NORWEGIAN ENGINEERS STUDYING NEW ROAD PROJECT:

## 'Repairs Plan' For Mombasa Nairobi Road

### MINIMUM SHS. 20 MILLION

A TEAM OF NORWEGIAN experts and engineers from the Ministry of Transport and Communications are meeting today in Mombasa to decide the fate of the portion of the Mombasa-Nairobi road which collapsed two years ago. Work on the damaged portion of the Mombasa-Nairobi main road came to a halt in February last year due to lack of funds for the repairs which are estimated to cost KShs. 20 million.

Since then traffic has been re-routed to the Magongo road connecting the main Mombasa-Nairobi road after major repairs were carried out by the Ministry of Transport and Communications last year.

A spokesman for the Norwegian firm Norconsult confirmed in Nairobi that studies on the damaged area spanning 100 metres to establish the cause which led to the collapse of the huge section of the road surface have been completed and a final report submitted to the Ministry of Transport and Communications Today's crucial meeting at

the site of the road in Changamwe will consider the reconstruction options presented in the Norconsult study report which was funded by the Kenya and Norway Governments.

They include constructing a bridge, a tunnel or filling back the collapsed portion of the road.

It is reported that Norwegian donors have shown interest in providing funds for the project

which is expected to take six months to complete.

Findings into the causes of the damaged road are said to be incomplete and further investigations will have to be carried out during the reconstruction period to neutralise different factors which led to the damage.

It had been suggested that lack of proper drainage facilities in the area could have caused the road to collapse following the heavy rains in 1979/80.

Excavation work carried out at the site is reported to have found trapped water underneath which could have caused the surface to give in and sink.

#### TRANSPORT PROTEST

Local Ministry officials confirmed that further damage to the road has been caused to road during last years rains, extending the cracked portion 50 metres further near the Mombasa-Nairobi railway line in Changamwe.

The Ministry of Transport and Communications has been under pressure from motorists and transporters to repair the section of the road which has remained closed for the last two years.

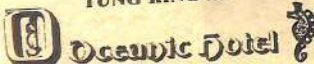

The exhibition which will be officially opened at 2.30 p.m. on Monday is aimed at promoting understanding of nature and the processes which produce natural structures.

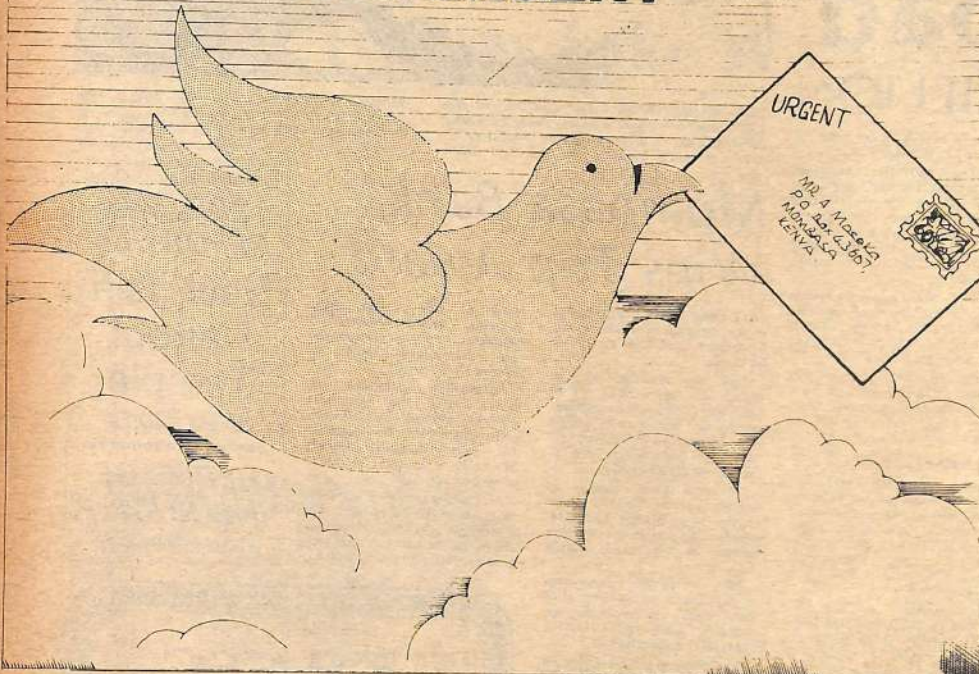

## Mayor Donates Christmas Funds To Coast Charity

MOMBASA (KNA) Several charitable institutions in Mombasa have received cash donations amounting to over Shs. 17,000 from the Mayor Councillor Ahmed Mwidani at his parlour.

Addressing the heads of the Institutions, Councillors Mwidani reiterated President Daniel Arap Moi's concern about the welfare of all Kenyans including those who cannot help themselves.

He told the Institutions that the work they were doing was an on rous one which the Government fully appreciated. He said this an appreciation was translated into action when the president himself inaugurated the fund for the disabled and declared a year devoted to uplifting their welfare.

The Mayor said that even all denominations supported President Moi's call of being mindful of their welfare.

He said the money he was giving was part of the last years X-mas tree fund which netted a record sum thanks to the generous Mombasa population whose unity and cooperation were fully recorded.

The Alms house got Shs. 500, Mji wa Salama for destitute children got Shs. 2,200, the Little Sisters of Poor (Nyumba Ya Wazee) Shs. 3,005, SOS village Shs. 2,200, the Post Reitz Polio Clinic Shs. 2,200 the Madrasahul Swaledina Shs. 2,200, the Likoni School for the Blind Shs. 3,005, and the Likoni School for the Deaf Shs. 2,500.

