

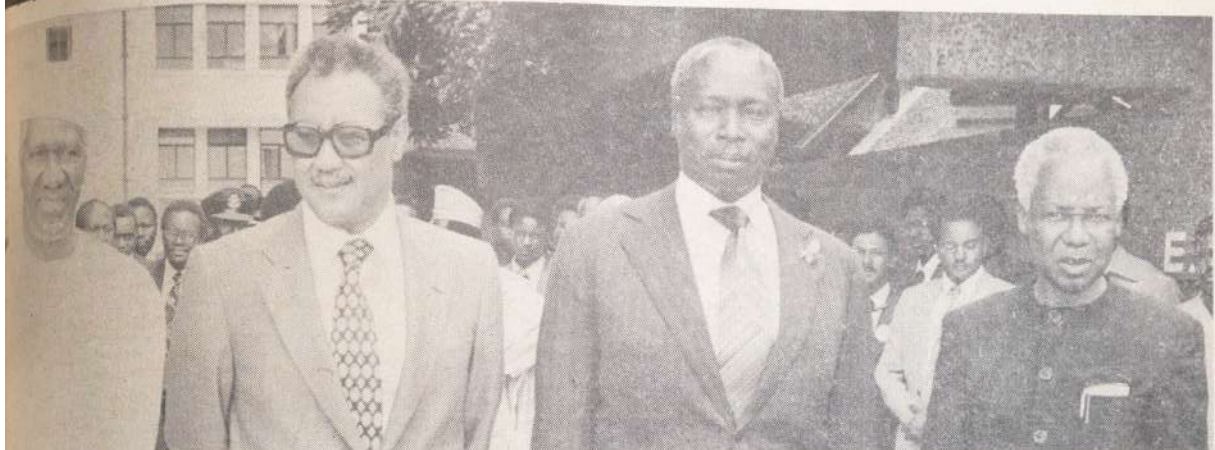

BALAIR CHARTER FLIGHTS 'FULL-UP'

SUCH is the popularity of the Kenya Coast on the Swiss market that Balair charter flights Zurich/Mombasa are "full up" during July and August, writes Neta Paal.

This was revealed by Seelig Ralf, sales representative, and Johner Jurg, reservations, both from Hotelplan, Switzerland, who are presently on a two week familiarisation tour of the Coast.

Hotelplan is the second largest tour operators in Switzerland and the first to send package tourists to Kenya in 1965.

Johner and Seelig have been spending a week at Lawford's Hotel, Malindi, which accommodated those early tourists. They also visited other hotels in which their clients stay including the Blue Marlin and Seafarers — all part of the Jambo Hotels group.

Seelig revealed that about 20 per cent of their repeat clients stay at Jambo Hotels. He said he was very impressed by the accommodation, food and service offered.

As for the peak summer months, he said "we just cannot carry all who would like to come, for bookings have soared for July and August".

They also visited tourist attractions where their clients go Lamu Island and Tsavo/Amboseli game parks.

FIRST VISIT

It was their first visit to Kenya, and they have been very impressed by the high standards maintained by the tourist industry here.

GULF ROUTE DELAY

Passenger services between Mombasa, Bombay and the Arabian Gulf which were scheduled to begin last month after the Zanzibar vessel — the Mapinduzi have been postponed indefinitely.

The general manager of the Zanzibar Shipping Corporation, Humphrey Shaibu pointed out that the Lloyds Classification Society of Mombasa which would have licensed the vessel had ordered certain modifications to qualify it for international travel.

The mapinduzi was chartered from Japan and the Zanzibar authorities found that the vessel would only be economically viable if it was to operate on international travel as envisaged along Tanzania's East African Line proved very expensive.

PORT PROBES TUG SINKING

THE Kenya Ports Authority has set up a committee to probe the mysterious sinking of one of its tugs at the Mombasa Kilindini Port last week.

The tug, Ngamia, was discovered missing in the early hours of the morning by a port watchman who immediately raised the alarm sending port personnel in a frantic search for the missing tug.

Divers aboard the other five remaining tugs joined the search and it was only hours later when the tug was found, submerged under the water. There was no person in the tug.

'MYSTERY AT MID-NIGHT' SINKING

Authority are reportedly puzzled by the sinking of the tug and would like to know what actually happened.

The Kenya Ports Authority Managing Director told COASTWEEK:

"We have not been able to ascertain the cause of the

sinking. A committee has been set up which is expected to submit its findings soon. In the meantime we are at a loss to say what exactly happened".

This is reported to be the first time that a tug has sunk in the Mombasa port. No one witnessed the incident despite the fact that a number of watchmen are posted at the port during the night.

Fifteen divers and marine experts from the Mombasa-based Divecon called in to assist in the rescue mission, battled the whole of last week in vain to recover the submerged tug. Repeated attempts to draw out water from the sunken tug and seal it before re-floating proved unsuccessful.

As the salvage mission continued this week, officials of the Kenya Ports Authority ruled out sabotage as the cause of the sinking. The probe committee set up to investigate the cause of the incident is expected to submit its findings in three weeks time.



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'POSSIBLE CAUSE'

One marine expert suggested that a possible cause might have been by a sea valve if it had been left open during the night and thus allowed the sea water to enter the tug cabins.

The 297.69 tons tug, Ngamia, which is 106ft long and 29ft wide, was acquired in 1969 from Glasgow, Scotland. It is propelled by two shafts with 2500 break-horse power. It has been in operation for the last twelve years and was said to be in good condition before sinking.

Manned by 14 people including a tug master, the tug was used for berthing and unberthing ships calling at the

port of Mombasa and was among a fleet of six.

Meanwhile port officials have refuted claims that the sinking of the tug has affected operations at the port. "The operations of the port continue as usual. There has been no delay or stoppage as a result of this".

TANA RIVER DISTRICT 'HAS GREAT POTENTIAL'

HOLA (K.N.A.) — The arid and semi arid parts of Kenya which were neglected by the colonial regime have, through the Government research efforts become big producers of livestock and irrigated crops with vast unexploited potential existing.

Tana River DC Mr. Moses Okal said this in Hola when he received a team of agricultural livestock experts in his office. The DC added that for such areas to be fully productive, effective measures should be applied. He said that apart from

producing cash and food crops, the arid and semi arid areas were the largest producers of cattle to the Kenya Meat Commission.

The team leader Mr. Peter Blon told the DC that the Tana River development authority had embarked on an ambitious programme to extend the farming zone in Southern Division to 40,000 acres, already 10,000 acres were under survey.

