IS YOUR CHILD A GENIUS ?

CHILD prodigies begin showing their extraordinary intellectual powers when they are still toddlers. So says Dr Hal Robinson, director of an American university team which is monitoring the progress of 200 highly intelligent children aged between two and 16.

In a recent interview he gave pointers to help parents to spot prodigies early and so put them on the road towards developing their abilities to the full. For example, only the most intelligent children would be able to say two or three whole

sentences before they were one year old or do a 30-piece jigsaw before their second birthday.

He also said that an exceptionally bright toddler could be spotted by his or

Dr Robinson, of Washington University in Seattle, is associated with a unique scheme to allow child prodigies to make maximum use of their talents by entering university

DISASTER AT SEA

KENYA-BOUND SHIP IS 'A TOTAL LOSS'

THE SUDDEN SINKING of a large British freighter in the 'English Channel' sent shock-waves through Kenya's insurance and re-insurance establishments — with an expectant loss of many millions of shillings. "Preliminary reports indicate claims well in excess of seven million shillings, and that only one of the cargo owners concerned," a senior insurance company spokesman told Coastweek in Nairobi.



"There are other claims on smaller items of the cargo, and the final figure is more likely to be in eight figures (well over ten million)," he admitted.

The incident involved the sinking on Sunday of the 6,500-ton British built cargo ship Aetolian Sky, which collided in Mid-Channel with the 1,000-ton West German coaster Anna Kruppel.

UNITED STATES NAVY VISIT COAST

She had only hours earlier sailed from London with a large cargo of imports for Mombasa and Dar es Salaam.

"Following the collision the Aetolian Sky suffered extensive damage, with severe flooding in her No.1 and No.2 holds.

"She was later taken under tow by an ocean-going salvage tug, but the tug proved too much... and she sank with all her cargo just 12 miles off Portland Bill," said a shipping line spokesman.

SWEET POTATOES

SUNFLOWER:
According to Larousse Gastronomique these taste like Jerusalem Artichokes and may be eaten as a vegetable. In France these are actually grown for their tubers which are long and eaten between November and the end of April.

Treat the vegetables as you would salsify and Chinese artichokes. The seeds are also edible and quite delicious and much favoured by Russians and Poles.

SWEETBREADS:
Calf's or lamb's sweetbreads are considered to be the most delicate product of the butchery. Now there is a common fallacy that these are the testicles of the animal but this is not so.

They are actually the organ situated at the top of the breast and form two parts, being the pancreas or thymus gland of the animal. As unpleasant as this might sound, they are esteemed a great delicacy.

The flesh of the sweetbread is white and quite soft and are only found fully developed in young animals such as calf, lamb or kid. They are used as entree dishes or rather select garnishes and come under the heading of Offal. Before following any recipe they must be prepared as follows:

Thoroughly soak in cold water, blanch, cool and dry. After this they may be braised or fried in butter or used as the recipe dictates.

SWEET POTATOES:
Though generally eaten roasted and boiled in Kenya, may be made with great success into souffles, or jam or preserved in syrup as they are not unlike the very expensive Marrons Glace when treated thus. The tender leaves of the Sweet Potato may also be used as spinach. In Creole cookery they are served with honey.

They are first boiled in water, dried out slightly in the oven then served on a napkin with a pot of honey on the side. And the Creoles also slice them thinly like chips, in rounds, fry them and serve them dredged with vanilla flavoured sugar.

But their sweet potato pudding is one recipe which I find interesting though I must confess I have not tried it. However that is no reason why other people shouldn't experiment and sweet potatoes are so easy to come by and inexpensive too that I am including the recipe for those who would like to extend their culinary repertoire.



CHOCOLATE ROULADE WITH CREAM:

5 eggs separated
5 ounces castor sugar
5 ounces bitter chocolate
1 tablespoon rum or brandy
1 extra egg white

Take a large shallow roasting pan or swiss roll tin and line it carefully with a double layer of waxed paper. This must protrude above the sides of the pan by at least 2". Press the paper into the tin with your fingers so that the edges stick up slightly.

Oil lightly and sprinkle with sieved flour. Beat the egg yolks with the sugar until fluffy and lemon coloured. Break up the chocolate in a double boiler, add the water and, when melted, add the egg yolk mixture and stir to a thick cream. Add the rum.

Whip the egg whites until stiff, but not dry, in the same way as you would for a soufflé. Fold the chocolate mixture into these. Quickly pour into the prepared pan, ensuring that your mixture is evenly spread and bake in a hot to moderate oven for ten minutes.

When the top is slightly brown or firm to the touch of a finger-tip, remove from the oven. Slide the paper and cake onto a wire rack and cool. Leave to stand overnight.

CREAM:

Whip 1/2 pint of thick, fresh cream. Spread some on the chocolate cake. Now roll up very carefully. You will find that it is fragile, but it is not a disaster if it cracks a little (after making it a couple of times experience will preclude this anyway) simply press the piece back into position.

