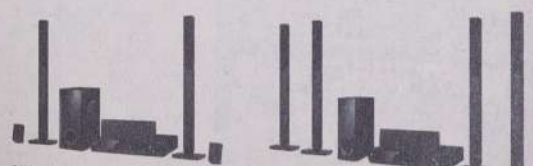

Readiness Of Kenya In Combating Cybercrime

By Chrispinus Omar NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Cyber security experts from the world are due to meet in Nairobi next week for an international conference aimed at assessing the readiness of Kenya to combat cybercrime.

The Kenya 2014 Cyber Security Conference will provide an opportunity to review the outcomes from the previous conference, chart a way forward as well as disseminate advancements and trends in the security sector, organizers said on Tuesday in Nairobi.

"We have noted that the trend globally is for a public private partnership approach to solving cybercrime problems," said William Makatiani, Managing Director of Serianu Limited, a local cyber security consulting and intelligence firm.

Serianu Limited has teamed up with experts from Canada, Singapore, South Africa, India and the United States to organize the conference.

The June 11 conference is a follow up to the inaugural conference held in 2012 that provided a basis/benchmark for the state of cyber security readiness in the country and region.

Makatiani said the forum will discuss the impact of the new national cyber security master plan developed by the Government and other initiatives driven by COMESA and African Union (AU).

"With more governments realizing that the threats could be from outside their borders and as the relevant institutions work on legislation to enable apprehension and prosecution of cybercriminals, it is likely that broader multinational agreements facilitating actions including extradition will be necessary," Makatiani said.

The conference comes a week after experts in Internet crime warned terrorists are using the country's cyberspace to coordinate their attacks due to lack of necessary laws and capacity to deal with thriving cybercrimes.

The experts meeting in Mombasa also said the country's criminal justice system lacks skills to deal with cybercrime and this is also contributing to its rampant increase.

They affiliated to the Systems Audit and Control Association (ISACA) deliberated on ICT and security in light of increased terror attacks in the country.

During the June 11 conference, Serianu will launch its latest cyber security report dubbed Kenya Cyber Security Report 2014 that contains a comprehensive analysis of the most vulnerable organizations, and the extent to which cybercrime is a problem in Kenya.

The report 2014 is prepared by the Serianu Cyber Threat Intelligence Team in partnership with Telecommunications Service Providers Association of Kenya (TESPOK) and United States International University (USIU) Africa's Center for Informatics Research and Innovation (CIRI), at the School of Science and Technology.

According to Makatiani, criminals target computers and the information stored and transmitted in the networks.

Cyber security has widely come to be regarded as an element of national security and the upcoming conference is designed to generate workable solutions that are also cost effective and easily implemented.

Associate Director at the USIU-CIRI Paula Musuva Kigen said while technology adoption has increased business innovation and growth in Kenya, it has also exposed the country to emerging threats.

"Cyber-terrorists, spies, hackers, and thieves are increasingly motivated to target Kenya's ICT infrastructure due to the increasing value of information it holds," she said.

Kenya's growing ICT infrastructure has resulted in the use of systems and networks to connect various organizations easing the process of obtaining information, communicating, and controlling these systems across great distances.

A vast number of applications have also been incorporated into virtually every sector of the country's critical infrastructure.

But the reality of external threat continues to loom every day. Today, it is possible for a malicious agent to penetrate millions of computers around the world in a matter of minutes.

Engaging Communities In Wildlife Conservation

NAKURU (Xinhua) — Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS) has announced plans to conduct community sensitization programs to protect wildlife in Lake Nakuru National Park and eliminate poaching.

According to KWS Central Rift Assistant Director, George Osuri, there is a great significance in engaging the communities in the fight against poaching.

"When the surrounding communities are aware of the social and economic importance of the wildlife, they will be keen in protecting them and this way we will have collaborative efforts in the fight against poaching," Osuri told Xinhua by telephone on Monday.

Osuri said they will sensitize the communities on different means that they can contribute towards preserving the wildlife such as informing the KWS officers of the intended poaching in the park.

He said communities remain a key pillar in ending poaching in the country as they can conduct firm collective campaigns against the aggressive killing of the endangered species.

"Protecting the wildlife is not one man activity. It requires the collaboration of the communities whose members can give us relevant information that can assist us in arresting the poachers before they can kill the elephants or the rhinos," noted Osuri.

In the Lake Nakuru National Park, six rhinos have been killed since the beginning of this year which points out to a declining figure of the most sought after wildlife in the park which hosts about 100 of them.

Plans to introduce use of high technology equipment among the KWS officers manning the park are also underway, a move that will facilitate digital surveillance of the wildlife.

Latest statistics from Kenya Investment Authority (KenInvest) released here Thursday shows that the performance was very good considering that 2013 was a recession year.

