Diwali, The Festival Of Lights

Diwali is one of the biggest festival of Hindus, celebrated with great enthusiasm and happiness in Kenya and across the World.

The festival is celebrated for five continuous days, where the third days is celebrated as the main Diwali festival or 'Festival of lights', writes REISHI ARUN PARIKH.

Different colorful varieties of fireworks are always associated with this festival.

On this auspicious day, people light up diyas and candles all around their house.

They perform Laxmi Puja in the evening and seek divine blessings of Goddess of Wealth.

The festival of Diwali is never complete without exchange of gifts. People present Diwali gifts to all near and dear ones.

The exact day of the festival is decided by the position of the Moon. According to the Hindu Calendar, Amavasya or 'no moon day' is considered as the perfect day to celebrate Diwali.

This dark night comes after every fortnight and in the month of Kartik, it marks this festival of lights and diyas.

As per the English calendar, the festival generally comes in

the month of November and December.

For all the Hindu people, the festival holds an imperative meaning since the festival is



reckoned with Lord Rama's victory as the King of Ayodhya after his return to the kingdom from 14 years of exile along with his wife Sita and brother Laxman after killing the demon King, Ravana.

The festival is celebrated by lighting diyas and candles to

drive away the darkness of Amavasya.

Diwali Meaning and Significance

Deepavali is a festival where people from all age groups participate.

They give expression to their happiness by lighting earthen 'diyas' (lamps), decorating the houses, bursting firecrackers and inviting near and dear ones to their households for partaking in a sumptuous feast.

The lighting of lamps is a way of paying obeisance to god for attainment of health, wealth, knowledge, peace, valor and fame.

It is one time in the whole year that children volunteer to leave their beds long before the day begins.

In fact, the traditional oil bath at 3 a.m, is the only chore that stands between them and the pre-dawn adventures.

They emerge, scrubbed clean to get into their festive attire, and light up little oil lamps, candles and scented sticks (agarbathis), there after setting aight crackers and sparklers.

On Diwali night, little clay lamps are lit in Hindus homes, but now a days colored electric lamps are also used.

What is the significance of lighting a lamp?

There is a logical answer to this question.

It is through the light that the beauty of this world is revealed or experienced.

Most civilizations of the world recognize the importance of light as a gift of God.

It has always been a symbol of whatever is positive in our world of experience.

To Hindus, darkness represents ignorance, and light is a metaphor for knowledge.

Therefore, lighting a lamp symbolizes the destruction, through knowledge, of all negative forces, wickedness, violence, lust, anger, envy, greed, bigotry, fear, injustice, oppression and suffering, etc.

Competition is stiff, and even the little girl in silk frocks and their

finery are watching out for the best sparklers and flowerpots, the rockets and Vishnuachakras, which light-up the night sky like a thousand stars.

Grown ups are the soul of generosity.

Festive bonhomie abounds. Blessings galore.

Taita Hills closely followed by one of the teams from Wildlife Works with Lumo's rangers coming in third.

An overseas sponsor gave some local teachers the chance to get out and explore their Sanctuary so that they could then return with groups of school children to learn how the wildlife on their doorstep can be a benefit not a threat.

Ksh1.8m was raised and a great deal of fun and adventure was had by all.

New 'Single Tourist Visa'

FROM FRONT PAGE During the third Infrastructure Summit of heads of states from EAC member countries on Monday in Kigali, the four countries including Uganda, Kenya, Rwanda and South Sudan fast tracked regional development through infrastructure, trade and political and economic integration.

In the implementation process, Rwanda will procure the first batch of visa stickers by December 2013, followed by Kenya in March 2014 and Uganda in June 2014, according to the same source.

With the new move, EAC member countries argue that time spent moving goods along the corridor will reduce from 18 days to 5 days from Mombasa to Kampala and from 21 days to 8 days from Mombasa to Kigali.

Specifically, the protocol aims to maximize benefits from sustainable tourism and wildlife for the people of the community, develop a collective and coordinated approach to the promotion and marketing of East Africa as a single tourist destination and harmonize policies in wildlife and tourism sectors.

Under the same protocol, the partner states will standardize classification of tourism facilities and services within the community, enhance cross-border efforts in the protection and monitoring of wildlife and wildlife areas against encroachment, poaching and other illegal activities, collaborate in establishing viable wildlife populations and species diversity and facilitate research, monitoring and information management and sharing in tourism and wildlife sectors.

