HALLEY'S COMET CAN BE SEEN WITH BINOCULARS

HALLEY'S comet has emerged from the dim recesses of space and, displaying an unexpected early brightness, is coming into increasingly clear view in the night sky.

The best opportunities so far to see the comet began Thursday and will continue through Sunday. The moon is new and thus not a source of much interfering light.

The comet will be fairly high above the eastern horizon and near an easily recognizable feature in the sky, the cluster of stars astronomers call the Pleiades.

The comet, which returns to the inner solar system roughly every 76 years, should be visible

through the night, beginning at about 9 p.m. local time, throughout most of the world, except in extreme southern latitudes such as South Africa and southern Australia.

However, in March and April, on the comet's return swing, the Southern Hemisphere will get by far the best view of Halley in its most spectacular phase.

Most comet experts recommend binoculars, rather than a telescope, for viewing the comet. They suggest 7x35 or, preferably, 7x50 binoculars. Binoculars provide a wider field of view than telescopes, which is an advantage especially in nights when the comet's tail stretches across the sky.

Visibility will depend on weather and proximity to city lights. The sky must be clear and dark. People in cities and most suburbs will have little or no chance to see the comet.

The comet will make its closest inbound approach to earth on Nov. 27. It will be 58 million miles (about 93 million kilometers) away and difficult to observe because of bright moonlight. The next two prime observing periods for the inbound journey are Dec. 8-13 and Jan. 4-6. Backyard observers might want to try Dec. 5-15 and Jan. 1-14.

In February the comet will disappear from sight as it passes behind the sun.

Late that month, it will emerge from behind the sun more dazzling than ever. Solar heat will have stripped its core, which probably is no more than a few miles wide, of its outer layers of ice and other particles. This will result in denser, more luminous cloud surrounding the comet's nucleus and twin tails extending perhaps 50 million miles across the sky.

On April 11, the comet will come closest to earth, passing within 39 million miles. But on the entire outbound leg, it will be a disappointment to observers in the Northern Hemisphere. It will always be too close to the horizon.

Rwanda Cargo Still Moving ...

CONTINUING KENYA-TANZANIA ASSISTANCE PRAISED

SOME 15,000 tons of import cargo and five million litres of fuel oil cleared through Mombasa have arrived in Kigali since the landlocked country of Rwanda began transporting its goods through northern Tanzania eight weeks ago, following the fresh outbreak of civil war and rebellion in Uganda.

At the same time, 12,000 tons of Kigali export cargo, mainly coffee and tea, have been ferried to Mombasa for shipment since the new route became operational in early October.

"It's now business as usual, despite the poor roads we have

to cope with," a spokesman for Societe De Transport International Au Rwanda (STIR) told Coastweek.

He also described Tanzanian authorities as "being very cooperative".

Since October, more than 500 trucks have been shuttling between Kenya and Rwanda, through the tortuous northern Tanzanian route, in a bid to clear Rwandanese goods which were stranded in Kenya and provide a normal flow of import and export goods destined for Kigali and Mombasa.

Essential commodities such as fuel oil, foodstuff, machinery and spare parts are reported to be in abundance in Kigali after a month-long wave of shortages that threatened to cripple the Rwandese economy.

More than 15 private transport firms are operating around 120 trucks a week to and from Kigali to Mombasa, carrying at least 3,750 tons of import cargo and a substantial amount of Rwandanese export cargo for shipment from Mombasa.

Burundi, also landlocked, was forced to join its northern neighbour Rwanda in transporting its import and export goods through northern Tanzania, by-passing the war-torn Uganda.

Figures for Burundi, showing the movement of its goods through the new route, were not immediately available in Mombasa.

The war in Uganda has so far cost transport firms engaging in Rwandese goods more than 45 million Kenya shillings, STIR sources.

At the same time, clearing and forwarding firms in Mombasa have complained of heavy

financial losses occasioned by the current and continuing internal strife in Uganda.

