

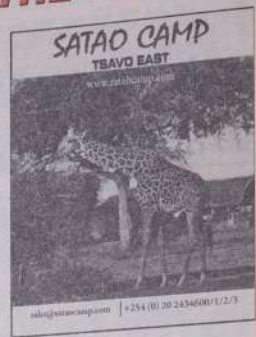

National Social Security Fund Launches A Social Security Awareness Campaign

Kenya's national pension fund has launched a campaign to sensitize the public on the benefits of the National Social Security Fund Act of 2013, as it moves to bring the retirement savings by the country's working population at par with regional and international levels.

The National Social Security Fund (NSSF) says the campaign is aimed at encouraging more Kenyans, particularly those in the informal sector, to save for their retirement.

It is also seeking to promote general public awareness of the benefits of the Act, which include expansion of social security benefits in line with the new Constitution.

NSSF Managing Trustee Richard Langat says retirement savings in Kenya was among the lowest in the region, adding there was need to tap into the country's large pool of workers in both the formal and informal sectors estimated at more than 13 million.

"The purpose of this campaign is to showcase the benefits of the Act, whose basic goal is to actualize the fundamental right of every Kenyan to

social security as enshrined in the new Constitution. "We want Kenyans to understand what they stand to gain by supporting the Act, which also seeks to radically transform the country's social security sector," said Langat.

He added that in the past, a lot of emphasis has been laid on the formal sector employees yet a big chunk of the country's working population was employed in the informal sector also popularly known as 'Jua Kali'.

"There are an estimated 11 million workers in Kenya's informal sector.

"NSSF is keen on increasing social security coverage by targeting this group," said Langat in Nairobi while distributing copies of the NSSF Guide Book which the fund has unveiled as part of the awareness campaign.

The Guide Book is essentially a simplified version of the Act.

The NSSF Act proposes to increase the basic contributions to a maximum of Ksh1080, a move Langat says, will significantly boost Kenya's social security sector.

However, some trade unions and employers have challenged the new rates in court. The case is pending in court.

TANZANIA'S TOURIST HUB IS TO SUFFER WATER CRISIS: EXPERT

ARUSHA (Xinhua) — Tanzania's northern tourist hub of Arusha is in danger to face water crisis in just ten years to come if there are no practical measures in place, hydrologists warned on Tuesday.

Joe Lao, a hydrologist who works with the Pangani River Basin Management which is in charge of managing all water sources in northern part of Tanzania, raised alarm that there was a big possibility of the water catchments in Arusha to completely disappear in ten years' time.

Citing human settlements as among the factors behind the looming crisis, Lao said uncontrolled human activities continue to inch closer to catchments something which contrary to water conservation rules and regulations.

The expert pointed out that in the past Arusha relied on rivers and streams flowing from the slopes of Mount Meru, most of which have dried due to climate change and other anthropogenic factors. Right now, only two rivers, Nduluma and Themti are tapped and supply water to more than

half million city dwellers.

The number of Arusha city dwellers has been increasing on yearly basis taking into account that it is the leading Tanzania's tourist city, headquarters of many international organizations and close to Kenya. The city is the main gateway to Serengeti, Tarangire, and Lake Manyara National Parks as well as Ngorongoro Conservation Area which attract more than 700, 000 tourists a year.

According to the findings of a recent hydrological survey carried out in Arusha, the Burka area near Arusha Airport and Seliani Agricultural Research Institute has enough underground water.

Ruth Koya, Managing Director of the Arusha Urban Water Supply and Sewerage Authority admitted that the challenge is big as the population in Arusha has been increasing.

"We have started on the challenge, but we need more support from different players including the Pangani River Basin Management and the Arusha City Council to ensure the earmarked area is preserved for future water use," he said.

Aga Khan University Hospital Introduces Specialised Early Pregnancy Assessment Clinic

Aga Khan University Hospital has introduced an Early Pregnancy Assessment Clinic (EPAC).

