heart operation was performed on Grace Mweya [5] in the United States. Grace and another girl, Laurencia Josephat are accompanied by Dr. Rajin Kanabar on the trip which has been organised and sponsored by the Mwanza Round Table Association.

Laurencia however, has to undergo a special cardiological test to establish whether an open heart surgery can be performed on her. The girls are at the International Heart Relief Centre in Minneapolis.

Tanzanians were faced with another price increase when the Tanzanian tea blenders raised the price of tea by about 40 per cent. The increase was put on higher costs of packing materials, raw materials and overhead costs.

A two year contract has been signed between the bicycle manufacturing company of India, Hamilton Industries and

the National Development Corporation (NDC).

Under the agreement, the National Bicycle company (NABICO) will receive technical and management assistance from the Indian company.

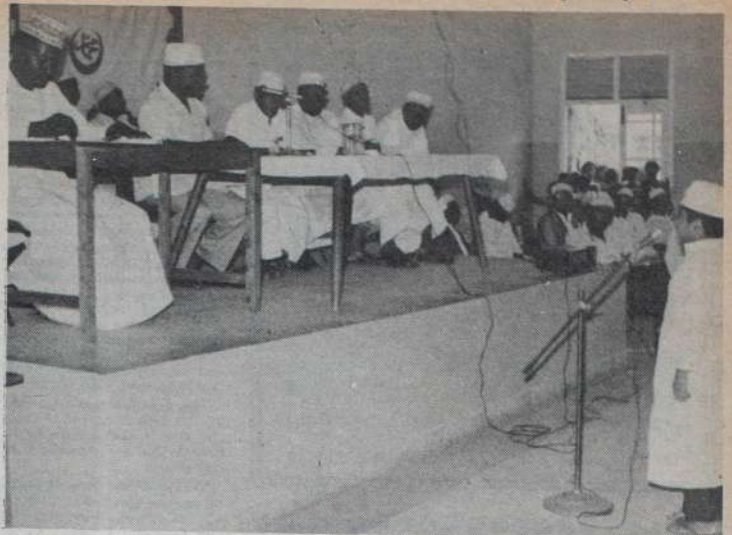
Hamilton Industries will also provide the technical personnel to train Tanzanians on bicycle manufacturing technology and will further train nationals on production planning, quality control and management.

The contract also carries a total technical and management fee of 2.8 million shillings which will be provided by the Indian Government.

SEWAGE SYSTEM

The International Development Association (IDA) which is an affiliate of the World Bank, has approved 202.5 million shillings credit to rehabilitate the sewerage and sanitation systems in Dar es Salaam.

The credit will meet expenses for repairing equipment and building pit latrines in the city. The credit will also meet expenses for providing low-cost sanitation facilities.

THE woman had been granted full freedom in the choice of her husband. Nobody has got the right to give her away in marriage without her wish and consent. And if she marries a Muslim by her free choice, nobody can stop her from doing so. If, however, she selects a man who is not her equal in the family status, the elders reserve their right to object.

She has also been given legal rights to obtain separation from a husband who is cruel, impotent or who she abhors.

The husband has been instructed to use the authority granted him over the wife with discretion in a large-hearted and magnanimous manner. The Holy Qur'an says: "Treat your women kindly" (4:19) and "Forget not magnanimity in your mutual dealings." (2:237).

The Holy Prophet (s.a.w.) said: "The best among you are those who are good to their wives and kind to their people".

Islam does not give only moral instructions. If the husband abuses his authority, the wife reserves every right to have recourse to the law.

Widows and divorced women and all such women whose marriages have been annulled by law, or who have been legally separated from their husbands, have been granted an unfettered right to remarry. Their previous husbands or any relatives, do not retain any right whatever over them.

Absolute equality has been established between the man and woman is so far as civil and personal laws are concerned. The Islamic Law does not recognise any distinction between them in so far as protection of life and property, honour and reputation is concerned.

charters to tourism and whether Kenya Airways can cope with the tourist market in a particular country or not."

He stated that "to-date CAB has been extremely fair in its consideration of charters". Here the Minister mentioned that "some whose applications had been rejected, had come to see us".

