## Ring up 'Ring-us-up'

BRRRR, BRRRR, next Friday December 29, 8.00p.m. the telephones at the Voice of Kenya's Mombasa Studios will start ringing at the start of another annual Mombasa Round Table V.O.K. Television Ring-us-up' auction.  
All the arrangements for this year's show, which promises to be the best ever have been made. Mombasa business community and regular supporters of charitable causes have been most generous in donating items for the auction.

As in the previous years, a total of four dukas, two in the first half before the news and two in the second half will sell about ten items each. There will be a few special items which include two refrigerators, a Sanyo special with the three items donated by Sanyo/Armco valued at over 6,500/-, a television and a few other items of a value of over 3,000/-.  
The main item of the auction as in the previous years will be a motor car for which bids will be accepted right from the start to the end of the show when it will be knocked down to the highest bidder.  
The car this year however is different from the ones in the past. It is a 1952 Rolls Royce,

Silver Cloud, which was bequeathed to the programme in the will of the late Mombasa benefactor, Mr Owen Barton. The car is in a very good mechanical condition and just needs a slight embellishing, particularly to its interior. The Rolls Royce factory in England has put a minimum value on the car of Shs. 60,000.00.  
The items on auction are being displayed for members of the public in the arcade of Ambal House.  
The Kenya Posts and Telecommunications have provided fourteen lines to the auction number which is 21261, and have kindly offered to send a telephone engineer to the studios during the show to en-

sure that nothing goes wrong with the telephones.  
The organisers of the programme have requested members of the public, who will be bidding to avoid making hoax calls, as this wastes valuable show time, and they will be depriving the less fortunate people to whom the proceeds from the show, that extra money which could be raised through genuine bidders.  
During the duration of the programme, there will be two three minute musical breaks to provide breathing space to the viewers and the presenters, one of these will be by a Comoro Band and the other by Julie Felix.

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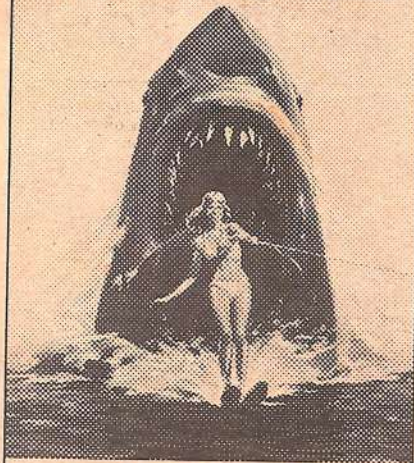

## COAST THEATRE Robinson Crusoe - sheer vitality

PLAYING to delighted capacity audiences at the Little Theatre Club has been Julie William's production of the Pantomime Robinson Crusoe. There is some talk that the run will be extended beyond today (Friday) and what a pity if it is not.

This is Julie's first Pantomime production for the L.T.C. and I think she will now have a job for life. What a superb show it is! Often Pantomimes lose pace mid-way particularly in the dance sequences.

This one bounces along from start to finish, keeping everyone, young and old, entertained for the entire three hours.

The company I was in ranged from three years to, well, around thirty-three, and none of us failed to be enraptured by the sheer vitality of it all.

The choreography, under the direction of Joyce Woodward, is a joy. One particular scene, an underwater ballet with fluorescent lighting, deserves special mention. It was a triumph for dancers and special effects men alike.

Every member of the sixty or more strong cast pulled his weight to provide a sparkling production. From chorus to principals there was no weak link.

With so many excellent principal performances it is unfair to single anyone out for special praise, but a pantomime dame if well performed, is a sure winner. Roy Williams as 'Mrs Crusoe' was hilarious and loveable. A performance here that we will all remember.

Ralph Cooper as Robinson with his charming personality and pleasant singing voice made an ideal hero, and he had an ideal heroine in Jane Lightbody as 'Polly Perkins'. She showed a delicious blend of sweetness and sauciness.

David Garnett and Roalgie Cross as 'Billy and Sukey' had the difficult tasks of setting the show off, and playing the subordinate roles to the principal boy and girl. They made an excellent job of it.

What a good sport was Patrick O'Neil as 'Man Friday'. His seemingly effortless performance must have taken countless hours to perfect.

Chris Fryer is a good villain, and clowned his way through some delightful scenes, ably supported by Glyn Davies as 'Jolly Roger' and by Ray Toomey who provided his perfect foil as 'Rueful Rupert'.

Dorothy Patience was a majestic 'Britannia'. Who could fail to cheer when she overcame 'Davy Jones' played so well by her husband Denis? I must make particular mention of Davy's make-up, he most certainly looked as if he had been down below for years.

And we must not forget our flying doctor Peter Wicklin as 'Broody' the parrot. He handled a difficult role with just the right blend of cheekiness and timidity. His costume was particularly eye-catching.

Add to these superb performances, good music, audience participation, colourful and well-designed sets and Liebrecht's dazzling costumes, and you have top-top entertainment.

Here is a show that had everything - and a little bit more.