The Mayor said more Institutions will continue to receive the donations but some of the money will be put in a fixed deposit account to await emergencies arising at the such institutions.

He also announced this year's X-mas tree fund target of Shs. 300,000 and hoped the Mombasa residents and other wellwishers will once again com to the aid of the disabled.

### Top Stars In Film Studying Realms Of Reincarnation

"MAN IS unjust. But God is just. And Justice finally triumphs." That is the basic theme of the film *KARZ* opening at LOTUS Cinema on Sunday. Karz which literally means "debt" deals with reincarnation and is almost a direct lift from the English film "The Life of Peter Proud", but a very clever copy too; not one of the usual of-the-mill types.

Every time a film about reincarnation is made in India, the reborn character always maintains the same face. However, this time, Subhash Ghai has directed a masterpiece.

Karz is the story of a young man whose untimely death leaves a lot of "debts" to be paid by others. Thus he is reborn in another place, a completely different face and person to come back and make sure that the debts are paid.

Ravi Varma is the only son of a rich and respected family in Ooty, and madly in love with Kamini, whose only interest in Ravi is his wealth, for she works for Sir Juda, Ravi's late father's partner.

According to the order of Sir Juda, Kamini marries Ravi and on the very next day, while driving through his tea estate in Ooty, murders him.

Next she proceeds to drive out Ravi's widowed mother and young sister out of their palace and makes sure that all the estate is in Sir Juda's hands.

Twenty years later, a young man called Monty is a singing sensation and heart throb of millions. But Monty goes through a strange phenomenon. On playing particular notes on his guitar, he goes into a trance and scenes of an unknown woman killing an unknown man flash through his mind.

WHEN the Donovan Maule Theatre closed its doors the Phoenix Players took off in June 1983 in an effort to maintain the 35 year old tradition of professional theatre in Nairobi.

It has had a succession of resounding successes during its brief career so far among them being *Fallen Angels* by Noel Coward, which received two rave reviews in the press and one unenthusiastic review; the public, however, had the last word and the production played to near capacity during its run.

Abusive reviews greeted the original 1926 production, and that show achieved a major box office success.

As Coward commented "Press notices for *Fallen Angels* were vituperative to the point of incoherence; no epithet was spared. It was described as vulgar, disgusting, shocking, nauseating, vile, obscene, degenerate etc etc etc - all this was capital for the Box Office and the play ran successfully."

So, what was all th fuss about? The central act of this highly diverting comedy depicts two elegant young ladies getting more and more plastered as they await the appearance of an 'old flame' - it is one of the funniest scenes ever written for the stage and Debbie Falkland and Avril Porter, in the Phoenix production do not miss a trick - their performances are real collector's pieces of comedy acting at its very best.

Audience reaction to each phase of their 'bender' was almost sustained laughter and applause.

How a modern day critic could re-act in the manner of his confreres of 1926 defies analysis - it is just brilliantly funny writing - brilliantly interpreted by Debbie and Avril. The 'old flame' is played by James Falkland who also co-directs with James Ward.

The idea is quite simply - Julia (Debbie Falkland) and Jane (Avril Porter) both had an affair with a dashing French lover, Maurice (James Falkland) some years before their marriage to their pleasant, unreflecting golfing husbands Fred (James Ward) and Willy (Kenneth Mason).

Whilst Fred and Willy are away on a golfing weekend, Maurice announces his impending arrivals; Julia and Jane, nonchantly sit down to an elaborate dinner together as they await Maurice's arrival.

They start with rather strong cocktails and then begin to punish the champagne, and finally the liquor until they are very 'high' indeed; while they are getting steadily more and more drunk they reminisce about their experiences with Maurice - this leads to bickering and ultimately to a blazing row.

Next day suffering from hangovers they not only have to face their mystified husbands but also Maurice.

As usual in a Coward comedy the wit abounds and the laughter is continuous throughout the three acts.

Jimmy plays one of the two dull husbands of the erring ladies and Kenneth Mason (making his first appearance in Mombasa after 30 years at the D. M. Theatre, Nairobi) plays the other dull hubby.

The important role of the new maid, Saunders, is played by Gill Shaw, who has also designed the quite superb period costumes.

It will also be a 'first' in Mombasa for Gill as well as Avril, James, Debbie and Jimmy are already well-known, having visited the L.T.C. in previous productions from Nairobi.

*Fallen Angels* is one of Noel Coward's most popular comedies and has had several successful West End revivals since its first production since 1926.

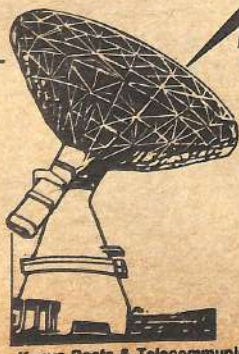

# DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

## City Residents In Frantic Search As Water Supplies Run Dry ...

THIS WEEK, Dar Es Salaam Residents faced a chronic water shortage which has never manifested itself as acutely as over the three days it persisted. City residents, almost without exception, were all bucket-in-hand trooping to water taps that still trickled with some water and to water holes and accessible rivulets.

Others frantically looked for running water at isolated offices and residences with tanks while some hired vehicles to collect water from offices and houses with reservoirs.

