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'Malindi Deserves Priority'

MALINDI (KNA) Hotel owners in Malindi have appealed to the government to hasten the development of the towns essential infrastructure with a view to attract more tourists to Kenyas north coast resort.

Speaking to KNA, a leading hotelier in Malindi, Mr Lacy Von Menyhart said the towns infrastructure includes improved sewage, roads and a permanent solution to the towns water shortages are some of the areas that needed immediate attention from the relevant authorities.

He also cited the building of a bridge at the Kilifi ferry and the expansion of Malindi Airport as the other areas the government should look into.

Mr Menyhart who is also the chairman of the tourist committee of the just concluded Malindi Harambee show, also hit out at the imbalance of allocation of tourism development projects in the country.

He claimed that most of the development projects in the tourist industry were being diverted to south coast and wondered why Malindi 'which is the mother of tourism in the country' was being neglected.

New Nairobi Road Ready

SH.10 MILLION MIKINDANI DEVELOPMENT COMPLETED

WORK on the main Mombasa-Nairobi road is expected to be completed this week, after a four-year-old battle to reclaim the damaged portion of the road at a cost of nearly K.Shs. 10 million. Major repairs on the crucial 100-metre stretch, swept by a major landslide at Mikindani, were completed early this month.

"The road is expected to be ready for opening and traffic use next week," the resident engineer Mr. Einar Myrhaugen told Coastweek.

Workers at the site were this week putting the final touches on the surface dressing which will undergo a final coating of premix tarmac next month.

At the same time the Provincial Engineer Mr. Mutunga is reported to be in Nairobi where he is expected to discuss the official opening of the road with Transport ministry officials.

Since its collapse in 1982, the traffic has been re-routed through the pot-holed Magogo Road connecting the main road at Kwa Jomvu.

NORWEGIAN HELP

Work at the site began in April last year after a one-year study funded by Norway established the cause of the landslide.

Findings into the cause of the landslide at the edge of the horizontal plateau that forms the Mombasa West Mainland revealed a large body of water sandwiched between

two layers of clay.

The water was observed to generate pressure upwards, causing the surface to crack and slide.

Initial work involved constructing groundwater drainage wells to release the pressure and stabilize the area, and the final stage in the last two months involved increasing the load at the top to support the road surface.

The Ministry of Transport and Communications, which received considerable Norwegian expertise in the project, had been under strong pressure from transporters and motorists to repair the damaged portion.

As a short-term solution, the ministry repairs the potholed Magongo road and re-routed the traffic through the old road.


Lack of funds and heavy rain had in the past prevented excavation work at the landslide area which was thought to be beyond economic repair.

The findings of the study, conducted by the Norwegian firm Norconsult, confirmed earlier fears that water was trapped underneath and finding no passage, caused the surface to give in and collapse.

The landslide, 12 metres thick and 20 metres high from

the plateau to the bottom of the valley, was sliding at the pace of one metre a month

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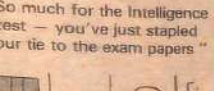

Fuel Shortages Hit Motorists As Refinery Awaits Crude Imports

THE GLOOMY FUEL SITUATION in the country remained critical this week, being manifest from long lines of fuel thirsty motorists at many petrol stations in Dar es Salaam. While the situation is expected to improve by early next week, the imminent independence day holidays next week has caused worry to motorists who fear they will not get petrol until then.

Tanker carrying 65,000 tonnes of Iranian crude oil arrived into the city earlier this week with crude supplies expected to last a month.

However due to snags in the manner of payment, the fuel was not released and Coastweek learnt that a certain amount was later discharged after some payment was made.

It is however expected that the situation will soon be cleared out with the parties coming to some concurrence on the mode of payment.

Taxi drivers in the city hiked their prices to more than double the normal rates with a reason that they were buying fuel at hiked prices in the black market.

The Tanzania Italian Petroleum Refinery Company closed down its oil processing section

since November 21 pending fresh crude supplies - to restart the plant it takes a minimum of 48 hours.

The national fuel demand is about 700,000 tonnes of crude oil supplemented by refined products of between 200,000 to 300,000 tonnes.

The refined products have to be imported since Tiper have only a capacity to meet about half of the demand of petroleum

products in the country.

Meanwhile the two Tanzanian hijackers, Yassin Mamba and Mohamed Tahir Ahmed, who were sentenced and jailed in Britain following the hijacking of an (ATC) Boeing 707 in 1982 have completed their jail term and have now been given permission to stay in Britain amid protests by some groups in the United Kingdom that by doing so the country is becoming a home for hijackers.

