

ERROL FOOD

Spiny Lobster — or Spaghetti

ROBINSON ISLAND
YOUR FAVOURITE RESTAURANT WITH A NEW LOOK

SPINY LOBSTER:
 or Crayfish or Langouste is the East African coastal equivalent of lobster, though of course unlike the true lobster, this does not have claws. However the flesh is sweet and when not overcooked very tender indeed. Unfortunately it is a common fault to leave the wretched creature too long in its broth or under the grill so that the Swahili name of 'Kamba' —

also meaning string or rope is all too often accurate. They may be purchased 'live' from the fish shop at Nyali and are relatively cheap still in Kenya compared to other countries. Instead of swamping the lobster in mayonnaise from a jar, try the Greek method of dressing them to serve cold, with beaten oil and lemon juice and a sprinkling of freshly chopped parsley or oregano (1 part of lemon juice to 5 parts of oil).

knife, hand the sauce separately. The diners split the lobster in two, pour the sauce over the flesh and eat with knives, forks and fingers. Finger bowls are needed with this dish which serves two.

packet of Buitoni Spaghetti which will feed four people. All too often the pasta is spoiled by the mean quantity of water used — Mombasa may have water problems but this is seldom the root of the excuse. Use your largest pan, bring the salted water to a full rolling boil and add a few drops of vegetable oil to this which will prevent the pasta from sticking. Once it is immersed, cover the pan tightly and open to give an occasional stir. It will be ready in 9-12 minutes.



Pinch a small piece between your fingers to see if it is cooked. Some cooks believe that to test its perfection, it is ready when it sticks to the ceiling if flicked upwards — but the idea of spaghetti covered walls is not very appealing to me so I have never tried this trick! As soon as the pasta is drained return it to the hot pan, and hold over the flame for a minute or so to drain excess moisture.

For this dish, prepare the following ingredients before cooking the pasta. Have your serving dish warmed and ready to rush to the table for it must be eaten at once — or as soon as possible after tossing.

You will need: olive oil (preferable but a good vegetable oil will do) peeled tomatoes, soft Kenya cheese cut in cubes; freshly ground black pepper, black olives (optional), anchovies (optional), a few herbs — basil is delicious. Quarter the tomatoes and make sure there are plenty — a whole tomato at least per serving.

By optional I mean that these ingredients are not necessary, the dish can be made with cheese, herbs of your choice, seasoning and tomatoes but the addition of the more exotic ingredients makes the dish more festive. Have all these things ready in your warmed bowl. Toss them well into the hot spaghetti; douse liberally with lots of black pepper and serve.

Or if you are barbecue fans, which so many people seem to be at the Coast, try braising the Crayfish on a spit, out of doors. (This method incidentally can be just as successfully done on your stove indoors.)

LOBSTER ON A SPIT:

1 lobster or crayfish
 Melted butter for basting
 Salt and pepper
 A pinch of thyme
 A few tablespoons dry white wine, cider or champagne
 a squeeze of lemon juice
 juice of 1 whole orange

It is best to use young lobsters for the dish. Plunge live lobsters into boiling water for one minute which will kill them instantly. Drain, impale on a spit and secure with string if necessary — straightening out as much as possible. Place a dish underneath the spit to catch all the drippings. While looking, either in a hot oven or over a hot fire, baste with seasoned melted butter in which the herbs have been standing and the cider, white wine or champagne.

Add any left over wine to the pan juices over which the lobster is cooked. When ready to serve, remove the lobster from the spit. Keep warm while you finish the sauce; to the juices in the pan add a squeeze of lemon juice, the orange juice, check the seasoning.

Place the whole lobster on a wooden board, with a sharp

SPAGHETTI:

Perhaps the most popular of all the Italian pasta products. It is solid as opposed to tubular, like macaroni, but may be cooked and used as in macaroni dishes if you wish. It may be eaten with so many different sauces that the variety of spaghetti dishes seems to be endless.

I discovered a new way to enjoy it this year and it is a particularly good dish for Mombasa during the hottest months when the very idea of hot food makes one wilt. But this is an uncooked collection of ingredients which are tossed about in the perfectly cooked 'al dente' spaghetti then served at once.

The fact that these ingredients are uncooked seems to give the dish a very light feeling. I do not know what the correct name for this is in Italy and doubtless there is one, so I have called it after the friend who showed me how to make it when she came to stay with us at Shanzu.

SPAGHETTI ANNA FALCK:

Decide how many guests you are to feed. Use plenty of boiling water for the spaghetti — the ratio is a quart to a

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NEWS FROM MTONGWE

THE designing of the new Mtongwe Ferry Jetty which had been halted pending approval from the Kenya Bus Service (Mombasa) Limited may soon resume if the K.B.S. gives the go-ahead, writes **Gray Phombeah**.

M/S Bertlin and Partners had been paid K.Shs. 37,364/50 for the job but were later requested to discontinue work pending the reviews of the Ferry Franchise Agreement.

