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## MUSLIM LEADERS IN G. TALKS

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — Views of the Muslim Community over the controversial law of succession has been adequately expressed up by the government. It has appointed three Muslim personalities to hold consultations with the Attorney General with a view to reaching a compromise. A review of this... critics of the law have been asked to refrain from debating the issue in public by the Deputy Governor of the Central Bank of Kenya, Ahmed Abdalla, until a decision has been reached. ## RESTRICTIONS ARE HURTING TOUR TRADE

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Tourism Industry in Kenya and particularly along the coast faces a grim future if certain restrictions currently in force are not relaxed. The ban on the importation of motor vehicles, spare parts, air conditioners and other items was one of the things causing pressing problems to tour operators.

This view was expressed by three officials Messrs John Arkle of the United Touring Company, Sean Gavaughan, the general manager of Bamburi Beach Hotel and Mrs Lorna Hayes chairman of the Mombasa Coast and Tourist Association (MCTA).

The officials who were briefing a Kenya News Agency reporter after a seminar held at Nyali Beach Hotel claimed that about four coast tour and hotel operators were likely to lose Shs. 15 million each in the next high season, this figure excludes the revenue that the country will have earned due to bars, restaurants, shopping and other luxuries.

They expressed concern that if at least some of the restrictions were not cut down, Kenya would lose a lot of tourist which they are prepared and able to accommodate, this may make tourist initially destined to Kenya to go to other countries in Africa, they claimed.

The officials further complained that although there was a need to build more hotels of international standard which cater for the tourists the move would be self-defeating.

The three officials said although they had also invited officials of the Ministry of Tourism in Mombasa, they did not show up.

## LOSS OF 5,000 POTENTIAL HIGH SEASON TOURISTS' GERMAN CHARTER PLANS COLLAPSE

MEMBERS of the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association have expressed concern over the government policy on air charters direct from Europe to Mombasa.

It was noted that four main charter companies operating in Mombasa had not as yet been licensed to continue flying here after October 31 as the Civil Aviation Board's meeting due to have taken place on September 18 had been postponed indefinitely.

The discussions took place at a meeting presided over by Chairman, Miss Lorna Hayes, as the most successful and well attended seminar at Nyali Beach Hotel and among those present were Kenya Airways representatives from Nairobi, Mombasa and Malindi, also two officials from the Ministry of Transport and Communication.

Although invited, no one from the Ministry of Tourism's headquarters in Nairobi turned up, this being described as 'most unfortunate'.

Members hoped that a national seminar which the Minister of Tourism had promised to organise, might take place soon as there are many urgent matters to discuss.

Addressing a press conference following the day-long seminar at Mombasa, Mrs. Hayes said that members had advised that a reply to an application by LTU of Germany to operate a second charter to Mombasa for Neckerman from November 1 had been delayed so long by the CAB that in the end they had no option but to cancel it.

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This had resulted in loss of 5,000 potential tourists during the high season representing 30,000 bed nights and a loss of business of about Shs. 20 million for one hotel alone, to say nothing of the foreign exchange these tourists would have brought into Kenya to spend on safaris, shopping and drinks.

It represented a great loss in particular to small African traders, suppliers and farmers who were looking forward to increasing business to meet soaring costs.

In addition, there were three new hotels on the south coast offering an extra 1,000 beds, as well as representing a considerable financial investment, all looking for more tourists to fill their beds.

The meeting also heard that Balair had applied to operate a second flight to Kenya from November 1. For one hotel alone this represents an occupancy of 800 beds during the high season.

Three other charter companies are still awaiting licenses. Members were advised that according to its winter schedule Kenya Airways would be introducing its first non-stop flight London/Mombasa from November 1 — arriving Mombasa Monday mornings.

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**KENYA DELAYS**  
 Regarding the licensing of charter aircraft it was pointed out that tour operators need a minimum of 15 months notice to publicise, promote and fill these aircraft.

Huge sums of money are involved, and there are many other countries of the world in which they can operate and be received with open arms without such delays as being experienced in Kenya.

The meeting decided to suggest to CAB that it announces meeting dates for a full year so that charter companies can apply well in advance.

Members felt that Kenya cannot afford to be selective about tourists. Charters bring in a mixed clientele, and that the only cheap holidaymakers are the hitch-hikers.

**MORE PLANES**  
 It was noted that many take a package holiday by charter so they will have more spending money here.

With inflation taking its toll many were cutting back on spending a lot on holidays and going to cheaper destinations.

While everyone agreed to support Kenya Airways to the hilt, it was felt that Kenya Airways must prove that it can handle all the traffic wishing to come to Kenya.

Many considered that, at the moment, they have insufficient aircraft to cope, but expressed the hope that this would be put right soon.

Members are again appealing to the Ministry of Tourism to look into the serious situation concerning spare parts for essential equipment used in hotels and by the tourist industry.

The spares situation was described as 'critical' covering not only cars but marine engines, water pumps, hotel and kitchen equipment, also air-conditioners.

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## NORWEGIAN AID TO SHIMONI FISHERMEN

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — The Nordic Government is determined to do everything possible to assist fishermen in the coast province with the prevalent high potential of the fishing industry in the area.

It was expressed by the Nordic officer of cooperative fisheries on the Coast Province Mr Arne Steffensen when he presented as a brand new vehicle Suzuki K1M 649 (4 wheel drive) to the south coast fisherman's cooperative union officials at the provincial headquarters. Mr Steffensen said his government had spent Shs. 90,000 for the purchase of the vehicle adding that there was more Mr Steffensen promised that in June 1983 the Nordic Government would provide another Shs. 500,000 for the construction of the union and her office equipment.

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Liver of all kinds may be used for endless variations of pate which I will not dwell upon today as terrines and pates demand and are worthy of, far more attention than a recipe in passing, and could almost fill a book in themselves.

