ASSISTANT MINISTER COMMENDS HIGH STANDARDS:

COAST HOTELS INDUSTRY PRAISED

"KENYANS are proud of our hoteliers, and it is because of their standards and efforts that we have more tourists coming here".

So said Mr. Clement K. Lumembe, Assistant Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, when speaking at the Annual Sundowner Party of the Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers', Coast, held at Mombasa Beach Hotel and sponsored by Gilbeys East Africa Ltd.

Mr. Lumembe was representing the Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, Mr. Mathews Ogutu.

He told members "continue with your strong hotel organisation for we want standards to be maintained, and not decline".

Also present were Mr. Norbert Odera, Director of Fisheries; Mr. Clement Nyamongo, Tourist Officer, Coast, and Mr. Joseph M. Omolo, Mombasa Area Secretary, Domestic & Hotel Workers' Union.

Mr. Lumembe assured hoteliers of government's continued faith in the tourist industry. He said it was "fully committed to the expansion of the nation's tourist facilities, as Kenya had come to be known as the best long-haul tourist destinations in Africa."

CHALLENGE

Although since independence the industry had developed by leaps and bounds, Mr. Lumembe warned: "There is no reason for complacency for we live in a competitive and challenging world and should not lose sight of this".

He stressed: "for continued rapid growth we need the co-operation of hoteliers, as well as all others in the trade".

Mr. Kim Morbey, association chairman, outlined how many people were benefitting from tourism at the Coast.

With 9,000 beds it was giving employment to some 6,500 people who were quite probably helping support some 25,000 dependants.

With over 6 million bottles of beer being consumed in Coast hotels annually, more jobs had been created in the breweries, while small holder farmers at the Coast had mostly benefited from the purchase by Coast hotels of some 146,481 chickens worth approximately Shs. 2,197,000/- over the year.

Other purchases included about 9,792 bags of potatoes worth some Shs. 2 million benefitting mostly Taita and up-country farmers, while some Shs. 3 1/2 million had been

spent on fish benefitting Coast fishermen and dealers.

This only went to show how thousands of people were benefitting indirectly from tourism at the Coast.

Mr. Morbey said how tired hoteliers were of being asked by those 'outside' the industry "what benefit does tourism bring to Kenya when all tourists pay for their Kenya holidays overseas and no foreign exchange comes here".

Declared Mr. Morbey: "this is absolute nonsense".

"To put the record straight", he explained "in almost all instances tourists arrive at our hotels with vouchers covering the full cost of their accommodation which are then paid - usually within two weeks - by the overseas operator in foreign currency".

He went on: "The Central Bank requests hoteliers to list the amount of foreign exchange they receive and if this does not fall in with their expectation then they are not given a currency licence again".

Mr. Morbey emphasised that "major overseas tour operators do co-operate with the Kenya Government and under no circumstances would tolerate any misappropriation of foreign currency".

ERROL ON FOOD

IT IS said that "What is sauce for the goose is sauce for the gander" and in these days of female liberation I suppose that means everybody is equal. One thing is certain however, a good sauce made from a subtle combination of ingredients and seasoned well makes some dishes more equal than others, to coin George Orwell's famous maxim.

A very simple but well

cooked dish can be transformed into a memorable meal by the addition of one interesting sauce handed separately. Sauces do not need to smother the basic food.

Indeed, an overdose can be quite off putting and may well ruin a meal altogether whereas taken in portions according to the diner's whim and appetite will probably put the very same sauce into a different class, for a sauce is supposed to enhance a meal not overpower the meat or fish it accompanies.

Sauces do not have to take hours of preparation and they don't have to be complex. Each

individual cook may vary the flavourings pretty much as he or she goes along.

Take an ordinary baked potato for example. Instead of serving them with butter, for a change try a mixture of chives, cottage and cream cheese and a little fresh cream, season well and serve in a bowl so that individuals help themselves and allow this creamy thick sauce to melt over the jacket potatoes.

If chives are not available use the finest green part of spring onions chopped finely.

As an alternative to dreary old mayonnaise try aioli which can be served with fish soups, or really fresh raw vegetables such as young carrots, cauliflower, strips of cucumber or celery which can be dipped into this garlicky sauce. Garlic is the essential ingredient so if you are not an addict of this pungent bulb.