While mentioning that "CAB has never rejected our recommendations", the Minister explained that "what CAB and my Ministry require of a charter company/tour operator is a breakdown of the cost of a package holiday including the air fare, plus all their expenses in the country of origin and other details showing that a sufficient portion of foreign exchange will be received in Kenya. So long as we can be given this, then there should be no objection".

"But it was necessary" he reiterated, "to be assured that there will be sufficient foreign exchange coming to Kenya from their operation here".

TOUR OPERATORS

Pointing out that tourism is now the country's No. 1 earner of foreign exchange, the Minister spoke of the minimal coverage often given to this important industry by the national press which appeared somewhat disinterested in what government, tour operators and hoteliers were doing to boost it.

The Minister also mentioned that he could see no reason why the name of a hotel should be omitted from any important function held there. Cuttings

of such reports were often sent all over the world, and this would do much to help promote Kenya's tourist industry.

He urged newspapers to give more support to this very important industry.

Referring to the question of the bad state of some of the roads in the coast province due to the unprecedented rain, the Minister gave an assurance that as soon as the rains subside, repairs will be carried out.

He also referred to the question of importation of tourist vehicles and said that the government is actively considering this issue. "Because of problems concerning foreign exchange, it had not been possible to authorise priority for only one particular sector". Said the Minister: "Government is looking into how it can assist, for tourism is regarded as one of the top priority industries in the country".

ENVOY AT 'FOREIGN AFFAIRS' BRIEFING

THE KENYA High Commissioner Mr. B. A. Kiplagat, has been entertained to lunch in London by the Eastern Africa Committee of the Conservative Commonwealth and Overseas Council, (CCOC) which is chaired by Mr. Ian Raitt, formerly a Kenya resident and now a public relations and tourism marketing consultant in London.

The function was organised by his colleague Mr. Patrick Orr who is also a Director of Church Orr and Associates of Nairobi.

The luncheon was attended by senior Conservative members of Parliament, including Mr Tim Renton - C.C.O.C. Chairman and Sir John Biggs-Davison who is Vice Chairman of the Conservative Party's foreign Affairs Committee.

Leading business people with interests in Kenya also attended including Mr. Ron Aldridge, Head of Africa Department of the Confederation of British Industry, Mr. Norman Aspin, Chairman of the East Africa Association, Mr. Rouben Chakalian, President of Dal Monte for Europe, Africa and the Middle East, parent company of Kenya Canners, Mr Ian Fox of Minet International, Mr. Bob Vincent, Deputy Chairman of Mowlem International and Mr. Arthur Bevers of Booker Agriculture International.

Mr. Kiplagat gave members of the C.C.O.C. and their guests an up to date review of the current political and economic situation in Kenya and outlined and Government's objectives for the future.

Replying, Mr. Raitt stressed the close ties between Britain and Kenya and the confidence that British investors retained in Kenya's future economic progress.

Reasons For A 'Recession'

THE BASIC cause for the present shipping recession is too many ships chasing too few cargoes. The changed pattern of shipping from break bulk (loose) cargo to the container has also had a drastic effect on the demand for containers in light of the present slump. There are now as a result a vast surplus of containers worldwide with the container leasing Companies bearing the brunt of the impact as shipowners naturally wish to utilise their own boxes to the maximum at the expense of the leasing Companies boxes, these Companies, whose containers can be seen daily in Mombasa and all over the country bearing their motives e.g. CTI, ICS, CATU, SCI etcetera, own over 50 per cent of the world's container supply and are now a very worried group.

ERROL ON FOOD

BY THE time the Christmas jollifications have run their course into the first few days of the new year, many people are appalled by the thought of food altogether, having had an avalanche of eating and general over indulgence. And then comes the battle of the bulge; people begin to talk in hushed tones on how to lose weight - fast.

The trouble is that since everyone's metabolism is individual there are no real keys to the success formula. What works for one person very often has indifferent results for another.

An 'Apple and Date' diet which worked perfectly well for hundreds of other people, once left me weak at the knees and pallid and all I had wanted to do was lose a couple of vital pounds.

It certainly worked fast but left me feeling ill rather than healthy. The best way to tackle a tendency to put on weight is to eat light meals.

