KENYANS MARK MOI LEADERSHIP

KENYANS THIS WEEK mark with pride and appreciation the third anniversary of the Nyayo golden era under the wise and dynamic leadership of President Daniel Arap Moi. This period has been climaxed by President Moi's assumption of the Chairmanship of the Organisation for African Unity in July this year during the OAU summit conference held in Nairobi.

Three weeks ago President Moi addressed the 36th session of the UN General Assembly in New York where he condemned South Africa's apartheid policy and declared there should be no compromise with the racist regime in South Africa.

He also concluded very fruitful talks with US President Reagan who was full of praise for President Moi.

Addressing the Commonwealth executive session this week in Melbourne, Australia, President Moi reiterated his call for instant total sanctions against South Africa.

President Moi emerged as one of the most forceful Third World spokesmen in the Commonwealth summit.

On the homefront, the three years' period has seen President Moi at his busiest.

And in between his jet-set

Harambee meetings and state functions President has been able to visit many overseas countries in Europe, America, Far Asia and some African countries.

Since the early days when he assumed 'interim power' the President has enjoyed landslide support from his people. He has taken wide-ranging steps to stamp out corruption and smuggling, and promised his countrymen an equal share of the national cake.

And he has ruled with tact and candour.

Under his leadership, the will to 'Make Kenya Great' has been revived, releasing a new spirit of national and personal pride among Kenyans.

'Confusion Over Site Revaluation

THERE appears to be considerable confusion surrounding the new 'draft' Site Revaluation Roll covering the Mombasa Municipal area, with not many residents aware that the revised rates have already been approved at a full council meeting.

It is understood that the new Valuation Roll will remain in draft form until after a Valuation Court has finalised the matter.

In accordance with the provisions of section 9(2) Valuation for Letting Act, Chapter 266, Laws of Kenya, it was formerly laid before council at its meeting on September 1.

A valuation Court is being set up by council. Members serving on it have to be approved by the Minister for Local Government.

Meanwhile many members of the Nyali Residents Association have suggested that the revised valuation are exorbitantly high, especially in view of deteriorating services by the Municipal Council.

They are also aware of the fact that after eight years neither the Commissioner for Lands as the government agent, nor Ministry of Transport and Communications nor Mombasa Municipal Council have accepted responsibility for the maintenance of roads and other services within the two estates of Nyali and Kisauni.

Lorna Hayes Vice-chairman reports that a special meeting of the Nyali Residents Association took place early in the week, after obtaining legal advice to study the reactions of members to the 'Draft' Valuation Roll and notices received by residents in the Mombasa Municipal area.

Members have been asked to

complete the forms of objection to object either directly to the Town Clerk or through the Forms should be returned to the Town Clerk not later than October 9 in accordance with Gazette Notice 1737 September 11


They first won the cup in 1979, were runners-up in 1980, winning it for the second time this year.

SOYINKA PLAY

The next production at the Little Theatre Club will be another of Patrick Obath's increasingly popular African plays, this time a comedy by internationally-acclaimed Wole Soyinka, *The Lion and the Jewel*, to run for five performances from November 4 to 7.

On its production in London, *The Times Literary Supplement* theatre critic wrote: "In that richly ribald comedy, *The Lion and the Jewel*, poetry and prose are also blended, but with a marvellous lightness is the treatment of both.

The big set-piece of miming scene, where the villagers re-enact the visit of the white photographer, and the production of the village jewel by the Old Lion of a chief, are two of the pinnacles of Mr. Soyinka's achievement to date."

The *Times* was equally enthusiastic: "This is the third play by Wole Soyinka to appear in London since last year, and this work alone is enough to establish Nigeria as the most fertile new source of English-speaking drama since Synge's discovery of the Western Isles.

Event this comparison does Soyinka less than justice, for he is dealing not only with rich folk material, but with the impact of the modern on tribal customs: to find any parallel for

his work in English drama you have to go back to the Elizabethans."