It is equally delicious with boiled French Beans, carrots or leeks, crusty French bread and a wonderful accompaniment to poached fish. Sometimes it is called *Le Beurre de Provence* and the thickening may be potatoes, fresh breadcrumbs or just more egg yolks. This is how you make it.

AIOLI

It is difficult to specify quantities because the egg yolks and garlic cloves are determined by the number of people you intend to serve but follow the basic rules for making mayonnaise and you won't go far wrong.

Allow 1 egg yolk per two persons

Allow four cloves of garlic per person; these should be large and succulent so if they seem a little small add 1 or 2 extra cloves of garlic.

Olive oil
Lemon juice
pepper and salt.

Beat the egg yolks. Crush the garlic cloves with a little salt pounded in a mortar with a pestle or use a garlic squeezer for this task. Combine the egg yolks and garlic thoroughly and

beat until smoothish.

Next add the olive oil, a drop by drop, whipping as would for mayonnaise and the same caution. You will it gradually achieves a consistency. Season to taste with salt, freshly ground pepper and a squeeze of lemon juice.

Serve in a chilled bowl. Boiled eggs are also excellent when eaten with aioli.

A word of warning - this should be used in a fishy soup, or coriander but never add aioli to the hot ingredient it will curdle at once. To avoid this is to strain other hot sauce or soup through a sieve on to the stirring all the time and will have a velvety smooth sauce.

ORANGE SAUCE FOR ROAST DUCKLING

2 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons vinegar
2 cups veal stock or bouillon
Juice of 3 medium sized oranges

Finely pared skin of 2 oranges cut in matchstick slices
1 1/2 teaspoons arrow root
2 teaspoons lemon juice
2 teaspoons arrow root
cornflour

1 small glass sherry
2 tablespoons orange liqueur - optional

Caramelize the sugar with the vinegar in the roasting pan. When it is a good brown color, add the pan juices from the duck which you should set aside to keep warm. Add the stock or bouillon, orange juice, peel, lemon juice. Cook rapidly until quantity of liquid is reduced by half.

Combine the arrow root cornflour with the sherry and stir into the sauce until it comes thickened and clear. Simmer for six to eight minutes, check the seasoning. Then add the orange liqueur, brandy may be substituted for this or one can leave it out altogether though it makes a less special sauce.

Welcome return of Walt Disney

THE KENYA Cinema opens tonight with Walt Disney's *Jungle Book*, a musical comedy, inspired, by Rudyard Kipling's *Mowgli* stories about a boy who wants to live his life in the jungle among the animals he knows and loves.

Kipling's early life in the exotic city of Bombay inspired the *Jungle Books*, which were published in 1894 and 1895. His father taught architectural sculpture there and it was here that the boy was born in 1865 and lived until he was six before being sent to school in England.

The mystery and beauty of India, then part of the 'British Empire', was a fascinating place for the impressionable boy. And along with his younger sister Alice, he spent most of his time with the native nurses learning *Hindustani*.

They filled Kipling's head with wonderful folk tales about the jungle animals who lived in the strange primitive country beyond the British Colony.

These stories remained with him until finally being committed to paper, in *The Jungle Book* which helped to make Kipling an international celebrity.

The Jungle Book is Walt Disney's seventeenth fully animated feature film, which probably took the longest time to make: three and a half years. It features the voice talents of Phil Harris as Baloo, the happy-go-lucky bear, Sebastian Cabot as Bagheera, the stern panther, Louis Prima as King Louie the Moat, and addled-ape potentate, George Sanders as Shere Khan, a sophisticated tiger heavy, Sterling Holloway as Kaa the sneaky snake, J. Pat O'Malley as the pompous elephant Colonel Hathi and Bruce Reitherman as Mowgli, the man-cub.

PREMIERE

The film has been directed by Wolfgang Reitherman.

On Wednesday at 9.00p.m. the Kenya Cinema is screening *Jaws 2*, which is having its East African Premiere for Rotary Club of Mombasa Charities.

This is one of the very few films which Mombasa audiences will have the opportunity to see before any one else in East Africa.

Until Wednesday the Naaz Cinema continues with *Abba* the movie, the film about the Swedish pop group which is followed on Thursday by the classic, *Gone with the Wind*, starring **Clark Gable**.