The Ferry Franchise Agreement between the Kenya Bus Service and the Council has already been reviewed and the work should start as soon as the plan is approved by the Kenya Bus Service Ltd.

Mr Patel, the Municipal chief engineer informed COASTWEEK that the preliminary design has already been carried out, but pointed out that there were still some differences between the Council and the K.B.S. on the kind of ferry craft to be used. He expressed hope that the matter will be resolved in the next few months.

Estimated to cost £100,000 the new jetty will be erected away from the Kenya Navy bases on the mainland side and should be ready by the end of 1980.

Last year the Council was absolved from any criminal liability during an inquest into the tragic deaths of 12 people when the old Mtongwe ferry jetty collapsed.

Meanwhile, the Municipal Council has resolved to undertake repairs and maintenance of all bus stops shelters in Mombasa as from next year.

The Municipal engineer

SUPER SURFER ON HOLIDAY

ONE OF THE FOREMOST windsurfers in Europe, Tomas Loven from Sweden, has been holidaying at Trade Winds Hotel, Diani, before proceeding to Mauritius to compete in the week-long World Windsurfing Championship in which 400 are expected to participate.

It was his first visit to Kenya, and Mr Loven was one of a group of 15 winners of an Agfa competition in Sweden to launch the company's new product — the 400 ASA colour film. Their prize was a ten-day holiday in Kenya, taking them to game parks and tourist attractions at the Coast — during which time they have shot some 30,000 colour pictures between them.

The competition was open to photographic dealers and photographers. Tomas, together with his father, have a photographic business in Sweden.

He came second in a national windsurfing championship — after beating the champion in a European contest.

In last year's world championship in Guadeloupe, Tomas finished seventh, and, in the European Contest which took place in Germany in July this year, came seventh again in his weight class of 'over 76 kg.' Ninety competitors from 13 countries entered.

Tomas uses a wind-glider which, he says, has "slightly bigger sails and is faster".

Although he has high hopes of being one of the winners, he says that this year the world championship will be harder as there are only two weight classes compared with four last year.

With a windsurfer from nearby Nomad Safaris Tomas was able to get some practice in at Trade Winds Hotel. He said that Kenya has "perfect weather conditions for wind-surfing, calm and with an even wind".

SURFING WORLD-WIDE

With the fast growing popularity of wind-surfing in the world it may be found it very strange not to find more people enjoying the sport in Kenya.

There are now about 10,000 wind surfers in Sweden, and some 80,000 in Germany. Tomas mentioned here that wind-surfing was more popular in these two countries, while in the U.S.A. wind-surfing was preferred.

With a business to run, Tomas does not get much time to practice. Another drawback is the cold weather in Europe. He mentioned that "only on three occasions this year had it been warm enough to discard his wet suit". He practices on a small lake in Sweden on which there was still ice at Easter, with only about 300 metres free of ice.

He described the weather in Kenya as "fantastic and ideal for wind-surfing".

Tomas flew to Mauritius on October 10 where he will spend a week getting acclimatised before the world competition starts.

COMPLAINTS about exorbitant rents are usually made by residents of Nairobi and to a lesser extent by those who live in Mombasa, Kisumu and Nakuru. In Nairobi, exploitation of tenants by landlords knows no bounds.

don't see any urgency in tackling the housing problem. These people live in comfortable homes and probably have never known the frustrations you have to go through when looking for a house.

As it is said, people who have suffered are likely to be more willing to help you than those who have never known any suffering.

And of course there is the economic school of thought. The demand for housing

people now living in the Eastlands!

Surely people migrating from the rural areas to Nairobi can hardly afford to rent one room lease alone 2,500/= a month for a bed-sitter.

The authorities have a moral duty to look into the housing situation and do something about it urgently. People are not only being forced to pay unfairly high rents but many are losing money to bogus housing agencies.

These housing agencies are numerous although there may not be as many houses to rent.

When you approach some of these agencies, they demand money from you before they even tell you whether there is a vacant house. This money, which they call deposit is not refundable whether you get a house or not.

So to make you pay the deposit the agencies tell you that there is a house at such and such a place. In fact there is no such a house. So you end up losing your money.

TELLING IT LIKE IT IS by REGI MTHARA

exceeds supply. Migration of people from the rural areas to urban centres has always been singled out as the major source of housing problem especially in Nairobi.

This is the reason, it is said, why rents continue to go up. But some people will disagree with this argument. Most of the people who migrate to urban centres are school leavers and casual workers who cannot afford the high rents in Nairobi.

People who have lived and worked in Nairobi for the past five years or so (and who form part of the so-called middle class) cannot be convinced that it is because of migration of rural people to Nairobi that the rents are high.

Three or four years ago, they could afford to rent a three bedroom flat in a relatively non-crowded residential area but now they cannot afford to rent a bed-sitter although they are earning more.

These days they can only live in a one roomed house in the so-called Eastlands where most Africans live. These are the most crowded residential areas in Nairobi.

