

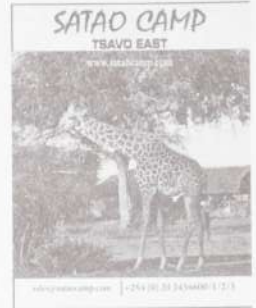

The final exhibitors' meeting is scheduled for 26th August 2016 at 2.00pm at the showground.

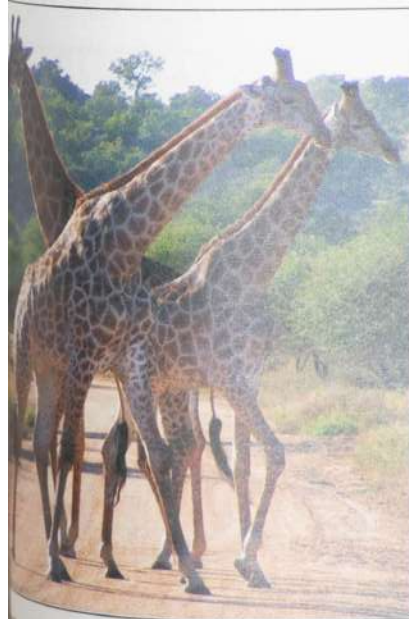

GIRAFFE EXPORT

SOUTH AFRICA TRANSLOCATE 63 CAPE GIRAFFE TO CHINA



ZHENGZHOU China (Xinhua) -- Airlift comprising a total of 63 two-year-old Cape giraffes - including 23 male and 40 female - from Johannesburg, South Africa, have all landed safely in Zhengzhou after 21 hours flight.

They will receive a 45-day quarantine in Qinyang City of Henan before being displayed to the public.

The South African giraffe or Cape giraffe (*Giraffa camelopardalis giraffa*) is a subspecies of giraffe native to Southern Africa. It ranges from South Africa, Namibia, Botswana, Zimbabwe, Mozambique.

It has rounded or blotched spots, some with star-like extensions on a light tan background, running down to the hooves.

In 2010, it was estimated that a maximum of 12,000 South African giraffes are living in the wild, and around 45 are being kept in captivity.

South African giraffes are not a threatened species, as their population is increasing whilst their northernmost relatives are threatened by poaching and habitat loss.

Coast Tightens Security As High Season Begins

MOMBASA (Xinhua)
—Authorities announced elaborate security measures in the tourism resorts in Mombasa as high season kicked off in August.

According to tourism stakeholders, bookings for hotels at the Coast are increasing with the onset of the August season, giving hope to the recovery of the tourism sector.

Coast Regional Coordinator Nelson Marwa told journalists in Mombasa that the police have increased patrols at key

installations that might be targeted by Al-Shabaab group.

Marwa said more security officers will be deployed during the Mombasa international show, cultural festivals, and among others activities lined up in Mombasa this month.

"We have mapped areas likely to be prone to attacks and attached more officers. Our intelligence team has increased information gathering to deal with Al-Shabaab threats," Marwa said.

His remarks came the East African bloc, the Inter-Governmental Authority on Development (IGAD), warned that Al-Shabaab group is

plotting major attacks in East Africa.

IGAD said that the militant group has grown and expanded its aspirations, operations and aims, and is preparing to wage a long war in East Africa.

In a report published early this week, IGAD labeled the military group as now a "transnational" organization projecting threats of extremist violence far beyond Somalia.

"Even if Al-Shabaab were to be defeated tomorrow, I think it has inspired a generation of jihadists from across the region, from different countries, who are likely to continue," said Matt Bryden, a director and senior analyst for the Sahar Foundation, which

conducted IGAD's regional study on Al-Shabaab.

Bryden warned that if the threat from the insurgent group is to be countered, regional countries have to attack the group's bases inside Somalia, where plots are orchestrated.

"Seizing their bases disrupts their administration and sources of revenue. They will be busy as fugitives, hiding, and cannot execute all the plots inside and outside the country," he said.