In Dar Es Salaam, the Principal Secretary in the Ministry of Home Affairs, E. Mallamia said the youths were free to return to Tanzania and that no legal action will be taken against them.

Some reports have it that the youths have only been permitted to stay in the U.K. for twelve months.

Meanwhile the National Food Control Commission has with immediate effect banned the manufacture or importation of food items whose covers or

seals are not tamper proof.

No exceptions have been made to this prohibition and the Commission will not cater for excuses like the non-availability of machinery or raw materials for local manufacture of tamper proof seals in the country.

The Commission has said that all food items now being manufactured or being imported into the country whose seals or corks are of the screw-type or other non-tamper proof covers are indeed a health risk to consumers.

The Commission cited such foods as including oils of all kinds, concentrated and syrups, cordials and concentrates.

Warning Over Food Quality Manufacture

It also called upon authorised officers to visit food manufacturing concerns to ensure that the notice is followed by their managements.

The Commission urged consumers to check the dates of expiry of any contained food items they procure since items in the shops were long expired and unfit for human consumption.

New Book Highlights Fascinating History Of Mombasa's Old Town

OLD HISTORY OF Mombasa Old Town is the news!

We read in Coastweek last week of papers that have been discovered over many years about the "Mombasa Martyrs" who were massacred in 1631, and the book recently written about the history of that ghastly event.

I am now writing about another most interesting well illustrated new booklet just published giving a concise history of the Old Town and Fort Jesus from its first mention in 1154 to the present day.

It is produced by members of the Friends of Fort Jesus, from original notes of Janet McCrae, by Jennie Matland-Jones, Judy Aldrick and Rosemary Macdonald with photographs by Maurice Taffe and printed by Rodwell Press Ltd.

It is entitled "The Old Town Mombasa" and the line drawings by Mrs. Macdonald on most pages gives it an attractive style bringing to the readers' attention often unnoticed details such as trimmings and designs in wood carvings in large doors and overhanging balconies and their brackets, fancy, frames and several articles in use in the past some of which are still in use today.

The foreword is written by Edward Rodwell and the Contents Page, surrounded by a detailed drawing of an ornamental frame, gives a list of what you may expect to read.

This includes paragraphs on some of the old streets, houses and their architecture, the people living there, their dress, staircases, rickshaws and trolleys, and the history of certain buildings, mosques and shops.

As a resident I have not only lived in the Old Town in the past but walked around it several times.

An so often happens when people reside near something famous and historical, details such as those mentioned and drawn in this booklet are often not seen.

This publication also gives the answers to many questions we residents in particular might wish to know about the early occupants of some of the existing buildings in the narrow streets of the Old Town.

For tourists, the booklet is ideal for them to follow one or perhaps both of the suggested walks in the area, detailed by paragraphs, map references, and a special walks map at the end.

This will help them to find the many interesting spots clearly identified by the experts in their writing detailed in the "marching orders" for the walks based not only on written history but much enhanced by memories of living inhabitants of the Old Town who still remember.

Some may have had history passed down to them by their ancestors - perhaps not absolutely correctly - of what happened in the late 1800s onward when the early beginnings of shipping and commerce of Mombasa started

and was the basis of business in Mombasa today.

The book left me feeling I wanted to know much more.

The authoresses have stated in their introduction that they would be glad to hear of any new information or further enlightenment that can be offered to them by anybody living in Mombasa (or elsewhere) on this fascinating old area of Mombasa once possibly enstoned within walls now hardly identifiable.

They are also willing to answer questions raised by those thirsty for more knowledge of this historically little known area.

I would advise everybody interested in this subject to purchase a copy of this well produced booklet (price 25/-) to study it, to follow it and its walks to learn to appreciate more what the part of Mombasa's antiquity and atmosphere can offer.

Groups of tourists could be taken round by informed guides and parties of older school children could learn in a most enjoyable way more history of their home town.

The size of the booklet is sensible: so is its price. It is excellent value for money and it is obtainable through Friends of Fort Jesus or at the Museum office.

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'Mombasa Ideal For University'

I WRITE to air my views concerning the construction of the next university in our republic.

I suggest that this should be located in Mombasa. This should be so because Mombasa is endowed with several attributes befitting a university town.

First, as the most modernised seaport in Eastern Africa, Mombasa could form an ideal campus for the study of certain specialised subjects such as Oceanography, Marine Engineering and Marine Biology.

