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Top Zambians pour Kilindini

THE continuing importance of Mombasa's Kilindini port to regional African trade has been highlighted by the high-level visit mid-week of three senior Zambian Ministers.

Ostensibly the Ministers arrived to review progress of the Eastern Africa National Shipping Line — jointly owned by the governments of Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda and Zambia, and based in Mombasa with important offices in Dar es Salaam and London.

However, during their one-day visit the Ministers toured the port area accompanied by senior Kenyan government officials who stressed that Kilindini's first class facilities can promptly handle any perceived Zambian cargo.

FLOODS HIT COAST

STORMY NINE-DAY RAINFALL

HEAVY RAINS have lashed many parts of the Coast — the downpour leaving more than 300mm. (12 inches) of water near Mombasa during the past week.

The rains have caused havoc to communication: stranding motorists, destroying paved roads, flooding telephone cables, uprooting trees, and even causing temporary power break-downs.

THREAT TO ZANZIBAR MONKEYS

from TONY BARROS in Dar es Salaam

A researcher with the Arusha-based Serengeti Research Institute has called for concrete measures to protect the rare Zanzibar Red Monkey from extinction.

This follows three years' study on the distribution, behaviour and feeding patterns by Mr Frank Skilkiluwasha.

The Zanzibar Red Monkey whose total is about 1,690 is only found in Zanzibar. It is listed in the International Union of Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources (I.U.C.N.) data book as an endangered specie.

Latest available weather records indicate that parts of Mombasa have received more than 630mm. (almost 23 inches) of rainfall during May — which followed on from an already wet April.

At the Bamburi Portland Cement quarry forest rehabilitation project the water table rose more than 50 centimetres, resulting in flooding the fish ponds... and the fish have dispersed, swimming their way out through the trees!

The site of the new port has already been selected, but construction would be determined largely by future needs of the K.P.A.

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Geometric approach to Orange peeling

ORANGE: Needs no introduction but my excuse for including it as a fruit this week is based on the discovery of an outstandingly good orange which is easy to prepare, looks decorative and costs next to nothing.

It comes from Michael Smith's *Fine English Cookery* and he gives explicit directions as to how to work the fruit which really is fiddly at the best of times but this method cuts its down the messiness with its rather geometric approach to the problem.

ORANGE SALAD:
8 large fleshy oranges
4 ounces castor sugar
1 small glass of gin
juice of one lemon
grated peel from the orange

Finely grate 2 heaped teaspoons of the best part of the rinds. With a small sharp knife, cut the rind from a slice oranges, having first cut a slice off the top and bottom to reveal the flesh. Cut off the first slice then use the white edge of the pith as your guide as you cut 'over and under'.

Care must be taken not to cut into the orange flesh, and at the same time no pith should be left on the fruit as this is bitter and will spoil the salad. Cut out the first segment between the obvious membranes.

Put your forefinger into the cavity and use this as a 'wall' against which to work as you cut out the remaining segments, moving the finger along into a position as you progress in this manner you should be able to produce whole segments easily.

Carefully arrange these segments in a dish, in attractive layered circles, sprinkling with a little castor sugar and rind as you go along. Finally pour over the gin and the lemon juice and chill the orange salad well. The sugar will dissolve and make its own rich syrup without further liquid or cooking.

ORANGES IN RED WINE:

Having attempted the above method of removing orange segments this gives you a chance to perfect it!

8 navel oranges
12 ounces of soft brown sugar
red burgandy
pinch of powder clove
double cream for serving

Prepare the oranges as in previous recipe but retain the rind of at least three of them. Shred the rind very finely. Measure the juice which has escaped from the oranges and add to this sufficient burgandy to make up 3/4 pint of liquid.

Add the sugar to this and dissolve over a gentle heat. Add the rind and allow it to cool in the wine syrup. When cool pour over the orange segments. Chill thoroughly after sprinkling with a little powder clove. Serve with washings of really chilled double cream.

Having started my theme this week with the orange it seems as well to continue for they are so readily available in Mombasa and at the market the fruit merchants will cut of a slice of the type they are selling so that one can gauge the sweetness before buying.

Oranges have a long culinary history. The Greeks and Romans however did not know the sweet orange — only the bitter one which the Crusaders brought from Palestine into Italy.

The Arabs introduced it to Spain, the south of France and East Africa. A historic orange tree, planted in 1422 by Eleanor de Castille, wife of

the King of Navarra, came into the possession of the Constable of Bourbois.

It was confiscated along with all his possessions in 1552 and later re-appeared first in the gardens of Fontainebleau, under the name of Lord High Constable, then the gardens of Versailles. The tree died in 1858.

ORANGE FLOWER WATER:

This has a very subtle fragrance and is used in pastry-making and confectionery while the essential oil, known as Neroli is used for scented creams, custards and pancake batters.

