## WATER BILL SHOCK

A FIFTY year-old man from Kibokoni was rushed to hospital apparently suffering from shock after receiving a bill amounting to Shs. 183,653/25 from the Mombasa Water Department writes Gray Phombeah.

His son told COASTWEEK that his father collapsed and was feared to have suffered a heart attack after receiving the bill early this week.

Mr. Mohamed Nur-mohamed lives in Kibokoni with his wife and two daughters. They have been paying their bill regularly and in most cases their bill had never exceeded KShs. 50.

A spokesman at the Coast Province Water Branch said that they have received the complaint and were investigating the cause of the error. He could not confirm whether this was a computer error or not.

The bed-ridden Mohamed Nurmohamed is said to be on sedatives at his Kibokoni home.

According to the bill his account was due for disconnection on July 10. It also indicated that he had paid KShs. 51,05 on June 17 and issued with a receipt no. 287. He was charged Shs. 26.10 for water consumed from the last reading, 3.50 for meter rental charge, Shs. 13.95 for sewerage and Shs. 7.50 for refuse collection. The date of reading was shown as June 9.

However, the account rendered amounted to KShs. 183,653.25.

## Police Probe 'Illegal Cash Transfer'

TONY BARROS reports from Dar es Salaam:

KENYAN POLICE are investigating the illegal transfer of Tanzanian Shillings in Tanzania currency to Kenya allegedly by a resident in Tanzania, Mr. Hermus Phillips Steyn.

The case in a Nairobi Court in which a Kenya Police officer was indicted to stop legal proceedings against Steyn.

# MINISTER APPROVES MOMBASA BUDGET

THE Local Government Minister has axed a number of staff upgradings, increments, new posts and the purchase of two cars approved by the Municipal Council of Mombasa as part of its budget for 1981.

And six days after his re-election, Mayor Sumba met with Councillors this week to discuss the report by the Minister on the Council's budget.

He also turned down requests for the up-gradings of a Doctor to the post of Assistant Medical Officer of Health and of a senior administration assistant 1 to Principal Administration Assistant.

In another request, the Minister turned down the upgrading of a planning officer to Chief Planning Officer as requested by the Council in its annual estimates for 1981 because there was no provision for such a post in 1981.

The Minister further turned down the recommendations by the Council for two additional

increments to the Town Clerk and one additional increment to the Town Treasurer which would have shot up their salaries by K.Shs. 5,290 and 2,400 respectively.

Among the departments affected by the Minister's ruling are the Drainage section, Building Inspectorate, Highways and Town Planning and Health Services.

At the same time the Minister approved the Council's budget with an overall surplus of K.Shs. 10,708,180 which takes into account the revaluation of rates.

In the provision of health services, the Minister has approved the construction of vertical drains at Kongwea

at a cost of K.Shs. 10,000, purchases of laboratory equipment for Mtongwe valued at K.Shs. 14,000, purchase of medical equipment for Magongo Health Centre at K.Shs. 16,000 and furniture and equipment for Bamburi Health Centre amounting to K.Shs. 40,000.

All these capital schemes would be financed directly by way of revenue contribution to capital.

Projects approved on the capital programme include the provision of public amenities at Magongo Trading Centre, Ganjoni, Kongwea, Mtongwe Likoni junction and Shimanzi, the construction of a new Ganjoni Health Centre, and the replacement of vehicles and

plants for the Fire Brigade section — whose sources of finances would come from external loans.

The Minister also approved K.Shs. 2,920,000 for the construction of old Malindi Road, K.Shs. 80,000 for major repairs to Tusk Arches, K.Shs. 500,000 for street lighting in Mombasa, K.Shs. 1,400,000 for a sub-fire station at Kisauni and the amount for another sub-fire station at the South Mainland.

The Mwendu Tavari market will be extended at a cost of K.Shs. 3,400,000 while K.Shs. 600,000 has been approved for the construction of a new market at Shanzu.

In the provision of Education services, the Minister has

approved an expenditure of K.Shs. 27,734,000 towards construction of additional classrooms and schools to alleviate the acute shortage of classrooms and schools in Mombasa.

Housing and Estate approved by the Minister amount to K.Shs. 4,237,000. They include the construction of five maisonettes, 30 rental houses, 204 rental houses, 204 rental flats, eight shops and flats.

Meanwhile, reports from Town Hall indicate that the Council has resolved to further the purchase of a saloon car for the Mayor and the Town Clerk re-submitting the request.

The Minister frowned on the Council's recommendations for the purchase of two saloon cars for the Deputy Mayor and the Mayor Clerk both valued at a total of K.Shs. 400,000 on the grounds that reasons and explanations given by the Council for the expenditure were not convincing and

## 'BAN THESE GIRLS ...'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Secretary General of the Matatu Association of Kenya Mr Kariuki Mbuthia has threatened that he may be forced to ask the Government to bar women taxi operators in Mombasa from operating if they did not quit using "unfair business tactics" against their male counterparts.

The matatu boss said that he had received complaints that women taxi drivers in Mombasa were jumping the queue when taking their clients, in complete disregard to the laid down procedure.

Mr Mbuthia vehemently stated that such unacceptable tactics would ruin the taxi business in the town and appealed to women to stop the practice immediately or his association would be forced to take stern measures.

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Guides and Brackets in Mombasa have donated clothes and shoes worth over 100,000 in aid of the 1400 Victims. Preventing donations to the Mombasa Divisional Council. ## Squatters Urged To Form Co-Operatives

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Squatters in Mombasa District have been advised to form cooperative societies with the aim of acquiring the land they live on. This way they would greatly facilitate efforts being made by the Government to seek a solution to the century old land ownership problem the acting Mombasa D.C. Mr Moses Indiazi has stated.

Mr Indiazi was addressing cooperative society members who jammed the Tononoka Hall to celebrate the International Cooperative Day.

He sent out an ardent appeal to land owners to consider squatters living on their land first when they wanted to sell their shambas stating that this would stop human displacement and suffering of those concerned.

The acting D.C. praised cooperative society officials for managing their societies well noting that this factor was contributory to the spreading of the movement in Mombasa.

The District Cooperative Officer Mr O. Odonda reminded society officials that sitting allowances were scrapped by President Moi.

The Chairman of the Kenya Union of Savings and Credit Organisation (KUSCO) at the Coast Mr Benjamin Ngulii informed the chief guest that there were about 10 cooperative Societies in Mombasa.

## ANSAAR MUSLIM YOUTH LEADING NEW 'REVIVAL'

WHILE many young people are turning away from religion in the world today feeling it lacks leadership and the ability to unite and uplift mankind, in Mombasa just the reverse applies — for a religious revival is taking place among young Muslims.