Mr. Blon said the zone, known as the Tana Delta Irrigation scheme, covers the

area around Garsen, Ngao, Kibusu and Wema. "Polders were being built to protect the farm land against destruction by follas and wild animals." He told the DC.

He pointed out that to harmonise the co-existence of livestock and farms, access roads would be opened for the wild animals to water in the River Tana. The team will present its findings to the Tana River development authority for discussion with relevant Ministries after completing its survey.

BRIEFS

MALINDI (K.N.A.) — Malindi has collected revenue amounting to Shs. 129,918 from licensing and Shs. 76,600 from liquor licensing fees since the beginning of the year. Area Revenue Officer Mr. W. Waweru disclosed in his monthly report.

KWALE (K.N.A.) — The Ministry of Basic Education has given a grant of Shs. 198,000 to two primary schools in Kwale District. The grant in aid of the two schools was promised by an Assistant Minister for Basic Education, Dr. Julia Ojiambo during her recent tour of the District.

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — The Government has given four village polytechnics in Taita Taveta District a grant totalling Shs. 79,000 as building fund. This was disclosed by the Assistant District Development Officer Miss E. T. Ngalla, who said the money will help the Polytechnic in the field development.

LAMU (K.N.A.) — Traders in Lamu District owe the Government about Shs. 500,000 in form of loans, and the district development officer Lamu District Mr. J. M. Thuku has threatened to take the defaulters to court. Mr. Thuku noted that the defaulters have outstanding debts since 1960 when the Lamu Trade Development Joint Board was set.

SHIMO-LA-TEWA 'OLD BOYS' HELP RAISE CASH FOR NEW DORMITORY

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Members of the Shimo La Tewa Old Boys Association (SOBA) have been commended for their untiring efforts to provide facilities for their former school.

The remarks were made by Mr. Yuda Komora, the managing director of Kenya National Transport Company (KENATCO) at a fundraising dinner dance in Mombasa in aid of dormitory project undertaken by the association.

He said Soba had done a wonderful job in carrying out projects worth over Shs. 400,000 for the benefit of the school. He appealed for the cooperation of the former students and the staff at the school so that the standard of education at the school could be maintained.

A total of Shs. 48,880 was raised in aid of the ultra-modern dormitory which is expected to cost Shs. 300,000. He said already over Shs. 100,000 has been raised for the project and called for the organisers to go ahead and start construction work.

Mr. Komora donated Shs. 6,600 and brought Shs. 20,000 from the Minister for Higher Education Mr. Kamotho. He also brought Shs. 1,000 from Mr. Darius Mbela, General Manager Kenya Cashewnuts, and a similar amount from Dr. Eric Mungola.

Mr. Galgalo observed that the organisation was genuinely trying to solve problems of birth control and family care and that all wanchi must give it the necessary support.

He said that the idea of family planning has been given greater emphasis by his Excellency President Moi during his Madaraka Day message to the Nation.

He said that if families are carefully planned there will be no problems like the lack of adequate education of food. He advised wanchi to give birth to children whom they can look after very sufficiently by giving them the basic necessities that will see them grow into more responsible and independent citizens.

Rotarians Urged To Boost Local Community Service

THE week-long Assembly and Conference of District 920 of Rotary International has ended with the installation of Monsieur Abel Jacquemot, 74, as the new District Governor for the year 1981/82 with effect from July 1.

He is a past-president of the Rotary Club of Saint Denis, Reunion. He fought in the second world war, later joining the French resistance movement and was captured and jailed by the Gestapo.

He told Rotarians "I know the tragedies of war, and the price of freedom".

M. Jacquemot becomes the 50th Governor of District 920 the largest in Rotary International and his rallying call to "develop the internationalism of their movement in keeping with its current theme of World Understanding and Peace through Rotary".

Saying this would require a change in their way of thinking, M. Jacquemot urged Rotarians to "increase their World Community Service as a means of developing the internationalism of Rotary".

Zambian Chief Justice

The District Governor-elect for the year 1982/3 is Annel Silungwe, the Chief Justice in Zambia, and a past-president of the Rotary Club of Lusaka Central.

He has been a Rotarian since 1970, and two of the largest projects being undertaken by his club is the building of a rehabilitation centre for the mentally handicapped, and about eight houses for the physically disabled.

There was a rousing ovation when Jayanti Rajani, managing director of Kenya United Steel Company, and past-chairman of the Rotary Club of Mombasa was nominated District Governor for 1983/4.

He has been a Rotarian for 13 years during which he was secretary of the District 920 conference at Mombasa in 1975, and for three years was

District Chairman of the Rotary Foundation which offers scholarships and awards to graduate and undergraduate students throughout the world.

He is also chairman of the Pandya memorial Clinic. The conference brought together 317 Rotarians and their wives from seven countries in Africa and five Indian Ocean Islands, as well as seven Rotary 'observers' from England. There were also 50 members from Rotaract and Interact Clubs in Kenya and Tanzania, as well as four from Zambia.

Although it was not the first District 920 conference to be held at Mombasa, it was the first time for it to be hosted by the Rotary Club of Kilindini for the District Governor, Pip Barnes, is founder chairman.

The venue was the Severn Sea Lodge complex, with deliberations being held in the flag adorned Plaza conference hall.

There was also a standing ovation for Dr. Mohamed Fateen from Cairo, representing the President of Rotary International who, in his closing remarks, told Rotarians you have overwhelmed me with your love and affection.

He urged them "to work together to strengthen our liaison and foster international relations".

He presented a pennant from the Rotary Club of Cairo to Felix da Costa, chairman of the host club, as a "token of our appreciation".

Orphan's Village

Earlier, when praising community projects being undertaken by Rotary Clubs in District 920, Dr. Fateen mentioned that a very interesting event was happening in Ethiopia where the marxist regime had actually asked for Rotary's help in installing and equipping medical facilities at a proposed War Orphan's

Village planned to accommodate some 300 children.

He also noted that the Dar es Salaam Club had rather unique projects, including a medical book in which the doctor "When the doctor" aimed at an outlying rural area.

Dr. Fateen also noted that Egypt's Ministry of Foreign Affairs had said the government was keen to see relations with other countries, through its projects.

Aid From Egypt

Under an Egyptian-African Co-operation agreement, aid was being sent to help the

The conference officially opened on July 1, 1981, by the District Governor, M. Abel Jacquemot, past-president of the District 920, who declared "Rotary will continue to serve the poor and the disabled in all countries".

He told Rotarians through you that Rotary give the world the best of world understanding and peace.