Smother with whipped cream. Decorate with curls of bitter chocolate shaved from the block with a sharp knife, or sprinkle coarsely grated chocolate over. Serves 8.

SWEET POTATO PUDDING (CREOLE)

Take five good potatoes. Boil them with skins on in unsalted water. When they are cooked the skins off and mash them to a fine paste. Stir vigorously and add to this paste 1 tablespoon flour and 1/2 cup vanilla flavoured sugar. This may be difficult as lumps are not easy to cook in Kenya. Use sugar and essence to flavour to taste.

Soften the paste with milk. Take four eggs, beat them in, one by one. Beat one egg white and whisk stiff. Fold this into the mixture at the last moment should make the pudding smooth and light.

Add a generous half of seedless raisins steeped in water, after which add beaten egg white folded in. You would for a soufflé mixture into a Charlotte mould. Cook for a few moments in a bain marie (pan of hot water - a pan is best) in the oven. Serve hot as is, cold or English custard.

SWISS ROLL:

This is basically a cake which is cooked in a flat tin, covered with cream then rolled up. I have a recipe for a chocolate Swiss roll which is the same thing with a different name, which I will post later.

In Mombasa it is common to make your own jam, i.e. the castor sugar is damp from the humidity best results.

But it is a boon to someone who is busy but is holding a dinner party where even the simplest of things should be made a day in advance thus diffusing the rush of the event. It is with fresh, whipped cream hour before serving.

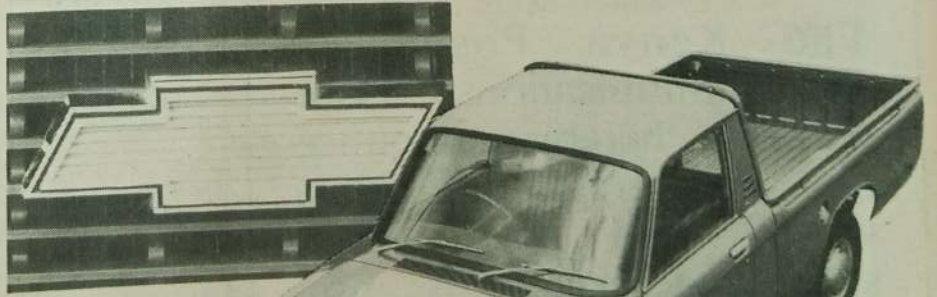

THAT'S 'THE WAY IT IS'?

A recent V.O.K. programme's "The Way It Is" commentary provoked angry reactions from some listeners. The programme noted conspicuous absence of certain sections of our society Harambee meetings and national days' celebrations.

Reacting to the commentary, the Attorney-General Mr Charles Njonjo said that loyalty to this country can be expressed in many different ways and not only in attendance in the national functions and Harambee meetings.

For the benefit of those who have not closely followed the debate, the following are some of the thoughts that have been expressed on the subject.

Abdalla Mohamed congratulated the Attorney-General for condemning the absurdities and excesses of this wretched "The Way It Is" commentary aired (alas) far too frequently by the V.O.K.

Assuming the producers of the programme to be irresponsible, Abdalla hoped that "they will now realise the errors of their ways and cease offending the airways around the Republic with their endless uninformed drivel on race relations in Kenya".

A Mr Abdulla called for level-headed officers who understand their responsibilities to run V.O.K. The tin-gods and little Hitlers who constantly keep on growing out of their boots should be thrown out of the broadcasting house.

He asked: "Can one imagine how much damage could have been caused to

the glittering image of Kenya's tolerance (racial), for which many are doing so much, had it not been for the timely reaction by our just and worthy Attorney-General Charles Njonjo?"

He described the Attorney-General as custodian of the Constitution who does not discriminate except against the injustice and called for the ministry responsible for V.O.K. to reaffirm that although Kenya may have many castes and creeds, it is one and will always remain one under the able leadership of President Daniel Arap Moi and his Government.

TELLING IT LIKE IT IS by REGI MTHARA

A Mr Tum said that Mr Njonjo's reaction to the V.O.K. commentary was both timely and representative of the majority view. He thought it strange that V.O.K. of all other media for communication dared comment negatively in such a manner likely to stir racial unrest.

Listener Mahesh said that being a Kenyan of non-African origin he was left scared and panic-stricken after listening to the commentary. Sheikh heaved a sigh of relief after reading Mr Njonjo's remarks about the commentary. He thanked him for making it clear that non-Africans in this country are held in high esteem by the Government.

He admitted that he does not attend the national

functions. Reason? He does not want to miss the live coverage of the occasions. He asked that if they (notice the reference they) want everyone to attend meetings why do they give live coverage? Is it to waste their (again notice the reference their) money? He noted that they often cry that they don't have enough finances.

Finally he asked "Since when has V.O.K. started measuring the loyalty of a person by the number of meetings he attends?"