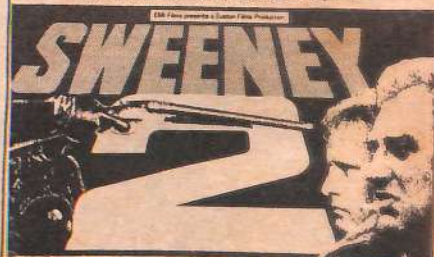

Import trade looks bleak

ANYONE WHO is considering buying imported goods next year should do so as soon as possible since the outlook for the import trade looks bleak.

The balance of trade has steadily worsened during 1978 as coffee and tea prices have eased, while the boom in imported goods has continued.

It seems inevitable that further measures will be introduced to check the level of imports during the early part of next year. The existing credit squeeze should lead to a fall in spending on imports, but such a measure takes time to achieve the desired effect.

There are two types of import control which might be used, quotas or duties. Quotas are more likely to be immediately effective since a physical limit is placed on the number of goods of a particular type which can be brought into the country.

In the case of duties, the prices of certain products are increased through the imposition of taxes so that the consumer is deterred from buying. But if he chooses to pay the higher price, the level of im-

ports is unaffected. Already there have been reports of possible reduction in the quota for imported cars. It is likely that other similar reductions will follow.

Although it is early days yet, the 1979 Budget will probably follow a similar pattern, unless there is a marked improvement in the trade figures.

The rate of duty on items such as cars, electrical goods, tobacco and alcoholic drinks seems certain to go up.

Imports will therefore be squeezed from three directions. There will be fewer of them entering the country, while their price will be higher and the money to buy them, will be in short supply.

No wonder that Economics is called the dismal science.

Thankfully no one appears to have been un- luly injured in these incidents although a considerable number of people have lost their valuables and have been greatly inconvenienced by resulting problems in obtaining new passports, travel documents and airline tickets.

It is comforting to know that thorough investigations are being undertaken by our often extremely competent police forces and no doubt the matter is being handled at a high level.

However it is advisable that hoteliers do seriously re-consider security arrangements at all points in their establishments where cash or valuable documents are stored.

Possibly inside information has contributed to the relative ease in which the criminals have operated, and obviously there is a need for hoteliers to drastically curtail the number of individuals handling valuables, and subsequently review the necessary control and security procedures.

At this time of high-spending parties during the festive holiday season it is more important than ever that due caution is exercised at hotel reception areas and that every possible measure is taken to see that these damaging incidents are not repeated.

NEW AIRSTRIP FOR ROBINSON ISLAND

OVER the past six years I have maintained an air-strip on the mainland close to Robinson Island. This has now been extended in to three directions (06, 15 and 18).

In recent years this air-strip has become extensively used for tourist traffic and in the last survey I have seen was placed in the top ten of all private maintained air fields.

Although much effort and money has been spent in improving this facility, a new air-strip on higher ground must be constructed as a matter of urgency.

This is necessary owing to the low lying nature of the rest of the land; it becomes saturated and therefore dangerous for landing and take off in rainy weather.

I have found an ideal site for the building of an all weather air field, pointing into the direction of the prevailing wet weather winds (16).

This level land extends in length for some two kilometres, is two metres above the plain and consists of sandy, good draining soil.

It is at present covered in light bush. With the addition of a firm surface this site would make an ideal year-round air field.

It is with these plans in mind that I have written with the request that the government institute the construction of such air strip.

Close encounters with Michaela

MICHAELA was the spitting image of film actress Deborah Kerr - and this gave her husband, Armand Denis, the stratagem he needed to bring his young bride with him to East Africa for the shooting of *King Solomon's Mines*.

"We'll need a double for Deborah, especially in the dangerous scenes: why not Michaela, who has the same stastics?" argued Armand, the film's technical adviser.

So she accompanied the film stars, Deborah Kerr and Stewart Granger, and the film crew to Kenya and what is now Eastern Zaire, and she recalls stepping in for Deborah in some scenes involving snakes.

And that experience in the late forties was the start of a memorable and famous filming partnership with Michaela and Armand Denis becoming household names among television viewers in 40 countries.

They filmed around the world and, in particular, their T.V. portrayals of East African wild life. I'm convinced, helped to foster the present tourist boom. Some of those beauti-

fully made films are still shown on T.V. screens.