If you have a family outing the rest tuck into bread, cake and sandwiches and confine yourself to lemon tea. Grapefruit is another helpful citrus when it comes to slimming; this fruit is said to break down the fatty contents of food if half a grapefruit is eaten before every meal.

Here then are a few recipes for lunch or supper which will titillate the jaded, overfed appetite without adding ballast necessarily. It is important to remember not to salt food as heavily as usual if you are trying to slim.

All these recipes are for people who think beyond drastic slimming action. They are not boring and will recharge the body as well as helping to knock off a few pounds.

These recipes all come from Professor Wolfgang Goetz-Claren of Rome and have been created round basic nutrition principles. All ingredients must be fresh, he believes that muesli and lemon tea should form breakfast every day.

On Recovering Your Waistline

Muesli although made with oats is energy giving rather than fattening when eaten raw.

Here is a salad dressing which is ideal for all dieters. Remember commercial dressings are out for all would-be sylphs!

Cucumber and Green Bean Salad

3/4 cup olive oil
1/4 cup vinegar
Juice of 1 lemon
1 crushed clove of garlic
1 tsp paprika

Blend all the dressing ingredients together until smooth. The dressing should be used sparingly - use it as a 'lift' to a salad - vary the flavour with different herbs.

Boil a quarter of a pound of green beans in water seasoned with a little sea salt. This should not take longer than ten minutes. Overcooking destroys the vitamins and the taste. Strain and leave to cool. When cold combine with half a finely sliced cucumber (if the ridged type the skin may be left on) and six well scrubbed radishes, thinly sliced. Sprinkle with dressing and sprinkle chopped hard boiled egg over.

Mushrooms la Grecque

This is a marvellous way to prepare mushrooms and makes a light luncheon dish, a salad or a starter to a dinner.

In a cheesecloth, tie a bouquet garni comprising, 1 small bay leaf, four pepper corns, sprig of parsley, a hefty pinch of mixed dried herbs and put this in a pan with 3/4 cup of water, 1/4 cup of olive oil and the juice and rind of 1 lemon.

Now boil rapidly for ten minutes with the lid of the pan removed. Wipe half a pound of

button mushrooms, [they should be good enough not to require peeling] with a damp cloth.

Then add to the reduced liquor and simmer for ten minutes exactly with the lid on. Set aside to cool and then chill in the refrigerator. Stir occasionally - check seasoning when ready to serve either on a bed of lettuce hearts or in individual pots with a light sprinkling of chopped chives or parsley.

Steak Americaine

Brush four ounces of lean beef fillet with juice of a clove of garlic, seasoning lightly and smear finally with olive oil. Grill under the hottest possible grill for two minutes on the first side and four on the second. Eat this as rare as possible. Serve with a green salad in which lemon juice

rather than vinegar is used.

Lemon Soup

Those who enjoy the Greek soup Avogolemono will enjoy this pale refreshing soup based on the classic. It is perfect for hot weather eating.

Bring three cups of real well seasons chicken stock to the boil and add the beaten yolk of an egg with the juice of one lemon in a bowl. To it add a cup of the boiling broth, beating rapidly. Take the soup from the heat and stir into it, the egg broth.

Spinach and Bacon Salad.

Wash and drain 1 lb. of fresh young spinach - the small leaved variety is best for this salad. Remove all stalks. Toss with the above dressing and pieces of grilled, crisp bacon.

Orange and Olive Salad

Slice to serve with roast duck. Slice an orange cut into sections, add two thin slices of onion and six pitted black olives. Toss in the above dressing.

'CAT FLU ...'

THIS is the most acceptable name for a viral disease of cats which is also referred to as 'cat flu', among other colourful names. It is a very fatal and contagious disease of cats that has been documented all over the world. The disease is most serious in the young cats.

The word 'cats' in this context means all members of the family *felidae* among whom the domesticated cat is the most familiar to most of us.

Transmission from infected to 'clean' animals can occur directly, or indirectly via such objects as dishes, bedding, cages and hands of the pet handlers. (These are collectively called *formites*).

Recovered cats may shed the virus in their faeces and urine for long periods, and thus act as carriers of the disease.