But fried or casserole liver can be prepared with great success. Pigs liver is not as good as lambs or calves liver - I would advise anyone to ignore ox-liver unless partial to chewing on miles of rubber tubing.

I suppose that one could stew it into submission but it seems to me to appear so unattractive in itself to begin with that it is difficult to imagine its ability to appease.

Calves liver is fit to put before any gourmet however, is easily prepared and has a flavour and delicacy that melts in the mouth. Remember that it is over-cooking which makes liver tough and that for maximum tenderness it should be still slightly pinkish after cooking.

**LIVER IN THE VENETIAN MANNER**

Fried liver and onions is well known English combination. Jocasta Innes, author of the Paupers Cook Book (Published in paper-back by Penguin) believes it to be one of the nicest ways of preparing liver that there is; I think that is arguable if one has tasted the

**The Delicacies Of Venetian Calf Liver**

Italian method of frying it quickly in oil and butter enhanced by the aroma of freshly gathered sage leaves but without doubt the manner of preparing onions is as simple as it is delicious and in any case it is worth knowing of whether one adds liver or not.

One of the endless joys of cooking is that one is always learning something new; it does not have a chance to become a dull subject providing one is willing to continue to experiment. Until quite recently I had never prepared onions using a lid and this manner produces surprisingly crisp results.

- 1/4 pound lambs or calves liver (enough for 2 portions)
  - 1/2 pound onions sliced very finely
  - salt, freshly ground black pepper and oil
- Having sliced your onions finely, pour a thin layer of oil into a heavy frying pan. If you do not have a sufficiently

heavy one, use an asbestos mat under a lighter frying pan.

Put in the onions and cook them gently but covered for 30-40 minutes with a little salt and pepper. Meanwhile with a very sharp knife, shave the thinnest possible slices off the liver. If it is calves or lambs liver it will only need 2-3 minutes cooking with the onions.

Sautee these just before serving. It can be served just as it is straight from the pan or with plain boiled rice. It is particularly warming in the colder weather.

**FEGATO DI VITELLO ALLA SALVIA**

(SAUTED CALVES LIVER WITH FRESH SAGE)  
This is a ridiculously simple dish - so simple that one is slightly baffled as to why it is not seen on tables in private homes more often.

Slice the required quantity of calves liver thinly.

Dredge in plain flour and quickly sautee in a mixture of oil and butter together with 8 fresh sage leaves preferably torn from the plant just before frying. Season with freshly ground black pepper and sea salt and transfer to a warmed serving dish. If desired the frying Season with freshly ground lack pepper and sea salt and transfer to a warmed serving dish. If desired the frying pan may be deglazed with a little stock and the resulting gravy poured round the liver.

**CALVES LIVER FOUR SEASONS.**

I used this recipe a few weeks ago in a column devoted to avocado pears; nevertheless, it is I think worthy of inclusion again while on the subject of liver and readers may be interested to know of the recipe's origins.

It comes from the New York restaurant The Four Seasons restaurant opened in Seagram Building in 1959 where many of the dishes are refreshingly different, and some utterly original. In keeping with its name, the menu is changed four times a year.

It has a reputation for costly food but the ingredients are so inexpensive in Kenya by comparison one can enjoy the privilege in the knowledge that one may be devouring a costly speciality for next to nothing.

- 1 1/2 lb calf or lamb liver
- 6 tablespoons butter
- 2 avocado pears
- 1/4 pint chicken stock
- 3 tablespoons white wine
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice

The restaurant is based as a self-service system with a choice of 15 dishes at any one sitting.

For a fixed charge 50/- for

1 tablespoon finely chopped chives

1 teaspoon chopped

Slice the liver finely to 12 slices. Quickly brown liver on both sides in hot butter. Set aside on a serving dish. Keep warm. Remove the oil from pan, skin carefully with a sharp knife and cut into slices. Fry lightly in hot oil for one minute per side.

Place on dish with warm butter, wine lemon juice, chives and parsley. Bring the boil. Pour this sauce over the liver and avocado. Serve immediately. Serves 4.

**CALVES OR LAMB LIVER WITH VINEGAR.**

This is a Lebanese recipe using vinegar rather than wine which is of course taboo for Muslims. The Lebanese use lamb or clarified butter; give a cup but butter will do in a pinch. Drain the liver well in absorbent paper before cooking.

- 1 1/2 lb calves or lamb liver
  - salt and freshly ground black pepper
  - 2 tablespoons butter
  - 1 large onion chopped
  - 2-3 cloves garlic crushed
  - 1 tablespoon crushed nut
  - 1 teaspoon plain flour
  - 1/4 pint wine vinegar
- Sprinkle the liver with salt and pepper. Brown it well on both sides in butter in a hot pan. Set aside.

Fry the onions gently in the same pan. When golden add soft acid crushed garlic and flour, blend well with butter or ghee.

Add the vinegar and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil slowly, then add the fried liver and a little water if necessary to cover. Simmer gently until the liver is cooked not overdone - about 5 minutes.

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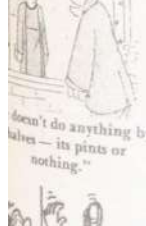
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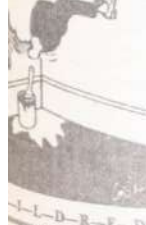

## AN INTERVIEW WITH THE PROVOST BIG BOOST FOR THE MEMORIAL CATHEDRAL

THE Mombasa Memorial Cathedral — the Mother Church of the Diocese of Mombasa — the foundation stone which was laid in 1903 — finds that it is now too small, and there is an urgent need to expand, writes *Neta Peal*.

Such is the popularity of the Sunday morning service in Swahili that there are not enough seats for all, and many have to stand, overspilling outside its front doors.

The Cathedral, the first in Kenya, was built during the time of the Rt. Rev William George Peel, the first Bishop of Mombasa from 1899 to 1916, while the first Bishop for Eastern Equatorial Africa was the Rt. Rev James Hannington (1884-1885) who, a year later was killed in Busoga, Uganda.