It is being spearheaded by the Ansaar Muslim Youth — an association which is unique being the only one of its kind at the Coast.

It was formed to look into the problems of students in and around Mombasa, and to help wherever possible.

Despite its meagre resources, it offers free secular and religious tuition, helps with school books and fees, organises lectures and seminars, as well as some sports and social activities.

It recently published a prestigious magazine called 'Ramadhan Special' and also produces leaflets about prominent religious leaders of the past. Presently under consideration is a quarterly magazine to coincide with school terms.

Members have developed a library — keeping an eye on good buys at auction sales — and now have thousands of books, mainly concerning Islam, but include many English classics as well.

On the more social side, members have enjoyed outings to Kwale and Malindi (while some to game parks are contemplated) and two swimming galas have been held.

These educational classes on secular subjects are very popular and take place in the evenings with senior students helping the juniors along.

Many who have left school with A level passes, and now hold responsible jobs, volunteer as teachers.

Like one banker who is making some use for his school certificate in biology in helping those studying this subject.

Sunday mornings are devoted to Islamic studies, and

many of those attending are preparing for their 'O' level examinations on this subject.

Sundays are kept aside for 'A' level students.

During Ramadhan special lectures are being given by Muslim scholars. Many members break their daily fast at their headquarters together, and then go to the mosque for prayers.

There is also a women's wing who, separately, study secular and religious subjects. During Ramadhan many say their Taraweh prayers together.

The organisation was formed in 1977 and among its founders are Sheikh Ali Darani, Kadhi of Mombasa and Kwale Districts, and Awadh Mbarak, both of whom are Trustees and Advisers.

Describing the birth of the Ansaar Muslim Youth and how it was conceived, Sheikh Darani recalled that it was during the time that a play depicting the conversion of Khalid Omar to the Islamic faith was being performed at the Coast Girls High School that Awadh Mbarak perceived the idea of writing a play to raise funds for the National Union of Kenya Muslims.

When the play was finished, they then had the task of finding performers.

At that time the Inter-Secondary School Drama Festival at the Coast was taking place, so Awadh and some colleagues went talent spotting selecting the best thirty Muslim actors and actresses they could find.

From three performances at the Coast Girls High School they raised about Shs. 10,000 for the National Union of Kenya Muslims.

Such was the impact of the play that many of the audience were in tears. The performers were also very moved, and such was their spiritual upliftment that they decided to form an organisation to promote Islam among young people.

The play was also performed twice on V.O.K. Since then a second play by Awadh Mbarak 'Return in Ramadhan' has been seen on T.V.

These young people joined the Ansaar Muslim Mission, later changing its name to Ansaar Muslim Youth their main objective being the 'educational well being of the youth'.

Said Sheikh Darani "a big revival is taking place with more young people seeking the guidance that Islam can give".

However, they are presently

faced with a big problem by having to move out of their present headquarters in Piggot Place, Kuze Road, in which they have become so well established.

The building, which belongs to the Memon Community, is going to be demolished to make way for flats for the poorer members of this community.

The Ansaar Muslim Youth will be moved at the end of Ramadhan into temporary accommodation at the Islamic Centre, Nyerere Avenue.

Meanwhile, they are planning to build their own HQ with recreational facilities, in the Old Town and have already deposited Shs. 60,000 against a plot of land worth Shs. 200,000.

Fund-raising events are being planned and they hope to have a stall at the Idd ul Fitr fete in Makadara Ground with many goodies for sale.

Members of the women's wing are already making dresses, pickles and a host of handicrafts for the stall, while the boys are considering staging another play and holding charity walks to raise money.

There is certainly a lot of 'go' among these young people who are finding a much more positive and spiritually rewarding approach to life in today's materialistically orientated society.

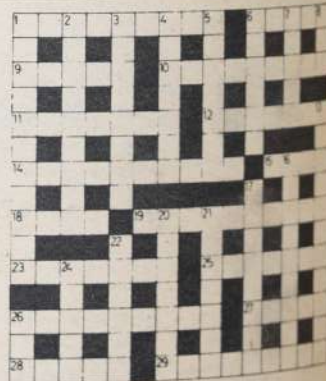

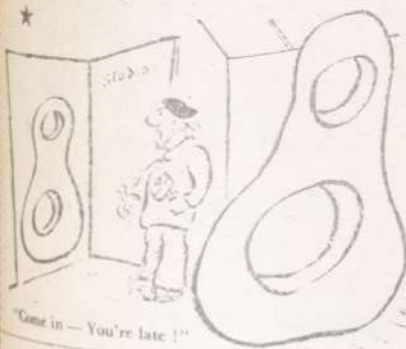

# UP-COUNTRY RESORTS SET FOR COASTAL TOUR BOOM

DURING the school summer holidays, when up-country folk are flocking to the Coast, is the time for coast residents to take advantage of escaping their familiar day-to-day scene and plan a holiday for themselves in other parts of Kenya.

# Tanzania To Exploit The Potential Of Her Oil And Mineral Reserves

DRILLING ON the seventh well — "East-1" is to begin next month along the Tanzanian Coast. The exact location of the drilling to be undertaken by an Algerian Petroleum firm has yet to be determined.

Sonatrach's Vice-President Nazim Zondiueche said in Dar-es Salaam that his firm would take about 13 weeks to drill the 4,000 metres deep well. The project will cost some US 7 million dollars.

The Algerian firm will this October carry out a seismic survey of Mafia Island to determine extension of drilling activities along the Coastal Belt. This project will cost some US 3 million dollars and will be completed after six months.

The drilling of another well — "SS — 6" on the Songo Songo Island was also undertaken by Sonatrach under World Bank supervision, but the drilling was abandoned due to "technical reasons".

The Government also plans to exploit gold, tin, gemstones and mica deposits. Gold mines are to be opened in Geita, Kahama, Chunya Mpanda and Musoma areas as surveys had shown the presence of gold in the area.

The plan would initially involve two mines covering a total of 10 million shillings. These would have a capacity of mining 400Kgs of gold worth 60 million shillings on the bullion market.

The newly formed Ministry of mines will also embark on long term plans. These include iron, production of coal and soda ash for export, nickel, cobalt, copper and uranium.

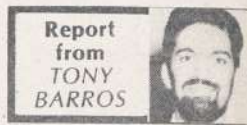
West Germany is to grant Tanzania 68 million shillings to cover the importation of industrial raw materials, auxiliary materials and semi-finished goods. This aid is in addition to the 578 million shillings grant Tanzania will receive this year from the Western European Nation.