The latter, I believe, could supplement work already being done by the Fisheries department.

Secondly, as the second largest town in Kenya, Mombasa has the necessary physical infrastructure and a university campus could start work in temporary quarters pending the construction of more permanent facilities.

Thirdly, culturally Mombasa could form another centre for Language studies.

This would have the honour of being situated within the precincts of the progenitors of our national language, Kiswahili.

I am not, in any way, suggesting that the Language departments already established at Kenyatta University and Nairobi be abandoned.

All I am saying is that another department at Mombasa would supplement and compliment the work already being done at the other two campuses.

I am aware of the hostility of a significant percentage of self-styled experts who will always denigrate Mombasa's hot climate.

They will argue, among other things, that because of Mombasa's great heat no serious academic work could profitably be undertaken.

Of course this is an old argument which does not hold water.

Indeed, a hot climate can be a handicap but it is not the decisive factor!

After all, some of the most outstanding institutions in Africa are situated in similar climatic zones.

I have in mind the University of Ghana in Accra and the Universities of Ibadan, Lagos and Port Harcourt; all in Nigeria.

Nearer home, we have the University of Dar-es-Salaam in Tanzania.

All these, indeed, are institutions whose academic excellence is the envy of our own universities here in Kenya.

And when it comes to resource persons, Mombasa is not wanting.

Why not the internationally recognised Prof. Ali Mazrui?

A person like that could be persuaded to at least get the institution off the ground.

Not only does he understand academic culture but also the needs of those who call Mombasa home.

Surely Mombasa is ready for an institution of higher learning; why deny it the opportunity?

Four of the animals that fall in this group are - The Black Rhino, Cheetah, De Brazza monkey and Grew's Zebra

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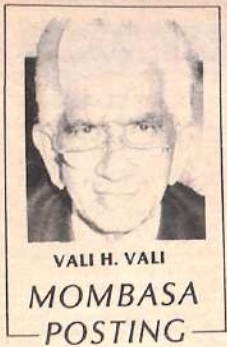

Luxury Liner Pays A Brief Call Before leaving For Zanzibar

I CANNOT recall when Kilindini last had a visit from a Merchant Navy Training ship. The number in operation today apart from sail training are few and normally combine trading-cargo operations as part of their training facilities. Such a vessel is the *Hanbada* owned by South Korea which was due to call on Wednesday of this week. Personnel on board will number some 244 including 92 trainees.

Berth occupancy has shown an improvement this past week averaging some 12 vessels alongside. At No.3 berth is the Greek owned ship with the unusual name of *Irenes Magic* discharging 3,000 tons salt and 1000 tons fertiliser.

Built in 1968 of 12,200 tons deadweight, she is owned by Tsakos Shipping and Trading Company Piraeus whose fleet being mainly bulk carriers all bear the first name *Irenes*. Another Greek flag vessel is the Taron Shipping Company *Aliki I.P.* built in 1970 discharging 9000 tons Fertiliser at No. 10 berth; she is expected to sail this week.

Another bulk Fertiliser dis-

charger with 10,000 tons from Canada is the Liberia flag *Far East* owned *Taishan* at No. 5 berth on charter on this occasion to Armada Line. She has been in Mombasa on charter to Limer Principals several times over the last year or two.

One of Mombasa's regular callers on her Owners Far East Service is the Nedlloyd vessel *Nedlloyd Moji* discharging over 8,200 tons of cargo from Japan and the Far East. The 8 year old 17,000 d.w. ton vessel is unique in the Nedlloyd fleet as she is in a class by herself having been a 'one off' building in Japan.

Since the *Lido Star* ex Tanzanian *Rukwa* arrived in port on November 11th under tow by the KPA tug *Mwokozi* from Dar es Salaam she continues to remain at 'R' anchorage and I have yet to hear of her next move.

The bulk maize loader *United Confidence* was expected to sail for Beirut this week on completion of loading at No. 11 and in time for the second loader *Ageos Nicolaos III* due yesterday to export 23,000 tons.

On Sunday a new East German container vessel, the 6,500 gross ton *Arnstadt* is due to make her first call at Mombasa. She was built this year in East Germany and is owned by DSR Lines who operate within the Conference Lines service to and from the N.W. Continent. She is expected to load 2400 tons in Mombasa and to discharge 900 tons; her itinerary will also include Dar es Salaam.