IN JANUARY, domestic refrigerators of all sizes will, for the first time, be manufactured in Kenya.

Master-minding their local production is Reffer Manufacturers Limited, a subsidiary of Kenya Cold Storage, which is based at Southern Engineering in Mombasa's Mbaraki area. It went 'on stream' just over a year ago, giving job opportunities to some eighty Kenyans whose numbers will increase when domestic refrigerators start being produced.

Reffer presently manufacture a complete range of freezers, bottle and water coolers, cold buffet display counters and meat display units.

It is the only factory in the whole of Kenya to be manufacturing these cold counters which are in big demand by supermarkets, hotels, butcheries etc.

Hotels are displaying their cold buffets in them thus ensuring the food remains fresh and free from flies.

Meat display counters come in lengths from 6-12 feet. There are also 16 cubic feet 'upright' freezers and fridges for commercial purposes.

Deep Freezers come in three sizes - 8, 12 and 25 cubic feet, and you can request the colour you would like.

In addition, Reffer is producing Bottle and Water Coolers.

All bottling companies in Kenya are now buying Bottle Coolers from them, while Water Coolers go in particular to light industries and hotels.

Water Coolers come in three sizes - 10, 25 and 50 gallon capacity. All have temperatures thermostically controlled.

Reffer is also producing Executive 'Mini' Bars which would also make an ideal present for someone who has to do a lot of home entertaining.

They are partly covered in washable velvet and have three bar stools. The bar is equipped with two wine chillers, warming oven for 'booze food', and has a built-in 5.5 cubic foot 'frig where beer and soft drinks can be stored and kept ice-cold.

They are made from stainless steel and will not rust.

A company spokesman said that 'prices, compared with similar imported items, are very competitive', adding 'in fact, our prices are comparable to none'.

He asserted that items being manufactured by Reffer at Mombasa 'surpass internationally laid down standards'. One example being that their deep freezers have copper pipes, instead of aluminium, inside. Copper, he pointed out, lasts much longer.

In addition, all items are manufactured to cope with conditions here, and are tropicalised.

Such is the demand for Reffer products that the factory is programmed until March.