One of its kind, the EPAC is a specialized one stop clinic that addresses any early pregnancy problems during the first 12 weeks of pregnancy often referred to as the first trimester.

This enables specialists to provide urgent and sensitive care and make immediate decisions on the management options of the patients.

One of its kind, this clinic is beneficial for women who are less than twelve weeks pregnant and may be experiencing problems such as bleeding (could be spotting or heavy bleeding); abdominal pain such as cramps in the tummy, along the pelvic or back pain; suspected miscarriage; suspected ectopic pregnancy and follow up treatment as well as pre-conception counseling/advice.

Of benefit is also women who have had

recurrent miscarriages and are pregnant or plan to get pregnant. The EPAC will be a one-stop service, with same day early pregnancy scans and relevant additional tests. Couples attending the clinic can expect immediate discussion of their results and timely decision making.

Aga Khan University Hospital currently provides evidence based antenatal screening and care for expectant mothers and a modern state of the art maternal and newborn unit fully equipped with a dedicated maternity theatre, water birth facilities and multidisciplinary team of specialists.

Newborn babies that need critical care are attended to by neonatal paediatricians and neonatal nurses at the Neonatal High Dependency Unit (NHDU) with Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) providing critical care for newborns requiring close monitoring and high level of interventions.

Specific clinics are also offered for fertility and reproductive endocrinology.

NAIROBI (Xinhua) – Tourism stakeholders have urged Kenya to lobby Western governments to review their travel advisories on visiting Kenya.

Kenya Association of Hotel

Keepers and Caterers (KAHC) Chief Executive Officer Mike Macharia said the travel advisories issued by governments of the U.S., Britain, France and Australia have negatively impacted the tourism sector.

"On average international tourist arrivals are only 40 percent of last year's level," Macharia said.

"From an industry perspective, it is our belief that these travel advisories can be reviewed by close cooperation between Kenya and our key source markets," he said.

KAHC chairman Jaipeed Vohra said that Kenya is currently faced with a barrage of negative publicity both locally and internationally due to the prevailing security situation from terrorism.

"The outbreak of Ebola in West Africa has also impacted international tourism arrivals," he

said. The chairman said that Kenya needs to adopt an open sky policy that allows certain airlines to fly directly to major towns in Kenya.

"This will help to address the issue of inadequate airline seat capacity which is a major constraint affect tourism growth," Vohra said.

Motorbikes Fighting For Space In Between Vehicles Is A Very Common Thing In Traffic

The next occasion when empty space in congested traffic can be dangerous is when there is space between vehicles, whether it is the space between vehicles on adjacent lanes or that between vehicles where there is a whole lane in

between them.

Let us take the first one where it is the space between vehicles in adjacent lanes.

This space is very often less than the width of a car door but space it still is.

Motorcycles and bicycles are

the biggest offenders here.

In congested traffic they try and weave their way in between cars so that they can make progress forward.

However, they do not always judge the space very well and can end up doing damage to a vehicle.

This is a situation that saloon cars tend to face in congested, slow moving traffic.

They are more vulnerable as the level of the wing mirrors is almost the same as the mirrors and handle bars of bicycles as well as motor bikes.

Motorcycles have other reasons for causing accidents or dangerous conditions.

As the riders weave through stationary vehicles, they will all dive into the best space that is available.

Sometimes they even head backwards when they find that the gap between vehicles narrows sufficiently so that they cannot get through.

This happens when the motorcyclist cannot accurately estimate the space between the wing mirrors of adjacent cars - both height from the ground and also distance in between the wing mirrors.

The rider will pedal backwards and most times they cannot see what is happening in between two cars in the same lane - that is to say at the back of the vehicle.

They can only see as far back as the space in which they happen to be between two lanes.

The incident Kachumbari wit-

nessed and which brought this story was when a motorcyclist was moving forward between two light commercial vehicles and then found that the space between the two adjacent vehicles was narrower at the front than at the back end of the vehicles.