Kenyans Have Decided That 'Turn Indicator' Has An Additional Use!

The previous CEO of Safaricom and a good friend of mine - one MJ, is remembered in many circles for his one line response as to why at the time the network was very inefficient on Friday evening.

He was widely reported to have said that it was because of "the peculiar calling habits of Kenyans".

This statement caused an outrage amongst Kenyans since they felt that they were being criticised unfairly by one mzungu who had no authority to speak on Kenya and its people.

This statement has however now entrenched itself into the lingo that Kenyans use in their everyday conversation and it is this statement that we would like to pursue and look at some of the peculiar driving habits of Kenyans.

The statements below should be considered in the context Kenya where we drive on the left.

The first one that has been around for some time and is not seen as peculiar is the habit that drivers have of using indicator to tell whoever might be watching, but preferably the driver behind, whether or not it is safe to overtake.

This is only done on single lane roads where such a situation can occur.

So why do I consider this a peculiar habit?

It stems from the original Highway Code when motorised transport first started.

Starting with the days of steam driven vehicles at the turn of the twentieth century, it was always a given that the driver of the engine would stick out their right hand to indicate that they intended to turn right and the

little orange lever even at night.

Size was obviously a limitation as one would have to be up close sometimes to be able to see the lever.

The next improvement in this mechanism was when the indicator was converted into orange lights that were at the four extremities of the vehicle. A driver would switch on the lights to indicate which direction they intended to turn in and such information would be available to drivers following them as well as drivers who were approaching.

The lights were static and did not flash as they now.

The flashing action was brought in to make sure that drivers were able to see the orange turn indicators and also to differentiate them from the other lights on the cluster.

And that is where the "technology" of turn indication has reached today.

For completeness sake, when all four orange lights on the extremities of a vehicle are switched on at the same time and they all flash, it now means that there is a hazardous situation.

This can be because of the vehicle that is flashing its lights or as a result of a situation that exists ahead of that vehicle.

So why have we taken so much time to describe the evolution of the turn indicator?

The reason is that Kenyans decided that the turn indicator should have an additional use

that no one else in the world (or precious few others who have learned from Kenyans) actually does.

It is the act of using turn indicators not for only for their original purpose but to also inform the vehicle behind that there is an oncoming vehicle so that they should not overtake.

Using the same signal to mean two things is just not on but we have persisted as Kenyans.

It started with matatu drivers but has now been adopted as a national signal.

The driver behind must make an informed judgement as to whether the right indicating signal is informing them that the driver ahead intends to turn right or is conveying another message - like there is an oncoming vehicle.

It is likely that one will be wrong fifty per cent of the time.

The same thing applies when the left hand signal is applied.

It could mean that the driver intends to turn left or that the road ahead is clear and one can overtake.

It has become so entrenched as to cause heated arguments when accidents happen as a result of the driver behind making the wrong judgement of what the turn signal was meant to portray.

The decision by the driver who puts on the indicator lights to indicate whether it is safe to overtake or not is based on their own judgement of the risks.

same would apply to the left hand.

Most of this was inherited from horse riding practices.

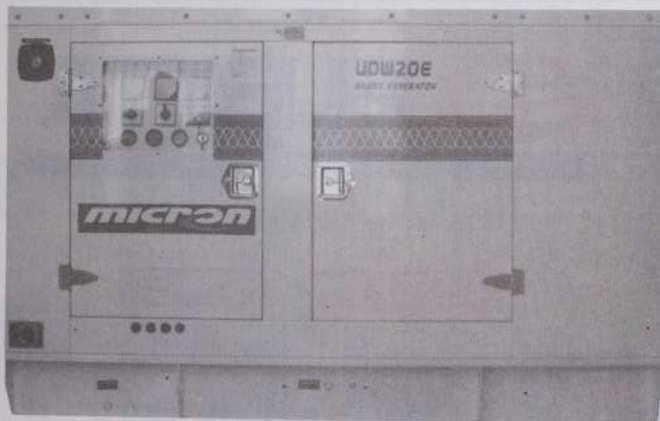
When we graduated to having internal combustion engines and the car as we know it today appeared, the driver then had to do the same but this time they had to stick their hand out straight to indicate that they were turning right and the hand would have a circular motion with the finger pointing down to indicate that the driver was turning left.

