Council Seeks 'Private' Loan

NEW SHS. 30 MILLION SCHEME FOR CHANGAMWE AREA

THE HARD-UP MUNICIPAL COUNCIL of Mombasa has begun negotiations with private financiers for a Kshs. 30 million loan to finance a new major housing scheme in Mombasa. According to Town Hall sources, representatives from Trans-National Finance Company

arrived in Mombasa this week with an offer to finance medium low-cost tenant purchase houses for two projects in the Municipality.

The Kisumu housing scheme will have 84 5-bedroom flats, 82 2-bedroom flats and 102 single roomed flats, both for renting.

The Council has suggested that the second phase of the Kisumu project should be converted into public rental houses instead of low cost tenant purchase bungalows.

The negotiations have centred particularly on the council's intention to have the whole scheme converted into public rental houses.

HOUSING UNITS

The council has argued that the municipality needs more housing units for rental other than bungalows for tenant purchase.

According to Town Hall figures, more than 7,000 residents are queuing up for houses in Mombasa and the number is rising.

The Municipal Council main-

tains 11 housing estates in Mombasa accommodating 3,248 families in the public rental scheme.

The tenant purchase scheme, including the completed USAID and the Nation House Corporation projects, provide 345 units in Kisumu, Likoni and Changamwe.

Other 429 units provide shelter for the families of council staff members.

When completed the new housing scheme is expected to provide houses for some 424 families.

At the same time Municipal Council requires Kshs. 7.7 million for the repairs of the existing housing estates in Mombasa.

According to cost estimates prepared by the municipal engineer, repair work for Changamwe housing estate will cost Kshs 5.5 million, Kisumu estate Kshs. 260,000, Tudor Kshs. 2 million and the Likoni estate Kshs. 150,000.

The municipal engineer has requested the council to make provision for the expenditure in the next year's budget.

The procession will begin at 8:00 a.m. from the Kanu office of Malengo through Bibi Wa Safi Road, Jomo Kenyatta Avenue, Saba Saba Avenue onto Nyali Bridge and Ronald Ngala Road before winding up at the municipal stadium where the mammoth rally will be held.

The assistant minister for Lands and Settlements Mr. Shariff Nassir, who is also the chairman of the Kanu Mombasa branch will then present a prepared loyalty declaration to the Coast P.C. Mr. Luka Galgalo.

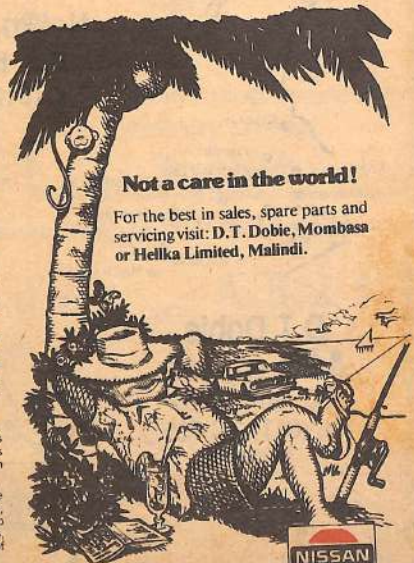
Owners of matatus and buses will be ferrying people to Kanu's office ready for the procession in the morning.

NIMROD ARE THE EXPERTS FOR YOUR FIRE RISK PREVENTION

FIRE. FIRE!! When you hear those words you always think it is the other person involved.

We hear stories of fires all over the world - how they were quelled after taking their toll of property - sometime of life. But nothing really registers till it is close to home, like the tikoni fires, like the Lamu disaster, or the fire caused by frying fat at the 1983 A.S.K. Show that we realise...

No one is more conscious of fire than Nimrod Mombasa Limited, who, between the staff, have 20 years fire-fighting experience behind them. Nimrod itself is only eight years old, but on their books we saw they have 542 active service contracts for equipment on the coast alone. It was, of course, Nimrod who extinguished that fat fire at the show.

People are moving to Nimrod largely because of their service. There is no point in having equipment which does not work when it is needed. Thinking of the man who is how a Nimrod client but wasn't when he had a fire a couple of months ago. Only three of out of twenty three of the extinguishers in his workshop garage worked. In consequence several cars were destroyed by fire including a Mercedes and a brand new Toyota Land Cruiser.

Unfortunately many attitudes regarding fire protection would be comical were they not so serious. A hotel chain on the coast was worried by the initial invoice they received from Nimrod who had just acquired their contract, when the payment demanded was several times higher than any previous invoice. But this was only until it was explained that seventeen Co2 cartridges had to be replaced, which meant that seventeen fire extinguishers, although serviced previously by a competitor, were not in working order!!