In those early days the Cathedral was supported by the Church Missionary Society. Today, it is the local people who are entirely responsible for its upkeep.

It is very costly to maintain for most of the original building materials, like marble, were imported. Not less than Shs 25,000 a year is needed for the cathedral's upkeep, and church collections do not raise sufficient revenue. So, annually, a big fund-raising event takes place in the form of a 'Bring and Buy' sale.

This took place recently and helped raise Shs. 44,500 which is much more than last year.

It was officially opened by Mr. D. C. Mlamba, chairman of Kenya Posts and Telecommunications who told a large audience that it was David kayanda, one of the church elders who had invited him, on behalf of the church to officiate at the opening.

Said, Mr. Mlamba 'David was tragically killed in a road accident and I could not let you down because of his death'. He told church leaders not to hesitate to call him again when they hold an harambee for further support of their church.

Apart from a wide variety of Bring and Buy items, the cathedral also received stacks of fruits and vegetables for auctioning while hundreds of chapatis were made by members of the Mother's Union and Women's Fellowship, and being ate as fast as they were made.

The Cathedral is very pleased that more money was raised this year as recently thieves paid it a visit stealing loud speakers, amplifiers and microphones, also a church clock, to the total value of about Shs. 8,000.

### THEFT PROBLEM

As a result, and for the first time in its 78 years, the Cathedral is being fitted with protective steel bars at all its many windows.

It appears that with the shortage of electrical spares in the country, due to a clamp down on importations generally such items have become a lucrative 'black market' for thieves whom, it seems do not

fear breaking into God's house.

The Cathedral is also having problems with its stone walls which are badly cracked and all pees are in urgent need of varnishing.

In an interview, the Provost of Mombasa Cathedral, the Rev. Dr. Jefferson Mwakima, said there was a need for a community centre where all church groups could meet and plan for the future, as well as wedding receptions. These go together, usually held when the school is vacant for accommodation is cramped.

The Provost said he was planning to start an adult education class to give more help to the community.

While the cathedral is predominantly African, Anglican Church members of all races and creeds are welcome.

The Mothers' Union, which is part of the Anglican Church, runs a very successful programme of the cathedral grounds, which caters for over 100 children all creeds from 15 to 18 years. Parents pay a nominal fee of shs. 55 a month, of which 15 is for the milk they give.

There is also a night school for boys and girls, upwards who are given the bible together with drama workshops, outings and visit hospital, chat to those who are lonely. They have a choir which is part of the cathedral choir.

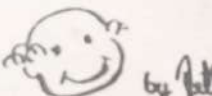
There is also a Brigade for boys and girls 8-14 years.

Mrs. Rose Mwakima, the Provost's wife, said the Women's Fellowship, the Mothers' Union, the church people, also members of the homes, also members of the help. The church meets once a week in classes and discussion.

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# H.H. AGA KHAN VISITING CHINA

THE Aga Khan, leader of 15,000,000 Ismaili Muslims, has opened an international conference in Peking to explore ways of improving the physical environment of rural peoples throughout the developing world.

It is the first conference of its kind ever to be held in China.

Officials of the Peoples Republic including Vice Premier Gu Mu, intellectuals and planners from 25 developing nations, and members of the diplomatic corps and the United Nations attended the opening session.

Noting that the North-South dialogue for a new

economic order for the poor countries will resume in Cancun, Mexico later this week, the Aga Khan called on the south to step up its efforts for self-help.

"Money by itself will not solve our problems," he told the conference.

"The nations of the south must identify their own priorities — of which the imbalance between urban and rural development is surely the foremost — and establish the human and professional infrastructure which alone can make outside financial assistance or indeed local resources both meaningful and productive.

The Peking symposium, entitled "the changing rural habitat" will discuss problems involving the rural poor that threaten to overwhelm the primarily landed nations of Asia, Africa and Latin America.

The Aga Khan pointed out that in western industrialised society, the rural poor tend to flock to the cities. In the developing countries, however, where many cities are already almost at the point of collapse.

"Ways have to be found to provide attractive alternatives to migration... to make the countryside itself a more desirable place to live in..."

The conference is being sponsored by the Aga Khan Award for Architecture.

It will, however, explore not only various solutions for building and housing design, but proposals to meet environmental, physical and regional requirements in different rural areas.

Mrs. Han Guang, Director of China's State Capital Construction Commission, spoke of the Government's urgent desire to "strengthen rural development, to gradually reduce the discrepancy between town and country and to continuously improve housing conditions and living environment in rural areas..."

Mr. Yang Tingbao, President of the Architectural Society of China, an official government group which is participating in the conference, said China is already providing millions of housing units for villagers but is vitally concerned about "how to plan the rural residential area with rational distribution and in proportional scale, how to use the building materials and energy in rural development, and how to modernise traditions."

To suggest possible answers to those and other problems, the members of the seminar will present case studies conducted by the Aga Khan Award in other developing countries and technical papers of the award's researches.

# DATELINE: DAR ES SALAAM

## Border Police In Joint Action To Halt Stock Theft

KENYA POLICE have returned to Tanzania a total of 176 head of cattle and six out of the seven goats stolen in two separate incidents in northern Tanzania.

Some 116 head of cattle which were stolen from Rombo District were returned two days later and 60 cattle and six goats were returned a day later to the owner in Moshi District. Both districts are in Kilimanjaro region (Province).

A group of 22 American tour operators have advised the Tanzania Tourist Corporation (T.T.C.) to ensure that roads leading national parks are in good condition.

The operators who scaled a number of national parks in the northern circuit complained about the dilapidated conditions of some of the roads leading to the parks and added that if T.T.C. is really serious about enhancing the tourist industry then the roads must be repaired.

T.T.C. officials agreed with the visitors and informed them that the poor condition of the roads had reduced the average on the road lives of the Kombis from five years to two years. The country's parks are run by the Tanzania National Parks (Tanapa).