In time these actions were replaced first by little orange levers that stuck out on the right of the car for a right turn and on the left side of the car for a left turn.

As night driving became a wish and was facilitated, these levers were also provided with lights so that one would see this bright

CONTINUES PAGE SIX This is subjective and puts whichever driver makes decisions based on this information at the mercy of the driver providing the information.

The driver ahead does not know how the car behind can behave or the mental model of the driver behind the wheel.

They give the information based on their own model of how they quickly a car can accelerate, how fast the driver behind can react and also their perception of the speeds of other vehicles on the road and which are around them.

All these are areas where they are invariably wrong and a driver acting on the judgement of the car ahead can end up in serious trouble - to the extent that they could have a fatal accident. My style is to consider an indicator purely as a turn signal and use my own driving instincts and habits as well as the Highway Code information and advice to make judgments as to what I should do on the road.

One must do all the things they are taught to do before they make a decision to overtake a vehicle.

First, stay sufficiently behind the vehicle in front so that you are able to see a reasonable section of the road ahead.

Nose out to the right to check the condition of the road ahead and if the conditions do not provide a safe proposition for overtaking than pull back into the lane and wait for a short while and check again. Good conditions for overtaking are that one should have clear sight of at least five hundred metres of road ahead.

There should be no turnings off the road either left or right and visibility should be good - and this is not just weather wise but also dependant on how much smoke a vehicle ahead is belching out! There are other considerations but these are the two main things that will aid one to make the right decision as to when to overtake.

We need to get rid of this habit of using turn indicators to signal whether it is safe to overtake as it is using a good tool for the wrong thing. I agree that there is need to develop a tool to convey this message and perhaps we need to have a bright white light at the four extremities of a car that say flashes in clusters of three flashes.

When the right hand set flashes, it indicates that there is oncoming traffic and the left hand flashes it would indicate that the road ahead is clear.

With this additional information the driver behind can now make a better decision after taking into account all the normal factors that one has to when deciding to overtake.

It is an area that vehicle designers and road safety experts should perhaps consider and do some research on and if found to be suitable, be introduced globally.

This would require a large collaborative global approach as it would be a big change in the design of vehicles that adds something completely new in the communication tools that a driver has. The implementation would have to be carefully managed and impacts post implementation closely monitored to ensure that the expected benefits accrue.

As Kachumbari says, the art of driving is dynamic to the extent that Kenyans can develop their own peculiar habit.

Poachers Snare Kills Baby Elephant

A baby elephant of approximately 2 years old was recently found dead at a private game sanctuary.

Upon close examination, the cause of death was clearly from a poachers snare that had completely cut off the baby's trunk as the poor animal probably attempted to free it self in an attempt to rejoin its mother.

It is impossible to imagine the amount of pain and suffering this baby went through over the last few days, slowly succumbing to starvation, dehydration and heavy blood loss.

Residents of villages surrounding many national parks and reserves have increasingly turned to bush meat poaching with

snares that they leave behind concealed among bushes to trap game meat.

As these poachers attempt to catch Dik-Dik, Warthog and the like, unfortunately these traps are unforgiving and will literally capture anything that gets caught in it, with most victims being the juveniles of wildlife such as Cheetahs, Lions and as shown here elephants.

Organizations such as Care For The Wild and the Kenya Wildlife Service tirelessly

conduct de-snaring operations regularly to rid the parks of these death traps and can even collect over 200 snares a day.

Poachers however secretly return to replace the lost snares and the vicious cycle continues.

Members of the public are encouraged to contact the nearest KWS or Police stations with assurance of full confidentiality to help track the illegal bush meat poachers and stop the needless killing of our wild animals.

MEASURES UNVEILED TO STOP POACHING

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Road blocks manned by armed police officers are to be introduced in Laikipia County in north-west Kenya to reduce poaching of rhinos and elephants, local official said on Monday.

Laikipia is one of the counties that have been hit by poaching crime in Kenya, which has increased in the recent past, targeting rhinos for their horns and elephants for their ivory.

"It is unfortunate that most elephants killed in Kenya are killed in Laikipia. We shall as part of efforts to reduce this crime introduce security roadblocks," County Governor Joshua Irungu told Xinhua in an interview in Nairobi on Monday.