**TRUTH IS LOVE.** Love is beautiful. Beauty is truth. And that is Satyam, Shivam, Sundaram.

Rajiv a young engineer, is asked at the site of a dam where he meets a girl who sings so beautifully. The beauty of her voice automatically and immediately relates in his mind to the beauty of face and body.

For the young engineer, the illusion created by her divine singing is an intense reality and it is this 'reality' that makes him love her.

For the young girl named Roopa however, her own reality is a hideous one. Scarred in childhood by a terrible accident, she acquired the label of *manhoos* (ill-omened) because her mother died in giving her birth.

There is no beauty left in her life. Branded ugly by both man and nature, she roams the countryside giving solace to her own soul in the most divine melodies.

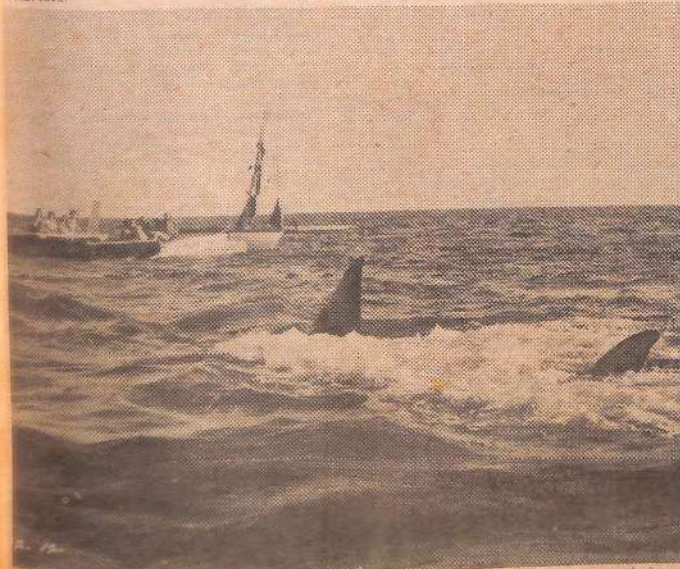

THERE were encores galore for Julie Felix — one of the most popular and talented singers in the world today — at the end of her charity performance at Trade Winds Hotel, Diani, on Saturday.

Among the enthusiastic audience was Mr. Elskiel Nyarangi, District Commissioner, Kwale, who was guest of honour accompanied by Peter Gitau, District Officer (I) Kwale.

The concert helped raise funds towards the building of a new wing at the School for the Deaf in Kwale for the exclusive use of mentally handicapped children.

Nearly Shs. 100,000/- has already been raised through self-help efforts, but the new buildings which will include a dormitory for boys and girls, also a classroom, is costing about Shs. 800,000/- to build, and they hope to raise sufficient funds to have these ready by February 1979.

The aim is to provide accommodation for 34 children from all over the Coast Province offering a standard 1-7 education.

Mentally handicapped children are presently being educated at the Deaf School, and there is an urgent need for separate facilities to be provided.

## PERSONAL IMPRESSIONS OF THE TOUR; The President visits Nyanza

"The President's visit is a blessing and will promote love and understanding, and appreciation of the cultural riches of Kenya's different people."

President Moi re-iterated his popular call of love, unity and hard work, as the major driving force sustaining our rapid progress in Kenya.

Later traditional elders presented gifts of respect and seniority to Mr. Moi.

The gifts included spears, shields, stools, skin gowns and caps. Large choirs of school children led the crowds in loud chanting of the chorus: *Moi juu! Moi juu! Moi juu...*

### EXPLAINING ASHURA

WHILE not justifying the *Matam* or *Zanjir* rituals held in Mombasa during *Ashura* I wish to clear up the misconceptions generated by mis-informed reports recently printed in the Nairobi press.

On the night of *Ashura*, to mark the martyrdom of *Imam Hussein*, various symbolic gestures and rituals have evolved over the centuries.

One of these, believed to be Persian in origin, consists of making small nicks on the back and/or chest so that some blood flows.

Although the exact details of this ritual, where it started, by whom and in keeping with what tradition, is now lost in antiquity, the principal idea is the common one of 'mingling blood to show solidarity'.

The action of 'mingling blood' is found in almost all societies, in some form of ritualised ceremony or other

[Christians partake of 'the flesh and blood' of Christ during their own religious ceremonies.]

This particular ritual, neither a central or very important part in the observance of *Ashura* has flourished in some areas; and died down in others - in Kenya, the majority of *Shias* symbolise this ritual by donating their blood to hospitals.

The *Matam* ceremony, an impressive and inspiring event, has been described thoughtfully and sympathetically by writers around the world.

Basically it is aimed at increasing the spiritual awareness of the religious devotee.

It is never allowed to be carried to any extreme lengths, and is at all times strictly controlled by the elders in charge of the *Ashura* rituals.

## Think about those prices!

THIS WEEKEND many readers will be preoccupied with last minute Xmas presents. Before buying more expensive items, however, it is worthwhile considering the relative merits and demerits of the various methods.

of their profit margins. But the customer is unlikely to negotiate a discount and the price paid will be the listed price.