Finland will give a similar loan of 50 million shillings. Eighty per cent will cover the importation of finish capital goods, and the rest will cover non-finish costs from projects for which contracts on export of goods and services from Finland have been included.

The Minister of Water and Energy, Mr. Al-Noor Kassim has told the National Assembly that the Government will not be able to supply all Tanzanians with clean drinking water as envisaged by 1991 due to poor allocation of funds annually.

## Tractor Factory

Tanzania will manufacture 60 per cent of all tractor components within the next ten years. This follows a long term agreement signed between the Government and a Finnish firm.

But the Ministry of Industries came under sharp criticism from Members of Parliament who suggested that they should manufacture one of the four popular types currently in use in the country and which were found to be very durable.

Tanzania and Mozambique have signed a memorandum of understanding for the promotion and marketing of cashewnuts. The two countries have also agreed to exchange cashewnut experts as part of their training programme.

The Spanish Red Cross is to contribute 2 million shillings towards the construction of a proposed first aid and training centre on the outskirts of Dar-es Salaam. The first phase of a project to be undertaken by the Tanzania Red Cross Society will cost 1.5 million shillings and the project is estimated to cost 7 million shillings on completion.

In a surprise move, the Government has raised the price of sugar from 8/50 to 10 shilling a kilo and in Dar-Salaam, the price of one litre of tetra-packed milk is now 2/60 instead of 1/60.

Members of the Parliament has challenged the Minister of Trade on the new price increase of sugar on the grounds that all goods whose raw materials are locally available are subject to a price review once a year. The price of sugar was raised recently from 8 shillings to 8/50.

Eleven students from the department of English language and literature at the University of Burundi have arrived in Dar-es Salaam. Their visit is part of the implementation of a cultural co-operation agreement between the two countries which was concluded early this year. In April, 21 second year students of French University of Dar-es Salaam attended a similar course at the University of Burundi.

An East African pioneer in the construction industry — Mr. Chatter Singh Sehmi has died in Dar-es Salaam at the age of 61 years.

Mr. Sehmi popularly known as Hem Singh after his business Messrs Hem Singh contractors came to Tanzania in 1948 from Nairobi, after establishing a family business there in 1928. Some of the projects he under-

took include the University of Dar-es Salaam, Faculty of Agriculture, Lodges in the Camp Parks and the Dar-es Salaam International Airport.

The World Wildlife Fund has donated 241,000 shillings to the Mweka Wildlife College in Moshi to cover this year's college expenses. The cheque was handed over in London to the college's principal, Mr. Felix Nyahoro by the WWF award for conservation news.

Ndugu Nyahoro and an American woman who spent ten years developing Youth Clubs in Kenya were the joint winners of the award.

## Somali Swoop

It seemed the Mogadishu-bound passengers had become jet set travellers shuttling between the Somali capital and Dar-es Salaam and siphoning out consumer goods in large quantities. And most of them would be back the following week to continue with this lucrative business.

But enough was enough. Last week, officials of the immigration, police and customs conducted a swoop on incoming and outgoing passengers aboard the weekly Somali Airlines Boeing flight.

Forty-eight passengers who arrived from Mogadishu were declared prohibited immigrants moments after their aircraft touched down and 39 would-be passengers cancelled their journey at the customs desk as they did not have relevant documents for exporting goods.

According to an immigration official, the 48 passengers of which Somali passport holders including 29 women did not have sufficient funds to pay even for their taxi fare to home while others did not have unfixed addresses in the city.

Most of the passengers would be taking a month's 'labourer' in their immigration forms leaving the immigration officials to wonder how some of them could pay the \$1,000 fare monthly and even work in some caves.

While outgoing passengers would be taking as many as four pieces of luggage (in suitcases) containing tea, coffee and packets of tea leaves, one passenger was found with a large quantity of penicillin drugs and another was known to have 400 caps in his possession as a carlaman — a very lucrative item on the world market.

It seems the swoop was sparked off by a report in the Sunday News newspaper that the previous week's flight in which the airline stated that the passengers left with goods, things, rice, clothing, popular Maadhi made with beer and wine even to be sold free with capital goods and electric fans.

Councillor Rajab Sumba was first elected Mayor of Mombasa in September 1974 up to the time of the dissolution of the Councillor in August 1976.

Before joining politics, Councillor Sumba worked for several years with the Kenya Shell Company in Mombasa and Nairobi as an executive officer.

During the struggle for Uhuru, he joined the defunct Kenya African Democratic Union (KADU) and following the dissolution of the party in 1965 he joined the Kenya African National Union (KANU) and subsequently elected the chairman of Bondeni Ward in Mombasa.

Councillor Sumba was first elected as councillor for Majengo ward in 1974 and was returned as councillor for same ward during the General Elections in 1979.

His public life has not been without its set backs. After having been elected and serving as a councillor for two years, Sumba was asked by his former employers to move to Nairobi on transfer or resign from the company. He chose to stay.

But a few weeks later the council was dissolved and an appointed commission took over the running of the council.

Councillor Sumba, however bounced back to retain his Majengo ward seat and the mayorship when the General Elections were held in 1979.

FIFTY year old Rajab Sumba has begun his second term of office after being re-elected Mayor of Mombasa at the annual meeting of the Municipal Council of Mombasa held at Council chambers.

Mayor Sumba was returned for a second term of office when he polled 19 votes against his opponents 11 votes. In December 1979, Sumba was elected Mayor of Mombasa by an overwhelming majority of 15 votes to 3.

His deputy mayor Councillor Ahmed S. Mwidani was also re-elected polling 21 votes against 9 votes.

In his acceptance speech, Mayor Rajab Sumba stated that the present Council had been most active in terms of development and welfare services for the residents of Mombasa.

He paid tribute to the Minister for Local Government Mr. Stanley Oloitiip for his active interest in the affairs of Local Authorities in the country.

His dynamism has helped Local Authorities achieve unprecedented progress during the short period he has held the portfolio," he said. Councillor Sumba requested the Minister

for Local Government to expedite Mombasa to the status of a city.

In terms of development progress Mombasa has made since independence, it is his considered opinion that Mombasa deserves the status of a city.

He thanked the Government of Saudi Arabia for making possible the twinning of Riyadh and Mombasa, and for providing an educational tour

the Americans' view challenging their dominance.

In other words, neither Col. **'MILLIONS EARNED BY CASHEWS'**

KILIFI (K.N.A.) — The Kenya Cashewnuts Limited in Kilifi sells 90 per cent of its products abroad earning Kenya millions of shillings in foreign exchange and the rest is consumed in the country.