Guest of honour was Deputy Provincial Commissioner, Coast, Mr. Luka Daudi Galgalo, and Mr. David Galgalo, and Mr. Rajab Samba, who were asked to attend.

Rotary International is the largest international service organisation in the world, outside United Nations. It has over 1.2 million members in 156 countries in 156 geographical areas of the world.

It has been serving humanity for 76 years and provides community work projects in a single country. It has a 250-300 million dollar fund and generated by the Rotary Foundation.

He mentioned that the president of the USA, Mr. Eisenhower had said "Rotary is a single force for good in the world today".

Mr. Jones mentioned Mombasa's past Rotary achievements in chartering the first Rotary Club in Africa in 1902.

WHILE the zesty Father Edward Corcoran will be generally missed at the Coast, feeling particularly forlorn are his 'Swinging Stars' for whom he opened up new and unimaginable horizons in the form of ambitious musicals which many thought were quite out of their reach.

Said one gloomy student "he was such a lively person. Always bubbling over with enthusiasm. Although strict, we enjoyed our rehearsals very much".

Fr. Corcoran had such a unique way of extracting the last ounce of talent from his 'Swinging Stars' that even parents were amazed at what he could achieve.

The 'Swinging Stars' are students from the Star of the Sea Secondary School. All their musicals which included Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour

Dreamcoat, Fiddler on the Roof, Mikado, Smike and Sound of Music — as well as Christmas carols — had been raising about Shs. 10,000 annually over the past ten years.

This had helped, in particular, needy students at the Star of the Sea Secondary School, Little Sisters of the Poor — who care for many golden-agers at Nyumba ya Wazee; Polio Clinic and Mji wa Salama.

This year the musical was to have been the Pirates of Penzance. Then Fr. Corcoran was called to Rome to become the Secretary General of the Holy Ghost Missionary.

He leaves Kenya on July 4 for a short holiday in Dublin, Ireland, where he was born. He will then spend six weeks in Paris brushing up his French for much of his work will be in that language.

He arrives in Rome at the beginning of September, his duties being to co-ordinate activities of the Holy Ghost Fathers throughout the world.

He had a tremendous send off by his 'Swinging Stars' who staged, before packed audiences, two farewell concerts specially for him at the Loreto Convent. Besides a full choir, there were performances of Indian and Arab classical dances.

These final rehearsals with the Swinging Stars were a very

nostalgic time for Fr. Corcoran who, although full of mirth-making wisecracks, looked decidedly a bit moist-eyed.

Interviewed on this very sad occasion, Fr. Eddie said he was leaving with mixed feelings after 25 years at the Coast.

During the last few weeks, various groups of the choir have been saying their farewells. On one occasion Fr. Corcoran was seen at Nyali Beach Hotel surrounded by young ladies who were senior members of the 'Swinging Stars'.

He was hosting his own farewell party and to thank them for all their hard work over the years.

It was at the Seminary in Dublin — where great emphasis was laid on music, that Mombasa's Singing Priest received his training in piano and vocals which were eventually to bring great enjoyment to many people in Africa, and in particular to the Swinging Stars, as well as to raise money for the needy.

Fr. Eddie said he hoped the Swinging Stars will continue to swing, and be as lively as ever.

July 3 marks the anniversary of his ordination into the priesthood 26 years ago.

A WELCOME RETURN FOR AMEER JANMOHAMED

ONE of the Rotarians from Britain attending District 920 Conference at the Plaza Hotel as an "observer" was Ameer Janmohamed who is no stranger to the Kenya Coast, for he has done much to further Rotary service in this community.

He lived in Mombasa for 32 years, leaving in 1972 for the UK where he is presently engaged in property management.

Ameer loves Mombasa, but reluctantly had to leave soon after the conference was over so as not to be late for his installation as President of the Rotary Club of Kensington, West London, on July 2.

His family roots go back to 1895 in Mombasa. His father Kassam, was a member of the Mombasa Municipal Council and a founder member of the Rotary Club of Mombasa. Said Ameer, "It was the first club to welcome non-Europeans in Africa, south of the Sahara".

Ameer joined the Mombasa Rotary Club in 1957 later forming an Interact Club — the first in Africa. When officially opening the District 920 conference last week, Erles Bevan Jones, a Rotary International director, mentioned that "Mombasa's most noteworthy achievement had been in chartering the first Interact Club in Africa during 1963".

Ameer was chairman of the Rotary Club of Mombasa in 1962/3, during which time the club put up buildings for the Salvation Army School for the

Blind, Likoni, as well as providing furniture and some of the equipment required.

He also formed the Rotary Education Trust which is providing 75 needy children with a secondary school education.

Ameer was Governor of District 920 in 1969/70. He was appointed by Rotary International to form a second Rotary Club in Mombasa.

This is the "Kilindini" club of which Pip Barnes, the outgoing District Governor, was founder chairman.

It was this Rotary Club which hosted the District 920 conference at the Severin Sea Lodge Complex, Mombasa.

Of interest is the fact that it was Ameer, then the out-going District Governor, who had brought Pip into Rotary in 1971.

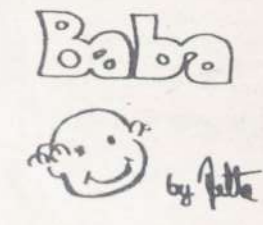

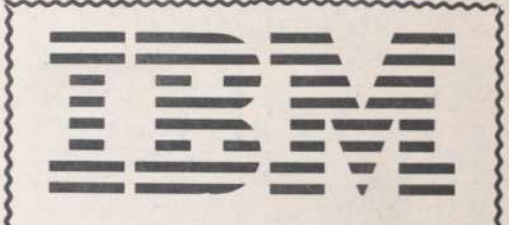
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ARTIST IMPRESSION of the proposed Silverview Terrace complex, scheduled for construction soon on a prime site in Nairobi's best residential area.

'IS THERE LIFE AFTER SILVERVIEW TERRACE?'

YOU may have noticed those advertisements asking: "Is there life after Silverview Terrace?"

I found the question intriguing enough to seek out the genius who designed this futuristic looking building and found him in a quiet road in a corner of Lavington.

Here from his office-cum-home Joginder Singh Chuda, head of J. S. Chuda, architects, interior designers and what have you, runs his creative empire without the least degree of ostentation.

You should know, I think, at this point in the story that he is the man not only responsible for Silverview but for Ambalal House — that prime, prestigious piece of office space in central Mombasa.