Unlike hire-purchase agreements, ownership of the goods passes to the customer as soon as the first payment is made. If he fails to keep up the payments the retailer's only remedy is to take legal action for the outstanding amount.

Undoubtedly the best method of buying, especially at the present time, is to pay cash. Many retailers are complaining of poor sales and good discounts are available for those with cash in their pockets.

For those without cash it is more advantageous to borrow money from a bank if such a loan can be obtained, and then pay cash for the goods required. The high rate of interest which must be paid will be more than offset by the discount received, as the table indicates.

Finally, it pays to shop around. The bleak economic climate is affecting retail sales and shopkeepers are feeling the pinch. As a result trade is competitive and some will give bigger discounts than others to attract business.

The table shows the true price of buying a Sh. 4,000 T.V. set by each of the four methods.

The commonest way of buying goods such as radios, record players and cassette recorders is through hire-purchase agreements. The customer pays a deposit, usually 40 per cent of the purchase price, and the balance is spread over a period of up to two years. Interest is charged on the amount outstanding, at the rate of 12-15 per cent annum.

The main advantage of this method is that customers can budget easily and spread repayments over a relatively long period. Consequently they can buy goods which would otherwise be beyond their financial resources.

On the other hand, the total price paid, including interest, is high, as the table shows and hire purchase agreements are the least economic way of buying.

Also, the goods do not belong to the customer until the last payment has been made. During the term of the agreement legal ownership rests with the financier and he can repossess the goods if the hirer does not keep up the repayments in accordance with the contract.

An alternative method of buying is the credit sale, whereby the price is divided into 6-12 equal instalments which the customer pays monthly.

Most retailers do not charge interest on credit sales, absorbing any interest costs out

It was felt that Kenya could benefit even more from the fact that Kenya could benefit even more from the expanding French tourist market if it was channelled through Cameroon, specially as Cameroon Airlines provides a regular service linking Paris-Douala-Nairobi.

### MORE KENYANS VISITING U.K. FOR HOLIDAYS

HOLIDAYS in Britain by Kenyans, which were launched last year by the British Airways' charter for 200 Kiambu farmers, and 'snowballed' this year, when over 400 Kenyan farmers visited the Royal Show, had established a 'new trend in travel'.

This was stated by Mr David Barrow, the Marketing Executive for Africa and the Middle East of the British Tourist Authority (B.T.A.).

Mr Barrow was summarising his views following two major promotions, organised by B.T.A. with the assistance of British Airways, for more than 250 travel industry executives in Nairobi and Mombasa.

Mr Barrow said that Britain 'tops the list' of countries to which Kenyan residents travel on holiday. This was borne out by the considerable number of weekly flights by British Airways and Kenya Airways from Nairobi to London.

Mr Barrow added: "The

He referred specifically to various, already popular, farms tour programmes, focusing on the Royal Show and the other agricultural shows, and hoped "an increasing number of Kenyans" would visit Britain in the future.

### COAST HOTEL TARIFFS 'FAIR'

from NETA PEAK

KENYA'S increase in hotel tariff structure has been defended by Kim Morbey, chairman of the Coast branch of the Kenya Hoteliers and Caterers Association.

Mr Morbey recalled that when in Germany and Switzerland recently he was regularly charged about K.5hs 40/- for large whiskey.

There he had found the profit on beverages (i.e. selling price against cost), were as high as 65 per cent on beers, and spirits in first class hotels.

"Most 'medium class' hotels reckoned on a minimum of 30 per cent gross profit and," Mr Morbey "could not understand how we could run a business making only our per cent overall gross profit."

Declared Mr Morbey "we do not ask for vast profits, we would not consider a 100 per cent gross profit unreasonable and this could be achieved by increasing the price controls, or alternatively reducing the vast government taxes on beers and spirits."

He explained that "almost all Coast hotels charge the same board rates, and the only way of keeping pace with the continually increasing cost of present was to increase the tariff."

He noted: "should consideration be given to allowing higher margins on beverage increases, tariffs would certainly not have to be so high as the possibilities of no net increases at all taking place could be envisaged."

### Tea sales improved

OFFERINGS at this week's African Tea Export Auctions totalled 27,942 packages comprising 23,590 packages from Kenya weighing 1,131,493 kilos, 3,412 packages from Uganda weighing 135,685 kilos, 10 packages from Rwanda weighing 19,343 kilos, and 278 packages from Mauritius weighing 1,303,297 kilos.

There was improved but fairly good demand at call rates for most descriptions.

The better CTC prime Fannings were irregularly often difficult to sell, but were a number of withdrawn in the room. Medium sorts of Off-Grade types met with useful competition.

Demand for Rotated manufacture top grades was limited.

There was fairly good support from Canada, the Continent and the United Kingdom and from Pakistan to some extent. The Sudan and Ethiopia were also in the market.

# Calling Lagos and New York

HAVING been absent from the local shipping scene for some three weeks, I have enjoyed the experience, albeit limited by time, of viewing shipping in other parts of the world.

My first port of call was Lagos which has earned an unfortunate reputation for heavy berthing delays over the past few years, coupled with occasional acts of piracy whilst vessels wait at anchor.