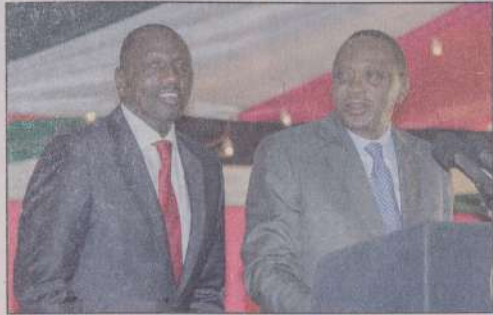

INFLATION: SALES OF GAS HIT ALL-TIME LOW

By Bodah Mengo NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Kenya is losing gains it has made in making citizens use clean fuel as consumption of Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG) hits an all-time low. Use of the clean source of fuel has dropped to the lowest point in three years as prices continue to climb steeply.

Kenyans are now consuming a paltry 4,000 metric tonnes (MT) of LPG, also known as cooking gas, a month, down from 8,000MT in 2012, according to Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) in its latest Leading Economic Indicators Report.

The drop in consumption has been consistent with rise in prices of the commodity.

A 13kg cylinder of LPG is being sold at an average price of 37 U.S. dollars, up from 30 dollars.

A 13kg cylinder of the commodity in some rural towns across Kenya is being sold at 42 dollars.

The high costs have marginalized the few people who use the clean source of fuel in the East African nation.

Energy experts and dealers have blamed the drop in use of LPG to introduction of value added tax (VAT) on the commodity that was initially exempted from taxation.

It was then also the base for RAF aircrafts and its officers.

One day my colleague Roy Marsh arrived in a Cessna C 170 with two passengers a man and his wife.

I immediately recognized Ernest Hemingway, the novelist and his wife Mary Walsh who had come into Eastleigh Airport.

They had suffered an almost disastrous crash but had come out unscathed after hunting in the Kimana area, to the east of Amboseli.

Roy was now booked to fly them to Uganda for the rest of their safari in the Cessna C 170.

We talked as we sat at the RAF canteen drinking coffee.

I expressed my great admiration for Ernest's novel 'For Whom the Bell Tolls' and his vivid

portrayal of the Spanish Civil War about which he had written with great insight.

It is a magnificent tale of heroism, of a people and a place by a master story-teller who reveals all the horrors of war and its futility.

Roy and I were both young then and felt privileged to be in such distinguished company, albeit for me this chance meeting was to be for only a few minutes while the aircraft was being refueled.

Hemingway marveled at the great herds of elephant he saw flying from Amboseli to Nairobi.

He wondered how long these animals would continue to live and to thrive in Africa with the impending and inevitable collapse of British Rule?

Today, the big herds are gone, vast areas of wilderness have been turned into ranches and farms, towns and villages have

sprung up where nature once reigned supreme while the burgeoning human population is posing an ever greater threat to all species of wildlife.

Most threatened are of course elephants and rhinos and there seems to be no end to this trend.

While dedicated individuals have been crusading to save the elephants through marathon walks and creating awareness, almost all have overlooked the fact that the greatest threat comes from an increase in human population.

We may walk across the entire globe protesting what is being done to wildlife, but that alone will not put a stop to the ongoing carnage.

To advocate that we save the elephant without corrective measures related to our own population is not enough in itself, it is time to convince governments

to manage and control human populations.

It is unfortunate that the so many people still do not understand the importance and value of Wildlife.

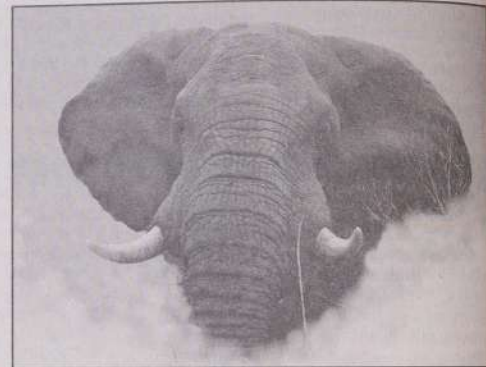
During the Colonial Days and my time as a professional Hunter we always realized the importance of wildlife and in those days the word poaching was hardly heard of although it was carried out in a small way.

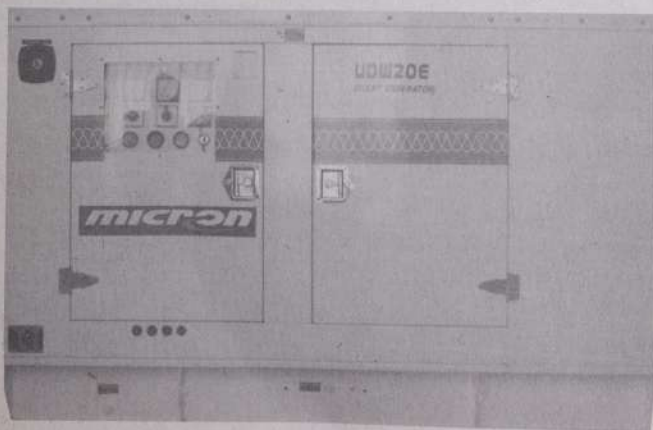

Survival Of Lake Naivasha Assured With Proper Farming Practices

Robert Manyara NAIVASHA (Xinhua) — Promoting farming practices in the wetland ecosystems has been a major contributor to the sustainability of the water lake, Lake Naivasha, in Rift Valley region.

Well known for its diverse birds species which are estimated to be about 350 species, the lake is a major contributor to the country's wildlife service (KWS).