Born in Kenya in April 1934, he went to study at Leicester College of Art in U.K. in 1951, qualifying in an intermediate architectural course and moving to Stuttgart School of Architecture in Germany where he graduated in 1959.

J. S. then spent a year in Denmark under the tutelage of the world renowned architect Arne Jacobsen who gave him his first taste of the 21st century architecture in which J. S. now firmly believes.

He then settled in U.K. where

he opened a joint practice and won immediate notice for a scheme to uplift a famous Egyptian temple to avoid it vanishing in the rush of modern floodwaters of development.

J. S. Chuda returned to his Kenya homeland in 1963 — convinced in the future of a free Kenya. He got off to a heady start for on a visit to Dar es Salaam he entered a competition for an architect to design the Mwanza District Council's new headquarters and when he got back to Nairobi found out he had been awarded the contract.

ARTS COLLEGE

And until 1971 he was going great guns in Uganda, too, having designed the headquarters of the East African Development Bank and the spacious layout for the Uganda College of Arts, a U.S.-A.I.D. backed projects that never left the drawing board once Idi Amin was in power. Now, unfortunately, Uganda has greater needs for its future development than an arts college.

Ambalal House was

conceived at the beginning of the 1970s. "At the time the initial idea to build it in three phases seemed to make perfectly good sense" says J. S. "Now if I had my time over again I would have built it all at once."

"We were horribly wrong in what the actual cost would be — remembering nobody could have foreseen the downturn in the world economy which has taken place since we began the first phase in 1972."

The final phase — three — is now virtually complete.

The design for even this section, of course, had been on the drawing board when Phase One started. So he has had plenty of time in between to indulge in the streak of fantasy and futuristic vision which marks all his work.

He took me out in his car to look at Bima Court, another insurance company project, a self contained complex of spacious, well fitted individual three bedroom apartments renting for Shs. 12,000 a month — complete with swim pool and sauna.

It was a challenging concept because of the difficult site on which it is located but it is a triumph of architectural skills which will only truly be demonstrated when the shady gardens and rich, hanging gardens have come into maturity.

His greatest dream however came about when he was dillydallying with his 10 year old daughter's Lego set.

Yes, take a look again — Silverview Terrace must be the first modern apartment block in architectural history which was designed out of Lego, the children's building toy system.

"As far as architecture is concerned" says J. S. "there has to be life after Silverview Terrace — but I hope I have cast it far enough into the 21st century for it to be a long, long time before anybody conceives anything like it."

NEW CENTURY

"Everything that comes out of this office starts with the conviction that as far as buildings go the 20th century has already ended".

On that note, I put away my 19th century pen and came back to see if I could dig out a few pieces of Lego and find out what is going to make the 21st century tick in terms of writing instruments.

I mean, will there ever be a transistorised typewriter after Silverview Terrace?

Tanzanian Industrialist Plans New Luxury Hotel For Down-Town Dar

A FAMOUS Tanzanian industrialist — Karmali Juma — and his sons are to construct a 300-bed hotel in Dar es Salaam to be known as 'Embassy Hotel'. The five-storeyed hotel will cost more than 150 million shillings on completion and some 94 million shillings will be 'injected' as a credit by the Society Generale of France — the seventh largest bank in the world.

The remaining funds will be met by Karmali Juma and Sons who will be the major shareholder, the Tanzania Tourist Corporation (T.T.C.) and another State-owned firm — General Foods Company Limited (G.E.F.C.O.)

The hotel will be built by a French firm 'Sarebowe' and construction is expected to begin this September. On completion it will have a swimming pool, a conference room capable of holding up to 100 people, a parking bay for 55 cars, boutiques, a coffee bar and offices.

Although another Tanzanian firm is having difficulty getting a guarantee from the Tanzanian Government for a credit for constructing another hotel in the city, French financiers and bankers have been very sparing to Tanzania over the past two years.

Three French banks and the French Government are assisting the Tanzania Government in the renovation and expansion of the Dar es Salaam airport, and last year we received a substantial loan from French financiers to purchase some 200 Peugeot 504 pick-ups.

K.J. and Sons who are well established industrialist throughout Tanzania entered the hotel business by purchasing the Twiga Hotel from a British company — African Trading Company (ATCOL). The hotel has an Indian general manager and the proposed hotel will be managed by a French general manager.

Air Tanzania Loss

Air Tanzania Corporation has made a loss of Shs. 106.6 million and the Minister for Communications and Transport Mr Ibrahim Kaduma told the National Assembly sitting in Dar es Salaam that in most cases the losses could not be averted.

He attributed the causes to the airline's infancy and the ever rise in costs of materials and spare parts.

Other reasons were suspensions of international and inter-continental flights, marginal profits and losses on domestic and regional flights as a result of high fuel costs,

exorbitant interest and insurance rates.

The Minister added that stiff competition from other established airlines forced A.T.C. to fly with fewer passengers and he admitted that customers were losing confidence in the airline as a result of cancellations and poor services.

The Government has 'injected' some funds to keep the airline going and Mr Kaduma noted that other immediate plans include a redundancy exercise.

As part of increased co-operation between the Stantonbury Campus and the Gatehouse School in Britain and the Tanzania Society for the Deaf, some 19 secondary school students and three teachers will make a month-long familiarisation tour of the country.

The group will be guests of the Buguruni School for the Deaf in Dar es Salaam where they will spend most of their time participating in manual work and sharing skills with deaf children.

This is the second time, a group has come down from the school and the 1979 trip was 'dubbed' a dismal success. The society's executive officer, Mrs Chiume and the former head-teacher, Mr Mkaali made a similar trip last year as guests of the school which is in Stantonbury — one of the many cities carved out of greater London.

Just like 1974 and 1979, the Government has felt that the minimum wages in the urban areas should also be increased from 480/= to 600/= and in the rural areas from 340/= to 460/=. Two weeks ago, the Government announced increases for other employees on a gradient scale.

The President of Zimbabwe Rev. Canaan Banana is due in Dar es Salaam this week for a five-day state visit to Tanzania. He will officially open the Dar es Salaam International Trade Fair in which Zimbabwe is

participating for the first and inspect development projects in Dar es Salaam, Dodoma and Zanzibar.

And President Ahmed Toure of Guinea left for Nairobi after making his second state visit to Kenya. But he handed over the Tanzanian youth of origin — Falache Toure — to President Nyerere after the care of him for 18 years. Falache is a doctor with years experience.

When President Sekou Toure of Guinea visited Tanzania in 1963, he promised to visit Falache and return to Tanzania on completion of education.