As remarked above, one of the features of *The Lion and the Jewel* is set-piece miming, and it may be wondered why the writer quoted did not also include a hilarious similar sequence recalling how wily old Baroka, the 'Bale' (pronounced as in Swahili "Ba-lay") or chief of Ilujinle, a Yoruba village in Nigeria, bamboozles a visiting railway surveyor into abandoning the planned route through the village and leaving it in pristine peace.

There are only five strongly-cast speaking parts with a total cast of over 20 which Patrick is considering augmenting by a Coastal team of musicians and dancers.

The main theme, developed full of surprises, is Sidi's having her head turned by some glamorous poses taken by a visiting white photographer and published in an international 'glossy' magazine, her wooing by the local school-master Lakunle whose aims in modernising Ilujinle include abolishing the bride price system, and the guile of Baroka in winning her for himself by showing her how he will print his own postage stamps adorned by one of the of her magazine photographs.

Trading With Mozambique

TRADE MINISTERS from Tanzania and Mozambique are expected to sign a treaty in Maputo to set up the Ruvuma free trade area (Ruvuma). The arrangement stipulates that tariff barriers existing between the two countries shall be progressively removed and trade between the two countries would be competitive. Other states in the sub-region can join if they adhered to the terms of the agreement. And in the Southern Tanzania Lake Port of Kyela Ministers from Tanzania and Malawi are meeting to map out the new border of their countries.

• A new trading company, Biashara Consumer Services Ltd, is in the "offing" to run the proposed state-owned departmental stores.

The move is aimed at socialising retail trade in the country and the first departmental store would be opened early next year in Dar es-Salaam. Two others will be opened later in Arusha and Dodoma.

• Tanzania is to receive a total of 20,000 tons of cement from Mozambique worth 14 million shillings by the end of the year. Some 7,000 tons are due at the end of this month, and all of it will be distributed to the three southern regions of Lindi, Mtwara and Ruvuma.

• The first ever conference of African skin specialists will be held in Arusha this week. The Pan-African Congress on Dermatology will attract delegates from Africa, Europe and Asia.

• The restricted travel

travel advice (PIA) will be able to fly out of the country as the forms will first be sent to the appropriate authorities. The Bank's requirements require financial statements revealing the bank's assets before a formal application can be made to the bank.

MORE KENYA IMPORTS FOR TANZANIAN INDUSTRIES

IT SEEMS Kenyan Manufacturer are in for a long term benefit in certain trading with Tanzania thanks to the Tanzania Central Bank's "Penny wise pound foolish" policy.

For the second time Tanzania Industries will have to import accessories from Kenya to be

able to make the goods when there are could easily be made in a country.

A number of bottles in the country have been imported by the Central Bank import cork for use in Kenya to alleviate the shortage of aerated drinks.

Corks are normally made in Dar es Salaam but Tanzania Crown Cork instead of giving the import licence to purchase materials, the Central Bank opted to permit the plants to import the raw materials. It seems that the best "bet" is to buy costs and materials.

Last month, the Central Bank allowed the Dar es Salaam based Tanzania Crown Cork Company (TCC) to import packaging materials from Kenya instead of permitting other Tanzanian firms importing the raw materials making the materials.

In seems in both cases great loss in government revenue in the otherwise of the bottling plants remain closed until the materials arrived probably six months.

JAPANESE LOAN
Tanzania is to receive of 524.2 million shillings in form of three loans from the United States and Japan, for various development projects in the country.

The Japanese loan stems from President Nyerere's State visit to Japan last year in divided sections. Some 100 million shillings will be used for projects in the Northern region of Kilimanjaro. A million shillings will be used to purchase industrial materials and spare parts.

The first American loan of 151.7 million shillings is used for rural development projects in Kilimanjaro, Morogoro and Arusha regions. The next year, 100 million of 49.2 million shillings given earlier to some regions.

The second loan of 100 million shillings will be used for a long term water programme in Dar es Salaam.

Fifteen teachers and Mbogoni Fisheries and Bagamoyo district near Dar es Salaam have left for the training in part of a million shillings grant which is to cover the expansion for the Centre.

