DEAD-LOCK OVER M.F. LOANS

TANZANIA'S chances of receiving loans from the International Monetary Fund (IMF) are virtually nil due to constant trips by its executives to Tanzania to convince government officials to give in to some more stringent conditions.

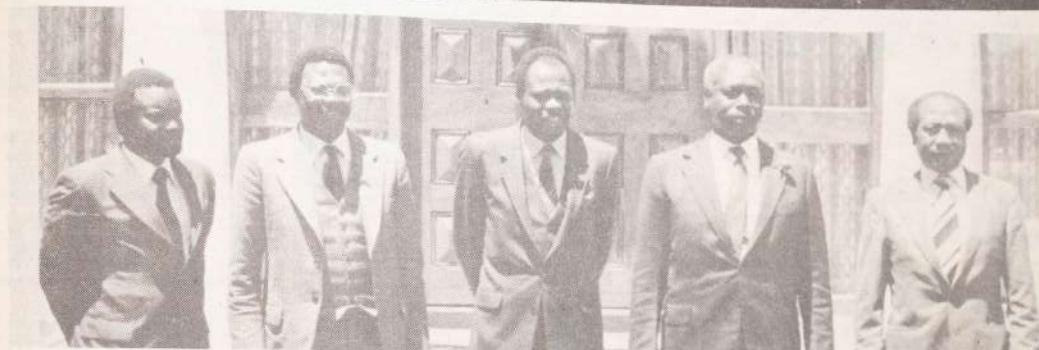
The situation has been aggravated by the deadlock over the 22-Nation Summit on world poverty at Cancun, Mexico and the IMF's proposed 45 billion shillings (US dollars 5.5 billion) loan facility.

The Minister of State for Planning and Economic Affairs, professor Kighoma Mwalimu told members of parliament that Tanzania will not accept any of the conditions — some of which are new — imposed by the IMF for financial assistance.

Dr. Malima said that the government could not consider the Tanzanian proposal to increase the interest rate between 16% to 20% against the present rate of 8.25 to one US dollar.

The government also rejected the increase of the price of Sembe (maize meal) from 100 to 120 shillings, the country's staple diet to 8 shillings when the present price is 250 per kilo was considered high.

'MINIMUM WAGES'
 Other conditions were that the government freeze the minimum wage and government employees to do away with the pricing mechanism and raise the present bank interest rates between 10 and 11 per cent to 15 and 35 per cent.

DUNLOP IN TALKS ON TYRE FACTORY

MOMBASA (K.N.A.) — A second multi-million tyre factory will be built in Kenya if discussions between the government and the investors, Dunlop Holdings Limited, are successful.

This disclosure was made by the managing director of Dunlop Kenya Limited Mr John Rees who said that in the near future, Mr Alan Lord who is the managing director of Dunlop Holdings will visit Kenya to advance the discussions.

He was addressing guests who included architects, builders, businessmen and industrialists at a reception hosted by his company at a Mombasa Hotel to mark the opening of a Dunlop Depot in Mombasa.

Mr Rees said that the proposed factory would provide permanent employment to about 700 people and its annual production would be in the region of 300,000 tyres.

This he said was part of expansion programme by the company in Kenya which he said was the biggest project in the programme.

The managing director told guests that his company had decided to open a depot in Mombasa to serve the growing industrial and commercial sectors of the economy by providing a wide range of sporting goods.

NEW MARKET FOR KISAUNI

WEST GERMAN LOAN FACILITY FOR COUNCIL PROJECT

THE CONSTRUCTION of KShs. 37 million modern wholesale market in Kisauni to be financed by the Government of West Germany under the Germany/Kenya Financial Co-operation is expected to begin in mid 1982.

The Ministry of Finance and the Municipal Council of Mombasa have already approved the preliminary costs for the construction of the market and two plots on mainland North have been earmarked by the Council.

About one million shillings of the estimated expenditure will go towards meeting compensation to squatters while other items of expenditure include consulting and market specialist services, site preparation and civil engineering, external infrastructure, and modern equipment for the new market.

The appraisal report has already been submitted to the West German Government for its approval and further

negotiations are expected to begin early next year between the Municipal Council of Mombasa, the Ministry of Finance and officials from the Government of West Germany.

Issues expected to feature prominently in the talks include rents for stalls, operation repayment fees and repayment of the loan by the Council.

A German consulting firm Kreditanstalt Wiederaufbau (K.F.W.) which is involved in the project is reported to have suggested that rentals should range between KShs. 1,300 and 1,400 per square metre sales space in order to cover investments and operations costs.

However, another proposal

has called for the council to start with reduced rent to cover operation costs only. The Municipal Council of Mombasa and the Ministry of Finance appear to have agreed in principle that no interest should be paid by the Council during the construction of the wholesale market and that the Council pay operation fees for the first five years of operation at an interest of one per cent per annum.

INSTALMENTS

The Council will then be required to make payments in equal instalments for a period of over thirty years at the interest rate of one per cent.

It has also been suggested that an entrance fee for vehicles should be charged in order to minimize traffic movement into the market.

Meanwhile the Council has resolved to invite tenders for the construction of sixteen additional Standard One classes to be financed by a Shs. three million loan secured from the National Bank of Kenya. The loan is repayable over a period of 5 years at an interest rate of 14 per cent per annum.

At the same time the Ministry of Finance has backed out of a sport Project for Mombasa and Nairobi for being able to provide the component of local costs required for the project.

The provisional estimates for the project which was originally supposed to be financed by the World Bank amounted to KShs. 364 million of which the local component was estimated at KShs 138,800,000.

ALTERNATIVES

The Ministry of Finance has directed the Ministry of Local Government to identify alternative sources which would make it possible for the City Council of Nairobi and the Municipal Council of Mombasa to meet the local costs and enable the project to commence in 1982/83.

About 2 1/2 million people in Switzerland go on holiday. Many are now spending their

As far as Kenya is concerned, Urs Steiner, the Airtour Suisse representative here, revealed that during the last 'low season' there had been a drop in the number of clients coming here, compared with the same period last year.

Mr. Oberg said the market was sensitive about prices while our once-weekly flights to Mombasa from now mid-January are full, bookings are just trickling in for the rest of the winter

Filming a wild and zany story

JANUARY 17, 1950. An armed robbery takes place at Brink's counting room at the North Terminal Garage in Boston where seven men, wearing Halloween masks, stole what was then a record \$2.7 million. It took police and FBI six years and some 29 million dollars to capture the culprits — and only when a few days before the Statue of Limitations ran out on the crime, one of the gang members confessed to the robbery and betrayed his fellow gang members.