Devani described the programme as a disgusting display of badly researched and totally irresponsible journalism. And El-Khuruuny called for the scrapping of the programme because it "often reflects the way it is not and misdirects the public".

Another listener also said that the programme should be abolished because it subjected the non-African nationals of this country to uncalled for and gratuitous insults.

Some Kenyans (mostly of African origin) disagree with some of the views expressed above. Gichuki stated that it is an open secret that racial integration in this country is a myth and only exists in a few homes. The closest the majority of indigenous Kenyans come to racial integration is in public houses and across shop counters.

The majority of Africans are found in the poor peripheries of the urban areas unlike that of non-African citizens. He argued that although every citizen is free to do whatever he or she wants during the national days, "it is foolhardy that one should expect only to attend self functions if he or she is officially invited with a card".

He pointed out that the thousands of poor wananchi who throng to such gatherings walk or take buses and matatus and yet they are at the bottom of this country's economic ladder.

And listener Kamau asserted that every citizen of this country, irrespective of his race is expected to participate in its political, social and economic aspirations but it seems that the majority of the non-African Kenyans are only interested in the country's economy. Wananchi would like to rub shoulders with them in the midday sun at national celebrations.

If there was going to be racial harmony and integration, he argued, the non-African citizens of this country must change their attitudes and start regarding their fellow citizens as equals who are not content with the crumbs from the table or to remain 'charity baskets'.

Comments

Although the V.O.K. commentary angered many people at the same time, it made them examine more closely the assertion that "Kenya is a multi-racial country in which people of all races live in peace and harmony".

And in a democratic country, people are free to express their views. So those who asked for the abolition of the programme "The Way It Is" were guilty of intolerance they accused the producers of the programme of. And if some Kenyans feel that the so-called harmony between races is superficial, why shouldn't they say so?

It is only through pointing out weaknesses in our society that we can correct them.

RESEARCH AID FOR WILD LIFE

THE world famous Ngorongoro crater in northern Tanzania has been given a shot in the arm. Three international bodies have donated funds towards the conservation of the crater over the next three years.

These are the World Wildlife Fund who donated 716,000/= one Toyota motor vehicle and radio, the Frankfurt Zoo from West Germany who donated a Cessna 182 aircraft, two Land rovers, materials and clothes worth 92,000/= and 12,000/= cash, and the East African Wildlife Leadership Foundation who donated 80,000/=, 50 safari beds and seven radios.

The money will be used for training personnel, tracking poachers, improving facilities for workers and maintaining the crater considered to be the eighth wonder of the world.

Tanzania will probably have three more vocational centres over the next five years. These will be in Moshi, Dodoma and possibly Morogoro.

The Moshi Centre will be aided by Sweden, the Dodoma Centre by Denmark and the World Bank might possibly contribute towards the construction of the third centre in Morogoro. Tanzania has three centres in Dar es Salaam, Mwanza and Tanga catering for 1,300 students.

Norway will grant Tanzania seven million shillings for equipment and social infrastructures at the Sao Hill saw Mill in Mufindi, Iringa region.

This will be used for the construction of feeder-roads, a dispensary, a market place and supply of water to 250 workers for the mill's workers.

Seven airports in the country will by next June be equipped with Distance Measuring Equipment (D.M.E.) and very high frequency omnidirectional range (V.O.R.) facilities. These are Mbeya, Tabora, Dodoma, Mwanza, Pemba and Zanzibar.

GENEVA

The country's clearing and forwarding agents have formed the Tanzania Freight Forwarders Association (T.A.F.F.A.) with a view to trying to ease ports congestion in the country. The chairman is Mr Medard Mutungi of Express Transport (T) Ltd.

It took the agents about five years to prepare the groundwork for the formation of the Association which is seeking affiliation with the Geneva-based International Federation of Freight Forwarders.

An association of Tanzania Leather and Allied Trades has

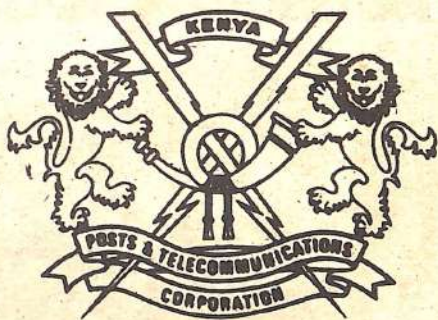

ONE YEAR OLD

ANY other Mombasa baby who reaches one year old, there are plans to celebrate its birthday tonight. COASTWEEK may do it with some style but that is its way.

In fact its cake has been cut all along and given to its readers since its birth a year ago — still warm and fresh from the presses each Friday.

Had this been the occasion of its 21st birthday, this healthy adolescent would have been able to drink in the pub for the first time (probably at Capri), marry without his parents' consent (possibly the Nairobi Times' daughter) and, of course, vote (definitely for Njoroge).