KENYA-AUSTRIA FLIGHTS

THE first ever charter flight direct from Vienna to Mombasa with first-class facilities will arrive in Kenya on Saturday, October 10, 1981.

Austrian Airtansport are opening this new DC 9/80 jet liner service following heavy demand in Austria.

The new service has proved to be a "big hit" with Austrian tourists, and the first 20 flights on a weekly schedule were practically sold out within two months after announcement in Vienna.

The aeroplane which is normally on medium range service will cover the distance Vienna-Mombasa in eight flying hours with one refill stop-over in Egypt.

The Kenya Posts and Telecommunications Corporation, in order to promote World Food Day 1981 and all that it stands for is issuing a set of 4 stamps. The stamps depict various aspects of agriculture in this country as follows: 50 cts — technical development in Agriculture, shs. 1/- — Mwea Rice Project, 2/- — Irrigation schemes, 5/- — Breeding of livestock.

Advance orders are being accepted now.

The stamps will be issued on 16th October, 1981.

However one mistake was that the photography in the dark was quite dull as some scenes seemed hazy. In all the film was actually smooth flowing and entirely coherent.


My point I would like to emphasise is that if Kenya could advance its film industry and could shoot such a kind of a film it would place Kenya very much ahead.

'MIS-LEADING AND IRRELEVANT PROPOGANDA AGAINST ISRAEL'

THE Advertisers announcement of the Socialist People's Libyan Arab Jamahiriya (COASTWEEK 18/9/81) refers.

It was most unfortunate to once again read the misleading and irrelevant propaganda clouded by a smokescreen in so far as the historical background of the Jewish State as well as that of the Arab world is concerned. To give a brief account of my statement the following facts are important:

- That at no one time was Palestine ever an exclusive Arab country. There never was an Arab state in Palestine, and there never was a separate Palestinian Arab nation, Palestinian nationalism is a post-World War 1 phenomenon.
- Subsequent to the above, Palestinian Arabs never created their own self-contained unit or any form of separate political or social identity. They were not autonomous at any time.

Although the area has its obscure historical background, the well documented biblical period must be taken into account and the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya's propaganda must be treated with the contempt it deserves.

Extreme Arab rhetoric invariably is wedged in myths rather than truths or facts. For their claim that Israel has not right to exist as a sovereign Jewish state is to ignore the obvious.

Israel as any other nation, has in fact a very impressive historic background and its beginning was validated by the ancient promise of the Bible.

The origins of the people there go back nearly 4,000 years and they are mistled over by the clouds of time.

Scholarly differences in terms of dates should therefore not be taken as 'criticisms' in falsifying the very origin of the Jewish State as we know for sure, from the time of the Promised Land, there has been unbroken period of stay by the Jews in their promised land.

The advertisers announcement by the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya should therefore not fool the free world by such falsified historical background.

Importantly, the Libyan Arab Jamahiriya should concern itself with how it could influence the attainment of peaceful co-existence in the Middle East instead of dwelling on who does and does not own Palestine.

"The initial foray into Malindi is to ensure that customers get a good after sales service."

The spokesman concluded: "No doubt sales will subsequently follow, but in the meantime Malindi is only being treated as a service depot and collection and delivery point."

LUXURY CRUISE LINERS LOOK TO THE FUTURE

A SHORT pre-trial shakedown voyage of the new 35000 ton West German luxury cruise liner *Europa* owned by Hapag Lloyd recently took place. Being built in Bremen she is expected to be completed in time for her maiden voyage in January 1982. She will replace the existing 21,000 ton 28 year old *Europa*, ex Swedish America liner *Kungsholm*, which has been sold to Italians.

The *Europa* has called at Mombasa whilst cruising on more than one occasion and we shall very much look forward to seeing her successor.

A new cruise liner is I understand also much in the minds of P & O who are considering placing an order for one in the range of 25,000/30,000 tons and a capacity of 1200/1500 passengers; replacement of the 20 year old *Canberra* cannot be many years away.