This is the story with an improbable ending to one of the most improbable heists in the history of crime being recounted in the Dino De Laurentis presentation, *The Brink's Job* opening on Monday at the Naaz Cinema. And filming this often wild and zany story was no less a challenge to the cast and crew.

In a classic example of film imitating real life, three armed men forced their way into the production company's editing facilities in downtown Boston during the first weeks of filming and made away with 13 reels of footage!

Their demand: \$600,000 to retrieve the stolen film. Fortunately, however, the stolen film was all very replaceable, and the shooting continued.

But not without further real-life risks.

For example, the production staged one of the most risky and dramatic scenes involving one million dollars in real cash in order to stage a film version of the real robbery. Happily, this time the money which took two days to recount, was returned safely back to its vault — and not a single dollar missing.

The off-camera drama did not end there. More than two weeks of filming were centred on the cramped, narrow streets in the old Italian neighbourhood in the shadow of historic North Church. Old style street lights were installed, the Brink's offices and vault area completely restored and even locating the original safe door.

Old Scollay Square came alive to Peter Falk, playing Brink's ringleader Tony Pino and Allen Goorwitz playing his comic brother-in-law, Vinnie Costa, to stroll the packed streets and shoplift to their heart's content.

Peter Falk also learnt the arcane arts of lock-picking and safe-cracking from his off-camera instructor who was a real-life expert on parole, and in one sequence seen using an acetylene torch to open a stolen safe.

In fact, *The Brink's Job* is perhaps the only and first film that shows, in tight close-up, how a lock is actually picked.

The film scripted by Walon Green, directed by William Friedkin and produced by Ralph Serp, features a distinguished ensemble of performers, both portraying the unlikely band of boosters and bookies who successfully pull off the historic Brink's heist.

This is the robbery everybody said nobody could do. You can see somebody do it on Monday at Naaz Cinema. And he is a 'nobody', they say!

And now to Kenya Cinema. Here, in another world and another time, the eight years reign of a despotic tyranny responsible for more than 500,000 lives in the country that God forgot, is once again chronicled one year after its premier debut in Mombasa.

Needless to say, it is none other than Sharad Patel's *Rise and Fall of Idi Amin* which caused quite a sensation when it hit the big screens in Nairobi and Mombasa last October.

The film traces the dictator's career from his triumphant motorcade through the streets of Kampala after the overthrow of the Uganda Government led by Dr. Milton Obote in 1971, until his ignominious retreat from the advancing Tanzanian army in 1979.

It boasts of an international cast and crew, with an original screenplay by that comic genius Wade Huie.

The role of Amin, needless to mention again, is played by Kenya's Joseph Olita who "as a non-professional actor produced the right kind of performance" to adequate that of a mass murderer (on the big screen, anyway) of the century.

Others in the cast are Thomas Baptiste (Dr. Michael Oloya), Leonard Trolley (Bob Astles) and Geoffrey Keen as the British High Commissioner.

Here is another chance to see Amin's pillage and plunder of Uganda, which lasted for eight years.

Breakthrough For The Ladies In North Coast Fishing Co-Operatives

WITH women's lib still being promoted, it was interesting to learn that the North Coast Fishermen's Co-operative Society, Lamu, has now opened its doors to female members — the only one of its kind to do so, writes Neta Peal.

Traditionally, fishermen's co-ops have been strictly 'men only' affairs. These women are not involved with fishing, but in collecting shells.

In the Taita/Taveta area such is the enthusiasm for women's lib that members of the fairer sex are now being allowed to form their own co-operatives. Here groups of women are involved in goat ranching, shopkeeping as well as in running their own bus service.

They have also expressed a wish for one society to cover all their income generating activities.

In an interview, the Provincial Co-operatives Officer, Coast, Alphonse Ouma, explained that the co-operative movement is the backbone of the country's socio-economic development. It is an important tool in educating the small farmer as well as offering a forum and facilities where he can be helped to help himself.

Greater interest is being taken in co-operatives, especially now that more government money is being distributed in the forms of loans to co-ops and farmers. Grants are also being given to such societies enabling them to employ qualified personnel particularly to look after books of account.

Said Mr. Ouma "a big change is taking place and co-ops now have the enthusiastic support of local politicians."

A big increase in membership of farmers' and fishermen's co-ops, particularly over the past three years, is reported. The World Bank programme to help the latter has induced many fishermen to join so that they too can benefit from the developments taking place.

With a Shs. 75 million financial injection from a World Bank loan, which is being supplemented by funds from the Kenya Government, a big leap forward in fisheries development all over the country is anticipated.

At the Coast, some of the funds will be channelled in the form of loans to fishermen's co-op societies enabling them to buy better fishing boats and equipment. More cold stores and ice-plants are envisaged along the Coast, including Lamu, where they have to bring in ice from Mombasa to keep fresh what they catch. The same also applies at Vanga and Shimoni.

Two years ago fishermen were not greatly interested in joining co-ops, now with development money pouring in, they do not want to be left out.

Of interest is the fact that there is also a fisheries co-operative in Taveta!

Government money is also helping more stores to be built in which farmers can keep their produce. Previously, insufficient storage space resulted in great losses.

KILIFI SUCCESS

The only farmers' co-op union in the Coast Province is in Kilifi District. Such has been its success that several years ago it was able to buy Malindi's top hotel, the Sindbad, and to invite Block Hotels to manage it. The union is also a shareholder in the Kenya Cashewnut factory, Kilifi, and it was recently permitted to raise the ceiling

of its share participation from 11 to 28 per cent. These monies are mainly derived from the sale of cashewnuts, copra and sisim.

It also enjoys a monopoly in the marketing of produce grown in that area and all farmers are obliged to sell through them.

No such union exists in Kenya. However, after seeing what has been achieved in Kilifi it has stimulated interest in establishing their own.

Said Mr. Ouma "we are trying to encourage them to do so."

Fishermen's and farmers' co-ops started forming in the Coast Province about the same time — in the mid-60s. They were not very streamlined, as people had to be convinced to combine efforts, to make the marketing of the produce much easier.

At Lamu, there are six co-operatives. Four are for farmers and one for cashew ranches and fishermen. The former are doing very well.

Said Mr. Ouma "they have helped to get lamu equal to their numbers, and are all doing well in the repayment of loans. They deal mainly with cotton, bixa, mangoes, cashewnuts and copra."