Over time, the lake has been faced with numerous challenges including the declining water levels due to the reduction of its hydrological function and increased turbidity as a result of excessive discharge of the agricultural wastes among others.

Various studies on the lake have recommended collaborative efforts in promoting sustainable management of the surrounding wetland ecosystem to ensure its survival.

The International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), a global environmental conservation agency identifies the need for community engagement in preserving the lake.

For six years till now, farmers in the upper catchment area characterized with high slopy terrain have continued to practice conservation agriculture in order to promote the long-term viability of the lake.

Under the program, Naivasha Payment for Environmental Services Project (PES) initiated by the World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF), the farmers in Nanyuki area within Nyandarua County employ good farming practices to reduce soil run off into estuaries feeding Lake Naivasha.

Wanjohi is a major water catchment area for Lake Naivasha and therefore any kind of farming activity undertaken in the area determine the quantity of water flowing into the lake and its quality," said Nancy Njenga, the program's coordinator, during an interview with Xinhua on Sunday.

Due to the steepness of the farms, poor ploughing methods and lack of conservation systems result to the massive soil erosion causing siltation in the estuaries and hence reducing the lake's water flow as well as quality.

However, Njenga says the farmers have been enlightened on the use of the grass strips, agro-forestry, river-bank protection and contour marking; techniques which she says have boosted the quality of water flowing into the Lake Naivasha.

"Over 1,440 farmers are now practicing conservation agriculture which has greatly reduced soil siltation in rivers into Lake Naivasha and we intend to have 3,000 by 2016 so that we have an expanded team of farmers devoted to preserving the lake," she says.

Joseph Njuguna is one of the farmers under the program.

He said the farming methods have not only reduced the soil run-off into the estuaries but increased his agricultural income.

"I have 15 acres but prior to 2007, I could not harvest more than three bags of potatoes because the seedlings could be carried away during the rainy season.

"I had no grass, Napier grass or contour marks on the farm to slow down the heavy run-off," he says.

With his conservation efforts, he has planted fruits trees, grown Napier grass, potatoes and vegetables, which have drawn him huge income.

"I did not know anything about conserving the soil or the best method of farming to adopt to make good harvests from this slopy piece of land.

"I wish that more farmers become aware of these techniques to reduce polluting the rivers while increasing their agricultural productivity," he says.

Peter Kabata, an agricultural officer with the Ministry of Agriculture said covering the soil with vegetation ensures adequate infiltration of water into the ground which flows into the rivers raising the water levels.

"With the increased ground water levels you can be sure of a sustainable flow into the rivers unlike the surface run-off which is just an immediate flush," he noted.

He said the soil run-off flushes the nutrients into the rivers which increases toxicity for survival of the organisms living in the Lake Naivasha.

"Farmers use fertilizers and other chemicals such as the herbicides, if all these flow into the river during the heavy rains, it increases the water toxicity making it difficult for organisms such as fish and birds depending on the water in the Lake Naivasha to survive," he noted.

Lack of awareness among the farmers on their contribution to the conservation of the wetland ecosystems, he says is one of the major factors causing continued pollution of the water masses in the country.

"Various studies show that farmers are among the 65 percent of the key agents that destroy the wetlands, pollute the rivers and cause the decline of the water levels in the estuaries which flow into the lakes," he notes.

Hans Ngugi, the Wanjohi Water Resources Users Association chairman said since the farmers begun using the agricultural conservation techniques, the water levels in the Lake Naivasha estuaries has increased.

"During the dry season, the water flow in river Wanjohi and Tarasha which flow into Lake Naivasha is now above five centimeters when before this conservation efforts begun used to be about two centimeters. It is also clean because of minimal soil run-offs," said Ngugi.

To encourage farmers to continue with the conservation efforts, he says those who have recorded improved results are given financial incentives annually.

"Each farmer who has done well is given 17 dollars once a year and this encourages other farmers to continue employing the conservation techniques which in the long-term benefit Lake Naivasha," he noted.

Kennedy Ochieng, an officer from the Naivasha Water Resources Authority says since 2008, the water flowing from upper catchment area into the Lake Naivasha has reduced impurities. This was due to the proper farming practices used along the waterbeds in the Lake Naivasha basin, he said.

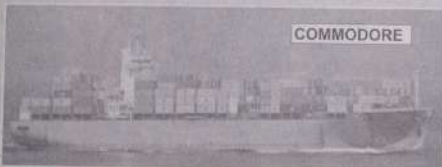

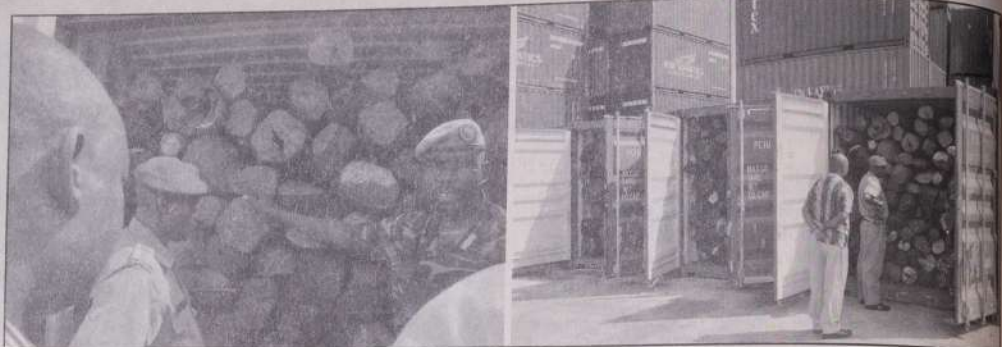

Solar Panel Manufacturers Complain At New Policies On Tax Exempted Imports

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Kenyan manufacturers of solar panels have decried the removal of taxes on imported solar panels.