In one building the Hose Reels were being serviced but the Hose Reel Booster pump had never been connected so there had never been any water pressure in the hose reel system. If the service rates quoted are cheaper than most companies. Why? Could it be that the service is not done correctly or not done at all. Spares and refills charged for but not used! Higher prices charged for new equipment! The list goes on. If you want to know what to look for ask Nimrod, a name renowned throughout the country. In yet another prominent Coastal hotel their alarm system was a dummy. It was not connected to the power source and had no sounders connected to it. Away in Nairobi, in one of those new high rise office blocks a stand-by Diesel Pump has been installed on the roof to boost the Hose Reel supply in the event of a power failure. An excellent idea, but to expect someone to climb to

the top of the building in a fire situation (remember lifts don't work then) to crank the engine is unbelievable!

One point Nimrod made is that if you employ a Fire Officer in a Hotel, make sure he knows what he is talking about.

We're always reading about hotel fires but Nimrod have come up with something new. It is the "Tohatsu" portable fire pump.

This small pump, placed near water (for example a swimming

pool) means you have as good as your own built-in fire engine. This pump takes in water and forces out 476 U.S. gallons per minute. It can be used safely by unskilled operators. The "Tohatsu" is renowned for very quick starting too.

The early September Hay fire on the ship in Kilindini Port need not have taken the lives of the cattle had the fire been tackled soon enough and with the right equipment.

Also, Nimrod is a company here at the Coast who own an instrument that can measure the content of Co2, in situ.

LEGAL PROFESSION HONOURS THREE MOMBASA ADVOCATES

AT A 'Special Dinner Party' held at Nyali Beach Hotel on Saturday (Sept 29), three members of the Mombasa Law Society were honoured for their long and distinguished service to the legal profession.

They were T J Inamdar, QC; John Bryson and D. D. Doshi, Advocates, who have each served the legal profession in Mombasa for over forty-five years.

The Occasion was to honour, and present each with an inscribed silver medallion as a token of the society's appreciation.

Over eighty members and guests were present, including Mr Justice Ernest F. Aragon, and the senior resident Magistrate, Mombasa Samuel Odhiambo Oguk.

Medallions were presented by Japheth Asige, chairman of the Mombasa Law Society. He said it was the oldest law society in Kenya, and that this was the first time for such a professional body in this country to honour their distinguished members who have also displayed great honesty.

Alliance Hotels Continue Ambitious Expansion Plans

NARO MORU River Lodge - a popular base for climbing Mt. Kenya - is presently being extended, while a permanent camp is being built at the 4,200 metres high Mackinder's Point which is due to open in November, writes Neta Peal.

The Lodge is owned by Alliance Hotels, said its group general manager, Chris Modigell to cater for the ever increasing demand by mountain climbers we are extending the Lodge by a further twenty beds, all in rooms of a high standard with verandah facing the river and some with open fire places.

It is estimated, he said, that of the 5,000 people climbing Mt. Kenya annually, 3,000 use Naro Moru River Lodge as their base.

The Lodge is presently being completely renovated, while the dining and bar facilities are being extended. It will also have a Conference Room to seat up to one-hundred people.

THREE PEAKS

Mackinder's Points, where the camp is being built, is the last point before climbing one of the three peaks on Mt. Kenya. It will sleep sixty people, and have an open fire place and kitchen.

Manager of Naro Moru River Lodge is Timothy Kagambi, now an experienced mountaineer, who has climbed Mt. Kenya from all possible routes in order to offer clients a first hand account of the best tracking itineraries.

He is a graduate of Utalii College, part of his training taking place at the Inter-continental Hotel, Frankfurt Mr Kagambi was Mr Modigell's assistant for a while at Jadini Beach Hotel/Africana Sea Lodge.

A major development presently underway by Alliance Hotels, is the complete renovation of the 75-year old Castle Hotel, a famous landmark in Mombasa.

Said Mr Modigell 'this is Alliance Hotels' current contribution towards the growth of the tourist industry' adding 'if all goes well we hope to embark on new projects in the very near future'.

SOUTH COAST

He went on 'we strongly believe in the possibility of tourism growing on the south coast based on its increasing popularity, regrettably, however, to the detriment of some of our competitors on the north coast, particularly Malindi'.

For now is the time to increasingly think ahead while the world is starting to recover from several years of recession.

On the question of more charter flights being allowed into Kenya, Mr Modigell said that most hotelkeepers' had welcomed government's decision to re-consider applications from selected foreign airlines,

as this would do much to boost tourism.

While, unfortunately, the decision had come too late to benefit the forth coming high season, more charters would do much to uplift occupancies thereafter.

Mr Modigell feels that coastal hotels and operators in particular should try and identify new markets 'because some existing ones are stretched to the limit due to insufficient aircraft seats being available.'