The state-owned National Buildings owns 2,200 'injected' 66 million shillings annually in rent. The Ministry for Lands, Housing and Development, Mr M. Nyang'anyi told the National Assembly that out of the houses nationalised in some 787 units were returned to former owners transferred to national land.

While the Minister of Industries, Mr Basil M. told the House that the country's textile mills produce 510,000 pairs of khaki shorts a month — some 91,000 pairs exported and 418,000 pairs sold on the local market.

And 1,000 Tanzanian men will remain in Kenya after the last Tanzanian pull out towards the end of the month. The Minister for Affairs, Brigadier M. Kimario confirmed the policemen were remaining at the request of the Kenyan Government.

MALAWI AVENGING DEFEAT IN NEW SERIES

MALAWI avenged their defeat against Tanzania in the 1980 East and Central African Challenge Cup "thumping" her 4-1 in Blantyre in the first series of international friendlies. The hosts in a clash against the proposed capital Lilongwe.

New captain Simulwe scored Tanzania's lone goal in the 75th minute after Kinna Phiso, Dandize, Bennett and Skipper and Charanwanana "beat" four goals.

Pre-meet Nyumbani Suleiman Nyumbani seventh in the Amateur Federation (IAAF) 10,000 metres "beat" Prague. Czechoslovak Mike McLeod of British first place.

Newly signed British Emmanuel Mwanuzi unanimously top point over his French challenger — Francis at Morogoro since 2000 from Dar. And the Dar es Salaam region team — Mwanuzi has retained the Dar Regional tournament third year running, beat Dodoma, and they set cup for good for the time.

NEW CHARGES FOR CONTAINERS CAUSE CONFUSION IN PORT

THE new 'Destuffing' charge for containers announced by the Vice-President and the Minister for Finance Mr Mwai Kibaki during his Budget speech has not yet been implemented, according to shipping sources in Mombasa.

The Kenya Ports Authority is reported to have written to the Assistant Commissioner of Customs in Mombasa for clarification on the new tax and is also awaiting further guidelines from the Treasury on how to implement the new measures.

In his budget speech, the Vice-President referred to the considerable increase in container traffic and noted the difficulties being encountered in inspecting containers. He claimed that some container operators were using this handicap "to smuggle goods meant for neighbouring countries into our domestic market".

He said that the Government intends to institute more strict regulations and supervision of the operations of container terminals to ensure that they did not breach Customs regulations. The 'destuffing' charge on all containers announced by the Vice-President was designed to cover the cost of physical examination of containers.

It was part of the revenue measures announced on Customs duty which was expected to earn the exchequer KES25 million.

A senior officer of Customs office in Mombasa explained that they are waiting for directives from Ministry of Finance headquarters in Nairobi on procedure to follow implementing the new measures. Discussions are reported to be going on in Nairobi over the issue.

It is however noted that has not in the past been the responsibility of the Customs officers to check and examine containers.

'Recession' Felt On Low Season

MALINDI POSTING

ENSURING that everything is spick and span and in working order at Lawford's, Blue Marlin and Seafarer's Hotels, as well as Petley's Inn, Lamu, and at the Malindi Chalets and Cowrie Shell Apartments is Guy Laval who has just been appointed Group Maintenance Manager by Jambo Hotels. He was formerly Technical Services Administrator with C.M.C. Aviation, Wilson Airport, being with them for 12 years, and previously was Chief Storekeeper with Safari Air Services.

JAMBO Hotels report a much 'leaner' low season than anticipated, due mainly to the economic recession in Europe.

While 'low' seasons were gradually becoming a thing of the past consecutively attracting higher occupancies, this year this happy trend was reversed with a decline in bookings compared with the same period last year.

This was revealed by Martin Thompson, general manager. He said that "short haul" countries such as Spain were now pegging their prices, following a decline in the number of tourists due to soaring prices during the last two summers. Consequently, many tourists were now holidaying in Spain again.

Mr. Thompson said that as far as Jambo Hotels are concerned, "indications are that over the next 3 to 4 months a similar pattern, with a drop in bed occupancy of approximately 10-15 per cent, will continue."

He pointed out that this was not only affecting the Jambo group, but also other hotels along the Coast which are experiencing a decline in business.

As far as the coming 'high' season is concerned Mr. Thompson said that indications are that this will be 'reasonable', but mentioned that major German tour operators do not anticipate any significant growth over the previous year.

Meanwhile, many families are taking advantage of the present bargain rates being offered at the Malindi Chalets to enjoy a holiday by the sea.

There is a strong feeling within the shipping circles that the Government should intend to regulate the payment of 'destuffing' charges while introducing measures on the operations of the containers. It is noted that container operators will share the charges as opposed to the present system where only a few operators had to meet the cost of stripping and re-stuffing containers.

YUGOSLAV SHIP
A Yugoslav ship Stamenkovic is expected to dock at the Mombasa port with general cargo from Pavrados and Adriatic ports.

A Swiss-French ship Oldenodorf owned by Svedel Lines is also expected to call at the port with cargo from Europe and the East ports. Among the cargo expected to call at Mombasa is the French ship, Ville de Brest.

Meanwhile, the Maharashtra from India will off from Mombasa on Wednesday with 600 tons of cargo including soda ash, coffee, coffee beans for Malindi and Bombay.

GOVERNMENT AIDS KENYAN EXPORTERS

AT LONG last, the Government has introduced incentives to the country's exporters. The scheme to manufacture, processed and horticultural goods will be effective from July 1, 1981, writes Gray Phombach.

The Minister of Trade, Mr Ali Michumo noted that the package would include tax incentives in the form of reduction in incentives for exports, preferential financing facilities and priority in foreign exchange allocation.

An export rebate scheme which would replace the present duty drawback and exemption scheme would be introduced for traditional exports, mainly agricultural exports which are processed with unprocessed raw materials fall under a different category.

Foreign exchange contributions by exporters, and the competition of foreign markets would be considered in the award of rebates. The rebate rates will be fixed by the Ministry of External Trade.

In addition, a bonus of ten per cent would be awarded to individual exporters exceeding the average performance in quality and not volume over the past year.

Mr Michumo added that an export awards scheme, a new development fund and a better transportation system would be established.

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THE WICKED CLINT IN YOUR EYE

"CLINT?" the pretty waitress said, looking around the dark courtyard of the restaurant. "No, he hasn't arrived yet". So I sat down at a table of the Hog's Breath Inn in Carmel, California, and glanced through the menu. A Dirty Harry burger, I noted, sold for \$2.75. An Eiger Sandwich (a mountain of roast beef) went for \$3.75. And for \$2.25 you could get the Breezy diet plate.