And the Lion Club at Dar es Salaam (city) distributes food, medicines and treatment worth Shs. 10,000 to disabled in Dar es Salaam part of World Service.

The project included 14 bridges, pillars, ten million caterpillars, six million caterpillars, and a loader caterpillars.

Dar es Salaam will be linked to Songea near the Mozambique border by an all weather road.

tourism is the second largest earner of foreign exchange — which the country badly needs, there is no special concession enabling vehicles to be imported for tourist use.

No new cars can be imported nor spares for those already here.

Tremendous corrosion takes place at the coast and it was much better, and cheaper, to be able to repair items than to replace them these days.

The association will be asking government to re-instate a previous concession of allowing items of up to Shs 4,000 to be imported without a license, as this would be of enormous help.

It was generally felt that not everyone in Government was sufficiently orientated as to the benefits being derived by Kenya from the tourist industry.

To help Kenya Airways, tour operators are to be asked to co-operate in discovering the culprits who book aircraft seats and then do not use them.

KA reports it is experiencing a very high percentage of 'no shows' on their DC9 without any prior cancellation. This had led to KA having to deliberately overbook aircraft to ensure seats are taken.

Monthly lists from KA and tour operators should reveal the source of 'OK' tickets being honoured.

The meeting recommended the introduction of a Salisbury/Mombasa/Nairobi flight next year, also from Dubai.

Members learned that Kenya Airways is opening a Passenger Service Department to deal with letters of complaint.

Members felt that foreign currency declaration forms in three languages, and not just English, should be available on all KA international flights.

It was hoped that Malindi airstrip will be extended to receive DC9's and improvement made to the terminal building and facilities as, at the moment, it was learned it is difficult to handle more than 60 passengers at a time.

### 'VISAS AVAILABLE'

Dutch Visas are now available at international airports in Kenya for those arriving with a letter from the Principal of Immigration Officer given to them by the travel agent when booking their Kenya holiday.

Members pointed out that the press overseas were running critical articles about the future of Kenya's tourism and that the travel trade in Europe was becoming increasingly concerned over various statements ascribed to the Ministry of Tourism over alleged currency scandals.

Prices in Kenya were already considered 'high' and the uncertainty over the future of charters — enabling tourists to enjoy package holidays at a very reasonable cost — was not helping in the promotion of Kenya's tourist industry at a time when there is a shortage of money and many are spending less on holidays and going to cheaper destinations in the world.

Members asked again 'can Kenya really afford to be selective about tourists in such a situation?'

## TANA FARM SEMINAR

comprise Strathdirk, Strathdevon, Strathdoon and Strathduns. They have all called at Mombasa at varying times, mainly on the P&O USA trade although the Dirk was only in Mombasa the other week ex U.K.

Recently the other three have been on the India/U.K. trade however that is now being containerised resulting in the presenting reported sale.

Singapore has overtaken Yokohama as the second busiest port in the world. Rotterdam (recently twinned with Mombasa) still holds the number one place. Placings are based on the annual amount of shipping calling expressed in gross registered tons.

Whilst the traditional Shipping lines serving Mombasa for many decades continue to sell off old or obsolete tonnage so they continue their fleet replacement programme.

Nedlloyd has just ordered two new container vessels from a Korean shipyard. To be delivered during the second half of 1983 they are destined for the Europe/Mid East trade.

Capacity will be 1800 TEUs (20ft containers), a speed of 19 knots, highly automated with a minimum of crew.

The well known Svedel Line — an amalgam of Swedish French shipowners — whose more prominent operating partner is Soc. Navale Chargeurs Delmar Vieljeux of Paris and whose motive is borne by the Svedel Ships, is shortly to place an order with a French shipyard for four container ships of 1400 TEU capacity to be delivered in 1984 for their African service.

Vieljeux also serves West Africa.

As expected and provided rain does not interfere too much with port working, Kilindini is rapidly recovering from its spell of berthing delays. Ships waiting numbered eight only last weekend with waiting time reduced to 2-3 days this week.

Now discharging at Number 16 is another vessel with a full cargo of 22500 tons of bulk wheat. She is the six year old bulk carrier Amazonas flying

## HELLENIC LINE MAY BE MAKING CHANGES TO THEIR SERVICE

HELLENIC LINE may be making some changes in their African service. Their present outsider (non conference) service from the Continent to South and East Africa may shortly be withdrawn. If this proves to be the case, the reason may be that Hellenic have been admitted as members of the Mediterranean/South Africa Conference and is currently negotiating with the Conference in London.

Evidently a sort of quid pro quo. As so often happens when one Shipping line withdraws from a trade another takes its place.

In this it is reported that a new Greek service is to start operations called the Inter Africa Lines from the Continent and London for South African ports and Mombasa.

The first ship is the Alexander's Power of 9800 d.w.tons, a conventional carrier she has already started loading.

The last of the famous Clan Line fleet has been disposed of with the announcement that the 880 gross ton 19 year old Clan MacGillivray has been sold for further trading to Far East buyers who have paid \$1.6 million for her.

As the British flag fleet continues on its course of a seemingly never ending run down, P&O have now announced that they are selling their four S.D.14s known as the 'D' Class for a sum in the region of \$28 million to a Cuban company.

The vessels in question, are about 5-6 years old and

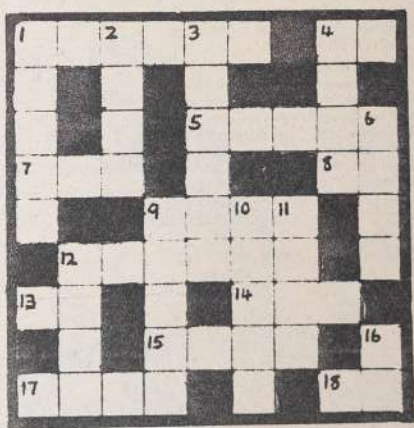

# PRESIDENT MOI CALLS FOR PEACE AND UNITY ON KENYATTA DAY

IN a wide-ranging speech touching on crucial global issues, President Moi this week reminded Kenyans that peace is the foundation of development within and co-operation among all communities which make up the family of mankind.