Armand, who was an inventor as well as a film maker, died in 1971; Michaela married a distinguished Nairobi lawyer, Sir William O'Brien Lindsay, four years later, but he died shortly after their wedding.

The other day, I called at Lady Michaela Denis Lindsay's gracious home in Muthaiga, and over coffee we talked about the state of the world. She is a Nairobi personality who is outstanding in terms of her strongly held convictions, her remarkable experience of the world, and her kindness to people... and animals.

She has always been concerned with the protection of the environment; her pet-voires include vandals who wantonly destroy animals and who chop down trees. Hunters and killers of wild life are anathema to her.

"These psychopaths, who find pleasure and satisfaction in destroying a lovely animal, must be inferior persons both mentally and physically," she said. The Nazis used human skin for articles and those who used animal skin for decoration and status symbols were on the same level, added Michaela.

When she travels to colder climates, her 'fur' coat is adorned with the slogan button: "Make no mistake, my fur is fake". It's made of nylon.

She applauds the Kenya Government's ban on hunting and curio-shops. "But a crack-down is still needed on illegal street sales of ivory and elephant hair."

Another cause Michaela feels strongly about is family planning. "I'm a firm believer in the quality of life. What's the point of having the world filled with millions of humans who are jobless, hungry and illiterate?"

PSYCHIC

She's concerned about the world's pollution, violence and barbarism. "We have advanced so much in technology but we have a long way to go in ethics, behaviour and in kindness to other people... and animals."

Yet another interest which fills Michaela's life is psychic research and spirit healing. Many people of all races and professions come to her for help. They include doctors, surgeons, dentists, priests, agnostics and atheists.

She has packed so much into her life - including several novels like *Leopard in my Lap*, *Maid of Money* and *Voice of the Lark*.

Welcome end to the 'War'

WITH THE routing out of Uganda's Idi Amin's troops from Tanzania soil, Tanzanians can look forward to the last phase of ending the war and ultimately total normality.

The effects of the war were clear over this weekend when the country for the first time in its 17 years' of independence did not have any celebrations.

And listeners over *Radio Tanzania's* external service will also miss the popular *Dial-A-Disc* programme (equivalent of Kenya's *Ring Us Up*) by the Dar es Salaam Round Table for the first time in 15 years.

Although the Tablers had been granted permission by the Radio Authorities from December 10 to January 10 with much longer hours than last year, they might not take off until the Government officially declares the war over.

The Lions Club of Dar es Salaam host who were also supposed to organise a three day fete during the Christmas celebrations to raise funds for their projects, have also postponed the event indefinitely.

Tanzanians will probably have a quieter Christmas and should look forward to greater sacrifices in the wake of the war's after effects.

The war, did not however deter tourists from coming into the country and K.L.M. - the Dutch Airline - will bring in more than 400 tourists to Tanzania in a 747 Jumbo jet on December 24. This will be the first time a Jumbo jet is landing in Dar es Salaam on a scheduled flight.

Staff of the *Air Tanzania* who have been greatly hit by an acute accommodation problem will be relieved towards the end of next year thanks to the airline's house purchasing and building 'spree' in Dar es Salaam and Kilimanjaro regions.

The airline is to construct 85 houses and purchase eight flats in Dar es Salaam and build about 200 flats in Moshi.

Five of the houses to be built in Dar es Salaam are for the expatriates from K.L.M. who will lay the ground-work for a proper canteen network in the Dar es Salaam and Kilimanjaro airports.

In a bid to boost cashewnut

production in the country, Tanzania and India are to set up a joint venture. A feasibility study to establish a 20,000 hectare farm will be carried out soon.

This follows a meeting of the Indo-Tanzania joint commission for economic, technical and scientific co-operation in New Delhi from November 28 to December 1, 1978.

The Ministry of Labour and Social Welfare will this week receive proposals from a 12-man steering committee for the formation of a National Safety Council.

Since this country has never had a National Safety Council, it seems the proposals will form the basis of such a formation and the establishment of a proposed national committee.

CONTINUED PROGRESS

The Nyali Beach Hotel story, since its opening in 1946 with 89 beds, is one of continued progress, despite many heart-breaks in its early days.