In the shipping world we are used to Ro-Ro (Roll on-Roll off) ships and Lo-Lo (Lift on Lift off) and even Lo-Lo (Lift on Lift off) which has been applied to a recent Ro-Ro ship converted into a cattle carrier for the trade between Ireland and the Mediterranean.

One of the more presently acquired units of the Mediterranean Shipping Company (MSC) is presently in port discharging 7800 tons cargo mainly transhipped from the SEAL Ro-Ro vessel *Noreford* in Malagasy which was originally to make a direct call at Mombasa until SEAL announced withdrawal of their service.

The MSC on carrier is the 10300 ton Russian built *Alexa II* ex Kuwaiti *Al Kadisiah*. It may be interesting to record that the *Vindafjord* which inaugurated the SEAL Ro-Ro service has now been renamed *Tarifa* and is operated jointly by a Swedish and a Norwegian Company as a result each of her twin funnels are painted differently in the respective operators' colours.

'ETERNAL SEA' CALLS

A caller for bunkers and water last weekend was the *Eternal Sea*, Greek owned, which was formerly the *Bamenda Palm* one of the fleet of the well known Palm Line who are so prominent in the West African trade.

Congestion and berthing delays over the past 10 days have built up in Kilindini at a faster rate than expected by Mombasa Shipping circles.

Last Saturday there were 15 ships waiting for alongside berths with no anchorages available in Kilindini, in fact on Monday morning four ships were waiting outside the port. It is sincerely hoped that the congestion will disappear as quickly as it arrived.

I am sure all concerned have heaved a sigh of relief that the American maize discharger *Point Margo* has finally sailed from Number 16 berth.

In her wake she has left a blanket of maize dust resembling a light fall of snow over everything in sight around 16/17 berth; containers are almost unidentifiable in the stacking area.

but could also create a further mess.

The Royal Australian Navy's guided missile destroyer *HMAS Hobart* was due to sail yesterday morning (Thursday) after her fortnight's stay in port.

Coincidentally the *Nedlloyd* vessel *Nedlloyd Hobart* has also been in port discharging/loading from and to the Far East which prompted Captain H. J. Adams, Commander of *HMAS Hobart*, to send greetings and a memento of the occasion to their namesake.

W.E.C. SERVICE

I have been asked to point out by WEC Line that their *Casilda Del Mar* is not expected to be handed over to her owners until next March so that she will continue to maintain her place will be taken by the *Maria Dolores Del Mar* due for completion in January and a sister ship to their existing *Hilde Del Mar* due next week.

The British Government have been surprised at the numbers of Russian ships calling at British ports. Investigations have revealed that some 250 Russian vessels visit more than 50 British ports each year with a weekly average of 30 calls compared with only about three British ships calling weekly at Russian ports!

This report, prepared in conjunction with the General Council of British Shipping, states that the gravest threat to world shipping is from Russian cargo liners.

Only a tenth of the cargoes carried by these vessels in the Russian fleet are Russian imports and exports whilst the rest are cargoes carried between other countries.

On our own doorstep rarely a day goes by when there is not one or even two Russian vessels of the Besta Line in port from Europe.

DOCKERS WARNED AGAINST 'CAUSING TROUBLE'

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — government will not consider any individual or group of persons trying to wreck the smooth operations of the Port of Mombasa for the acting P.C. John Etemesi declared.

And he has asked dockworkers to identify persons injecting political propaganda among workers so that they can be discouraged.

Addressing dockworkers at a certificate presentation ceremony for Adult Education graduates in Mombasa, Etemesi noted that the port was a lifeline to the economy and those of its neighbouring countries as such industrial area could not be considered the area.

Mr. Etemesi had also heard charges by the Mombasa dockworkers union secretary general Ismael Yunis that some individuals were introducing peace distracting talks among dockworkers to discredit the Union's leadership.

He alleged that by seeking group resolutions for disturbances at the port were led by a union secretary general if the dockworkers union and that they were now causing a Mombasa to carry out its tedious plans.

Mr. Yunis went on to pledge that his union would for the peace and increased productivity.

In his remarks the P.C. recollected that the dockworkers had been praised by President Kenyatta for the excellent job of offloading maize during the year and this year when they broke all records of cargo ever handled in the port.