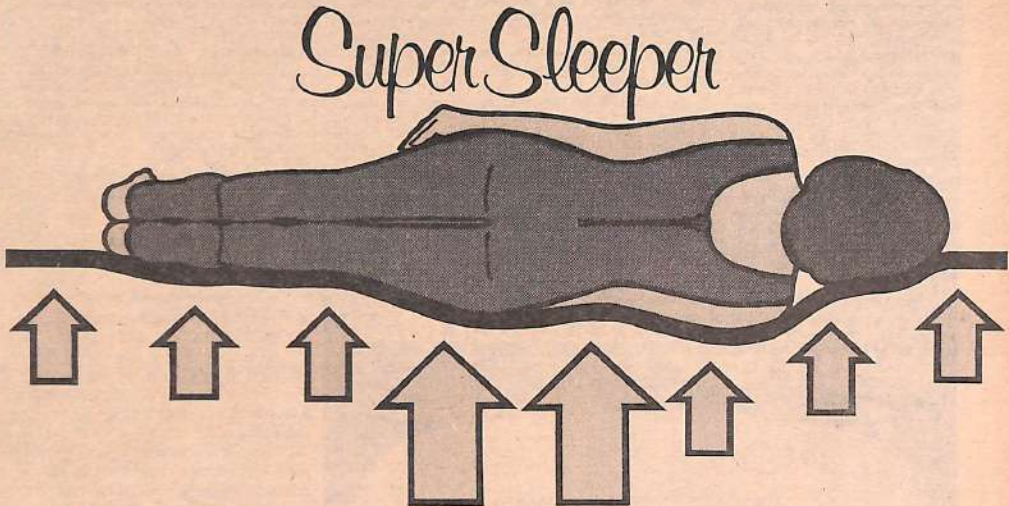

NETHERLANDS BOOK GIFT

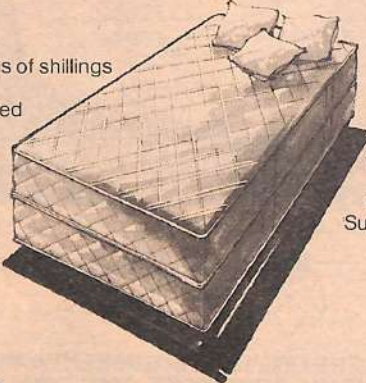

DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM Tanzania Still Seeking Economic Discussions On I.M.F. Policies

THE LONG outstanding issue of Tanzania's negotiations with the International Monetary fund (IMF) was once again brought up for mention by the country's new President, Ali Hassan Mwinyi, this week. Mwinyi said that the previous government was at one time very close to concluding with the International Fund Organisation but that the issue reached a stalemate after additional conditions were raised.

The President expressed hope that a positive agreement would be reached so as to assist and consolidate efforts towards national economic rehabilitation.

He however clarified that although the country was facing economic problems, the government was duty bound to closely scrutinise the IMF conditions so that these did not adversely affect the well being and standard of living of the country's nationals.

In Zanzibar the President Idris Abdul Wakil told the voice of America in an interview, that the Zanzibar Revolutionary Government will soon enact a law to protect private investment in various sectors of the economy. He said, the Isles government would protect funds to be released by private investors for boosting the Isles economy.

He said that agriculture, fishing, livestock, tourism and industries would remain the key sectors that called for financial injection and that clove farming

would get special attention because the Isles economy continued to depend on earnings from this crop.

He said the government was considering giving financial and material loans to clove farmers so as to enable them to come up with a fine quality crop that can compete on international markets with those from other clove-producing countries in the world.

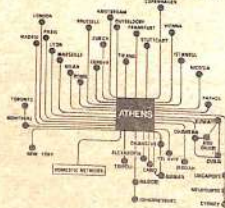

Further Facts On The 'Ferry Fiasco'

THE BIRTHDAY of the Prophet Muhammed S.A.W which will fall on Sunday the 24th November, 1985 will be celebrated in Mombasa with a mass procession and a rally.

The mammoth procession to be organised by the Muslim Association of Mombasa will commence from the Sakina Mosque, Majengo at 4.45 p.m. soon after the prayers and will culminate at Mbarouk Mosque, near the Jamhuri Gardens (Makadara Grounds) at about 6.00 p.m.

The procession will be preceded by the scout troops of the Muslim Boy Scouts and a van fitted with loud speakers chanting the holy hymns and sermons from the Holy Quran.

The mass Maulid-un Nabi (SAW) celebrations to mark the festive occasion will be held at the Jamhuri Gardens Makadara Grounds and will commence soon after the Isha prayers at 8.30 p.m. where thousands of Muslims will throng the grounds to witness the spectacular celebrations of the holy Prophet Muhammed (SAW).

The celebrations is expected to be attended to by Government and Local Authority officials, politicians and other leading dignitaries including the Imams of various mosques and children from the far and near by Muslim Madressas who will recite the Qasidas in praise of Prophet Muhammed (SAW).

All Muslim and non-Muslims are cordially invited to attend the mass procession and the Maulidi celebrations. Various learned speakers have been invited to speak on the life of Prophet Muhammed (SAW).

The Association wishes to draw the kind attention of the public that ladies will not be allowed to join in the procession. Ladies attending the night Maulid-un Nabi SAW should occupy the designated seating arrangements behind the dias.

Those attending and joining the procession should follow the instructions of the Traffic Police and Officials of the Association.

SOME newspapers have drawn attention to the problems faced by the hundreds of thousands of commuters who were affected by the ferry fiasco on the night of the 11th November; there are, however, a few facts that I would like to mention as I am a resident of Likoni and have been frequently involved in these appalling delays.