However, as far as the British market is concerned 'this still has high potential as it had not been able to operate competitively due to the lack of charter flights directly into Mombasa.'

New markets had already been identified by the Ministry of Tourism, particularly the USA 'because of the current strength of the US Dollar enabling many more Americans to travel abroad.'

Other destinations such as Japan and Australia should also be tapped, for statistics reveal that many from these two countries take long-haul holidays.

Mr Modigell mentioned that one should realise that 'existing markets can only be exploited so far, as only a small

percentage of the European population actually choose, or can afford, a long-haul destination holiday.'

He said it was 'encouraging to note the extremely high number of 'repeat' visitors from Europe. This was a clear sign that they considered the service and standards provided by Kenya hotels to be excellent value.'

As far as future developments in the tourist industry are concerned to meet Government's aim to cater for one million tourists in the near future, Mr Modigell suggested urgent

consideration be given to those wishing to develop local facilities.

He asserted that 'anyone doing a feasibility study on a new project at the moment is immediately discouraged by the extremely high cost of plant and machinery needed to be imported to run a high class operation. A contributory factor being the very high duty and tax now being levied.'

He described these to be 'so alarming as to immediately act as a deterrent to any would-be investor.'

DUTY AND TAXES

Mr Modigell said that laundries and kitchen equipment for example, now attract a duty of around 150 per cent Air conditioners which, five years ago, cost Shs. 5,000, are now around Shs. 16,500, and do not last long at the Coast.

He disclosed that Alliance Hotels has recently undertaken feasibility studies on two projects.

These had then to be re-structured, not only in the light of recent heavy backdated salary increases to hotel staff, but also due to increased duty and tax in this year's budget.

Mr Modigell mentioned that many competitive long-haul destinations have certain tax advantages to boost their tourist industry.

He feels this is something which needs to be considered by the relevant authorities here

DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

First Flights Operating Into New International Airport Terminal

THE NEW Dar es Salaam International Airport Terminal went into operation this week with the commencement of Commercial flight operations by both foreign airlines and the national carrier, Air Tanzania. The country's Prime Minister, Salim Ahmed Salim urged workers at the new Airport to cater for passengers with utmost courtesy and to maintain efficiency whilst on duty so as to promote the image of the airport and the country to travellers.

Salim also called upon the Air Tanzania Corporation (ATC) health, immigration, customs and sales tax officials to work as a team so as to be able to render good quality service to both foreign and local passengers.

He cited out instances when passengers were rudely told to open up their suitcases for custom checks and said such approaches had to be curbed immediately.

Salim said that baggage checks at customs was normal practice at all International Airports but what mattered most was the approach of customs officers to arriving and departing passengers.

The Prime Minister also said that the number of 'very important persons' (VIP's) privileged to use reserved lounges needs to be minimised in order to maintain high standards.

Salim also asked the airport authorities to maintain tight security to guard against vandalism at the new terminal which he termed as a modern

person suspected to have wanted to destroy certain documents for his own reasons.

The cause of the fire is based on findings of a three man Scotland yard team called into the country to help with investigations. The Police are reported to have established all circumstantial evidence related to the fire and court proceedings are expected to begin after the actual culprits are identified.

The police are also trying to establish whether the motive of the fire had emanated from within the bank or if there had been an outside hand.

Tourism Problems

On the tourism sector, the director of tourism in the country has said that deterioration of discipline amongst hotel employees and poor hotel services are the major drawbacks to the development and improvement of the national tourist industry here.

The director, Sotter Mushi, also cited other drawbacks like lack of adequate communications and cooperation between tourism related institutions, lack of qualified personnel in the sector, deterioration of discipline among hotel workers, unreliable local air and surface transport, old hotels, lack of adequate communications of essential items like drinks and food as well as shortage of vehicles, spare parts and lack of other important hotel equipment.

Other limiting factors pointed out by Mushi were the high rates being charged by hotels and other Tourist Institutions. He said that though Tanzania has a capacity of serving more than 400,000 tourists annually, which could generate almost three quarters of billion shillings in foreign exchange, the present shortcomings frustrated attainment of any such targets.

He said that over a ten year period stretching from 1976 to 1982, only an average of 80,000 tourists visited Tanzania annually, earning a total of 872.2 million shillings in foreign exchange.

Whilst operations at the Airport have begun, the official inauguration of the 850 million shillings (about 50 million dollars) complex will be made next week by President Nyerere. This will exactly coincide with the 30th Anniversary of the old Airport which opened in October 1954.

The extension and modernisation of the Airport is expected to raise passenger traffic to 1.5 million by 1990 and can enable all types of planes to land safely at the Airport.