It was built by Harry and Eva Noon, pioneers of Kenya's hotel industry. Mr. Noon died just two months before the hotel opened in December 1946, and his wife thirteen years later.

Today, the hotel stands as a proud memorial to their foresightedness and courage in going ahead with such a prodigious development in those early days, which spearheaded and stimulated hotel growth at the Coast and is now attracting a booming tourist trade as well as earning the country much needed foreign exchange.

Both Harry and Eva Noon would be proud of their hotel today, for it remains the biggest and best at Mombasa, with its own fully equipped conference centre which attracts many international, national and local forums as well as offering 'top' banqueting facilities.

In 1972, the hotel in which the Noon family had always been principal shareholders, was sold to a consortium with United Touring Company holding 60 per cent of the shares and the rest equally divided between Block Hotels and Kuoni of Switzerland.

It is a hotel group which places particular emphasis on staff training to ensure that the highest standards are maintained. A continuous training programme includes an incentive scheme where gold stars and cash prizes are awarded monthly, as well as annually. It embraces all departments, and just recently telephonists and receptionists underwent a Tack Telephone Communications Course to uplift even further standards of telephone etiquette.

NEW DEVELOPMENTS

These have all been masterminded by Masterplan, project consultants, the new wing being built by Acadia Construction Company, and restaurant developments being carried out by Mombasa Builders, with the exclusive furnishings and interior decor being designed by Gemini Interior Design, Nairobi.

EXTENSION

The 24 air-conditioned rooms are all sea-facing with spacious verandahs and comfy, folding, blue denim film director-style chairs in which to relax. The rooms in white and deep blue have 'mini' bars and two channel music. Ceilings have rounded edges, and there are 'real' beds (not divans) with unusual headboards in blue stained wood joined to mosaic tables. There are brass lamps, and decorating the walls are lino cuts of khanga clad coastal women by Thelma Sanders, a well-known artist in Kenya.

The rooms overlook beautiful gardens which run down to the sea, the landscaping being carried out by very experienced people from a new company - Coast Agriculture & Veterinary Services.

All existing hotel rooms are to be upgraded to this standard and have 'mini' bars and music.



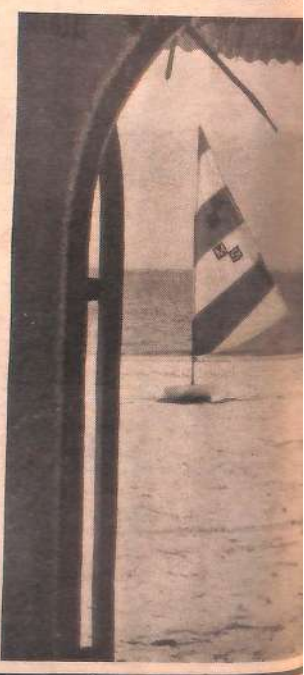

ARCHITECTURE EMPHASISES INTIMATE ATMOSPHERE:

LUXURY, STYLE AND COMFORT

THE extensions and alterations at the Nyali Beach Hotel were designed and supervised by Masterplan Limited - Kenya's first integrated project consultants. And although the project was commissioned only at the end of April this year, it has been completed and handed over precisely on time.

The time factor was important, because the new extensions were needed for the peak tourist season, now starting. But despite the comparatively short period allowed for the project, the entire plan has been fully completed, and final costs within the original budget have been agreed.

Comprising a 48-bed extension in a three-storey block, a new discotheque, the Mvita beach-front grillroom, and the Mchana bistro, the project also includes additional water storage facilities, with a new 500,000 litre water tank.

Masterplan Limited specialise in the provision of the full range of consultancy services, embracing architecture, engineering, quantity surveying, town planning and other related fields. As a result, they were able to handle the entire planning and execution of the Nyali Beach Hotel project, and to ensure its completion to the highest degree of standards, within a period of only seven months from the date of formal commission.

The whole project is integrated within the existing hotel development, and it now makes the Nyali Beach Hotel one of the biggest hotel developments on the Kenya Coast, while extending the hotel's range of facilities for its guests.

The new rooms are all twin-bed rooms, each with modern bathroom and balcony, and fitted with air conditioning. There is a mini-bar in each room.

Externally, the new building blends in with the existing hotel development. But internally, it incorporates the most modern trends, with great attention paid in the design to environmental aspects.