Addressing the nation from Uhuru Park in Nairobi on the occasion of Kenyatta Day, the President who is also the current chairman of the Organisation for African Unity called for a new understanding of inter-dependence among nations in a global web of mutual activities and interests in his message to the North-South meeting taking place in Cancun, Mexico.

On the political problems which still remained unsolved on the African continent, President Moi repeated his call to all parties in the Western Sahara crisis to refrain from "any acts that might aggravate the already tense situation prevailing in that area."

He also urged the leaders of Libya and Sudan to desist "from any further hostility between themselves as individuals and between their respective countries."

Following his address to the General Assembly of the United Nations and his subsequent discussions with US President Reagan, President Moi expressed his confidence that the United Nations Security Council Resolution 435 on the independence of Namibia will soon be implemented.

## CO-OPERATION

He reiterated the Kenya Government's stand to promote and uphold programmes of regional co-operation, leading to continental co-operation and stressed the need for a new economic order:

On the home front, President Moi announced drastic measures to stop the undermining of Governments efforts for self-sufficiency by banning the importation of eggs and chickens and directed the price of charcoal to be reduced

with immediate effect.

In Mombasa, the acting P.C. Mr. John Etemesi assured wananchi that there was enough food in the province and appealed to farmers to apply for more loans in order to expand their farms.

Mombasa Central M.P. Shariff Nassir urged parents to send their children to school and castigated leaders who were against unity and development in the country.

The Mayor of Mombasa Councillor Rajab Sumba said that the Mombasa Municipal Council has earmarked K.Shs. 320 million for the construction of more houses and K.Shs. three million to build more primary school classrooms in Mombasa.

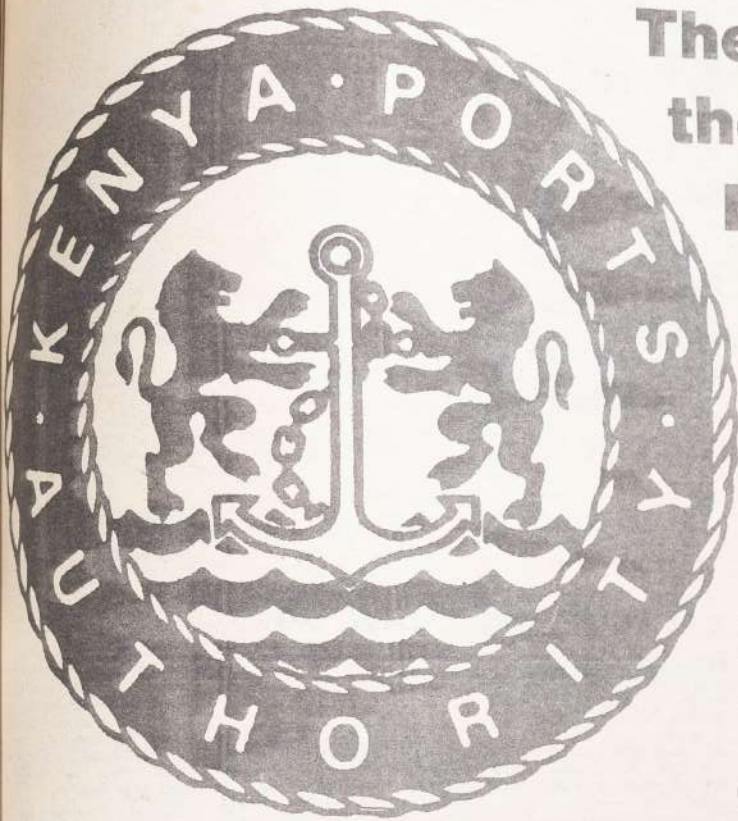

'Diwa' means a small cone shaped earthenware bowl in which cotton wool dipped in oil is lighted.

History says before 2000 years Lord Rama came to 'Ayodhya-puri' after hunting the devil called 'Dashrath' on Diwali.

Diwali is also the end of the year for Hindus. Every Hindu home is decorated with 'Diwa' and the entrances are decorated with 'Rangoli' paintings.

Diwali celebration starts three days before on Dhan-Terash.

On that day Hindus buy gold and jewellery as the luckiest pieces of the year. They also offer special pooja to 'Dhan' (money).

Sweet dishes are prepared and exchanged among relatives and friends. On Diwali, the books are closed and new books are opened with 'Laxmi Pujari' a special prayer on the first page of new books.

The whole family gets new clothes. Children are engaged with fireworks and having fun.

Diwali cards are sent to friends as a remembrance to each other.

Then comes New Year. The day starts very early in the morning with temple bells ringing as early as 5a.m.

There is a mass congregation at the Temple Hall. The Hindus offer special prayers. Then they shake hands and wish each other a Happy New Year.

Homes and shops of relatives are visited and special cold drinks are served to welcome each other. Children bow to their elders as a sign of respect.

## 'Legend of a King's three exiled sons'

DIWALI has been celebrated among the Hindu community for over many centuries. This loveliest of Indian festivals celebrates Lord Rama's victorious return to his capital from exile. Diwali also heralds the approach of winter and winter crops are sown.

According to popular belief, many centuries ago, there was a King named Dhashrath in a certain part of India. The legend revolves around his three sons (of different wives): Ram, Laxman and Bharat.

Bharat's mother had once managed to cure the King of a sickness and the King in gratitude had granted her a boon that she could ask him for whatever she wanted, and her

wish would be granted.

As the sons grew up, Bharat's mother made her request: she wanted that the throne be passed on to her son, Bharat when Dhashrath died, even though the place was rightfully Ram's, him being the eldest son.

