NEW SHOCK FOR COAST MATATUS MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Municipal Council is to request the Government for Local Government powers to grant powers to the Matatus to control and regulate matatus within the Municipality. A proposal to that effect was approved at a full council meeting chaired by Mayor Kabub Sumba. Council spokesman said the Government will be for the proposal and the use of the powers which hitherto have not been used. There are over 2,000 matatus of various sizes on the Mombasa roads.

West German Welfare Group Aid Polio Clinic

IT WAS A GREAT moment for the Port Reitz Polio Clinic, Mombasa, when Shs. 36,000 was received from the Albert Schweitzer School, Hilden, Germany. For over the past month, the clinic has been very short of money to meet its running expenses. This donation will sponsor 6 in-patient beds for a year. Presenting a cheque were three teachers who had promoted this project at their school after the Freedom from Hunger organisation in Germany had told them about the wonderful work, on a shoe-string budget, being carried out

NETA PEAL reports at Port Reitz. Students had not only collected money, but had made handicrafts to sell at a fund-raising fete for the polio clinic at Port Reitz. Such was the enthusiasm generated for this project, that all items sold like hot cakes. The teachers came to Kenya specially to present the money the school had raised, to visit the clinic and to take pictures of it to show students back in Germany. In presenting the cheque Hildegard Brieden promised

they would continue with their support, and that their target was to sponsor 2-3 beds a year. It costs about Shs. 180,000 annually to run this 30-bed clinic, and Tom Douglas, chairman of the APDK, Coast, said they would like to have more public-spirited people, or organisations, sponsoring a bed at Shs 6,000 a year. There are still 21 beds available for sponsorship. In July, the committee was delighted to receive Shs. 20,000 from the Ministry of Culture and Social Services, through the APDK's headquarters in Nairobi, which gave their finances quite a boost. Also at the presentation was Rowland McVicker, a well known surgeon at the Coast, who since the clinic first opened 15 years ago has taken a keen interest in the welfare of these young polio victims, carrying out essential operations 'free of charge', and giving them a great deal of his time and attention. Others present included Geoff Kizito, vice-chairman, APDK, Coast; Mick Clarke, committee member and Elizabeth Okello, an occupational therapist in charge of the clinic. These teachers from the Albert Schweitzer School were sincerely thanked for their concern over the welfare of Kenya's polio victims, and asked to convey to students the appreciation and gratitude of all at the Port Reitz Polio Clinic. The other two teachers were Lisa van der Poel and Uschi Hortella.

COAST OFFICE ACCUSED OF 'GROSS MIS-CONDUCT' DEVELOPMENT MONEY MIS-APPROPRIATED

Government is reported to have lost millions of shillings through irregular contracts and misuse of development funds involving government projects.

'LIVESTOCK FUNDS USED TO BUY OFFICE CARPETS'

Board in Nairobi. Contrary to laid-down government regulations, the contracts are alleged to have been formalised by simple letters signed by the Provincial Director of Veterinary Services and the owners of the firms. The contractual agreements did not contain any details of technical specifications of the construction works and despite payments being made to the contractors, none of the projects were completed or carried out. The Provincial Livestock Office in Mombasa is reported to have entered into four construction agreements for a total of K.Shs. 181,000 with a private firm to build one block house, two chicken houses, one sub-staff house and a cattle boma at the Ukunda Veterinary Research Station. 'OVER — PAYMENT' One house was not completed and the rest of the buildings were found to be of poor quality and did not warrant the amount paid to the firm. In another contract, an amount of K.Shs. 175,000 was paid to a private firm to build junior staff houses in Voi. However, the assessment made after the construction of the houses revealed the amount paid was excessive and that the

houses were not properly built. Another sum of K.Shs. 70,000 was paid to a private firm for the construction of junior staff houses at Chonyi. But the correct estimate showed that the construction should have cost only K.Shs. 56,000. The Provincial Livestock Office signed another agreement with a contractor to build a junior staff house in Kaloleni at a total cost of K.Shs. 100,000. The office paid K.Shs. 30,000 as advance payment but no such house was constructed. In Malindi, the provincial Office signed a contract for the construction of two junior houses at a cost of K.Shs. 300,000. The contract was signed by the Ministry official at the Coast and the first payment of K. Shs. 100,000 was paid to the firm. But only minor constructions were made. The Provincial Livestock office went to sign three other contracts for the construction of one garage and workshop, one bridge and live drainage drains for a sheep and goats project at Maluga, Kwale at a cost of K.Shs. 610,000. Records show that K.Shs. 390,000 were paid to the firm as advance payment against