The supply interruption also forced many restaurants and tea shops in the city to close down and also disrupted services at hospitals which had to use water prudently from their reservoirs.

Moreover a number of industries were forced to close down while others had to reduce their operations.

The cause of the problem was attributed to a power cut at the lower Ruvu water plant due to some power pylons being burnt as a result of a shortcircuit to an earth wire.

To assist in the city's recurring water supply problem, the Minister for Water and Energy, Alnoor Kassum, said that Indian expertise will soon be brought into the country to study the poor water situation and will then advise on permanent solutions rather than the stop-gap measures that are presently being taken.

Kassum, who returned to Dar Es Salaam this week

from a seven week tour of France, Holland and India said that the Indian Government had already agreed to the proposals of sending the experts to Tanzania.

Away from the dry scene, there was more spirited news for would be travellers when British Airways announced the introduction of cheaper excursion flights between London and Dar Es Salaam.

According to the new fare structure, a Dar-London return ticket will cost 384 pounds sterling (6800 Tanzanian shillings) and 533 pound sterling (950 Tanzanian shillings) for the peak season.

In the past, a normal economy class ticket cost 834 pounds sterling (14760 Tanzanian shillings).

The Airline has also expanded

ticket validity from 45 days to between two weeks and one year but under the new system, passengers wishing to travel will be required to make reservations at least one month in advance.

It appears that the new rates are intended to improve passenger loads on the London-Dar direct flight thereby helping the Airline to recapture its former market before it suspended flights for six months

beginning April, last year.

The new rate schedule is also in line with a request by the Tanzania Tourist Corporation (TTC) request to help promote tourism out of the country.

## Philip Ochieng On The 'Freedom Of The Press'

LIKE other professions and occupations the journalists too have their association or their union.

This is the Kenyan Union of Journalists (KUJ) which is a body of about 200 members who are active as writers, broadcasters and photographers.

Once every month members meet on the second Friday in order to be together at drinks and to dine at leisure. Later they listen to a talk of special interest to members.

Last Friday there was an above average turnout with 80

members and their colleagues coming to meet one another and to listen to a most provocative talk on "The Trials and Tribulations of Journalists in the Third World".

The speaker was Philip Ochieng who is a well known journalist in East Africa.

Before entering active journalism Philip Ochieng used to work in the Protocol Section of the office of the Vice President, for the East African Institute and as Public Relations Officer of East African Airways.

He co-authored, together with Joseph Karimi, the amazingly successful book, after the emergence of the Nyayo era, "The Kenyatta Succession".

Philip Ochieng is back in Nairobi to "explore possibilities" and, if he so decides, he may have to leave his job where he is employed by UNICEF in Geneva in their Information Department.

His talk to Kenya pressmen was admirable and full of innuendoes, sarcasms and downright criticisms of the way local journalists are treated by their employers and by their editors.

Having been a victim of circumstances and having himself been to prisons in East Africa, Philip Ochieng can speak from his own experience of the way in which the journalist is stultified and humiliated in his own environment and in his own country.

Nobody who has been an active journalist will have failed to understand the relevance of what he meant when he referred to "Memo Terrors" which were the missives used to bring terror to senior journalists so that they could in turn write to their underlings and give them warning notes which would go to their "personal files".

It was an exposure of the practices that were and perhaps are still current so that editors are able to pass the buck when they are in trouble and blame

sub editors or reporters, or even stringers, for slips and mistakes and stories which should be defended by the editors and not misused by them to sacrifice the bona fides of working journalists.

The address to the Kenya

Union of Journalists had to be cut short due to time.

It was past 10.15 p.m. and with most journalists having to catch matatus or buses to reach their homes it was felt that there may be another occasion soon for Philip Ochieng to carry on with the second part of his talk which, it appears, touched on criticism of the pressmen and the stalwarts of the Fourth Estate who like to write about other professions and other personalities but who wish to claim a sort of immunity when they are themselves criticised!

A suggestion has been made that the Kenya Union of Journalists should have Philip Ochieng's talk suitably

reproduced in a book that all members can have or at least in some ways, a healthy journalist from Kenya say about his trials and tribulations working in Africa.

Philip did mention the trials and tribulations of the same or almost the same whether a journalist in Asia, in South America or practically all other African countries.

He blasted Manu which continued to "expatriates" on their made it quite clear that import is not necessary export" (obviously meaning expert!)

I for one cannot be marvel at the maturity enormous depth of Ochieng's analysis and hope that those journalists listened to him most will endeavour to probe own individual values and integrity as men and women whose role is reporting.

At times one wonders whether it is not the journalists themselves who are dictated to by Managements since they be bold enough and state their freedom and their able rights to ensure their stories are truthful reports and not distorted conveniently biased reports events and episodes and personalities in third countries.