He was thus not able to make any progress forward as the space was too narrow.

He decided to "walk" his motorbike backwards so that he could then navigate behind the

trying to make rapid progress between the stationary vehicles.

One was shooting forward between the vehicles on adjacent lanes directly behind the first rider.

The other was crossing from one space to another at the front of one of the stationary vehicles.

Most of the vehicles were light commercial vehicles so there was very little opportunity to see what was happening in the spaces between them compared to if there were saloon cars.

The rider who was coming across from one lane to another between vehicles did not look back down the lane he was heading into to check whether another rider was coming up the space.

He looked forward to check whether it was clear to enter that lane.

At the point when he did this, the rider who was reversing was still quite far up the lane so he could not be seen.

The other rider coming up the space between the lanes was moving at a good speed and when he saw what was happening ahead with the rider crossing from one lane to another, he could not slow down quickly and he did not have much space to take any evasive action so he ended up hitting one motorcyclist from the side which then hit the rider who was walking his bike backwards from the back.

Motorbikes fighting for space in between vehicles are a very common thing in traffic especially now that 'boda boda's

have been added to the mix. Before, there were only pizza delivery motorbikes well as the data rushing couriers who were delivering material and around town.

The addition of boda boda has created mayhem and in a hustle and bustle of trying to get around quickly, motorbikes become a serious menace a danger in traffic.

There is a need to create dedicated motorbike lanes in major thoroughways so that motorbikes can fight each other for space in their own lanes rather than try and argue with cars and commercial vehicles.

A lot of the new roads that are coming up have lanes for motorised traffic (so called MT) and these are divided into those that are used by bicycles and those used by pedestrians and those used by bicycles and motorcycles.

However, most cyclists do not use these lanes and still stick to their old habits and use the main roads. What I wonder is whether it is out of ignorance or sheer madness.

I would like to believe it is the former and it therefore behooves our National Transport Safety Authority to start a vigorous campaign to get NMTs off the main thoroughfares and onto the specially provided lanes.

If there are none then they should operate as close to the outer edge of the roads as possible so that they are in predictable places and also away from the fast lanes.

As Kachumbari says, the state of road safety is to educate

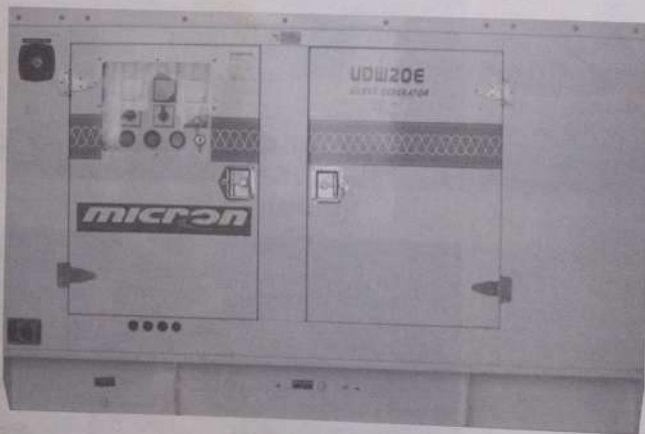

Tanzania Will Punish Dynamite Fishermen

BAGAMOYO, Tanzania (Xinhua) -- Tanzanian authorities are in the process of enacting laws that will mete out heavy penalties for fishermen engaged in dynamite fishing which is now rampant in the east African nation, an official said on Friday.

Fatma Sobo, the Assistant Director of Fisheries Resource Development, said dynamite fishing in Tanzania's Indian Ocean Coastal line was out of control.

"Controlling dynamite fishing is difficult because of the involvement of politicians," Sobo told a two-day workshop for key actors in the marine fisheries sector in Tanzania gathered to identify challenges facing the tuna fishery sub-sector and seek

common solutions.

She said the government has formed a task force with members the Tanzania People's Defence Forces (TPDF), the Ministry of Home Affairs and the government's environment department to find out how the fishing malpractice could be eliminated.