She further went on to ask that Ram be sent into exile for fourteen years so that Bharat could be firmly placed on the throne for the rest of his life. In those days if a promise was made it had to be kept at all cost.

Thus the King Dhashrath sent his two older sons, Ram and Laxman, into exile in the forest for fourteen years while Bharat was the successor to the throne. The King died with Ram's name on his lips.

Bharat was called to take over the throne and when he heard what had happened, he was shocked. He at once followed his brothers into the forest and begged them to come back.

Ram was insistent that the promise to Bharat's mother be kept and asked Bharat to follow his mother's wish and rule the country.

Seeing that his younger brother was adamant, Ram asked him to take back his slippers and sword to the city.

Bharat took the slippers and sword and returned to the city and placed them on the throne refusing to sit on it until the return of Ram. From that day on he dressed in a simple attire and ruled the country on behalf of Ram.

After fourteen years of hardship and war, Ram, his wife Sita, brother Laxman and companion Hanuman returned back from exile. They were greeted by the jubilant citizens of the country and by a very happy Bharat, who had ruled just as his brother had bid him to: firmly but with love.

The return of Lord Ram was such a happy occasion that it was celebrated with great pomp. It was recorded in history books and has been celebrated down through the years just as a symbol of happiness and splendour. It was on the day it was celebrated that the festival of Diwali happened.

Every home, no matter how poor, is decorated with twinkling Diwa (oil lamps) with oil to welcome Lakshmi, the Goddess of wealth and prosperity. Unlike houses which are believed overlooked by the Goddess, Rice-flour slaps on the doorstep and Diya illumination lend colour to the festival.

After Diwali is the time for the community and the commercial year begins with Diwali and businesses open new account books.

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# AUF DEN SPUREN DER WILDEN TIERE IM TSAVOPARK

Der GRÖSSTE und bekannteste Wildpark erstreckt sich über eine Fläche von 100 km<sup>2</sup>. Seine riesige Ausdehnung kann vielleicht etwas besser erfassen, wenn man vorstellt, daß er gerade halb so groß ist wie die Schweiz.

Die gesamte Region war von jeher nur spärlich besiedelt, weil die Viehhaltung durch die weitverbreitete Tsetsefliege und die Malaria durch chronischen Wassermangel unmöglich gemacht wurden. Da diese Tiere vulkanische Wildnis kaum je wirtschaftlich genutzt werden konnten, sich aber ein erstaunlich vielseitiger Wildbestand in der unwirtlichen Landschaft aufhielt, wurde die Region 1948 zu einem der ersten Nationalparks Kenias erklärt.

Administrativen Gründen wurde das Gebiet in Tsavo-Ost (13.000 km<sup>2</sup>) und Tsavo-West (18.000 km<sup>2</sup>) mit je einem verantwortlichen Parkhüter. Über die Tsavo-Ost-Parks liegt nördlich des Ozeans. Diese wilde, unwirtliche Gegend ist für den Touristenverkehr noch nicht erschlossen und kann nur mit spezieller, vorher beantragter Bewilligung besucht werden.

Die Parks sind getrennt durch die alte Nairobi-Straße und die Eisenbahnlinie Uganda. 1901 fuhr der erste Zug von Mombasa nach Kisumu am Viktoriasee. Über die Eisenbahnlinie führt der Tsavo-Ost-Park hinaus auf die Nairobi-Straße. Nach etwa 40 km kommt man zum Tsavo-Eingang linker Hand in den Tsavo-West-Park.

Für die Eiligen gibt es den direkten, breiten Weg zur Ngulia Lodge. Vielversprechender ist jedoch der etwas holprige Pfad am Tsavofuß entlang. In der bezaubernden Landschaft halten sich auch viele Tiere auf.

Die 1969 erbaute Ngulia Lodge ist eine Luxusherberge mit Aussichtsterrasse, Swimming Pool und Wasserloch mit Flutlichtanlage. Auch von hier gibt es einen direkten Weg zur Kilaguni Lodge, doch lohnt sich ein Umweg über das "Rhino Valley", wenn man auch mit ziemlicher Sicherheit kein Nashorn sieht. Man fährt durch riesige erstarre Lavaströme und schwarze, mit hellgrünen Büschen überzogene Kokshalden, die zu beiden Seiten emporragen.

## SA LODGE

Von Mombasa her gelangt man zur Aruba Lodge, die an einem kleinen Stausee am Arubafluß liegt. Die Lodge besteht aus kleinen Häusern mit Schlafzimmern, Esszimmern, Kamin und Küche für Selbstversorger. Am See halten sich viele Wasservögel auf. In der Umgebung sind Pelikane, Reiher, Kormorane. Vor allem am Abend wandern große Elefantengruppen zum See, und viele andere Tiere sind auch tagsüber zur Tränke zu sehen.

Der riesigen Park sind die Entfernungen zwischen den einzelnen Punkten beträchtlich. Vom Galanafluß fährt man ungefähr 1-2 Stunden. Seine Ufer sind von Durrpalmen gesäumt und bieten eine sehr afrikanische Szenerie. Die Lugardfälle sind sehr hoch, aber recht eindrucksvoll. Das ungewöhnlich verformte und durch Schichtgestein brodelnde Wasser durch enge Spalten in die Tiefe.

Von Mombasa aus gelangt man nach 110 km zum Kitani und durch eine sehr rauhe und wilde Landschaft zum Galanafluß, der in den weiteren Verlauf umbenannt wird und schließlich bei Malindi in den Indischen Ozean mündet.