these contracts. But no construction work was ever undertaken. In a series of mis-appropriation of funds, the provincial livestock office is alleged to have misused thousands of development funds without authority for items which were not included in the Ministry's estimates of expenditure. The office is reported to have spent K.Shs. 15,800 and 23,700-intended for Livestock improvement to carpet the offices of the Provincial Director of Livestock Development and the Range Officer in Mombasa. A further sum of K.Shs. 28,000 intended for small-scale irrigation schemes was diverted to finance the erection of parking shades at the Provincial Headquarters in Mombasa without authority being obtained from the Ministry's Headquarters in Nairobi. 'PAYING TWICE' And two duplicate payments of K. Shs. 39,000 were allegedly paid to a firm for building steel bodies for G.K. lorries without tenders being invited and any official authority obtained. In another incident of 'gross financial misconduct', the Office is alleged to have paid K.Shs. 92,000 to a private firm for a supply of four water trailers without quotation or reference to the Ministerial Tender Board or the Central Tender Board. The Mombasa Livestock office is further accused of over-spending K.Shs. 196,130/95 for the purchase of cement, timber, posts, ballast, sand and cement blocks from various non-government contractors. It is alleged that there was no

evidence that the materials were received since none of the items was taken on charge in any of the stores ledgers. At the same time no actual disposal of the materials could be ascertained or verified.

**Taveta Fishermen
Making A Million**

WUNDANYI (K.N.A.) — Fish caught from Lake Jipe weighed 458,308 kilograms worth Shs. 1,323,751/50 while that from Lake Chala was 168,973 kilograms worth Shs. 483,106 and 50 cents according to the 1980 annual report released by

the Taita Taveta D.C. Mr. Tiampati.

Mr. Tiampati said that the catch decreased due to lack of fishing gear which has gone up in prices adding that fishing in Chala using gill-nets was reduced by the fisheries management during the year.

He added that the catch through the Fisheries cooperative during the year under review was 334,285 kilograms of fish valued at Shs. 1,040,000. The commission collected from the fish dealers amounted to Shs. 3,728/25.

The Nontic countries agreed in principle to supply Taveta fisherman cooperative society with an ice plant and other equipment for preservation and transportation of fish to its market, he said.

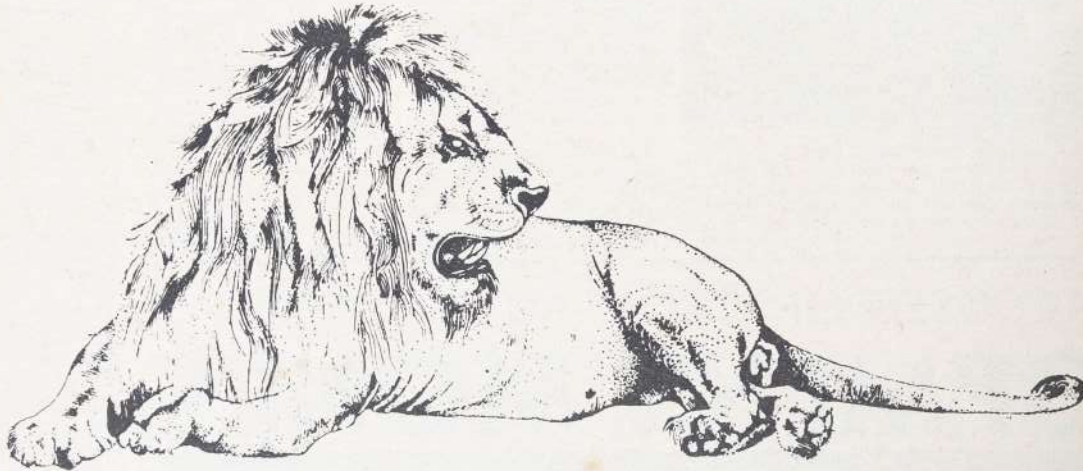
He went on to say that repayment was Shs. 16,200 while the amount outstanding stood at Shs. 128,000. The industrial and commercial corporation gave a loan of Shs. 100,000 to wages during the year.

FISHING LOANS

KWALE (K.N.A.) — Fisheries Cooperative Society in the country will benefit from loans totalling over 500 million shillings, seventy million of which will come from the World Bank and the rest from the Government. This was disclosed by the Director of Fisheries, Mr. N. Oloo who he addressed Shimoni Fishermen Cooperative members in Shimoni, Kwale District.

WELL PRESENTED COMEDY-CUM-DRAMA THAT IS EASY ON THE NERVES

OPENING At the Kenya and Naaz Cinemas this Sunday is Director B. Nagi Reddi's *Swayamvar*. Like his previous films *Julie* and *Swarag Narak* this one too is easy on the nerves and the presentation of every sequence is extremely well executed.

The yarn is spun around two brothers who are out to woo two step-sisters. They do this to fulfil a promise they made to their father on his death-bed.

Ratanlal (*Dr. Shreeram Lagoo*), a prosperous businessman with two sons, Ram (*Sanjeev Kumar*) and Laxman (*Shashi Kapoor*) is snubbed by Nadira, playing the role of a proud widow, when he seeks the hands of her two daughters (*Vidya Sinha* and *Moushumi Chatterjee*) in marriage for his two sons.

The film runs the traditional pattern of "challenge and

response" with the narrative unfolding engagingly.

Sanjeev Kumar disguised as a Naukar (servant) enters the widow's house and then the heart of her charming daughter Shanti, portrayed by Vidya Sinha.

Shashi Kapoor, in the garb of a prince and a social worker, wins the favours of the busy Moushumi and the stage is set for a romantic comedy.