This was disclosed by the factory general manager Mr Danus Mbela when he welcomed in his office a team of county Council chairman, official and educationists.

Mr Mbela said the factory was self reliant on the raw materials and it had never experienced any shortage since it started in 1975.

The group was conducted around the factory plant by the company's welfare officer Miss Jane Kazungu who told him that the factory gets its raw materials from the National Cereals and Produce Board.

Miss Kazungu said cashewnuts is produced in Lamu, Kwale and Kilifi but the majority of it is produced in the District.

Miss Kazungu further said that the factory has a labour force of more than 1,900 and more than 1,400 are women.

**RAIL POWER ARRIVES FOR TORORO LINE**

THREE diesel engine locomotives worth K Shs. 30 million ordered by the Uganda Railways arrived at the port of Mombasa this week aboard the French vessel *Ville de Marseilles*.

The off-loading of the locomotives, made in France, was witnessed by representatives of the Uganda Railways, Kenya Railways and Clearing and Forwarding agents based in Mombasa, Freight Hauliers.

The locomotives weighing 70 tons each were part of the 525 tons cargo brought in to Mombasa by the French vessel, including six containers with general cargo and 22 empty containers for stuffing in Mombasa.

**KENYA RAILWAYS**

The locomotives were expected to begin their journey to Tororo early next week by Kenya Railways where they will be handed over to Ugandan authorities.

The week also saw the arrival in Mombasa of a Yugoslav vessel *Morso* with 100 tons of general cargo on its way from Tanga and Dar es Salaam.

The ship was expected to load 800 tons of Kenya sisal and coffee before sailing off from Mombasa this week.

Other arrivals included the Western European Container Lines (W.E.C.) vessel, the two year old *Casilda del Mar* which has a capacity of 350 containers.

The new large class vessel was introduced in January this year to the fleet of the independent cellular service of Western European Container Lines which include the 1,600 ton *gross Anna del Mar, Eva del Mar, and Silvia Maria del Mar*.

The agents for the lines changed hands last week when

it was announced that Leslie and Anderson (E.A.) Ltd. had been appointed their general agents in Kenya.

Leslie and Anderson have a vast network of connections in the shipping industry and has been extending and expanding its line of operations in the region.

A Greek ship, *Adria* left Mombasa mid-week after loading general cargo to Piraeus, Venice, Trieste, Ravenna and Bari.

Meanwhile, ETCO Mombasa Ltd. have announced the arrival next week of a Saudi National Line vessel to Kenya. The vessel is a sustained containerised vessel which can load and off-load at any pier.

Its fleet includes three other vessels, *Cothia*, *Western* and *Tauria* which discharge and load cargo from and to Karachi, Bombay, Dibrut, Hodeidah and Jeddah U.L. French and North Western continent destinations.

**CHAMBER INVESTMENT COMPANY**

VOI (K.N.A.) — Members of the Kenya National Chamber of Commerce and Industry have until the end of August this year to purchase shares from the recently established Chamber Investments Company.

Speaking to VOI businessmen over the weekend the public relations officer Mr Andrew Mwalomwa said that the share register will be closed at the end of August and urge those interested in securing shares to do so before the deadline.

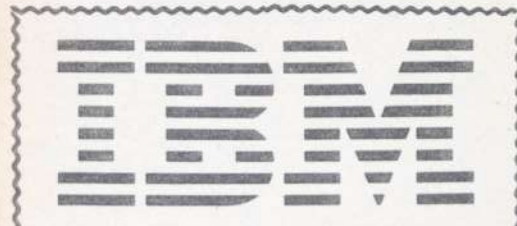

# NEW FASHION IDEAS FOR TOTOTO FROM THE UNITED STATES

ELVINA Mutua, director of Tototo Home Industries has returned recently from a visit to the USA loaded with new ideas to help in the upliftment of women, particularly in the rural areas, and the extension of the services presently being offered by Tototo — a project of the National Christian Council of Kenya.

Tototo has been giving handicraft training and marketing facilities to many women's groups, and recently has been helping them establish other income generating activities.

Elvina who was accompanied by Maggie Gona, Social Welfare Officer, Mombasa Municipality, was among 37 participants from 20 countries at the Third World attending a six weeks course on 'Women in Management'.

Some of the classes took place in Washington and others in W. Virginia and Maryland.

Elvina met many donor agencies interested in funding programmes concerned with women's development. In an interview she said 'there are lots of opportunities for assistance in the form of grants materials and technical aid'.

However, she went on 'many of us feel it is better to have the technical know-how ourselves rather than having to beg for assistance from overseas'.

Much of this technical know-how had been given to them while in America. The main emphasis of the workshop was on the problems facing women in rural areas.

Said Elvina most of the participants are working with women on different projects in the countryside, some on income generating activities and others concerned with promoting health, family planning and tackling other problems facing those who live in rural areas.

Said Elvina, our aim as women is to train women to become more self reliant and be able to organise things for themselves to raise living standards in the rural areas, rather than always seeking help from us.

As far as Tototo is concerned Elvina said we would like to work with more groups and train them so they are able to identify their own problems and find solutions themselves'.

There was now a great need to show them to stand on their own feet and organise things themselves.

Discussions in America also had great stress on the health of mother and child.

It was realised that health came from being decently housed, enjoying a good balanced diet and having clean water to drink. All were interested. A mother in good health could assist much more in the community.

men together to assist them as well.

It has already started a 'men only' group at Bomani who plan to open a vegetable marketing selling the produce which villagers bring from their shambas, as well as making handicrafts to sell.

Another group is being organised at Mgomani who plan to open a co-operative shop to sell commodities — something badly needed in that area. The men have been egged on by seeing women running a very successful poultry project there.

Meanwhile, Tototo already has a group of men making handicrafts — laundry baskets, wine stands table mats, etc., at Shimo-la-Tewa.

Many more women and men would like Tototo's help in embarking on income generating activities — but the big drawback is transport.

Said Mrs Mutua 'we are hoping that some public-spirited person might come forward and donate a vehicle suitable for our work in the

Street shop, but have started other income generating activities with Tototo's help.

Mrs Mutua mentioned that she was also hoping to find a donor to fund a book-keeping course for those involved in income generating activities as many have little idea how to keep books of account.

This was Elvina's second visit to America, but the first to Washington. She finds America has a very mixed society compared with countries in Europe — excluding Great Britain.

Mrs Mutua also revealed that Tototo is hard at work in its Old Town workshop creating a new range of fashionwear which will be on sale in their section of the Mombasa Show

# FRENCH VOTE FOR NEW DIRECTION IN THE 'EIGHTIES

THE French people celebrate this year, in a traditionally festive atmosphere, the 192nd anniversary of the storming of the Bastille, at a time when they have chosen a new direction for their society.