Adding that the government was appreciative of their good job, he urged them not to allow a few elements to tarnish the good name and work exposing them to the authorities so that measures could be instituted against them.

He also emphasised that they must remain united for their employers and the Union officials to do the essentials work of the port could continue smoothly.

The outlook for the Company is generally encouraging with exports now accounting for over 70 per cent of our production. We continue to take a positive view on further investment and development of the Company.



 correspond with the new epoch which had dawned on the country and President Moi assured Kenyans that he will follow in the footsteps of Mzee Jomo Kenyatta in writing Harambee. He embarked on serious campaigns to cleanse the Kenyan society of its past evils. He took measures to stamp out corruption and smuggling, and moved to assess and reevaluate the role of parastatal bodies and the Civil Service, coupled with the launching of the fourth Development Plan, 1979-1983, with the theme "Alleviation of Poverty". Other policy measures included the introduction of Free Primary Education upto Standard Seven, the release of all political detainees, free milk tax for all primary school children and a ten per cent increase in wage employment in all sectors to mark fifteen years of Independence.




KENYA — INDIA: President Moi toasts Indian President Sanjiva Reddy during his Official State Visit.





'Recalling Acts Of
Honest Sacrifice'

MY Dear Brothers-in Islam,
We are now in the month of
Eid-UL-Haj. This month draws
our attention to the Islamic
History as far back as during
the life time of The Prophet
Ibrahim P.B.U.H. God says in
2:127 "And remember Ibrahim
and Ismail raised the
foundations of the House with
this prayer. Our Lord! Accept
this service from us. For thou
art the All-Hearing All-
knowing."

After the completion of the
building Ibrahim was given the
command as under:-

"And proclaim the pilgrimage
among men, they will come to
thee on foot and mounted on
every kind of camel, lean on
account of journeys through
deep and distant Mountain
highways."

All these are for our own
benefits provided for them, and
celebrate the name of God
through the days appointed..."
Out of these commands there
are benefits both for this
material life and our spiritual
life. Of the former kind are
those associated with social
intercourse which furthers
trade and increase knowledge.
Of the later kind are the
opportunities of realising some
of our spiritual yearnings in
sacred associations that go back
to the most ancient times. Of
both kinds may be considered
the opportunities which the
pilgrimage provides for
strengthening our international
Brotherhood.

The act of pilgrimage is done
yearly and May God accept and
give fruitful rewards to our
lucky Muslims who manage to
fulfil the fifth pillar of Islam.
And to those who are not yet
lucky, may God extend His
help over to them so that they
manage to go Amin.

Going back to Abraham again
we find that Abraham was
commanded to slaughter his son
Ismail as a sacrifice. This is as
per God's statement when he
stated that, "Then when the
son reached the age of serious
work with him, he said, "O my
son! I see in vision that I offer
thee in sacrifice. Now as thou
art commanded, thou wilt find
me if God so wills one
practising patience and
constancy!"


And we ransomed him with a
momentous sacrifice".
The word "Sacrifice" may be
understood both in a literal and
a figurative sense. In a literal
sense it implies that a fine sheep

or ram was substituted
symbolically. The figurative
sense is more important. It was
in deed a great and a
momentous occasion, when two
men, with concerted will,
"ranged themselves in the ranks
of those to whom self-sacrifice
in the service of God was the
supreme in life. But none
that the ransom i.e. the
commutation of sacrifice, was
made not by the men, but by
God. God wants our will and
devotion, not necessarily our
lives in physical sense. He
will find man if we offer
ourselves, to use us not for our
destruction, but for our further
advancement. In this sense said
Jesus, "He that loathes his life
for my sake shall find it".