The extension includes an increase of the runway from 2400 metres to 3000 metres and widening from 45 to 46 metres. Other new structures include the new terminal building with five pneumatic bridges attached for embarking and disembarking passengers, a 193 kilometres horizon scanning radar that can locate the position of an aircraft, give its number and nationality and a well equipped control tower.

Bank Of Tanzania

The first plane to land and mark an official start to operations was a scheduled British Airways flight direct from London.

Meanwhile in Dar es Salaam the fire that gutted the headquarters of the Bank of Tanzania (BOT) in April this year has been traced to a

'When The Boss Loves You And Your Work'

When the Kenya Institute of Management held a five-day seminar on the 'Effective Personal Secretary' at Mombasa Beach Hotel, one of the subjects discussed was how to deal with the 'Affectionate Boss'.

The consensus was that a secretary should not yield or encourage her boss, but have a tactful and intelligent approach to this rather

sensitive issue.

It was a case of genuine love, then the boss and secretary should not work in the same office together.

The course was conducted by Robert Ouko, KIM's training administrative manager who, the previous week, was taking a five day course for Managers (the bosses) at this hotel which included discussion on how to treat a secretary properly.

Attending the 'Effective Personal Secretary' course were also participants from Nairobi and Webuye. It also covered book-keeping, good public relations and self-development.

Here participants said they preferred to be designated 'Personal Assistants' rather than 'Secretaries', for when the boss is away they act on his behalf. They felt they should be given the opportunity of advancement through 'on the job' training.

Swissair Advance Service

EFFECTIVE October 28, Swissair is to reintroduce its advance seat reservation facility on short-haul flight for passengers travelling in Business Class or who have paid the full Economy Class fare.

The facility was temporarily dropped in Spring when the airline launched its three-class system.

Business and Economy Class cabin divisions on the Airbus A310 and DC-9 aircraft vary from flight to flight in accordance with demand and some time was necessary at the beginning to gain experience with the new system.

The advance seat reservation facility allows passengers to state their preference for a window/aisle seat in the smoking/non-smoking section up to two weeks before departure. Specific individual seats can then be reserved in the 14 days before take-off.

BIG STEEL CARGO GOES 'MISSING'

OVER 8,000 TONNES of steel has been stolen in transit somewhere between the port of Dar es Salaam and Lusaka.

The stolen consignment was part of the 115,000 tonnes of steel donated to Zambia by North Korea for the construction of a multimillion kwacha

complex of the National Institute for Planning and Management, and almost certainly disappeared at Dar-es-Salaam.

The revelation by President Kaunda of the missing consignment coincided with the visit to Lusaka of a principal secretary in the Tanzanian Ministry of Communication and Works, Odia Ongara, who was in the Zambian capital to persuade importers and exporters to use the port of Dar es Salaam.

Ongara, however, assured Zambian exporters and importers that security at the port had improved with more stringent regulations adopted by port authorities.

He said while four years ago the port had over 200 forwarding and clearing agents, the number had been reduced to less than 50.

The large number of agents created confusion which enabled some of them to steal cargo and involve themselves in other clandestine activities at the port.

"We had to reduce the number of agents, and we intend to reduce the number further to ensure proper accounting of goods at the port while they are still in our hands", he said, adding that the wagon turn-around time on Tazara from Dar es Salaam to Zambia has now improved from more than 29 days to less than a week.

The Tanzanian government is now expecting to secure a loan of \$62m from the World Bank and other international donor agencies for the rehabilitation of Dar es Salaam port.

'MERCURY LINE MAY HAVE DISAPPEARED'

ONE OF the regular liner services trading from Mombasa to the Arabian Gulf over a number of years latterly extending to Karachi has been the Hongkong based Mercury Line. However, this seems to have disappeared into the mists of history as Dodwells, the Local Agents, no longer advertise the service which used to be monthly and sometimes bi-monthly operated by the Mercury Lake and Mercury Gulf being the two most frequent callers.

The Mercury Lines last sailing was in July by the Mercury Lake which vessel has now gone to the ship-breakers.

Another quiet withdrawal from Mombasa has been the Manta Line Ro Ro Trader which I noticed accidentally was no longer at the Port Reitz anchorage and must have sailed during the first few days of September.

Since the collapse of the Manta Line she has faced an uncertain future and been subject to legal restraints from time to time whilst on the Coast. The longest serving incumbents in Kilindini of the defunct Manta Line are the Franky and Copper Trader which were put up for auction on instructions of the Admiralty Marshal in August.

I understand that Swedish interests bought them for Scrap and that in due course they will be towed (presumably in tandem) across the Indian Ocean to be broken up in Karachi.