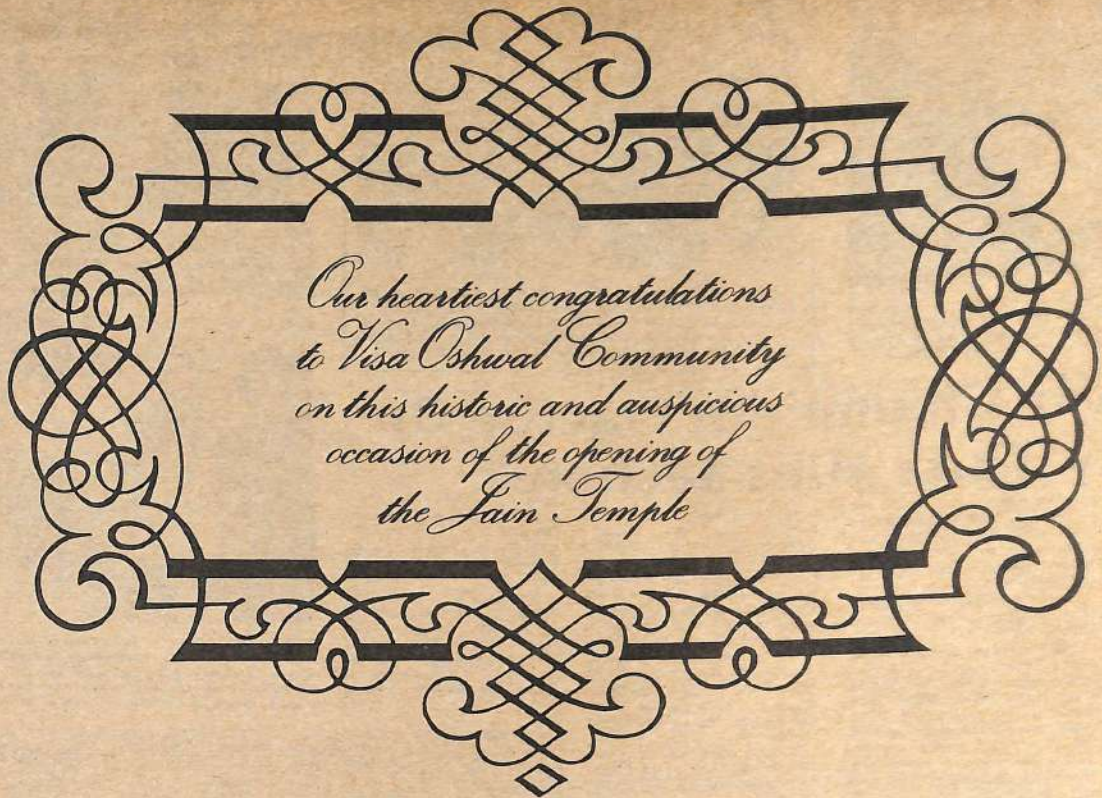

The *Derasar* is meant to bring everyone together and when they are within their spiritual vibration bring peace and tranquility to ones thought.

# CRUISE SHIPS VISIT KENYA

MOMBASA welcomed a big influx of 740 tourists who arrived on two cruise ships - the Sagafjord and Odessa for a two-day visit to Kenya.

Between them they also carried a complement of 580 officers and crew.

The two ships berthed before sunrise on Friday, Feb 10, with most passengers going on air and land safaris all over Kenya, as well as sightseeing tours at the coast.

Their arrival was most welcome as it gave hotels, restaurants, shops and woodcarvers' stalls a big boost in trade.

Cunard Line's 24,000 ton Sagafjord carrying 420 passengers (90 per cent of whom were American) and 330 crew (mostly Austrians), was completely refurbished in 1980.

She is presently on a Great World Cruise calling at twenty countries including Devil's Island, Rio de Janeiro, Maputo, Seychelles, Maldives, Colombo, Singapore, Pattaya/Bangkok, Shanghai, Peking, Tokyo and Honolulu.

She arrived at Mombasa from Maputo 'Full Up'. Such is the popularity of this Great World Cruise that '60 per cent were repeat passengers'.

In fact, Norwegian American cruises record the 'highest repeater ratio of 72 per cent in the cruise ship industry', and most bookings are made a year in advance.

The Sagafjord left Fort Lauderdale, USA, on Jan 10, the cruise ending in Los Angeles on April 3.

Three hundred and twenty passengers went on a variety of United Touring Company's safaris by land and air. Of these 52 were on the 2-day air safari to the Maasai Mara, and 41 on a day's air safari to Amboseli.

They returned just before the ship sailed for the Seychelles on Saturday evening describing the safaris and service they had received as 'wonderful'. Many wished they could have stayed longer.

### HEALTH OFFICERS

The Sagafjord paid tribute to Kenya's Immigration, Customs and Health officers whom they said had been most helpful enabling those going on air safaris to disembark with the minimum of delay.

Forty-eight disembarked to return to the USA, but before leaving Kenya went on safari in the Nairobi National Park before catching their British Airways flight home.

British Airways also flew in 46 passengers from America who were embarking on the Sagafjord. Before joining the ship they also enjoyed a safari in the Nairobi National Park before flying with Kenya Airways to the coast.

The Sagafjord undertakes a variety of cruises during the year. In fact, it is found that two out of three passengers on many NAC cruises soon sign up for another.

The ship is air conditioned, and offers Five Star living. It has a grand ballroom, one of largest alfresco, indoor and outdoor swimming pools, a Golden

Door Spa (fitness centre), night club, three bars, and restaurant that can cater for passengers at one time.

It has 35 entertainment board, as well as a full orchestra music trio and pianist, and 'elegant private casino' where passengers receive a share of the profits for use during the cruise.

Said Mr Anwar Kanji, UTC senior manager Coast, 'I was delighted that the Sagafjord should have chosen Mombasa as one of her ports of call. This Great World Cruise will look forward to seeing her again.'

We are also most happy to hear that our safaris were enjoyed so much.

Mr Kanji took the opportunity of thanking UTC staff members for looking after the Sagafjord passengers so well.

### CRUISE SEASON

The 13,757 gross tonnage Odessa, a Russian ship built in England in 1974 is operated by Black Sea Shipping Co.