Kenya's tourism has suffered a decline the number of tourists arriving since September 2011 when the Al-Shabaab carried out the kidnappings of tourists in the Lamu archipelago.

The East African nation's coastal towns are the backbone of the country's

thriving tourism industry, which has been hit by the fear of terror attacks and the kidnapping of foreigners.

The Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers and Caterers (KAHC), said hotel occupancy in the region is expected to go up to 60 percent from the 10 percent that most hotels recorded between May and June.

"International and domestic tourists have made

reservations for holiday packages, we expect domestic tourism to rise because of the calm witnessed due to improved security," KAHC CEO Stan Ikwake said.

Ikwake said hotels are also counting on the regional travel advisories by key markets of the British and France, which are expected to boost international arrivals into the country.

Modern Thika Highway Delighting Central And Stimulating Business

English Wangui NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Before the Kenyan government mooted planning to expand Thika Road in 2009, commuters would waste hours on traffic gridlock.

Commuters wished for the road to be traffic free so that they would not waste time and fuel. The completion of the 50km road that links Nairobi and Thika town of Thika, Kenya, has since acquired the Thika Super Highway, a road that has changed fortunes. Thika super-highway was one of the major projects that showcased the close China-Kenya relationship, which has continued to grow on the back of converging interests in infrastructure, innovation and natural resources.

Chinese companies are preferred by the Kenyan government because of their competitive pricing, workmanship and their ability to complete the projects according to schedule or even ahead of time.

Apartment buildings have also mushroomed along the highway as people take advantage of the changed circumstances.

Peter Kang'aru said if it were not for the super highway, his small piece of land in Roysambu would still be lying idle.

"After completion of the highway, I seized the golden opportunities that came with the road and constructed and put up two bedroom apartments from which I earn a cumulative amount of 1,000 U.S. dollars per month," he said.

Six years ago, the then two-lane traffic-clogged road was not ideal for investment.

Its upgrading changed the landscape of the area, eased access and spurred property development.

The highway has boosted business growth and helped expand the Kenyan economy.

It has helped link Kenya to Ethiopia, a major regional economy with about 80 million

Online Radicalism Poses Different Threat to Youth Over The School Holidays Suggests Securex Chief Operating Officer Daniel Lemmer

The much-awaited school holidays are often seen as an opportunity for families to reunite with their children after months of separation.

What is often not given much thought is the safety and security implications surrounding these young children and teenagers while they are away from school.

With crime trends being dynamic, the youth are increasingly exposed to new threats that often go undetected until it is too late.

Mobile phones and internet usage have increased the youth's vulnerability to influence by external sources, thus increasing the likelihood of radicalism tenfold.

Intelligence gathered from media and crime reports over the past year have indicated that the internet and social media, in particular, have become definite conduits for the passing of radical content, with extremists finding it an easier means to put their ideas across to a wider populace.

According to Securex Chief Operating Officer Daniel Lemmer, the use of the internet as a means to radicalize the youth has been a feature of terrorist activity for

over a decade now.

However, this phenomenon has particularly gained traction in East Africa over the last five years or so.

"Terrorism-related content has been available online for a while now, but as these extremist groups borrow heavily from one

another, of course when they feel that the time is right. Beyond this, more forms of control can be exercised. Access to the internet could be controlled through the amount of airtime or internet bundles purchased, or restricting mobile phone use to only certain times of the day.

It is also important to know whether your child is active on Social Media, and what kind of information they interact with when they are online.

Mr. Lemmer also feels that the war on terror may well be won or lost online with the curbing of the spread of extremist ideas. Currently it has proven difficult for governments or Social Media networks to clamp down on this as they are sometimes reliant on

themselves, of course when they feel that the time is right.

third-party reports or complaints before suspending or blocking an offensive Social Media user, at which point one would simply open a different Social Media account and continue with their activity.

