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THICKENING:
This process varies slightly in different countries and for different dishes but the process is intended to give body to food of a liquid nature, from broths to sauces and syrups. Thickening with flour or starch consists of making a 'stable paste' by heating.

Dr. Modi. was absolutely amazed at the extensive range of exhibits from doctors which included a portable battery operated radio able to pick up conversations within a five-mile radius!

Now he works mostly in oils after finding water colours 'too messy', and has confined the use of water colours to his postage stamp size sketches which he blows up on canvas and then paints in oils.

As far as is known, he is the only doctor who paints at the Coast. He paints for pleasure, but being a very busy person finds time for his hobby, only at weekends or during holidays, depending on his mood.

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

Later my friends told me that homosexuality among certain religious sects is as old as the faith itself. They also claimed that homosexuality is not only found among such sects but is on the increase in other groups. of our society.

Some people who don't even want to hear the word homosexuality' because they believe sexual perversions don't exist in an African society are in for a big shot because the 'rebel trends' are seemingly on the increase.

Some homosexuals are no longer hiding what they are. They are seen in all public places. There are many men who have at one time or the who have at one time or the other been approached by fellow men for sexual favours.

A waiter in a Nairobi hotel told me recently that cases of males hunting for other males are increasing "at an unbelievable rate".

One waiter recalls that five years ago, you rarely saw an African homosexual looking African homosexual tooking for clients. But now you offen see many African homosexuals in hotels behaving in the same way like prostitutes in search of clients.

It is said that homosexual practice in East African Coastal towns dates back to the coming of foreign sailors and ancient traders. But some people strongly maintain that homosexuality was never existent in traditional African concitoties and is a product societies and is a product of foreign influence.

It is said that in some Coast towns 'marriages' between males have been witnessed. Women openly have 'affairs' with other women. And to avoid the usual hazards of normal sex such as pregnages, some school girls join in the 'harmless game'.

From what one hears, one recognises types of homosexuals. Sometimes inmates in male prisons have appeared in courts and admitted committing "an unnatural offence".

In one establishment in Nairobi it is claimed that employees have had to 'sleep' with the owner of the club to get promotion.

Young men in desperate need of money are turned into homosexuals as a means of earning a living.

In the brief discussions in the press about homosexuality, a writer noted that although the word 'homesexuality' disgusts many people, if two consenting adults (be they males or females) want to have a relationship, they should not be persecuted.

Thus, you might see a number of young men hanging around hotels and other public places to catch tourist clients.

Stories are told of young men who are lured by promises of jobs and a place to stay. Also, some boys of impressionable age have been turned into 'gays' by impressionable age have been turned into 'gays' by their teachers. This has also happened in other institutions

Some men leave their families because they prefer to have relationships with other men. One such a man left his wife and children for

After all this society is all set for progress. Since it has been shown that development been shown that development produces sexual perversions, Kenyans should be prepared to discuss (and perhaps accept) homosexuality as part of the price they have to pay for progress.

What is downright wrong is where grown-up males and females take advantage of young and impressionable boys and girls and turn them into homosexuals.

Another writer thinks that homosexuality can be prevented by eliminating those conditions responsible

for its occurence and by avoiding prolonged absence of the opposite partner.

During their adolescence most boys and girls are in secondary schools. It is here that steps should be taken to help them avoid sexual perfersions.

Carefully prepared sea education programmes would make youth understand the moral, social and physical disadvantages and possible damages that sexual damages that perversions can cause.

Some theories claim that sex roles are a matter of environmental and free choice, while others have it that the family is the major architect of homosexuality.

Freudian work of 'infantile sexuality' has it that experiences in the earliest years of life may have farreaching consequences. Given a good environment, a child can go through all the stages of development towards maturity. maturity.

A halt at one of the stages perhaps explains why some people discharge their sexual instincts in some unusual manner.

According to some modern psychoanalysts, genuine homosexual tendencies largely spring from situations in infancy.

Thus, the 'true homosexual' distinct from the dabbler in 'sexual perversions',
deserves understanding
because he or she is a loser

had no choice.



AN increasing number of banks in Kenya are changing over to a five day week, abolishing

Saturday opening, but remaining open for six

hours a day instead of

These extra hours of opening are used as a justification for closing on Saturdays by the trade union representing bank staff, implying that customers are going to benefit by the change.

Undoubtedly bank staff will applaud the change in hours as it will give them longer weekends, and who doesn't want an improvement in their leisure hours.

However, the main question must surely be whether the new hours are as convenient to bank customers as they were previously, since the customer's interests must be paramount in any business enterprise.

in any business emergine.

The answer to this question must be in the negative, as a large number of customers can only use bank facilities outside normal working hours, which

normal working hours, which means in the evening or on Saturday mornings.

Business customers will experience few difficulties from the new hours, but the private

The only opportunity they will have to use a bank will be during lunch hours, and for those workers employed outside

those workers employed outside the town centres, for example at Bamburi or Changamwe, it will be virtually impossible to get to a bank, especially if they rely on public transport.

Several years ago the major banks in U.K. abolished Saturday opening, using as evidence a survey which showed that only seven per cen of customers used their facilities on Saturday mornings.

This appeared to be sound evidence until a consumer organisation conducted a separate survey among bank customers, which indicated that apart from Fridays, Saturday was the busiest day.

On other days of the week the average number of customers using bank facilities was less than five per cent.

THE SIXTH Africa-Indian Ocean Regional Air Navigation Meeting — the first ever held in Africa will take place in Arusha (Tanzania) from November 20 to December 13 under the Auspices of ICAO (the International Civil Aviation Organisation).

Particular emphasis will be placed on the implementation of facilities and services needed for efficient and cost-effective air transportation as part of an integrated worldwide system.