An interesting feature is the adoption of coved texture ceilings - which give both visual and environmental advantages by making the room more cosy. An arch leads from the main area of the bedroom into the bathroom and wardrobe area, giving it an extra spaciousness.

HAND-WOVEN FABRICS

Internal furnishings fit into a predominantly blue/green colour scheme which is chosen because it gives a cool, fresh ambience in the tropical conditions of Kenya's Coast. The furnishings have been designed to suit the philosophy of the room, by Gemini Interior Design, a company with which Masterplan Limited have a close association. All fabrics have been manufactured or hand-woven in Kenya, specifically for this project.

Even the timber surfaces in the rooms are stained blue, in order to harmonise with the overall colour scheme.

The main access walkway to the new rooms is flanked with tropical flower boxes, adding an additional note of luxury to its setting.

All furniture in the rooms has been specially designed by Gemini. The wooden beds have interior sprung mattresses

for comfort and coolness, and the wooden bedside tables have mosaic tops for convenience and an additional note of colour. Specially designed bronze-ware bedside lamps were locally manufactured. Two easy chairs are upholstered in matching fabrics.

On the balcony, there are director-style chairs, (specially designed by Gemini) with removable, washable upholstery.

The discotheque, named 'The Hole in the Wall', has luxurious, intimate, but casual atmosphere. It is artificially lit and air conditioned, and the lighting comes from the floor, reflecting from a bronze mirrored ceiling. The dancing area is separated from the lounge area, with entry through a hole in the wall - hence the name of the discotheque.

SUPERLATIVE SETTING

The former Mchana bar, well known to the patrons of the Nyali Beach Hotel over many years, has been transformed into the new Mchana Bistro. Here too, the accent is on intimacy, with a series of arches to set off the atmosphere. Upholstery is in bright green polka-dot design, and each archway area has its own fan for extra coolness.

A new, open-plan kitchen, with counter bar, will serve drinks and snacks throughout the day.

The former beach room has been converted into the new Mvita Grill. Here guests can enjoy tasty meals in a superlative setting, beneath waving palm trees and only feet from the waters of the Indian Ocean.

With a fully equipped kitchen, the grill seats 76 diners in intimate comfort, below a unique suspended ceiling of black-and-red tasselled kikoi. Dominant colours in the grill are black and red.

The area outside the grillroom is flood-lit at night, and incorporates a barbecue area.

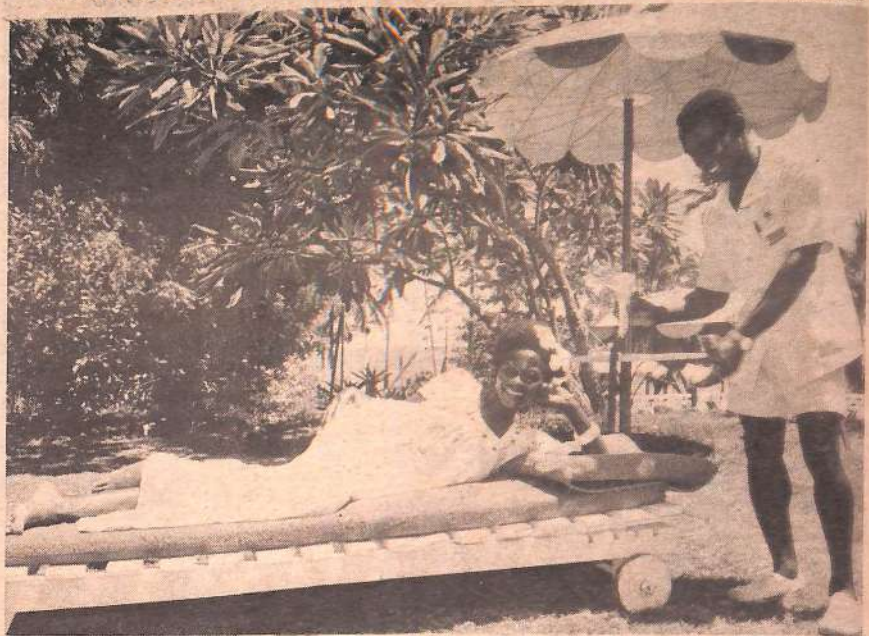

**East Africa's first
and finest resort**

NYALI Beach Hotel, as it was first built for Harry and Eva Noon at the end of the Second World War, was Mombasa's first permanent hotel on the Coastal mainland, although there had been hotels on Mombasa Island since before the turn of the century when Mombasa and not Nairobi was the country's capital.