This act of sacrifice is still in
practice to-date.
Every well-to-do Muslim is
required to give sacrifice of
domestic animal. This animal
is divine into three parts. The
first one is given to the poor
and the needy, the second one
is to be given to relatives, friends
and the neighbours and the last
one is for home consumption.
In the view of what is stated
hereinabove it is clearly seen
how a true Muslim should be
devoted to God without fear
or prejudice.
Consequently I call upon all
Kenya Muslims to follow these
foot-steps in order to promote a
good standard of living both
external and eternal.
Lastly I call upon all Eid
prayer Imams all over the
country to pray for our beloved
father of the Nation His
Excellency the President Daniel
Arap Moi's long life, continued
good health and peace,
prosperity and stability of our
Nation. These special prayers
should be made immediately
after the Eid sermons.



THE FESTIVAL OF MAKING SACRIFICIAL

THE festival of Idd-ul-Adhba falls on the tenth day of the 12th month of the Islamic calendar.

It means the "festival of making sacrifices", but another name for it is "Idd-ul-Hajj" or the festival of the pilgrimage.

It has a two-fold significance.

Firstly, it celebrates the completion of the Prophet's mission when the following verse was revealed:

"This day have I perfected for you your faith and completed my blessings upon you, and have chosen for you Islam as your religion".

The revelation occurred at Arafat near Mecca on the evening of the ninth day of the last month of the Islamic

calendar.

Because of the significance of the revelation the Prophet declared the following day an occasion for rejoicing — an Idd.

The second significance of the festival derives from the fact that it marks the fulfilment of a principal commandment of Islam — performance of the pilgrimage to Mecca.

The obligation to perform the pilgrimage is placed on all people with financial means to carry it out though many Muslims of meagre resources also undertake it.

At the appropriate time people from all corners of the globe make their way to Mecca — travelling by plane, ship, car,

buses, camels and horses and some even on foot.

Of the principal commandments of Islam, fasting during Ramadhan and the pilgrimage to Mecca necessarily require the believers to commence their performance together at the same time and to conclude them collectively at the same time.

Ramadhan begins for all people residing within a given area on the same date and ends on an identical date.

Similarly the Hajj begins for all pilgrims on an identical date and ends the same way.


On Idd day mosques overflow with people during the special prayers as happens during Idd-ul-Fitr.

Again everyone puts on their best clothes, parties and the greeting "Idd Mubarak" is heard everywhere.

Soon after the prayer or even before, Muslims slaughter goats for distribution to fortunate members of their community, their relations.

Unlike the "Fitr" festival, this sacrifice is not obligatory on all and is only meant for those who can afford it.

Despite this it is a find animals slaughter households on the day being distributed in the neighbourhood.





KENYA Girls have been praised by Mr. Philip Okundi Deputy Managing Director when he presented prizes to the winners of International letter writing competition organised Universally by the Postal Union in conjunction with the Kenya Post Telecommunications.

The main objectives of the competition was to encourage young people to develop their facility in composition and also to contribute to the strengthening of International Friendship.

The yearly competition was started in 1972 and Kenya participated for the first time in 1976. In Kenya the corporation organizes the competition in conjunction with the Ministry of Higher Education.

The Kenya entry forwarded to the Universal Postal Union in 1976 won the 3rd International prize.

The winner Miss Veronica Mangeli from Kenya High School was presented with a bronze medal by the Universal Postal Union.

In addition she obtained national prizes of cash and corporation book on the

History of East Africa and its stamps. Every year the corporation awards the winners of the competition with prizes.

In this year 1981, a total of 31 Secondary Schools participated in the competition and the winners came from Ouganda High School in Homa-Bay and Limuru Girls High School.

The three winners received the corporation prizes which include cash for purchase of books, album with Kenya Postage Stamps.

The school prizes include 2 books on the story of East Africa and Stamps.

CHICKEN AND PINEAPPLE SALAD

- 8 ounces tinned pineapple pieces drained
- 1 lettuce
- 1/2 head of Cos Lettuce
- 1 cup very finely diced celery
- salt, ground black pepper
- 3 tablespoons toasted silvered almonds
- 3 fresh peaches or a few drained peach-halves
- a small bunch of seedless grapes.

Dressing

- 1 teaspoon salt
- a dash of white pepper
- 2 tablespoons cider vinegar
- 3/4 orange juice
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1 teaspoon capers.