Although up to a short time ago it was not uncommon for vessels to be waiting up to 6/9 months, with over 100 ships waiting in the roadsteads, the situation has considerably improved and I only counted approximately 50 vessels waiting.

An excellent view of shipping at the harbour of Lagos/Apapa is to be seen from the centre of the town. Like Mombasa containers were much in evidence, and all vessels were of modern design made necessary by the recent Nigerian Authorities ruling that vessels of 15 years and over would not be allowed to use the Nigerian ports unless in exceptional circumstances.

I found the climate in Lagos considerably hotter than Mombasa with higher humidity.

After a 13 hour flight across the Atlantic I found myself in New York. The City boasts a magnificent Maritime Museum namely the South Street Seaport Museum on the waterfront where there is berthed square riggers, old tugs and a Misty Swagi stern wheeler amongst others.

The vessel which caught my attention was the fully rigged iron ship *Wavernee* built in Liverpool in 1885 as the *Southgate*. She sailed on her maiden voyage from Cardiff to Singapore on March 5, 1886 and arrived after a passage of 112 days. She subsequently had an interesting and chequered career with many instances of heavy weather damage and near disasters.

## MONTREAL

From 1911 until 1947 she lay in Punta Arenas in South America and acted as a storage ship for wool. She was then sold for scrap but 'rescued' in Buenos Aires by the Director

of the San Francisco Museum, the result of which is that another fine square rigger has been preserved for posterity in spite of heavy cost especially making the vessel seaworthy for towing to New York.

Leaving New York behind, a visit to Montreal and Toronto was next on my schedule where I viewed the great St Lawrence Seaway in conditions of ice and snow and a temperature of -18°C (2°F).

As the Seaway ices up normally by mid December, ship-owners are anxious to ensure that their vessels clear the River in time otherwise they face the possibility of their vessels being trapped above Montreal for some 3/4 months. A grim and expensive prospect!

## ENGLAND

My safari was completed by a few days in London at which time severe gales were sweeping S.W. England. The force of the gale and the strength of the sea was well illustrated by the apparent loss of the 37,000 tons 'LASH' (lighter aboard ship) vessel *Munchen* owned by Hapag Lloyd and flying the German flag.

Like the container ship, the 'LASH' concept is reasonably new and it is hard to believe that a six year old vessel of this size full of laden barges can disappear below the waves without trace, although I believe two or three barges were found afloat at the time I left U.K.

On my return to Mombasa I hear another old favourite presently discharging is being sold, namely the 7,300 ton *Clan Malcolm*, ex U.K. She is being sold to Far East interests and after completing discharge on the coast she returns to Mombasa to be handed over.

Built in 1957 she is a sister ship to the *Clan Matheson* also sold last month.

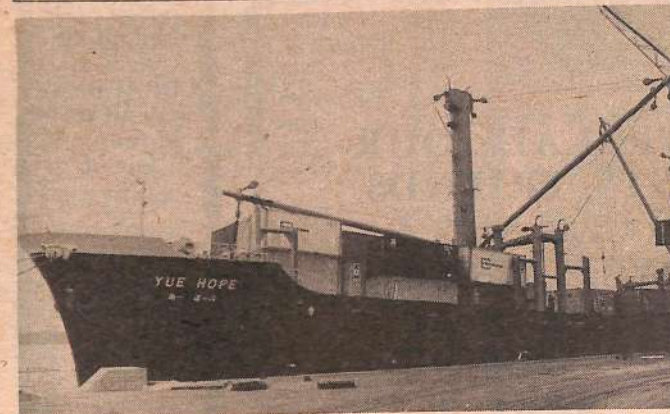

The freighter will take on consignments of bulk soda ash for Lagos, and containerised cargo comprising soap, sisal and produce exports for the West African ports of Apapa, Tema, Port Harcourt, Douala, Matadi and Lobito.

Through *Zim Line*, Star East Africa offer regular container sailings from Mombasa and Dar es Salaam to European, West African and Far Eastern ports.

## LAKE STEAMER TO RESUME SERVICES

from TONY BARROS in Dar es Salaam REPAIRS on m.v. *Liamba* have been completed. Administrative formalities are being finalised before the ship, grounded for the last eight years starts plying the Lake Tanganyika waters.

The Tanzania Railways Corporation is working out of fares and running schedules for the ship which serves areas surrounding the lake rehabilitation of the ship cost about four million shillings.

The ship which was fitted with new diesel engines, failed to begin operating at the end of last year as scheduled because of the late arrival of some spare parts.

The rehabilitated *Liamba* will have better travelling facilities and will carry 20 first class passengers, 32 second class and 350 third class. It will also carry 280 tonnes of cargo.

Its cafeteria has also been improved. It consists of a fully serviced restaurant for third class passengers, and another one for first class with a bar. There is also a special room where children can get soft drinks and play.

The assembling of m.v. *Bukoba*, one of the three vessels bought by the government to serve on Lake Nyanza has been completed. Only minor fitting are being carried out.

The ship is expected to be commissioned next June.