NEW ICE PLANT

As far as the fishermen's co-op is concerned, it has managed to buy its own ice transport fish to Mombasa. Mr. Ouma revealed that an ice plant is to be constructed there. With this will probably come more vessels to help in the transportation of fish, and in the future they may be looking into selling their catches further afield than Mombasa.

There are 15 farmers' co-ops in Kilifi, as well as 10 fishermen, and three fish farmers.

Mr. Ouma also mentioned the tremendous help that the government is giving to the building of stores for farmers. There are two in Lamu and three each in Kilifi, Kavirato and Taita/Taveta.

Much effort is being placed to getting fishermen together and Dugudunji, Diani and Dugudunji have organised into co-ops. In fact, they too can benefit from the World Bank loan and training co-op managers, equip them with the necessary know how.

As far as farmers in Kilifi District are concerned, they have not been doing very well and efforts to stimulate them into a greater united effort are not met with success. Only a few will still produce through co-operatives. The benefits of co-ops are now beginning to be felt together after seeing what the Kilifi Co-operative Union has been able to achieve. Said Mr. Ouma "we are trying to encourage them to do so."

In Taita/Taveta, there are co-operatives, two of which are in respect of consumer goods.

'I.P.S.' HELPING BANGLADESH DEVELOP

AN important new concept in industrial development for Bangladesh has been announced in Dacca with the creation of the Industrial Promotion and Development Company of Bangladesh Limited (IPDC).

The main purpose of this new institution is to help stimulate the private sector in the economy by linking the resources of several important international development agencies with those of the Bangladesh Government itself.

The idea was originated by His Highness the Aga Khan and represents another of his major initiatives to assist Third World development.

It will be implemented through his Industrial Promotion Services (IPS) group

in Switzerland which is to be joined by the International Finance Corporation (IFC), an agency of the World Bank in Washington D.C., the Commonwealth Development Corporation (CDC) of the United Kingdom and the Deutsche Entwicklungsgesellschaft M.B.A. (DEG), the West German Development Agency.

The Government of Bangladesh is investing U.S. Dollars 1.8 million in the institution and the foreign participants will each invest U.S. Dollars 1,050,000, making the total initial capital Dollar 6,000,000.

OBJECTIVES

The new Industrial Promotion and Development Company will have three major objectives: it will look for

industrial projects in the private sector and hopes to assemble domestic and foreign capital, as well as qualified management, as required. Secondly, in partnership with other investors, it will offer advisory and consultancy services to initiate new industrial undertakings or expand existing ones.

Finally, it will use its expertise and its wide informational contacts to help create conditions to increase the flow of domestic and foreign capital for industry throughout Bangladesh.

The establishment of the Industrial Promotion and Development Company of Bangladesh supports that country's policy of developing a vigorous mixed economy

through a more active private sector. It is a particularly timely initiative when, as evidenced at Cancun, there is growing international concern for the economic development of the world's poorer countries.

Bangladesh was one of 21 participants in the recent United Nations Conference on the least developed countries, held in Paris, which was attended by the Aga Khan as a special guest of the French Government.

COMMITMENT

IPS itself has been committed to development in Third World countries ever since its inception by the Aga Khan nearly 20 years ago.

Today it operates in Kenya, Tanzania, Zaire, Ivory Coast,

Bangladesh and Pakistan. It aims everywhere to encourage consortia which combine both local and private industries with government and international organisations.

Over a hundred different enterprises have been launched in this way, ranging from building materials and mining to textiles and tourism.

In addition to the Aga Khan's commitment, through IPS, to furthering economic development in Third World countries, he is also deeply involved with both social welfare and cultural concerns in the developing world. The Aga Khan Foundation founded in 1967 is active in many developing countries, mainly in the fields of health care, education and low-cost housing.

Zanzibar's Old Town To Be Re-habilitated

THE OLD STONE Town of Zanzibar is to be preserved and rehabilitated. Some of buildings which date back to the 18th century need immediate attention.

This follows a meeting in Zanzibar between professor R. L. Barclay of the United Nations centres of human settlements (Habitat) and officials of the Zanzibar Government. Experts of the rehabilitation of Historical areas are due in the Island very shortly.

And Mtware, Southern Tanzania, a party leader, Mr. Yusuf Nabalang'anya has called on the government to preserve the town of Mikandani as a historical site.

He noted that Mikindani had equal importance like the other coastal towns of Pangani, Kilwa, Bagamoyo and Zanzibar and added that one cannot write the history of slavery on Eastern African coast and the expeditions of Dr. David Livingstone without touching on the town.

An Austrian travel writer Mr. Erwin Korzendorfer who has been about 30 times to east Africa has advised the Tanzania Tourist Corporation TTC not to urbanise the country's National Park and Game Reserves.

Mr. Korzendorfer who was in the country with his wife as guests of TTC and the Bushtrækker Safaris company cited that macadamising of the road from the Ngorongoro National Park to the Seronera Lodge in the Serengeti National Park. He felt it was unnecessary and claimed it was a distortion of one of the world's most attractive natural beauty.

The Austrian writer has viewed all the country's parks and reserves and commended the Mbuyu Camp in the selous Game Reserve as the most Romantic Safari Centre.

Meanwhile members of a committee to probe the systematic killing of Rhinos in and around the Ngorongoro Crater in Northern Tanzania have started work.

'Mass Slaughter'

Concern has been mounted on the mass slaughtering of Rhinos and their near extinction following failure by Game Rangers to arrest unknown poachers involved in the killing of five Rhinos since last October.

Two of the Rhinos were killed in October 1980, two in June this year and one on September 27, 1981 and according to the Ngorongoro conservator, Mr. Solomon ole Saibull, the poachers seem to know the conservators while they did not know them.

• Eight blind Tanzanians are to scale Mt. Kilimanjaro -

Africa's Highest Mountain as part of a specially organised two-week course at the Tanzania outward bound School. The course is scheduled to start on November 1, 1981 and will be different from the normal courses given their handicaps. The climbers are sponsored by the Tanzania Society for the Blind (TSFB).

• The TSFB has meanwhile received 20,000 shillings worth of communication equipment from the London-based royal society for the blind for the two blind students who graduated this year at the University of Dar es Salaam.

• Four factories - all of them recently operational in Mbeya and Musoma have had to ground their operations to a halt due to power problems, other major industries in Mbeya may also be affected.