The solar manufacturers told a news conference in Nairobi that argued that the move gives importers an undue advantage.

"The new tax exemption while being a very noble idea on the surface will have negative effects on local manufacturers," said the Managing Director of solar manufacturer UBBINK Haijo Kuper.

Kenya has passed a law that exempts solar panel imports from Value Added Tax beginning May 29. The move exposes large investments made by sector players to unprecedented losses.

Kuper said that local manufacturing will be no longer viable as all inputs will be subject to VAT while imported finished products are tax free.

By exempting imports, the government is seen as supporting external production at the expense of local producers.

"The vibrant solar energy market that Kenya has developed, will be flooded with cheap imports."

"Local manufacturing has the added advantage of offering after sales and warranty due to close proximity," Kuper added.

Currently, only 30 percent of Kenyans have access to electricity.

The rest depend on off-grid solutions such as kerosene lamps and solar.

"Unfortunately, kerosene exposes households to indoor pollutants that have negative effects on health," he added.

"They also involve daily purchase of the fuel which expensive in the long run compared to electricity tapped from the national grid," the managing director said.

He said that high uptake of mobile phones has led to demand for electricity to charge the handsets.

Kenya also faces major hurdles in the adopting solar technology.

"A lot of households don't have the finance to purchase the solar panels" he said. According to the industry, the low awareness of the potential opportunities and economic benefits offered by solar technologies.

In the past, Kenya has encouraged electricity grid expansion. "The country is now encouraging off-grid solutions that will take advantage of the abundant sunshine and other renewable sources of energy," he said.

CANADIAN FIRM CONDUCTS OIL SURVEY

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- The Canadian oil and gas firm, Simba Energy is undertaking airborne surveys that are to continue for several days in Block 2A in Manderia in northern Kenya.

The company's airborne Full Tensor Gradiometry (FTG) survey commenced daily flights about 10 days ago and is expected to be completed in the next 7-10 days.

"Simba has had discussions with a number of companies expressing interest in farming directly in to Block 2A to undertake a 2D seismic program with a drilling commitment, based on these FTG results currently being generated," the firm's CEO Robert Dinning said in a statement received on Saturday.

Results to date for the FTG survey in this area have been encouraging. Simba Energy said that the results from the survey would serve to provide better targeting and more cost-effective 2-D seismic acquisition, which it has planned for later in the year and is preliminary to final drilling decisions.

The Canadian firm said it has engaged Campbell & Walker Geophysics Ltd. to provide project management the company's FTG survey.

Kit Campbell has worked extensively with airborne gravity gradiometry in the East African Rift System as well as throughout North and South America for many years.

Inflation Rate Surges To 7.3 Per Cent In May

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Kenya's overall monthly inflation rose to 7.3 per cent in May from 6.4 per cent in the previous month due to an increase in the cost of energy and food items, the statistics bureau has confirmed.

The Kenya National Bureau of Statistics said the Consumer Price Index (CPI) computed using the geometric mean approach increased by 1.01 per cent from 148.2 in April to 149.7 in May.

"During the review period, Food and Non-Alcoholic Drinks' Index increased by 1.25 per cent.

"There were significant rises in the prices of several food items including maize flour, potatoes and sukuma wiki (kales) among other food items," the bureau said.

These prices increases, it said, outweighed falls in the prices of sugar, milk and a few the items thereby resulting in an aggregate rise in the food index.

Due to higher costs of common cooking fuels, the Housing, Water, Electricity, Gas and Other Fuels' Index, increased by 1.76 per cent between April and May.

"In this regard, price increases were

recorded in respect of electricity, charcoal and firewood.

"The cost of electricity in consumption increased mainly on account of fuel cost adjustment which rose from 0.599 shillings in April to 722 cents per KWh in May," KNBS said.

"For example, the cost of 50 KWh of electricity increased by 21.71 per cent mainly due to this fuel cost adjustment."

The bureau said the Transport Index increased by 1.43 per cent mainly as a result of high costs of diesel, petrol and bus fares.

According to Standard Chartered Bank's Regional Head of Research for Africa, Razia Khan, the May inflation most likely signals the start of a new interest rate cycle in Kenya, although he does not expect interest rates to rise anywhere near as much as they did in the last tightening cycle.

"A sufficiently early rate hike will help moderate the overall pace of tightening that is required," Khan said on Friday.

He said unseasonably dry weather in Kenya, and the country's continued reliance on rain-fed agriculture, are helping to pressure prices.