Referring to my notes last week on the Palm Oil carrier Trinity Botany, which ultimately found herself waiting for one week to berth at Shimanzi Terminal, due to a slip of the pen I stated she had arrived from Dola in the Cameroons, West Africa whereas in fact her cargo of Palm Oil had been loaded in Malaysia and she was destined to sail for Douala after Mombasa.

PANAMA FLAG

Another Palm Oil discharger was due on Wednesday of this week to discharge 7,000 tons at Shimanzi. She is the Panama flag, Japanese owned Fujikaze No. 3, built in 1977. She has a carrying capacity of some 8,000 tons of edible oils.

Although tankers due to berth at Shimanzi have lately experienced heavy delays, this cannot be said for the dry cargo berths where the average occupancy last week was 4 or 5 vessels only. With the turn-around of ships becoming faster as the port tends to perfect its expertise in container handling, the low berth occupancy trend will undoubtedly continue.

vessels nowadays, unlike a few years ago when 12 in port at one time was no exception. However, early this week two Korean vessels, the *Kingstar 315* and *Kingstar 316* arrived at Mtongwe to carry out a transhipment operation into a mother ship, the Japanese *Koshi Maru*. Another fishing vessel, the *Cima No. 701*, was also due this week for bunkers and water.

I must take issue over a shipping item which appeared in one of our National Dailies stating that the Mediterranean Shipping Company was "the only line whose vessels call regularly at Mogadishu, Somalia during the Monsoon period". I hasten to mention four members of the Conference Lines namely, DOAL, Lloyd Triestino, Messina and Nedlloyd whose vessels call at Mogadishu all the year round before M.S.C. had even been established.

Please do not overlook the pioneers of the trade!

Another West German owned vessel flying the Cyprus flag is the 11,100 d.w. ton *Cape Gata* which should now be in port to discharge 2,340 of relief food cargo from the United States.

A first time Zim caller, the Israeli flag 15,000 tons gross *Zim New Orleans*, built in 1979 is due tomorrow to load 800 tons and discharge 500 tons, all containerised. An interval of several years has elapsed since one of the Zim Line owned fleet has called at Mombasa.

Another Zim line vessel, first time caller the chartered Panamanian flag *Esti* has been discharging and loading this week so it seems Zim are stepping up their liner service.

Due on Sunday is another Maize discharger with the pleasant sounding name of *Ming Jade*, owned by the Hongkong Ming Wah Shipping Co. Ltd., Hongkong. However, she flies the Panamanian flag. Most vessels with the prefix *Ming* are owned by Yangming, the Taiwanese progressive national line who have a large modern fleet of cellular container ships and bulk carriers.

An arrival in the early part of this week to discharge was an extra sailing on the D.S.R. (East German) liner service to East Africa. She has not called before at Mombasa, although she is 7 years old.

I refer to the 7,500 d.w. ton *Schonwalde* normally on her Owners' Mediterranean trade, which is calling to discharge 1,000 tons steel billets loaded at Rostock in Eastern Germany.

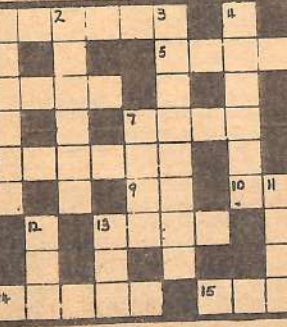

Minister Ouko Advises On 'Management Role'

PEOPLE appointed to senior positions in the public and private sector should not take their appointments as rewards to their past deeds but as a challenge for their present and future performance, the Labour Minister, Dr. Robert Ouko has said.

Dr. Ouko was speaking at a dinner hosted by the Federation of Kenya Employers at Taita Hills Lodges where 24 delegates were attending a policy workshop on the 'Role of Management in Nation Building'.

Dr. Ouko told the workshop that some people in responsible positions became deadwood soon after such appointments because they imagined their jobs were rewards.

The Minister appealed to the delegates to help the Government root out all malpractices in the labour movement, saying that as long as there was corruption in high places the economy would remain at a standstill.

He expressed concern that some project implementation officers deliberately delayed projects because their aims

were to get personal cuts.

Dr. Ouko urged wananchi to shun tribalism, mudslinging and witch hunting in the course of their duties.

The Minister noted that retiring officers should impart knowledge to their successors in good spirit. He said it was imperative to have a clear line of succession which meant a contribution of sound economy.

Chief Secretary

The workshop was also addressed by Mr. S. Nyachae, Chief Secretary, Office of the President, Mr. H. Mule, Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Finance and Mr. A. Kandie, Permanent Secretary-Director of Personnel Management, Office of the President as well as noted businessmen and finance personnel.