The changes which we are witnessing in France indicate that our nation has reached a high degree of maturity. For, first of all, they take place in the framework of modern, democratic and deep-rooted institutions. Second, they show that Frenchmen, as other western peoples, reject both conservatism and communism.

Lastly, they demonstrate the will of the nation to pursue its objective of economic, cultural and scientific development, as well as to carry out reforms, deemed indispensable, in the social and economic fields.

These intended reforms, will essentially bring about a greater decentralisation of authority, a further reduction of economic inequalities and, finally, an extension of the public sector of the economy. It goes without saying that, France will, as always, stay firmly committed to free enterprise and free trade.

What do these changes mean as far as our foreign policy is concerned? Although based on the same principles as before, this policy will assert itself more forcefully in certain fields.

First of all, France remains totally bound by its alliance with western nations with which it shares the same democratic values and the same attachment to liberty. This solidarity does not exclude a political independence which, indeed, may only enrich the latter, for the complexity of today's world require a multiple approach.

The second axis of French external policy is the European Community which we would like to see reinforced, especially

in the social field, and playing a greater role in the world. A united Europe is, indeed, not only a condition of our continued economic development, but also an indispensable factor of political stability in the old continent.

Thirdly, France attaches a constant, but henceforth growing, importance to its relations with the developing countries. It is essential for a world which we would like to be, in the future, based on justice and peace, that not only the burden of misery borne by many of these countries should be alleviated, but also that they should be gradually integrated into the world economy.

We believe that developing nations should be helped in

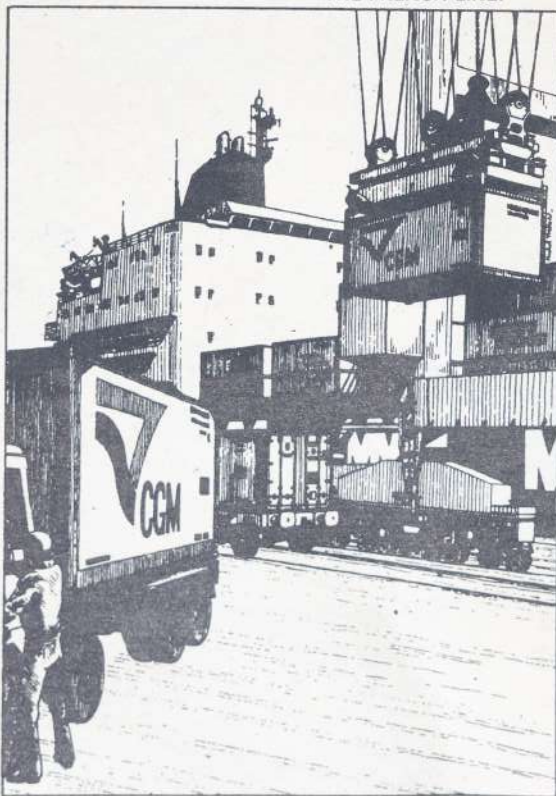
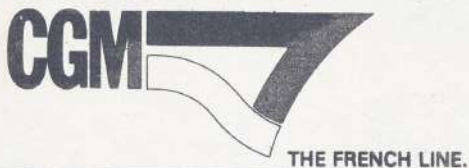
such a way that on the one hand they may be able to meet their basic needs — particularly in food and energy — and, on the other hand, thanks to a proper recycling of financial surpluses and the required transfer of technology, they may produce goods to be exchanged with those of developed countries.

In that respect France intends to play a leading role — especially in Africa, to which is bound by so many links. Incidentally, it is worth noting that these links imply that France will remain faithful to its friends and will observe its commitments, whatever they are, and that she will also contribute to efforts being deployed to put an end, particularly in Southern Africa, to unjust and anachronistic

relations between France and Kenya can only benefit from this approach. For it will certainly reinforce the mutual respect and esteem which characterize these relations, in a climate of complete political agreement, and help in giving a new impetus to the growing co-operation and exchange between the two countries.

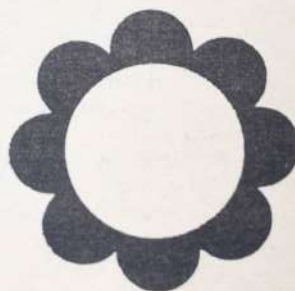

# Freedom And Justice Are Fundamental

Relations Minister Claude Cheysson comments:

People must know what is

to them: respect for individual and freedom. For me are not just words, they are fundamental.

— Yes there is a danger of giving up, from weariness, and it causes to disappear. I see far less of it in France. It is a remarkable sign of our

African policy — Africa is the continent nearest to us geographically, linguistically and culturally. So as for disengagement, certainly not. But Africa is not just a continent, it is a continent which France has special relations — these relations must be maintained, of course. Africa as a whole has preferential relations with the European Community to which we belong. As a consequence we will have relations with different countries in Africa... We are bound by our past commitments. If something were to happen tomorrow and we were called on to meet one of our obligations, we would do so. That's clear.

the financial situation of developing countries — Of course there will have to be a commitment for the countries to pay the heaviest debts. That is what has already happened for Egypt, Ghana. But the situation is more general. There is currently a financing crisis over and above the problem of the repayment of the debt. If the banks are not paid the banks will stop.

The problem must be tackled from an even broader perspective. The third world countries must be helped in the internal restructuring needed to reduce their consumption and increase their energy production. A necessary remark: the underdevelopment of many of the third world countries is due to the overpowering forces of the all-encroaching industrial system that burns every day, in the form of winds. These are the winds of energy. Considerable resources are needed to free these countries from oil imports. They must also be allowed to

South Africa — We would like to see progress in South Africa under conditions that correspond to our ideas. For individuals, the right is to decide their own future. This must take the form of a free and open demonstration. If there is no demonstration, there will be an arms race. France will not supply arms to one side, not one side in South Africa and we will be close in this.