Sobo said in 1997/98 dynamite fishing in Tanzania was almost eliminated after the involvement of TPDF.

Mwanaiidi Mlola, a senior official with the Ministry of Livestock and Fisheries Development, said the process to review fisheries laws was intended to make dynamite fishing a treasonable offence.

"The current laws are not deterrent enough," she said.

According to the Fisheries Act of 2003, any person who uses explosives to kill fish or destroy aquatic flora shall be liable to imprisonment for a term not less than five years and not exceeding 10 years.

In a recent world map of the Global Reefs at Risk initiative, Tanzania is the only African country where dynamite fishing occurs.

Dynamite destroys coral reefs, which is contrary to what people normally think, it's not a series of rocks, but it's a congregation of living animals which create the corals (rocks) as their homes.

A survey conducted in Tanga Region in the 1990s showed that 10 per cent of coral reefs were damaged beyond recovery, while 70 per cent had significant damage but could recover if protected.

Turkana, Baringo, Samburu, Wajir, Marsabit And Mandera Counties Facing Food Crisis

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- An estimated 2.5 million Kenyans in six counties could experience severe hunger and water scarcity in the next three months, Kenya's Red Cross has warned.

Insecurity and climatic shocks are the major drivers of famine in Kenya's northern rangelands, Gullet said. Counties affected by drought were engulfed in skirmishes triggered by politics and competition for scarce resources.

"These counties are not only on the margins but their residents are vulnerable to political incitement that fuel inter-tribal conflicts," said Gullet.

He urged the government and relief agencies to invest in long-term projects to attain food security in the arid counties.

"Pragmatic decisions must be made by the national and county governments to arrest recurrent droughts," Gullet said.

The Director General, Kenya Red Cross, Abbas Gullet said at a press briefing in Nairobi that the looming drought in the northern rangelands risks becoming a humanitarian crisis.

"Unseasoned rains and recurrent conflicts in the arid counties have worsened drought and malnutrition. The phenomenon could escalate into a bigger crisis," Gullet said.

A situational analysis by Kenya Red Cross said Turkana, Baringo, Marsabit, Samburu, Wajir and Mandera are starting experiencing months of recurrent droughts.

State organs have stepped up humanitarian interventions in drought hit counties.

Mandera stressed the need for the government and humanitarian agencies to scale up distribution of food, water and medicine to population affected by drought.

"We anticipate food scarcity in these counties to worsen between now and mid October," said Gullet.

Kenya Red Cross has appealed for 8 million U.S. dollars from donors to support a range of humanitarian interventions in the drought affected counties.

The relief agency will invest in school feeding programs, medical outreach and rehabilitation of water points to benefit 632,500 people in need of urgent humanitarian assistance.

Recurrent droughts in Kenyan rangelands have attracted the attention of global relief agencies.

Abbas said that the World Food Program (WFP) increased the number of food aid beneficiaries from 800,000 to 1.3 million between April and August. He regretted crop failure in Kenya's bread baskets has worsened the food crisis in the country.

"A virulent maize disease in the North Rift reduced total yields," Gullet said.

Mombasa Airport Ebola Screening Center

MOMBASA (Xinhua) -- The Kenyan government on Monday established an Ebola screening center at Moi International airport in the coastal city of Mombasa, said a local government official.

A team of specialized public health and disease surveillance officers and doctors were dispatched to the airport and key entry points in the coastal region which is among the transit point in the East Africa Region.

Mombasa County Director of Health, Khadija Shikelly said the team has been tasked to ensure

all passengers are thoroughly screened to curb the spread of the fever.

"We have a team for Ebola experts comprising trained doctors. In case of any in eventuality we have identified Tudor public hospital where the patients will be isolated," Shikelly said.

The government on Saturday announced it would suspend travellers from Liberia, Guinea and Sierra Leone which have been hard hit by the outbreak.

