Kenya Doubles Petrol Storage

K.SHS 560 MILLION KIPEVU FUEL FACILITY COMPLETED

THE KENYA Government has completed the installation of one of the biggest petroleum facilities in East Africa at Kipevu, costing Kshs. 560 million. The project which was funded by a Canadian loan brings the total number of oil storage tanks in Kenya to 20 and will increase the country's storage capacity from seven days to 15 days.

Five huge storage tanks with a total capacity of 1.49 million barrels have been installed in Mombasa and are expected to be commissioned next March. The final testing of the new facility is expected to be carried out next month.

The completion of this project means that consumers will be able to obtain finished oil products at a faster pace while at the same time improving the country's storage capacity.

Three tanks have a capacity for storing 330,000 barrels each while the other two can store up to 250,000 barrels each.

Crude oil will now be pumped direct from oil tankers docked at Kipevu oil terminal as well as fuel oil from the Mombasa Oil Refinery in Changamwe.

The Kipevu storage facility will supplement 15 other smaller storage tanks in Nairobi which were constructed in 1977.

KENYA OIL PIPELINE

They have a total volume capacity of 80,000 cubic metres of various petroleum products.

Work at Kipevu began in January last year and was expected to take more than eighteen months before com-

The Kenya Oil Pipeline, one of the most ambitious development programmes in post-independence Kenya, was completed in 1978 at a cost of Kshs. 850 million.

The pipeline, spanning 450 kilometres from Mombasa to Nairobi, pumps 1.45 million cubic metres of oil per annum.

Kenya's annual fuel bill is estimated to have topped over Kshs. 5 billion last year from

Iran May Provide Tanzania With 'Special Price' For Fuel Imports

THE PETROL and diesel problem in the country is expected to be alleviated following the discharge of 65000 tonnes of crude oil from the Iranian tanker which held on to its crude until financial hitches were sorted out, with local authorities. Meanwhile Iran is reported to have expressed willingness to help Tanzania with oil provisions with an understanding of the financial constraints being faced by the country.

An Iranian official, Mohamed Besharati, who is the principal secretary in the Iran Foreign Ministry is presently in the country and on arrival he said that Iran would be willing to give Tanzania more oil and also to consolidate the good relationships between the two countries.

The visiting principal secretary is expected to meet authorities in the Ministry of Energy and Minerals and the Tanzania Petroleum Development Corporation (TPDC) to chart future programmes on oil deliveries to Tanzania.

Iran is one of the countries delivering oil to Tanzania under a special agreement with the Government here.

Lenin Hospital

Iran has also shown willingness to assist the country in the agricultural sector so as to help the country attain food self-sufficiency.

In Zanzibar the European Economic Community (EEC) will provide a 14 million shillings grant to the revolutionary govern-

ment there for the rehabilitation of the V. I. Lenin hospital.

The agreement to this effect is to be signed later this month and funds will be released immediately thereafter. The money will also go towards procuring medical equipment and furniture for the hospital. Under the programme an elevator at the hospital will also be repaired.

In Dodoma, the country's Prime Minister and the first Vice-President, Joseph Warioba, laid the foundation stone for a 60 million shillings market being constructed by the Capital Development Authority (CDA) there.

The market is expected to be ready in 1987 and will then replace the present market which is proving too small for the growing population of the new capital.

The town has a population of some 110,000 people at present and it is forecasted that by 1995 this will increase to some 350,000 people.

The market will cover a little over 4000 square metres of land area and will be second in size to the country's biggest market, the Kariakoo Market in Dar-es-Salaam, which occupies some 6000 square metres.

In Dodoma again, the Prime Minister and first Vice-President, Joseph Warioba said that the Government would in the coming two years concentrate its efforts to improve the nation's economy to earn enough foreign exchange for development purposes.

He said that in the previous two years the emphasis had been towards containing food shortages which he noted

proved considerably successful with the situation now well under control with peasant producing enough food for the nation.

He said that the first phase Government had laid a proper foundation for a smooth take-off and that after sometime the new Government would be speaking of tremendous successes in development plans.

He reiterated the Government's role of ensuring that farmers in the country are well served with necessary inputs.