LUXURY CRUISER

The luxury 33,800 ton West German cruise vessel *Europa*, duly arrived alongside No.1 berth on Saturday and sailed for Zanzibar on Tuesday. Security around the vessel seemed to be unusually tight for a passenger vessel but I have no doubt her Owners Hapag Lloyd were rightly taking all precautions possible to avoid any sort of hijacking incident with the *Achille Lauro* affair still fresh

in their minds.

On Monday evening at 6 p.m. a bulk carrier in light condition called at Mombasa unexpectedly for bunkers and water, she was the Panamanian flag *Bougainville* of 26,000 tons d.w. built in 1972.

The last I heard of this vessel was being under arrest as she was formerly owned by the respected and old established British tramp shipowners Sir William Reardon Smith & Sons of Cardiff and was their *Tacoma Star*, thus on subsequent sale of the vessel she has become the *Bougainville*.

She was at 'K' anchorage for a few hours only before resuming her voyage.

APART FROM the obvious wires connecting the two instruments, it is interesting to reflect that the association is between the telephone and a man with over-developed detective instincts!

No matter how hard one may try to shun the public eye, and attempt to hide way out back and beyond, should someone really be keen enough to 'get hold of' one, if serious attempts are made, the someone will succeed.

So the phone goes, and the message is: 'We're doing 'The Merchant'; will you do a 'crit'?' Stifling numerous oaths, and after muttering a few excuses, one agrees, and only later reflects: Why on earth did I agree?!

What, in any case, is expected of a theatre critic? Dare one be blunt, and tear the production to pieces — if that is what one genuinely believes should be done?

Or does one bear in mind the expectations of the caller, and go out of one's way not to tread on those painful corns? What is really expected?

It's a long time since any Shakespeare has been read, let alone seen on stage — ought one to read the script beforehand?

The programme notes warn it is an abridged version — will the production succumb to successful abridging? The questions — and possible problems — are numerous.

TRIP-TYCH STAGE

Nevertheless, a slight delay for curtain up (this is, after all, the dress rehearsal), and the audience 98 per cent students, some of whom have yet to learn the 'art of applause', though great joy was had at seeing 'The Head', or the 'Computer Boffin' in a different guise!) and it's in to the National Anthem played by the trio of Phillippe Zimmerlin, Elizabeth Taylor and Felicity Evans, who follow this with a suitable 'overture', and finally the curtain is up — a slight touch of the WD40, or a squirt of oil would help to make this operation rather quieter and smoother!

Nevertheless the wide 'trip-tych' stage is an asset, allowing free movement from one scene to the next in a different area of the stage, whilst props and set are changed — very quietly — elsewhere; a great asset, and full marks to the scene changers.

Later, one wonders whether they really had the good old

'fanussi' in Venice in those days — but concludes this is an ingenious improvisation which works.

Hoof beats of approaching horses, though they vary in tempo, do not get louder as the riders approach; a small criticism.

What of the actors themselves: Portia perhaps a bit too old in both character and make-up for the wildly sought-after bride to be? Maybe not, bearing in mind her role as 'Judge' later on.

ECSTATIC LOVER

Bassanio — what to make of him?

Does he develop: are there any changes in mood, from the ardent suitor bent on achieving his goal, to the ecstatic lover who has overcome the obstacles, only to have his dream shattered by further problems?

Somehow one felt that this was a rather weak link in an otherwise strong chain, but the interpretation could improve during the public performances.

Enough of the possible weaknesses: the Show has a great deal to commend it! Apart from a possible confusion of which play he was in (did Shakespeare really write 'Are you there?' as part of the 'Merchant'?)

Peter Oduor's portrayal of 'Morocco' was convincing if a little too long; in general, the other supporting roles were also very well portrayed: Jean Koch as Nerissa, Dennis Pocock as Solanio, Michael Wright as Gratiano, and others.

However, without any doubt at all, Derek Jones' Shylock stole the show: imagine Shylock as a migrant Welshman, with distinct overtones of the Jew he is intended to be as well as the local businessman with whom we are all too familiar!

In all scenes in which he was on stage, he certainly held the audience captive.

One almost felt that the play should have ended with the judgement scene, but perhaps that might have meant a bit too much of re-writing Shakespeare.

All in all, the production was a success: music, acting, stage management, set and costumes all blended into an acceptable production, of which, I am sure, 'The Bard' would not have had reason to complain, and we look forward to future productions from the 'Mombasa Academy Players'.

These include the 'promotion of international understanding and goodwill, as well as co-operation among people of different nations'.