Meanwhile Kenyan government confirmed Tuesday it will suspend flights connecting three Ebola hit West African

countries, yet insisting not to undertake evacuation movement.

A statement from the ministry of foreign affairs said Nairobi will not allow passengers from Guinea, Sierra Leone and Liberia to enter its territory from midnight.

"Suspected cases entering Kenya by road, air and sea from the three countries shall be closely monitored and where necessary be quarantined," the

ministry said.

The suspension excludes Kenyan citizens and health professionals from the affected area.

But they must undergo extensive screening and where necessary shall be quarantined.

The outbreak began in the forested zone on the borders of Guinea, Sierra Leone and Liberia earlier this year, and spread to Nigeria in July.

Throughout the summit, we had the opportunity to stay in the heart of Cambridge, at Irving House, amidst the bustling daily university life, from where we would attend daily classes at the Harvard Faculty Club, and have group meetings and fellowship events around the Harvard Square.

Life was very different for duration that I stayed at the house, as I was responsible for myself and all my belongings, detached from my comfort zone, and away from family.

The experience was in line with university life, and a great way to prepare me for my final year at the Academy, and

Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) reports cargo volumes at Port of Mombasa rose by 12.8 per cent in the first six months of this year on the back of ongoing expansion in capacity and enhanced efficiency to reduce the time goods stay at the port.

According to KPA Managing Director Gichiri Ndua, besides the increase in overall cargo output, the volume of goods destined for neighboring countries most notably Uganda, has risen this year.

He attributed this performance to the opening of berth No. 19 in August last year, improved cargo handling infrastructure, and removal of non-tariff barriers.

The total cargo throughput (all cargo passing through the port) between January and June 2014, rose by 12.8 per cent to 11.9 million tons from 10.5 million tons in a similar period last year.

Similarly, container traffic grew from 415,948 TEUs last year to 463,920 TEUs this year, representing 11.5 per cent growth, which is above the global average growth rate of eight per cent per year.

"The above performance is attributable to continued application of best management practices, well-coordinated effort of all port cargo interveners, improvements in cargo handling facilities and removal

of non-tariff barriers along the Northern Corridor," said Ndua.

Imports grew by 11.7 per cent posting 10.06 million tons compared to 8.90 million tons registered in 2013. At the same time, exports rose by 13.9 per cent to 1.65 million tons up from 1.45 million tons in 2013.

Kenya is a net importer of goods mostly crude oil, machinery and agricultural inputs.

Ndua says that transit traffic recorded an impressive 9.6 per cent growth to stand at 3.53 million tons up from 3.22 million tons in 2013.

"Uganda, our biggest transit market, has continued to increase its usage of the port.

"In the first six months of this year, Uganda cargo handled at the port increased by 14.4 per cent to 2.72 million tons compared to 2.38 million tons in 2013," said Ndua.

The KPA MD added that Rwanda also recorded an impressive 12.5 per cent growth handling 110,540 tons up from 98,240 tons in 2013.

Burundi recorded a modest growth of 0.8 per cent.

Following commissioning of berth No.19, trans shipment traffic has registered tremendous growth of up to 120 per cent to reach 158,085 tons in 2014, up from 71,996 tons in 2013.

Trans shipment cargo comprises goods destined for other ports other than Mombasa.

The Port of Mombasa has also seen productivity indicators register strong improvement.

For instance, KPA managed to reduce vessel turnaround time to 3.2 days in the first half of this year compared to 3.5 days in the same period last year.

"During the period under review, Port productivity improved significantly.

"Cargo dwell time reduced to 3.8 days from 4.9 days last year.

"Truck transit time reduced from an average of seven to four days," said Ndua.

He further noted that KPA has been investing heavily in cargo handling infrastructure to further

reduce ship turnaround time and cargo dwelltime.

"The Authority has put in place an elaborate equipment acquisition plan to enhance performance.