In Dar-es-Salaam, the Metal Engineering Industries Development Association (MEIDA) has called upon the Government to look into the statistics used to plan the production of farm implements since they do not appear to be realistic.

Whilst MEIDA has been supplementing the efforts of the Ubungo Farm Implements (UFI) to manufacture hose, spades, machetes and other implements, the market for these items has not been very satisfactory.

SCANIA TRUCKS

Meanwhile an improvement in the haulage of crops from villages seems likely following the presentation of 23 Scania trucks to the Cooperative Rural Development Bank (CRDB) by Nordic countries.

The trucks have been bought from a part of some 80 million shilling grant given by the Nordic countries for stabilising the transport position of eight cooperative unions in the country.

BATTLE GROUP BRAVO PAINT!

SHANZU Teachers College, located on a lovely 112 acre site just north of Mombasa, was built in 1966.

Since that time it has trained hundreds of teachers for Kenya's increasing number of primary schools, won dozens of awards for the quality of its college chorus, and provided a full program of enrichment for its students.

And it has done all those things while showing one the same face to the world: because of more pressing priorities of the Ministry's budget, the school has never had a coat of paint since it was built.

That situation changed during the recent port visit of the US Navy's Battle Group Bravo.

About a dozen men of the USS Mars arrived at the school on Saturday morning ready to freshen up the appearance of the school.

They brought their own paint, brushes, ladders, thinner, rags, rollers-even paper and tape to protect the areas of floors and windows which were not supposed to be painted.

The crew worked several hours on Saturday and returned to finish on Sunday. A few Shanzu students and staff helped as well.

They observed how the various materials were to be used, so they could continue the project after the sailors returned to their ships.

All materials, including extra paint but excepting the ladders, was left behind for the school's use.

The sailors finished the staff room, geography room, education room, and activities room.

The school's deputy principal Mr. M. G. Kanore, indicated that the school personnel would begin painting the administrative offices the following day.

Some fifteen gallons of paint remained as the men of the Mars returned to the ship, smelling of turpentine but pleased to have been of assistance in realizing a dream that Shanzu had deferred.

Language Tutors Meet For 'Training Seminar'

THE MOMBASA German Classes recently invited representatives from 28 secondary schools, the Alliance Francaise and the British Council for a two-day workshop on "Direct methods in foreign language teaching" at their premises.

The participants included teachers and students who teach and learn English, French and German at their respective schools as foreign languages.

The workshop took stock of the different skills required to teach foreign languages as opposed to the teaching of subjects like maths, geography or Kiswahili which is already used by pupils in day-to-day communication.

Other aspects included foreign languages and their cultures and the change of common speech patterns of those languages from time to time.

The guest lecturer Mr. Amisi told the workshop:

"If we want to teach a language to our fellow friends who want to share with us the knowledge of that language, we have to make sure that our classes are both effective and enjoyable."

He added that a method should be developed that would

be able to create an atmosphere where the learner "is picking up the new language like a child learning its mother tongue".

Mr. Amisi, who is the director of Nairobi Cultural Institute, went on to display in practical terms, with the help of five students, the use of direct-method-teaching in Kiluya language, while the rest of the participants observed.

TEACHING AIDS

The general consensus in the workshop was that this method when combined with other teaching aids would produce effective transfer of a new language from one person to another.

Following the success of the first exercise, a second workshop is planned for next February.

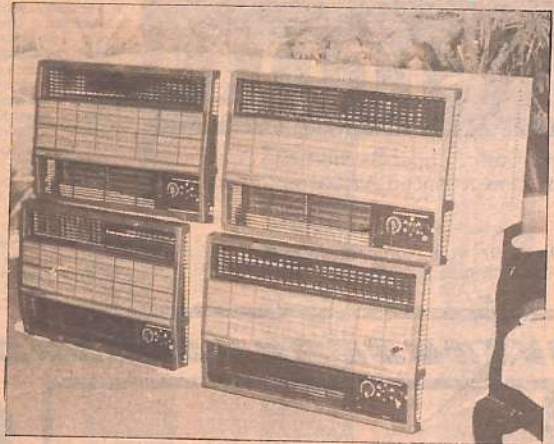

This line have just introduced a third vessel from Europe namely the Reef Island ex Palm Beach of 2500 deadweight tons built in 1963. A 30 ton deck crane, and fitted to carry 52 TEU containers. This vessel is loading cement for the Comores and thereafter Soda Ash for Maputo.