In Mbeya, a 620 million

shilling cement factory, a 4 million shilling textile factory and a farm implements plant are lying idle, and although the situation might improve in December 1981, the units will not be able to go into normal production till next April.

And in Musoma, the new Eastern Lake Victoria port at Kisumu, the giant Musoma Textile Mill (Mutes) will not go into normal production quite some time.

The Tanesco Electric Supply Company (Tanesco) state that their current average usage of diesel per week was 300 litres as opposed to 200 litres a day required to power the Mutes plant.

Tanesco state that it would have to accumulate about 500,000 litres of diesel before Mutes could be production and they attribute this anomaly to a shortage railway wagons to transport fuel.

Mutes has so far lost million shillings and the Mbeya Textile Mill (Mutes) might also be affected by hitches in the smooth distribution of fuel to the regions.

The Minister for Industries Mr. Basil Mramba in Parliament meeting in Dodoma that textile mills - once Mwatex made an overall loss of 138 million shillings in 1979 due to constant power and water cuts. Some million metres of textile were not produced during the year.

UNIVERSITY BOOST FOR THE SCIENCES

THE UNIVERSITY of Dar es Salaam has reduced its intake of students for Liberal Arts by 30 per cent to off-set an increase in the enrolment of students for the science subjects.

The University's vice-chancellor, Mr. Nicholas Kuchanga told members of the Tanzania press club during their monthly luncheon in Dar es Salaam that there is an acute shortage in training facilities for students of basic science.

He pointed out that there was a shortage of between 500 to 700 science teachers in secondary schools, literally no tutors to teach in technical schools and very few to man the country's increasing industries.

He noted that the reduction of arts intakes will assist the authorities to enrol more students in the sciences and engineering faculty. This reduction will not affect economics, Geography and the languages.

And although 65 per cent of the teaching staff were Tanzanians, Mr. Kuchanga stressed that the University had to rely on expatriates for the teaching of some essential courses.

These were about 50 per cent in the science and medicine and 60 per cent in the faculties of engineering and veterinary science and Mr. Kuchanga added that 30 per cent of the Tanzanians on the faculty of medicine were on training.

On the country's call to decrease the rising costs of running the University, Mr. Kuchanga felt that if more students were outside the University Campus costs per student per year could be drastically cut down from \$7,000 to about \$3,000 per year.

Shortage of funds has delayed the improvement of residential and teaching facilities and led to the shelving of expansion programmes in the faculties of engineering and agriculture.

But he added that the government was going ahead with the construction of three more Universities in the country, probably through the expansion of the existing facilities.

Serviscope, who act as food industry consultants as well as representatives in Kenya of leading overseas suppliers, will be setting up bakeries in Siaya, Mombasa, Meru and Homa Bay — all as a result of their involvement in the Nairobi Show.

BLEAK PROSPECTS FOR U.K. SHIPPING

I HAVE commented on numerous occasions in these columns of the decline of the British flag fleet as so many of the well known British Shipping Companies dispose of surplus tonnage. To add further emphasis to this, the General Council of British Shipping in their latest report expect the British fleet to shrink to about 30 million deadweight tons by the end of this year and if this expectation becomes a reality the British fleet will have fallen by over one third in five and a half years.

During 1981 so far 90 vessels have been disposed of and the majority have been sold for further trading with much reduced overheads. A bleak prospect indeed for a country's shipping fleet which, up to recent times, one could truly say ruled the waves.

The India/U.K./India counterpart of the British/Continental Lines East African Beacon service to be known as Cobra is expected to have four containerhips in the India/Pakistan/Sri Lanka trade to the U.K./Continent in January, 1982 after the service initially starts.

Kilindini continues to thin out with only a handful of ships waiting. A number of veterans have been or are still in port.

The 5,000 ton Panamanian flag "Bhoja Trader", which at one time I mistook for one of the Manta Line fleet, is becoming a long stayer. Having arrived on October 7 to discharge some 850 tons cargo, she berthed last week at No. 17 and on completion moved to Port Reitz anchorage presumably for further orders.

Built in 1955 as the Danish "Ecuador" she is certainly now feeling her age by her appearance. The 21,000 deadweight ton Greek tanker "Kamos" arrived alongside Shimanzi Oil Terminal last Monday to take water and diesel oil. She was on voyage from Karachi to Durban with a full cargo of Naptha, now 23 years old cannot be far short of the shipbreakers yard.

ENGINE TROUBLE

The following day, due to engine trouble and reportedly no astern power, she had to be removed off the berth and towed by three K.P.A. tugs outside port limits where at time of writing she is at anchor — altogether an expensive exercise.

I remember being at anchor on the "City of Exeter" with this vessel alongside some three years ago whilst waiting to enter Dar es Salaam.

A deeply laden vessel was the modern looking Greek

owned "Theocharis" flying the Panamanian flag which called at the port last Sunday for bunkers and water, and moved of her double banked berth on Monday evening and anchored in the harbour. From her appearance the vessel was German built. She was on a voyage from Santos, Brazil to Bandar Abbas in the Gulf, no doubt with Grain.

Loading some 2,600 tons of cargo for the United States at No. 1 berth has been the P and O day direct for New York on a 24 day passage.

Another vessel in the American trade which has not enjoyed the same speed of despatch is the Lykes Lines "Allison Lykes". This vessel has been in port surprisingly since September 25th and she should finally have sailed from No. 9 berth yesterday. Admittedly she has been loading and discharging but I believe not all has gone as smoothly as it might have done.

A strikingly handsome looking ship is the 12,600 gross ton "Ville de Marseille" which has been at the buoys since the 22nd October awaiting discharge at No. 17 berth. This is her first visit to Mombasa although two of her sister ships "Ville de Strasbourg" and "Ville de Nantes" have called before on the French Line's service between France and Madagascar, complimenting the CGM monthly Ro-Ro service.

The "Ville de Marseille" and her three sisters on this run are owned by the well known French Shipping Company NCHP (Navale et Commerciale Havraise Peninsulaire, paris) and are products of the same shipyard which built the Swedline "Patrick Vieljeux" and her ill fated sister "Francis Vieljeux"; apart from cargo handling equipment their design is identical.

An annual nautical event I must not let pass without a

mention was the Indian Missions to Seafarers which took place at the Anglican Cathedral Sunday week commencing Provost and the Rev. Harry Hopkins, R.N.E. to the Mission.

The service is a moving ceremony attended by many personnel from the port and members of Shipping companies Mombasa, the flag of Shipping Companies and Kenya Navy were contingents from the service.