An infected cat may die within 12 - 24 hours after the first appearance of clinical signs, in which case it is called a *per acute* infection, or such an animal may persist for four or five days, in which case it is called an *acute* infection. The former in stance will be encountered mostly in the less than six month old kittens.

'INITIAL SIGNS'

The most initial sign is a fever which lasts about 24 hours, by which time per acute cases are dead or, in acute cases, is followed by a return to normal temperature. The affected cat is severely depressed, often with the head between the forelegs.

Concurrent with this depression is vomiting which is usually of a yellowish fluidy substance. Diarrhoea may follow the onset of vomiting. If it occurs, it is usually dark brown.

Overall the cat will often lie on its belly on a cool surface. Handling of the sick animal elicits painful meows due

to the pain in the abdominal region as a result of the immense paid due to inflammation of the intestines: known as *enteritis*.

Affected cats lose weight very rapidly - due to the dehydration caused by the vomiting and diarrhoea.

It may be noteworthy to mention that the causative virus is capable of crossing the placenta. Therefore, depending on the age of pregnancy, an infected queen will abort *in foetus* or may deliver abnormal ones.

'TREATMENT'

There is no treatment for the virus causing this disease. Any treatment given to a sick cat is therefore symptomatic and aimed at making the cat as comfortable as possible.

By symptomatic treatment is meant combating the extreme dehydration, providing nutrients (affected cats will not eat well) and electrolytes and preventing any secondary infection.

Pet owners are advised to thoroughly disinfect their cages and completely isolate clinical cases in the event of an outbreak. Recovered animals usually acquire a complete and life-long immunity.

Also reassuring is the presence of vaccines to protect kittens whose mothers may not have passed adequate levels of anti-bodies in the colostrum and also pregnant queens which subsequently pass anti-bodies to their kittens via the colostrum.

Pet owners are advised to present their kittens for vaccination at about nine weeks of age.

Subsequent booster doses will depend on your veterinarian and locality. Most veterinarians, however recommend an annual revaccination for maximum protection.

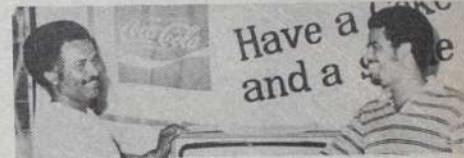

AUF DEN SPUREN DER WILDEN TIERE IM TSAVOPARK

von NELLY RIEGGER

DER GRÖßTE und bekannteste Wildpark Kenias erstreckt sich über eine Fläche von 21.000 km². Seine riesige Ausdehnung kann man vielleicht etwas besser erfassen, wenn man sich vorstellt, daß er gerade halb so groß ist wie die Schweiz.

Die ganze Region war von jeher nur spärlich bewohnt, weil die Viehhaltung durch Schlafkrankheit verbreitende Tsetsefliegen und der Ackerbau durch chronischen Wassermangel beinahe unmöglich gemacht wurden. Da diese primitive vulkanische Wildnis kaum je wirtschaftlich genutzt werden konnte, sich jedoch ein erstaunlich vielseitiger Wildbestand in der urwüchsigen Landschaft aufhielt, wurde diese Region 1948 zu einem der ersten Nationalparks Kenias erklärt.

Aus administrativen Gründen wurde das Gebiet aufgeteilt in Tsavo-Ost (13.000 km²) und Tsavo-West (8.000 km²) mit je einem hauptverantwortlichen Parkhüter. Über die Hälfte des Tsavo-Ost-Parks liegt nördlich des Galanaflusses. Diese wilde, unwirtliche Gegend ist für den Touristenverkehr noch nicht erschlossen und kann nur mit spezieller, vorher beantragter Bewilligung besucht werden.

Die beiden Parks sind getrennt durch die Mombasa-Nairobi-Straße und die Eisenbahnlinie nach Uganda. 1901 fuhr der erste Zug von Mombasa nach Kisumu am Viktoriasee. Über den abenteuerlichen Bahnbau berichtet das interessante Buch "Die Menschenfresser von Tsavo". Zwei Menschenfresserlöwen schlichen sich nachts in die Zelte der Arbeiter und hielten sich dort ihre Opfer. Der ganze Bahnbau kam zum Stillstand, weil die Arbeiter diese Gegend meieden, wo sie ihres Lebens nicht mehr sicher waren. Man erzählte, die bösen Geister von zwei Stammeshäuptlingen erschienen in der Gestalt dieser Löwen, um den Bahnbau zu verhindern. Erst nach unzähligen vergeblichen Versuchen gelang es schließlich Oberst Patterson, dem Leiter des Bahnprojektes, die Löwen zu töten, die neun Monate lang die Leute in Angst und Schrecken versetzt hatten.