COASTWEEK breathed life one early Friday morning a year ago along Nkrumah Road, inside Ambafal Building, weighing 52 grams and carrying 20 pages of local news ranging from tourism, shipping, business to entertainment and sports.

It was only a formal affair, with no cake or champagne being waited.

Its first editorial comment wrote on the birth certificate:

Its first editorial comment wrote on the birth certificate:

"We hope you will like the look and feel of our first issue and will join in the fun of having your own weekly newspaper."

"We hope to be of great service to you in the coming years and even if we do not entertain all of you, all of the time we shall continually aim to please most of you some of the time."

"To readers in distant lands, we hope you will find us a mirror of our local community."

And a reader writing in the first issue summed up the feelings of many readers on its inception:

"I wish to congratulate the inception of COASTWEEK, which I hope will receive a warm reception from the Coast people and the whole country as their paper for accurate and first hand information."

"It is further hoped that the Coast Province which in the past has not been covered properly will now be covered fully and the whole country will be able to read much from the Coast."

COASTWEEK was born as an independently owned newspaper with deep roots in the Mombasa community and has survived to become as much a part of Mombasa as the imposing Fort Jesus monument.

Like all babies, a reader may today notice some changes in COASTWEEK if he has come across it before. And, hopefully, for the better.

It might have grown too fast for its own strength, or too slow to need some tidying up. Yet its almost fanatical determination to serve its readers is unquestionable.

Making ends meet with a skeleton staff of contributors, the COASTWEEK has had little to do with wire-service copy and other canned material as is common with most established papers in the country. Almost all of its editorial is written by this small gang of contributors.

The normal 24 pages are packed with newsy departments on Business, Tourism, Shipping, shopping, special columns in German and Swahili, entertainment and sports and capped

with juicy local news which would have otherwise found no space in other newspapers.

With a clean-cut look and easy-to-find sections, refreshing elan, humour and wit, it has managed to look better and read better each week.

Of course, beautiful girls in bikinis have from time to time graced the pages of COASTWEEK — earning the wrath of a few readers. But the paper was nowhere heading to the skin-magazine business of the West.

Maintaining its autonomy from the mainstream of national press, COASTWEEK has gone out of its way as a leisure paper to expose some of the ills which have long bedevilled the community it was designed to serve.

"It Stinks" shouted an editorial on the Kibarani Dumping Yard. Terming it a dumping disgrace, the paper called on authorities concerned to find ways and means to combat the health hazard posed by the dump to the residents of Mombasa.

When 50 people died in the worst ever road accident at Kilifi Ferry, COASTWEEK mourned. This was the moment that darkened a sunny afternoon at the Coast.

And reacting on the reign of terror unleashed by witchdoctors in the rural areas, the paper blasted these "little Jim Jones" who have overpowered chiefs and local administrators and called for their eradication.

The paper has, too, not been silent on the plight of refugees (whether in Africa or Indo-China) or the challenges of the International Year of the Child.

In one of its most brilliant editorials the weekly called for municipal democracy and an end to the Municipal Commission which had been appointed to run the affairs of the council. It surely has had its bite of opinion.

On balance, it is in the field of sports that COASTWEEK has rendered its most outstanding service to its readers. Its most beneficiaries have been sportsmen and women who until then were not "getting a fair mention in our national press."

Its sports comment in the first issue pledged:

"We shall endeavour to highlight our athletes and their performances in the best way possible, and a sincere effort will be made to cover all the sporting activities each week."

Noting that the athletes are the most important people in the sporting world, the paper promised that all others will take a back seat when it comes to reviewing sporting events.

True to its pledge, COASTWEEK has run thousands of words and pictures on Coast sports than any other national paper of high repute in the country. And if COASTWEEK has been lacking in anything else, it has certainly not been lacking in sports coverage.

As the paper observed in its first issue, numerous people had encouraged and supported the newspaper since its inception.

It can be hoped that the same people, especially the readers, who have supported the paper through out its one year of existence as the only paper in Mombasa will continue to do so in the coming years ahead.

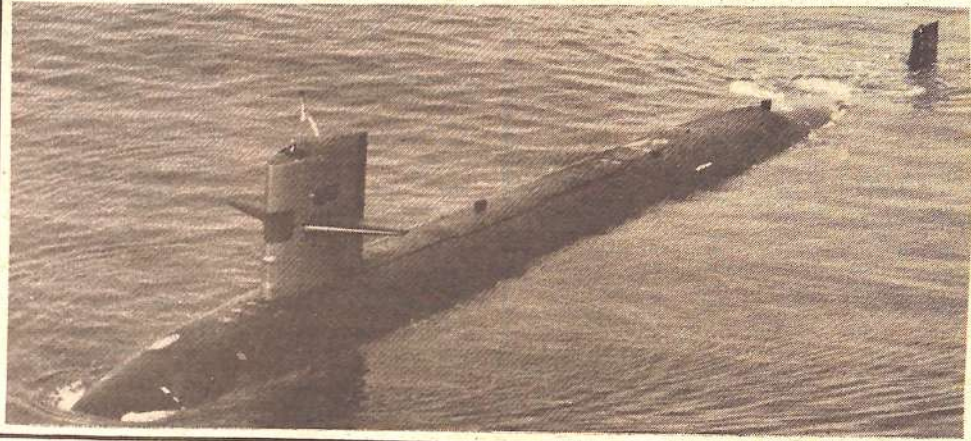

NUCLEAR-POWERED!