In February 2016 for instance, Twitter announced that it had blocked over 125,000 accounts since mid-2015, and while this is certainly commendable, radicalism online still persists.

"What we are perhaps struggling to contain at the moment is the spread of these ideas, and their appeal to our youth. It is all well and good to kill a member of the Al-Shabaab for instance, but it is infinitely more difficult to kill an idea. These beliefs live on, and they keep spreading online, and we need to be on guard against this."

another, the Al Shabaab here in East Africa have become quite proficient at its use.

"It is now easier to clamp down on recruitment cells in mosques and other physical locations, but we have found it more difficult as security agencies to battle extremism online.

More often than not Social Media platforms such as Twitter and Facebook are used to first reach out to potential recruits before then roping these recruits to secure private messaging applications to enhance one-on-one engagement.

"While it has proven difficult to control extremist content online, on a domestic level it is possible to control what our youth are exposed to whenever they are online.

"Most guardians feel that radicalism cannot affect their children, so they become pretty lax when it comes to monitoring them.

"Many do not realize until it is too late, as was the case with a 14-year old boy who was arrested by the police in October 2015 after being exposed to radicalism by an Al Shabaab recruitment cell that was operating here in Nairobi."

With most children at home for the holidays, the chances of their safety being compromised when interacting online are significantly higher.

Peer pressure does drive the youth to the use of smart phones and engaging on Social Media, and guardians are often even unaware that their children have mobile phones or that they engage in Social Media.

It is therefore advisable for guardians to even buy their children a mobile phone

KENYA TO RATIFY GLOBAL MARITIME DEAL TO PREVENT 'ILLEGAL' FISHING

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Kenya has launched the process of ratifying an international maritime deal to help deter illegal fishing. Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries Cabinet Secretary Willy Bett said ratification of the Port State Measures Agreement (PSMA) will help curb an escalation of transnational and organized criminal networks engaged in illegal, unregulated and unreported (IUU) fishing.

"We have set an Inter-Agency committee to spearhead this process since IUU fishing is a serious global problem," Bett said in a statement issued in Nairobi on Friday.

Bett said that fish are valuable commodity that is capable of spurring economic development with a view to meeting the country's Vision 2030.

IUU fishing is causing economic losses to global economies and is estimated that catches representing some 11-26 million tons of seafood valued at some 10-23.5 billion U.S. dollars are being lost annually.

In Kenya, it is estimated that the country is losing 100 million dollars annually besides undermining resource conservation, food security and livelihoods and destabilizing vulnerable coasts.

Bett revealed that the move that is expected to enable Kenya join the global initiative in fighting IUU fishing has been principally domesticated in the Fisheries Management and Development Bill, which has passed through the National Parliament.

"These regional and international efforts will deny vessels engaged in IUU fishing from using ports and landing their catches to national and international markets," Bett revealed.

He said that by implementing the PSMA, the financial gains that flow to illegal actors could be recaptured by the Kenya Government and local fishing communities.

"The PSMA provides a unique opportunity to harmonize and strengthen port State controls in Kenya and around the globe," he added.

Kenya signed the PSMA in November 2010 expressing its intent of ratifying the agreement, but has not yet ratified the instrument as required.

The country has already constructed a Monitoring, Control and Surveillance center in Mombasa and are in the process of installing the Vessel Monitoring System.

The country has also established an Inter-agency Committee which is already implementing the regional and national obligations using the Standard Operating Procedures for inspection and boarding.

"We are now in the process of purchasing an offshore patrol vessel and a number of compliance inspectors have been trained," Bett added.

TANZANIA IS LOSING MILLIONS WITHOUT FISH SURVEILLANCE

DAR ES SALAAM Tanzania (Xinhua) -- Tanzanian authorities has said the country was losing millions of U.S. dollars due to lack of surveillance boats and weak maritime governance in the Indian Ocean and other water bodies.