But Makhhanal (*Madan Puri*)

a distant relative and self-appointed adviser to Nadira, upsets the cart by involving his salacious son, *Ranjeet* in the bridal stakes.

In the climax, the two brothers join forces to save Nadira from the clutches of the wily Makhhanal who is after her wealth. Nadira realises her past follies and the story comes to one of those endings where everyone gets his due.

Despite some obvious flaws, *Swayamvar* is a light-hearted, colourful, funny and glamour-packed movie that offers entertainment of a kind that audiences don't often find.

The greatest attraction is Sanjeev Kumar and his subtle humour — which is a knockout. The two heroines, Vidya and Moushumi playing step-sisters dominate the film and keep the momentum going.

During the year Kenya Breweries Limited changed its policy of valuing bottles and cases from the lower of cost and deposit value to actual cost on a first in first out basis. This has resulted in restatement of 1980 comparative figures.

The Group profits before taxation for the year amounted to K£5,228,479 which represents a decrease of K£2,347,751 from the previous year's figure of K£7,576,230. Apart from increase in depreciation charge of K£1,096,483 due to the substantial revaluation on 30th June, 1980 of the fixed assets of the Company's wholly owned subsidiary, Kenya Breweries Limited the rest of decrease in profits of K£1,251,268 is largely due to inflation in costs. The position would have been much worse if there had not been an increase in beer sales of 7.6% for the period under review.

The current year's taxation on profit is much higher than the standard rate of 45% Company Tax mainly because of the increased depreciation charge arising out of revaluation of Kenya Breweries Limited's fixed assets which is not offset by a corresponding increase in tax allowance, as the increased value of assets on revaluation does not qualify for this allowance.

As a result the profit after taxation of K£2,293,804 shows a disproportionate decrease of K£1,726,711 on previous year's figure of K£4,020,515.

Shareholders will however be happy to learn that from Budget day 1981 permitted margins on beer were increased and as a result we have a real prospect of a marked improvement in our profits in the current year. Indeed figures for the two months since 1st July 1981 firmly indicate that we will more than recover the ground lost during the financial year under review and that our profitability will be restored at a level which will ensure a more equitable relationship between net profits and increasing capital employed in our activities.

In consequence your directors recommend the same final dividend as in the preceding financial year.

MOTHER THEREZA SHARING HER LOVE IN KENYA

INDIA'S Mother Teresa has spent five memorable days in Kenya during which time she officially laid the foundation stone for the Missionaries of Charity centre at Huruma on the slum outskirts of Nairobi.

Mother Teresa, recipient of the 1979 Nobel Prize for Peace, arrived from Uganda where she was a guest of President Milton Obote who requested her to consider sending her Missionaries of Charity in Uganda.

The place where they would like to work and the nature of their work was left entirely to the Missionaries of Charity.

Prior to visiting Uganda, Mother Teresa had been to her Missionaries of Charity in Rwanda and Tanzania where the Missionaries have been working since 1968 and have three major outposts in Tabora, Dar es Salaam and Dodoma.

Their centre in Rwanda is more recent and was established in 1979 with the strong backing of the President of Rwanda and the local Roman Catholic Church authorities.

There are thousands of people in Nairobi who were eager to see the founder of the Missionaries of Charity congregation whose Sisters and Brothers work among the "poorest of the poor" in over 40 countries of the world. Most were rather disappointed as she was unable to accept advance requests for interviews or to put in personal appearances at religious services.

However, there were over 200 friends and co-workers of Mother Teresa who turned up for the laying of the foundation stone of the Missionaries of Charity first establishment in Kenya.

Almost all these friends and co-workers came of their own volition.

None were invited and hardly anybody knew what time there would be a small service of blessing of the foundation stone by the Holy See's repre-

sentative to Kenya and the cementing of this foundation stone by the Cardinal Archbishop of Nairobi, His Eminence Maurice Otunga; the Indian High Commissioner to Kenya, Mr. V. R. Grover; representatives of several Roman Catholic congregations including the Jesuits whose regional superior, Fr. Peter Meinberg, from the Ruaraka Benedictine Monastery making an acknowledgement that the Benedictines were happy to be so close to the Missionaries of Charity, the Guadalupe Mexican missionaries, the Verona Italian Missionaries, the Comboni Sisters and individuals from the U.N. embassies and other bodies who have been closely associated with the Missionaries of Charity in Kenya and other countries.

'Kind, Gracious And Charming'

There was surprisingly no Press or Radio and TV representation even though some

newspapers did publicise that the Vice President of Kenya and Finance Minister of the country, Mr. Mwai Kibaki, was expected to be there for the function.

Mother Teresa was kind, gracious and most charming during the time she welcome friends and co-workers at the Huruma foundation.

She had nice words for all present and in particular thanked the Vice President of Kenya for being helpful in getting the government of Kenya to donate three acres of land to the Missionaries of Charity.

The land is being turned into a miracle with the local residents not being able to believe what is being transformed so industriously with hard work and daily prayers into one of Huruma's most promising and welcoming institutions.