Hotels on the Island were a necessity for travellers arriving at the Port. No one at that time in Kenya, was thinking about hotels in the holiday or tourist sense. The days of Kenya's beach hotels and Indian Ocean holiday resorts had still to come.

At the end of the Second World War, because there were so many members of the Civil Service and Armed Forces domiciled in the country who were unable, as was the custom, to take their 'home leave' due to the shortages of shipping space, the Kenya Government advertised that they would offer assistance to anyone adventurous enough to start a hotel at the Coast.

Until that time, this exquisite seaboard was little exploited, even by those who had made this country their home, and much of the popularity of Mombasa with its incomparable north and south mainland beaches came as the result of the ideal position and superb hospitality offered at *Nyali Beach Hotel*, the spearhead of many a later seaside establishment. Their experience as owner-managers of the very successful Salisbury and Westwood Park hotels in Nairobi encouraged Eva and Harry Noon to have confidence in such a new venture.

FLOURISHING

Harry Noon died before *Nyali Beach Hotel* was completed, making Eva Noon a widow for the second time, one of two indomitable and courageous women pioneers of this country's now flourishing hotel industry. She had first come to Kenya in 1912 as Eva Begole to join her husband who worked for the Railways. With their two little children she arrived in Mombasa only to find that he had died two days before their ship reached port.

Her own fascinating story of fifty years in the hotel business in this country appears in *The Nyali Beach Hotel Story* on sale in the hotel. Her daughter Nona (now Colpoys) was born of the second marriage.

When the hotel first opened in December 1946, a new standard of accommodation was set for hotels outside the capital. All but two of its double bedrooms had their own bathrooms, and most of them faced the sea. There were 57 bedrooms in all giving accommodation to 89 people. There was a pillared dining room - also used as a ballroom - two bar lounges, a writing room and a card room, all beautifully and tastefully furnished.

Eva Noon's country-wide reputation for hospitality and cuisine soon made *Nyali Beach Hotel* the Kenya residents' first choice as a holiday destination and popularity within the first decade demanded an increase in accommodation. Eva Noon was 77 years old when she attended the champagne and caviare party held in the Galleon Room to celebrate the opening of the new bedroom wing in 1958.

IMPRESSIVE

After her mother's death in 1959, Nona Colpoys was elected Chairman of the Board of *Nyali Beach Hotel Limited*, and in 1965 further impressive extensions were added, putting the hotel into the international class. The magnificent freshwater swimming pool was completed in 1968. The tourist potential of Mombasa was escalating with the years.

It was in 1972 that the hotel in which the Noon family had, up until then, always been the principal shareholders, was sold to a Consortium comprising UTC, Block Hotels, and Kuoni of Switzerland, when it came under the management of the oldest and best-known group in Kenya, Block Hotels. Accommodation at that time was 250 beds.

Immediate extensions and additions were planned, completed in 1975, which included a new four-storey bedroom wing, a new lounge, the Karibu (Conference) Room and the Ocean View Dining Room, bringing accommodation capacity to 360 beds, all bedrooms and public rooms air-conditioned.

The renovations, improvements and extensions completed this month are evidence of faith not only in *Nyali Beach Hotel* as a premier resort, but in Mombasa and the Kenya Coast as being able to compete with any of the most attractive holiday destinations around the world.

MVITA GRILL

This is the former Beach Room. The interior has been converted into a very intimate grill room, with colourful kikoi making a most spectacular ceiling drape. It is candlelit at night, with black tablecloths and black canvas film director-style chairs, and together with outside terrace surrounded by illuminated shrubs, trees and sea, can seat some 80 people.

The hotel will be offering more cabaret than in the past, with Ed Silveira continuing to entertain on the piano with romantic background music.

Guests will be able to dine there as part of their 'full board' allowance, with only the difference in price to be made up.

MEAL CARDS

On arrival at Nyali Beach Hotel, guests receive a meal card entitling them to eat either in the restaurant/bistro or grill room of their choice.