'Foundation Night' took place at Mombasa's most luxurious hotel — the Inter-Continental. Chief guests were two Rotary Exchange Students — Laurie Stovel from Canada and Richard D. Kahlenberg from the USA to personally testify as to how these ideals are being translated into practice.

Under a Rotary Foundation Scholarship, Laurie is presently studying for her Masters Degree in Environmental Economics at Nairobi University, while Richard is at the University's School of Journalism.

At the dinner that night were many Paul Harris Fellows who have contributed around K.Shs. 16,000— each to further this Foundation's work.

Outlining in detail what Rotary Foundation is all about, Dr. Kaiyum Anjarwalla, past-chairman of the Rotary Club of Mombasa, said there were now at least 870 scholars from different countries spread all over the world furthering the enhancement of cultural and educational exchanges with peoples of other lands.

Established in 1917 it was not until 1947 that the activities of the Foundation gained momentum when contributions in memory of its founder, the late Paul Harris, started pouring in.

The following year, eighteen graduates were awarded schol-

arships to spend a year abroad to advance their education and to see what the world outside was like.

CHARITY FUNDS

It was explained that the Rotary Foundation is a Trust into which monies collected voluntarily from Rotary Clubs and friends goes to further its programmes.

One of these is "Scholarships", an important criterion in awarding these being that

the recipient must go and study abroad for one year.

Another programme is 'Group Study Exchange' whereby groups of five young business or professional people from a district are sent to meet colleagues working in the same fields in different countries of the world to acquaint themselves with the lives and problems which others face.

There is also the '3 H programme' (Health, Hunger and Humanity) geared to help al-

leviate hunger and to promote health, as well as cultural and social development.

Since 1979 Rotary Foundation has been involved in vaccination programmes which have presently been extended to cover more than a dozen countries of the world.

In its '3 H' programme Rotary has also worked together with the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) in promoting a vaccination programme against Red Measles in South India.

Red Measles is described as 'an important cause of blindness'.

This, declared Dr. Anjarwalla 'illustrates that Rotary is always willing to join hands with other national or multi-national organisations to help alleviate hunger and promote health in any part of the world'.

'SPECIAL GRANTS'

The Foundation programme also includes a 'Special Grants' section under which a grant is made available to any club on a pound-to-pound, or dollar-to-dollar basis, for any worthwhile project which is too big for one particular club or district to undertake on its own.

Various programmes, including some in Kenya, have been sponsored under it.

Under another programme, experts who volunteer their services are sent to serve in different parts of the world where expert assistance is required and not available locally.

Said Dr. Anjarwalla 'more than 800 physicians and dentists have rendered service in various countries to help promote community health and so on'.

He went on 'while science and technology have spread and shortened the distance between countries, it is sad to note that human minds are still full of prejudices, born out of fear and ignorance.

Rotary believes, he said, that by promoting a person to personal contact between peoples of different countries, we can remove these barriers and thereby promote international understanding and goodwill.

Said Dr. Anjarwalla 'we are a small organisation, and the problems facing the world are big'.

We do not say we will solve all the problems of the world, but we have made a start in what we consider to be a very practical way of getting people to come to know and understand each other better.

WHAT YOU REQUIRE:
1 chicken, 1 coconut, 1 teaspoon curry powder, small quantity of pili pili (red hot) powder, 5 cloves garlic, Salt to taste, 3 medium sized onions, 3 medium sized tomatoes.

METHOD: Section the chicken (i.e. cut one into pieces). Slowly boil the chicken in its own gravy without adding any water, until it dries completely. Transfer the chicken into a presentable pot. Squeeze the first coconut milk, put it aside. The second milk should be put in the pot with the chicken. Add enough salt, the curry powder, onions, garlic and tomatoes. The coconut milk should cover the chicken. Let all boil until it dries, then add the first coconut milk. Continue boiling for a little while.

You will then find that you have produced a dish which you never ever thought you would be able to cook!!

IT'S FRENCH CUISINE at Restaurant Le Pichet, Mtwapa, the exclusive eating place at Kenya Marineland, and run by Jacky Wainwiller.

Don't say before you read further that you can't get there, for Le Pichet has two buses and arranges transport to collect people from North Coast hotels (Sun n'Sand to Nyalali) at the token sum of K.Shs. 30/- as a service to clients.

Transport can be arranged from South Coast too for a higher sum, but this is usually fixed by hotels.