"However, with indicators pointing to robust underlying momentum in the economy, and

strong credit growth (notwithstanding recent security risks), the likelihood of food-related pressures spilling over into secondary effects is high," Khan added.

The move comes as the government will next month start reviewing how formula Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is measured in order to improve decision making.

The formula which is referred to as rebasing would see the GDP expand by 20 percent, making Kenya a middle-income economy by next month.

KNBS said the government is set to revise calculations of the size and composition of the economy in a "rebasings" exercise to be done in June. GDP rebasing typically involves changing the year from which values are compared.

The bureau said the revision of the economic indicators requires a wide range of datasets that should be analyzed in a coherent, consistent and integrated approach in order to achieve the overall goal of improved economic statistics.

Experts said the current GDP, which was rebased in 2001, does not factor in the invention of the Internet, the coming of mobile phones and mobile money transfer services.

Nine Customized Vehicles To Scale Up Anti-Poaching War

The war against poaching will move a notch higher with an additional nine custom-made Land Cruisers being deployed to the anti-poaching elite crack unit.

The unit is comprised of security personnel from the Special Service Unit, Administration Police and Kenya Wildlife Service (KWS).

KWS Acting Director General William Kiprono flagged off the nine Land Cruisers at KWS headquarters during a ceremony witnessed by among others KWS deputy directors, managers and staff at headquarters on May 22, 2014.

In August last year, the government directed that a joint inter-agency anti-poaching elite crack unit be formed to reinforce KWS security operations and help combat the poaching menace.

At the same time KWS has formed an elite Rapid Response Unit (RRU) to work alongside the anti-poaching elite crack unit in readiness to take over at the end of the one year tenure of the crack unit.

KWS Acting Deputy Director, Security Robert Muasya said the vehicles will enable the elite unit cover a wider range than before and have been deployed as follows:

Two based in Narok, Two based in Tsavo Conservation Area, Two in Laikipia, One to be

used in Nakuru National Park by Rapid Response Unit rangers, One to be used in Nairobi National Park by Rapid Response Unit rangers, One to be used at Tsavo River in Tsavo West National Park.

"These vehicles will enhance operations carried out by the inter-agency anti-poaching elite crack unit and all security companies in the areas of deployment", Mr. Muasya said.

Mr. Kiprono thanked the Ministry of environment, water and natural resources for supporting KWS in its operations, especially in operationalizing the Wildlife Conservation and Management Act 2013 which became operational in January 10, 2014.

The cabinet Secretary for environment, water and natural resources, Prof. Judi Wakhungu, in a message read on her behalf by the Ag. Director General said, "I am delighted today as we officially flag off these nine vehicles to boost the momentum of our on-going war against poaching that had hitherto threatened to decimate our national heritage".

Prof. Wakhungu added that the government is aware of the magnitude of the challenge posed by poaching, especially of rhinos and elephants.

"We acknowledge that wildlife security threat is a global phenomenon that has largely been driven by the high demand for ivory and rhino horn in the Asian Countries."

She said adding, "the Govern-

ment has demonstrated its commitment to combat poaching challenges and guarantee security by procuring the nine vehicles".

She urged KWS to continue working with other law enforcement agencies, especially National Intelligence Service (NIS), Customs, the Kenya Police Service, Interpol, Lusaka Agreement Task Force (LATF), Immigration Department and Kenya Airports Authority, among others; in ensuring that local and international laws on wildlife crimes are enforced.

Experts Seek To Save Kenya's Mt. Elgon Ecosystem

KITALE (Xinhua) — An integrated plan has been unveiled to save Kenya's Mt. Elgon ecosystem facing a serious threat from massive population increase, a Mt Elgon National Park's official said on Tuesday.

The population trend is worrying and promoting the destruction of wildlife and forest, said Mt. Elgon National Park Senior Warden Collins Omondi during a five day training workshop held in Kitale.

The workshop organized by Lake Victoria Basin Commission (LVBC) attended by participants from Kenya, Uganda and Rwanda was aimed at come up with a multi-sectoral approach to counter the emerging threats against Mt. Elgon national park and its ecosystem.

Omondi said during the workshop that ended late Tuesday the increasing human activities along the ecosystem are affecting the environments citing illegal poaching by a cartel from Uganda.

"The increasing population among communities around the ecosystem has influenced a negative impact on the ecosystem.

"There is high demand for fuel wood and land for farming," the warden revealed.

He announced KWS and Uganda Wildlife Service have agreed to launch joint tourist strategies to market Mt. Elgon ecosystem to enhance livelihood for the communities around the region and in bid to discourage destruction.

Omondi said communities around Mt. Elgon Park has already initiated a tour guiding program and groups involved are generating income to improve food security in their families.

The official further disclosed that the two wildlife conservators are diversifying tourism to curb illegal poaching and conservation of the environment.

LVBC regional coordinator population and health program Dr. Doreen Otero said the workshop will empower the conservation, health and population workers to strengthen their capacity in bid to enhance integration services to the communities.

LVBC has kicked off series of educational training of health, environment and wildlife workers to equip them with relevant skills on integrated services.