Die Safari Lodge, nur etwa 5 Kilometer vom Eingang entfernt, bietet allen Luxus und liegt auf einem Hügel mit einer in die Unendliche Weite. Oft weiden auf dem Hügel riesige Büffelherden. Die romantische Zeitplätze im Park, wo man unter Umständen fast hautnah mit dem

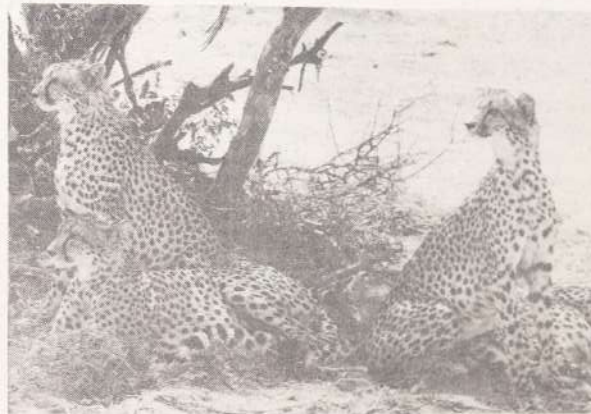

Wild in Berührung kommen kann. Auf einer Rundfahrt am Tsavofuß entlang, wo es auch Krokodile gibt, hat man vor allem frühmorgens oder in der Abenddämmerung unvergessliche Begegnungen mit wilden Tieren.

An den Mudanda Rocks vorbei führt der Weg zum Manyani-Tor aus dem Tsavo-Ost-Park hinaus auf die Nairobi-Straße. Nach etwa 40 km kommt man zum Tsavo-Eingang linker Hand in den Tsavo-West-Park.

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Die Kilaguni Lodge besteht seit 1962, wurde modernisiert und vergrößert und bildet eine Oase der Erholung in der Wildnis. Sie hat ihren ursprünglichen Charakter bewahrt und hat begeisterte Stammgäste bei den Menschen und in der Tierwelt gefunden. Beim Mittagessen auf der Terrasse kann man die Parade der Tiere am Wasserloch an sich vorbeiziehen lassen. Viele Glanzstare, Pfefferfresser und Erdhörnchen sind zahm und lassen sich von Hand füttern.

In der nahen Umgebung befinden sich ein paar interessante Aussichtspunkte. Bei den "Roaring Rocks" (brüllenden Felsen) hört man zwar höchstens den Wind durch die Felspalten pfeifen; vom "Poachers Lookout" (Wildkliebs-Ausguck) hat man einen phantastischen Rundblick; bei den "Mzima-Springs" sprudeln 2 Milliarden Liter Wasser pro Tag aus unterirdischen Quellen, die den größten Teil von Mombasa mit Wasser versorgen. Die Reservoirs befinden sich etwas oberhalb der Quellen, so daß die natürlichen Pools, in denen sich eine große Ansammlung von Flußpferden aufhält, nicht verändert oder gestört werden. Von einer Plattform aus kann man die Flußpferde und Krokodile beobachten, und durch die Glasscheiben einer Unterwasser-Kammer erhält man Einblick in die Fischwelt.

Von den Mzima Springs ist es nicht weit bis zum Kitani Lodge, wo man sich selbst verpflegen muß. Sie liegt in einer wildreichen Gegend und es kommt nicht selten vor, daß man Zebras und Kongonis zum Greifen nah sieht direkt vor der Veranda und zwischen den Steinhäusern aufhalten.

Man kann die Safari fortsetzen und zum nahegelegenen Amboselipark weiterfahren oder in entgegengesetzter Richtung nach Mtito Andei, an der Hauptstraße auf halbem Weg zwischen Nairobi und Mombasa gelegen. In der Mitte der sechziger Jahre wurde der Südzweig

des Tsavoparks, ein ehemaliges Jagdgebiet, für den Tourismus erschlossen. In Voi biegt man ab Richtung Taveta, das an der Grenze nach Tansania liegt.

## SALT LICK LODGE

Nach etwa 40 km teilweise auf der Asphaltstraße durch die landschaftlich reizvollen Taitahügel kommt man zu den beiden Luxusherbergen, die unter dem Management der Hilton-Hotel-Gruppe stehen. Die Taita Hills Lodge, außerhalb des Parks, verschwindet fast in einem Blumenmeer und dient oft als Konferenzzentrum für Seminare und Tagungen. Die Salt Lick Lodge ist auf Stelzen gebaut wie ein Taita-Dorf und liegt in einem privaten Wildpark, in dem es erstaunlich viele Tiere gibt. Letztes Jahr sind zwei Löwen in der Nähe der Lodge in einen ausgetrockneten Brunnen gefallen, und unter Leitung des Managers wurde eine abenteuerliche, aber erfolgreiche Rettungsaktion durchgeführt.

Ein Stück weiter auf der Überland-

Schotterstraße erreicht man den Eingang zum südlichen Teil des Tsavo-West-Parkes. Er ist nicht so viel befahren und liegt etwas abseits des großen Touristenrums. Durch die weiterhin hügelige Landschaft gelangt man bis hinunter zum lieblichen Jipese, dessen anderes Ufer bereits in Tansania liegt. Ein Boot steht zur Verfügung für Rundfahrten auf dem See, der von einem dichten Schilfgürtel gesäumt ist, in dem sich unzählige Wasservögel aufhalten.

An interessanten Fischerdörfern vorbei und durch riesige Sisalplantagen kommt man wieder auf die Hauptstraße. Auf dem Rückweg kann man noch einen lohnenden Abstecher machen zum Lake Chala, einem kleinen, aber sehenswerten Kratersee auf der linken Seite der Straße. Man sieht ihn erst, wenn man den Kraterand hinaufgefahren ist und direkt am Abgrund steht. Ein atemberaubender Anblick!

Der Tsavopark mit seinen vielen Untergebieten ist so groß und vielseitig, daß man auf jeder weiteren Safari immer wieder etwas Neues entdecken kann.

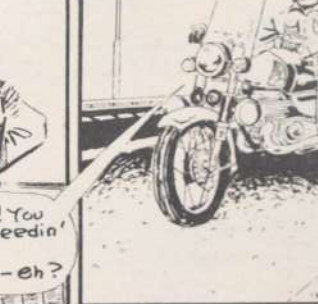

THE Sabaki 300 Rally gave another win to Horace Horsey and his navigator Adrian Bell when they brought their Datsun 120Y in with a single point edge over team mates David Horsey and Robin Nixon.