Founded in 1885 and celebrating its anniversary, the Mission established a tradition and reputation for practically and spiritual seafarers worldwide with regard to rank, colour, nationality or religion.

Ports of the world are different, also are changing but the atmosphere and welcome of the Mission remains unchanged as clearly evidence in thousands of seafarers who on their own Missions to Seafarers situated at the top of the leading from the port.

On a three hour visit to Mombasa last week Mr. H. Ngai, chairman of Mitsui O.S.K. Lines Ltd., one of the world's leading shipping groups, accompanied by Mrs. Ngai. Also in the party was O.S.K. Lines Ltd. agent.

Apart from moving the Agents, Maritime Co. Ltd. discussions the benefits of a visit allowed for little else.

Tour Agents 'Impressed'

KWALE (K.N.A.) — A group of German Travel Agents completed a tour of the Shimba Hills National Park where they saw different species of the game at the Ng'ombe. ACADEMICS

The largest group of students on the course are sponsored by the Ministry of Higher Education and it is anticipated that a number of them will join the academic staffs of the two National Polytechnics on completion of the course in December.

This is the third course of its kind to complete since its inception in January 1978 and is continuing to make a substantial contribution to the Higher Technician manpower requirements in Kenya.

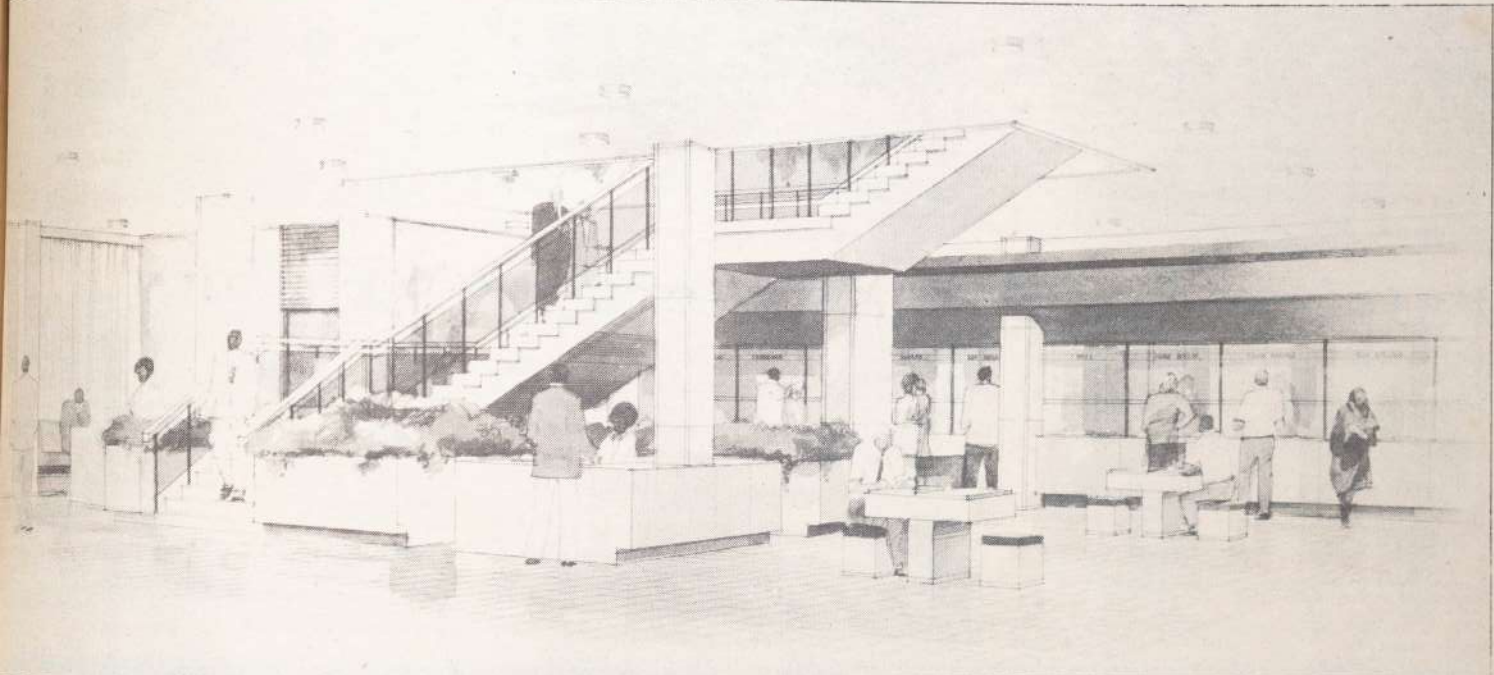

The new sophisticated, fully air conditioned, and much more spacious Barclays Bank celebrated its 50th anniversary

Barclays Are Part Of Mombasa's History ...

MYSTERY has tended to cling to the history of Mombasa — and so has the operations of the Barclays Bank which is part of the old history of Mombasa.

For many years the exact date when the Bank began its operations on this island embraced by the Indian Ocean remained unsolved and continued to defy many who attempted to trace its history.

It is an historical fact that major industries, factories and even communication infrastructures all over the world have begun along the coastal areas.

Mombasa was no exception. And so it came to pass that the first operations of the Barclays Bank in Kenya began in Mombasa through a fore-runner bank during World War I.

Laying claim to accuracy, it can now be told that the first premises of what later became to be known as Barclays Bank was established along the former Vasco Da Gama Road in Kibokoni, between 1915 and 1917, on a place where today stands a three storey building.

The choice of the location was no accident: a few yards from the

old Mombasa Port which was then the nerve-centre of business operations and transactions in Mombasa.

Indeed, many firms and banks along the present Nkrumah Road are an extension of the old Mombasa Port and form an important part of the history of Mombasa.

The Bank was then moved to what is now known as the Treasury Square in 1925. The passage of time has been very lenient to this building, which today still stands proudly a few yards from the Commercial Bank

of Kenya.

In 1932 the Bank moved to its present premises along Nkrumah Road. Records show that the new premises were built at a total cost of K.Shs. one million — a substantial amount of money by any standards and considerably less than the cost of the recent changes.

After over 60 years of operations, the bank now boasts of about 130 staff at the Nkrumah Branch alone, and about 200 including other branches at the Coast.

Branches in Mombasa include a

branch along Kilindini and a Bureau De Change serving the tourist market six days a week between 9a.m. and 5p.m.

A new and modern branch has been operating in Malindi, serving the local as well as the tourist market. The extensive alterations to the Bank's main branch in Mombasa is by no means an isolated case.