The workshop, the first of its kind was organised by the Federation of Kenya Employers, under the chairmanship of Mr. Tom D. Owuor, Executive Director, F.K.E., in conjunction with the international Labour Organization and the Nonwage Employers Confederation.

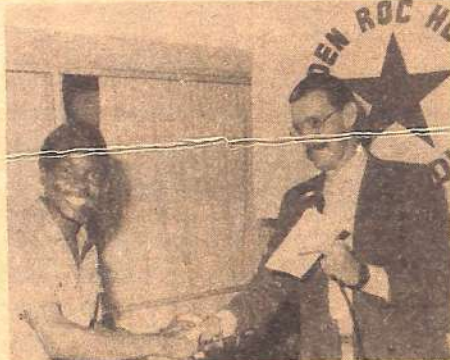

Tsavo Safari Camp For Idyllic Park Experience

GETTING AWAY from it all for a weekend of complete tranquillity at Tsavo Safari Camp were members and guests of the SKAL Club of Mombasa led by its chairman, Sean Gavaghan.

Colleagues are leading personalities in the tourist industry, and weekends together are very popular.

The camp situated just 27 km from Mito Andei is the only one in the "Northern Area" of Tsavo East National Park which covers some 5,000 sq. miles.

It has been described as one of the largest uninhabited areas left in Africa. It has a wide variety of plains game while a herd of some 1,000 buffalo was seen recently. Tsavo Safari Camp has permission from the Game Warden to take safaris around this Northern Area.

Just an hour's drive away from the camp is the Tiva River which attracts a large concentration of game.

David Sheldrick

Lionel Nutter, manager of Tsavo Safari Camp, revealed that they had just received permission to take over the derelict concrete observation post built by David Sheldrick, former warden of Tsavo East National Park.

Mr Sheldrick died in June 1977 after a tireless struggle against poaching. His ability as a naturalist will long be remembered by conservationists throughout the world.

The two-storey building has eight beds, kitchen, lounge with terrace overlooking a permanent spring which feeds the Tiva River, the only source of water for miles around.

It is being renovated and staffed by Tsavo Safari Camp so that guests can stay here overnight.

Mr Nutter reports there are lots of game around, including lions.

Tsavo Safari Camp was originally Cotter's Camp established some twenty years ago. Cotter, father and son, worked there until the site was over in 1966 and was taken over in 1974 by African Safari Club.

Bought by Rajni Desai, the Managing Director of Kilimanjaro Safari Club group which also manages Amboseli Lodge, Mombasa Safari Lodge as well as Kiliana Lodge just below Mombasa.

Yatta Plateau

A magnificent backdrop to Tsavo Safari Camp is the Yatta Plateau, an odd geological feature almost geometrically shaped along the northern horizon. Two km wide, it runs for some 90 km and is consequently claimed by many to be the world's longest lava flow.

Very popular with guests are

the sundowner parties organised by the Camp on top of the plateau from where Mt. Kilimanjaro can best be seen as the sun goes down.

Touristic Union International/Touroopa offer in their programme a seven day 'Stay Put' holiday at Tsavo Safari Camp, with Pollman's Tours & Safari taking them to the camp and back. Guests have a choice of a variety of day safaris organised by the Camp to Amboseli Lodge, Mzima Springs, the Chyulus, Tiva River, Lugard Falls. A night stop-over at Amboseli Lodge can also be arranged.

Tsavo Safari Camp is equipped with seven four-wheel drive vehicles, and also offers half-day game drives, as well as sundowner parties on the Yatta Plateau and fishing trips.

If you are willing to take the risk, walking safaris with a fully armed Park Ranger can be arranged enabling one to take a closer look at bird, plant and animal life.

Tsavo Safari Camp is presently a green oasis in an area which has been starved of rain for about ten months. The Athi River has virtually dried up, leaving only a few pools.

The camp gets its drinking water from a bore-hole, while spring water from the Chyulu Hills found in the Athi River is used for other purposes.

A big welcome awaited Skalleagues from Lionel Nutter, Manager, and Catherine Horsey, Asst. Manager, as well as an ice-cold drink after the journey by road from Mombasa.

Swimming Pool

The camp has forty-two comfortable beds in well appointed and equipped tents, each with its own separate washing and toilet facilities complete with hot/cold showers.

Its Crystalline swimming pool has an adjacent bar with the surrounding lawn just dotted with sunbeds.

Skalleagues enjoyed a delicious dinner of French Onion Soup, Fillet Steak and Poissin, Fruit Mousse. They loved the hot home-made rolls and Tabasco-like sauce. There was a big clamour for its recipe.

With a roaring camp fire outside the bar throughout the evening, Skalleagues settled down to some exciting darts with matches against a camp team led by its manager.