NIGHTCLUB

'The Hole in the Wall' named after a famous restaurant in Bath, England, will have guests climbing some steps to pass through a 4' 6" hole in the wall and then descend into a very groovy scene. The colour scheme is purple - in different hues - with mirrored ceiling and unique lighting effects produced by floor level spotlights. It has 'bean bag' seating and will accommodate 75 people.

The nightclub offers the latest in disco music and will be open from nine in the evening for six nights of the week, closing on Mondays only.

MCHANA BISTRO

This was formerly the Mchana Bar and part of the original hotel which opened in 1946.

The interior has a completely new look with white walls, arches and alcoves and a Lamu-esque ceiling made from boriti poles. The furniture, with a beautiful 'natural' look had been fashioned from Cyprus wood, while furnishings and place

mats on tables are all in green. There is a copper canopied 'open plan' kitchen where you can watch your food being prepared.

The Bistro is open from 7.30 in the morning until eleven at night, and will prove a boon to late-risers who missed breakfast in the restaurant, for this can now be obtained in the Bistro until eleven in the morning.

From midday a de-luxe snack menu will be offered including a variety of tasty dishes such as Nyali Basket - a mix of deep fried prawns, chicken and spare ribs, or a marinated sirloin steak, as well as 'weight watcher' snacks. There will be a big selection of fresh salads as well as mouth-watering ice creams.

The Bistro, which will seat some 70 people comfortably, includes an outside terrace in the centre of which is a shady flamboyant tree as old as the hotel itself.

FOOD

New dishes have been created and new menus designed. Special kikoi lunches, as well as Danish and Fish buffets are being offered during the week, while special evenings include Candlelit dinners with folksy guitar music in the Mchana Bistro.

The new attractive menus have all been designed by Kurt M. Vogel, Food & Beverage Manager, who also helped with the creation of many new dishes.

He has won medals in exhibitions of the culinary arts, and has been in the hotel industry since 1963 with much of his career as a Chef being spent in the U.K., Ireland, Caribbean and South America.

He was Executive Chef at Nyali Beach Hotel for one year, before being appointed Food & Beverage Manager.

Derek W. Parritt is now Executive Chef. He has won medals and prizes in culinary exhibitions and has worked at top hotels in many countries of the world, including the famous Vierjahreszeiten Hotel, Munich.

ENTERTAINMENT

The hotel has one of the Coast's top bands playing there twice a week - the Mombasa Roots - which have been filmed by BBC television, and there is dancing on the terrace under the stars at night.

There are also discos, film and fashion shows, a variety of African traditional dances performed by the Samburu, Maasai, Giriama, and 'Kwa Zulu', while one night of the week there will be an Arabian night with music and dancers.

In the evening, Edmund Silveira will be entertaining on the piano in the Mvita Grill most nights of the week, while a guitarist will be playing in the Mchana Bistro, and sometimes in the Mvita Grill.

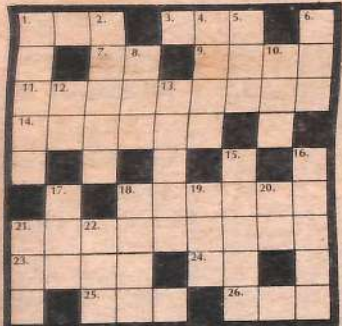

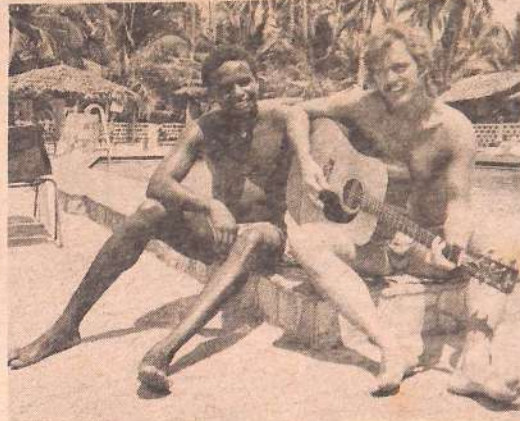

soaring!

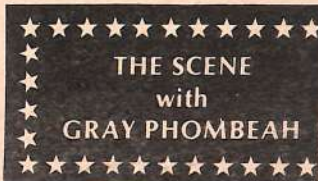
Night spots which a few