Harrison Mwakymbe, the Minister for Justice and Constitutional Affairs, said Tanzanian waters in the Indian Ocean were exposed to illegal fishing, illicit flow of imports and exports of fish products and toxic dumping conducted by large foreign companies.

He said these problems remained persistent despite the country being a member of the International Maritime Organization (IMO), a United Nation's organ dealing with maritime matters.

The minister was inaugurating a newly established Maritime Law Association of Tanzania (MLAT) in the commercial capital Dar es Salaam.

However, Mwakymbe did not reveal the exact amount the country was losing from illegal fishing caused by lack of patrol boats.

He appealed to the private sector to intervene, saying their current participation in marine resources participation was minimal.

"The government needs the support of the private sector and professional bodies like MLAT," said Mwakymbe.

He said all major economies of the world have formed Maritime Law Associations and they have been registered under the Committee of Maritime International (CMI) established since 1980 as an umbrella organ for the associations.

He added that their major role was, among other things, to promote the study and the advancement of maritime and mercantile law.

Ibrahim Bendera, MALT acting president, said the association will assist the government to improve and appropriately develop maritime laws and help the courts in handling maritime cases.

Kenya's Prepare For 17th Convention On International Trade In 'Endangered Species Of Wild Fauna And Flora'

KWS Nairobi -- Kenya's preparations for forthcoming 17th meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES CoP17) have entered the homestretch.

This follows completion of Kenya's consultative preparation process through a national multi-agency CITES Technical committee and subsequent submission on 27 April 2016, of proposals for consideration at the conference.

In total, Kenya has submitted fourteen (14) proposals covering a wide range of wild species, including the African elephant,

African Pangolins, species of snakes endemic to Kenya, the thresher Sharks, species of chameleons, plant species and others on measures to combat illegal wildlife trafficking.

These proposals, together with others submitted by other Parties to the Convention, have since been uploaded on the CITES website www.cites.org in readiness for discussion as

agenda items of the triennial World Wildlife Conference in Johannesburg, South Africa from 24 September to 5 October 2016 at the Sandton Convention Centre.

Over 180 proposals are lined up for discussion as agenda items of the Conference of the Parties that will bring together 182 States that are Parties to the Convention.

The Parties will take critical decisions on wildlife trade policy and the scope of regulatory control over international trade in specific wild species.

As part of Kenya's roadmap to Johannesburg, the Cabinet Secretary for Environment and Natural Resources Prof Judi Wakhungu this week convened a two-day retreat in Naivasha for the National CITES Technical committee to review and develop a country position on all items.

The committee brings together experts from the Ministry of Environment and Natural Resources, Kenya Wildlife Service, National Museums of Kenya, Kenya Forest Service, Kenya Forestry Research Institute, Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs State Department of Fisheries and Blue Economy

and representatives of Conservation Alliance of Kenya, an umbrella body bringing together more than 50 NGOs.

Meanwhile, plans are under way to convene a briefing session for national stakeholders, including members of the Parliamentary Committee on Environment and Natural Resources ahead of the conference.

Kenya remains committed to playing its rightful role in ensuring that international trade in endangered species of wild animals and plants does not threaten their survival in the wild.

That is why it is lobbying and persuading Parties to the CITES Convention to ensure discussions of the proposals before the CoP17 bear this intention in mind.

It is therefore critically important that Parties to CITES adopt the proposals submitted by Kenya, key among them the five complementary proposals on African elephant submitted by Kenya and other Parties under the framework of the African Elephant Coalition calling for decisive action to ban trade in elephants and elephant ivory to save the species from imminent extinction.

Tanzania Drive To Fight Illegal Fishing Gear In Lake Victoria

ARUSHA Tanzania (Xinhua) -- Tanzania on Thursday announced new operation to crackdown illegal fishing gears in Lake Victoria, Africa's largest fresh-water lake.

The move is part of the government's efforts to revamp fish stock in the lake, which in recent years had been plummeting due to increasing number of unfriendly fishing gears. Charles Tizeba, Tanzanian Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Fisheries, said the operation will involve burning all illegal fishing gears such as fish nets that are not allowed for fishing.