The question is who is renting those houses which became too expensive for the

Some people would gladly accept to work in smaller towns just to avoid paying Nairobi's high rents. But it seems the 'rent racket' is permeating smaller towns.

A resident of Limuru (of all the places!) wonders whether the authority concerned with house rents is really performing its duty. Some landlords in the small town of Limuru are raising rents everyday and no one stops them.

This is the situation most Nairobi residents have had to put up with for a long time. And since nothing has been done to make rents reasonable, it is no wonder that landlords in small townships are emulating their counterparts in Nairobi.

In fact as far as the whole question of rents and housing is concerned, it can be said that the Government has failed many people. The situation gets worse everyday. Yesterday, it was easier to find a house and the rents were lower than today.

It is obvious the problem of housing and exorbitant rents merits Government's intervention to arrest the situation. But constant cry for lower rents has fallen on deaf ears. But why is it like that?

Government controls Needed

Some people feel that the reason why the Government has not taken any steps to control rents is because its own officials are landlords who are not willing to enact a legislation that would reduce incomes they get from renting premises.

Other people think that those who are in a position to make policies regarding rents





The Risks of selling Goods by Third Party

To the socialist profit is an unacceptable concept, but to anyone who believes in the free enterprise system profits are an essential element of the economy.

which case the trader is merely an agent and receives an agreed percentage of the selling price as commission.

But to attempt to get the best of both worlds, by selling the goods as though they are his own, when in fact they belong to someone else, is morally dishonest.

This is especially true when the trader later tries to avoid his responsibilities if a fault develops with the goods. Then he declares the true position, that he is selling the goods on behalf of a third party and therefore has no legal liability.

Of course there is no legal basis for this, and a buyer's contract is with the person who sold the goods to him. He is responsible for rectifying any defects in the goods, even though he may not be the true owner.

IMPROVEMENT IN KILINDINI EXPORTS

THE DRY general exports handled through the port of Mombasa by the end of the third quarter this year have shown an improvement as compared to the same period last year.

A total of 673,680 deadweight tons of dry general exports were shipped from the port by the end of September this year.

Last year a total of 621,321 deadweight tons of exports had passed through the port during the same period. This indicates a rise of 52,359 tons handled this year as compared to 1978.

On the side of imports, the figure of first nine months show that there has been a decline this year. Up to September this year, a total of 795,108 tons of dry general imports were handled at the port, which was

353,482 tons lower than the same period last year when 1,148,582 tons were handled.

The dry general cargo handled over the period in review indicate a 371,715 tons drop this year as compared against last year's figure. The port handled 1,769,903 tons and 1,458,788 tons of dry general cargo in the first nine months of 1978 and 1979, respectively.

During the month of September alone a throughput of 147,605 tons of dry general cargo were handled comprising of 74,309 tons of imports and 73,296 tons of exports. This figure was lower than that of the preceding month of August when 149,566 tons were handled constituting 61,059 tons of imports and 88,507 tons of exports.

The September throughput was also lower than the corresponding month last year when 186,706 tons of dry general cargo were handled, the port composed of 104,970 tons of imports and 81,708 tons of exports.

This year's figure is 39.1 tons lower than that of last year.

A total of 67 general cargo ships called at the port of Mombasa over the month

PORTS PROBE TALLY SYSTEMS

from TONY BARROS in Dar es Salaam

THE unsystematic tallying of goods on arrival at Tanzanian ports has led to several problems in settling claims on lost and damaged goods.

A seminar on customs procedures in Dar es Salaam was held that while the National Shipping Agencies Company (Nasaco) tallied the goods when being off-loaded at the port, the Tanzania Harbours Authority (T.H.A.) tallied them after they had been off-loaded.

'Expressing grave concern'

The participants expressed grave concern over this anomaly adding that it brought problems when the goods got

lost or damaged because the responsibility of the shipping lines over the goods ended with the hook-landing of the goods at the port.

"Some outstanding claims dating to 1975 have yet to be settled", a participant noted.

The T.H.A., Nasaco and representatives of shipping lines were urged to find a solution to this long standing problem.

Tanzania is to re-examine the East African Airspace following the collapse of the East African Community with a view to re-defining the Flight Information, Regional Boundaries (F.I.R.).

This issue will be discussed at the sixth African and India Ocean Regional Air Navigation Meeting in Arusha next month.

The meeting will attract over 650 participants from 98 countries and 15 international organisations.

Eastern Africa's Mulungushi sold to Greek owners

AFTER COMPLETION of a period of several weeks at the buoys awaiting sale negotiations, the Eastern Africa National Shipping Line vessel m.v. *Mulungushi* is finally changing hands. She has been lying at No. 14 berth this week where she has been given the unimaginative sounding name of *Enamel*.

I understand she will shortly be proceeding to Durban for cargo on account of her new Greek owners. Her presence on this Coast for so many years flying the E.A.N.S.L. flag will be sadly missed. Regrettably the m.v. *Ujamaa* will be the next one to lose her identity when she too is sold after her current discharging operations on this Coast are completed.