"This year, we received nine new Reach Stackers, ten manual spreaders and 12 Terminal Tractors.

"We expect two Reach stackers in August and 12 Rubber Tyred Gantry cranes later this year.

"In 2015, we will add eight Terminal Tractors by February and three Ship to Shore Gantry cranes in August," explained Ndua.

On June 30th, twenty five institutions including government agencies, private firms, civil society organisations and interest groups, signed the Mombasa Port Community Charter, a pact to boost efficiency along the Northern Corridor, and aiming to eliminate cargo delays at the Port of Mombasa by 2016.

EU Force Commander On HNLMS De Zeven Provinciën And ESPS Navarra

Force Commander of EU Naval Force (EUNAVFOR), Rear Admiral Guido Rando, has visited HNLMS De Zeven Provinciën and ESPS Navarra.

The Dutch frigate is currently conducting the last patrol of her four months deployment in the EU's Somalia counter-piracy 'Operation Atalanta', whilst the Spanish Frigate ESPS Navarra will remain in the area of operations until December.

During the visits, the Force Commander met with the Commanding Officers of both, *De Zeven Provinciën* and *Navarra*, and their officers and ships company, followed by a brief and a tour of the ship, providing Rear Admiral Rando with an overview of the vessels' main capabilities.

On board HNLMS *De Zeven Provinciën* RADM Rando attended a Medal Ceremony where he presented the Commanding Officer, Commander Ruud Schoonen, and the Commander of the Maltese Special Duties Enhanced Boarding Team (MSDEBT), Lieutenant Colonel Cardona with the 'Operation Atalanta' medal.

The Force Commander highlighted that "the Maltese Team embarked on HNLMS *De Zeven Provinciën* is an excellent example of co-operation between nations and the European effort for operations at sea."

To enhance interoperability, it is not unusual for allied armed

forces to exchange personnel. The Force Commander would welcome an increase in the exchange of personnel between units deployed with the EU Naval Force to improve mutual understanding of national procedures on board and thus increase effectiveness.

To that end, *ITS Andrea Doria* and *ESPS Navarra* arranged for a temporary exchange of crew members from both sides. Rear Admiral Rando thanked the COs and their crews for their hospitality the hard work and professionalism they provide to 'Operation Atalanta'.

MOMBASA RAILWAY RECRUITS NEARLY 2,500 KENYANS

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- A Chinese construction firm said Monday it has recruited some 2,464 Kenyans for the initial work of the Standard Gauge Railway (SGR) project expected to make the movement of goods easier across the country.

Wen Gang, President Assistant of China Communications Construction Company Ltd., said in Nairobi that his company will impart skills and transfer technology to the locals so as to help the country in the manufacture of components for the SGR project locally.

"We will continue recruiting local people to impart skills and also ensure transfer of technology," he said in a statement issued after holding talks with Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta and his deputy William Ruto.

At the peak of the project over 30,000 locals would have been employed directly while 40 percent of the work would be subcontracted to the local companies, he said.

Wen added his company will deliver quality work on time.

Speaking during the meeting, Kenyatta welcomed the company's pledge to partner with local companies to boost the steel manufacturing industry in the country.

Kenyatta lauded the support of the private sector in developing its infrastructure, noting that his government attached great importance to the improvement of infrastructure in its effort to grow the economy.

He also praised the Chinese company for working with county governments in

implementing the railway.

The railway is aimed at providing efficient and cost effective rail transport for both freight and passengers.

It is intended to reduce the cost of doing business by reducing the cost of transport, a move that will see Kenya become a competitive business hub for the East African region and beyond.

Passenger trains will have a speed of 120 kilometers per hour while those for freight will be designed to move at 80 kilometers an hour.

It will take passengers four hours and 30 minutes to travel from the country's coastal city of Mombasa to the capital Nairobi while freight will take eight hours.

The project is slated to kick off on October 1 and take 42 months to complete.