• TWO vessels of the United States Navy flotilla visiting Mombasa this weekend for a five-day call on Kenya are 'unusual' in a special way — they are both powered by nuclear energy. They are the cruiser U.S.S. Bainbridge (above) and the submarine Pintago (below). The 8,500-ton cruiser was commissioned in 1962 and has a top speed of over

30 knots produced by her twin pressurised, water-cooled General Electric reactors. The Pintago is of the 'Sturgeon' Class submarine and was commissioned in 1971. Her single Westinghouse reactor allows for a top surface speed of 20 knots and more than 30 knots submerged. Nuclear power gives this vessel an unlimited operational range.



TWO MORE VESSELS FOR KIGOMA

CONSTRUCTION HAS started on the Lake Tanganyika passenger and cargo ship m.v. Mwongozo and an oil barge, m.v. Sangara.

The keel laying ceremony of both vessels will be held next weekend at Kigoma port and they will be completed in two years.

Mwongozo capable of carrying 400 passengers and 200 tons of cargo and Sangara with a capacity for 450 tons of fuel oil are being built simultaneously.

The Mwongozo will be the second passenger ship to operate along the Lake Tanganyika water after the Liemba, while the Sangara — 38.8 metres long and 5.8 metres wide will ferry oil to Zambian, Zairean, Burundi and other ports along the world's deepest lake.

Like other vessels owned by the Tanzania Railways Corporation (T.R.C.) on Lake Tanganyika and Lake Victoria, they have been built by the Belgian Ship Builders Corporation under an aid

Meanwhile, two vessels of the Tanzania Coastal Shipping Line (Tacoship) — m.v. Mtwara and m.v. Lindi are to be overhauled with a view to improving their technical condition and cutting down revenue losses.

The overhauling will be undertaken through half of the 16 million shilling grant from the Norwegian. It will begin early next year.

The remaining half will be used for training, procurement of spares, acquisition of basic equipment including shore radars, forklift trucks and other equipment.

A small workshop for preventive maintenance and repair is nearing completion at the company's terminal in Dar es Salaam. The commissioning of the workshop will greatly improve the technical condition of the vessels, reduce maintenance costs and also help reduce revenue costs.

NEW PLANS FOR WATER TREATMENT

THE TANZANIAN Government is to establish a national water treatment programme for the rural areas with a view of supplying high quality water to the peasants.

The basis of this mammoth exercise is a 325-page report on 'rural water quality programme in Tanzania' prepared by a Swedish consultancy firm — Brokonsult AB.

The decision to treat water has been prompted by the fact that in many areas of Tanzania mainland, peasants are drawing water for domestic use direct from rivers infested with diseases, unprotected wells and they also fetch water contaminated with dangerous chemicals.

The firm after making a thorough study of the costs of different levels of water treatment and manpower required, has also recommended that a "low cost treatment method" for the rural areas is more appropriate.

This would need 47.2 million shillings per year, some 191.8 million shillings for medium level and 937 million shillings for high level.

A great advantage of the low

cost water treatment method that it does not require chemicals or other supplies and demands virtually no maintenance. Ground water has also been recommended as the best for domestic use.

CARGO FIGURE 'BEST OF ANY MONTH IN 1979'

THE TOTAL tonnage of dry general cargo handled at the port of Mombasa during October was approximately 199,911 deadweight tons. This total was composed of 121,202 tons of imports and 78,709 tons of exports.

This October figure was the highest for any singled month this year. June provided the second highest month of total dry general cargo handled at the port when 194,129 deadweight tons were handled.

The month of February had the lowest performance this year, with 122,438 tons of dry general cargo handled in that month.

The throughput for October was higher than that of the preceding month of September by 52,306 tons.

In September, 147,605 deadweight tons, comprising 74,309 tons of imports and 73,296 tons of exports, were handled.

The month's (October this year) performance was also higher compared to October last year when 183,076 tons of dry general cargo, comprising 119,974 tons of imports and 63,102 tons of exports were handled.

The throughput for the month in review was 16,835 tons higher than that of the corresponding month of October last year.