Mother Teresa's nuns work among the poorest of the poor and their plan is to have a home for disabled and unwanted children a habitation for the old men and women who are poor and sickly and have nobody to look after them and tend them, and social centres where they will be the teaching of sewing and other crafts to the women of Huruma and the neighbouring areas of Mathare and Kariobangi and gradually the organising of classes to teach poor children the elements and the fundamentals of what is basically writing reading and arithmetic.

Mother Teresa is a most remarkable woman and one who is in her own way a combination of several entities as administrator tireless worker practicing nurse, experienced doctor, wise teacher and most important an inspirer of the Work which she starts with the her Missionaries of Charity.

The world has recognised the contributions she had made to Peace and she is equally warmly welcomed at Buckingham Palace by Queen Elizabeth II as she is joyfully received by the President of the United States, Mr. Ronald Reagan and Mrs. Reagan at the

White House.

The Missionaries of Charity is the only Christian religious order which has its recently established foundations in Socialist Yugoslavia and in Communists East Germany.

Even though a committed and fully devoted follower of Jesus Christ, Mother Teresa does not preach any religion other than that of our loving and helping the poor, the incurably sick and the destitutes in our society.

When a friend remarked to her that the motto of our present Government was 'peace love and unity' and tried to get her to appreciate that there may not be that heaven of justice which is so important for any society, she was quick to react and quietly said:

"How can there be love without justice?"

During her short stay in the capital of Nairobi she was expected to visit Nakuru as the guest of Bishop Raphael Ndingi but was unable to do so due to another commitment in Nairobi.

There are strong indications that she would be made most welcome to start a foundation in the Coast Province of Kenya.

Here it is will be up to the local Bishop of Mombasa Dr. Nicodeus Kirima and well wishers at the Coast to ensure that she is invited to come and visit the province and find out for herself what nature of work her Missionaries of Charity may be able to undertake.

'Feeding The Undernourished'

The Missionaries of Charity have their Africa Continent Superior, Sister Regina based in Nairobi and there is Sister Pauline who is the Kenya Superior. Their box number is 32778, Nairobi. But the best practical way of contacting either of them is around 3 p.m. in the afternoons when they feed each day, except Thursday and Sunday during the week, over 400 undernourished and very poor children from their centre at Huruma on the Outskirts of Nairobi.

Shell Oil Plans Leave Tanzania

THE GIANT Dutch Oil Company, Shell is to gradually leave Tanzania. It will transfer its shares in Shell and BP Tanzania to the end of the year to BP Tanzania. The Tanzania Government approved the transfer of shares which gives BP Tanzania with the government Shell and BP had originally 25 shares each.

The phasing out is attributed to both companies being equally balanced in their operations, for BP or British Petroleum had expanded its marketing activities and Shell has acquired substantial crude oil sources.

The exercise entails a smooth withdrawal of the Shell brand from the oil market, however, petroleum products and associated services in the country will still be available.

Co-operation between shell and BP was predominantly producing crude oil with a few marketing outlets which were controlled by Shell. In the early seventies the government took a 50 per cent share in the two companies and the Italian Oil Multi-National-Agip.

Tanzania earned some 1.18 billion shillings in foreign exchange from the sale of coffee to quota and non-quota markets. The amount is quite low given the rise of the coffee price on the world market and the fact that a substantial quantity was sold to the non-quota market.

Algeria purchased some 21 million Kgs out of the non-quota market and the North African Arab State has agreed to buy an additional five million Kgs between October and December this year.

And the export of 218 tons of cashewnuts worth 8.2 million to the United States has been delayed as the cargo was not delivered in time to catch the American vessel, *Mormac Wave* Arrangements are in hand to have it shipped by another vessel later this month.

Seventeen African countries including Kenya have adopted a memorandum of understanding on the establishment of a continental housing development and finance institution. This follows a five-day conference in Arusha under the auspices of the Abidjan-based African Development Bank (ADB).

The proposed institution to be set up with a capital outlay of 320 million shillings will be called the company for habitat and housing in Africa "Shelter-Afrique".

Feasibility studies on the proposed company were undertaken in 1977 and 1979 by the ADB and the institution will handle housing loans for its 50 members.

Kenya has pledged 16 million shillings towards the company whose seat is yet to be determined. Others are the ADB, 80 million shillings, Commonwealth Development Corporation and the German Development Corporation (DEG), 24 million shillings.

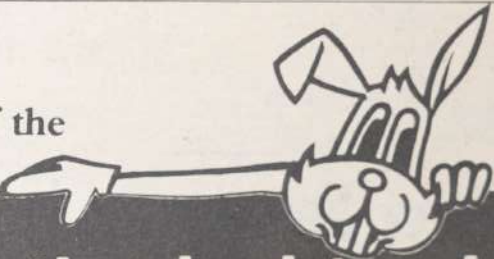

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KILINDINI PORT TONNAGES IN DECLINE

THE TOTAL dry general Cargo handled at the port of Mombasa in August 1981 was approximately 199,095 deadweight tonnes. This comprised of 146,141 tonnes of imports and 52,954 tonnes of exports.