The yellow hulled Ro Ro vessel *Alpha Express* has become the centrepiece of Kilindini since she was moved last week from Port Reitz to the Buoys. I gather her future is still undecided whilst her owners continue to sort out their present problem.

If sold today and bearing in mind she is the type of ship buyers are seeking, she should fetch a figure in the region of \$5,000,000.

A vessel entering Kilindini on Sunday morning with unmistakably British lines was the 8700 ton Greek vessel *Argiro*, previously the Bibby Line vessel *Shropshire*. Her familiar Bibby funnel colours of buff with a black top have been changed to red with a black top.

FLOURS PAR

I noticed her new owners had decorated the bridge front by painting on a large Mickey Mouse. There is no accounting for taste! She is presently loading 11000 tons Flourspar for Montreal.

Berthed at No. 17 this week has been the U.S. Navy Oceanographic Research Vessel *Wilkes*. Being light grey in colour she could almost be mistaken for a private yacht. This is not her first visit to Mombasa.

In Mombasa from P. & O. London this week, on a two day visit was Peter Milburn, who spent some 18 months in Mombasa in 1975 on secondment to Mackenzie (Kenya) Ltd.

In his present position as manager of the P. & O. Strath service between East Africa and the United States, Peter was visiting his Agents, Maritime Co. Ltd. Shippers, Port Office.



'When the top soil goes — We go too!' explains Eddie

MEET AN angry, frightened middle-aged man: Eddie Albert, the American film and T.V. actor. But the role he is now playing is . . . for real.

He has played in some 80 films — the older generation will remember his press photographer in *Roman Holidays* with Gregory Peck and Audrey Hepburn. Interestingly, he played a magazine photographer in *Roots of Heaven* with Trevor Howard and Juliette Greco.

Howard took the part of the fanatic rightly concerned with the slaughter of elephants in north Africa, who went so far as to give a public slapping on the backside of a woman elephant huntress. Romain Gary's book made deep impression on me when I read it years ago.

I suggested to Eddie, when we met at the Hilton the other day, that perhaps it was this association with protecting the elephant that 'hooked' him on his present environment 'thing'.

'A microbiologist traces the problem'

"Not exactly", he replied. "I once discovered the collapse of eggs in a bird's nest in Anacapa on the Californian coast . . . a microbiologist traced the problem back to fish and then back to D.D.T."

D.D.T. was eventually banned in the United States. The Eddie Albert fund of Southern Illinois University is worried about soil erosion and tries to persuade farmers to employ biological methods rather than nitrogen fertilisers.

Eddie gave a Nairobi talk on "World crisis in agriculture as related to the soil". He came and he went and (in my humble opinion) the Kenya media somehow missed out on a (literally) world-shaking story.

Let's listen to Eddie Albert's fears and concerns:


"I'm talking about a matter of life and death — our's and our children's — and you'll be surprised when I tell you the subject is what some people call dirt, but it's much more than that: it's really topsoil or the thin skin of soil that covers the earth on which we depend for our lives.

From the topsoil we get every morsel of food we eat, the clothes we wear, the houses we live in and even our industrial life . . . trees, plants and that thin precious layer of topsoil sustains all plant, animal and human life and when they go, we go!

For thousands of year, kings, governments and empires have sold off their resources, trees, ore, oil and land to extract a few more dollars — occasionally for their personal benefit — and when the trees were cut down, and no replanting, and the land and topsoil were exposed to the sun, wind and rain, and the dried-out dead topsoil blew away or was washed down the rivers, lost forever, the land died, the people died and the country passed into the history books.

'Solomon cut the trees for his temple'

Look at Africa, Asia, Central America, the Middle East. Rich countries at one time. Solomon cut the trees for his famous temple. Alexander cut trees for warships. The whole of north Africa was once the granary of

the Roman Empire.

Now, where once stood those great temples, cities, people — desert sand stretches to the horizon. Erosion is not new. We could learn something from the record.

Plato lamented the loss of topsoil in ancient Greece. "Our land is now like the skeleton of a body wasted by disease, the soft parts are gone and all that remains is the bare carcass".

Herodotus wrote: "You could walk across the north of Africa and always in the shade of trees". Not today: sand, lost empires, famine.

Ethiopia? All but four per cent of its trees have been cut down and the unprotected soil has gone down the river (literally), and its rich soil is now silting up the Aswan Dam. Topsoil has gone, crop failure, drought, thousands — have starved to death and saws are working on that last four per cent of those trees.

In India, newspapers carry nightmarish stories of entire families committing suicide to end the agony of slow death by starvation. The sub-continent is losing 30,000 acres of agricultural land to the desert each year.

Nepal, Java, the Philippines, parts of Malaysia and Indonesia are expected to be deserts by the end of the century.

Fifty per cent of Mexico was once covered with trees. Ten per cent is left — and saws are working to eliminate that.

'One third of the World is desert!'