Wash the lettuce dry, and refrigerate so that it remains crisp. When ready to make up the salad, line a shallow salad bowl with the outside leaves of lettuce, break the rest of the leaves in small pieces with the fingers and place in the centre of the bowl with the finely chopped celery.

Add the chopped chicken, most of the pineapple (reserve some for garnishing), pour the dressing over the toss. Check the seasoning and if necessary add more dressing.

Sprinkle the salad with almonds peel and halve the peaches (if fresh) and place on top of the salad, hollow side up. Fill with the rest of the pineapple and the grapes. Serves four.

Dressing. Combine all the ingredients in a jar with a tight fitting lid, shake vigorously to combine well. Chill until ready to use. Shake well again before using.

FINGER-LICKING CHICKEN IDEAS

MARINATED PICNIC CHICKEN

- 2 pound tender chicken
- 1/4 pint olive oil
- 1 tablespoon tomato sauce
- a dash of Worcestershire sauce
- 1 clove of garlic crushed
- salt and black pepper
- 1 ounce flour
- 2 eggs beaten
- 3 ounce breadcrumbs.

Joint and skin the chicken. Make a marinade from the oil, sauces and garlic, season this, and steep the chicken pieces in it for at least 2 hours, if convenient this can even be left marinating overnight.

Drain the chicken pieces toss in flour then in the beaten eggs and finally in the breadcrumbs. Place in a roasting tin, cover with aluminium foil and cook for about 45 minutes on the centre shelf of a moderate oven. Remove foil for the last 10 minutes, allowing the joints to brown.

Leave to cool then pack in foil ready for the picnic. Serves six.

COLD STUFFED CHICKEN

- 3 pound boiling fowl
- 1 veal knuckle
- 1 calf's foot
- water and 1 bay-leaf
- a sprig of parsley
- 5 peppercorns
- salt
- 1 bottle good white wine

- 14 ounce pate de foie gras
- 3/4 cup Madeira.

Place the chicken in a deep pot with the knuckle and calf's-foot. Cover with cold water, add bay-leaf parsley, peppercorns, salt to taste and the white wine. (Aim for equal quantities of water and wine in order to cover the chicken)

Bring to the boil and simmer

gently until tender. When ready allow to cool in the pot and then stuff the joints with the pate de foie gras which has been blended with the Madeira and seasoned to taste. Skin the chicken and place it in a casserole from which the stock is strained. Strain the stock through muslin over the bird and leave until set. Serves six to eight.

The above dish is always a picnic or luncheon on a summer day. Serve with boiled potatoes, carrots and larger ones with a mixture of parsley and chives.



It's All Happening At The New ARCH DISCO Bamburi

The Arch Disco which opened recently at Whitesands Hotel is the latest addition to modern disco vestibles along North Coast. Situated where the old disco stood, the Arch opens up one side to the new enlarged terrace which itself is a pool terrace to the sea front. The other side of the disco has an area which is landscaped with exotic plants and concealed soft lighting. The two enormous mirrors on the dance floor add to the feeling of freedom and space. Initially opening two days a week, Wednesdays and Saturdays, it is planned that within two months the Disco will open four nights a week. Equipped with the sophisticated lighting and sound systems, the discotheque has been designed by Mr. Zbigniew Trzebinski. The special features of the disco are the special light effects which include helicopter lights, strobe lights, mirror balls, bubble and smoke machine.

At the centre of action is Mombasa's famous D. J. Murad whose disco career include a stint at Hole in the Wall at Shauri Moyo Beach Hotel.

Incorporated into the Arch is a new coffee shop complex due to open shortly. Featuring a stainless steel open range, the menu will include baked potatoes with various toppings, home-made beef hamburgers, and a wide selection of prawns and lobster dishes.

Diners can sit inside overlooking the pool or on the large covered terrace which is open to the gardens and the sea.

It is also envisaged that local residents will make use of the coffee shop which will open for lunch and dinner.