Although the restaurant is open for lunch and dinner, both mealtimes are flexible. Dinner normally commences from 6.00 p.m. onwards, right upto 10.00 p.m. — sometimes later.

From this month Le Pichet is open seven days a week. Ring for table reservations on Mombasa 485923.

As a treat to the "wazee" (old people) from Nyumba ya Wazee, Restaurant Le Pichet has given an annual party.

This year the fifth such party was held on 2nd December instead of early 1986 at the request of the nuns (sisters) in charge of the old people's home in order to make it a Christmas treat.

As usual there was the visit to Kenya Mariners' aquarium, who always offer free entrance to the old people, who number about 100.

But this year there was a band from Likoni to accompany them. The band-members are made up entirely of blind people. Of course they too look part in the Christmas fair at Le Pichet.

Le Pichet was transformed — so were the old people — as there was dancing on the verandah.

In the rather quiet lives of all these "clients" Le Pichet is surely going to be the talk of the year.

Restaurant Le Pichet has a general clientele: The local people who simply must have their business dinners there; Tourists; but, perhaps above all, Nairobi visitors who make a beeline.

No wonder, for the food is delicious. As an entre between three of us we sampled Champignon a l'Escargot, Cocktail de Fruits de Mer Graines, and Asperges Fraiches Mousseline.

Our main dishes consisted of Filets de Poisson Donzi, Longoustes au Beurre Rose and Steak au Poivre a la Creme, whilst we finished with sweets: Coupe Saint Jacques; Parfait aux Fraises Chantilly (Le Pichet is well known for this), and Plain Brandy Snap (another popular item on the menu).

The restaurant is better known for its sea food and fish, of course.

Wine can be served by the bottle or glass.

There is also a full-scale Bar in the building, whilst the tables are on the verandah overlooking the creek.

PRINTED MENU

Although there are printed menus, the one presented is on a blackboard which is taken round. It was like this in the beginning and regulars have got used to this, so the printed menus are now given away as souvenirs, to keep the mouth-watering memory.

Restaurant Le Pichet opened seven years ago, and one can sense the tightknit "harambee".

From cooks to waiters Jacky has taught them from scratch. Therefore everyone has his style. He feels "confident" about his staff, and even in his absence they could, at a

pinch, continue with his ways.

Le Pichet's French cuisine is authentic and original — not the "nouvelle" type.

Clients and readers may well remember the fire in 1980, but Le Pichet would not succumb and re-opened within three

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Dramatische Gepardenjagd vor der Salt Lick Lodge

IM ALLGEMEINEN wird in den Tierbüchern und Reiseberichten der Gepard durchwegs als schnellstes Tier der Welt oder als bester Kurzstreckenläufer des Tierreichs beschrieben. Geschwindigkeiten bis zu 100 Stundenkilometern wurden von Raymond Hook registriert, als er in den dreißiger Jahren in Großbritannien Geparden in einem Rennen gegen Windhunde antreten ließ.

Wenn man die Geparden bei ihrer Jagd auf Beute beobachtet, wie sie mit geballter Energie in einem kurzen Spurt ihr Opfer verfolgen und blitzschnell anspringen, kann man auch verstehen, daß sie höchst selten von anderen Raubtieren angegriffen werden.

In der Natur werden solche Regeln immer wieder durch Ausnahmen bestätigt, wie die folgende dramatische Begegnung zwischen einem Geparden und einem Löwen vor der Salt Lick Lodge von Hilton International in den Taita Hügeln beweist.

Ein stattlicher Wasserbock graste friedlich und ganz allein am natürlichen Wasserloch vor der Salt Lick Lodge. In mildem Dunst brach der Morgen an; die Touristen fanden sich auf der Dachterasse ein, um das Stimmungsbild auf sich wirken zu lassen und in der Hoffnung, vor dem Frühstück noch ein paar interessante Tiere zu sehen.

Als die ersten Sonnenstrahlen durch die Morgendämmerung brachen, erschien in einiger Entfernung ein Gepard am Rande des Unterholzes. "Es ist ein Leopard", hörte man begeisterte Ausrufe, doch an dem schmalen, schlanken Körper, den hohen, dünnen Beinen, am kleinen runden Kopf mit den charakteristischen schwarzen Streifen von den Augen bis zur Schnauze konnte man klar erkennen, daß es ein Gepard war.