About one-third of the world is already desert and we add 14 million more acres of desert yearly; meanwhile the population will double. Where will the food come from?

The destruction of topsoil in the United States is shameful. When we arrived in this rich and beautiful continent, there was a green

carpet of marvellous trees — oak, maple, beech, walnut, basswood, sycamore, laurel, elm, pine, fir, ponderosa, magnolia, cypress, cedar, spruce, hemlock, larch alder, willow, chestnut, ash, sequoia, redwood, eucalyptus, dogwood, etc. etc.

Not any more. With the trees gone, with wind and water erosion, we are losing four billion tons of our precious, irreplaceable topsoil annually. When we arrived, we enjoyed about 18 inches of nutritious topsoil; we are down to seven inches. Below that seven inches the soil is as lifeless as the moon . . . we're seven inches from sand and starvation. And when that last seven inches goes — we go.

'On the wrong track for years'

There's only one rule of good farming . . . leave the soil better than you found it.

The truth is we have been on the wrong track for many years; we have had a tragic love-affair with technology dreaming of ourselves as masters over nature; we are not the masters; we are only part of nature.

So we exploited, poisoned and raped nature only to discover that we have exploited, poisoned and raped ourselves.

The great historian, Dr Toynbee, who has studied the decline and death of all the great civilizations declared: "I'm not sure whether it's my grand-daughter or my great-grand-daughter who will see the death of this civilization".

We ripped off the earth. All she ever asked of us that we put back what we take out. Replant forests after we cut. Put back all the nutrients that we took out of the soil.

Use the water, put it back clean. Our greed got in our way.

Now nature is about to present us with the bill.

Another Sugar Factory for the West Lake Region

CONSTRUCTION on the country's fifth sugar factory the 320 million shilling Kagera plant in West Lake region is underway following the laying of the foundation stone by President Nyerere early this week.

Production at the factory will start in 1981 initially with 20,000 tonnes of sugar a year, and rising to between 55,000 and 65,000 tonnes a year by 1982/83.

The factory which is jointly financed by the government of Tanzania, the Netherlands, India, the Industrial Development Bank of India, the Abu Dhabi Fund and the State Bank of India.

And in Kibaha, some 40 kms. from Dar es Salaam, a 7.8 million shilling sugar research centre is to be in operation early next year. The centre will house a modern research laboratory whose 1.8 million shilling equipment has been donated by the United States Aid for International Development (U.S.A.I.D.).

The station was established in 1972 under the Ministry of Agriculture to breed and undertake research work on sugar-cane varieties in the country. It was earlier established as a substitution for the defunct East African Agricultural and Forestry Research Organisation (E.A.A.F.R.O.).

Tanzania will receive 736 million shillings in aid from Sweden making her the largest recipient of aid this year. Vietnam, the largest recipient of Swedish aid will receive 768 million shillings.

Representatives of a Norwegian consultant firm — Hafslund A/S are expected next month to continue discussions on the Rufiji Basin Development. A feasibility study report on the Steigler's Gorge project will be the centre of discussion.

Feasibility studies of the Rufiji Basin are financed by Norway and projects undertaken by the Authority include promotion of tourism, development of agriculture, generation of hydro-electricity, forestry, fishing, industrial projects and control of floods.

Officials from Rwanda, Burundi and Tanzania are meeting in Bujumbura, Burundi to prepare for a conference of donors to the Inter-State Kagera River Basin Development Project. The donors conference is expected to start in Paris on October 15.

Yugoslavia has agreed to grant Tanzania 18 million shillings for various development projects. This follows a meeting of the Tanzania-Yugoslavia joint commission in Arusha.

The city's bus company — Shrika la Usahiri Dar es Salaam (U.D.A.) will reinforce their fleet with the purchase of 85 buses of three makes this year to alleviate problems faced by the city's bus commuters.

The State-owned company will buy 25 Leyland buses, 20 Mercedes Benz and 40 articulated Ikarus buses. Arrangements are also in hand with the State Motor Corporation (S.M.C.) to purchase another 20 mini buses possibly of the Isuzu make.

operation in 1984, the factory will process between 300 and 400 tons of coffee daily.

Financial negotiations on the proposed railway link between Ubungu and the Wazo Hill Cement plant on the outskirts of Dar es Salaam are to be held this month with the Bank of Brazil.

The Bank will provide a loan for the proposed 75.4 million shillings 40 per cent of whose costs will be met by the Tanzanian Government. A Brazilian company — Cicol are contractors and will also handle the foreign component of the loan.

When completed, cement from the country's only plant will be loaded directly onto railway wagons for shipment upcountry.

President Nyerere in his capacity as Chancellor of the University of Dar es Salaam has conferred degrees and presented diplomas and certificates to 895 graduates at a colourful ceremony at the main campus in the city.

These included 639 students who completed their first degree, 91 who received their masters degree and four who received their doctor of philosophy degrees (Ph.D.).