The throughput for the month in review showed a decline when compared with the previous month of July. In July the performance was 23,745 tonnes higher — the tonnage for the month was 222,840 made of 154,293 tonnes of imports and 68,547 tonnes of exports. The month of August 1980 was also better than the corresponding month this year. This year's tonnages went down by 39,594 tonnes as compared to last year.

In August 1980 the port handled 238,689 deadweight tonnes of dry general cargo, composed of 181,137 tonnes of imports and 57,552 tonnes of export. In the month of August at least 73 general cargo ships called at Kilindini Harbour.

**Ships Warned
Of Threat From
Tanga 'Pirates'**

ONE OF the regular Dutch flag callers to use Mombasa for many years has been the 10,000 ton Nedlloyd Ebro on their service between East Africa and the North West Continent. Having outlived her usefulness to Nedlloyd she has now been sold to unnamed interests although probably for further trading as she is only 21 years old.

The recent incidents of piracy on board vessels whilst sailing between Singapore and Indonesia can be likened on a smaller scale to attacks on vessels whilst at anchor in Tanga. Frequently "thieves and cutthroats board vessels with the aid of grappling irons or by means of the hawsepipe, and proceed to steal whatever they can lay their hands on. Ships' agents in Mombasa have many tales from ship's personnel of their experiences in Tanga.

TANGA AUTHORITIES

Hiding places on container vessels or any ship having deck

could present no problems to would be boarders. It is hoped the Tanga authorities are taking urgent steps to curb this new menace facing mariners.

Such attacks are modern versions of piracy attacks which were regular features of the maritime scene several centuries ago.

The use of large tankers for oil storage is becoming increasingly popular and well illustrates the stockpiling by the large oil companies against another energy crisis.

At the present time some 130 tankers are at anchor as floating warehouses in various parts of the world representing 31 million deadweight tons of oil. Some of the tankers involved are comparatively new but at least using them for this purpose does bring in revenue to owners and brings a better 'return' than scrap value.

Felixstowe Port Services have sent a team of specialists to Mombasa to advise the Kenya Port Authority on further developments in the port in the present age of the containers.

Felixstowe, the U.K. terminal port for several liner services from Mombasa, here had close relations with the Kenya Ports Authority over the past few years and this latest visit is yet another example of co-operation between the two ports. The officials concerned are Mr Dick Bridges, Mr Ian Trelawny, Mr John Northfield, and Mr Nick Hallis.

ARRIVALS BUNCHING

Mombasa Port is presently experiencing full berths and in fact some vessels can expect a wait of between 2 and 4 days next week. This has been brought about by rain and a bunching of arrivals.

On September 16 the *Point Margo* is due with 33000 tons bulk maize and the day after another vessel with 25000 tons bulk wheat.

CHANGE NOW TO COAL ...

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The world has today 2231 years of coal and 271 years of oil production and developing countries including Kenya will continue to benefit from this abundant resources if the political climate remains stable, a senior oil executive Mr. N. Muriuki has said.

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BELGIUM CASH BOOST FOR LAKE VICTORIA SERVICES

MARINE Services along Tanzania water of Lake Victoria are to improve tremendously with a 317.8 million shillings aid package from Belgium.

The funds will be mainly used for the construction of a floating dock which will be built in Mwanza. The balance will be used for purchasing cargo vessels, oil tankers and tugs.

The air package also entails the improvement of the small ports of Nansio, Namirembe, Karumo and Shirati, purchase of equipment and the construction of a workshop.

At the moment, three major vessels, *M. V. Botiama*, *M. V. Victoria* and *M. V. Bukoba* ply along the three major ports of Musoma, Mwanza and Bukoba and on to port bell in Kampala whenever cargo warrants.

However, these vessels have problems docking at the small ports given the low level of water at the entry point.

All Marine Services along Lake Victoria, Lake Tanganyika and Lake Nyasa are run by the Tanzania Railways Corporation. However, vessels from Burundi and Zaire also ply along Lake Tanganyika and vessels at Lake Nyasa serve

Malawi ports.

The Brussels-based European Economic Community has requested the Tanzania Government to give it an up-to-date list of equipment it requires to improve facilities at Lake Victoria Ports. EEC has aided a project at Kigoma port along Lake Tanganyika and it is hoped that any aid will benefit the interests of Burundi, Zaire and Rwanda.

Dynamic Gulf State Developing Into The Exciting 'Eighties ...

Geographically Oman is located in the extreme south east corner of the Arabian Peninsula. It has a total area of 300,000 square Kms. of mountainous terrain punctuated by wadis and green valleys.

The climate varies from region to region with the exception of the higher locations where it is temperate all the year round. The rainfall is low and irregular, with exception of the southern region of Dhofar where heavy rains occur as a result of the monsoons.

The population is estimated to total about 1,500,000 people. The majority of the people are engaged in agriculture, commerce and fishing.