Since 1983 she has been chartered by TRANSOCEANIC tours of Bremen, West Germany.

Modernised at the beginning of the cruise season, she is presently on the last leg of 'India, E. Africa and East Cruise which started in Venice, Italy, early January.

She arrived at Mombasa in Zanzibar on Feb 10 with passengers, and a 250-member Russian crew. Shortly after berthing, 170 of her passengers left the ship to be taken to Moi International Airport for the flight on a NAC charter back to West Germany.

This aircraft had brought Mombasa the same number of passengers who were joining the ODESSA for the final of her cruise with calls Dar-es-Salaam, Seychelles, Djibouti and Mediterranean ports.

Pollman's not only looked after the transfer of departing and arriving passengers before airport and ship, but also organised safaris by land and air which included a 2-day safari to the Maasai Mara and a 1 1/2 day safari to Tsavo game parks by road.

Others went on excursions to Malindi and bush tours before sailing Dar-es-Salaam on Saturday evening.

Everyone was delighted with their safaris and what they had seen of Kenya, and her wish to return in two short days. Yuzi Mombasa the Russian President Yuri Andropov, a party they had planned immediately cancelled.

The Odessa has a warm outdoor swimming pool, fitness centre, cinema, bowling, while some cabins are equipped with TV and videos.

Pollman's Tours & Safaris handled small groups of passengers on the Sagafjord for Mombasa tours who arrived in Kenya by air or ship, and then on city tours in Nairobi and Mombasa during their short stay here.

## ADDIS ABABA TALKS ON THE MOMBASA-LAGOS HIGHWAY

THE fourth meeting of the Governing Council of the Lagos-Mombasa Highway Authority has been hosted at Africa Hall, headquarters of the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA).

The two-day meeting, which was attended by representatives from Cameroon, the Central

African Republic, Chad, Congo, Gabon, Guinea, Kenya, Rwanda, Sudan, Uganda and Zaire, discussed the report of the meeting of experts which met in early January 1984, and adopted resolutions on the pressing problems facing the activities of the Authority.

The current chairman of the Council, Mr. Abel Aleir, the Minister of Construction and Public Works of Surdan, said in his opening statement that the financial problems of the highway programme were well-known to all members of the Authority and he expressed the hope that the meeting of the Council would adopt realistic resolutions with regard to the 1984 work programme of the Authority.

In his address, the ECA Transport, Communications and Tourism Division Director, Mr. Tchouta-Moussa, said the meeting would discuss the financial problems which the Lagos-Mombasa Highway Authority secretariat had facing during the past two years and which stood in the way of the full implementation of the programme of work.

He disclosed that the staff of the secretariat of the Authority have not received their salaries for several months.

He added that such financial difficulties were being faced by several other African institutions because African countries have to pay contributions to the numerous organizations of which they are members and in some cases have failed to do so.

### GOVERNING COUNCIL

The solution adopted by the Governing Council of the Cairo-Cabonere Highway Authority, he noted, was to do away with the bureaucratic and administrative organs of the secretariat and maintain a technical unit only to implement the programme and thus enable the Authority to fulfil the same functions with less financial contributions from Member States.

This re-organization, Mr. Tchouta-Moussa said, would reduce the contributions of members by at least 80 per cent.

Mr. Mwele Oumia Ikandanya, Director-General of the Lagos-Mombasa Trans-African Highway Authority spoke in some detail about the financial difficulties of the Authority and said only 36 per cent of the 1983 budget had been paid by Member States, putting the programme of work in jeopardy.

He told the Council that lasting solutions had to be found to this problem.

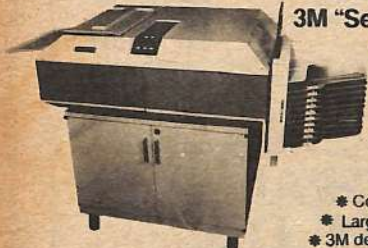

## More Ships Off-Load Salt Cargo From The Gulf

FURTHER PARCELS of salt continue to be imported, and awaiting to discharge in the early part of this week were the short sea traders *Alpha Michael* with 2,900 tons, the *Nazir* with 1,500 tons, the *Bilbarakah* with 2,700 tons, all bagged salt. Today the *Mukalia*, a regular trader between Aden/Mombasa, is due with 1,160 tons thus a total arrival this week of 7,660 tons. The Danish vessel *Birthe Boye* continues to delay the start of her ship to ship transhipment operation from the ill-fated *Copper Trader*. The operation was expected to start this week at the buoys of Kilindini.

The first cargo of that highly poisonous chemical Octel used by Kenya Petroleum Refineries in the distillation of motor fuel is due today when the 16,500 d.w. ton 5 year old Norwegian flag chemical tanker *Essi Gina* berths at Kipevu Jetty to discharge 400 tons loaded from Ellesmere Port on the West Coast U.K.

Lauren Navigation are introducing a larger vessel to cater for increasing numbers of containers to Karachi. The newcomer is the 11,800 d.w. ton *Emerald Star*, Panama registered built in 1976. She is a twin sister of the *Zim Lines* operated *Yue Hope* which is such a regular caller at the port.

The *Emerald Star* has only fairly recently assumed her present name as she was previously the *Yue Flower*.

She has been brought in to strengthen the service to Karachi and Bombay presently operated by the much smaller *Colombo Maru* whose capacity for containers is strictly limited.