Von Mombasa aus erreicht man auf der Nairobistraße bereits nach 90 km das Buchuma-Tor rechter Hand zum Tsavo-Ost-Park. In der flachen Buschlandschaft sieht man viel Steppenwild, und in der Savanne ist der Vogelstrauß zu Hause. Tsavo war einst berühmt für seine 20.000 Elefanten, von denen allerdings nur noch ein paar Tausend übrig geblieben sind.

Der größte Teil ist wegen ihres kostbaren und immer seltener werdenden Elfenbeins den Wilderern zum Opfer gefallen, bevor 1977 die Jagd auf alle Wildtiere und der Handel mit sämtlichen Jagdtrophäen verboten wurde. In der darauf folgenden Trockenzeit, die wie in der biblischen Geschichte etwa alle 7 Jahre die Gegend von Tsavo heimsucht, verhungerten wieder Legionen von Wild und die Natur trifft jeweils ihre willkürliche Selektion unter den Tieren, wobei nur die stärksten und widerstandsfähigsten überleben.

ARUBA LODGE

Von Buchuma her gelangt man zur Aruba Lodge, die an einem kleinen Stausee am Aruba Dam liegt. Die Lodge besteht aus kleinen Steinhäusern mit Schlafzimmer, Esszimmer, Badezimmer und Küche für Selbstversorger.

Auf dem See halten sich viele Wasservögel auf, Nilgänse, heilige Ibis, Pelikane, Wildenten, Reiher, Kormorane. Vor allem gegen Abend wandern große Elefantengruppen von weit her zum See, und viele andere Tiere kommen auch tagsüber zur Tränke.

In diesem riesigen Park sind die Entfernungen zwischen den einzelnen Punkten beträchtlich. Bis zum Galanafluß fährt man ungefähr 1-2 Stunden. Seine Ufer sind von Dampalmen und Borassuspalmen gesäumt und bieten eine typisch afrikanische Szenerie. Die Lugardfälle sind nicht sehr hoch, aber recht eindrucksvoll. Durch das ungewöhnlich verformte und durchbrochene Schichtgestein brodeln das Wasser durch enge Spalten in die Tiefe.

Von Malindi aus gelangt man nach 110 km zum Sala-Tor und durch eine sehr rauhe und wilde Gegend ebenfalls zum Galanafluß, der in seinem weiteren Verlauf umbenannt wird und als Sabakifluß bei Malindi in den Indischen Ozean mündet.

Die Voi Safari Lodge, nur etwa 5 Kilometer vom Voi-Eingang entfernt, bietet allen Luxus und Komfort und liegt auf einem Hügel mit Aussicht in die unendliche Weite. Oft weiden am Fuße des Hügels riesige Büffelherden.

Es gibt auch romantische Zeltplätze im Park, wo man unter Umständen fast hautnah mit dem