More than 10,000 hectares of forest, bushland and health land have been destroyed along the slopes of the Mount Kilimanjaro by fire which swept the area for the past ten days.

SENEGAL

Two commissions have been forced to prepare details on research projects submitted by the member states for developing a regional policy on research.

The task of the commissions will be to study the problems so that a common approach could be formulated for the development of oral tradition and African languages in the area.

The meeting, the first since the centre was established last January is being attended by delegates from 14 East and Central African States, Unesco, West Germany, Sweden and Senegal.

Secretaries-general of Unesco's National commissions from 15 countries meet in Dar es Salaam from October 22, 1979 to examine ways of improving communication and co-operation between Unesco member States.

The meeting which will end on October 26 will be the last to be held in a developing country. Previous meetings were held at Ljubljana, Yugoslavia in 1971 and in Ottawa, Canada in 1975.

The towns of Njombe, Makambako, Babati and Kondoa will have electricity by early 1981 under the Tanesco rural electrification programme.

Survey work in the four towns has been completed and erection of transmission lines will begin in January next year and the installation of generating equipment will



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



MILLIONTH PASSENGER IN SEYCHELLES

AVIATION HISTORY was made this week in the "Pearl of the Indian Ocean" — the Seychelles Islands, writes Colin Church.

The occasion was the arrival at Seychelles International Airport of the millionth passenger to be handled by Aviation Seychelles Limited (A.S.L.), the airport handling agents since A.S.L. was founded six years ago.

And the lucky British lady and her family were given a V.I.P. welcome normally reserved for dignitaries.

The 'lady in a million', 44 year old Mrs Anne Annand from Chiswick in London was told of her luck after her British Airways B747, flight BA063 had left London's Heathrow Airport last Sunday for Seychelles.

To meet her on arrival in Seychelles were the Minister of Transport and Tourism, Mr Mathew Servina; the chairman of A.S.L., Mr Guy Morel who is also the Principal Secretary in the Ministry of Finance and A.S.L.'s general manager in Seychelles, Mr Mike Lewin and traffic manager Mr Brian Cannadine.

B.A.'s manager in Seychelles Mr Keith MacGaul was also there to meet the lucky passenger and her family.

As she set foot on Seychelles said, Mrs Annand was served with an exotic banquet of flowers. Following this she and her family were taken to one of the V.I.P. lounges where champagne and caviar were served.

Welcoming the "millionth plus three" passengers Minister Servina noted that "we have started making history" and hope that the two millionth passenger would arrive in Seychelles in less time than Mrs Annand.

Mr Lewin said that the occasion was a "milestone in the history of A.S.L." and added: "Not many milestones will be remembered as this one".

Mrs Annand was then presented with an inlaid wooden box with the spicy fragrance of cinnamon bark. Her husband 48 year old Mr Alistair Annand and their two children, 17 year old Charlotte and 15 year old Ian each received a book on the natural history of Seychelles.

HISTORY

Still looking fresh after the tiring 14 hour flight from London Mrs Annand said that when she booked the passage she never thought that she would be making history.

"I had no idea of it until the plane was in flight. And the reception I received here has been wonderful".

This is not the first time that Mrs Annand has set foot in Seychelles.

In 1975 she and her family transited through Seychelles when flying to Mauritius. And that short stay has been one of

the reasons that convinced her to holiday in Seychelles.

The Annand family will be staying for two weeks in Seychelles at the Coral Strand Hotel on the Republic's world famous Beau Vallon Beach a picturesque stretch of pure white beach lapped by the crystal clear, warm Indian Ocean.

The highlight of their visit will be free trip to Bird Island one of Seychelles' most beautiful tiny outer islands, by courtesy of the Tourism Division.

The Republic of Seychelles consists of 92 islands, the furthest being 600 miles from the main island of Mahe.

A.S.L. started operations in June 1973 when it took over from the Directorate of Civil Aviation.

In its first year A.S.L. handled 70,000 passengers from nine flights per week by three airlines.

In the past 12 months alone it handled some 250,000 passengers from 25 weekly flights by 11 airlines.

MILESTONE

The last most significant milestone was the introduction of wide body 747 jets in 1976. The next step will be the extension of the airport facilities over the next two years to handle twice as many passengers.

The objectives of A.S.L. are threefold:

- Financial — by efficient operation to maintain the lowest possible fees to airlines consistent with generating sufficient profit to replace old assets and buy new equipment for growth without recourse to outside finance.

- In the first year of operation there was a turnover of R 1,978,000 (E152,153.84) compared to R. 10,103,000 (E777,153.84) last year. Profit during the first year was R. 60,000 (E4615.40) compared to last year's R. 2,300,000 (E176,923.10).

- Staff — to develop an train staff to both create Seychellois successors for staff from overseas and to build firm base for future promotion at middle and junior supervisory level. Indeed a expatriate Duty Officers have been replaced by Seychellois.

- And one Seychellois aircraft engineer has completed his five year training and is now working at the airport, a further four are currently being trained in U.K.