Orange flower water also appears in an old English pudding known as Flummery described rather stodgily by the Oxford Dictionary as a kind of food made by coagulation of wheatmeal or

1 tablespoon water
grated rind one orange
Place in the bowl a double handful of flour and a quarter of a pound of sugar. Add the orange flower water and mix thoroughly. There are many uses for the orange flower water.

GRANNY HAN'S ORANGE MARMALADE
12 Serrano lemons
4 sweet oranges
5 quarts of water
12 pounds sugar
12 pounds sugar

It will make a very good jam up the fruit of a



wholemeal! Which certainly does not do its delicate flavour justice, though it is a firmish 'cream' but it is as simple as can be to make and is an interesting accompaniment to fruit salads.

It could be served in a magnificent Georgian mould or one of those elegant Victorian affairs with knobs and turrets defying the laws of gravity. I have used a flat mould and decorated it with orange segments. It should be served with cream — oddly enough it is not over rich.

- 1 pint of double cream
- 1 ounce gelatine dissolved in water
- 2 ounces castor sugar

sources more than 92 hours were 'lost' during the eight days due to bad weather conditions.

"The monthly total of lost working hours at the port is officially put at around 160

hours, but of course this does not include the time taken to cover and uncover cargo hatches and ships holds", explained the same sources.

Mombasa airport witnessed cancelled and delayed flights as jets were unable to land on schedule because of heavy

cloud and poor visibility.

In Mombasa itself the town's roads were generally admitted to be in "their worst" ever conditions with large potholes breaking out all over every major road.

Kenya Bus Services reported breaking more than 30 springs on their regular routes in less than five days.

Several roads were underwater over the entire weekend, the most extreme example being near the railway station roundabout where vehicles splashed through almost one metre of flood water gathered around a choked storm drain.

such as fallen trees.

A pedestrian was reported hospitalised with leg injuries after falling into a particularly deep and dangerous pot-hole near the Makupa Causeway.

Villages in Kisauni on the north coast suburbs experienced three continuing days of heavy rainfall and had to paddle to work through upto half a metre of stagnant flood water.

According to local weather watchers the rains are not a record in themselves but are running close to the record levels of 1972 and 1968.

The gloomy weather has not been without its humorous side too. A West German tourist 'marooned' in his Shanzu hotel room noted:

"When I get home I shall tell people that it only rained twice during my stay here once for just seven days, and then again for another week!"

IT'S ALL GOING TO POT-HOLE

MOTORING CORRESPONDENT JOHN GARDINER AND MOMBASA ARTIST FRANK CORNWELL REPORT

OVER THE last week several acquaintances have said "When are you going to write about the roads?" I avoided the obvious response "What roads?"

There is little doubt that our towns roads have become the most popular topic among the brave breed of people, Mombasa's drivers. It must be many years since the roads have reached the present stage of decay, there are sections of main road that look as though they have been the stage for a tank battle. The individual pot-holes have merged, the really deep ones are full of water so that drivers have no idea what depth they are about to drop into, and the rest is strewn with rubble.

Why do Mombasa's roads break up so easily? The easy answer is the heavy rain, but it is that sufficient reason? Mombasa's average rainfall is far below that of several other cities, so how about asking their engineers for a new recipe?

Someone explained to me last week that fresh water dissolved coral and as coral is the base of most of our roads this leads to the water filled cavities that the upper structure falls into. Most of the islands of the Indian and Pacific Oceans are made of coral, so someone must have come across that problem before.

My theory is that road engineers in other parts of the world have faced the same problems and have presumably solved them. So how about asking them for advice? An extended tour of tropical, heavy rainfall coral based towns by one engineer would still be cheaper than the enormous cost to the local authorities, of making good the present chaos, and that doesn't take into account the expense to owners of damaged vehicles.

May I suggest one minor financial spin-off? How about walking off some of the more spectacular sections and declare them National Parks? Tourists could then be diverted from Colorado and thus help pay for the cost of mending the rest of the roads.

"Visit the Grand Canyon of Digo Road! See the sun set over the distant rim. Travel by pony to the river below. See the fossilized remains of a Mini-moke!"

CARE FOR TWENTY NINE DESTITUTE CHILDREN:

MOMBASA S.O.S. VILLAGE OPENS

TWENTY-NINE destitute and orphaned youngsters now have a beautiful place in which to live where the emphasis is on a happy home life — together with a 'mother' and 'family'.

These lucky ones are the first to take up residence in the prestigious SOS Children's Village, Mombasa, situated near the sea and the Reef Hotel.

Costing about Shs. 6.1 million to build it will eventually give a home and care to between 100/120 young children from babies up to seven years of age who will grow up there and not leave the village until they can support themselves.

This SOS Children's Village makes a magnificent contribution towards the U.N. designated 'International Year of the Child'.

Raising a fantastic sum of over Shs. 1 million has been a small band of enthusiastic, public-spirited members of the Mombasa Round Table who have given up much of their spare time to assist in establishing this SOS Children's Village at the Coast — the second to open in Kenya.