Now if some of those dishes have a familiar ring, it is because their names are derived from some of the films of the world's top box-office star: Clint Eastwood. Which is not really surprising, since he owns the restaurant.

Here in Carmel, some 350 miles north of Los Angeles — a place of rolling hills and stunning seascapes — Eastwood recently finished building a sprawling house which overlooks the pounding Pacific (the living room is designed around a tree, because he refused to have it uprooted).

Not for Clint Eastwood the tinsel of Hollywood, with its premieres and parties. Instead he stays up here with his wife Maggie (they married in 1954) and their two children, Kyle, 9, and Allison, 5. Here Eastwood can loaf around in old jeans and a sweater, go for long walks along the beach, and be left alone. And that is the way he likes it to be.

He has, on this day, gone to Los Angeles on business, driving down in his Ferrari. But he is expected back at any moment, and I am to wait, and order a drink.

Bigger than Redford. Bigger than McQueen. Bigger than Newman — He is the King.

At 47, Clint Eastwood is America's biggest star. Bigger than Redford, bigger than McQueen, bigger than Newman. It is Clint Eastwood who, given the right role, fills the cinemas. And so it has been for a dozen years.

Starting with a trilogy of spaghetti Westerns in the mid-Sixties, this 6ft. 4in. star — until then best known as a moderately successful actor in the television series *Rawhide* — rapidly carved for himself a special niche in iron-jawed belligerency. Sensing early that audiences were ready for bloody violence on the screen, he gave it to them. And in less time than it took to cart away the corpses, the queues began to form. For here was a new kind of hero; one who shot first — and to hell with the consequences. Audiences loved it. And they loved him.

Surprisingly it was not until the success of *Dirty Harry* in which he played a rogue cop ("You didn't assign Dirty Harry" ran the slogan publicising the film, "you turned him loose") that Hollywood caught on to how big a star he was.

That film, denounced by one critic as a "fascist masterpiece" made a fortune. It was followed quickly, by other pictures in the same vein. Cinemas began advertising "Spend the night with Clint Eastwood", and ran his films one after another all night. The Bank of America got out its welcome mat.

Today Eastwood is a multi-millionaire. A friend of his, who knows him well, estimates his wealth at over 10 million dollars. "He just can't help making money" says this man. "Remember, most of his hit films have been made by his own company. And for years he's had a percentage of every film he's made. That adds up to an awful lot of green".

All of which, not surprisingly, makes Eastwood sure of his status in the industry. And so sure is he of the Eastwood the public wants to see that he now directs most of his own pictures (*The Gauntlet*, recently released, was his sixth self-directed film).

For a man who has made his fortune playing passionless killers in films like *A Fistful of Dollars* and *For a Few Dollars More*, Eastwood himself is a disarmingly quiet and civilised man. And rather shy.

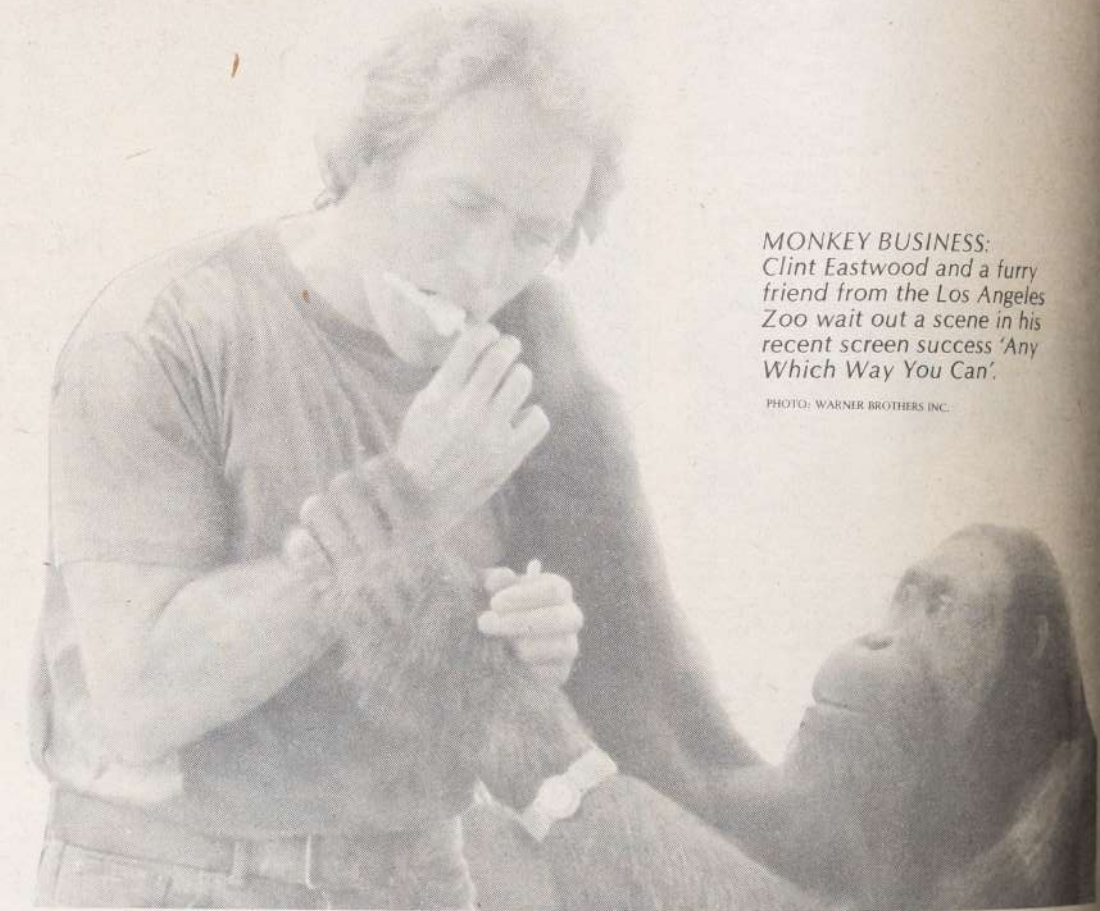
When he did arrive at the Hog's Breath Inn after a drive of nearly five hours from Los Angeles ("I left the Ferrari for servicing and came back in the Mercedes") he was deeply apologetic for being slightly late, but clearly he was delighted to see the place so busy.

"It's been a gold mine ever since we opened four years ago" he said "I tell myself that if all else fails I can always fall back on this".