The Jambo Hotel sponsored event formed the centre piece of a Mombasa Motor Club weekend at Malindi which attracted some 70 enthusiasts.

With the first car due to be flagged off at 4.30p.m. on Saturday, most crews reported to the Blue Marlin soon after three o'clock.

A minor panic occurred when it was found that the Haldas carefully adjusted in Mombasa no longer gave the correct reading between the Malindi markers. This led to furious bartering for gears and calculators.

The draw gave the decidedly dubious honours of leading the 13 starters to Nasiralli and Valli, a pair of newcomers to rallying. A minor problem of missing documents was put right at the first control after a spectacular display of driving by the organiser's messenger.

The first section of 10 kilometres took the cars out of Malindi past the prison and along the Ganda-Sinoia road to the junction with the main road. No simple transport section, already penalty points were piling up.

Carlo Vitulli in his pick-up with two points down had a narrow lead of one minute of six other cars.

The route took the cars over the Sabaki Bridge, with its set of permanent concrete yumps, then a left turn through Marikibuni and along the very fast road along the north bank

of the river. Six kilometres on a sharp right hander (do not miss!) put the cars on to a narrow track. Some cars did miss and had to come back to look for the skid marks.

A passage control in the school grounds stopped any private enterprise work, then onto the main road at Gongoni. Four hundred metres later a sharp left caught at least one navigator out, putting the crew

behind two other cars for the fast and lumpy run to Magarini.

A combination of setting sun and thick dust made life complicated and some harsh words were passed between cars.

At Magarini control, Vitulli still held the edge on points, one ahead of Horace, with David and Farook in close pursuit.

The 13 kilometre sprint to Marafa was cleaned by most cars, this was followed by a 57 kilometre section that included some interesting drifts, yumps and washaways. One canyon, triple cautioned with the request for slow speed, broke the tie rod on Vitulli's pick-up, putting him out of the rally.

Farook and Rashid damaged their Lancer at the same hazard, while Kalsi and Bhama skidded into the chasm but came out again intact.

Walsh's Escort suffered a total electrical power cut which had them stationary for 50 minutes, while a navigational boob sent the Sulton VW on its own expedition that cost them a lot of time.

At Marikibuni control, David Horsey led the rally, one point in front of Horace, with the Kalsi/Bhama pick up in a very creditable third position.

The route joined the main road near the nasty bend at Mamburi, over the Sabaki bridge into the control, leaving a 10 kilometre trot around Malindi's hinterland to the Blue Marlin. Car 14 missed the Sabaki control, piling 60 penalty points onto their card.

By 7.30, all eleven surviving cars were back, and crews relaxed while the officials worked out the points lost. After the handicaps were imposed the points for the rally leaders read:

David Horsey 25, Horace Horsey 26, M. S. Kalsi 33, Vishnu Dhulia 39, Percy Mellon 40.

Sunday produced a complete change in weather conditions, the first rain Malindi had seen for quite a while.

At 11a.m. the leading car was flagged off on the second leg, starting with a short transport section to the much used

junction before the bridge; three cars lost points in these five kilometres, two of them by booking in early.

The route turned onto a narrow track towards the river through the trees and along the airport fence. Several cars had problems in these 21 kilometres Sutton's V.W. shed its fanbelt, Munshi had a flapping boot lid, which he later removed, and to add to his problem, Walsh's Escort came to a sudden halt with a blocked fuel line.

At Ganga control, Horace had taken the lead on points from David, Dhulia's 160 had wrestled third place from Kalsi.

Seven kilometres later, the yellow Opel of Mellon and Jennings developed an expensive engine rattle and they retired while lying fifth.

The rest of the road to the crossroads at Gedi had been got at by a grader, transforming what is usually a competitive track into a very long sand trap. The steady rain helped cars get a grip, the tail enders ran along the sunken grooves provided by the leaders.

Five kilometres of main road tarmac ended with a passage control and a right hander into the forest, full of lurking tree stumps, head flattening yumps and evil mudholes.

When the cars came out at jilore control at the barrier, Horace had now increased his lead to two minutes, at the expense of a very tired looking front suspension. The rally followed the main Sala Gate past Kakoneni, and flat out the 12 kilometres down the pipe line road before turning off into the forest again.

With rain still falling, some of the mud holes began to look like nesting boxes for the Loch Ness monster, a severe test of the weatherproofing of any rally car.

One of the 120Ys has developed its own method of collecting gravel; pump mud in past the gear box and strain the water out through the mats and perforated floor pan. Several cars had unplanned excursions into the trees.

Finally the cars joined the main road at Fujim barrier, named after an early Japanese settler.

The two leading cars were now travelling in convoy, often metres apart, as they tackled Sokoke forest once more. The first fourteen kilometres would be classified by up-country organisers as decidedly "bumpy-bumpy". A short stretch of tarmac, then onto the old road that runs parallel.

Finally the minor track through the palm trees to Watamu, and into Sealaters and the finish banner.

Horace held his one point lead right to the finish. After the handicap for the second leg was applied, Kalsi and Bhama squeezed into third position, just ahead of Dhulia and Khan.

Walsh's Escort had its problems to the very end when

a front tyre blew off from the end; gears which broke its rotor arm on the back to Mombasa!

The arrival of one of the heavily sponsored cars with a hovering helicopter caused a problem of illegal aerial servicing, but the protest was rejected.

Martin Thompson, General Manager of Jambo Hotel gave away the prizes and reaffirmed the sponsors support in the very popular event in the M.M.C. calendar.

Both rally and weekend evoked a great success in all concerned, and once again the hotel management and organiser John Heller are to be congratulated for supplying the ingredients of a very pleasant weekend.