The roadblocks will be supplemented by other initiatives, including a drive to make policy changes to enable more locals benefit from wildlife through tourism for instance, and also economically empower them to reduce motivation to aid crime like poaching.

Xinhua could not ascertain the number of elephants killed in Laikipia in the past year as officials said data is still being compiled.

But they said it was clear that of all the elephants and rhinos killed in Kenya, most were in Laikipia, the vast open savanna land rich in biodiversity located in central Kenya region, north of Mount Kenya.

The roadblocks are expected to intercept vehicles being used to carry ivory and rhino horns as well as act as a deterrent to poachers through introduction of visible policing, said the governor.

The roadblocks are also expected to help reduce the general rate of crime in the country including incidences of poaching as well as help improve community policing.

Leaders in Laikipia however believe that the bigger picture is to address the issue of wildlife benefits to the local people so that they are motivated to take care of the animals and also take measure to reduce human wildlife conflicts.

"Everything must be done to ensure that the people here benefit from wildlife through tourism and other means," said John Weller, the General Manager of OI Jogi Limited, a 58,000-acre ranch situated in Laikipia.

The ranch is rich in wildlife and also rears beef cows. It has now upgraded its tourism division so as to increase the number of tourists visiting the ranch which features a rhino sanctuary, a wildlife rescue center and a veterinary clinic that attend to wild animals from across the world.

Weller believes that as tourists numbers to the ranch increase so will be the expansion of employment opportunities for the locals, hence enabling the local benefit to the wildlife resource. The ranch currently employs 400 people.

In the past week, the ranch opened a new wildlife corridor that is meant to ease the migration of wild animals from one ranch to the other, and also help reduce the human-wildlife conflict and crop damage.

Jane Punoti, the Executive Committee Member for Tourism in Laikipia said measures that help reduce human-wildlife conflict will help conserve the wildlife and therefore attract more tourists which in turn will benefit more local people.

"Tourism has not helped our people before. So this is the time that we are putting in place structures as a County Government to ensure that the public benefits from the resource," she told Xinhua.

She said in addition to policy measures being undertaken, the County government has also liberalized tourism sector.

For instance, the country is working with partners in private and non-profit sectors to establish a tourism market where locals can sell their wares and with premises that are well built to attract high value buyers.

"We are also setting up a cultural center known as Twala Cultural Centre that will in particular help the local women benefit directly from higher tourism numbers," she said. She said empowering the locals to benefit from tourism will improve their level of protection of wildlife and provide vital intelligence that will help defeat poaching.

The county government has also proposed to form a savings and credit society scheme for all women, where loans and grants from the governments and donors meant to empower the women will be channeled through.

According to Benedict Mbugua, the Deputy County Commissioner of Laikipia, poaching is a reality in Laikipia County, which must be addressed holistically.

"One of the reasons we are facing challenges fighting this crime is that we have shortage of Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) officers," he said. KWS has an armed wing of rangers whose duty is to protect wildlife.

Bomet Quarry Collapse Kills Five

NAROK (Xinhua) — At least five people were buried alive and one rescued with serious injuries in a quarry collapse in the southwest of Kenya, local medics and witnesses reported on Friday.

The six were mining sand at Tulwetab Mosonik quarry in Bomet County when the accident occurred early in the day, four years after a similar tragedy in the same area.

The upper part of the deeply excavated sand quarry collapsed sending large boulders to cover the miners who were scooping sand from a deeper side of the mine.

The rescue team saved a man who had been trapped in the rubble of the collapsed quarry for two hours. Doctors said the survivor was in stable but serious condition.

They said he had suffered fractures in various parts of the body including legs, arms and back due to heavy rubble which fell on him.

An eyewitness Julius Koech said they were preparing to start mining sand when walls at the quarry started falling.

"I was basking in the sun a few meters from the quarry and had

to run for my dear life when the walls started falling," Koech told Xinhua.

"Seven of us were at the site which collapsed and I only escape because I was feeling some cold and went a few meters to bask in the sun and all my colleagues were buried," he

added. Koech said his colleagues who were in a deeper side of the miner were caught up in the rubble before they could move out.

National Assembly Deputy Speaker Joyce Laboso, who visited the scene, described the incident as tragic and very

unfortunate saying it could have been averted if miners were followed the safety precautions.