"This exercise involves all the security organs including police, who are fully armed and use speed boats," the minister said, urging people who are behind illegal fishing in the lake to voluntarily and immediately hand over illegal fishing tools.

He also called upon government officials to perform their duties properly. "I will fire staff under my ministry who fail to prevent illegal fishing in their areas, and we will conduct an operation of listing illegal fishermen village to village."

The minister also received three patrol boats issued by the Tanzania's Ministry of Water and Irrigation for strengthening security in the lake.

Operation Census: Kenyans were gearing up Friday night for the 1979 population census which was estimated to cost KSh 45 million. In Mombasa, projected to have about 413,000 residents, all bars, restaurants and nightspots were to close at 5.00 p.m. to facilitate the exercise and allow people to be counted at home.

According to the 1979 Kenya Population Census Guide, the 1969 census showed that Kenya's population was just under eleven million and growing at a rate of 3.3 per cent each year, the highest rate in the world.

'YOUTH CENTER' HELPING MERU COMMUNITY TACKLE SOCIAL ILLS

MERU (Xinhua) — A group of youth are seeking to change perception and attitude on social ills in east Kenya's Meru County, where the populations are largely struggling with high levels of drug abuse among youth, and teenage pregnancies.

The 30-member Family Health Options Kenya Meru Youth Center capitalizes on the people's way of life to create awareness on the pertinent issues affecting the youth.

For six years, they have been sensitizing local community, and they have seen minimal change but the call for better lives for the youth still continues.

"Life is terrible in the rural areas," said Christine Kuri, a member from the center, in a recent interview. "Girls become

pregnant at a very early age because they have to engage in sex to get money."

Kuri said the school going children are the most vulnerable to drug abuse due to the prevailing unfavourable life conditions which pushes them to find an alternative.

"In a school you will find children from the miraa merchants. They are rich. On the other hand, there are those who come from the poorest of the poor families. This combined with peer pressure drives the youth into drugs as they seek to gain some balance with their colleagues," Kuri said.

The Center draws membership mainly from schools and 15 years is the minimum age limit for joining.

Once one attains 24 years, he or she becomes a peer counselor for below age fellow youths.

According to Kuri, persistent awareness on retrogressive traditions could save the girls in the area from early marriages.

"Parents need to know the importance of investing in education of girls rather than marrying them off soon as they are done with primary education," she observed.

Further addressing issues of poverty could significantly tackle problems of high prevalence of teenage pregnancies and widespread substance abuse.

"We partner with other organizations such as the Kenya Red Cross to educate the communities on sexual reproductive health and maternal health as well as encourage people to go for cancer screening," said Kuri.

The Kenya Demographic and Health Survey shows that at least 15 percent of the young girls aged 15 to 19 are mothers.

Members of the public watched as the MV Ever Delight containerized ship sailed through past Mama Ngina Drive at the port of Mombasa. This is the longest containerized ship with a length of 296 meters long loaded with more than 100 hundred containers to dock at the port of Mombasa after the recent dredging of the channel and the ship turning.

New Record Set At Port Of Mombasa

A NEW record performance has recently been registered at the port of Mombasa by a Container ship that handled 852 Twenty Foot Equivalent Units (TEUs) in less than an eight hour-shift.

Evergreen Shipping Line vessel Mv. Cape Maas reported her first sling on Sunday at 2320 Hours and remained busy moored alongside berth No 18 until Wednesday when she recorded her last sling at 1940 Hours.

The gearless vessel with a length overall of 212.6 meters and a breadth of 32.4 meters recorded 3,228 cumulative moves in 51.34 hours.

She posted her best performance on the third shift using three Ship to Shore Gantries where she registered 116 berth moves per hour.

The Colombian registered ship has a total capacity of 2,800 TEUs, a gross tonnage of 35,708 and a declared draft of 12.5 metres.