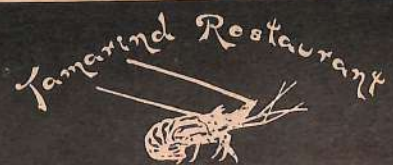

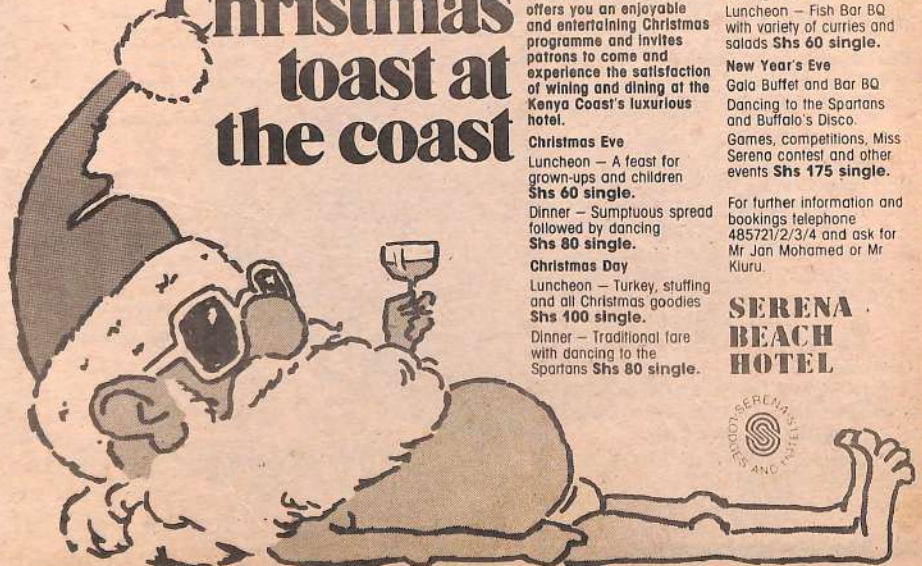

AS Christmas approaches and allusion to this annual feast intensifies from all quarters, I can feel myself growing fat. In fact I can almost identify with the poor Strasbourg goose. Since families tend to cling to tradition more steadfastly as the years go by, I shall make no attempt to interfere with their habitual menus or persuade them to alter their well tried and loved recipes for chestnut stuffings, hard sauce or flaming Christmas pudding.

But instead, I will try to suggest some light alternatives from VE. OLDE LEFT-OVER turkey (turkey risotto, turkey hash, turkey soup, devilled turkey, turkey fricasse...turkey trout) which might come as a welcome change during the Christmas holiday particularly when friends are apt to drop in, only to be confronted with exactly what they thought they had left behind in their own larder.

I am not knocking turkey. I look forward to it, it is a very fine bird, it feeds multitudes and is equally good hot or cold but *fourous perdis*, as the confessor of Henry IV found out to his cost.

Consider mushrooms which are sufficiently different in texture, flavour and appearance and which are easily obtainable at most times of the year in Mombasa though not at the market. One has to go to The Fort Supermarket or Omnes for these. But they are worth seeking out for they provide endless variations on one theme and compliment, vegetables, meat and fish quite

happily.

Here are three recipes which come from a fascinating book by Jane Grigg *The Mushroom Feast* published by Penguin. Mushrooms do not take long to prepare and will stretch far enough to include a few droppers-in. Here is a sauce which is perfect for almost any non-oily fish and originally came from Russia.

### WHITE WINE SAUCE FOR FISH:

- 1/2 pound quartered mushrooms
- 2 ounces butter
- 1/2 pint fish stock (used heads and bones for this)
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon flour
- 8 ounces white wine
- 2 egg yolks
- Salt and freshly ground black pepper
- Pinch of sugar
- 5 ounces thick cream

Cook the mushrooms for a few minutes in half the butter. When the juices begin to run, add half the fish stock and the lemon juice. Simmer for 20 minutes without the lid on the pan, stir in the flour, then add the rest of the fish stock and the white wine. Reduce over a low flame. Beat the egg yolks in a bowl and whisk in the wine sauce, little by little.

Heat an inch of water in a largish pan and when it simmers place the bowl over this and stir gently until it thickens. Do not allow to boil.

Add the mushroom mixture which should still have a little liquor left, but not much, and correct the seasoning. Add the pinch of sugar at this stage.

If you are using a very dry wine or not a very good one, it helps to improve it. Stir in the cream and go on cooking until

the sauce is very hot again.

Or try an iced mushroom soup which is refreshing during sultry weather. The problem in this recipe will be to get the cream home before it goes sour.

### ICED MUSHROOM SOUP:

- 6 ounces mushrooms
  - 1 3/4 pints chicken stock
  - 1 dessertspoon of arrowroot
  - 3 egg yolks
  - 5-7 ounces thin cream
  - Salt and white pepper
  - Plenty of chopped chives.
- The fine green tops of spring onions chopped in the same way will do very well. One man in the market always has these.