He's quite shy. Hates being stared at. To tell the truth he's a bit of a recluse ...

A waitress, greeting Eastwood, said to me: "You know what he was doing on the first day we opened? Our number one box-office star? He was helping to carry out the garbage".

The moment he sat down, in his crumpled jeans and sweater, and ordered a glass of wine, small boys began a pilgrimage to the table, armed with pencils and paper. He signed the autographs with good grace. Everyone called him Clint, and he did not seem to mind. Thanks

to television and the cinema, he is as familiar a figure to them as their own uncles.

Did he enjoy the attention?

A shrug.

"Not really. Public attention doesn't turn me on. I like my work, but I don't like the other part. I don't seem to have the gift to enjoy fame the way some actors do. I'm a bit of a recluse, to tell the truth".

Had he always been?

"I guess so. I'm quite shy, you see. I hate being stared at. When I take Kyle to the movies round here I sometimes put on a moustache and dark glasses as a disguise. Otherwise I just don't enjoy myself. I've never understood how anyone can enjoy being looked at. As for parties and premieres and stuff, I've never liked them. That's why I prefer living up here, away from Hollywood. That and the fact that it's a beautiful part of the world. When I was stationed near here in the Army I always promised myself that if I ever got money I'd have a house here".

Today he has that house, set in 200 acres of Cypress-strewn land overlooking the sea. It has a room where he can show films, a gun room a fully equipped gym, and a garage big enough to house his Mercedes, his Ferrari, his motorcycle and his pick-up truck. Eastwood likes to tell how, on the first day's shooting of *Paint Your Wagon* some years ago, he turned up at the studio in his truck and was refused admittance by the guard.

"The man wouldn't believe who I was" he says. "So I went back to my office and got on with some work. Then the calls began coming in. I may say I took my time about getting back".

So Clint Eastwood has fame, fortune and freedom. What he does not have — at least not yet — is the general approval of the critics. Many of them, appalled at the bloody carnage of his pictures, have slammed him mercilessly. "Zane Grey meets Marquis de Sade" wrote one American critic of an early Eastwood film. And in *The New Yorker* magazine Pauline Kael called him "the reductio ad absurdum of macho today".

Did he cry all the way to the bank? He did not. He just laughed (Anyway, when you earn this kind of money, the bank comes to you.)

"I don't pay too much attention to those

critics". He said. "Most of them are aged between 40 and 50. Whereas most of the people who go to the movies today are between 18 and 25. So I just trust my own judgement about what people want to see. I make the kind of films I'd like to go to. You know, when my luck ran out early in my career at Universal" — he was dropped as a contract player in Fifties — "I supported myself by digging swimming pools. Bumping around like that for three years taught me a lot of things; among them, the sort of movie the man with a small income will spend his money on seeing.

"So I just trust my instinct. Years ago when my agent called and asked if I wanted to make a picture on the plains of Spain with an Italian director who spoke no English, at first I laughed. Why would I want to do a Western in Spain — particularly as it paid only 15,000 Dollars? My business manager said: "Don't do it. It's a bad move". But I thought about it and decided: what the hell! It could be interesting. So I got on the plane".

Eastwood later called his production company Malpaso — which means "bad step" in Spanish. Many believe he named it from his decision to defy his business manager. Not so, he says. He named it after Malpaso Creek, near his home.

The film was *A Fistful of Dollars* — an Italian-Spanish-German co-production which so desperately wanted to masquerade as a genuine Hollywood Western that the director Sergio Leone, took the screen pseudonym of Bob Robertson.

The film was an instant success in Europe. So Eastwood stayed to make two more. For the last one he demanded — and got — a quarter of a million dollars, plus a percentage. When he returned to the States he was a ready-made star.

So the critics did not worry him. But what about the charge that there is excessive violence in his films?

"Well, look around you. Read the front page of any newspaper, if you can bear it. That's the kind of society we live in. We may as well face it. Believe me, I don't advocate violence. I don't have. I don't even hunt. But if violence is properly presented on the screen, I don't think it can be a sort of release for a lot of people. Man is a very violent animal. I see nothing wrong in showing that.

"I've never pretended that my films are violent. But I do say one thing: I think they're more honest than many. Everybody knows that no one ever stood in the street and beat the heavy draw first. That's where I disagree with the John Wayne concept of the hero. He does things that Wayne would never do. I'd shoot a guy in the back. Be glad to.

Eastwood tries, when he can to finish his work quickly. *Breezy*, the third film he directed (it starred William Holden), was made in five weeks on a budget that would scarcely keep a Grade in cigars.

"It's true. I can't stand long schedules. I said: 'Paint Your Wagon took six months to make. Six months! It should have been made in half that time. All that hanging about was crazy. Another one. *Where Eagles Dare* took five months. The only good thing about that it was made in London, so I got to see a lot of English pubs." He looked thoughtful. "I tried to make this place look a bit like London."