Under the forward looking leadership of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos bin Said, Oman has regained its place among the sovereign nations of the world and is busy building its future on its firm and unshakable Islamic foundation with the assistance of modern technology, while at the same time endeavouring to preserve its identity, its Islamic culture, and its Arab heritage. In doing

so, Oman like any other Sovereign Nation, is exercising its right to look back with pride of her great historic accomplishments and look forward for a better future within the framework of the International community and cooperation.

The cultural, historical and commercial history of the people of Oman dates back many centuries before Islam, a religion which our ancestors embraced with a conviction so remarkable that it left a soft spot in the heart of the Prophet (May peace and blessings be upon Him) Islam, a religion which came to enrich our ancient culture and to open new horizons for the people of Oman and to lay a foundation for a spiritual life based on holy tenets brought to us by our creator through his true messenger.

MESOPOTAMIA

It is now fairly well established fact that the Arab people of Oman settled in organised villages as long as the fourth millennium B.C., almost six thousand years ago; archaeological research has revealed that the early Omani

people had wider contacts through countries that were later known as Mesopotamia, the Upper Gulf, the Middle East, East Africa and many other parts of the world. Characteristically the people of Oman, even today are, in the majority of cases, as I have said are farmers, and many had embarked on adventurous sea voyages.

Discoveries have shown that the older Omani communities had achieved a considerable degree and sophistication in trade, commerce and industry to the highest level they could attain.

There is sufficient evidence for an example that the country used to be known as Magan, is the present Oman and that the people of Oman or Magan as it was used to be called, had engaged themselves in substantial trade with the historically renowned civilisations in the Gulf area, and the basin of Euphrates and Tigris in Iraq, and the Indus

Valley of India. Ships of Magan used to carry products of copper that were exchanged for silver, cooking oil, clothing and leather goods. Archaeologists from the University of Harvard in 1973 discovered that among the third millennium settlements of Oman or Magan, included the regions of Samad, Batin, Zahir and Ibra — on which there is evidence for the smelting of copper and other metals.

FRANKINCENSE

Coming to a much later date, one thing that is worth to note is the fact that the most important export of Oman by that time was frankincense, which was highly used as far as Rome, as a drug, an aromatic and as medicine. The Frankincense trade was of such importance that the Roman writer Pliny described the Omanis as the richest people in the world because of it. Export of Frankincense from the town of Sumhuram in the Southern Province of Dhofar in Oman was mentioned by the Greek writer Sumhuram as Mocha.

In another development, a Greek writer in his book known as the Periplus of the Erythraean Sea published in the first century A.D. reference is made to the town of Sumhuram, given another name of Moscha.

In her treatise on the same subject, a distinguished French archaeologist Dr. Pirenne writes "Moscha must therefore certainly be the Bay of Dhofar in Oman where Khor Rori is situated."

Taking the advantage of their position, the inhabitants of Oman were the great mediators and carriers of the Indian goods to the west, successfully monopolizing it and excluding all others from the Indian ocean, navigating their vessels between India and the Euphrates and enjoying a most lucrative trade. This commerce was of course, unknown before the civilisation of Babylon and Egypt had begun.

GOLD AND SILK

As Babylon, on the banks of the Euphrates advanced in civilisation and began to appreciate more and more of the products of India and Africa, it was Oman that had provided the lifeblood of this great civilisation in the back scene, and indeed Oman became the chief emporium of goods from the east and the west.

In 570 BC next to the Tyrian and Carthaginian Navies in the Mediterranean, the Omanis too possessed the most numerous and powerful fleet, trading between India to the Eastern Archipelago and from Africa to Arabia and from Arabia to the west. Items included spices, ivory, gold, silk, and

embroideries. Other items included ebony, sandal wood, liganum, cassia and cotton materials.

The Omani trade, started in the Arabian and Indian Ocean sea had been prevalent with the dawn of civilisation of mankind. Taught by the observation and how to guide themselves by stars. Omani merchant fleets boldly struck out for distant shores. The South West monsoon that blows seasonally in the corridors of the Indian Ocean had facilitated to an astonishing degree, the great voyages of the Omani merchant fleets over a distance of more than 2000 miles from Oman to Zanzibar along the East African Coast. The Maritime routes used by the Omani Arabs towards Africa were clearly defined by the Monsoon winds and that their southerly limits were known as Lorenzo Marques, a port of Mozambique, or Ras Mkumbu of Pemba Island, part of Zanzibar.

The Omani traveller Ibn Masoud about 915 in the 9th Century made his first voyage to Persia, India and China and back by the way of Eastern Africa waters. A recent Omani dhow 'Sohen' was commissioned by the Government of Oman to prove this to the world. The Dhow has left Sri Lanka and continues her travels towards Jakarta and later to China without the use of any of the modern technology.

Ibn Masoud gave vivid account of his historic voyages in his books "Muruj Abh-Dhahab" and "Ma'adin Al-Jawhar". Among the stories narrated in these books included how one prominent African King from Mozambique travelled in an Omani dhow to Muscat, and after accepting the religion of Islam made an extensive tour towards Basra, a pilgrimage to Mecca and went back home through Egypt, Sudan, Uganda, what is now Tanzania mainland and back to Mozambique.