SENIOR POLICE OFFICER ARRESTED WITH ELEPHANT TUSKS IN NORTHWEST KENYA

NAROK (Xinhua) -- Police have confirmed that a senior Kenyan police officer and another suspect were arrested with two elephant's tusks worth 71,000 U.S. dollars in Narok, about 100 km southwest of Nairobi.

The Administration Police officer and his suspected accomplice were arrested by Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) rangers at Ilkerin Loita area on the outskirts of world-famous Maasai Mara Game Reserve in Narok County Sunday evening.

Narok North deputy divisional police commander, Paul Cherulyot, confirmed the officer was in charge of Loita Administration Police in Narok.

The officer be arraigned in court once investigations are completed.

Cherulyot said the two were arrested following a tip-off from members of the public who alerted the KWS officers who later pounced on the suspects.

"When the officers and rangers approached them in a bush, they started engaging in negotiations and immediately arrested them as the senior police officer tried to flee the scene when he noticed the danger," Cherulyot said.

He said the officers posed as potential customers before ambushing and arrested them with the 62 kilogrammes of ivory.

He appealed to Kenyans to be vigilant and report those behind poaching activities in the area and help the government's efforts to reduce the vice in the region.

Cherulyot said police and KWS have heightened surveillance to nab poachers.

The discovery comes as there has been an unprecedented surge in the number of elephants killed by poachers for their ivory

in the last few years.

Two weeks ago, KWS officers impounded 84 kg of elephant tusks of estimated value of 96,000 dollars and arrested a suspect. The nine pieces were

Meanwhile Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) plans to deploy some 575 additional rangers in September to stop the rising poaching in the country, according to a Monday KWS

"These men (rangers) and women will graduate next month and join the ranger force to sustain our effort in conserving wildlife," he said in the statement.

The conservationists have decried the entry of organised crime syndicates into the illegal wildlife trade, most notably of rhino horn and elephant ivory, which they said, has created a crisis situation in many African countries.

The KWS has expressed fears that the scenes of 1970s and 1980s when poaching was a serious menace, and contributed to the depletion of wildlife including elephants, lions and rhinos are back, are threatening many years of conservation efforts and animal populations that had started to balloon. More than 1,000 rhinoceros, an all-time high, have been poached in the last three years, and current poaching of elephants is documented to be the highest since the 1980s.

The illegal poaching of wildlife for commercial purposes is also decimating many more species.

Kiprono said KWS is investing on areas of mutual interest with County governments and communities living in wildlife-inhabited areas to minimize threats posed to Kenya's elephant population.

"We modernizing our security operations, systems and deployment to ensure our troops embrace latest technology. This will enable us to achieve high standards of performance and stop any further poaching incidences," he added.

MIGRATION MARVEL AS WILDEBEEST BRAVE MARA RIVER

World Famous Maasai Mara National Reserve

Maasai Mara National Reserve (also known as 'Masai Mara' and by the locals as 'The Mara') is a large game reserve in Narok County contiguous with the Serengeti National Park in Mara Region, Tanzania.

It is globally famous for its exceptional population of lions, leopards and cheetahs, and the annual migration of zebra, Thomson's gazelle, and wildebeest to and from the Serengeti every year from July to October, known as the Great Migration.

The wildlife roam freely across both the Reserve and Conservation areas which are a continuous wildlife ecosystem.

Wildebeest, topi, zebra, and Thomson's gazelle migrate into and occupy the Mara reserve, from the Serengeti plains to the south and Lolla plains in the pastoral ranches to the north-east, from July to October or later.

Herd of all three species are also resident in the reserve.

All members of the "Big Five" (lion, leopard, African elephant, African buffalo, and Black Rhinoceros) are found in the Maasai Mara. Hippopotami and Nile crocodiles are found in large groups in the Mara and Talek rivers.

Leopards, hyenas, cheetahs, jackals, and bat-eared foxes can also be found in the reserve. The plains between the Mara River and the Esait Siria Escarpment are probably the best area for game viewing, in particular regarding lion and cheetah.