It has been their largest and most ambitious project yet, and much of its motivation came from Chris Fryer who was shocked to learn that there are some 800,000 destitute children in and around Mombasa. This is apart from such areas as Nairobi, Eldoret, Kitale and other towns in Kenya.

Said Chris "While these statistics expose the enormity of the problem, it is likely there are hundreds more such children around".

The newly established Mombasa/Nyali Round Table is also giving a helping hand.

Chris Fryer, chairman of the

Mombasa SOS Village committee said "The two Round Tables at Mombasa would still continue to assist". He envisaged this might take the form of helping equip a playground, and with other things.

A Dutch women's magazine, *Lebelle*, contributed over Shs. 3.5 million. Annually, it publishes feature articles about these children's villages, each carrying an appeal for donations.

Other funds have been made available from SOS Kinderdorf International — the parent organisation in Austria.

It is hoped that its founder, Dr Hermann Gmeiner, will be coming to Kenya sometime in November to officially open the SOS Children's Village at Mombasa.

In 1949 he established the first SOS Children's Village based on his firm belief that

'mother' along — who is now employed at the village. They now comprise five family units — which are expandable and can absorb up to 45 children altogether.

There are five mothers and an assistant mother looking after them all. They, too, came from different parts of Kenya and were trained at the SOS Village, Nairobi.

Said Simon K. Njuguna, director of the Mombasa SOS Village "our aim is to get more local mothers, and we are presently looking for suitable recruits, preferably those with some experience in child care, homecrafts and social work who would regard this as a 'permanent' vocation".

He mentioned that single or unmarried mothers with one or two children — but not above the age of seven — would be most welcome, and their children would become part of

cleaning and cooking — the children giving a helping hand.

This has already bred a spirit of 'family togetherness' as witnessed when a toto who had been with a group of children outside the house — found herself suddenly alone. On hearing her cries, one of the 'family' quickly appeared on the scene and carried her back to the fold.

Each mother is given an allowance for the upkeep of her family — for which she accounts to the village administration at the end of each month. She decides how it should be spent, and does her own shopping.

There is also a children's clothes store where garments donated are kept, and a dispensary with Dr L. De Souza calling there on a 'voluntary' basis once a week.

A giant cube, which also combines as an entrance sign, and styled on the lines of a Ludo dice will eventually contain about 10,000 gallons of water and will be of great help in times of shortages.

However, over Shs. 200,000/= is still required to pay for the rest of the furniture, also for the levelling of the very bumpy ground and coral outcrops. The garden needs to be developed and the grounds

made generally more attractive.

In addition, playground equipment needs to be found.

All furniture is being made by the YMCA, Nairobi. Cadbury/Schweppes is helping by donating crates of Super

Ndau Sea-wall funds appeal

Not only will the construction of a Sea Wall prevent the destruction of property but it will also enable boatmen to load and unload necessary commodities more easily.

The total cost of the Sea Wall is Shs. 500,000/= The Government has agreed to provide Shs. 180,000/= It is therefore hoped to raise approximately Shs. 320,000/= on a Harambee basis.

Safari Rally answers

IN reply to my early letter on the re-allocation of the Safari Rally, your correspondent J. Gardiner of Mombasa (COASTWEEK May 18-24) wanted to convince the readers that Nairobi is the only place which has the space, communications and hotel accommodation for the mass of journalists who cover the event. Apparently that is why it cannot be started or finished elsewhere.

Those taking part in the Safari Rally, would be forced to take leave of absence from their immediate employers if the event was scrapped on taking place over the Easter Holidays.

It's a pity to say that the Kenya Government — whose leader is a devoted Christian — has ignored the Easter Holidays. The Radio and T.V. which is supposed to give us the life history of Jesus Christ till his crucifixion, during this time, talks absolutely nothing about Christ other than the Safari Rally coverage.

Easter like Christmas must be given full coverage by the V.O.K. come what may. But why is Easter ignored in Kenya?

Yes, Mr Gardiner, I live in Nairobi but Mombasa is also my hometown. However, I am bored to see Nairobi year in year out starting and finishing the rally as though it is the

only suitable place for it we have in Kenya.

But then you shocked me when you defended Nairobi saying that it has space, communications and hotel accommodation for those covering the event — than any other place.

Do you mean to tell me that Mombasa — which is the second largest town we have — does not have enough space, communications and hotel accommodation, for those talking about, for those covering the Safari Rally? Man! You must be kidding.

Whatever you meant, Mr Gardiner, by saying so of you. But why don't you seem to like my idea, I mean of having the Safari Rally, started and finished in Mombasa yet you stay there! Don't you think you will save a lot of duff (not Buff) by seeing the rally start and finish there instead of coming all the way long from Mombasa to Nairobi — to see the rally and only to find that you have overspent?

But you see the whole idea is not to shift the Safari Headquarters to Mombasa for good because, if my suggestion materialises, they will be rotating the venue every year.