IMPROVEMENTS

It is just one of many improvements and extensions to Barclays branches throughout of the country and part of a

massive development plan the Bank has seen the opening of new branches in the rural areas and major extensions and improvements in many others varying from internal facilities to construction of new buildings.

As of now Barclays Bank of Kenya has some 60 offices in all the principal urban centres and throughout the coastline from Homa Bay to Malindi and Garissa to Nairobi.

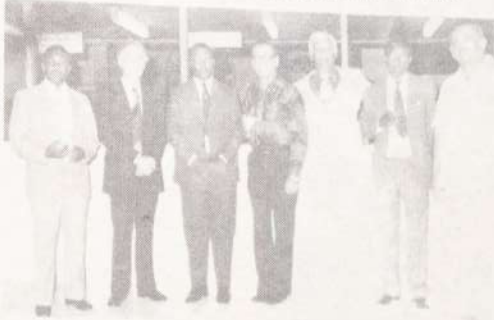

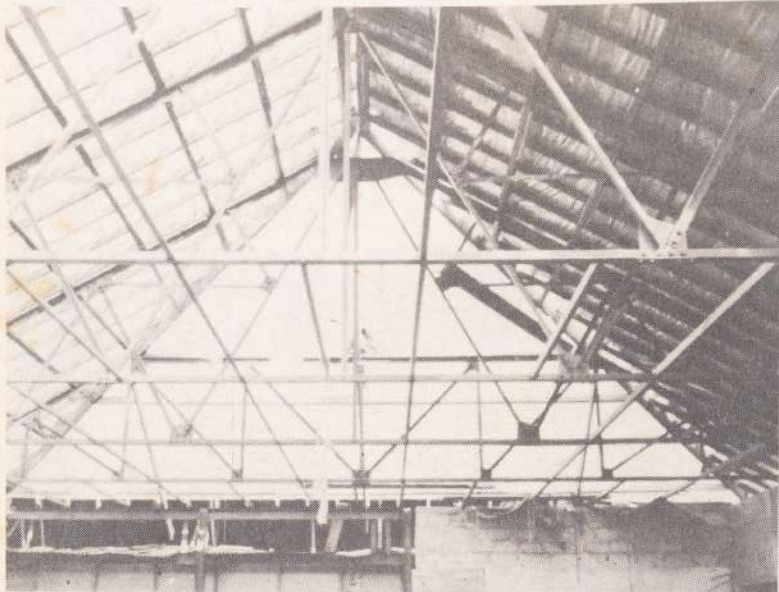

Muljibhai and Partners Construction Co. (main contractors); Civicon Limited (steel works); Power Engineering International (electrical contractors); Dibeco Limited (air conditioning); Afro Italian Co. (counter facings and floors); Secularms Limited (security systems) and Jetty Botschinsky (wall mural).

In consultation with the bank, it was decided that construction work be completed in six phased operations which involved the moving of existing counters and desks to temporary positions.

TWO FLOORS

Inside, a whole new floor was added enabling the banking hall to extend to two floors. This entailed a mammoth operation of lifting the original 50 ft. span steel roof trusses by six feet to allow headroom for the extended first floor. The steel trusses in the original buildings were taken down, cleaned and bolted together, and on them was found the makers mark and shipping instructions. Said Nick Carter, a senior partner with Covell Matthews "they have been there

for 50 years and remain as good as new."

The mangalore tiles, which have also been there for 50 years, remain on the roof.

The bank was so solidly built with 18 inch walls made from Mazeras stone chippings, that both ends of the pneumatic drill broke when some of the masonry had to be demolished. The work done laborously by hand used cold steel chisels.

Problems also arose over the traditional hardwood panelled and moulded doors. Said Mr. Carter "they had been taken out and carefully stored, for we had intended to re-fix them in a new position." He went on "to our horror we found that fundis had cut off the bottom part to fit them into the opening and had spoiled the proportions of these beautifully designed doors. We were in a panic."

However, luck was on their side for the son of the carpenter who had made the doors 50 years ago was found still living in Mombasa's Old Town.

Said Mr. Carter "it was quite fantastic, for after we had explained our problem he just went over to a shelf and picked up the original drawings which his father had made of these doors." The father, Purshotam Velji, died two years ago but had seen the start of re-development work on Barclays Bank.

His son was able to make replica doors from these plans, which fitted perfectly.

As re-development work got under way so counters had to be moved around and temporary ones set up. Said Mr. Tony Farr Barclays branch manager "we received tremendous co-operation from the staff throughout who for two years had to work under very difficult conditions. They had seen an artists impression of their new bank which had inspired them all, and despite many inconveniences, kept the bank operating efficiently throughout."

The interior is certainly one of the coolest places in town with central air-conditioning and air handlers on each floor.

The bank's exterior facade has not changed at all. At both

ends of the building remain which, in those days, had contained the drinking fountain.

In a tribute to the Mombasa Municipal Council, Mr. Carter said it had been quite fortunate the way in which it had been able to lay its hands on plans submitted 50 years ago.

Interior wall paneling, counters and floors are simulated marble produced by Afro Italian Company in Mombasa. The pre-cast concrete staircase, erected by Civicon just two days, has simulated marble steps at the top of which is a huge papier mache wall relief by the Coast's well known artist, Jetty Botschinsky depicting a coastal scene of Mombasa Island with lateran bui-bui, a dhow, palm trees and a cathedral.

The original building plans were approved by the late Municipal Engineer, J. D. Robinson in November 1931 while the architect commissioned by Barclays Bank (Dominion, Colonial and Overseas) was Harold E. Henderson, FRIBA, of Nairobi and Mombasa. The steel work was designed and supplied by Kelvin Construction Company of Glasgow, and the main contractor and painter was Purshotam Velji of Mombasa.

HIDDEN WELL

While the re-development was taking place, a 60-70 lb pot was re-discovered by a contractor's labourer who accidentally fell into it complete with bucket and spade. He was hauled out, dusty and bewildered, but otherwise intact.

In 1978 Barclays Bank of Kenya Limited asked Covell Matthews Partnership to submit proposals for a major increase in the area of the building to accommodate some 90 extra staff without closing the premises to the banking business.

Mr. T. D. Miles, Managing Director, specially requested the architects to retain the external character of the building as far as possible and, at the same time, to bring the internal banking facilities up to modern day standards.