This past week all three vessels could be seen in Mombasa as the Reef Star ex Helny of 1260 d.w. tons built in 1960 has been in port together with the Reef Moon ex Otter of 957 d.w. tons built in 1963. All three vessels are registered at St. Vincent in the West Indies.

Their Mombasa Agents, Off-shore Services Ltd. of Bank of India House, whose Executive Directors are two long established local shipping personalities, Chris Soper and Philip Nguti, tell me that with their additional vessels they can now provide a service every 3 weeks in-out of Gulf Ports catering for limited container traffic but mainly breakbulk, in addition to a service to the Comores, Mozambique and E. A. ports.

Despite rumours that with the re-vamped service of the United States Lines the American Robin and American Cardinal would be withdrawn from the East African coastwise-feeder trade, this seems not to be so and the two vessels will continue to operate under their Gateway Shipping label.

As the United States Lines are withdrawing from their deep sea liner service between the USA and South Africa, the focal point of their transhipment service to connect with U.S. Lines much publicised Round the World container service will be Khor Fakkan in the United Arab Emirates in the entrance to the Arabian Gulf where they

The age of the container breeds many changes in hitherto traditional shipping services and this is a good example.

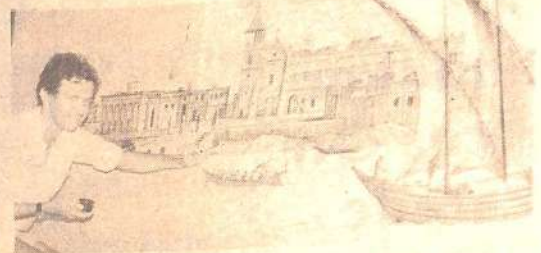

Guillaume de Brouwer On The Quarter-Deck

VISITORS to the elegant Quarter Deck Lounge at Mombasa's new Inter-Continental Hotel are not only greatly impressed by its furnishing, interior decor and cool air, but also with the murals by Guillaume de Brouwer, a very talented young artist who has been living in Kenya for the past four years.

He was recently putting the finishing touches to ships, including tea clippers, sailing the Indian Ocean which have been reproduced from etchings circa 18-19 century. There is also an interesting chart of 'The Island and parts of Mombasa' based on a survey undertaken by Lieutenants W. Mudge; T. Boteler and R. Owen under the direction of W.F.W. Owen of H.M.S. Leven in 1824.

He has also reproduced from etchings (circa 1500 - 1600) the murals of Vasco da Gama which are to be seen in the speciality restaurant named after this famous Portuguese explorer who visited the Kenya coast in 1498.

The Portuguese ruled the Swahili coast on and off for about 136 years with Vasco da Gama meeting with resistance when he first arrived at Mombasa, and going on to Malindi where

he not only received a friendly welcome but also found Ahmed Ibn Majid, the greatest pilot of his day, to take him to India. On his return journey to Portugal he again stopped at Malindi. In 1593 the Portuguese built Fort Jesus which after many bloody battles and sieges was taken by the Omani Arabs in 1729.

Guillaume, who was born in Dar-es-Salaam, is the son of Maurice de Brouwer, a former Belgian Consul at Mombasa, who now lives in Nairobi. Guillaume studied for six years in art schools in Belgium, followed by three years specialising in 'Illustrations'.

WALL MURALS

He has been mostly involved in commercial art, also design work and illustrations for various printers and publishers. Guillaume has also executed some unique wall murals for a variety of clients.

His work in the Inter-Continental Quarter Deck Lounge has been carried out on hardboard using ordinary enamel paint. Said Guillaume 'this is quite unusual, and was used as it is readily available here'.

The effect is most dramatic.