Built in 2011, the ship has 506 refer plug points (338 plugs on deck and 168 plugs in cargo hold).

She regularly calls at the port of Mombasa Monthly flying a Marshall Islands flag.

Her last port of call was Majuro in the Marshall Islands.

The record shift performance by the cellular vessel now shatters that of 755 moves set

recently by the largest ever container vessel to call at the port.

Maersk Shipping Line vessel, Mv. Clemens Schulle which also worked with three Ship to Shore Gantries recorded the impressive performance during her second shift.

The celebrated vessel had recorded 3397 cumulative moves in 48.91 hours.

Following the announcement of the new record a senior port official commended the container operations team for the job well done and urged the team to ensure sustainability.

The same sentiments have been echoed by the Ship's Agent Gulf Badr operations Manager Amr Mostafa.

In a communication to KPA, Mostafa said the Evergreen Shipping Line had enhanced its operations since January and was looking forward to becoming the best caller at the port of Mombasa.

Meanwhile 20 general cargo and seven container vessels had called at the port of Mombasa in the following week.

The Container carriers discharged 8500 TEUs (loaded and

empty) and loaded another 10,131 TEUs.

At the Conventional cargo section, a total of 208,838 metric tonnes were handled at an average of 29,834 metric tonnes per day.

Motor-car imports accounted for 3,614 units with an average of 516 units per vessel.

Bulk Clinker imports from five vessels recorded 124,879 to lead in the list of non-containerised commodities followed by bulk wheat which accounted for 26,526 metric tonnes.

Other notable imports were 22,016 metric tonnes of bulk fertilizer, 7,682 metric tonnes of steel, and 1,272 metric tonnes of assorted general cargo.

The total yard container population by the close of the week stood at 12,800 TEUs down from 13,580 registered during the previous week.

There were 4766 TEUs awaiting pickup order, 1778 TEUs ready for collection and 2066 TEUs full exports (nominated/un-nominated).

There were 459 TEUs for Transhipment, 2601 TEUs empties and 1130 TEUs at the Customs Warehouse.

Deliveries of container the port during the week review by road and rail accounted for 6,899 T 291 TEUs respectively.

Local Containerisees recorded 3,198 TEL transit bound account 4,163 TEUs with Ugar maintaining the lead in TEUs.

Other transit markets were South Sudan 1 TEUs, Rwanda with 2 Democratic Republic and Tanzania with 2 and 205 TEUs respect

The next fortnight conventional cargo handle 333,817 metric imports and 4080 met of exports.

The Container co handled 5359 TEUs in 5818 TEUs exports.