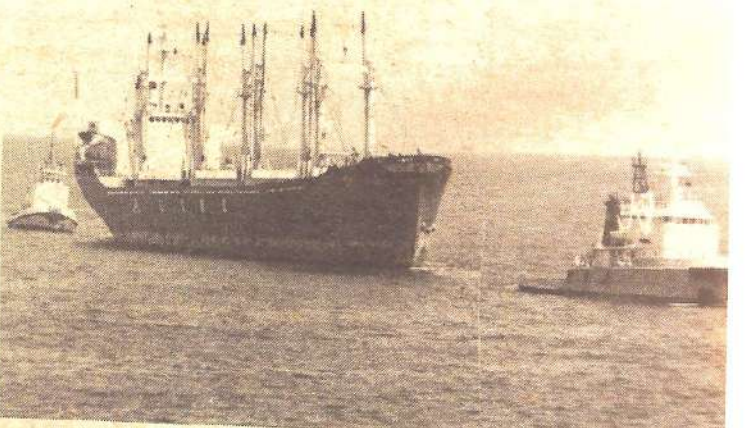

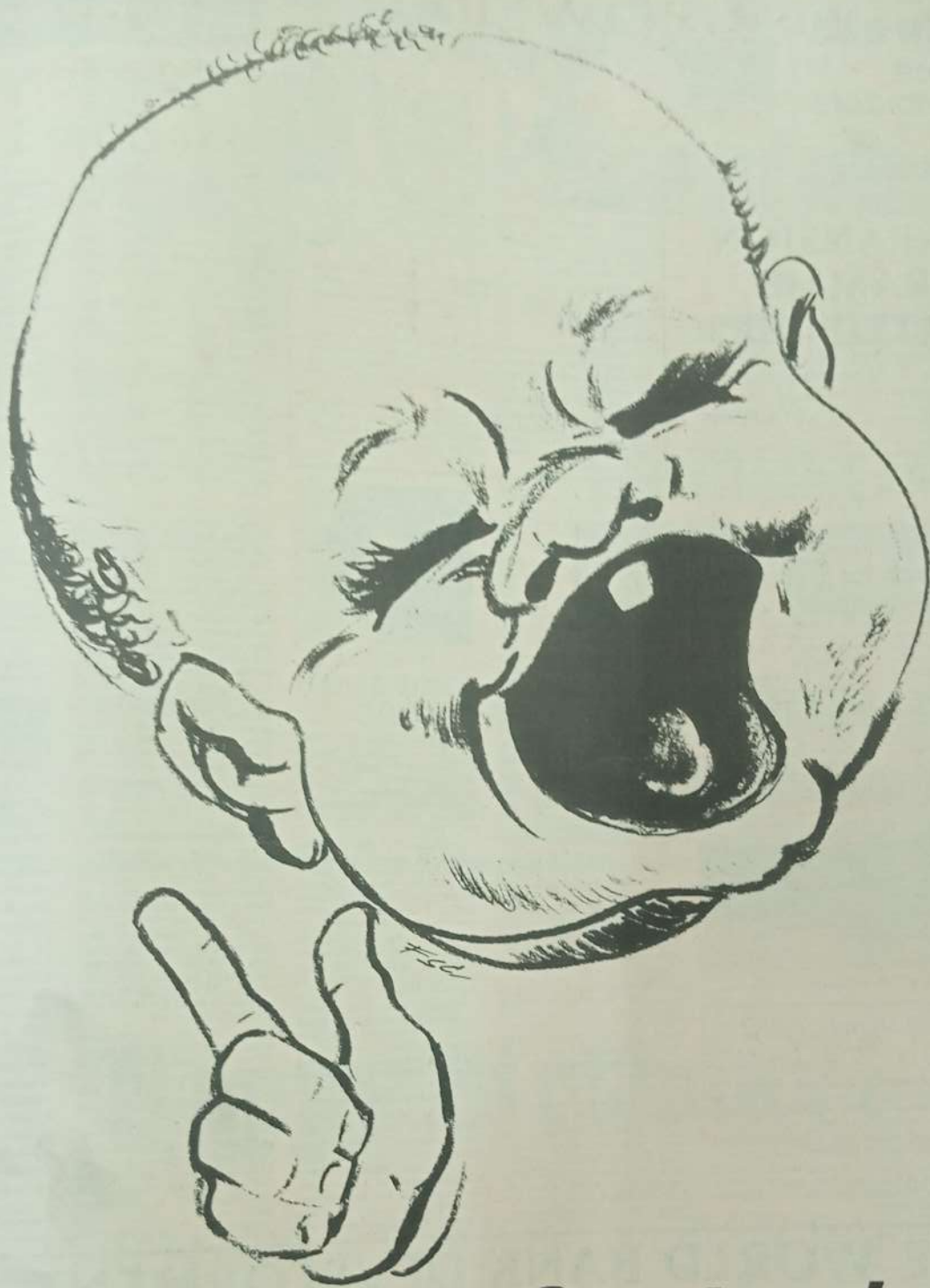

BIG EXPANSION PROGRAMME ON CATTLE DIPS

SHS. 27 MILLION is being spent in building cattle dips in Coast Province, and more than 135 will be completed by the end of next month.