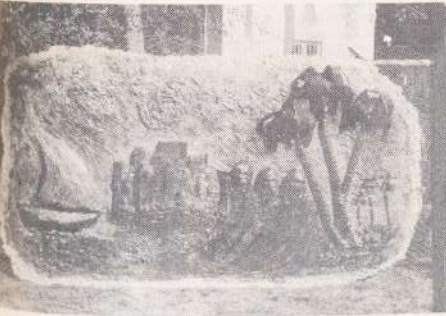

WIE IN DIANI EIN PARADIES ENTSTAND

MIT DER Eröffnung des Diani Paradise Hotels wird die reichhaltige Palette der Hotelangebote an der Südküste noch um eine andere Art erweitert.

Die Idee zu diesem Projekt entstand in der Annahme, daß hier noch eine Marktlücke zu füllen sei. Nach einer Bauzeit von 14 Monaten offeriert nun das Diani Paradise 50 Betten in klimatisierten Zimmern.

Im Ebony Grill im Zentrum des Hotels werden neben der internationalen Küche lokale Spezialitäten serviert. Auf dem Hotelgelände von über zwei Hektaren gibt es auch einen Swimming Pool mit Umkleidekabinen und Toiletten sowie reichlich Parkplätze, ferner eine Boutique und die Peponi Pub and Snackbar, die den ganzen Tag geöffnet ist.

KAVIRONDOMATTEN

In der Bamboo Disco mischt Big Silas am Schallpult die zündende Musik. Kavirondomatten wurden zu wunderschönen Mustern zusammengestellt. Mit etwas Erfindungsgeist kann man mit ganz einfachen Mitteln eine hervorragende Wirkung erzielen. Für die Möbel und Dekoration in der Bamboo Disco wurde natürlich viel Bambus verwendet. Das gesamte Mobiliar wurde eigens zum afrikanischen Baustil des Hotels passend kreiert. Die Innendekoration mit hohem künstlerischem Niveau stammt von Interior Design Limited in Nairobi.

Die Gartenanlage wurde von dem erfahrenen und bekanntesten Schweizer Gartenbau-Fachmann Rene Haller aus Bamburi gestaltet.

der schon viele andere Hotelgärten an der Küste verschönert hat. Bei der Bauplanung wurde sorgfältig darauf geachtet, keine Bäume zu fällen und die natürliche Umgebung harmonisch miteinzubeziehen.

EIN ausgesprochener Schlangenfrend ist Michael Werikha, der sich als begeisterter Reptilienforscher betätigt. Bernabe wäre dieses Interview vorzeitig beendet worden, als er plötzlich aus seinem Plastikack eine braune Hausschlange hervorholte!

Michael arbeitet bei AVA — einer Fabrik in Daangwame, in der über 30 verschiedene Marken von Autos zusammengesetzt werden — wo er die Nachhunde der Firma betreut. Sein Enthusiasmus für Reptilien wirkt offenbar ansteckend: sein Arbeitsgeber stellte ihm drei Käfige für seine Schlangen zur Verfügung. Manchmal kriechen darin 20 Exemplare herum, im Moment allerdings nur zwei, denn Michael gibt die Tiere jeweils dem Schlangepark in Nairobi, der sie dankbar entgegennimmt.

Michael stellte fest, daß viele seiner Arbeitskollegen ihre Furcht vor Schlangen verlieren, als sie mehr über diese Kriechtiere und ihre Gewohnheiten erfahren. Sie sind nun nicht mehr so wild darauf, jede Schlange zu töten, sondern rufen Michael, damit er sie entlarft.

Die Schlangen sind auf jeden Fall besser als ihr Ruf. Sie haben eine wichtige Funktion in der Natur zu erfüllen und sorgen dafür, daß die Flotten, Mäuse, Maulwürfe und Kanariel in Schach gehalten werden. Michael glaubt, daß Schlangen grundsätzlich nicht angreifen, außer wenn sie sich in die Erde graben oder bedrückt fühlen. Ihr Gift dient in erster Linie zur Verdauung ihrer Beute und wird nur als Verteidigung gegen den Menschen gerichtet.

Unterrichtsobjekt

Michael ist in Mombasa geboren und ging hier zur Schule. Sein Lehrer brachte ihm das Wissen einer Grasschlange mit als Unterrichtsobjekt. Michael war schon immer fasziniert von Reptilien und besuchte oft den Schlangepark in Nairobi. Er lernte dort den Karate kennen, der ihn zeigte, wie man Schlangen identifiziert und die giftigen von den ungefährlichen unterscheidet. Michael half bei der Pflege der kranken Schlangen und reangie die zentrale Graben, in der sich mehr als 20 verschiedene Arten von Reptilien befinden.

Er bewies großes Geschick beim Umgang mit Schlangen und fing auch Edelstein in der Umgebung von Nairobi. Er fied mehrmals in den Nairobi-Büff, bevor er den gelang, eine kleine Python zu fangen.

In Mombasa liegt er einige Schlangen, die in Schulkolatorien gehalten wurden. Das Interesse der Schüler war so groß, daß sie einen Schlangengarten gründeten. Unter Michael's Leitung lernten die Mitglieder, die Tiere zu identifizieren. Es gibt verhältnismäßig nur wenige giftige Schlangen, die meisten sind harmlos.

In Malindi arbeitete Michael eine Zeitlang als Schlangenfänger für einen Deutschen, der Reptilien an Zoologischen und Tiergärten in Europa exportierte. Manchmal fing er an einem Tag acht Schlangen. Er fand God und die Gegend am Südküste am ausgefallen.

Schlangenforscher

Michael besuchte auch Mark Esterbrook, den berühmten "Schlangensammler" von Malindi, und war ein seiner privaten Kollektionen teil bewirbt.

Bereits im Alter von 7 Jahren hatte Michael eine Sammlung von Reptilien, die aus Agamen, Edelstein, Affen und anderen Kriechtieren, Phantasie, Vögeln, Chamäleon und Schlangen bestand. Er fand fast heraus, daß alle diese Tiere bei intensiver Beobachtung verständig und intelligent sind.