FRIEDRICH Konrad Hornemann, geboren 1772 in Hildesheim, war der Sohn eines Predigers; seine Mutter war eine geborene Crone und stammte auch aus einer Predigerfamilie. Unter diesen Umständen schien es sich von selbst zu verstehen, daß der Sohn sich ebenfalls dem geistlichen Stande widme.

Die Beschäftigung mit dem Alten sagte ihm jedoch nicht zu; sein Sinn war vielmehr auf das Neue, Ungewöhnliche, Gefährliche gerichtet, und sein kraftvoller, nie von einer Krankheit befallener Körper förderte diese Neigung.

Hornemann hatte kaum das 15. Jahr erreicht, als sein Vater starb. So war der Sinn der Mutter eher zu bewegen, den Wünschen des Sohnes nachzugeben. Dieser war jetzt entschlossen, die Bücher mit dem Schwerte zu vertauschen. Der Kampf um Gibraltar und die Heldentaten der britischen Seemacht im amerikanischen Kriege beschäftigten ihn Tag und Nacht. Erst die Märsche der Gruppen durch seine Vaterstadt auf dem Zuge gegen und von Holland öffneten ihm die Augen.

Hornemann gab seinen Plan wieder auf und entschloß sich, sein bereits unterbrochenes Studium der Theologie wieder aufzunehmen. Nach Vollendung seines Studiums fand er in Hannover eine Hauslehrerstelle und im folgenden Jahre auch eine Stelle als Gehilfslehrer an der Hochschule.

Allein er fühlte sich nicht glücklich in diesen Verhältnissen. Er beschäftigte sich am liebsten mit Geographie und hatte eine besondere Vorliebe für Afrika. Ein älterer College erzählte ihm, daß in London eine Gesellschaft existierte, welche sich mit der Erforschung des noch unbekanntem Innern von Afrika beschäftigte und zu diesem Zwecke auf ihre Kosten Reisende dorthin sendet. Tag und Nacht beschäftigte ihn nur noch die Frage, wie er sich mit der englischen Gesellschaft in Verbindung setzen und sie überzeugen könne, daß er ein paßliches Werkzeug ihrer Pläne sei.

Er schrieb an den berühmten und einflußreichen Hofrath Blumenbach in Göttingen, der, wie er wußte, mit der englischen Gesellschaft in Verbindung stand. Diesem enthüllte er seine Wünsche. Nachdem Professor Blumenbach im Geheimen Erkundigungen über den jungen Mann eingezogen hatte, die alle zu Hornemann's Gunsten ausfielen, schrieb er sowohl an diesen selbst, als auch an die afrikanische Gesellschaft in England. Nach einigen genaueren Angaben und mit der Gesellschaft gewechselten Briefen war die Sache in Ordnung.

GÖTTINGEN

Hornemann beilegte sich, um in Göttingen noch einige notwendige Studien zu machen und sich auf seine große Reise vorzubereiten. Alles, was ihre Ausführung begünstigen oder ihren Nutzen erhöhen könnte, wie Kenntniß der arabischen Sprache, der Sitten und Lebensweise der afrikanischen Völkerschaften, Bekanntschaft mit der Kunst, die geographische Lage mit unvollkommenen Hilfsmitteln zu bestimmen, einige medicinische Kenntnisse, um sowohl die eigene Gesundheit besser zu erhalten, als auch den Wilden sich als Arzt empfehlen zu können. Übungen im Zeichnen nach der Natur, einige mechanische Fertigkeiten u. dergl. m., wurden nun der Gegenstand seines eifrigsten Studiums.

Auch gymnastische Übungen wurden von ihm wieder eifriger als je zuvor betrieben, namentlich die Gewöhnung an eine einfache Lebensart voller Entbehrungen und Anstrengungen.

Da Hornemann die Kinderblattern nie gehabt hatte und diese Krankheit in heißen

Himmelstrichen doppelt gefährlich auftritt, so ließ er sich dieselben mehr als einmal einimpfen, aber ohne allen Erfolg.

Eines lag ihm noch schwer auf dem Herzen: seine Mutter von seinem Vorhaben in Kenntnis zu setzen. Er hatte aber ihre Zukunft für alle Fälle sicher gestellt, denn es war eine seiner Hauptbedingungen gewesen, unter denen er in die Dienste der englisch-afrikanischen Gesellschaft trat, daß seine Mutter für den Fall seines Todes in Afrika eine Pension zusichere.