Die wunderschöne Raubkatze äugte vorsichtig nach allen Seiten und ließ ihren Blick dann zufrieden auf dem Wasserbock ruhen, den sie wohl als passendes Frühstück erachtete. Langsam näherte sich der Gepard dem Wasserbock, auf staksigen Beinen, im hohen Gras am sumpfigen Burafuß nur von Zeit zu Zeit zu sehen. Nach ein paar Schritten hielt er immer wieder an, um aufmerksam Ausschau zu halten.

Das Auge ist das schärfste Sinnesorgan des Geparden. Er behält sein potentielles Opfer stets im Auge und sucht gleichzeitig die Umgebung nach möglichen Feinden ab. Deshalb sieht man oft Geparden auf einem Termitenhügel oder auf einem Baum sitzen. Ein Gepard in der Serengeti war bekannt dafür, daß er mit Vorliebe auf die Kühlerhaube eines Safarifahrzeugs sprang, um von dort aus die Umgebung zu betrachten.

WASSERBOCK

Unterdessen verkürzte sich der Abstand zwischen dem Geparden bei der Salt Lick Lodge zu dem ahnungslosen Wasserbock, während die Spannung unter den Touristen, die mit gezückter Kamera bereitstanden, ständig wuchs.

Es war durchaus möglich, daß der Gepard seine Jagd im letzten Moment abbrechen würde. Nur drei von vier Versuchen endeten erfolgreich; oft lassen die Geparden nach einer Weile von ihrem Opfer ab, weil sie sich von den Touristen, die sich zu nahe herangewagt haben, gestört fühlen.

1978-1979 im Masai Mara

Reservat durchgeführte Studien haben bewiesen, daß die Geparden sogar ihre Jagdgewohnheiten änderten, also nicht mehr am Tag, sondern nachts jagten, um den Touristen auf Pirschfahrt aus dem Weg zu gehen.

Andererseits machte Joy Adamson, die während vieler Jahre das Verhalten der Geparden in der Wildnis studierte und auch einige junge Tiere in die Freiheit zurückbrachte, die Erfahrung, daß sich die Raub-

katzen mit der Zeit an die Menschen gewöhnten und sich durch ihre Nähe nicht mehr stören ließen. Jedenfalls scheinen die Geparden in ihrem Verhalten eher nervös, sensibel und mißtrauisch zu sein.

Der Wasserbock hingegen ist ein ruhiges, ausgeglichenes Tier. Sein gut geformter Kopf mit den langen, gerippten Hörnern und die ausgeprägten weißen Halbmonde, die seine Hinterbacken markant einrahmen, verleihen ihm ein würdiges Aussehen.

Pötzlich hat die Spannung auf dem Schauplatz in den Taita

Hügeln ihren Höhepunkt erreicht und wird für die Akteure und die Zuschauer beinahe unerträglich. Der Wasserbock steht stockstill, hält im Kauen inne, der Gepard duckt sich und bereitet sich wie ein richtiger Sprinter vor seinem 500 m Lauf auf den Endspurt vor. Sogar Impalas und Gazellen, die sich ganz im Hintergrund aufhalten, werden unruhig und fühlen die Gefahr.

Sekunden vergehen. Der Gepard blinzelt mit den Augen; der Wasserbock hat seinen Feind erkannt, sein Fell zuckt. Mit aufrechtem Schwanz rennt er in panischer Angst um sein Leben. Gleichzeitig springt der Gepard mit einem Satz aus der Deckung. Hintereinander rasen die beiden Tiere in südlicher Richtung auf das Unterholz zu. Die Jagd hat begonnen!

Der Gepard holt langsam aber sicher auf. Der Wasserbock springt in die Büsche, dicht auf seinen Fersen folgt der Gepard. Zur gleichen Zeit schnell ein fähiger Körper in die Luft. Es dauert eine geraume Weile, bis die Zuschauer realisieren, was sich hier abspielt. Es ist unglaublich, aber wahr: Ein riesiger Löwe hat den Geparden angesprungen.

Hatte er wohl ebenfalls den Wasserbock zum Frühstück auserkoren, oder war er nur in seinem Morgenschlaf gestört worden, als der Wasserbock über ihn hinwegsprang? Und als Gipfel der Beleidigung wurde nun seine Majestät der König der Tiere auch noch von einem ganz gewöhnlichen Geparden respektlos angerempelt!

In der dramatischen Endrunde wurde der Gepard, als wäre er im Boxring, mit zwei direkten Rechten und einem eisernen Kinnhaken bedacht, worauf er tot zu Füßen des Löwen sank. Der Wasserbock hatte sich unterdessen in Sicherheit retten können.