- Service — to offer a level of customer service a punctuality higher than of handled airlines in the Indian Ocean region.

NOEL CLARKE writes on The Addictive Game of Golf — and describes basics of the game for beginners.



formulated the first set of rules of the game. These same gentlemen passed the hat around and collecting five shillings from each bought a silver putter to be awarded in open competition. The first winner of this putter, in 1754, was one William Landale who, on account of his achievement, became the Captain of St Andrews for that year. St. Andrews is, to this day still an active club and is the seat of the Ruling Body of the game.

The game has since evolved into an International sport with both amateur and professional ranks and equipment in use has become more and more sophisticated.

There is little doubt that golf in Kenya is a legacy of the colonial period but the local people, showing a great natural aptitude for the game, have excelled in 1906 and is the present Royal Nairobi Golf Club.

It was followed five years later by Mombasa Golf Club and Kenya can now boast of having over a dozen courses some of which are of international standard.

Golfers at the Coast are well catered for, apart from the course on the island there is an excellent one in Nyali along the Links Road which is soon to have eighteen holes and there is an interesting nine hole course at Malindi which is kept going by a handful of enthusiasts there.

Kenya hosts an annual Open Competition which is mainly for professionals and this attracts quite a few world class players such as the young Spaniard, Severiano Ballesteros, who took the title last year and is the reigning British Open champion.

Golf is a great test of the physical coordination required to strike a ball well and accurately and of a person's ability to remain cool under pressure. For a game in which the ball must be at rest before being struck it is deceptively difficult to master.

Beginners are often advised to grip the club in a rather unnatural manner, to keep the left arm straight in swinging the club back to strike the ball and they are supposed to finish up after a full shot with their spine contorted into a downward concave curve. If, on first try, you succeed in accomplishing all these acrobatics you will be lucky not to end up in the orthopaedic wing of the local hospital.

'Those of us who get the Bug'

For those of us who get the bug it is an exceptionally absorbing game and men have been known to trudge over courses in Arctic condition and bear the blistering heat in the deserts of the Middle East carrying a little square mat on



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Dubai Games

ABOUT THREE years ago, oil rich Dubai wanted to put some of its wealth into athletics in the form of the Dubai Games, with exotic prizes for the winners.

The One Mile was to be the 'blue ribbon' event with a prize fund of one and a half million shillings. However, to stage such an extravaganza in Dubai, with hardly any spectators would be ludicrous, and therefore various other venues around the world were considered, the most probable being Meadowbank in Edinburgh, Scotland.

Tom MacNab of the British Amateur Athletic Board was contracted to organise the Games and the books were opened for entries. However, athletes were very cautious to enter such a contest, since they would then become professionals and lose their amateur status, and be barred from almost every athletic meeting in the world.

This was further emphasised by the timely collapse of the I.T.A. in America, a professional athletic body that attracted many top class athletes including Kip Keino and Ben Jipcho.

It soon became apparent that the Dubai Games as such were to be a 'non-starter'.

Therefore a far better alternative was devised in which several 'golden' events would be held around the world (in accordance with I.A.A.F. rules) and the top stars would be invited to partake.

Last year saw the first race of the series, with a 'Golden Mile' being held in Tokyo, late in the season. Steve Scott of the U.S.A. and Henry Rono were amongst the outstanding field of athletes who ran a tactical race as they bunched together for the first three laps. This suited Steve Ovett who had flown all the way from Norway the previous day, and he just 'sat in' until the final 200m. when he launched his customary attack, to win in 3 minutes 55 seconds.

This year there have been three 'golden events'. The one mile was won in world record time by Sebastian Coe, the golden sprint held in Zurich, Switzerland, and the golden 10,000m, in Brussels, Belgium.

In the golden sprints meeting the winner was decided on an aggregate of their 100 and 200m. times. All the world's best sprinters were present with the exception of Mennea of Italy and Silvio Leonard of Cuba. Such was the standard of the competition that twelve were guaranteed a place in the finals and the others had to qualify through heats.

There were two final races at each distance, and in the 100m, it was James Sanford (10.15) from Houston, McLean (10.20), Allan Wells (10.22), and Steve Ridick (10.25). Only one tenth of a second between the first four. Sanford (U.S.A.) started as a favourite in the 200m, and his 2nd place time of 20.39 was good enough to clinch the Golden Sprints title. Alan Wells (U.K.) was of 20.42 seconds, and although setting a U.K. record of 20.42 seconds he could not overhaul the flying American. Final aggregate times were 1st Sanford (U.S.) 30.54; 2nd Wells (U.K.) 30.64; 3rd Gyles (Guyana) 30.67 seconds.

The Golden 10,000m. was held early in September at the Heysel Stadium in Brussels, Belgium. By coincidence it was at this meeting that Steve Ovett attacked Coe's 1500m world record, that highlighted the Golden Sprints meeting the previous month. Ovett missed it by almost three inches, which is ridiculous after running almost one mile, to be cheated by such a small amount.