On Wednesday, 2nd October at around midday, the ferry tried to embark a huge truck which broke down half way on board.

There was no plan for diverting traffic to the other ramp at the island side of the ferry, and it was at least two hours before anyone moved.

On Monday, the 11th November at around 1700 hrs. once again an enormous truck, trailer and container was permitted to board.

This colossal weight had the remarkable effect of pushing the ferry down on to the ramp and grounding it.

The tide then went out leaving the craft stranded. Once again, there was no plan to make use of the second ramp and it was yet again a full two hours before anyone moved.

The ferry staff did ask for the free use of a Tug but the Kenya Ports Authority refused to assist unless payment was made, not unreasonably.

Had the tug been called in it is fairly safe to assume that the ferry would have been off the rocks in half an hour.

Thousands of people were stranded all night.

On Tuesday, the 12th November, the same ferry, (which had been refloated late the previous evening by the timely intervention of Mungu and a high tide) suffered a mechanical failure very early in the morning: only one other ferry was available and this was devoted entirely to carrying pedestrians (free of charge) back and forwards.

Not a car moved for nearly two hours at which point someone called the police who held

back the crowds, allowed vehicles to board and then per-

mitted pedestrians to embark.

Several points arise from this:-

• We are told that Likoni is to get a bridge before Likoni gets one: There is absolutely no justification for this and this priority is entirely wrong.

Why on earth are our MPs (there are at least three involved) keeping quiet on this issue?

• I am told that at a recent meeting of irate hoteliers etc, the ferry manager blamed everything on the state of the ramps which "are the responsibility of the government".

This is surely nonsense. The ramps are in a dangerous state but the operational expertise of the ferry staff is worse.

Ship Discharges Material For New Oil Exploration Project

A MULTI purpose ship with a difference is the Malagasy owned Vatsy 3 Japanese built in 1979 which arrived last weekend from Madagascar to discharge project material for geophysical survey work in connection with oil exploration. She berthed at Liwatoni Creek close to AMGECO drydock, which called for some skilful navigation, where she discharged wheeled vehicles and other equipment. The 1100 ton vessel combines the features of a ferry-landing craft with a bow ramp as well as lift on-lift off facilities. I gather she will be returning to Mombasa with a second shipment.

As predicted Kilindini has been passing through a lean time of late sharply focussed last week end when there only

3 or 4 vessels alongside the general cargo berths. The three container berths, however, continue to reflect a high occupancy.

In port this week at No.2 after an interval of almost 5 weeks is one of the Pacific International line vessels, the *Kota Jaya* built as the Hansa line *Sturmfels* discharging 1700 tons general cargo from the Far East at No. 2 berth. Built in 1972 she is 14500 d.w. tons and has called here on several previous occasions.

Loading 2000 tons bagged Soda Ash for the Far East is a vessel with a good South American name the Belgian built *Antofagasta* which, whilst flying the flag of Panama, is owned by leading Chilean ship-owners. Built in 1970 she is over 20,000 tons deadweight. I noticed her red, white and blue funnel markings seem identical to United States Lines.

Making a return call on Monday for bunkers and water was the Dutch owned deepsea salvage tug *Sirocco* which some weeks ago had towed into Mombasa the oil drilling rig lying off the Yacht Club.

MONDAY CALLER

A smart looking red painted products tanker which has called here before entered port on Monday morning for a few hours to discharge 320 tons only of chemicals at S.O.T. She was the Dutch flag, Norwegian owned tanker *Jo Cypress*. Built 2 years ago the housing for her two totally enclosed fireproof lifeboats recessed into the superstructure is an unusual feature

in the ship's design. Due on Sunday is the vessel carrying the second shipment of cranes for the KPA general cargo berths manufactured by the well known British Company Sothert and Pitt. The carrier is the 3 year old Dutch heavy lift vessel appropriately named *Jumbo Challenger* owned by Kahn Scheepvaart B.V. Rotterdam. I believe she called at the port on a previous voyage. On this voyage she has 4 cranes to discharge.