Put a little stock in the blender and puree the mushrooms. Dissolve the arrowroot with a little of the stock. Bring the rest of the stock to the boil, add the mushroom mixture and cook for 3 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in arrowroot. Reboil then remove from heat again.

Combine the egg yolks and cream add to the soup and stir until the soup thickens over a very moderate heat. Correct the seasoning. Cool. Then chill thoroughly. Sprinkle the chopped chives over before serving.

*Mushrooms 'a la Grecque*. This may be served as part of a mixed hors d'oeuvre or as an appetiser. Be careful not to overcook the mushrooms. They should retain a certain firmness in the centre and not be mushy so really fresh ones are the best.

### MARINADE:

- 4 ounces olive oil
- 1/2 pint water
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- Crushed peppercorns to taste

- 1/4 teaspoon crushed coriander seeds to taste
- Salt

Bouquet garni, 1 bay leaf, sprig each of parsley, thyme, fennel and 1 celery leaf

1 pound cultivated mushrooms. Boil all the ingredients except the mushrooms together for 10-15 minutes. Add mushrooms to this hot marinade for approximately three minutes only, then leave to cool. Serve well chilled in little of the marinade.

According to Alice B. Toklas the longtime friend of Gertrude Stein "a mushroom, is a mushroom" except when it became a mushroom sandwich which, have been a speciality for years".

### MUSHROOM SANDWICHES:

- 4 ounces mushrooms cooked in 2 tablespoons butter, then blended
- 2 scrambled eggs
- 3-tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

Combine the cooked mushrooms with the scrambled eggs and add the Parmesan cheese and mix well. Season to taste.

The recipe ends with: This makes a delicious sandwich which tastes like chicken-frenchman can say no more.

# LOOKING DOWN MEMORY LANE

MANY newspapers, at this time of the year, stand back from news coverage and ruminate on happenings during the past 12 months. Just to be different, I will dip into my memory and recap on some of the famous personalities I've had the pleasure of meeting over the past 21 years — since my arrival in Kenya at Nairobi's old Eastleigh Airport.

While producing a tourist picture magazine called African Life in the late Fifties, I met the British Queen Mother Elizabeth — affectionately known as the Queen Mum — who recently celebrated her 78th birthday in London.

With other journalists, I was invited to Nairobi's Government House (now it's State House) to meet her. I can remember her melodious voice and charming smile which put us all at ease. We talked about her earlier safari to Kenya in the Thirties with her late husband, King George VI.

It's now a Kenya legend, of course, how her daughter — the present Queen Elizabeth — ascended to the Throne of Britain while at Treetops with Prince Philip. It was there she learned of her father's death in 1952.

Another VIP whom I shall never forget meeting in Nairobi — at Alamed Bros. to be exact, where he and his wife, Una, and their children were being fitted up for their safari — the greatest entertainer of all time, Charlie Chaplin. It must have been around December 1957.

## CHAPLIN

Stepping inside the store with a photographer, I had a few words with Charlie's escort, the late Major Milne of the Mombasa safari firm, Flood's Tours. He's not in the best of moods, I was told.

In the event, the visiting star couldn't have been more pleasant and helpful. We chatted at length. "If I were a bit younger, I think I'd like to live in Kenya," he said.

He then studied our fine struggling magazine and asked, "How would you like me to hold it?" He realised that being pictured with African Life, he would be helping to boost it — and, in the process, doing us a great kindness.

Then, there was the late Governor of Tanganyika (as it was called) Sir Edward Twining who appeared outside his Government House in Dar es Salaam in white shorts and

shirt. An aide remarked, "There's a Mr. Ivor Davis from Nairobi to see you, Sir." He exploded, "What! Another of those Kenya rascals from Nairobi — you've really got to watch them!"

After that, he invited me in for coffee and a chat. It would seem that even in those far off colonial days, there was a spot of jealousy between Dar and Nairobi.

Another Royal I met was the Duke of Edinburgh — also in Dar es Salaam. This was during Tanganyika's Uhuru Celebrations in 1962. I was then running a TV-news filming agency, called Africapix, with my partner, Moulund Dhillon, a well known Nairobi cameraman. The Duke indicated quite a good knowledge of the TV business.

My final VIP memory? Our Nairobi meeting came to mind when, aged 80, after a long illness, she passed away recently in Jerusalem. I'm thinking of that indomitable mother figure, Golda Meir, a pioneer of the State of Israel and at one time its premier.

She was in a queue of visiting diplomats in Nairobi waiting to present a gift to Mzee, President Jomo Kenyatta — he was then our Prime Minister — at Kenya's Independence in 1963.

I saw a variety of carpets and ornaments waiting to be presented. I was then introduced to Golda. "What is the gift from Israel you will present to Mzee," I asked her.

"It's rather difficult for me to lay it before him like the others," she replied. "It's an ambulance for the Ministry of Health!"

# URANIUM FIND IN TANZANIA

PROSPECTING for Uranium in Tanzania has started and the Ministry of Water, Energy and Minerals will receive the first results of the rock analysis from the Federal Republic of Germany later this year.