At an early date, certainly not later than 1200 A.D., a Nabhani Prince from Oman travelled in large convoys of merchant dhows from Muscat and landed at Pate island, near Lamu, north of Mombasa, Kenya and in the long run established a stone built town. There are towns built by Omanis along the Kenya Coast and the most important historically, at this stage, is the historic town of Gede, near Malindi. The climax of this Omani cultural Renaissance and awakening led to the mushrooming of typical Omani towns from the areas north of Mogadishu, now capital of the Republic of Somalia, to Sofala, in the South. This led to the

commencement of the later date, Omani who made a penetrating influence in their teachings from schools where apart from religion other arts were taught. This included navigation, astronomy, farming, medicine and the like. It is so surprising even to this day to see Omani miniature towns along the whole entire coast of East Africa and the islands. Indeed it has not been the work of two or three years but generations. This was the dynamism of the Omani Empire builders, Omani leadership at home and abroad and indeed to some extent a product of the great Omani Omani ship builders, shipwrights and many other factors.

CHINA VOYAGE

The Arab Geographer Ibn (1100-1166 A.D.) had spent the major portion of his life at the Court of Roger the 2nd of Sicily where he compiled his great works on travels and geography in his books "Muruj Abh-Dhahab" and "Ma'adin Al-Jawhar". Ibn Khitraq Al-Faq described the Omani civilizing influence on religion and culture in the East Coast of Africa. He wrote: "Zanj of Eastern Africa has no ships to voyage, but vessels from Oman and Muscat by Omaniis." According to Omani records the first European to set eyes on the Gulf was probably Portuguese, the Cretan, one of Admiral's in 325 B.C. The famous of the Arabian Middle Ages visited the island of Taddella and Polo, in the 12th Century.

Before the 8th Century Omani Arabs were trading at Canton, China and a few trading posts and owners had settled at Java, Sumatra and other islands that now constitute the state of Indonesia. Omani Arabs had formed language and religion. East Arabic like Kawi was also introduced in Eastern and Central Asia. The intervening period between Muscat and China was taken to China in the

Oman, compared to many Arab lands in the Gulf and still has large areas of farm lands, water resources and that as I have said earlier 80 per cent of her people are farmers, the situation of which had given the country domestic food stability and security.

BIRTH OF ISLAM

The birth of Islam in the 7th Century too had given a greater impact on the Omani trade and commercial activities. Omani continuing eminence in the Maritime and commercial life of the Indian Ocean went a long way with the story of Ibadhism, Omani predominant Islamic religious sect, whose efforts are directed towards the creation of an ideal Islamic society in true conformity to the teachings of Prophet Mohammed (peace and blessings be upon him) without any dilute or deviations from his earlier Islamic strategies. This is indeed one of the threads that run through the Omani history.

During the greater years of the Arabian Gulf Golden Age, (750-1507 A.D.) Oman was at the forefront of all prosperity of the region. In the early

17th century, the situation slightly declined when the Gulf route was partly replaced by the Red Sea-Suez Isthmus Route as the leading East West seaborne corridor. Indeed from the second half of the 17th century of the middle of the 19th Century Oman and its chief port of Muscat, were numbered the most important localities of the east and of the Indian Ocean region. The situation was enforced as the regional most stable political power of no small repute, a commercial entrepot, and indeed a shipping centre.

The Portuguese were the first to challenge the Omani dominance of the Indian Ocean from 1487. In their search for an alternative route to India the Portuguese, through Bartholomew Diaz pioneered maps of the West African Coast and later with the bits of information from Omani Arab geographers Vasco da Gama managed to cross the cape of South Africa to Eastern Africa. The Portuguese met the challenges of the well established civilisation in Eastern Africa headed by the Omani people, but their intrusion into this area had also signalled the end of the Golden age enjoyed by the Omani merchant fleets. Despite of the strong resistance from the Omani Arabs at the East Coast of Africa Vasco da Gama cunningly fled to Malindi, north of Mombasa only to secure the services of a Rknown Omani Indian Ocean pilot Ahmed bin Majjid.

It was this Omani pilot who was also the author of the most distinguished log books written on the Indian Ocean between 1460-1496. The log books contained information on the current, stars, and the winds and many other aspects of the Indian Ocean.

VASCO DA GAMA

According to an Omani writer Al-Hanafi in his book 'Al-Baq' Al-Yamani' the Portuguese Vasco da Gama obtained the services of Ibn Majjid by deceit and the use of force, I quote "since the Commander of the ship invited him to board the ship at Malindi and took him hostage..."

The success of the Portuguese to reach India also signalled the beginning of a series of confrontations that led to the Portuguese conquest of most of the Omani long time built stations along the East African coast and later Muscat itself suffered the same consequences. But their days were numbered.

The arrival of the Portuguese marked the silver age in the Gulf as historically known. They launched devastating attacks on most of the strategically located commercial centres under Omani sphere of influence.