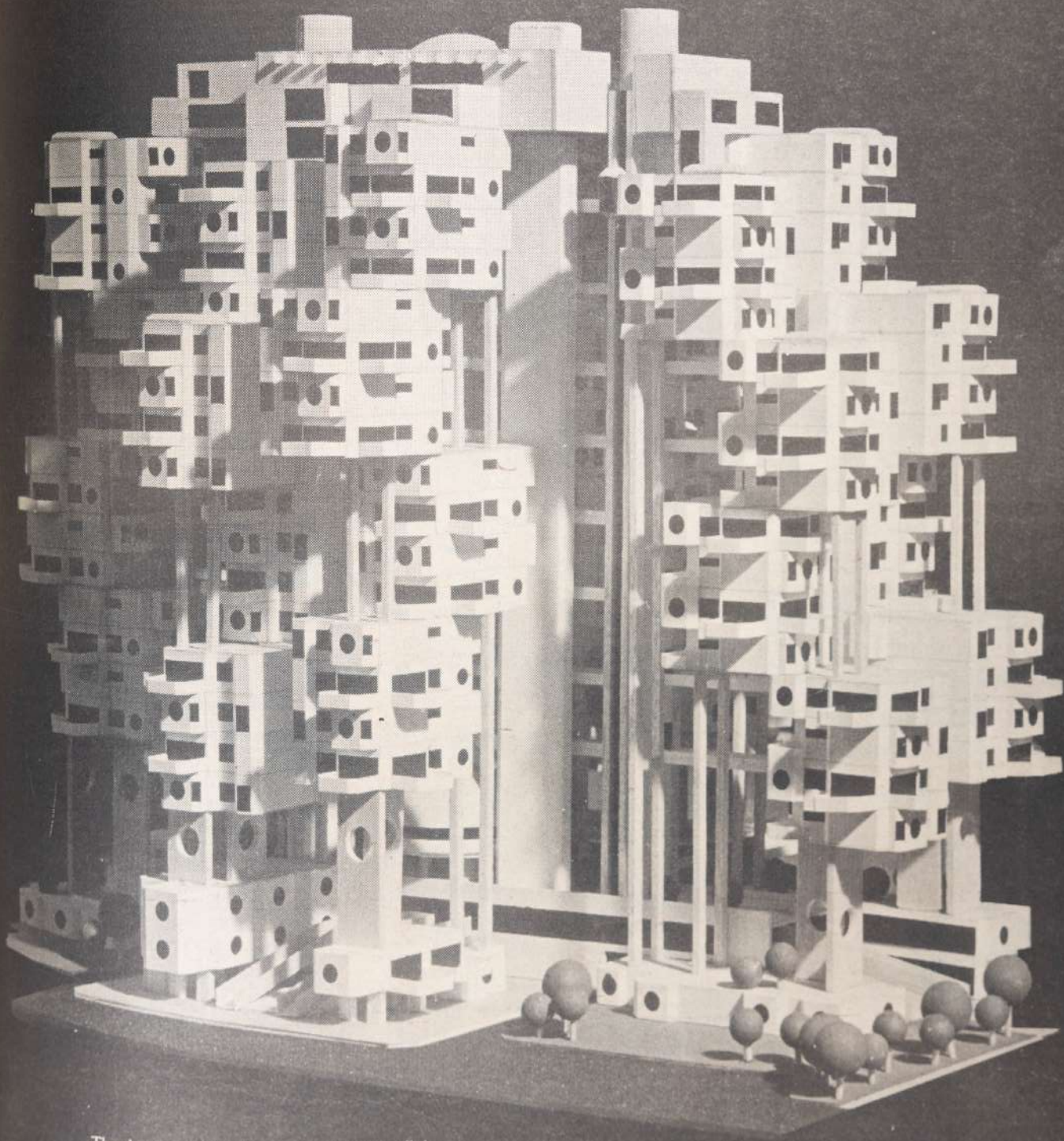

TERRINE ON FOOD

USE THE RIGHT SORT OF POT ...

THE word 'Terrine' refers to the earthenware dish or pot used to contain the pate, potted meat, game or fish rather than the pate itself which may come as a slight surprise.

By extension the term is used to qualify the food itself, such as Terrine of Duckling or Terrine of Foie Gras etc.

Remember that pates are cooked when they too come away from the sides of the dish or tin in which you are baking them and it is the depth of the pate which must be considered in the timing of the cooking.

It is always advantageous too if you can allow the mixture to stand for a couple of hours so that the flavourings of herbs, wine or seasoning etc. may penetrate the meat before cooking.

ANNIVERSARY TERRINE:

- 1 pound of leanish pork
- 1 small chicken with the skin removed
- 8 ounces bacon
- 8 ounces chopped chicken livers
- 4 tablespoons Cognac
- 2 large bay-leaves torn roughly
- 4 whole bacon rashers with the rind trimmed off
- 1 onion finely chopped
- a good pinch each of, allspice, thyme and marjoram
- 2 cloves garlic crushed
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

Take all the meat off the bone from the chicken; carefully remove the breasts and set these aside whole; chop the rest of the meat quite finely

Remove the skin from the pork and chop finely. Trim the rind from the 8 ounces of bacon. Chop finely. Combine the chopped chicken, pork, bacon and chicken livers and put through the mincer twice. This is a tedious but necessary task.

Marinate the minced meats for two or three hours in the Cognac with the crumbled bay-leaves. Cut one or two whole rashers of bacon into julienne strips and arrange in a terrine to make an attractive cross

pattern.

Remove the bay-leaves from the meat and add the onion herbs and seasonings to taste. Now put half of this mixture into the bottom of the terrine, lay the chicken breasts across the centre and top with the remaining mixture.

Put the bay-leaves on top and cover completely with the remaining bacon rashers. Place the terrine in a shallow roasting pan, half filled with cold water. Cover with thin foil and bake in a slow oven for two hours. When cooked set aside to cool.

This pate should be left for a week to ripen though at the coast 'ripening' is swifter than in a cooler climate, so keep it in the refrigerator. For a really splendid presentation, an aspic made from port-wine jelly can be used as coating after the terrine has been turned out.

Garnish with shiny black olives — either whole or sliced. Serves ten.

This next recipe is an excellent pate for picnics or day long sailing it can be eaten in the fingers and is a good way of using up left-over meats.

PATE SPICA:

- 3 pork chops boned and chopped finely
- 6 ounces left-over duck meat (other left over meat will do)
- 8 ounces raw sausage-meat
- 2 slices of bread soaked in a little milk
- 1 medium onion chopped finely
- 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
- 2 eggs yolks
- 2 ounces butter
- salt and freshly ground black pepper

Combine the meats and the sausage-meat and put through the mincer with the soaked bread. Add all the other ingredients, mix well and season to taste.

Place in a suitable terrine or loaf tin, cover with tin foil and bake in a moderate oven for an hour. Cool. Serves 6.

TERRINE DE CHEF:

- 1/2 pound pig's liver
- 1 pound pork belly
- 1 pound veal
- half a wine glass of white wine
- 2 tablespoons brandy
- 1 clove of garlic
- 6 peppercorns
- 6 juniper berries
- 1/4 teaspoon ground mace
- 4 ounces fat bacon

Get the butcher to mince the

a roasting pan half filled with water and cook uncovered, slow oven for about 1 1/2 hours.

Remove from the oven taking care not to spill the water as you do so. All the fat is then weighed them by the greaseproof paper over the board or plate on that a weight of some description. This will ensure that your will cut better.

If you plan to keep the terrine longer than a week it must be sealed off from the air with pork fat. Wait until it is quite cold before doing this then pour the pork fat over the top.

Serve with hot toast, probably won't require salt as they are quite rich.

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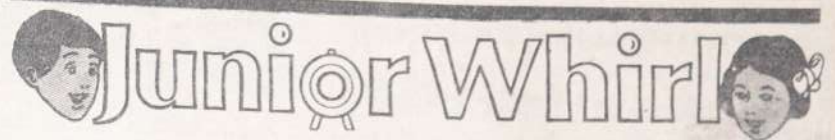