The camp specialises in tasty home cooking, and on Sunday a curry/cold buffet is served which includes a spectacular range of desserts. The cook is Benson Hilton who has been with them for eleven years.

Conveniently situated at the back of the camp is a landing

strip for light aircraft.

Mr Nutter reports that more local people are spending weekends there, while others stay a night while driving to the coast from up-country or vice-versa.

Mr Nutter was born in this country, and is a Kenya citizen. He has had seventeen years experience in the tourist industry, including safari work which has taken him throughout Central Africa.

He has also worked at Baringo Lodge, Baringo Island Camp, as well as Jambo Hotels, Malindi.

Catherine Horsey, Asst. Manager, has had nine years experience in the hotel industry and is a Kenya citizen. Her brother David is a well-known rally driver in Kenya, while sister Ruth is cateress at Governor's Camp, Maasai Mara.

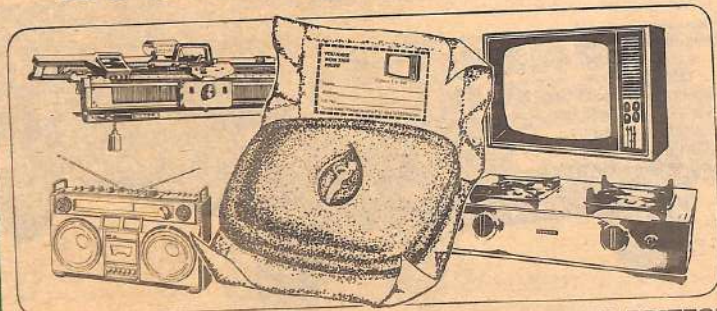
SALT LICK LODGE and its surrounding Taita Hills game sanctuary have just broken all previous records with their exceptional game viewing.

The new tented camp, is sited 2 km from the main entrance to the Masai Mara and is the first venture for Sarova Hotels out of a major city.

PRIVATE bathrooms

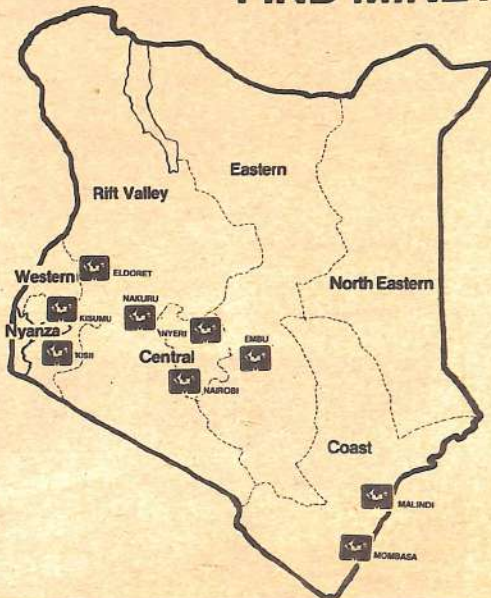
He was also Food and Beverage Manager at the 3,000 bed Hotel Century Plaza. Los

'Animation' Team Ensures 'Never A Dull Moment ...'

There is a 11-strong 'Animation' team, eight of whom are from KENYA, WHO KEEP THE ACTION GOING. Each day there is a programme of exciting events.

For those who feel shy about using a surf board for the first time, they can participate in a 'Surf Happening' when, sometime, as many as forty guests take to the beach to try these out together with the windsurfing instructor.

It all becomes great fun falling into the sea and being fished out by lots of newly made friends ready to get you back on your board again.

Sometimes, when the tide is out, there are Adventure Trips to the reef for games and drinks, sailing there in traditional Ngalaw as with African boatmen.

A great happening for the Staff, who are all very football conscious and have their own team, is the opportunity to play against guests.

For 'Keep Fit' fans there is jogging along the white-sand uncluttered beach to Jadini Beach Hotel and back, which usually attracts between 25-30 at a time.

There are also gymnastics either in the gardens or swimming pool. Guests from Europe love the opportunity to exercise in the fresh ozone-laden sun-kissed air.

On the outsized chessboard on the Restaurant Terrace,

gymnastics and aerobics take place to music, while body-building classes are held in the garden.

There are, also classes in Yoga and Swahili with a target for guests from overseas learning ninety-nine words before they leave.

At-fresco concerts of classical music take place under shady trees, and there are all kinds of tournaments as well as lessons for beginners in table tennis, tennis, water polo, volleyball, soccer, archery and darts.

To enable guests to meet the local people and study the environment around them, bush walks are organised.