The Ya'Araba-ba Imamate dynasty of Oman led by Imam Seif bin Sultan the first initiated a general mobilisation of the Omani people towards the Portuguese strongholds. Imam Sultan Seif, the first,

locally known in history as the Lord of the earth, spearheaded the attack on Muscat and was won back in 1650. The expulsion of the Portuguese from Muscat was one of the events which accompanied the rise of power of Oman and was given considerable rise of power and by regional standards regained considerable maritime and commercial and even political power. The victory of Imam Seif the first against the Portuguese led to the African people of East Africa to a delegation to Imam Seif asking his assistance to rid themselves from the Portuguese at Mombasa. From 1661 to 1698 common strategy was worked out by the African people and Oman to rid the Portuguese from Mombasa stronghold at the fort locally known as Fort Jesus. After a siege of 2 3/4 years the last remnants of the Portuguese colonisation was removed from Mombasa after a great siege. At the point of his death in 1780 Imam Sultan Seif the first had restored Omani dominance on the Arabian Gulf and the Indian Ocean.

After the intervening leadership of other Omani leaders, the Al-Busaidi Dynasty later led by Seyyid Said Bin Sultan further consolidated the grip of the victories of Oman on her stations both in Oman and Eastern Africa and partly moved the capital to Zanzibar in 1832.

Oman had entered into many international treaties and one of them mentioned in history includes the Anglo Omani

Commercial and Political Treaty of the year 1798. During the 19th century other treaties were also with western powers.

In 1815 Britain's East Indian Company was formed and was followed by the Deutsch East Indian Company. France was one of the European countries that had been working together with Oman and in 1862, signed a joint Declaration with British respecting the independence of Oman. In 1894 France established a Vice Consulate in Muscat, and in 1883-1885 France subsidized the first steam service between France and the Gulf area.

There had been many great other developments up this stage of today, under the wise and dynamic leadership of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos bin Said, Oman, which had experienced a period of slumber and stagnation is now emerging in the new period of Renaissance and Awakening.

PROGRESS

And in conclusion, I would proudly quote the speech of His Majesty Sultan Qaboos to all his people of Oman and the world, I quote:

"Our aim on the domestic level is to build our country and to ensure for all the people, a life, filled with prosperity and dignity, and in accordance with our traditions, we extend the hand of cooperation for the sake of Oman and international progress, the peace and understanding of mankind as a whole."

Oman Chamber Assures Kenyan Businessmen Of Co-Operation And Full Support

THE PRESIDENT of the Oman Chamber of Commerce and Industry Sheikh Ahmed Mohammed bin Ameir al Hinai has assured Kenyan businessmen of continued support and cooperation since such a policy conforms to the wishes and policies adopted by H. M. Sultan Qaboos in the land of Oman and his government.

Speaking on the eve on inauguration of the Kenya-Arab Chamber of Commerce and Industry Sheikh Ahmed Al-Hinai pointed out that the new chamber ushers a new era of cooperation in trade between Oman and all Arab countries and this should be a challenge to all. 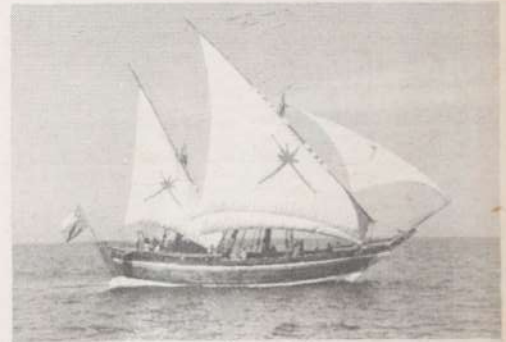

A light lunch will be available, free of charge, at the finish, entrants are asked to bring their own drinks.

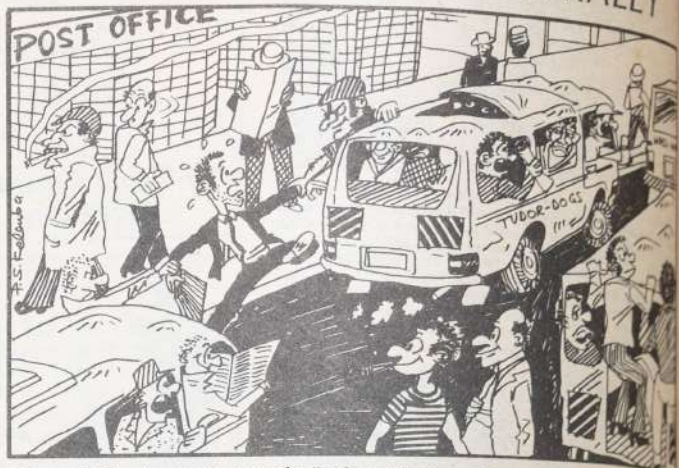

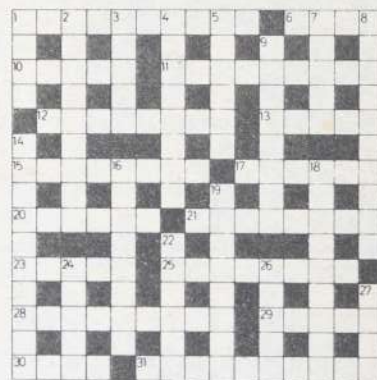