I am afraid, Mr Gardiner, I don't have any influence whatsoever with the V.O.K. to persuade them to improve what you call "ludicrous radio coverage of the Safari". But are you sure it is the V.O.K. to blame and not the Safari Rally organisers over the poor coverage?

A friend of mine working with the V.O.K. told me the other day that they are being blamed for nothing because the full report comes from the Safari Headquarters to rely on and to quote the fifth paragraph of your letter "Some 1,500 volunteers, who man controls, operate radios and telephones etcetera".

Therefore, the V.O.K. announces exactly what they have received from their people stationed outside any mistakes, is right from them.

Mr Gardiner, the V.O.K. coverage of the Safari Rally is and has always been excellent — and I say to them, keep it up! But you should not forget that I do not want to hear the Safari coverage over the Easter Holidays — the Safari dates MUST be switched.

AS a frequent visitor to Kenya over the past 12 years, I have observed the growth of tourism into one of Kenya's major industries.

I have also seen some problems developing recently which could seriously affect this growth unless attended to quickly by the Ministry

concerned and the police.

Prices at many hotels and lodges have sky-rocketed. In some places they have doubled and even tripled in the past four years. The tourist cow can only be milked so far!

Not all tourists are rich, and certainly a range of accommodations at all prices should be available, especially in the parks, for both locals and tourists.

Safety seems to be a growing concern. Recently I witnessed an attack on a tourist on an isolated beach at Lamu, an incident which isn't rare.

these days. 'Covering up' assaults won't help; in fact, it makes matters worse by suggesting that the problem is worse than it actually is.

Most tourists don't know how to deal with beggars. Some contribute out of sympathy, which of course increases the number of beggars. Instead, information on charitable agencies should be made available and donations and perhaps visits encouraged, to see what is being done.

In some places hawkers and peddlers so overwhelm tourists that they retreat from the streets and beaches to the 'security' of hotel lobbies and swimming pools. Without stifling the enterprise and initiative of these aggressive salesmen, maybe some way can be found to limit their numbers and territories.

Taxis must have meters and their use must be enforced. The unescorted tourist is often incredibly overcharged (e.g. 120/= from the airport to town) and starts out with a very bad impression.

Some problems are the fault of tourists as well, usually from ignorance. I would suggest that the Ministry of Tourism should publish a short pamphlet to warn tourists about some of the unpleasant things they might encounter.

The pamphlet should tell the tourist whether to tip or not and if so, how much. I believe the official policy is 'no tipping', and tourists would be

much relieved to know this. Policy differs so much from country to country, and most people tip to be 'safe'.

PAN AFRICA Insurance is that rare bird, a commercial company with its head office in Mombasa — but whose activities aren't confined to the Coast. It has branch offices in Nairobi, Kisumu, Meru and Eldoret, and very sizeable interests in property development in Nairobi and Kisumu.

Equally, its Kenya-wide developments are judiciously thought out. Its main investments lie in Nairobi, where it holds 60 per cent of Mae Properties Ltd which is developing a former coffee estate outside Nairobi for good-quality housing.

Elsewhere, in Kisumu it has a 50 per cent shareholding (Kenya Reinsurance Corporation hold the other 50 per cent) in Wedco, a town-centre development comprised elevated car parking, shops, a supermarket, and office accommodation.

