

Our fatality count this year to date of over three thousand is a grim statement of our road safety standards

Over and above our suggestions over the last few weeks, it is also now coming to light that the boys in blue are equipping themselves with sufficient gadgetry and laws to launch an onslaught on miscreant drivers.

The main places where technology can be applied to influence driver behaviour is in the area of speeding, driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs and that of jumping traffic, lights.

There is also technology in the form of tachographs which can be applied to vehicles but will need intervention in order to interpret and educate drivers on their driving styles and behaviours. Speed limitation devices are also available

The other areas where technology can be applied is to check the condition of the vehicle

This would help if the safety critical items were to be regularly checked and calibrated.

However, the country does not have the capacity currently to make this compulsory for all vehicles and it is not part of the low hanging fruit that would have immediate impact on road fatalities and damage to property.

These interventions have been tried in the country with varying degrees of success.

speed governors or limiters and these were very quickly frustrated by the drivers who found a way to disable them and continue operating the way they have always done.

The matatu community has developed their own language by which they pass on message about where the cops are carrying out speed checks.

So after disabling speed limiters, they would tell each other where the cops were and the drivers would slow down to a crawl when they reached the

Kenyan drivers also found ingenious ways of avoiding the boys in blue - by wearing hijabs or having special drivers to drive them from one side of a road block to another.


CAN WE EVER WIN WAR ON PIRACY?