A West German firm — Uranerzbergbau — GMBH has been granted a licence by the government to prospect for the mineral in the country. Three German geologists and five local experts were working on the job.

If the analysis is positive, sources state that trenching and sampling will be intensified. The same applied to drilling.

Aerial geophysical surveys show that Tanzania has rocks suspected of having Uranium.

Tanzania will have to grapple with a prolonged shortage of tumblers. The country's main glass factory has been subjected to power failure, water shortage and continuous shortage of gas.

But education and tourism will receive a great boost following the approval of two loans totalling 208 million shillings by a world bank affiliate aid to Tanzania. About 96 million shillings has

been set aside for an education project and 112 million shillings for the tourism facilities rehabilitation project.

Sweden and Canada will also increase their aid to Tanzania and Tanzania will receive compensation of 82 million shillings from the European economic States scheme for a shortfall in steel export earnings in 1977.

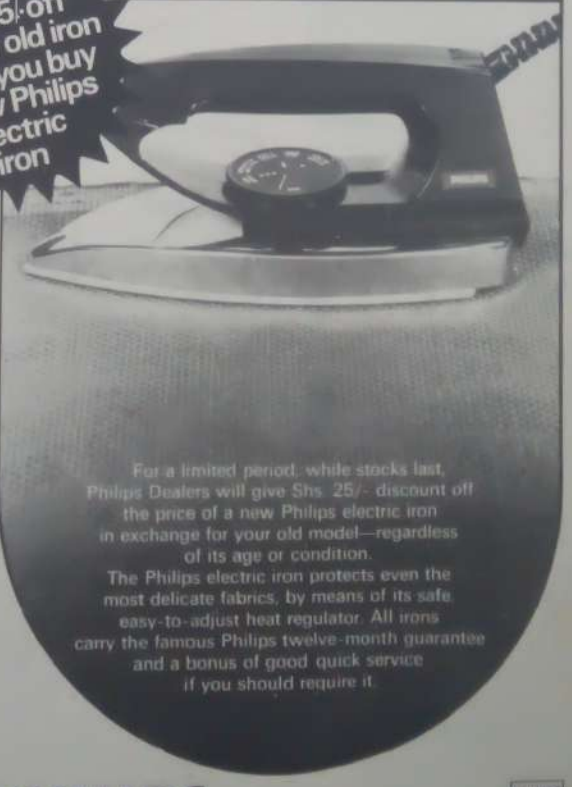
## TANGA

And in Tanga, the town, 80,000 residents are now drinking saline-free water following the completion of a Shs. 16 million Tanga Water Supply Scheme.

Although it is yet to be commissioned, the plant at Mahoyari on the Sigi River some 13 kms from Tanga is supplying water to Tanzania's second largest town at the full capacity of 26,000 cubic metres daily.

Already, the town is awash with flags, colourful decorations and dolled up in a sparkling prelude to the pomp and ceremony which accompany Christmas holidays.

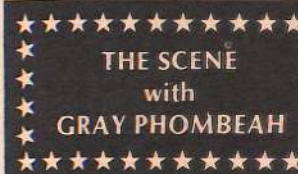
Miniature Christmas trees and flowers now adorn most homes, offices, and hotels in town.

**HIMALAYAS EXPEDITION**

**KENYA TEAM REACH 22,000 FEET IN 54-DAY CLIMB OF THE HIMALACHULI**

EXCLUSIVE report from NETA PEAL

THREE men — two from Mombasa and Nairobi and one from the U.K. — have managed to reach 22,000 ft in their assault on the Himalachuli peak in the Himalayas — but were still over 3,000 ft short of their target.

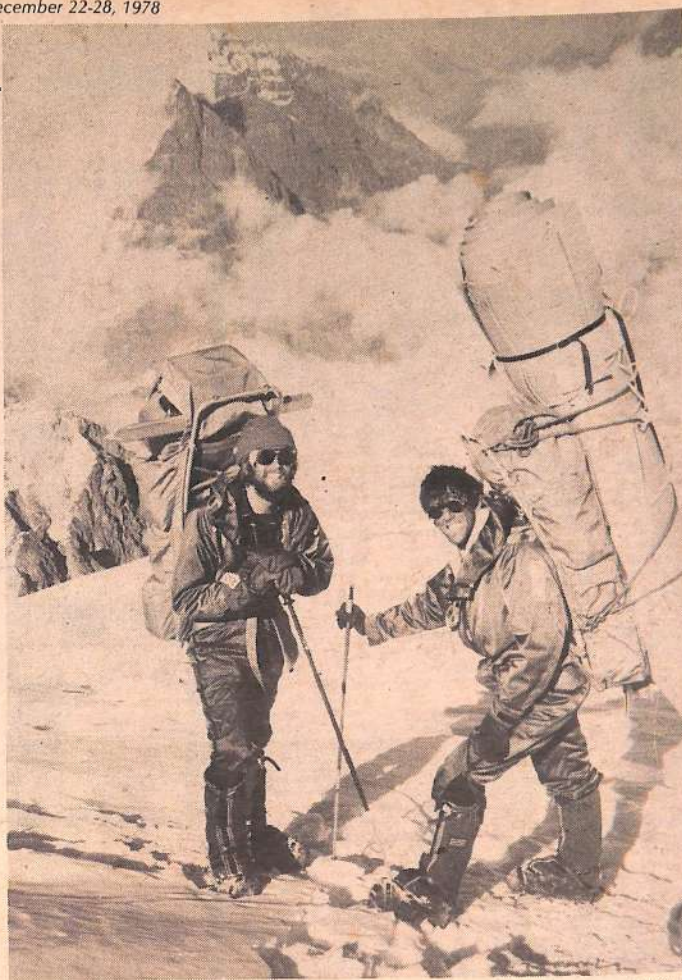
Originally a part of an eight-strong (British) expedition — Ian Howell, co-leader (Kenya); John Cleare expedition leader and professional photographer (U.K.) and Dr Alistair Stevenson (Kenya) continued with the assault despite the expedition being marred by tragic news, bad weather and diminishing numbers.