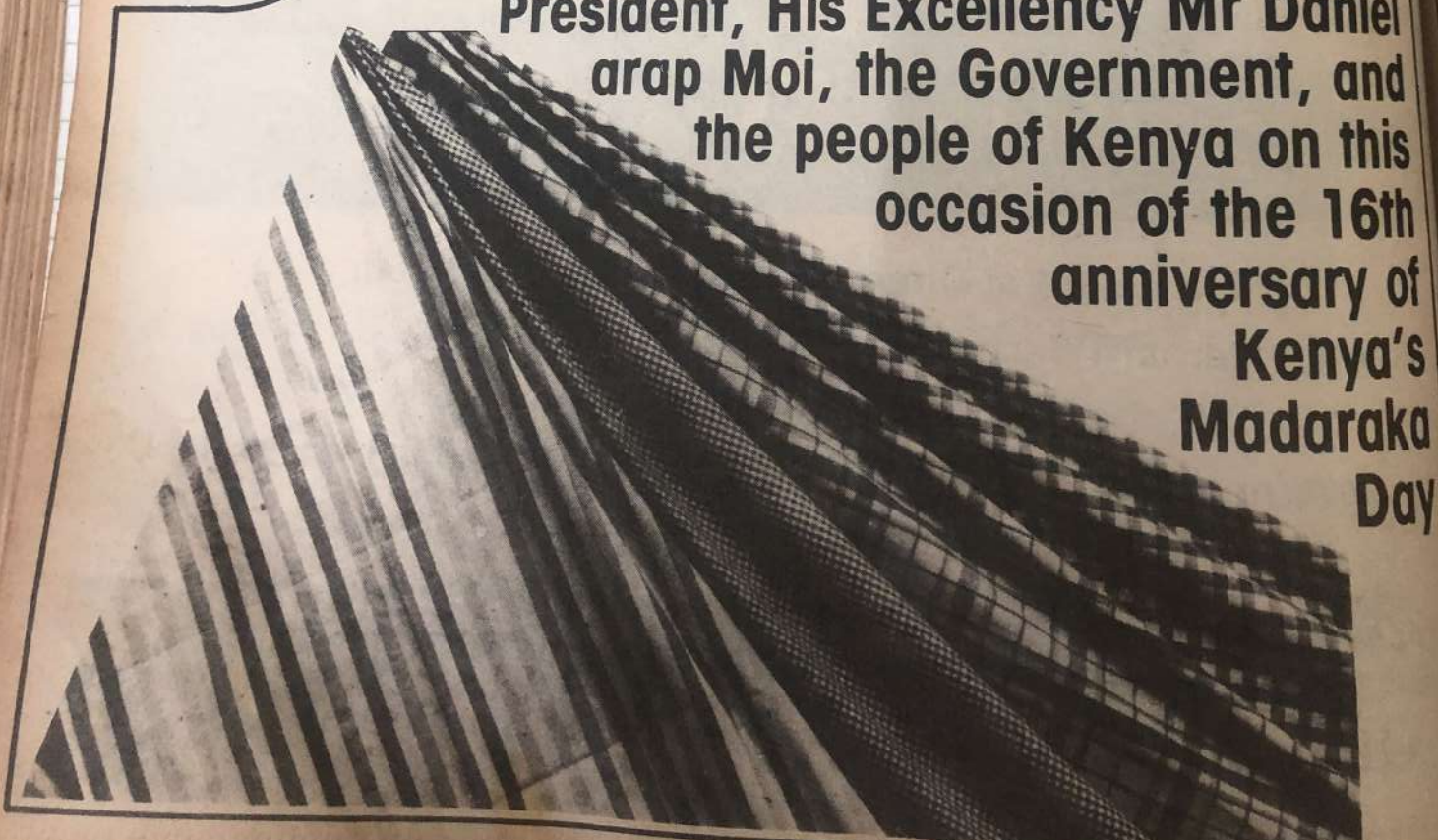

THE PORT of Mombasa plays a vital part in the economic advancement of Kenya.

From Mombasa come imports, which include farm machinery, fertilisers, crude oil, steel works and vehicles which sustain Kenya's growing manufacturing and agricultural sectors.

Out of Mombasa go exports, such as tea, coffee, cotton, sisal, soda ash, to earn the much needed foreign exchange and to maintain trade with the rest of the world.

Mombasa is connected to all international sea routes, a fact which far pre-dates Kenya's modern history.

Since Uhuru, port development has taken a quick pace, taking into account the latest technology in shipping and cargo handling techniques.

Two more deep water berths number 16 and 17 have recently been completed and brought into use.

The new berths were designed and constructed for eventual conversion to handle container traffic.

Other modern facilities included installations for handling bulk tallow, a conveyor belt system for handling soda ash and two oil terminals.

These developments are geared to keep pace with the trend of agricultural and industrial development in the hinterland, which has gone up 100 per cent since Uhuru.

In 1963, a total of just over 3 million tons of imports and exports were handled through the port. In recent times the figure has doubled to more than 8,000,000 tons.

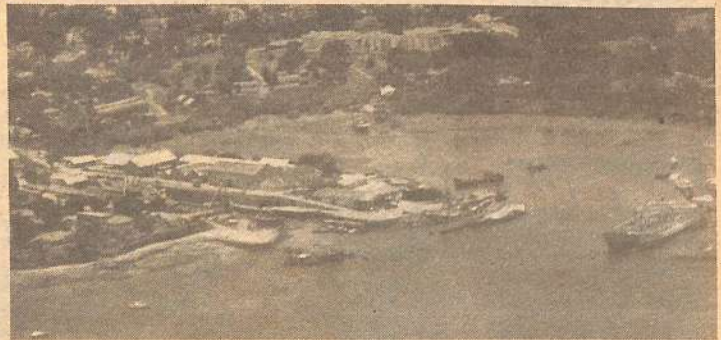
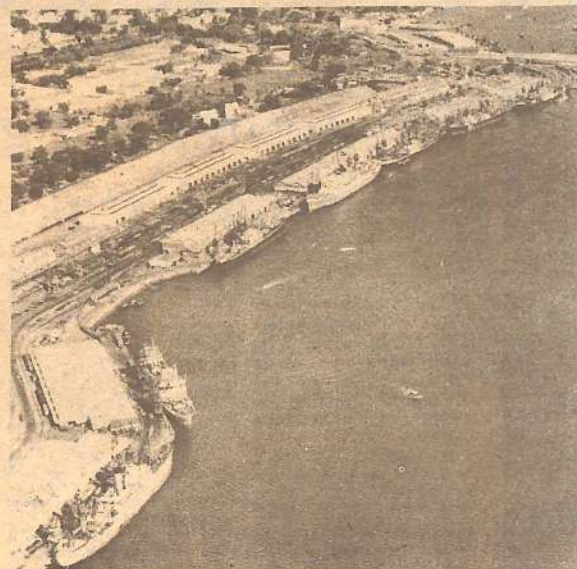

REFINERY COMPLEX

A VITAL key to industrial development in Kenya is the huge East African Oil Refineries complex spread out over the Changamwe Industrial Area on the Mombasa west mainland.