Discharging 14,500 tons of fertilizer at No. 10 berth is the Korean vessel *Koh Eun* of 17,900 d.w. tons built in 1969. She will be in port for at least another week.

The *Holland America* cruise vessel *Rotterdam* arrived on schedule on Monday morning and sailed noon on Tuesday; she occupied her regular annual berth reserved for her at No. 15.

The Russian laundry soap discharger at No. 16 berth the *Komsomolets Armenii* of the Black Sea Line took over five days to discharge her 51 containers due. I understand, to the fact that the containers had to be destuffed ashore and the empties reloaded on board. The Russian cruise vessel *Belorussiya* returns to Mombasa on Monday for a second call.

### CEMENT CARRIER

The cement carrier *Helvetia* an occupant of Kilindini since 29th December finally sailed last Friday evening fully laden with 20,000 tons Cement for Port Louis, Mauritius.

A large discharger from the Far East and Japan is the Panamanian registered 15,800

### SHIPPING with JOHN WALTERS

d.w. ton Mitsui OSK chartered *Mutan Career* due tomorrow on her first visit to discharge almost 5,000 tons.

Two of the Polish Ocean Lines (POL) 'King' Class arrive this week and will be in port at the same time - an unusual occurrence for POL. The two vessels are *Zygmunt III Waza* discharging 3,700 tons from the N.W. Continent, and her sister the *Boleslaw Krzywousty* loading 4,000 tons of conventional and containerised cargo for the N.W. Continent.

These vessels were Polish built in 1971/1972 and have proved popular vessels in both the East African and West African trades - they also have accommodation for 12 passengers.

With the increasing demand for Container traffic it is only a matter of time before these vessels are phased out.

### UNIVERSITY SHIP

Next Wednesday the floating University of the sea arrives on a visit. This is the 31 year old 14,000 ton *Universe* with her complement of American University students on what is termed their floating campus. I cannot remember her calling last year but she usually makes one call annually.

The Port of Colombo have dangled quite an attractive carrot before shipowners, namely, as from January 1st this year they are offering a 10 per cent rebate to those Lines which guarantee handling a total of 12,000 containers (TEU) per year.

The Colombo Port Authority wish to encourage transhipment and make the port more competitive. Kenya Ports Authority how about a similar move?

Colombo's container traffic in 1983 totalled about 69,600 TEUs which more than doubled the 1982 total. As a matter of comparison the KPA in Mombasa handled 81,000 TEU in 1983 and are expecting 105,000 this year although this could be a considerable underestimate.

## Time For Kenyan Industry To Increase Productivity

"CONTINUED expansion of our industrial capacity should now be embarked on to meet the needs of goods in countries such as Tanzania and Uganda - now that all three states have agreed on common intra-state trading".

This was the call made by Mr. Justus Kalinga the managing director of JK Industries.

Rwanda, Burundi and Eastern Zaire offers a ready market for our goods which are of good quality he said, and called upon manufacturers to support the Government.

Particularly as it has in a big move now come out in full support of industrialists who are seeking overseas markets, by providing foreign exchange facilities for the importation of raw materials which is a positive step he commented.

Kenya through relevant export promotion agencies like the Kenya External Trading Authority has learned the hard way about the stringent standards of overseas markets that call for the purchase of quality goods only.

"The foreign trade fairs which various Kenya industrialists have attended have taught us the need to improve on our goods and to manufacture them to high standards", Mr. Kalinga said.

He pointed out for example how JK Industries are becoming aggressive in earning Kenya essential foreign exchange as they are capitalising on the demand for their quality products such as Jordan toothbrushes, medical syringes, telephone sets, cassettes for radios and educational items.

During the last half of last year although they earned almost half a million pounds in the African export market, he intended to boost it considerably this year by aggressive marketing.

"In addition the newly formed

PTA can only benefit trade relations and the sooner they begin to function the better for our own export earnings" he commented hailing this as a break through for Africa.

"It is most important for central banks to liaise with each other, in particular over expediting payments.

"Further documentation must be simplified, as well as facilitation of transport, not forgetting the cooperation required from neighbours over traffic in transit".

Mr. J Kalinga has been abroad in several trade missions and accordingly has seen the potential that exist for Kenya markets.

He observed: "The latest discussions between the three Presidents over the Tanzanian Kenya borders can only be to mutual advantage the industrialist added.

"Such negotiations have come

promptly at a time when the minister of Commerce had declared this year to be the year of export.

He went on to say that more frequent sales visits to our neighbouring countries will increase the volume of goods we are selling outside.

"There is an urgent need for better priced goods from buyers whose market is there right under our noses. These should be the priority he insisted in which way we may continue to expand our markets.

"For a long time to come", Mr. Kalinga said, "Kenya is going to take pride in having a big share of exports to African countries. About one third of her exports now go to neighbouring countries.

"We can proudly state that even some simple items such as plastic ware have had a favourable reception at campuses in Zambia."

## Church Donates Fishing Vessel

THE West German Church organisation - *Bischofliches Ordinariat, Rottenburg* has donated a boat to the Kenya Freedom from Hunger Council for National Development, Nairobi.

The Vessel known is *Nyasaye Erakomono* (which means Thank God) will be used at Catholic Mission, in Mbita, South Nyanza Province.

The boat is worth KShs. two and half millions and arrived this week on board the cargo ship *Tagama*.

*Nyasaye Erakomono*, was built at the shipyard of *Bodan Werft Kressbronn*, West Germany which manufactured the complete boat. *Kressbronn* is located 900 km from the seaport of Hamburg.