FRANKREICH

Unter heißen Thränen riß er sich im Februar 1797 von der Mutter und drei jüngeren Geschwistern los und eilte über Cuxhaven nach London. Hier fand er die freundlichste Aufnahme und wurde von der afrikanischen Gesellschaft mit einem Vertrauen beehrt, wie es noch keinem ihrer früheren Reisenden geschenkt worden war.

Mit mancherlei Nachrichten und Winken über die von ihm zu bereisenden Gegenden berei-

te erscholl plötzlich die Nachricht von der französischen Landung bei Alexandria am 2. Juli 1798.

Das wüthende Volk drohte alle Europäer zu erfordern. Dieselben mußten sich in die Festung flüchten. Als die ersten Schrecken vorüber und der Karawanendienst wieder hergestellt war, kamen die erwarteten Pilger von Mekka an und sammelten sich, um ihre Reise nach Fessan fortzusetzen. Hornemann, nunmehr völlig ausgerüstet, schloß sich ihnen an.

Die Bewohner der Stadt Swah, sowie auch diejenigen des nördlichen Afrika, waren auf das Höchste gereizt durch den unerwarteten Einfall der Franzosen in Egypten, und sahen in jedem

chert, verließ er England, um über Frankreich seine Reise weiter fortzusetzen.

Im August schiffte sich Hornemann in Marseille ein, und im September gelangte er im Hafen von Alexandria an. Dort lernte er einen Mönch kennen, welcher ebenfalls nach Kairo zu reisen gedachte. Wie wunderbar mußte diesem um's Herz sein, als deutsche Laute in sein Ohr tönten, die von den redseligen Lippen des Geistlichen quollen, welcher selber ein Deutscher war! Schon eine Reihe von Jahren vom Vaterlande getrennt, sprach er freilich das Arabische viel geläufiger als die Muttersprache.

Mit diesem Begleiter also reiste Hornemann den Nil hinauf über Rosette nach Kairo, wo er noch zwei andere Landsleute antraf, einen Major Schwarz und einen Kölner namens Joseph Freudenburg, der schon zwölf Jahre zuvor gezwungen worden war, seinen christlichen Glauben mit dem muhamedanischen zu vertauschen und dreimal die Wallfahrt nach Mekka zu machen.

Da wie alle Jahre so auch damals die Karawanen der muhamedanischen Pilger aus dem nördlichen und westlichen Afrika durch diese Stadt nach Mekka und von dort ins Vaterland zurück zogen, so wollte sich Hornemann ihnen anschließen. Die bedeutendste dieser Karawanen zieht von Kairo über Sirah nach Augela nach Murzuck, der Hauptstadt des Reiches Fessan.

Von Murzuck gehen Karawanen nach Kairo, Bengasi, Tripolis, Gadamah, Burmu, Twat und Kaschnah, der Hauptstadt des Landes Sudan. Wenn es Hornemann gelang, nach Murzuck zu kommen und dort für einen Muhamedaner zu gelten, so konnte er ohne große Schwierigkeiten seine Reise mit einer nach dem Süden gehenden Karawane fortsetzen und die wohlhabenden und stark bevölkerten Länder an den Ufern des Niger besuchen.

Diese Gegenden zu durchforschen und die Fragen aufzuheben; ob der Strom Djoliba derselbe sei, welchen die Alten 'Niger' nannten, und ob er seine Gewässer in einen Landsee ergöse oder etwa mit dem Nil vereinige, welche Verbindungen und Verhältnisse zwischen diesen Gegenden und den noch entfernteren Landstrecken des inneren südlichen Afrika und der Gebirgsländer der Ostküste stattfänden - dies waren die

Reisenden, dessen Betragen von dem gewöhnlichen abwich, einen Kundschafter oder Spion.