As in the Serengeti, the wildebeest are the dominant inhabitants of the Maasai Mara, and their numbers are estimated in the millions.

Around July of each year, these ungainly animals migrate north from the Serengeti plains in search of fresh pasture, and return to the south around October.

The Great Migration is one of the most impressive natural events worldwide, involving some 1,300,000 wildebeest, 500,000 Thomson's gazelles, 97,000 Topi, 18,000 elands, and 200,000 zebras.

These migrants are followed along their annual, circular route by hungry predators, most notably lions and hyena. Many antelopes can be found, including Grant's gazelles, impalas, duikers and Coke's hartebeests.

The plains are also home to the distinctive Masai giraffe.

Kiplagat Wins Local Race Eyes Chicago Marathon

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Kenya's Commonwealth 10,000m Games silver medalist Florence Kiplagat won the County Pensions Fund (CPF) Nairobi Diamond 10km Run.

Kiplagat also announced she will compete at the 2014 Chicago marathon scheduled for Oct. 12. Kiplagat finished the 10km course in a time of 31:42.0 to win prize money of 3,000 U.S dollars and a diamond with an unannounced value.

Irene Chebet won placed second in a time of 31:45.0 whereas third place went to Alice Aprot who stopped the clock in 31:46.0. "I missed competing at the African Championships in Marrakech Morocco because of visa problems and I was happy to have a race in Nairobi to do speed work," Kiplagat said during a post-race interview in Nairobi.

"I have been competing in many races and so I have experience that is why I could manage to outpace my rivals in the last 300m," she said. The 27-year old Kenyan is the current world record holder of the women's half marathon with a time of 1:05.12 and has represented Kenya in many events from cross country to marathon.

"This will be the first time for me to compete at the Chicago Marathon of which I am preparing myself adequately," Kiplagat said.

In the men's event Amos Kiplimo took first position in a time of 27:42.0, followed by Edwin Kiptoo Rop who clocked 27:43.7, whereas Vincent Yator took third position after clocking 27:44.6.

"I had only run two competitive races in my running career and I am treating this competition as a launching pad for my arrival," the 23-year-old who also took home the winner's purse and the cut diamond, said.

Race director Barnaba Korir said the idea of the race is to bring the Diamond Runs to Kenya to add to the 14 others across the globe.

"The County Pension Fund, the main sponsor for the event, aims at creating a retirement fund for athletes as a cushion," Korir said of the inaugural meet, which attracted over 1,400 participants.

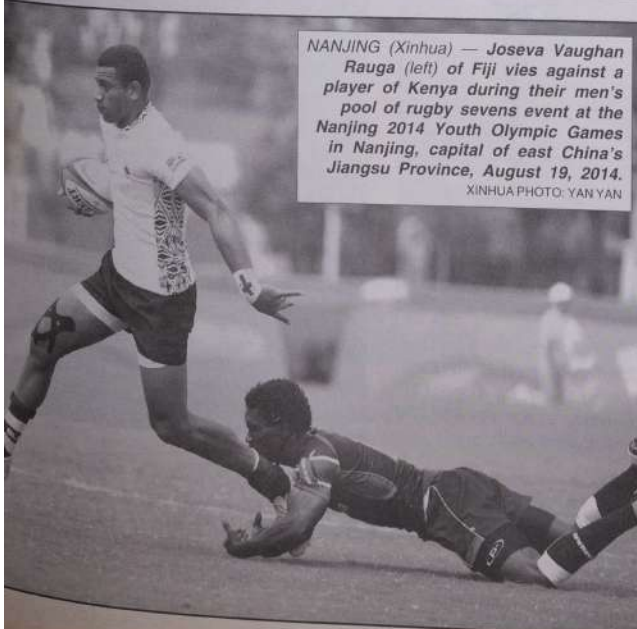
KIBENT COLLINS WINS INNER MARATHON FAIR