All transport arrangements in Germany, including the sea-freight was done by *Pohl and Company, International Forwarders, Hamburg*.

The boat was loaded on the cargo vessel *Tagama* of *Deutsche Ost Afrika Linie (D.O.A.L.)* - German East Africa line in Hamburg.

Clearing and Forwarding in Kenya was handled by *Interfreight Kenya Limited*. A special low loader took the boat direct from the vessel *Tagama* supervised by Mr. Heil Somfleth, branch manager and Mr. B. M. Kiara, operations and personnel manager.

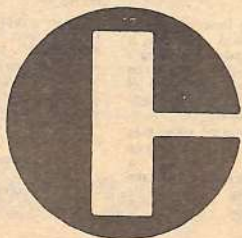

That same land he could find, but on our island of Mombasa, we've got to face the hot weather, technical factors, the is literally crawling with both garden (long-tailed rat) and roof rats. Our paper is to be applauded.

We're talking about the man who owns GENESCO Mr. B. S. Chadha, and his very able team of pest controllers. They might be out in the field when you ring on 23166, but 'old faithful' Mr. Bakari will pick up the 'phone and take your message.

Mr. Chadha also has a phone at the house should you ring there - No. 471440. (His Box is 98395). GENESCO PEST CONTROL will tackle any vermine problem, but getting

back to the rats and mice, or rodents.

"These are more clever than humans" said Mr. Chadha in a very informative talk in his office on Lady Grigg Street, Blue Room/Bahari Bookshop area off Turkana Street.

He added that it takes two or three months to get rid of these, but his extermination team is clever too and they dress so that where they are carrying out their work they leave no trace of human smell.

They use an anti-congulant rodenticide as bait and when the rats eat this it kills them

but their bodies will have no unpleasant odour for they get dehydrated.

Besides rats and mice Genesco carry out the eradication of bats and remove pigeons without harming them.

They can reach any height, and, for animal lovers and, in fact, all concerned human beings, do remember that Mr. Chadha. Abides by the rules of the R.S.P.C.A.

Pichadithi series provides an easy method of cross-cultural communication using pictures and words that are fun to read to tell traditional stories clearly and simply.

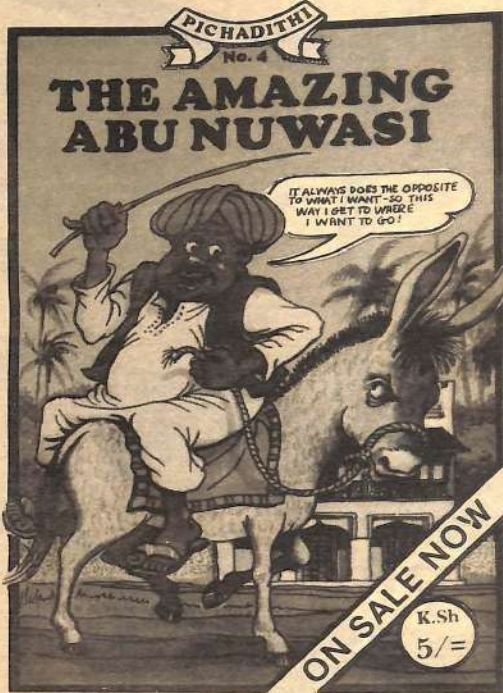
Each story has a moral relevant to modern African living as it was in the past and they are one way of communicating African culture and heritage to the new generation.

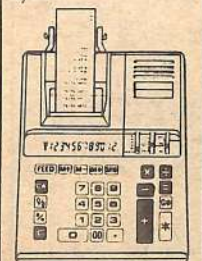

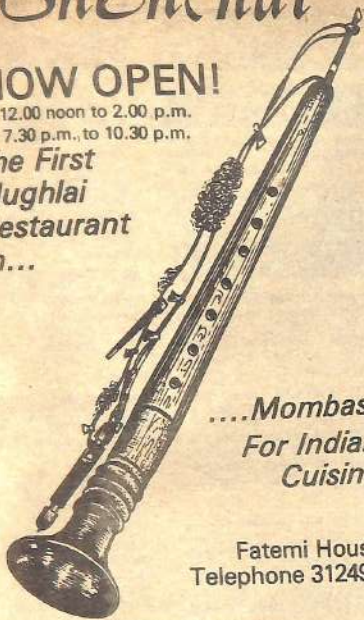

In einem Zoo kann man die Tiere und ihre Verhaltensweise studieren. Die Menschen schützen auch wilde Tiere in ihrer natürlichen Umgebung. Haben Sie schon gehört, daß auch wilde Tiere helfen, die Menschen zu beschützen?

Dies ist eine wahre Geschichte! In Vipingo, nördlich vom Mtwa-pa Creek, ging ein Speerfischer anfangs November während der Ebbe zum Riff hinaus. Schließlich konnten ihn seine Freunde vom Ufer aus nicht mehr sehen.

Etwa eine halbe Stunde später betrachtete jemand mit dem Fernglas das Meer und sah zu seinem Entsetzen den Körper des Fischers mit dem Gesicht nach oben außerhalb des Riffs auf dem Wasser treiben, hilflos den Wellen ausgeliefert. Der Mann im Wasser machte keine Bewegung. Er war offenbar erschöpft und in höchster Gefahr.