The incident happened at a time when the county government was moving to stop quarrying activities for the safety of miners.

Since its launch in 2008, the expo has fostered fruitful cooperation in tackling global challenges including hunger, poverty, climate change and diseases.

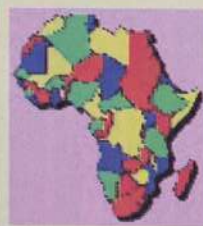
The international community supports partnership among emerging nations to share experience and best practices that would catalyze sustainable development.

World Bank Seeks Innovative Activities

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — The World Bank on Tuesday launched a survey on innovative activities and outcomes for manufacturing and services firms in Kenya and several developing and emerging countries.

The Innovation Follow-up Module to the Enterprise Survey will enable the World Bank to better understand innovation, productivity and economic growth in Kenya, the World Bank said in a statement issued in Nairobi.

"The results of this extensive data collection exercise will

inform the government and policy makers of where things are working and what areas require improvements in Kenya," said Jorge Rodriguez Meza, the World Bank group's Program Manager, Enterprise Analysis.

"An innovative private sector is crucial for sustainable growth and may lead to increased employment opportunities, economic growth and prosperity," Meza added.

The survey, which starts this month, will cover areas including Mombasa, Nairobi, Nakuru and Nyanza. The Kenya Enterprise Survey will provide data on 720 establishments in Kenya and will be completed in a few months.

The data from the Innovation Follow-up Module will be available by April 2014. To ensure reliability of the collected data and to protect the identity of the interviewed firms, the World Bank Group guarantees confidentiality of individual information of firms.

The World Bank said data collection module is part of a broader project in Africa and South Asia that includes interviews with 540 manufacturing and services companies in Kenya, over 5,000 companies in several African countries, and over 4,000 companies in South Asia.

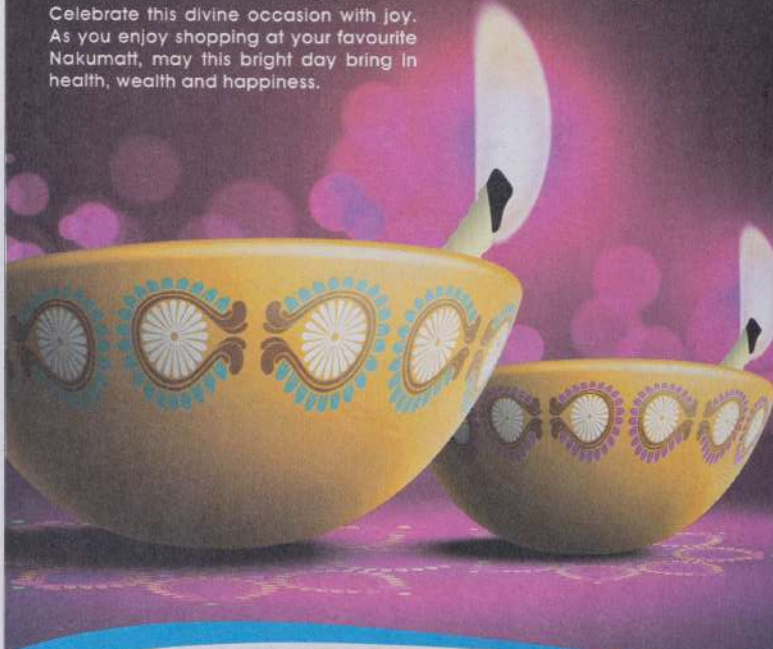

Braeburn Students Brave Freezing Temperatures To Conquer Mt. Kilimanjaro!

During half term a group of 18 students and 2 members of staff braved high altitude, freezing temperatures and not so pleasant toilets to try to conquer the world's tallest free standing mountain - Mount Kilimanjaro in aid of KESHO and KSPCA.

Students and parents had an early start meeting at school at 4 a.m. to get luggage packed and on the road.

The anticipation, excitement and apprehension were palpable. The first few days were tougher than we had expected.

From Day two onwards we saw students slowly experiencing the effects of altitude - early morning wake up calls from students who were sick in their sleeping bags, quiet walks whilst others battled with headaches and feelings of nausea.