The Kenya government, with the help of the European Economic Community, is spending Shs. 36,000/= on each dip alone, which service is being made available free of charge to wananchi so that they can dip their cattle each week.

It is all part of a big campaign in the province mounted by the Ministry of Agriculture with assistance from E.E.C. to eradicate tick borne diseases such as east coast fever, anaplasmosis and babesiosis.

Recently, Dr I. E. Muriithi, director of Veterinary Services in Kenya, officially opened the Majimboni Dip — one of the ten constructed and completed in the Kwale District.

He was accompanied by Mr J. Bailly, representing the European Economic Community and Dr M. A. Fazil, assistant director, Veterinary Services, Coast Province.

The Cattle Dips programme started in Taita where existing dips were repaired and new ones constructed. Today, there are 52 in working order in the district.

As a result, the number of cattle dipped in the Taita/Taveta district has increased considerably with some 40,000 head of cattle going through these dips in a week. However, there is considerable fluctuation in the numbers going through each week, and the veterinary department are investigating to find out why this should be.

When the programme is completed in the Shimba Hills, Central and Southern Division a total of 24 dips will have been constructed. The success of this project is very dependent not only on the work of the team leader Dr

The one at Wundanyi is nearing completion and staff to man the centre including a veterinary officer have already been appointed. The centre is expected to open this month.

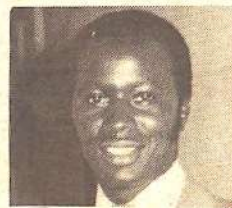
The Taveta centre is expected to be completed in December, and those in Kwale and Kilifi about April next year.

The story of Freddie Lake

RECENT editions of COASTWEEK have carried news items on the new developments in airline travel from Europe to Mombasa which will open up new tourist markets, increase the number of visitors to the Coast, and give a further boost to the area's economy.

Last week, for example, the inaugural flight of the direct London-Mombasa British Airways route arrived at the Moi International Airport. A much greater effect is likely, however, if Laker Airways is successful in its application to run a service over the same route.

This independent airline specialises in low cost air travel, bringing it within the reach of the not-so-well-off, thus getting into an untapped market.

The company first hit the headlines a few years ago when it obtained a licence to fly the London-New York route. Fares were revolutionised in that a single ticket was offered for £58, whereas the major airlines charged £120 or more.

Operating on the same basis the company intends to offer package holidays in Mombasa at around £275, which is up to twenty per cent cheaper than similar holidays organised by competitors.

Many people wonder how Laker Airways manage to offer such low prices, but basically it is a simple question of airline economics.

The major airlines use a costing system which is based on the assumption that their planes are never full and charge a price related to a load factor of about sixty per cent.

This price constitutes their full fare and covers costs. Then they offer special inducement fares such as excursions and charters to travel agents in an attempt to boost the load factor above sixty per cent.

Laker Airways, on the other hand, bases its costings on an almost full load and offers low fares as a consequence. Furthermore, by offering low fares it is more likely that full loads will be carried.

In the first year of its operation of the London-New York route, its planes were over ninety-five per cent full on average and for many flights passengers had to be turned away.

Additional cost savings are

made by cutting out the commonly associated with travel so that the service provided is completely basic.

Advance booking is possible and reservations only be made a few hours before flight departure to the airline. Agency commission is there eliminated.

Free meals in-flight are normally provided, resulting savings in staff, anyone wishing to eat on journey must take their food, although it is undeniable that these will be provided the Mombasa route.

AIR TANZANIA FLYING TO DJIBOUTI AND OMAN

AIR TANZANIA CORPORATION (A.T.C.) goes 'international' next month — with a weekly flight to Muscat, the capital of the Sultanate of Oman. The airline has also extended its wings to cover Djibouti and Malawi, writes Tony Barros.

The flight to Djibouti and Muscat will be on Wednesdays. A.T.C. will fly to Blantyre, Malawi, on Mondays.

Both new flights will use the recently acquired Boeing 737 aircraft. Other countries A.T.C. now flies to are Rwanda, Burundi, Zambia, Uganda, Ethiopia, Seychelles, Madagascar, Comoro, Mauritius and Mozambique.

HUGE WORLD BANK DEVELOPMENT AID

LOAN and investment commitments amounting to \$10,435.9 million were made to developing countries by the World Bank and its two affiliates during fiscal 1979. The World Bank lending for the year at \$6,989 million, was \$891 million more than in the previous year.

Commitments by the International Development Association (I.D.A.), the Bank affiliate that lends on concessionary terms to the poorest of the world's countries only, amounted to \$3,021.5 million, or \$709 million more than in fiscal 1978.

Almost four-fifths of I.D.A. commitments were to countries with annual per capita gross national products of \$296 or less.