A second crude oil processing plant was completed in 1974 at a cost then of 224 million shillings — making the refinery one of the Republic's largest single industrial investments.

The refinery annually imports up to 2,800,000 tons of Gull oil for local processing — the crude oil breaking down into aero and motor fuel, kerosene, industrial and marine fuel, grease and bitumen.

Apart from supplying all of Kenya's petroleum and lube requirements, the refinery exports its products to neighbouring countries, the Indian Ocean area, Mediterranean countries, Australia and the Far East.

East German technology build Mbeya cloth factory

THREE EUROPEAN nations are to assist the National Textile Corporation (NTC) in the construction of a 450-million shilling Mbeya, southern Tanzania. Construction is to start next week and the mill is expected to be in operation in late 1981.

The mill anticipates to process 26 million square metres of cloth annually and will meet the entire demand of the southern highlands areas. It will also export khanga, vitenge, dress prints and shirting material to Zambia, Zaire, Malawi and Mozambique.

The main contractors — Unitechna — from East Germany will provide the spinning machinery. Verme from Poland will supply the weaving machinery and Union Matex of West Germany will provide the machinery for processing and finishing. The local costs will be met by the Tanzanian Government.

Two other textile mills currently under production in western Tanzania are due to go into production early next year. These are the 120 million shillings Tabora Spinning Mill and the 468 million shilling Musoma Textile Mill.

Netherlands grant for vital imports

Tanzania is to receive a grant of 120 million shillings this year from The Netherlands for financing essential imports. This is in addition to a 380 million shillings made available last month.

While Sweden will grant a relief assistance grant of 9.5 million shillings to help disabled people in the areas affected after the recent war with Uganda. This amount is in addition to the 2,000 million shillings Sweden is to grant Tanzania over the next three years.

A local firm, Messrs. Jandu Plumbers has started manufacturing exhaust pipes sufficient for the demands of the motor vehicle users. The plant can make 14,400 pipes a year.

The firm also makes exhaust pipes for tractors, shackle pins, U-bolts and centre bolts. All the products are made from locally used materials except imported fibre glass.

A feasibility study for a 10 million shillings Tabora regional master plan has been completed. The plan, part of the Tabora Rural Integrated development Project (Tridrep), will enable the region to work out a programme for low-cost water supply projects in the rural areas.

Tridrep is jointly financed by Britain, Canada, Tanzania and the International Development Association (I.D.A.) — a World Bank affiliate and the project will involve an investment of about 195 million shillings over a five year period.

And the West German Government will grant Tanzania 2.7 million shillings to finance a cardamom farming project in Tanga region. In finance surveys aimed at improving cardamom production, while in Muheza 40kms from Tanga, two cardamom drying kilns are to be commissioned.

Construction of a 30 million shillings district and nursing school complex at Muheza is expected to be completed.

She writes songs for Roger Whittaker

I listened to Roger in Britain hearing *Thorn Trees* for the first time, strumming and then whistling it — according to Nat, he's a great *siffleur* as well as singer. He later created a French version, *Les Lutins Qui S'ennuient* (The goblins that walk in the night) and it's already in one of his albums.

He wrote his own music for Cynthia's *Idle Dreamer* lyric, and that has appeared (in English) on a Whittaker disk made in Germany. Neither of Cynthia's songs have yet been released in Britain.

I was privileged to see a letter written by Nairobi-born Roger — who was given his first real chance in showbiz

by Ron Partridge of the Nairobi Equator Club way back in the fifties — who told Cynthia: "I think that between us we have created a couple of very lovely little songs... I hope that life is as blissful in Kenya as I remember it".

Roger's parents, incidentally, live not far from me in neighbouring Loresho. Cynthia, Nat and myself had a good natter about those long-forgotten arguments that surrounded her creation of the national song for the 1956 Olympics.

A certain Mr Wm. T. Bircham — one of the six finalists whose entry didn't make it — rushed into print with a letter to the *Sunday Post* suggesting that Cynthia

had unfair help from her violinist husband, who had (most wisely) retired as a judge because of his wife's participation. Bircham had 'noted' that Cynthia couldn't read, let alone write, music and, therefore by implication, Nat must have had a hand in the song.

In a spirited reply, Cynthia wrote: "I do not read or write music. I play the piano by ear and Kenya *Land of the Lion* was composed by myself alone, complete with melody, harmony and rhythm, and only then set down on paper from my playing by a music teacher friend of mine (not my husband)".