Arab policy — Our policy is to have very close relations with the Maghreb. Similarly it will be to have very close relations with the Black Africa. We must not be afraid that any of our commitments would be weakened. Our current policy is to have very close relations with the Arab world. We have the right to establish a relationship with those who may be interested. There is a need to have the right of people to be heard, including

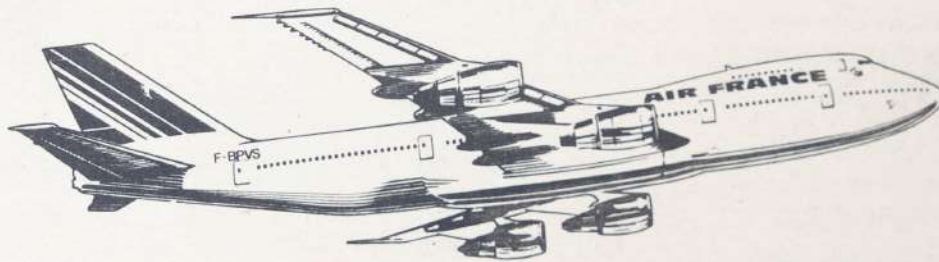

## A LOOK AT FUTURE FRENCH TECHNOLOGY ...



TGV REVOLUTIONIZES RAIL TRAVEL — As it roared down a new railwayline between Paris and south-east France last February 26, it colors merging in a blur of orange and blue, France's high speed train — called the TGV after its initials in French — shattered the world's speed record for trains by hitting a peak 380 kilometers per hour... or no less than 106 metres per second. The train did it with a minimum of vibration and noise

inside the driver's brown cabin, a compartment decked out with steeply-inclined windows and an ultra modern control panel because the aerodynamic noise of the locomotive had been dampened by computer to slice through air resistance like a knife. The train is expected to revolutionize rail travel between Paris and Marseilles in France. Starting from September 27, passengers will be able to travel from the French capital to Lyon in just 2 hours 40 minutes.



SOLAR ENERGY — Ecologists see solar energy as by far the "softest" on offer in the world. And governments, research workers and industrial firms everywhere are evidencing a growing interest in the various ways of converting solar energy into heat, hot water and electricity. France's projects in the field are geared, in the first instance, to building small and medium-sized solar power houses made up of concentration: a capter injecting heat into a heat-conducting fluid: a thermal engine converting heat into mechanical or electrical energy. As solar energy power station going by the name of Thémis is being built in France's West Pyrenees area at the cost of 120 billion francs, it is equipped with a 2 megawatt turbo alternator.

THE COUNTRY's nuclear energy program, launched at the end of the 1950's is based partly on the use of pressurized reactors (PWR) feeding on slightly enriched uranium and partly on fast breeder reactors using re-cycled plutonium. The "conventional" (PWR) series consist of two power stations, which is no longer linked by contrast to Westinghouse nuclear boilers while Atchoum Atlantique comprises pressurized alternator systems, the first of France's fast breeder station producing 1,200 megawatts — is scheduled to be built at Creys Marville on the banks of the Rhone river in 1985. The nuclear energy program supplied just 15 per cent of the electricity in 1978. This percentage should rise to 40 per cent in 1985, to 70 per cent in 1990 and to between 75 and 80 per cent by the year 2000.

Chilled Spanish Loaf

CHILLED Spanish Loaf is a well established favourite on our picnic menu and I am always asked for the recipe when someone tastes it for the first time; everyone comes back for a second helping so what better recommendation can there be for a dish.

It can be made quite far in advance which is useful and can be left in the deep-freeze, wrapped in tinfoil until required. It defrosts on the journey yet remains crisp until one is ready to eat it and is a meal in itself. This recipe will feed six hungry adults.

- 2 French Loaves
- Filling
- olive oil
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 2 finely chopped onions
- 4 crushed cloves of garlic
- 4 large eggs well beaten and seasoned
- 1 large can of macaroni cheese
- 1 medium can of Italian tomatoes - drained
- 2 fresh green peppers
- Anchovy fillets or olives and parsley for garnishing

Cut the loaves in half lengthwise. Put them under the grill crusty side up and brown lightly. If you have no grill do this in a hot oven. Next pull out most of the soft inside of the bread leaving a one inch rim all the way round.

Melt the butter with a tablespoon full of olive oil and cook the onions and garlic until soft but do not allow to brown. While these are simmering pour olive oil into the hollowed out loaves and leave to stand while you make prepare the rest of the stuffing.

Add chopped peppers to the onion, when soft add the macaroni. Heat through then stir in the beaten eggs until the mixture begins to thicken — like scrambled eggs. Season with plenty of pepper but not too much salt.

If you wish to add a little extra cheese for flavour now is the time to do it. Before the mixture becomes too dry stir in the well-drained tomatoes. Now strain the oil out of the loaves and place them under the grill again until they are crisp and golden inside. Fill them with the savoury mixture.

Press it into the hollows firmly and decorate with slivers of anchovy, olives and parsley or slivers of uncooked green pepper. Wrap each tightly in the foil and chill in the deep freeze.

I found that the loaves were too long for my deep-freeze so I slice the loaves across into portions about 5 inches long cut on the slant and wrap these individually.

This salad is called Christmas salad, merely because the first time we made it was for a Christmas picnic. Grapes may not be so easy to come by at other times of the year in Kenya which would be the only reason for confining it to December.

It can be prepared in a plastic bowl with a lid, taken to the picnic and dressed on the spot.

- Mix a combination of grapes, seeded and halved
- lettuce
- green peppers
- spring onions
- cucumber, celery
- finely shredded white cabbage
- chopped parsley
- Clean the vegetables and fruits and chill thoroughly before the journey.

Cut the cucumber in squares not slices after peeling it. Make the dressing to taste from lemon juice and olive oil, freshly ground black pepper and salt. Take to the picnic in a screw top jar. Shake thoroughly before dressing the salad.

MARINATED PICNIC CHICKEN

- 2 — 2 1/2 pound tender chicken
- 1/4 pint olive oil
- 1 tablespoon tomato sauce or ketchup
- dash of Worcester sauce
- 1 clove of garlic crushed
- salt and freshly ground black pepper
- 1 ounce flour
- 2 eggs, well beaten
- 3 ounces breadcrumbs
- Joint and skin the chicken.

Make a marinade from the oil, sauces and garlic. Season it and steep the chicken pieces in this for at least 12 hours. Turn occasionally so that the joints get a fair share of the marinade over all of the.

It can conveniently marinade overnight. Drain the chicken pieces, toss in flour, dip into beaten egg and coat with breadcrumbs. Place the breadcrumbed joints in a roasting tin, cover with aluminium foil and bake in a moderate oven for 45 minutes on the centre shelf!

Remove foil for the last 10 minutes, allowing the joints to brown. Leave to cool then pack in foil ready for the picnic. Serves 6.

Consider serving chilled

Gazpacho as a first course on a picnic, it is refreshing on a hot day and a Thermos simplifies transportation. Serve it in insulated beakers.

Pascal noch nicht selbst fressen konnte, so war ihm jeweils Milch mit der Pipette zuzusetzen sowie einen halben Löffel Obst.