Artisans Today Can Not Hold A Candle Next To Centuries Old Monuments

FATEHPUR SIKRI - We left for Jaipur the next morning and stopped at Fatehpur Sikri about a 45 minute drive from Agra. Akbar, the greatest Mughal emperor was a lover of art and culture under whose reign not only did the Mughal empire triple in size, but also the economy.

He established many centres of learning and was very tolerant to all other faiths, especially Hinduism, celebrating Diwali with great pleasure. Of his many wives his first three were his favourite.

Ruqaiya, his first wife and also first cousin, married to him at the age of nine, was very learned and intelligent but bore him no children.

Salima, the widow of Akbar's most trusted general Bairam Khan, was married to the emperor who also happened to be his cousin.

His third, and the one that changed Akbar's thinking on religious and social policies, was Heer Kanwari or Harkabah also known more popularly as Jodhabai.

An Hindu Rajput princess from Amer / Amber this marriage was a political alliance made to gain support from the Rajput royals and gain access to Rajasthan and eventually Gujarat (a feat achieved only by Akbar and no other Mughal emperor).

With no heir in sight, Akbar heard of a religious man in Sikri (where the stone artisans lived).

Legend has it that he walked the 37km. barefoot to Sikri from his capital in Agra, falling at the feet of the Sufi saint Salim Chishti imploring him to bless him with a child.

Salim Chishti predicted that within the year, Akbar would have a male heir to carry on the dynasty and as foretold, a male child was born to Akbar and Jodhabai, within that year.

Salim, named after the saint, who had an acrimonious relation with his father especially due to his addiction to alcohol and opium, was later named Emperor Jahangir.

To be nearer to the saint, Akbar decided to shift his capital from Agra to Fatehabad (Fateh is victorious and Abad is abode or city) on the Sikri ridge and construction of the walled city, in red sandstone commenced in 1569, taking 15 years to build.

His three favourite wives were housed in three different quarters but after the birth of Salim, it was Jodhabai, now given the title of Mariam-uz-Zamani (Mary of the Age) who was now the Malika-e-khaas (favourite wife).

She was given the largest apartments and even had her own separate kitchen, since she was a staunch vegetarian. The kitchen is decorated on the outside with carvings of earrings and women's

ornaments denoting it as an area only for ladies.

While Ruqaiya and Salima's apartments had Persian and Islamic design, Jodhabai's which also had her temples built for her, were of Hindu design.

One central hall, Diwan-i-khaas (Hall of private audience) was built with a beautifully carved octagonal shaft that went up to a central landing, supported by 36 serpentine brackets, from which four bridges or walkways connect to the four corners of the room, important meetings would be held here.

Despite being a Hindu all her life, Jodhabai was buried under Islamic custom and as per Akbar's wish, his only wife that is buried next to him.

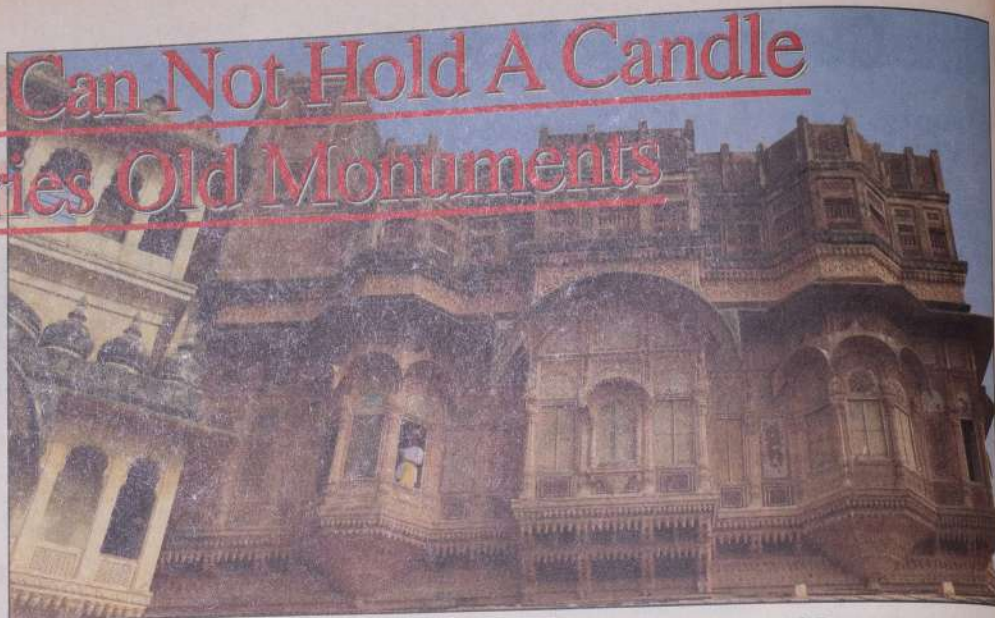
Other important buildings at Fatehpur Sikri are Birbal's house - Akbar's favourite minister who was an Hindu; Buland Darwaza - the stupendous 55 metre entrance to the fort gradually making a transition to a human scale in the inside; Anup Talao - ornamental pool with a central platform and four bridges leading up to it, used for evening performances by musicians and dancers; Pachisi court - now known as Ludo, a square marked as a board game where the playing pieces were humans, usually slaves; Taksal (mint); Daftar Khana (Records Office); Karkhanas (royal workshop); Khazana (treasury), Hamams (Turkish styled Baths).