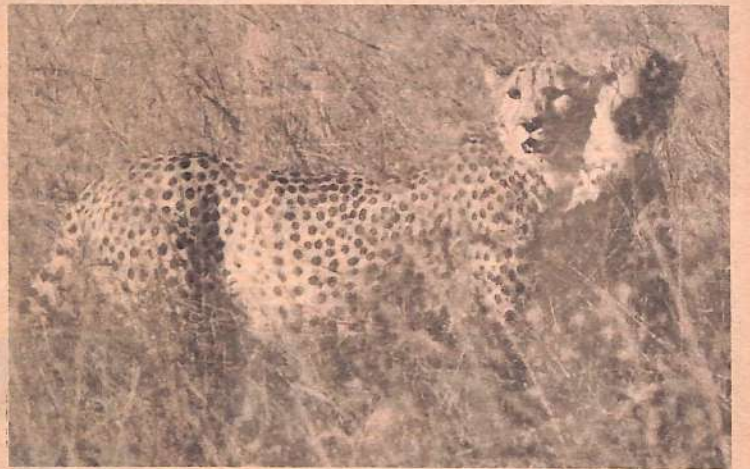

Neuer Wildhüter in den Taita Hills

DIE VERANTWORTUNG als Wildhüter im privaten Taita Hills Reservat von Hilton International — ein Gebiet von 28.000 Acres, wo sich 45 verschiedene Arten von Säugetieren und 385 Vogelarten aufhalten — wurde Mr. Philip Mwasi aus der Taita Region übertragen.

Er verfügt über 30 Jahre Erfahrung im Bereich Wildschutz und Wild Management, die er im Tsavo Nationalpark gesammelt hat. Seinen neuen Job betrachtet er als eine Herausforderung und er ist davon überzeugt, daß er viel zum Wohle der Tiere und zur Entfaltung des Reservats beitragen kann.

Die Erhaltung der wilden Tiere in Kenia und Maßnahmen zum Schutze des Wildes im Taita Hills Reservat ist seit langem ein besonderes Anliegen von Hilton International.

Durch aufmerksame Beobachtungen und Überwachung des

Gebietes und aufgrund von Konsultationen und Besprechungen mit den Experten vom Ministerium für Wildleben erkannte Hilton die Notwendigkeit, neue Vorschriften für das Reservat zu erlassen.

"Wir haben diese neue Regel zur ungen eingeleitet", kommentierte Mr. John Bundy, Manager der Taita Hills und Salt Lick Lodge, "aber bei den spärlichen Regenfällen und dem immer zahlreicher werden Wild in diesem Gebiet würde sich der Boden bald in Sand und Staub

verwandeln, ungewohnbar für das Wild und unangenehm für die Besucher".

Weitere Verbesserungen sind in Vorbereitung, wie die Markierung der Kreuzungen mit nummerierten Wegweisern. Diese Referenznummern dienen als Führer für alle Chauffeure und Besucher, damit sie leicht herausfinden können, wo sich das Wild gerade aufhält.

In beiden Lodgen innerhalb des Reservats gibt es eine Anschlagtafel, wo jeweils die letzten Bewegungen der Tiere eingetragen sind. Vor jeder Pirschfahrt sollten deshalb die Besucher auf der Tafel nachsehen, wo das Wild zu finden ist. Mit all diesen Verbesserungen ist dieses wunderschöne Reservat, wo man jeden Tag Löwen, Elefanten und Büffel sehen kann, einer der besten Orte in Kenia zur Beobachtung der Tiere auf freier Wildbahn.

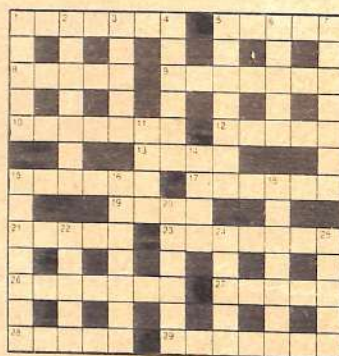

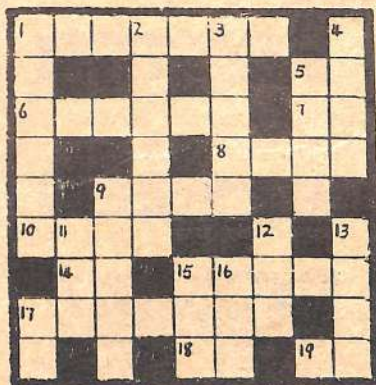
