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## Shell - B.P. To Change Marketing Network In Kenya

KENYA SHELL/BP Kenya Limited will in January implement a far-reaching rationalisation programme in its marketing network, designed to meet new developments in the business environment and to contain the organisation's operating costs and strengthen its long-term viability.

The move was prompted by a stagnation in inland demand for petroleum products and a shift of the traditional oil export trade to neighbouring countries from Kenya to offshore supply sources.

**NEW DIVISION**  
The changes to be adopted include decentralisation of the organisation and the creation of a new marketing division which will be headed by Mr. George Chiuri as Marketing Manager.

Two expatriate employees have been replaced and will be assigned posts elsewhere in the Shell Group's international network.

To ensure more efficient operations and quicker attention to customer needs, three separate marketing areas have been developed with area managers who will be responsible for area administration and the receipt, storage, distribution and sale of products in each area.

**COAST AREA**  
The Coast Area, to be headed by Mr. Paul Kihato, comprises North Eastern and Coast Provinces, with the area manager based at the one supply point at Mombasa.

The Central Area includes Nairobi, Central Province (excluding Nyandarua District), Eastern Province, Laikipia District and Kajiado District. Supply points will be at Nairobi and Nanyuki, with the area manager, Mr. Jan Mutai based in Nairobi.

Shell and BP's Western Area is comprised of Rift Valley Province (excluding Kajiado and Laikipia Districts), Nyandarua, Western and Nyanza Provinces, and will be headed by Mr. Robert Maina who will be based in Nakuru. The area has supply points at Nakuru, Eldoret and Kisumu.

**JOINT OWNERS**  
These changes will have no effect on the shareholding of the organisation which will remain jointly owned by the Royal Dutch-Shell Group and BP Oil International on a 50:50 basis, with the management expertise being provided by Shell International Petroleum Co Limited.

During our visit we chatted to the famous band 'Mombasa Roots' who had placed an order here for their stunning uniforms. Final Image had been highly recommended to them, they said.

The brains behind this house are Naushad and Sajjad Ali — yes, men! We spoke to Naushad and fired many questions at him. Where was he trained? — England.

How long had he been in such a business? To this he replied "15 years but in Nairobi".

In that city he often prepared clothes for shows held by the Elite Blunt School of Modelling as well as many of the existing boutiques.

Although only one tailor at present there are several machines awaiting expansion.

The very fact that Naushad had arranged his place properly is a good foundation for the business he is likely to get. We peered into his order book and saw that at present he has an average of three requests for tailor-mades a day.

This is excellent in a street where there is not so much passing trade, but most of those who were walking by did actually stop and pop in.

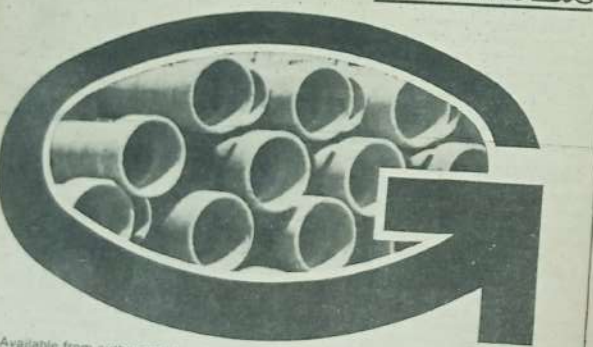

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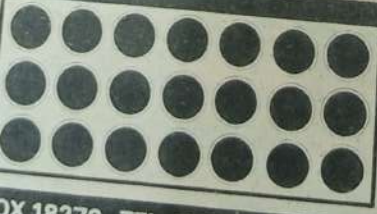

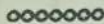

Cargo movement will also be speeded as a result.

## Menace Of Stowaways Strikes Mombasa Ships

THE STOWAWAY menace has reared its ugly head on two occasions of late. Last week the Pacific International Line vessel *Kota Muro* sailed Mombasa for Shanghai after a week of unloading operation at No.1 Berth and when outside the KPA pilot cutter whilst two days later the Gold Star Line vessel *Gold Varda* discovered three Kenyan stowaways on board when outside the port after sailing from Mombasa. These two incidents have cost the respective Shipowners several thousand dollars in delay lost alone the unquantifiable inconvenience.

Mention of the *Gold Varda* which has been in Mombasa discharging 4,000 tons of cargo mainly rice from Chitagon, reminds me that she was flying the Red Ensign, with port of registry, London. Her owners are Haverton Shipping Ltd. This is the first time she has called at Mombasa.