Im ersten Tag wurde sein Schwanz eingekürzt und er blickte uns mit großen Augen an. So hatten wir nun zwei Affen, die auf dem Baum herumturnten und sich gegenseitig in der Leine verwickelten, so daß wir sie schließlich frei herumspringen lassen mußten. Sie blieben aber immer in unserer Nähe.

In der Zwischenzeit war Pascal auch gewachsen und wollte schon etwas mehr von der Welt sehen. Er wagte sich noch nicht aus dem Haus, setzte sich jedoch liebend gerne auf meinen Kopf, um bei Gefahr in meinen Haaren unterzutauchen. Man konnte ihn auch in einer Bananentraube deponieren, wo er sitzen blieb und zusah, bis man ihn wieder abholte.

Nach einigen Monaten wurde sich Pascal seiner Rasse bewußt. Als Lemure (großer Galago) schlief er nun tagsüber im Kleiderschrank in der Beuge der Kleiderbügel und zischte wütend, wenn man ein Kleid herausnehmen wollte. Nachts wurde er munter und ging auf Safari. Als er in der ersten Nacht allein ausging, waren wir sehr besorgt. Im Morgengrauen kam er zurück, hüpfte auf das aufgerollte Moskitonetz, fuhr darauf Karussell und sprang in unsere Betten. Er ließ uns keine Ruhe, bis wir wieder zuhauften.

Zusammen mit Susi hatte er die Wohnung inspiziert. Sie schlangen sich vom Bücherregal auf die Bilderrahmen und Lampenschirme, von den Blumenstöcken in die Vorhänge.

Bubi konnte offenbar nicht sehen, was unter seinem Bauch vorging und bot als Hund mit Katzenbuckel ein unwerfend komisches Bild.

Auch Chiko und Beppi begehrten Einlaß und suchten Schutz vor dem Platzregen. Da man bei einem solchen Unwetter keinen Hund vor der Türe lassen konnte, mußte man erst recht Mitleid mit den Affen haben. Sie waren aber schlechter Laune und führten sich im Hause gar nicht artig auf. Mit Mühe und Not konnten wir sie davon abbringen, in die Vorhänge Löcher zu beißen und wir suchten sie in die Küche, wo sie weniger Schaden anrichten konnten. Chiko interessierte sich für ein Paket Orzo, Beppi griff sich gewandt einen Laib geschnittenen Toastbrot. Auf unsere Schreckensrufe hin rannten sie davon; Chiko verstreute mit jedem Satz eine Prise Waschpulver und Beppi verlor



bei seinen Sprüngen jedesmal ein Stück Brot aus dem offenen Paket.

Wir konnten sie nur noch mit Bananen von ihrem wilden Spiel ablenken. # SCHWEIZER ZIEHEN BILLIGERE FERIEEN VOR

ARTOUR Suisse — eines der größten Reiseunternehmen der Schweiz — stellt fest, daß infolge der nun bei 10 Prozent angelegten Inflationsrate die Urlauber nicht mehr so weit in die Ferne schweifen, da das Gute näher und billiger zu erreichen ist, vor allem die Mittelmeerländer.

Sagt Urs Hank, der neue Übersee-Product Manager: "Obwohl Kenia immer noch zu den beliebtesten Urlaubsorten gehört, haben die Buchungen diesen Sommer zum ersten Mal keine Steigerung erfahren. Bisher hatte die Besucherzahl in Kenia jedes Jahr zugenommen".

Aufgrund der wirtschaftlichen Notizen in Europa müssen die Schweizer nach vielen Jahren des wachsenden Wohlstandes ihren Gärtel wieder etwas enger schnallen. Als Folge dieser Entwicklung hat der Tourismus nach Spanien beträchtlich zugenommen, denn

ein vergleichbarer Urlaub kommt dort etwa 1300 Fr. 350.1 billiger als in Kenia.

Durch die dauernden Ölpreiserhöhungen sind auch die Flugkosten enorm in die Höhe gestiegen. Die zum Glück nur vorübergehend eingeführten neuen Visabestimmungen für Kenia hätten sich ebenfalls sehr nachteilig auf den Tourismus aus der Schweiz ausgewirkt, da viele Kunden ihre Ferien erst kurze Zeit vor dem Abflugdatum buchen und die neuen Bestimmungen eine Wartezeit auf das Visum von 34 Wochen vorsehen. Unterdessen wurde die neue Regelung revidiert und man kann ein Visum wieder in 34 Tagen erhalten.

## GRUPPENREISEN

Auch bei den Winterbuchungen erwartet man zum ersten Mal seit vielen Jahren keine Zunahme. Artour Suisse bringt pro Jahr etwa 3000 Gäste nach Kenia und hat

vor 10 Jahren die ersten Gruppenreisen durchgeführt.

Vor zwei Jahren kamen in der Sommer- und Winterferien wöchentlich zwei DC8 Chartermaschinen nach Kenia. Gegenwärtig gibt es nur einen Balar Charterflug pro Woche und die DC 8 transportiert die Kunden von sechs Reiseunternehmen, anstatt von drei wie bisher. Aus diesem Grunde sind die Flüge noch immer voll besetzt. In der Winterferien wird eine Balar DC 10 eingesetzt.

to Kisumu, the competitive driving begins with the ascent of the winding road up to Bamba, a favourite with the cross-spectators and photographers. The route then heads north on the traditional Safari route over the Rare River then swings inland towards Bamba. Shortly before darkness the leading cars will be joining the main Nairobi near Mariakani with their first chance to refuel. The cars then head back through the hills around Kaloleni heading for the Vipingo area, and another chance to service on the Malindi road near the Petrol Station.

#### ENDLESS MUD-HOLES

The last competitive section takes the cars through the winding tracks of Kikambala, endless yumps, mudholes and lurking coconut trees. The leg ends with a transport section from Mtwapa Bridge to Severin where the first car is expected at 8p.m. Crews who have not lost too much time will enjoy a rest period before the first car leaves Severin at 10.15p.m., followed by the rest of the survivors at two minute intervals.

The second leg takes the cars once again up to Ngau Tala hill, this time the cars turn west, the leading car is due at Mariakani shortly after 11 o'clock. Service teams will have a chance to work their magic before the cars head down towards the Shimba Hills on the South Coast.

By using roads new to rallying the organisers get the rally back to main road near Maji-ya-Chumvi after midnight, farmac to Mariakani, then back towards Kaloleni and the north coast near Mtwapa, and back to the main control at 2a.m.