Paanch Mahal (five palaces) is an imposing structure that is five floors of decreasing size with the ground floor, having 84 columns and the top a single large umbrella-shaped dome.

The pillars on each floor originally had jaali (latticed screens) between them supporting the whole structure.

Built very close to the harem or women's quarters, queens and princesses would enjoy the cool breezes and splendid views of Sikri from the top floor.

Another feat we noticed not just here but all these old forts that we visited, is the very straight channelling for rain water.

Today's artisans could not hold a candle next to these centuries old monuments.

When Salim Chisti died, an elaborate mausoleum, in marble, was built on the grounds of the fort where people still visit, to tie a thread and ask for blessings to have their wishes come true.

Due to lack of water the fort was abandoned almost after it was completed and is now a 'ghost town'.

Wherever you go hawkers really pester you and even ask for your used tickets hoping to make a few rupees from re-selling it,

just like royals did four hundred years ago.

These elephant rides can only be taken as per the season. During the winter and cooler time of the year (November to March) each elephant is allowed five round trips, while during the much hotter summer they can only take one round trip each.

Fronting the fort is the Maota lake surrounded by beautifully laid out gardens whose design was taken off a Persian carpet.

Built by Raja Man Singh (nephew of Akbar's wife Jodhabai) in the late 16th century, it is located in the area of the Aravalli hills and is a mixture of Hindu and Islamic architecture.

Entry through the Sun (Pol) Gate takes you into the first

this room was closed to the public due to renovations.

Sukh Niwas or Sukh Mahal (Hall of Pleasure) - the name says it all - is the opposite building which had a piped water supply through an open channel that ran through the building keeping it cool, as in an air conditioned environment.

All the women, Royal family, concubines, mistresses and their female attendants lived in the fourth courtyard (Zenana) which had many living rooms to accommodate the kings many wives.

Ladies would watch processions and fights between elephants and tigers in the courtyard, from windows above that were covered by curtains or carved marble.

Food was cooked in massive cast iron cauldrons (on display in the courtyard) where the cook would have to stand on a raised platform with a huge cooking ladle.

At one time, the King of Jaipur was the second wealthiest man in the world.

City Palace in the heart of Jaipur was built in 1729 is now part museum and part an existing palace where the royal family lives. Both are open to the public at a fee, the actual residence will cost you 2,500 rupees per person for entrance and if you know the right people can have dinner with the Maharajah and his family.

It was in 1727 that the seat of power was shifted from Amer Fort to Jaipur initiating the construction of this Palace.

The Museum has many artefacts including the armoury from four hundred years ago which are housed in the Maharani Palace (queen's residence).

A collection of old carriages, palanquins and European cabs are kept in good condition in the Bhaggi Khanna.

Since men were busy in battle, it was the women who kept the accounts which was housed in the zenana (women's quarters).

In the marble-floored Diwan-i-Khaas, the private audience hall of the Maharajas which is located between the armoury and the art gallery are two huge sterling silver vessel 5.2 feet in height with a capacity of 4000 litres, weighing 340 kilograms, on display.

Made from 14000 melted silver coins without soldering, it is officially recorded in the Guinness Book as the world's largest sterling silver vessels.

They were made especially for Maharaja Sawai Madho Singh II, a devout Hindu who was making his first trip to England in 1901 for Edward VII's coronation.

Not sure if he would be

committing a religious sin by drinking English water, he made two of these silver urns and carried water from the holy Ganges all the way to England by ship.

Not very far from the City Palace is an astronomical observatory named Jantar (instrument) Mantar (formula).

Built in 1727 from local stone and marble it is the largest and best preserved in India with fourteen major geometric devices for measuring time, predicting eclipses, tracking stars' location, ascertaining the declinations of planets, and determining the celestial altitudes.

At 90 feet in height, the Samrat Yantra (giant sun dial) tells you the time of the day to the nearest two seconds.

Jantar Mantar was a very important construction since everything that Indians do has to be done with reference to the astrological conditions of that time.

This practise is just as important today as it was centuries ago.

We did not get a chance to go inside the Hawa Mahal (Palace of Winds), so called because it is structurally designed to allow a breeze to pass through all the rooms without any fans or movement.

Jaipur also has many hotels on different ratings but if you are willing to splurge you can stay at the Jaipur Palace Hotel (managed by the Taj group) for about 12,000 = rupees a night on bed and breakfast for a double or go one up and stay at an actual palace which has now been converted into a hotel, the Rambagh Palace (also managed by Taj) for about 30,000 = rupees a night.

Jaipur Palace Hotel is designed like a palace but is actually newly built on the grounds of one of the Maharajah's havelis (mansion).

Chokhi Dhani is about 30km out of Jaipur and is an interesting concept. A large area that houses all sort of traditional Rajasthani homes, snacks, trades, camel rides, dances, mehndi, snake charmers people sitting in a house actually cooking chapatis in the traditional way, head and neck massages and a restaurant.