I was sorry to learn that the East Africa Feeder Line vessel *San Juan*, which was introduced on this coast with much promise in the press as a container feeder line vessel to augment the main line container vessels, has finally sailed Mombasa for Colombo.

She has been based in Mombasa for several months but regrettably the expected business did not materialise in

spite of optimism during the initial stages of the new service.

EAFI naturally had to take something of a gamble and I know many of my shipping colleagues are sorry to see it did not come off, however, should there be a need for a feeder service (this is bound to arise sooner or later), then perhaps the *San Juan* may return to this Coast.

A first timer in the port and which arrived on Friday morning was the 8 year old single voyage charter *Vivian* from the Far East on NYK Line's regular monthly service. Flying the Liberian flag she has a deadweight of 20,500 tons and under Hong Kong ownership. She is discharging 1,900 tons mainly cars and containerised cargo.

Shortly before her arrival, I was watching the Shipping Corporation of India's State of Punjab outward bound in the entrance channel having spent a few hours at the containers terminal loading.

Unless the vessel is due to be scrapped, I really feel that S.C.I. could afford to give her a coat of paint. Seeing the

S.C.I. as the state owned National Shipping Company of India they seem to take little pride in the appearance of their vessels.

There are three maize vessels due Mombasa up to the end of the year so that over the Christmas period there will probably be five in port plus the *Saint Vincent* the wheat discharger which is now in her fifth week waiting outside fully laden.

Mackenzie Maritime Limited, one of the prominent Mombasa Ships Agencies is losing its Chief Executive on retirement. Richard Nicholls left Kenya shortly before Christmas after 5 years in Mombasa.

A popular figure, he will be missed by both the shipping and business community of the town. His successor as Chief Executive is Simon Morse, who has a wealth of shipping experience and has joined Mackenzie Maritime, having previously been with an associated company in Hong Kong.

## DATLINE: DAR ES SALAAM BOMANI WARNS HOTELS ON IMPORTANCE OF CLEANLINESS

THE COUNTRY'S Minister for Lands, Natural Resources and Tourism, Paul Bomani this week called upon tourist hotels in the country to maintain clean premises. He said that hotel-keeping was a specialised service with international norms and stressed that awareness towards proper hygiene had to be encouraged to all hotel workers.

He assured hoteliers that the Government would give priority to the tourism industry but that national efforts to develop the industry would serve no end if hotels and other facilities were not properly maintained.

In a move to enhance hotel services, the Minister announced plans to introduce an annual performance competition which would emphasise on cleanliness and hotel maintenance. In this competition, the winning hotel team will get an award for good performance whilst the respective management will be accorded due recognition.

Bomani expressed hope that the competition would instill a sense of responsibility among hotel workers and managers which would lead to better services being rendered.

### NEW TARIFFS

The Minister also said that his ministry was re-examining tariffs charged by tourist hotels

problems being faced by several parts of Dar-es-Salaam city will be alleviated in about a year's time.

The grant will be used to rehabilitate the water pumps at upper Kivu and will include the construction of new trunk line and the replacement of pumping machines.

### I.D.A. CREDITS

In another development, it was learnt this week that the International Development Agency (IDA) will grant Tanzania a credit of 450 million shillings for the modernisation of Dar-es-Salaam port.

The entire project which will cost some 1547 million shillings is planned to improve the status of the Dar-es-Salaam port so as to enable it to keep up to modern shipping methods and also to maintain its strategic position as a regional port.

The Dar-es-Salaam port serves as a gateway port to Zambia, Burundi, Malawi, Zaire and Rwanda. The port is also a focal point for the Tanzania Railways Corporation (TRC) and the Tanzania Zambian Eastway Authority (TAZARA) which serve Tanzania and neighbouring countries.

The planned project is expected to be finished by the end of 1989 and will include the conversion of one container and two general cargo berths at the port to a purely container handling facility. The new container terminal will be provided with equipment including cranes, tractors and trailers.

Some other finance towards the project is reported to be coming from Denmark, Finland, Italy, the Netherlands, Norway and Britain and this is expected to amount up to some 544 million shillings. The Harbour Authority in the country (THA) will be contributing about 344 million shillings for the project.

### GRAIN DAMAGE

On completion, the project will speed up the unloading of grain ships and reduce the amount of grain damage and loss from handling inefficiency and will also provide storage capacity within the port area.