Am Ufer waren keine Boote, aber ein Mann - ein guter Schwimmer - was sofort bereit, ins Wasser zu waten und zum Riff hinaus zu schwimmen. Die Familie des Fischers konnte

in ihrer Verzweiflung nur hoffen, daß ein Unglück noch verhindert werden konnte.

Durch das Fernglas konnte man beobachten, wie der Körper auf einmal, anstatt ziellos weiter hinauszuwehen, direkt zum Riff hinanschwamm. Ein scheinbarer Antriebs in die sanften Wellen und zu einer Sandbank glitt.

Der Schwimmer hatte unterdessen das Riff erreicht. Er eilte zu der flachen Stelle und zog den Fischer auf Trockene, drehte ihn um und half ihm, das geschluckte Meerwasser loszuwerden.

**VORSEHUNG**  
Nach einer Weile konnte der Fischer aufsitzen und erzählte seine ungläubliche Geschichte. Er hatte bereits alle Hoffnung auf Rettung aufgegeben und war schon halb ertrunken. Er konnte nur noch sich treiben lassen und auf die gütige Vorsehung hoffen.

Pfötzlich fühlte er Bewegung um sich herum. Einige Kreaturen hoben ihn auf, zogen ihn und schubsten ihn sanft durch das Wasser auf die Sandbank hin. Eine Gruppe von Delphinen hatte in der Nähe gespielt, ihm aus der gefährlichen Strömung gezogen und vor dem Ertrinken gerettet.

## Neue Kilifi-Brücke kostet 21 Millionen K £

SECHS japanische Experten brücke zu bauen, um die Fährre zu ersetzen, die den ständig wachsenden Verkehrsstrom an der Nordküste und nach Malindi - infolge zunehmendem Tourismus und Weiterentwicklung des Hinterlandes - nicht mehr bewältigen kann. Es entstehen deshalb immer längere Autoschlangen und Wartezeiten an der Fährre, die durch eine neue Brücke entfallen würden.

Ein Sprecher der Japanischen Technischen Zusammenarbeit bestätigte **COASTWEEK**, daß die Kosten für das Projekt 420 Millionen KShs. betragen und für die Konstruktion 48 Monate benötigt werden.

Ein endgültiger Bericht wird gegenwärtig gemeinsam vom kenianischen Ministerium und den japanischen Experten ausgearbeitet und soll im März vorliegen.

Die Regierung von Kenia hatte die japanische Regierung um Unterstützung gebeten bei der Untersuchung der Möglichkeiten, über den Kilifi-Kanal eine

Brücke zu bauen, um die Fährre zu ersetzen, die den ständig wachsenden Verkehrsstrom an der Nordküste und nach Malindi - infolge zunehmendem Tourismus und Weiterentwicklung des Hinterlandes - nicht mehr bewältigen kann. Es entstehen deshalb immer längere Autoschlangen und Wartezeiten an der Fährre, die durch eine neue Brücke entfallen würden.

### TOKIO

Die Voruntersuchung, die Kshs. 9 Millionen kostete, wurde von der Japanischen Internationalen Technischen Zusammenarbeit finanziert. Sie wurde im März und April 1983 von der Central Consultant Company, Tokio, durchgeführt und dem kenianischen Ministerium im Dezember vorgelegt.

Gemäß Baustudie hat die neue Kilifi-Brücke eine Spannweite von 420 m und wäre somit -

nach der neuen Nyali-Brücke, die ebenfalls von den Japanern gebaut wurde - die längste Brücke dieser Art auf dem afrikanischen Kontinent.

Nach dem Muster der ultramodernen Nyali-Brücke wird die Kilifi-Brücke über vier Fahrbahnen mit speziellen Fußgänger- und Fahrradwegen versehen. Die Brücke wird mit Kabeln in den Betonstützen verankert und erhebt sich 40 m über den höchsten Wasserspiegel.

Im Schlußbericht soll auch bekanntgegeben werden, ob die Automobilisten Brückenzoll bezahlen müssen.

Die kenianische Regierung hat die Regierung von Japan bereits angefragt, ob sie bereit sei, den Bau zu finanzieren. Sobald die Darlehensanfrage geklärt ist, soll mit dem Bau begonnen werden.

Ein weiteres Projekt - ein Tunnel oder eine Brücke über

den Likoni-Kanal - ist ebenfalls in Vorbereitung und soll mit japanischer Entwicklungshilfe finanziert werden.

Eine entsprechende Untersuchung und Studie wird zur Zeit in Mombasa von Pacific International Consultants, Tokio, durchgeführt.

Die japanische Regierung hat bisher eine ganze Reihe von Entwicklungsprojekten in Kenia finanziert, darunter den Moi Internationalen Flughafen, die neue Nyali-Brücke sowie die Mtwa-pa-Brücke.

### Staatsbesuch

Die Durchführung dieser Projekte wurde ermöglicht durch den Abschluß bilateraler Abkommen technischer Zusammenarbeit zwischen den Regierungen von Kenia und Japan, nach einem erfolgreichen Staatsbesuch von Präsident Moi in Japan im Jahre 1982.

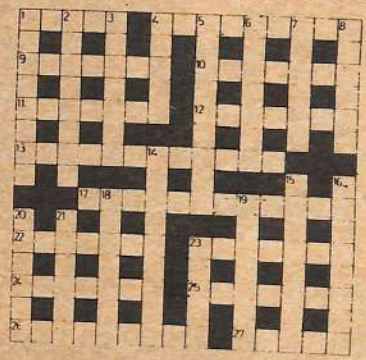

# MIKE LOTZ AGAIN