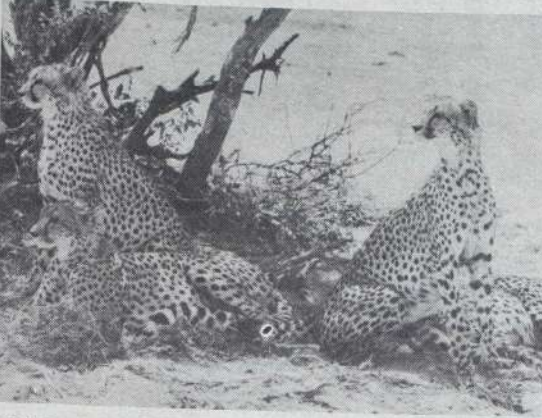

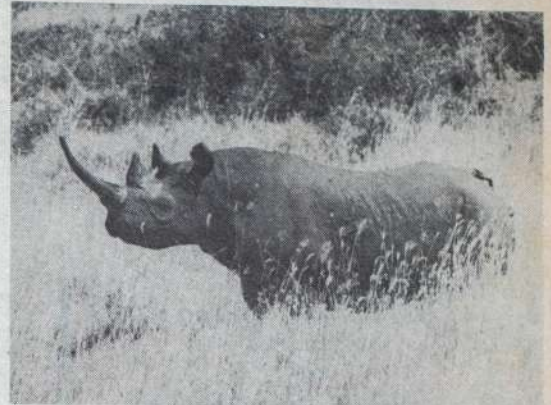

Wild in Berührung kommen kann. Auf einer Rundfahrt am Tsavo-Ost-Fluß entlang, wo es auch Krokodile gibt, hat man vor allem frühmorgens oder in der Abenddämmerung unvergessliche Begegnungen mit wilden Tieren.

An den Mudanda Rocks vorbei führt der Weg zum Manyoni-Tor aus dem Tsavo-Ost-Park hinaus auf die Nairobistraße. Nach etwa 40 km kommt man zum Tsavo-Eingang linker Hand in dem Tsavo-West-Park.

Für die Eligen gibt es den direkten, breiten Weg zur Ngulia Lodge. Vielsprechender ist jedoch der etwas holprige Pfad am Tsavo-Ost-Fluß entlang. In der bezaubernden Landschaft halten sich auch viele Tiere auf.

Die 1969 erbaute Ngulia Lodge ist eine Luxusherberge mit Aussichtsterrasse, Swimming Pool und Wasserloch mit Flutlichtanlage. Auch von hier gibt es einen direkten Weg zur Kilguni Lodge, doch lohnt sich ein Umweg über das "Rhino Valley", wenn man auch mit ziemlicher Sicherheit kein Nashorn sieht. Man fährt durch riesige erstarrte Lavaströme und schwarze, mit hellgrünen Büschen überzogene Kolkshalden, die zu beiden Seiten emporragen.

Die Kilguni Lodge besteht seit 1962, wurde modernisiert und vergrößert und bildet eine Oase der Erholung in der Wildnis. Sie hat ihren ursprünglichen Charakter bewahrt und hat begeisterte Stammgäste bei den Menschen und in der Tierwelt gefunden. Beim Mittagessen auf der Terrasse kann man die Parade der Tiere am Wasserloch an sich vorbeiziehen lassen. Viele Glanzstare, Pfefferfresser und Erdhörnchen sind zahm und lassen sich von Hand füttern.

In der nahen Umgebung befinden sich ein paar interessante Aussichtspunkte. Bei den "Roaring Rocks" (brüllenden Felsen) hört man zwar höchstens den Wind durch die Felspalten pfeifen; vom "Poachers Lookout" (Wilddiebs-Ausguck) hat man einen phantastischen Rundblick; bei den "Mzima-Springs" sprudeln 2 Milliarden Liter Wasser pro Tag aus unterirdischen Quellen, die den größten Teil von Mombasa mit Wasser versorgen. Die Reservoire befinden sich etwas oberhalb der Quellen, so daß die natürlichen Pools, in denen sich eine große Ansammlung von Flußperlen aufhält, nicht verändert oder gestört werden. Von einer Plattform aus kann man die Flußperle und Krokodile beobachten, und durch die Glasscheiben einer Unterwasserkammer erhält man Einblick in die Fischwelt.

Von den Mzima Springs ist es nicht weit bis zur Kitani Lodge, wo man sich selbst verpflegen muß. Sie liegt in einer wildreichen Gegend und es kommt nicht selten vor, daß sich Zebras und Kongonis zum Greifen nah direkt vor der Veranda und zwischen den Steinhäusern aufhalten.

Man kann die Safari fortsetzen und zum nahegelegenen Amboseli-Park weiterfahren oder

in entgegengesetzter Richtung nach Mito Andei, an der Hauptstraße auf halbem Weg zwischen Nairobi und Mombasa gelegen.

Mitte der siebziger Jahre wurde der Südzweig des Tsavoparks, ein ehemaliges Jagdgebiet, für den Tourismus erschlossen. In Voi biegt man ab Richtung Taveta, das an der Grenze nach Tansania liegt.