Other new features of Whitesands entertainment programme include the very popular Safari Band every Fridays, Crab on Thursdays and on Saturdays a jazz session with the Whitesands Jazz Band and a prawn and lobsters bar-be-que

on the beach. Sunday lunch consists of curry buffet, featuring curries and vegetarian dishes which have been the trade of Whitesands for many years. Every Monday is African Night, featuring African dishes served from traditional pots with entertainment by a local dance troupe. Friday is Pasta Night.

Further upgrading of the hotel includes 130 modernised bathrooms a dining room extension which will also be used for private dinners and meetings and re-planting of all lawns around the hotel.

Watersports include a wind surfing school, glass bottom reef boat and creek safaris, deep sea fishing and stuba diving at the adjacent Barakunda Dive School.

Zuerst machten sie kleinere Ausflüge auf der

Calao nach England und verbrachten die meisten Wochenenden auf See, wobei auch die Kinder seefest wurden. Ihr Wunsch, andere Teile der Welt kennenzulernen, wurde immer stärker, doch beschlossen sie zu warten, bis die Kinder etwas größer waren.





WIND-SURFING ON THE MALINDI BAY

THE first Windsurfing Centre in Malindi Bay has opened at the Blue Marlin Hotel.

ROB Collinge and John Lyall brought their Fiat 131 home to the narrowest of victories in the Coast 600 Rally on Sunday morning. A single point separated them from the Datsun Turbo entered by Hellier and Hope, while third position went to Mike Kirkland and Anton Levitan in another Datsun.

This year's rally was divided into two legs with the slightly shorter first leg being used for the Standard Production Car Championship event.

With the start at Taita Hills Lodge, the cars were put into the Taita Hills, first the climb from Bura to Mganga, then the long plunge to Dembwa. Altitude was regained on the tarmac which includes several cautioned bends in the notes, at Wundanyi a short loop around the hill before a decidedly hairy descent on the north face of the hills.

This section has already been written in to the 1982 Marlboro Safari route and crews looked quite thoughtful at the next control. Back on the plains, the cars skirted the foot of the Taitas, through some interesting washways one of which marked the end of Zasada's 1979 attempt at the Safari.

The first opportunity to service came on the tarmac near Voi, before disappearing around the Sagalla Hills. A long high speed sprint across the ranch lands to the base of Kasigau mountain, was followed by more bush craft to reach Rukinga Ranch where the leaders enjoyed a 2 1/2 hour rest.

The second leg began with a long service section on tarmac as far as Samburu, where the route turned south to Kinango, not quite as cleanable as usual due to rutted patches churned up in the rains a month ago.

A narrow sandy winding track took the cars into the Shimba Hills, joining the Kwale-Kinango Road by way of a well hidden elephant track.

A very fast road back towards Mwaché River and Mazeras allowed some high speed dicing, followed by tarmac as far as Rabai. The final loop northwards included Mariakani, the rocky road to Bamba and the 25 kilometre

long sand trap back to Gotani.

A chance to be serviced could be used at Kaloleni before a loop through Chonyi, including several high speed ski jumps and the traditional sprint down the Ribe-Kisauini hill before the finish at Nyali Beach Hotel.

Several crews had their share of problems before the start. Jayant Shah's Datsun PA10 didn't get as far as Taita Hills

had thrown away a vital 34 points by booking in early at the end of the Voi service station.

Collinge was first away from the Ranch in the Second Leg, and like his main challengers cleaned the two sections as far as Kinango.

The next hurdle was the narrow track in deep sand on the way to Sirira below Kwale, complicated by thick mist that mingled with the dust stirred up by the cars.

Collinge lead over Hellier, 6 minutes at Sirira, tumbled to 2 at Mazeras, allowing the Turbo to snatch the much coveted lead on the road. The service area at Rabai caught the Kirkland/Levitan crew out when they booked in three minutes early, costing them a disastrous 14 points.

The pressure stayed on all the way to Bamba and back, all the leading cars gave up service at Kaloleni, saving valuable seconds. Hellier sliced one more minute off Collinge's slender lead on the Nguu Tatu hill.

Seventeen cars qualified as finishers, and all crews were happy with a hard fought event after highly competitive sections.