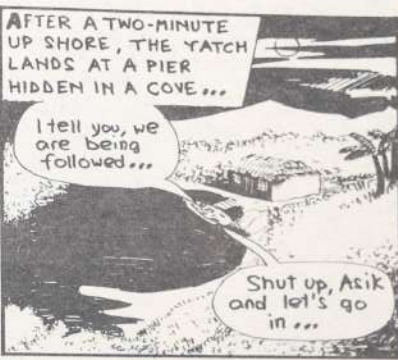

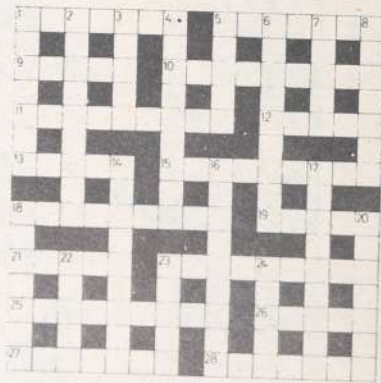

THE place for rally drivers this weekend is Eldoret, when David Morgan of the Western Kenya Motor Club offers the Raymonds Rally.

The sponsors, in addition to financing the event, allow their factory premises to be used for the briefing of controllers, the pre-event scrutineering, drivers briefing, start and finish of the rally. Rally headquarters are based at the factory, who provide refreshments for officials, competitors and their service crews.

The organisers were issuing route notes for the first leg, some 300km. long, as soon as entry forms (and fees) were received, allowing crews the opportunity of trying out the route and writing their own pace notes.

Included in the first leg is the Fluorspar Hillclimb special stage. Cars are to set off at three minute intervals, and are times to a flying finish. The record for the stage was set by Rob Collinge in 1980, when he clocked 15 minutes 21.8 seconds.

According to the route notes, the stage is 19.97Km. long, so the average speed works out at 78 kph; an indication of both the slope and the number of hairpin bends that confront the drivers.

Mombasa Motor Club will be represented by John Hellier and John Hope in the Datsun Turbo, a crew that will be going for a win. With only the Jamhuri and Rift rallies to be run before the season ends in March, Hellier is a few points behind leader Jayant Shah, while Hope tops the navigator table, ahead of Mike Dougherty.

Adrian Bell has been invited to navigate for Guy Bromley. Earlier this year Bromley and Bell brought their Toyota Corolla back to the finish of the Marlboro Safari Rally, very satisfied with their 13th overall position, and second in class.

Monday saw the start of the 13th Ivory Coast Rally. Formally known as the Bandama, this event has much in common with Kenya's Safari Rally. Both are 5,000 kilometres in length, have sponsorship from Marlboro, and are included in the World Championship.

Among those taking part are Guy Freuquin (Peugeot), who holds the lead in Drivers Championship, and Ari Vatane (Ford) who is close on his heels. Among the list of likely winners of this weeks rally is Shekhar Mehta in a Datsun; Bjorn Waldegaard, this year behind the wheel of a Toyota Celica; Timo Salonen (Datsun), Eklund (Toyota), Ari Vatane (Escort) and Guy Freuquin (Peugeot).

More and more manufacturers are turning to the turbo-charged engines to squeeze out the maximum available horsepower, and the entry list for the Ivory Coast Rally includes Turbos from Peugeot and Mitsubishi.

The 1981 glamour car of Europe's rallies is the Audi Quattro, that gave such an impressive win in the Monte Carlo. The grape-vine hinted for weeks before the Safari that a Quattro would be at the start. The ability of keeping the Quattro in one piece on African roads will be put to the test this week by the local team of Choteau and Burel.

The range of machinery is impressive, among the 57 starters are one Alpine Renault, several Porsches, a Datsun 260Z and a Peugeot 104.

The organisers have stressed their efforts to improve the safety aspect of the event. After

last years run, several drivers commented on the difference between rallying in West and East Africa.

The average bus/truck/matu driver in Kenya, when confronted with a brightly painted car, ablaze with lights, will come to the conclusion that a rally is coming his way, and then expects to meet others also in a hurry at approximately two minute intervals.

His Ivory Coast counterpart, with less exposure to rallying,

takes the line "small someone late for the start and then presses on with the "middle of the road" approach. This means that tall men have as many hairy moments as the rally leader.

The rally is being run this year on narrower tracks which will reduce the high average speed of the event, which previously suited large cars and allowed Mercedes to take the first four places in 1977.

Looking further ahead, the second Himalayan Rally starts in Bombay on November 1st with Kenya's Ramesh Krishna and Aslam Khan leading the field in a Datsun. Ashok Bhat and Gurbux Singh have been invited to India to assist in the organisation of this event which has applied for inclusion in the World Championship Calendar.

The 1980 event made headlines for the common response set off by public opponents who objected to the rally being staged.

Stories of road blocks and cars being attacked in club waving attacks made overseas crews wary of coming back for a second attempt; one Kenyan navigator referred to the event as "The Indian Mutiny" after he had to fight off one attacker who attempted to climb in through a broken rear window.

Public reaction of this sort does allow extra awards in addition to the usual "Meritorious Award", as organisers could consider medals for distinguished acts of bravery in the face of the enemy.

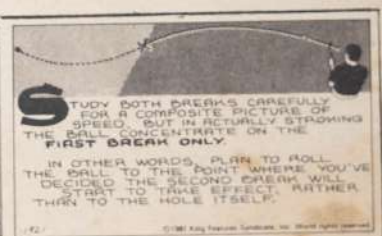
For Jaffery 'B' Mohamed Kassamali (3 for 25), Sohail (2 for 27) and Asger (2 for 31) bowled well.

Title winners will represent coast in the national league next year along with Feisal and Lake Warriors.

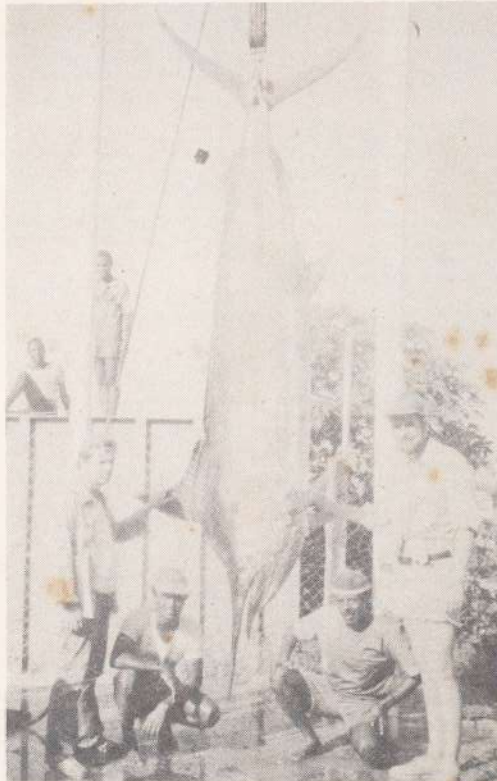