At 4.15a.m. on Sunday morning, the cars are set off on the final leg, over the Nyali Bridge, Mazingira Causeway towards Mazarra. The rally heads south before looping back to Samburu at dawn, then a loop through the bush beyond Mackinnon Road.

The cars can service again between Samburu and Mariakani area, then a long north before a final dash down the long hill to Kisumu, and the main farmac road back to Severin at 8a.m. on Sunday morning.

#### NARROW TRACKS

The recent wet weather has done away with the dust problem but cars will still need each control at intervals of not less than two minutes. The wet cut down the chances of cars being baulked on some of the narrow tracks. One section on the South Coast could be affected by rain, but alternative route markers are ready and will be used if the route opening car reports the section impassable.

This years route has been laid out in clover-leaf pattern, so that the furthest point on the route from Severin is only 80 kilometres.

This allows rally headquarters to be fixed at one spot, makes it easier to identify control officers from one leg to the next and greatly reduces the amount of fuel used by service cars.

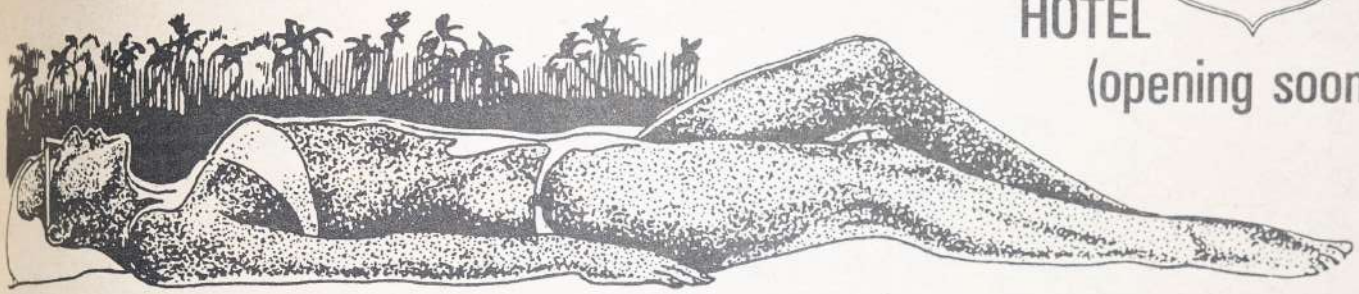

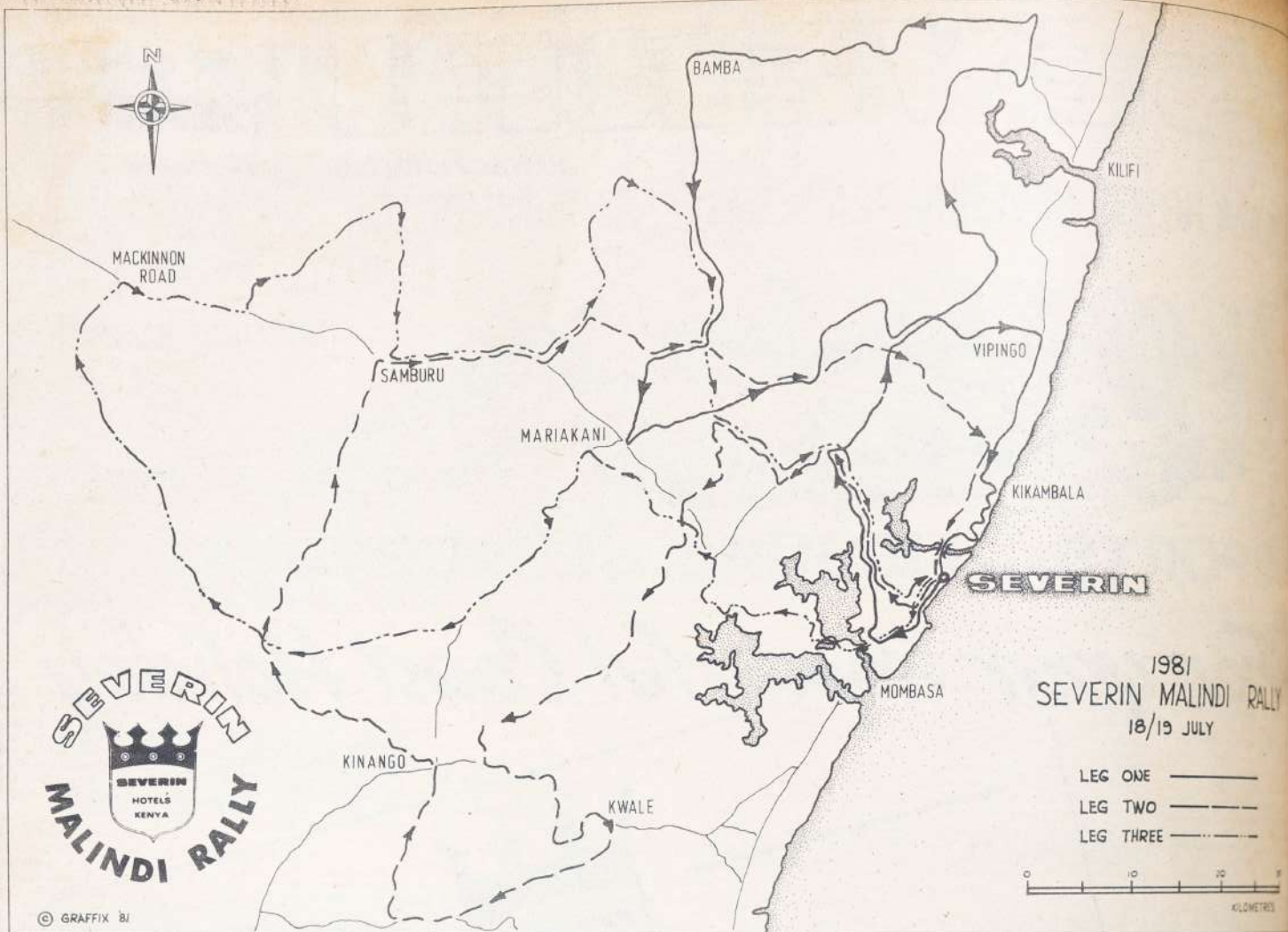

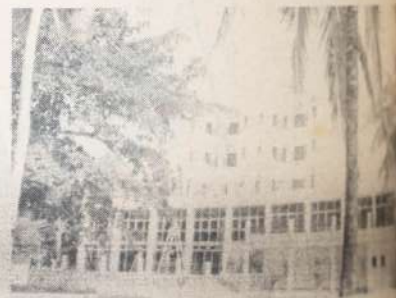