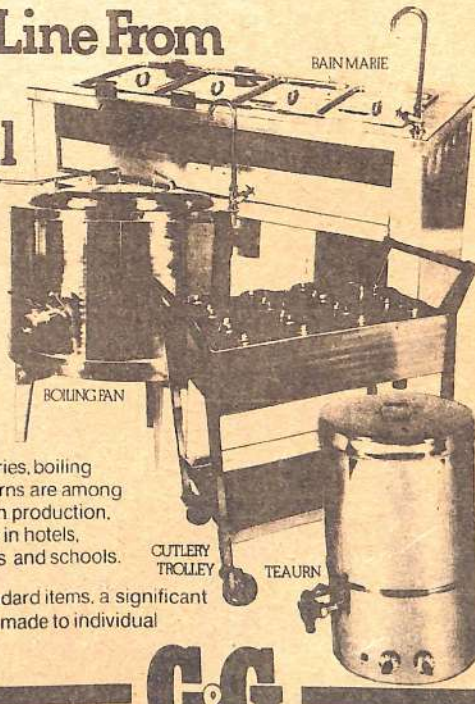



GROBE PLÄNE FÜR DEN KILINDINI HAFEN

EINE VON Amerika finanzierte Studie über die Erweiterung der Hafenanlage von Mombasa befrwortet ein Entwicklungsprogramm in Dongo Kundu, das auf über US \$ 104 Millionen zu stehen kommt. Das Projekt, dessen Durchführung sich über eine Zeitspanne von sechs Jahren erstrecken würde, schließt den Ausbau der bestehenden Hafenanlage, einen Export-Abfertigungszone, direkten Eisenbahnschluss, sowie ein Industriegebiet ein. Durch diese Entwicklung sollen Exporte erhöht, Arbeitsplätze geschaffen und die Handelsbilanz von Kenia verbessert werden.

Das Projekt sieht neue und verbesserte Liegeplätze für loses Getreide und Mineralien vor sowie eine Eisenbahnver-

bindung zwischen Dongo Kundu, dem Süden von Port Reitz (Flughafen) und dem westlichen Festland.

Die Kosten für die geplante Eisenbahnverbindung werden auf US \$ 8,9 Millionen geschätzt.

Auf dem Industriegebiet sind vorgesehen: eine Fabrik zur Verarbeitung von Früchten und Fisch, eine Misch- und Verpackungsanlage für Düngemittel, eine Getreidemühle, ein Stahlwerk, ein Traktorenwerk und andere vom Industrie-

ministerium bestimmte Industrien. Das Projekt soll 1987 in Angriff genommen werden und zwischen 1990 und dem Jahr 2000 anlaufen.

TRANSTAINER

Die beiden separaten Verladeanlagen für lose Trocken- und für Containerfrachten werden unterstützt durch zusätzliche Lagerhäuser sowie durch das bereits bestehende Transtainersystem im Hafen.

Dongo Kundu wird als idealer Platz betrachtet für die Export-Abfertigungszone wegen seiner Lage in der Nähe des Hafens und des Flugplatzes. Gemäß der Statistik der Hafenbehörde müssten die Schiffe mit allgemeiner Fracht ab 1990 mit unverhältnismäßig langen Wartezeiten rechnen; das gleiche gilt für Containerschiffe ab 1995.

PROGNOSE

Die Benützung der Verladeanlage für Fracht würde 1995 100% erreichen, und der Containerhafen wäre im Jahre 2000 zu 78% ausgelastet. Diese Prognose zeigt deutlich, daß nach dem Jahr 2000 der anfallende Schiffsverkehr die Hafenkapazität bei weitem übersteigen würde.

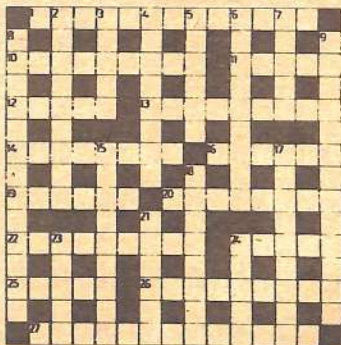

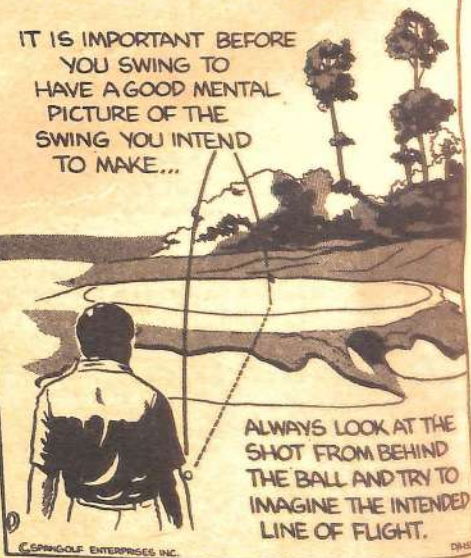