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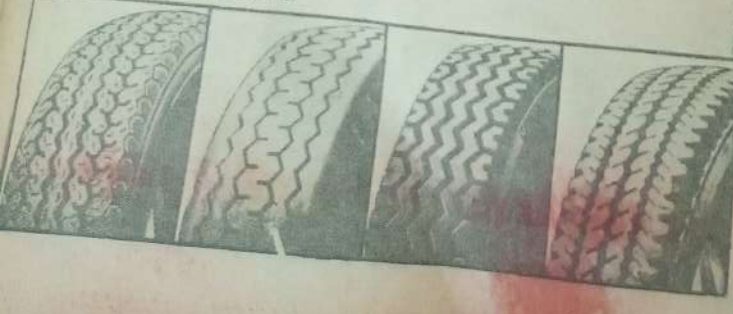

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# Festlich tafeln im Imani Dhow Restaurant

DIE SEVERIN Sea Lodge, 15 km von Mombasa entfernt am Banabustrand gelegen, hat nie aufgehört, sich weiter zu entfalten. Als sie Ende 1982 ihr 10-jähriges Jubiläum feierte, war es den Inhabern und der Geschäftsleitung klar, daß der nächste Schritt zu einem neuen, exklusiven Restaurant führen würde.

Bei der Planung kristallisierte sich die Idee heraus, eine Dhuu in ein Restaurant umzubauen und im Hotelgarten, von Wasser umgeben, aufzustellen. Über ein Jahr lang wurde an der ganzen Küste entlang vergeblich nach einem geeigneten Objekt gesucht; entweder stimmten die Maße nicht, war der Kahn zu alt oder nicht verkauflich. Am einfachsten wäre es gewesen, eine neue Dhuu nach Maß bauen zu lassen, was auch nur halb soviel gekostet hätte wie eine umgebaute alte Dhuu. Severin zog jedoch vor zu warten.

Eines Tages lag im alten Hafen von Mombasa die Dhuu IMANI die bisher nur mit zwei Segeln gefahren war und nun mit einem Motor ausgerüstet werden sollte. Sie schien in jeder Beziehung den Anforderungen zu entsprechen. Nach langwierigen Verhandlungen gelang es auch, den Besitzer zum Verkauf zu überreden, und am 3. Juli 1984 segelte Kapitän Hamza Makame die IMANI auf ihrer letzten Reise nach Bamburi. Als sie vor dem Hotel verankert wurde, begannen die eigentlichen Schwierigkeiten. Tag und Nacht mußte sie wegen dem Geratenwechsel beobachtet werden. Große, im Sand verborgene Steine beschädigten jedoch den Kiel so stark, daß das Schiff auf den Grund sank.

**Kaimauer**  
 Mit Hilfe von zwei Kränen mußte die 40 t schwere Dhuu mühsam über die Kaimauer gehievt werden, ein Vorgang, der genaueste Berechnungen und größte Sorgfalt erforderte. Die komplizierte "Operation" wurde von der Firma CIVICON erfolgreich durchgeführt. Einmal in der Hotelanlage, wurde die Dhuu über eine von der alten Bohlen, die Röhre stammten, bis zu ihrem endgültigen Standort gezogen. Allein zum Tragen und Aufrichten des hohen, schweren Mastes wurden 40 Leute benötigt.

Die IMANI, 20 m lang und

7 m breit, wurde vor 20 Jahren in Sansibar gebaut. IMANI heißt "Vertrauen". Mit einer Besatzung von 14-16 Mann fuhr diese Dhuu jahrelang auf ihrer Route von Sansibar, Dar-es-Salaam, Tanga, Pemba nach Mombasa und zurück mit 90 Tonnen Ladung, bestehend aus Bortstangen, Baumwolle, steuerbord auf der rechten Seite aufgemalt ist.

Jetzt steht die stattliche IMANI in einem Teich, umgeben von tropischen Pflanzen und fächerförmigen Palmen, davon eine mit besonders malerischem Knick. Der neu eingezogene Boden ist leicht gewölbt, so daß man beim Gehen das Gefühl hat, auf See zu sein. Achtern ist die Bar genau an der Stelle, wo sich früher das Quartier des Kapitäns und seiner höchsten Offiziere befand. Der restliche Teil des Schiffes war offen, und die übrige Mannschaft mußte sich im Laderaum mitten unter