The International Finance Corporation (I.F.C.), whose essential function is to assist the economic development of developing countries by promoting private sector growth, made 48 investments

in the amount of \$425.4 million or \$87 million above the mark set in fiscal 1978.

For the Bank and I.D.A., lending for projects in the agriculture and rural development sector accounted for 25 per cent of the total. Transportation was next (19 per cent), and was followed by water and sewerage (10 per cent), industry (9 per cent), and lending to development finance companies and small enterprises (7 per cent).

CREDITS

I.D.A. credits are interest free, and are repayable over 50 years. An annual 0.75 per cent service fee is charged on the distributed portion of I.D.A. credits, however.

During fiscal 1979, the Solomon Islands and Cape Verde joining the Bank, bringing the institution's membership to 132 countries. I.D.A.'s membership increased by one to 121 with the inclusion during the year of Cape Verde.

The World Bank and its affiliate, the International

Development Association (I.D.A.), approved loans and credits totalling \$1,202 million for African countries south of the Sahara during fiscal year 1979, which ended on June 30. The number of development projects assisted was 70, divided equally between East and West Africa. Over half of the total, or \$619 million, was provided in the form of concessional financing by I.D.A. They are extended to countries with per capita incomes below \$581 a year.

In East Africa total lending for the year reached \$646 million for 35 projects, about 22 per cent above the average of the previous five years. New I.D.A. commitments of \$380 million were 36 per cent above the 1974-78 average. Major increases occurred in lending for agriculture and rural development and transportation, with these two sectors accounting for 31 per cent and 41 per cent respectively, of the total volume of lending.

Agricultural lending was, in the main, for programs of rural development in which more than half the benefits are

expected to accrue to the rural poor. Funds for training were included in each of the 11 agriculture and rural development projects for East Africa approved this year.

About 12 per cent of Bank and I.D.A. lending this year was for industry, approximately the same proportion as in recent years.

The main emphasis continued to be on institution building, i.e., strengthening local financial institutions through financial assistance and advice to develop their capacity to pursue sound investment policies and to carry out proper economic and financial analysis of investment projects.

PARTNERS

World Bank commitments to Kenya in this last year reached an unusually high amount of \$251 million for a total of 7 projects. This compares favourably with commitments of \$113 million in financial year 78 and \$155 million in financial year 77.

And although it is unlikely

be matched next year, it looks as if World Bank will not return to the earlier average either but do a bit better than that, as long as the Government of Kenya and the World Bank continue in the excellent spirit now characterizing their partnership in development.

Commitments to projects are not the same as money actually paid to Kenya. Most projects take several years to be implemented and hence the actual transfer of money from the Bank to the Government is spread over that period.

But since World Bank has been committing increasing amounts to Kenya over the years — in fact, the cumulative figure for commitments now stands at over \$1,000 million, excluding Kenya's share in East African community loans — our actual payments, or disbursements as the Bank jargon has it — are growing from year to year.

They were \$46 million in financial year '77, \$57 million in financial year '78 and \$77 million in financial year '79.

World Bank loans to Kenya

I.D.A. credits have to be repaid although over such a period (50 years) that certainly not a heavy burden.

Kenya's payments to Bank (for both amortization and interest) are in the order of \$20 million per year, so balance Kenya does receive a considerable net inflow of funds from the Bank Group.

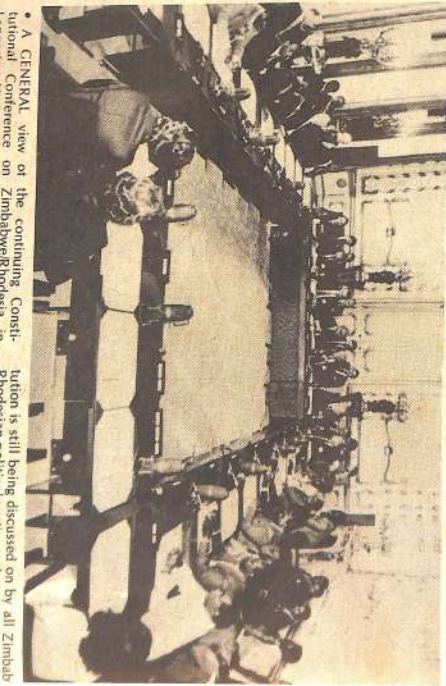

Apologies must go to Brollo, who would have hoped for a more competitive game, and following the electrifying encounter of a few weeks ago they may well have expected something better from M.S.C.

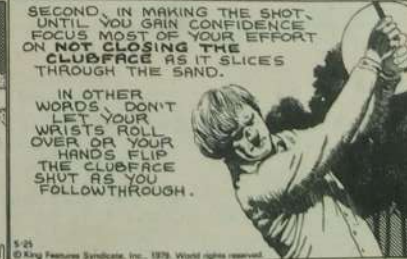

The final will be played in Nairobi next weekend.

TAIFA WILL TOUR BRAZIL