SALT LICK LODGE

Nach etwa 40 km teilweise auf der Asphaltstraße durch die landschaftlich reizvollen Taitahügel kommt man zu den beiden Luxusherbergen, die unter dem Management der Hilton-Hotel-Gruppe stehen. Die Taita Hills Lodge, außerhalb des Parks, verschwindet fast in einem Blumenmeer und dient oft als Konferenzzentrum für Seminare und Tagungen. Die Salt Lick Lodge ist auf Steilen gebaut wie ein Taita-Dorf und liegt in einem privaten Wildpark, in dem es erstaunlich viele Tiere gibt. Letztes Jahr sind zwei Löwen in der Nähe der Lodge in einen ausgetrockneten Brunnen gefallen, und unter Leitung des Managers wurde eine abenteuerliche, aber erfolgreiche

Rettsaktion durchgeführt.

Ein Stück weiter auf der Überland-Schotterstraße erreicht man den Eingang zum südlichen Teil des Tsavo-West-Parks. Er ist nicht so viel befahren und liegt etwas abseits des großen Touristenrummels. Durch die weiterhin hügelige Landschaft gelangt man bis hinunter zum lieblichen Jipese, dessen anderes Ufer bereits in Tansania liegt. Ein Boot steht zur Verfügung für Rundfahrten auf dem See, der von einem dichten Schilfgürtel gesäumt ist, in dem sich unzählige Wasservögel aufhalten.

An interessanten Fischerdörfern vorbei und durch riesige Sisalplantagen kommt man wieder auf die Hauptstraße. Auf dem Rückweg kann man noch einen lohnenden Abstecher machen zum Lake Chala, einem kleinen, aber sehenswerten Kratersee auf der linken Seite der Straße. Man sieht ihn erst, wenn man den Kraterrand hinaufgefahren ist und direkt am Abgrund steht. Ein atemberaubender Anblick!

Der Tsavopark mit seinen vielen Untergebieten ist so groß und vielseitig, daß man auf jeder weiteren Safari immer wieder etwas Neues entdecken kann.

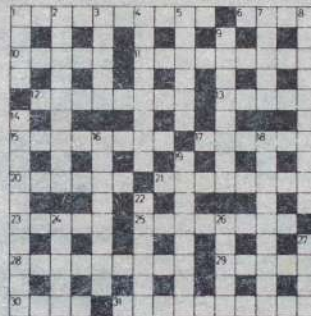

Weakened MSC lose To Sir Ali

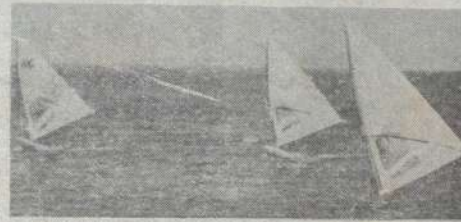

WITH just over a week to go, the route for the Firestone Coast 600 rally is complete, and entries are being received. First confirmed entries received on Christmas Eve, were that of Ashok Pattni and Fark Yusuf, in a Datsun 160J.

The Coast 600 now in its seventh year, was introduced by Mombasa Motor Club as its second Championship rally. In its first few years the start and finish was at Mtito Andei, so as to cut down the amount of driving before and after the rally for upcountry rally crews.

The 1976 event took the cars across country from Kilifi in an easterly direction, heading for fuel dumps that had been sited by the organisers. Cars who took part in that particular rally still insist that a working knowledge of the stars was an important factor in successful navigation.

This year the Firestone Coast 600 starts from Voi Secondary School, sited on the road from Voi township to the game park entrance.

Because of the difficulty of moving between the main Nairobi road and the Diani area without using the rally route, it is recommended that one service vehicle is used to cover most of the service areas along the Mwatate-Voi and Voi-Samburu main roads, while a second vehicle assist in the Tiwi-Mwabungu area before and after the half way rest control at the Two Fishes, Diani.

The closing date for entries for the Firestone Coast 600 is Wednesday 5th January and the order of starting will be determined at 8 p.m. on that evening Bahari Club.

The Control Officers' briefing will take place at Bahari Club following day, Thursday 6th January at 6 p.m.