Some of these services are free while for others you pay a small amount like ten or twenty rupees. A 700 rupees ticket allows you to enter the area and roam around partaking in the free services while paying for those on sale.

The entry fee entitles you to a traditional Rajasthani thali (large brass plate) meal either sitting on the ground as tradition requires, or on a table.

Seven different curries and daals in little brass bowls, with chapatis, khichdi with ghee but all very spicy, so the accompanying buttermilk and dessert were very welcome.

JAIPUR - Our next stop was Jaipur, capital city of the state of Rajasthan, built by Sawai Jai Singh and among the first of India's planned cities. Beautifully laid out gardens and parks, heritage hotels, colourful bazaars that delight in Rajasthan handlooms and trinkets.

Made up of three parts, it has the old city at Amer (or Amber), pink city (painted thus for a visit by the British royal family a century ago) and the new city.

We have now entered the world of the Hindu and Rajput maharajas, which was equally as opulent as the Mughals.

Amer (also known as Amber after the Goddess Amba) Fort or Palace set on the ridge of a hill, is ascended on foot or by elephants,

courtyard where armies would form victory parade after a battle won and the women would watch the parades and throw flowers onto the victors from Suhag Mandir (latticed windows high up on the Ganesh (Pol) Gate).

Named after the Hindu god Ganesh who removes all obstacles in life, this gate gave entry to the private palace of the maharajas.

In the first courtyard you will see a small but very beautiful temple to Sila Devi (an incarnation of Kali - Goddess of death and Durga - the invincible Goddess).

It is here that animal sacrifices were done on the eighth day of Navratri (the nine holy nights in a Hindu calendar which are devoted to the Goddess Amba), a practise which has been banned since 1975. People still come to worship at the temple.

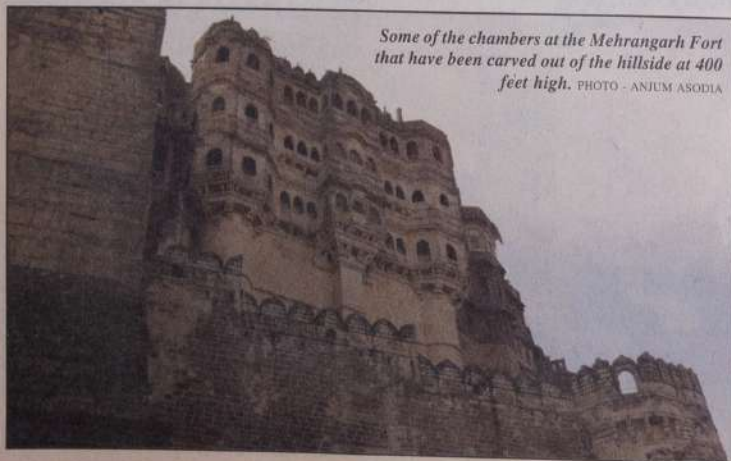
Diwan-i-Am or the Public Audience Hall, in the second courtyard, is a raised platform with 27 colonnades, each of which is mounted with elephant shaped capital with galleries above it.

In the private quarters of the Maharaja and his family in the third courtyard, there are two buildings opposite each other, separated by a garden laid in the fashion of the Mughal gardens.

To the left is the Jai Mandir also known as Sheesh Mahal (mirror palace) where mirror mosaics and coloured glass would reflect the light of one candle like a glittering jewel box.

Glass inlaid panels and multi-mirrored ceilings even on the outside gives it an even more beautiful look.

but this time we decided to walk which was really enjoyable as we saw quite a lot of interesting birds on the way.

We were able to see the Yellow-fronted Canaries, one of the few birds which seems to like the Casuarinas.

Ethiopian Swallows were numerous flying overhead, Grassland Pipits, Pin-tailed Whydahs and Three-banded plovers were all seen at close quarters which makes them much more interesting for our novice birders.

A nice surprise in the quarry at one of the seasonal puddles was a Little-ringed Plover.

I have never seen one away from the beach before.

Purple Heron gave us just a brief glimpse and a Black Crane darted from one clump of reeds to another.

We ambled back through the woodland to Haller Park to see how the Woolly-necked Storks were going on with their nest building.

A bit of an untidy structure but just about finished I think.

We look forward to seeing the little woolly-necks.

Pied, Mangrove and Grey-headed Kingfishers were around but the Giant Kingfisher which we had hoped to see was not around.

Total of 31 species, a good number at the end of a very enjoyable bird walk.

Tuesday May 27th - Talk by Dr Paul Webala 'Bat Research and Conservation in East Africa-Challenges and Opportunities'.

How nice it is to have such a professional presentation on a subject about which we know hardly anything about a mammal which most of us are not particularly keen on by somebody who is a font of knowledge and shows beautiful pictures into the bargain.

We are truly grateful that Dr Webala asked to come to speak at FFJ (through Doris and her Facebook) and that he took the trouble to travel all the way from Karatina to do so.

It was also gratifying to have some members and two visiting students who had lots of questions to ask.

I have asked Dr Webala to contact us if he is ever coming to the Mombasa again and maybe we can go out and do some bat spotting with him. He has agreed!