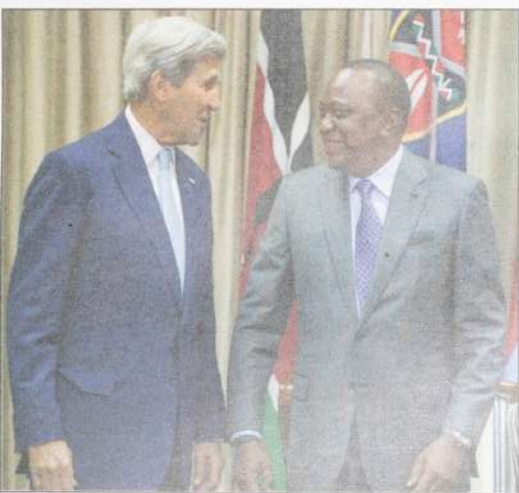

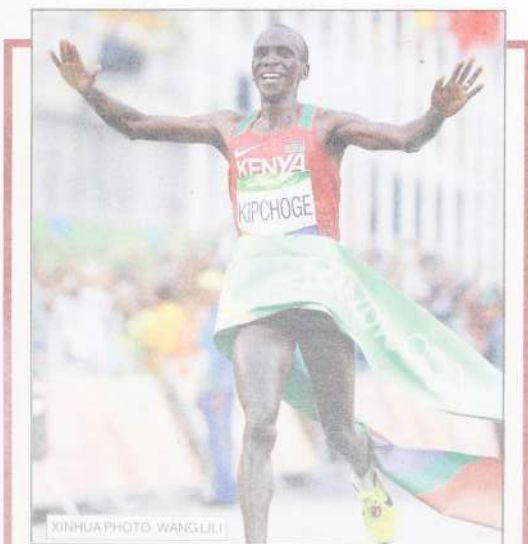

Strict New Tobacco Regulation To Take Effect In October

NAIROBI (Xinhua) -- Kenya's health ministry said on Tuesday that the new tobacco control regulation will come into force from October 2016.

Once the regulation comes into force, the East African nation will for the first time be able to implement the long-awaited graphic health warnings.

"The global evidence show that graphic health warnings are much more effective at encouraging smokers to quit and deterring youth from starting," said the Director of Health in the health ministry Jackson Kioko during the launch of the Global Adult Tobacco Survey (GATS).

He revealed that the Tobacco Control Unit within the ministry is due to start implementing standardized packaging in readiness for the official start of the regulation effectiveness.

In Kenya, 69 per 100,000 deaths for individuals aged 30 and above result from tobacco use, while 55 percent of all deaths from cancers of the trachea, bronchitis and lung are attributable to tobacco.

The new regulation requires all tobacco products in the country to be sold in plain packets and not designed to look attractive hence promote tobacco consumption.

Kioko said the packets will be without any logos and other features apart from health warnings, tax stamps and government information.

According to the GATS survey, 2.5 million adults in Kenya use tobacco even at a time when the country banned smoking in public places.

"More than 10 percent of Kenyans are still exposed to second-hand smoke in various public places," he said.

According to Robert Buluma, manager of the Population and Social Statistics at the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics, 80 percent of Kenyans support increase of tobacco taxes.

"The populations sampled believe that effective increase in tobacco prices is expected to deter initiation of smoking by young people and also motivate smokers to quit besides preventing former smokers from relapsing," Buluma noted.

The new regulation also directs the ministry of education to start integrating tobacco matters in public and private school syllabuses.

Government Kick Off Preparations For 2019 Census

NAIROBI (Xinhua) — Kenya has kicked off the preparations for conducting the 2019 population census, officials said Monday.

Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) Director General (DG) Zachary Mwangi told Xinhua in Nairobi that given the complexity and magnitude of the operation it requires three years of preparation before the actual count begins.

"We have begun mapping the country into small enumeration areas so that it will be easier to do the actual counting of people,"

Mwangi said.

"We have rolled out a nationwide awareness and advocacy campaign to educate the public on the need to cooperate in order to make the census a success," he said on the sidelines of the National Workshop on Data Ecosystems for Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The East African nation has been conducting a population census every ten years since 1969. Kenya's population is currently estimated at 45 million people.

The KNBS is also conducting a study on the estimated cost of the exercise which takes two days.

The 2009 census cost 80 million U.S. dollars and was 90 percent government funded while the 2019 census is expected to cost more.

According to the statistics agency, the funds for the census will be disbursed over a period of three financial years prior to the census year.

Mwangi said Kenya will partner with a number of institutions including the United Nations in order to undertake the exercise.

He noted that the UN Population Fund will provide both financial and technical expertise on the census.

He dropped all nine over par shots in the first nine, starting

Out of the nine lost shots he only managed to regain 3 shots off pars on the 5th, 6th and 8th.

It was however not a great start, his run of bogeys continued on the 10th but he quickly recovered the last shot with a birdie on the 11th.

Peter made a good start playing the first nine to his handicap, with pars on the 1st, 8th and 9th and the rest within his stroke allowance of one over.

There were problems on the back nine as well, the 10th bogey on 14th and double bogey on the 16th left her three over handicap but with a birdie on the 13th and pars on the 17th and 18th, she finished the back nine six over par 41, two over handicap 33 which leveled her total to nett 71