Kenya *Land of the Lion* and its composer created quite a story at the time. The *Standard* gave Cynthia this write-up: "As a child she learned to love Kenya and its wild-life. Living in Rumuruti she kept lion and leopard cubs as pets and when she was 16, she shot a charging lion near her home. Her brother, Mr Bill Ryan, is a well known Kenya hunter."

Mrs Kofsky wrote her song while on leave at Mombasa. "I went out for a walk one evening on the beach by myself and made up the tune. I made up the words later. We sang it all the way up from Mombasa in the car... it nearly drove the family crazy".

During the Forces radio station's "Wireless for the Blind Fund Request Programme" — I suppose this was the start of the present 'Round Table's *Ring Us Up* — an announcer, asked to play *Land of the Lion* remarked: "Sorry we don't have the record: if I had the words I'd sing it for you".

Whereupon Alderman Reggie Alexander (as he then was) and chairman of the Kenya Olympic Committee visited the studio, put down a donation and challenged the announcer: "Here are the words — sing it!" He did.

But I think the last word on the subject must go to my late friend, Sir Derek Erskine, who wrote in the *Post*: "The wise guys — the disenchanted — who love to mock another's efforts are calling these lines trite and sentimental."

"Kenya, Land of enchantment" "To the less sophisticated, and I hope to Kenya's young champions in far off Melbourne, I believe these words with their rousing melody will recall the plains and mountains of 'Kenya! Land of enchantment'; and I believe that this Kenya song by one of Kenya's women pioneers will inspire Kenyans of all races, colours and creeds to 'March on, staunch and united' leaving the uninspired, illiterate and

Every night from 10 p.m. to dawn (5 a.m.) disco-manias meet here and 'Travolt' in the friendly atmosphere of the Club.

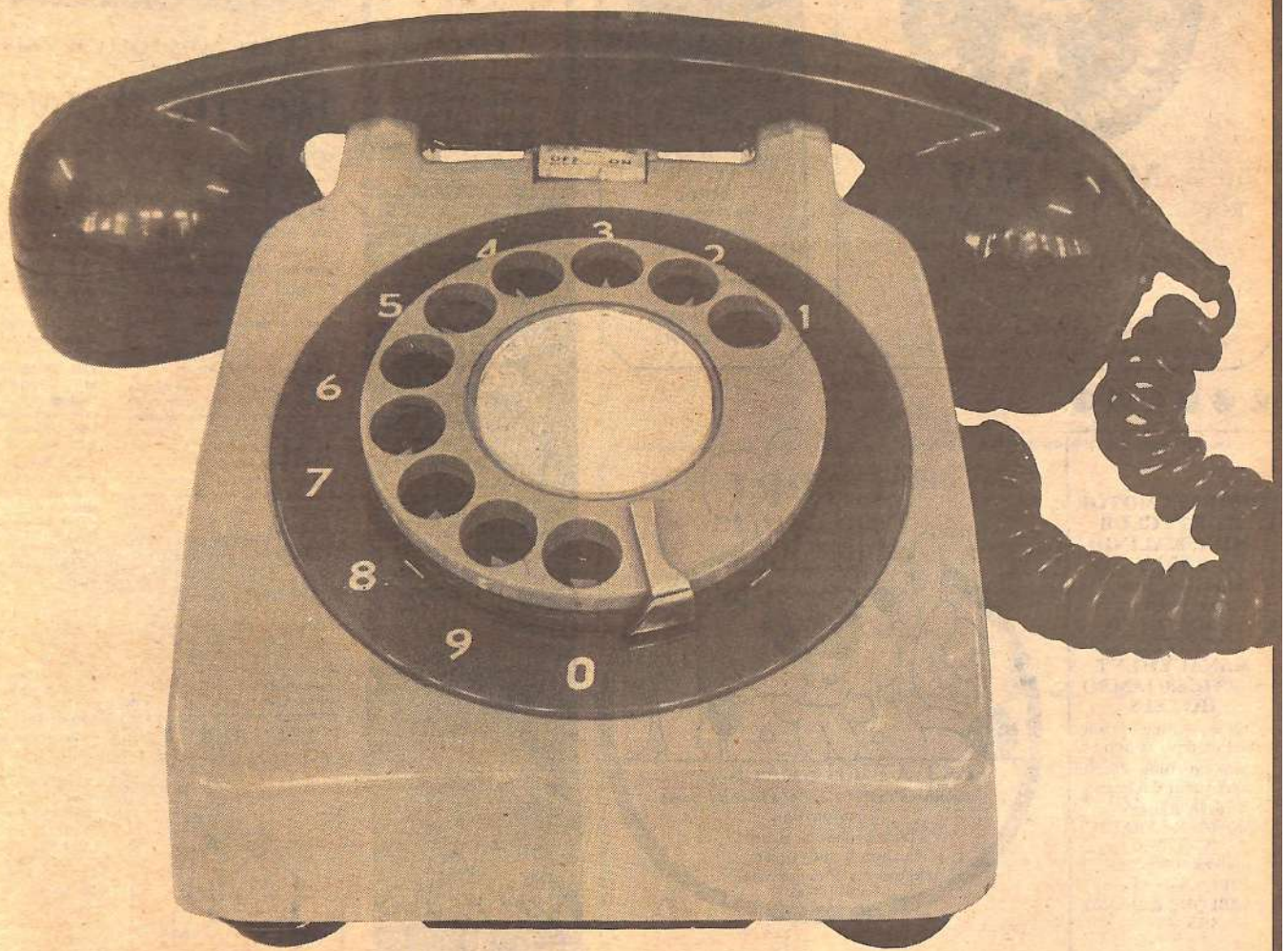
This has now become Malindi's main night spot, where tourists, mainly young men and women from West