So waren denn auch mehrere Hundert bewaffnete Einwohner von Swah schreiend und lärmend der Karawane nachgeeilt und schienen es auf Hornemann abgesehen zu haben. Dieser ahnte nichts von der über seinem Haupte drohenden Gefahr, bis ihn Freudenburg mit der Schreckensbotschaft überraschte. Freudenburg zitterte an allen Gliedern und schien völlig den Kopf verloren zu haben. Hornemann bat ihn dringend, Alles, was Aufsehen erregen oder Argwohn erwecken könne, sorgfältig zu vermeiden, dann ging er unbewaffnet den Swahem entgegen, zu denen sich auch einige Pilger der Karawane gesellt hatten.

PROSIT!

Nun forderte man die beiden Deutschen auf, im Koran zu lesen, um sich zu vergegenwärtigen, ob sie Rechtgläubige wären. Diese Probe konnte nur dazu dienen, sie aus ihrer peinlichen und gefährlichen Lage zu befreien, denn sie lasen nicht nur, sondern Freudenburg wußte sogar ganze Stellen aus dem heiligen Buche auswendig herzusagen und Hornemann ganze Sprüche aufzuschreiben - eine seltene Kunst in jenem Lande.

PILGERKARAWANE

Jetzt waren alle Anwesenden für die beiden Deutschen gewonnen. Somit waren unsere Landsleute gerettet und wurden nun von den Mitgliedern der Pilgerkarawane wegen ihrer Frömmigkeit und Gelehrsamkeit doppelt hoch geehrt.

In Murzuck hielt sich Hornemann sieben Monate auf, um eine andere Karawane zu erwarten. Leider hatte er hier einen großen unersetzlichen Verlust: sein treuer Reisegefährte Freudenburg wurde ihm durch das gelbe Fieber entrisen.

Hornemann stand nun allein da in einer fremden Welt, in der die eigentliche Forschungsreise jetzt erst beginnen sollte. Er selbst wurde auch von einem Fieber befallen, aber seine kräftige Natur überwand die Krankheit.

Um seine Rolle als Muhamedaner mit Erfolg fortspielen zu können, erlief er soviel als möglich den Umgang mit Christen.

Hornemann machte einen Abstecher nach Tripolis, wo er in öffentlicher Audienz dem Pascha vorgestellt wurde. Von hier aus schrieb er an die afrikanische Gesellschaft drei Briefe; die letzten beiden waren mit Briefen an seine Mutter begleitet. Sie erhielt nur noch den zweiten, denn der letzte vom April 1800 fand sie nicht mehr am Leben.

Die Route seines Rückweges hatte er noch nicht festgelegt, jedoch geht aus früheren, in Kairo gemachten Ausäuerungen hervor, daß er von Kaschnah entweder den Djoliba hinauf und nach Senegambien, oder über das östliche Afrika nach Mekka und von hier nach Europa zurück reisen wollte. Auch hatte er den Seinigen damals mitgeteilt, es sei möglich, daß sie in mehreren Jahren nichts von ihm hören würden, und die Bitte hinzugefügt, sich seinetwegen nicht zu beunruhigen.

Dies waren Hornemann's letzte Nachrichten! Sein Glückstern sollte plötzlich erlöschen, denn von jenem Augenblicke an blieb er spurlos verschollen und man hat nie auch nur erfahren, ob er einer Krankheit erlegen, oder, was wahrscheinlicher, durch Meuchelmord gefallen ist. Nicht einmal wie weit er vorgedrungen, weiß man, und selbst die Früchte seiner Entdeckungen sind für die Wissenschaft verloren gegangen.

Mit wie viel Muth und Begeisterung war er aus der Heimath fortgezogen und jetzt fand er ein schnelles Ende, das in geheimnißvolles Dunkel gehüllt bleibt. Gewiß aber verdient der kühne junge Mann, der als erster deutscher Pionier in jenen unwirthbaren Landen, wo späterhin noch so viele Gebirge heldenkühner Entdeckungsreisender bleichen sollten, sein Leben im Dienste der Wissenschaft einsetzte und verlor, der Vergessenheit entrisen zu werden und ebenso sehr in unserm Andenken fortzuleben wie einige glücklichere Forscher, die seinen Fußstapfen folgten!