Fertiliser continues to come in with parcels of varying sizes being regularly discharged. Over this week and next approximately 25000 tons is due to arrive in bulk and bags by the *Almedina*, *Leslie Lykes*, *Al Raza*, *Blue Liner* and *Aliki Ip*.

With the Royal Navy hydrographic survey vessel *HMS Hydra* in East African waters, incidentally she sailed for Tanga and Dar-es-Salaam early this week, it is perhaps appropriate to mention the recent launch in Britain of *HMS Roebuck* a new Royal Navy Survey vessel costing £8 million sterling and due for delivery mid 1986. She will be larger than *HMS Hydra*.

Presently the R.N. have four ocean deepsea survey vessels which, amongst other tasks, serve to keep Admiralty Charts updated, but regrettably *HMS Hydra* will be decommissioned early next year and most likely sold to another country whilst the new *HMS Roebuck* will thereafter be a fitting substitute.

TOKYO PARTY FOR THE N.Y.K.

MR SOLOMON M'ANAMPIU, director of shipping services and freight of Mitchell Cotts Kenya Ltd., has returned from a visit to Japan during which he attended the centenary celebrations of NYK Lines.

Mitchell Cotts Kenya Ltd. are local agents for NYK, one of Japan's largest shipping organisations.

An old friend whom Mr. M'Anampiu met during his visit was Mr T. Matsuda, the former resident NYK representative in Nairobi.

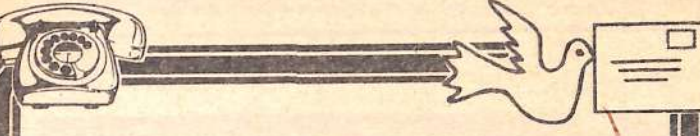

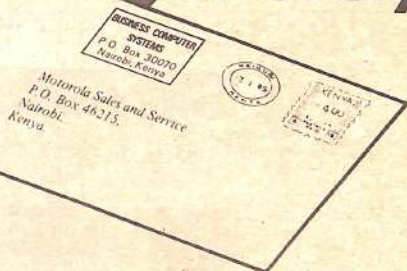

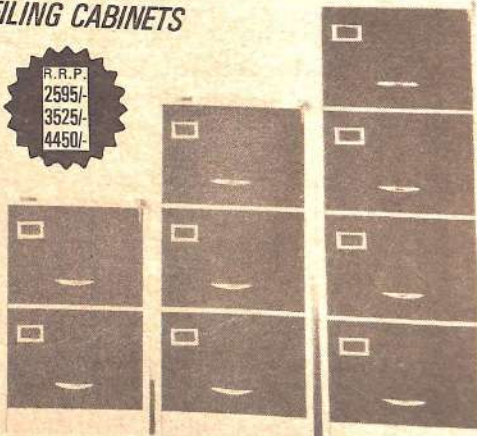

NGUU TATU HASHING ...

ORIGINS OF THE HASH

It has been suggested that readers of this column might be interested to know a little about the origins of the Hash and I have done some research into this mysterious subject.

It appears that many years ago, (at least ten), a group of expatriate Englishmen living in Malaysia decided that it would be a good idea to improve their thirst by running to their local watering hole, the "Hash House". Thus the "Hash House Harriers" were born and each Monday a trail was laid by designated hares to reach the place by a different route, incorporating many false trails and deceptions along the way.

The idea spread with amazing rapidity, originally amongst expatriate communities throughout the world, although it is nowadays by no means limited to expatriates.

The Spokesman said the team has already started serious training and expressed hope all players will attend practise daily. They intend to play first division clubs in respective districts.

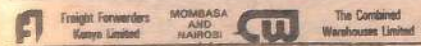