Ian Howell — an electronics expert and marketing director of Navcom Ltd who has climbed to the summit of Mt Kenya over fifty times, with 12 solo ascents to establish the Lowbonar Hut on the 17,000 ft peak, and Dr Stevenson — a Mombasa dentist — planted the Kenyan flag on the highest part of the Himalachuli they reached before returning to base camp due to bad weather.

At 17,000 ft they came across footprints of the Abominable Snowman finding to their horror that they were travelling in the same direction. It was the Sherpas in the party who identified the footprints as being those of a Yeti. Everyone was very happy when their route took them a different way.

They also found tracks of a snow leopard at that height.

The original eight-strong

team, including five climbers from Britain — broke up when news reached Janusz Onyskiwicz — one of the lead climbers, that his wife had died in the America Women's Expedition climbing Annapurna in a neighbouring range.

**MACABRE**

Earlier they had been experiencing foul weather. It had taken 14 days to walk the 100 miles to base camp at 15,300 ft along a valley which runs into Tibet.

Although they planned to arrive in a post-monsoon period, they still suffered considerably from leeches which fed hungrily upon them.

Said Alastair "we often looked a most macabre crowd with blood streaming from our legs, and out of our boots!"

For the walk to base camp they had 70 porters each carrying about 30 kilos of luggage in woven baskets on their backs, a total of over two tons

of stores and equipment.

During the time they were trying to establish themselves on the mountainside, all camps suffered considerably in a bad storm and raging winds. They were all in very exposed situations with ice cliffs all around them.

They lost two tents, and as it was estimated that it would take a further five days to reach the summit (25,980 ft) they decided to return to base camp and rest awhile to wait for the storm to abate.

There was a lot of new snow around and Alastair who was in the lead between Camp 2 and 1 was suddenly engulfed by an avalanche. He was swept some 300 ft and buried in snow, but managed to dig himself out.

"Fortunately," he said "we had not been roped together at this particular time — so my partner escaped."

Adding "I think my colleague who saw it all happen was more upset than I was."

For Alastair it was his first

visit to the Himalayas.

He described the scenery as "stunning", adding "you would arrive back at Camp 2 short of breath and with sore feet only to be revitalised by the most stupendous scenery, particularly at sunset with views stretching some 100 miles into Tibet".

He said, with a laugh, "it would also have been breathtaking, but oxygen was already in short supply!"

Altogether, fifty-four days were spent walking with only four rest days, covering 450 miles.

**RESCUE**

Alastair has returned to Mombasa with a lot of personal cold weather gear such as down suits and sleeping bags all of which were donated, also a quantity of unused medicines which he is donating to the Mountain Club of Kenya's rescue team and to Mission Hospitals.

**Marlin, Sailfish and Shark taken**

DURING November 2,100 kilos of fish were weighed in at Bahari Club. These included 13 Marlin, 15 Sailfish and a shark.

These figures were undoubtedly boosted by the fact that two major two day fishing tournaments were held during the month. However the Club's previous best score in November was 2 for Marlin, and 7 for Sail, so it could be stated without question that the past month's billfishing has been the best ever experienced at this time of the year.

Another factor that has contributed to the marked increase in the number of billfish caught in November is that many more boats are fishing further out than there were a few years ago.

The highlight of the month was without doubt the landing of a Black Marlin of 228.2 kgs. (503 lb.) by Maurice Robinson while fishing in Tamaam during the Elianto Fishing Competition.

Maurice's marlin was gaffed 25 minutes after the fish was hooked, and this was no doubt largely due to the able handling of the boat by Mac Spence.

This fish is the largest ever weighed in at Bahari Club, but unfortunately does not qualify for the Club's prize of a crate of whiskey as Maurice was not a club member at the time.

However, we are pleased to note that he has now joined the club and is just waiting for another monster!

Romania will supply two soccer coaches and a netball coach, Poland will send a football coach and two athletics coaches will come from the United States.

The American coaches will prepare Tanzanian athletes for the 1980 Olympic Games in Moscow and the Romanian coaches will during their 18 months conducting courses with the ultimate aim of training 25 local coaches.