Day three saw a number of students feeling ill as we reached altitudes of 4600m; definitely not our finest moment but once against our students showed compassion towards each other, support and an

abundance of hugs were provided.

As we reached each camp our story was spreading and many others climbers were interested to pass on their words of good luck and discover how we were all getting on.

When we reached our summit camp - Barafu Camp we met a gentleman who had heard about this crazy school group attempting to climb to roof of Africa - he wasted no time in telling us we had no chance of making it to the top!

A challenge our students strongly accepted and took a "watch this space" stance on his/less than kind words.

That evening, knowing we all had a tough night ahead, students were provided with letters from home - a truly special moment, we had tears before they had even opened them, students relished in sharing their parent's motivational messages with others and we laughed and cried as a group.

We headed off to bed hoping to get some sleep before our 1 a.m. wake up - sleep became more and more difficult with altitude and this was not helped by the howling winds ripping through our tents.

At 1 a.m. we were up and dressed in what felt like 900 layers ready to face the Baltic temperatures.

The pace is slow as you make your way up to Stella point and Uhuru Peak and tiredness really takes over your eyes, every step causes strain on your breathing and as you are walking up, you see many people being brought back down the mountain, having being unsuccessful in their attempt.

Braeburn kept trudging on inspired by each other, driven by the beautiful sunrise and determined to achieve their dreams.

On many occasions Mr Read and I felt emotional watching the strength of our students.

We finally reached Stella Point and had Uhuru Peak insight, by now temperatures were way below freezing and we had limited time before we would have to move back down the mountain.

So despite our bodies craving rest we had to continue.

The last few steps before reaching Uhuru Peak were painful and cold yet exhilarating, we had done it!

The first group of 12 made it to the top with many more still on their journey.

Although we could not stay long due to the ever dropping

temperatures those few minutes were filled with relief, pride and amazement.

We are immensely proud of all our students; I have never witnessed such perseverance, compassion and team spirit in a group of young people.

Although the climb back down the mountain and eventually after another tented night, back to luxury was tough, every child bounded with the sense of achievement they all deserved.

In the end all 20 students and staff made it to Stella Point and 19 to Uhuru Peak - an amazing feat!

It was just a shame we never got to see the man who doubted our abilities.

Through sponsorship and a bake sale we managed to raise approximately Sh159,000 for our two charities.

A huge well done to all the students who took part, remember you can achieve anything if you have the belief in yourself!

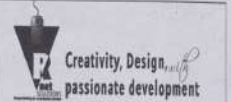

At trick two he led the King of Diamonds and would have been in a very strong position if both opponents had followed (able to ruff One Club with the Queen of Trumps and discard the other on Ace of Hearts). But West discarded and East won the Ace and returned the Eight of Trumps.

Declarer won the Dummy's Queen and crossed back to hand to draw East's remaining Trumps (discarding a Heart from Dummy).

Note that he did not attempt to ruff a Club with Dummy's low Trump - the bidding suggested that East would

East's double of the final contract was presumably based on more than his Trump holding alone, so Declarer was expecting something good in Hearts.

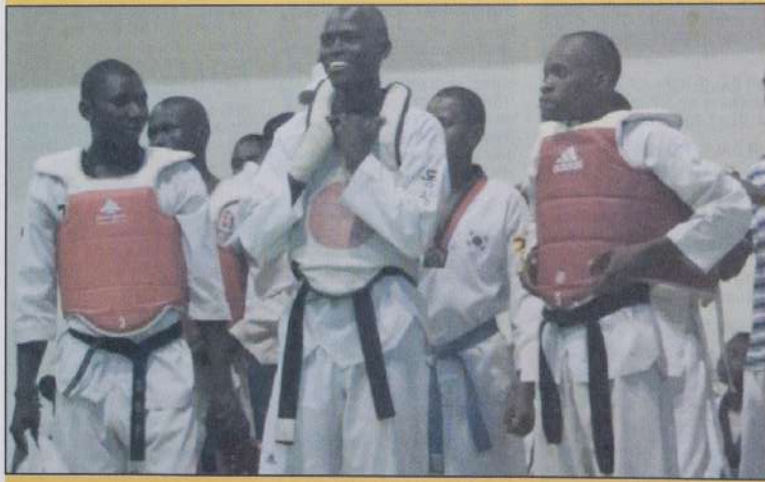