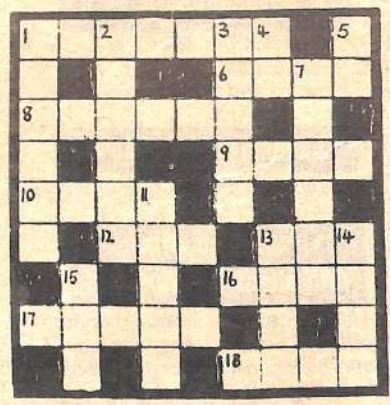

He added, "Each of the six races will last between one and a half hours. A fleet of twelve boats is expected and information about the Fireball Championship can be obtained by phoning me at Nairobi 722695."

The reigning Kenya fireball champions are Mervyn and Richard Hughes who will be defending their title in the British Airways sponsored event at Malindi.

They are likely to be strongly challenged by Graham Bush who won the recent Three-Of-A-Kind Title at Kisumu.

He has a new boat which will be crewed by his son Charlie at Malindi.

In 1983, John Trundell won the Fireball Championship and has held the Title several times. He will be competing at Malindi partnered by Rob Mousley.

Harish Soama will be travelling from Kisumu. He sailed in the World Fireball Championship at San Francisco last year and is rated among the potential winners at Malindi.

The Fireball class is for racing sailing dinghies made of flat sheets of plywood. There are international regulations specifying minimum weight, the size of the sail, length of the mast and other main features. This has made the fireball class ideal for yachtsmen who construct their boats themselves.

There are a growing number of fireball enthusiasts in Kenya and a good turnout is expected for the Malindi races.

THE EDWARD WILSHAW TROPHY:

THE WINDS in early December are usually light and the events at Mombasa Yacht Club over the past week have been held in typically calm conditions.

On Sunday, 1 December 1985, the First race of the Edward Wilshaw Trophy was sailed over a course around the Entrance Channel Buoy.

This trophy was presented to the Club by the Captain and Crew of the cable laying vessel "Edward Wilshaw" which was based in Mombasa some years ago while laying undersea communication cables in East African waters, and is one of those most keenly contested trophies at the Club.

The light wind and flood tide made it essential for competitors to judge the correct course from the starting line to the harbour entrance and, in the event, the race was virtually decided on the first two long legs to Likoni and Green Serani buoys.

The latter tactic paid off so well that by Green Serani buoy Andy Burnard in Hatshepsout had overtaken Tony Newman in Tally Ho and was not far behind Manish Patel in Tantivy.

The wind was too light for both Curly McPherson in Chatsby and Ray Kester in Umeme, despite the good work done by his large spinnaker.

Final results on corrected time were — 1st Hatshepsout (Andy Burnard), 2nd Tantivy (Manish Patel), 3rd Tally Ho (Tony Newman), 4th Umeme (Ray Kester), 5th Whitecap (Paul Bradshaw) and 6th Aphrodite (Khalim Hassanali) with Chatsby (Curly McPherson) retiring.

This was Paul Bradshaw's first race in Whitecap (ex-Nef-

ertiti) and all members were pleased to see a new face in the fleet.

The first December Monthly Mug was sailed on Wednesday 4 December in very similar conditions and the wind did, in fact, prove to be too light for Khalim Hassanali in Aphrodite to complete the course and he had to retire.

The three Ospreys of Tony Newman, Tricia Adams and Barry Mitchell had a close tactical battle around the course but, on corrected time, it was the Commodore, Tony Rowland, in his Laser Svelte who took the honours followed by Tricia Adams in Meteorite, Tony Newman in Tally Ho,

Andy Burnard in Hatshepsout, Barry Mitchell in Atalanta, Paul Bradshaw in Whitecap and Curly McPherson in Chatsby.

The Perigny Cup, which should have been decided at Mombasa in a series of inter-club races between Mombasa Yacht Club and Naivasha Yacht Club on Sunday 8 December, unfortunately had to be cancelled when Naivasha were unable to raise a team.

Mombasa Yacht Club members thus had a rare opportunity to enjoy a Sunday afternoon ashore but two skippers did, however, take their boats out, no doubt trusting in the truth of the old adage that "practice makes perfect".