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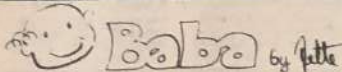

Soccer lovers left in the lurch . . .

TO MANY Coast soccer lovers, the series of defeats our football clubs have suffered since the beginning of the current season looks like a bad dream that everyone would like to forget as quickly as possible.

The extent that lesser powerful teams have humiliated our teams and the number of goals they have conceded so far confirms the faculties of even the most impassionate soccer observer in this country!

Yet this is the story of our soccer clubs of today — fatefully carrying the torch of soccer shoulder-high, while for all intents and purposes the flame appears to have spluttered over the years.

Judging from their current performances, the future of Mwingo, for example, is hopelessly in tatters! The power-packed forward machine of the past is no longer in existence and a makeshift defence system has now replaced the former formidable wall-like defence which could withstand any bombardment.

As each league day passed by, Mwingo fans in particular and spectators in general, have systematically been treated to a saddening spectacle of slow death as Mwingo, once the pride of soccer in Mombasa, trot wearily to the graveyard of soccer!

We had every reason to rejoice when three teams from the Coast joined the select elite of Kenya Super League contenders this year.

But this joy has been shortlived by our teams' dismal performances in the current league.

Frankly speaking, Coast soccer is no longer what it used to be: exhibitive, entertaining and satisfying fans' mania for classic goals.

In other words, we had stopped regarding and even watching soccer as it should be long time ago! Instead of the professional spirit of the game and the urge to win came in mere personalities who turned the pitch into a battlefield between soccer pundits and seemingly reduced players into sporting mercenaries.

At the corner, soccer lovers watched in utter bewilderment!

In the process, our went discipline among players, proper and principled administration of soccer at all levels, and finally the glory of winning and the moral obligation of delivering the goods to the fans.

And the soccer politics revolving around matters totally alien to the interests of the game, have not even spared those who see soccer as an end in itself! Humble players have mercilessly been cast aside, their brilliant careers cut short and the country denied the services of its most dedicated and selfless ambassadors in the world of sports.

Subjectively, everyone would wish to see the golden era of Coast soccer regained and the reputation of Mombasa as the home of soccer in the country restored.

But analysed objectively, this is a long way off from now, and taking into account the sad situation Coast soccer find itself in, such a phenomenon may never come to pass.

Yet in all fairness, the decline of soccer as a sport in Mombasa cannot be taken at face value. It is not the result of one man, one team or the soccer lovers of Mombasa.

It is, in fact, partly attributable to the current chaotic situation which continues to bedevil the administration of soccer in this country. And despite a new administration at the helm of power, its future still looks as confused as ever!

A lot of soul-searching is therefore, called for from all those concerned in order to steer away the game from its present steady decline.

Once upon a time there were such names like Lindonde, Kadenga, Madegwa and Sungura. These stars must be replaced and soccer re-admitted to its rightful place among other sports in the country.

As for Coast, no amount of tears can water and blossom the tree of soccer. The reality of the present is that we have to start all over again from scratch.

From the accumulated ashes we must search for the remnants of soccer — for the future.

There are no short-cuts!

To keep this event as prestigious as possible, and prevent international athletes being hauled by hundreds of very slow runners, an entry qualification has been set. Either 800m. in 2 minutes or less, 1500m. in 4 minutes or less, or 5000m. in better than 15 minutes.

All times must have been set in the last 12 months and be certified by an athletic official, as being correct. Entries to: The secretary C.A.A.A., Mombasa, or to Tony Lett at the stadium on Tuesday and Thursday evenings.

The likelihood of some good performances can be expected as international athletes gather in the town for the East and Central African Games, plus the possibility of some European athletes still being present after the Kenya vs. European Select team, also planned for June.

It should be noted that a marathon race has been included in the East and Central African Games, and athletes interested in attempting this distance should already be training. It is advisable to be running an average of 10 miles (16km.) per day.

More news and information on these events will be printed in COASTWEEK as time grows near, plus a few tips on marathon running, to help would be contestants.