In the 10,000m., Joel Cheruyot was Kenya's representative, and he stuck with the leaders for the greater part of the race, passing 5,000m. in 13:54 with Lasse Viren behind him. Mike McLeod of Britain took the lead just before the final lap and opened up a huge lead which he held to the finish, putting in a last lap under 55.5 seconds. There was nobody that could match him. A furious battle took place for 2nd position, with Brendan Foster just getting the verdict.

Ten runners finished in under 28 minutes, including Cheruyot (27:50.3) in ninth place. Olympic gold medalist, Lasse Viren was his characteristic self, keeping out of the limelight in pre-Olympic year, yet finishing in 12th place in a time a little over 28 minutes. 1st Mike McLeod (U.K.) 27:39.8; 2nd Brendan Foster (U.K.) 27:41.3; 3rd Schots (Belgium) 27:41.4; 4th Fyedotkin (U.S.S.R.) 27:41.9.

The 'Golden Spears' is the next event, and could have featured our own All Africa Champion, Eunice Nekesa. However injuries and insufficient training this year have reduced her to the ranks of 'just another competitor' rather than a potential medal winner.

The I.A.A.F./Dubai Golden events are scheduled to run until 1983, after which they will be reviewed and evaluated to see if it is worth continuing the series. If this year is anything to go by, they are definitely a winner, and if ever Kenya gets an international standard track it will be nice to see one of these events held here.

ONE Kenyan record fell last month, and two others were established at different athletic matches in England and Germany. Ibrahim Juma's Junior 5000m. world record of 13:35.1 fell to Steve Binns (U.K.) at the Crystal Palace Coca Cola meeting, by a massive eight seconds.

Binns is just nineteen years old and has been breaking records and top class runners on several outings recently.

Meanwhile, 12-year-old Erik Kimani, ex Nairobi, ex James Maina's tribe and now living in England, set a U.K. age 12 best of 2:06.5 for 800m., taking almost eight seconds off the previous record.

Not only that, but he also holds the U.K. age 12 best for 1500 in 4:20.8.

At Koblenz, Germany, Mike Boit showed his current return to form, heading James Maina in a close race with Steve Ovett, to set a national 1000m. record in 2:16.2.





BETTER FISHING IN MALINDI

IT HAS been rather a case of 'after the Lord Mayor's Show' for after a month of interesting fishing in August, we had a very dull time in September, writes Jack Edge

Fishing is still mostly off Watamu, which is handy for the boats stationed there, although to get out through their shallow 'miango', with the seas that are running at present, must be something of an experience.

But they do it, and recently Col. Bill Stead, fishing in Honeylulu, caught a Black Marlin of 74.5 kilos, a Karambesi of 23.4, Wahoo, Barracuda and other fish. Alfred Lettesberger and Colin Kyle-Millward fishing in the same boat each got their first Sailfish, but the Slaters themselves seem to have gone in for Shark fishing and got a couple of white tips weighing 130 and 134.5 kilos.

Concorde also ventured through the reef, and Duncan Scroggie caught his first Sailfish.

Malindi boats have had to slog down to Watamu waters for their boat fishing, although now conditions are improving off Malindi. Herbie Paul's Tina has been out a lot, chiefly with inexperienced fishermen from Germany, and has brought in some useful catches, including a couple of Sail.

Colin Hoods Karenmoore got a very nice Sail of 42 kilos and a White tipped Shark of 79 kgs. Among the little boats which did not seem to mind the seas, was Gerald Nevill's Orbit and Donald Destro's Allegra.

Altogether 1 Marlin, 6 Sailfish, 4 White tipped Shark and numbers of Wahoo, as well as plenty of 'bait' fish, have been caught in Watamu waters during the past three weeks.

Pretty quiet, but conditions are now improving, and we hope for some good fishing during the forthcoming Festival.

FISHING FESTIVAL NOW UNDERWAY

AT least forty boats are expected to participate in the British Airways/Air Canada fishing competition — the largest fishing event of the season — and which, once again, will take place at Malindi on October 13/14.

The two-day event will launch the annual Malindi Fishing Festival which continues through the week.

The event, which will be organised by the Malindi Sea Fishing Club, offers the winners who achieves the highest points

on the Club's points system, a return economy fare from Nairobi to London on British Airways and from London to Canada on Air Canada.

Boats may start from anywhere on the Kenya coast on the first day and from Malindi only on the second day.

Special accommodation rates are being offered by Block Hotels for competitors who can stay at the Sindbad Hotel. Transport to and from the hotel is also being provided by the Sindbad.

Gilbeys are sponsoring a cocktail party at the Sindbad Hotel on the evening of Sunday October 14.

Competitors are expected from as far south as Mombasa, Mtwapa and Kilifi, as well as Watamu where several large Marlin have already been caught this season.

Amongst the entrants this year, will be Lady Delamere, who will be fishing in her boat White Bear, both in the British Airways/Air Canada event and the other Festival competitions.
