

Die Altstadt: Wo Mombasa begann

HIER VERMISCHT sich der penetrante Geruch von trockenem Fisch mit dem aromatischen Duft teurer Parfummessenzen, das Geräusch schrill aufheulender Fräsmaschinen unterbricht sporadisch den gleichmässigen, monotonen Gesang der Lasten tragenden Hafendarbeiter.

Motorboote kreuzen brümmend wie aufgereizte Hummeln zwischen den stattlichen Schornen, die alten schlanken Häuser scheinen Halt suchend sich aneinander zu lehnen, die gewundenen Strassen übertragend, wo moderne Autos mit aggressivem Motorenlärm durch die Gassen brausen, durch welche einst Vasco da Gama gewandert ist.

Dies ist die Altstadt von Mombasa. Eine Stadtrundfahrt ist komplett, ohne dieser Gegend mindestens einen Besuch in Musee abzustatten — einst das Herz der Stadt Mombasa, jetzt einen bewundernswerten Kontrast darstellend.

Um zur Altstadt zu gelangen, folgen Sie der Nkrumah Strasse, an der Gedächtniskathedrale vorbei zum Gerichtshof, dann schwenken Sie links ab in die Mbarak Hinawy Strasse. Bevor Sie hier abbiegen, werden Ihnen rechts die massiven roetlichen Mauern des Fort Jesus auffallen, auf das wir spaeter zu sprechen kommen werden.

Der Mittelpunkt von Mombasa's Altstadt ist der Alte Hafen. Wenn vom Maerz bis Mai die Monsunwinde vom indischen Subkontinent her in suedlicher Richtung wehen, kommen die malerischen Daus aus Oman, dem Persischen Golf, aus Karachi und Bombay, mit geblähtem Segel fahren sie majestaetisch durch die Luecke im Korallenriff, welches die Insel und den Alten Hafen umschliesst und gegen die grossen Brecher abschirmt.

Der noch vor kurzem vertraute Anblick von 50 bis 60 Daus, die friedlich im Hafen schaukeln, ist zum seltenen Schauspiel geworden, da dieses alte Transportmittel veraltet geworden ist und immer mehr durch raschere und wirtschaftlichere Verkehrsmoeglichkeiten verdraengt wird.

LAMU UND FAZA

Der Alte Hafen beschaeftigt zwar heute noch taeglich 70 "Hamalis" oder Kulis im Durchschnitt, hauptsaechlich fuer die interne Schoneischauffahrt. Diese Schoner gehoeren lokalen Gesellschaften und transportieren taeglich Lebensmittel nach Lamu und Faza und bringen auf dem Rueckweg die selbige Menge Mangrovenstangen.

Neben dem Hafengebäude ist das Samaki Industrie Depot. Frische Meeresfruechte werden dort von den Verteilern an die Grossehaendler und den Einzelhandel vertrieben. Ein grosser Teil geht direkt nach Nairobi, um den immer grosseren Bedarf an frischen Meeresfruechten zu decken.

Etwas weiter vorn ist der Fischmarkt, wo die einheimischen Fischer ihren Tagesfang abgeben.

Frischen ist unbedingt erforderlich und der gewiegte Fischer erkennt intuitiv jeden "Neuling", wenn dieser ungeschickt mit einem Fingerdruck die Qualitaet eines saftigen Frisches pruefen will. Es ist ratsam, moeglichst frueh morgens auf dem Markt zu sein, packen Sie entschlossen einen Fisch, der Ihnen besonders gut zu sein scheint, nennen Sie einen Preis und bestehen Sie hartnaeckig darauf. Nach ungefaehr drei Minuten haerten Frisches sollten Sie mit dem Verkaufserloes einen guten Preis ausgehandelt haben.

Auf dem Fischmarkt finden Sie Haifisch-Risotto fuer Ihre Suppe und gelegentlich auch die Saegen eines Schwertfisches als Dekoration fuer Ihre Wohnung.

Einen steinwurf entfernt befindet sich Mr Yusuf Abdulla und verbreitet seine wohlriechenden Duette. In seinem sehr reinlich gehaltenen Laden koennen Sie aus 300 verschiedenen exotischen Parfums aussuchen. Er bereitet die Mischungen selber zu, garantiert ohne Alkoholzusatz zur Beruhigung der zahlreichen islamischen Bevoelkerung, die in seiner unmittelbaren Umgebung wohnt.

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NOW THAT Kiswahili is the national language of Kenya, it is imperative that we become fully and heavily involved in its development and promotion.

Whereas during the colonial period it was not taken seriously although it was an examination subject in certain schools and was used in broadcasting, local government administration and in the running of local tribunals, it must now be taken seriously as an important factor in the social and cultural life of Kenyan people.

We should no longer accept the language with indifference and be unappreciative of its cultural significance and literary worth. Actually, it is heartening to observe that we Kenyans are gradually beginning to be aware of its importance as a language to be reckoned with and the great future it has in our everyday life.

This being the case, we not only have to master the language but also to utilise it fully and efficiently as a vehicle of communication between the different ethnic groups of our highly cosmopolitan population.

'NATIONAL PRIDE'

It is not enough for us Kenyans to treat Kiswahili as a matter of personal choice, but as something of national importance requiring priority. It must involve our conscience and make us adopt a posture of national pride in it and be appreciative of its relevance in the scheme of things in contemporary Kenya.

It is imperative for us to take the language seriously, not only because it is the accepted national language and the only medium of inter-tribal communication, but also because of the important part it played in our political

history of the pre-independence era. It was one of the instruments used in the political struggle. Our political leaders conducted their meetings in Kiswahili.

They used it rhetorically to address the masses. They used it to persuade and convince. In short, it functioned efficiently as an organ of political persuasion and a veritable weapon for fighting for our independence. The role played by Kiswahili during the vital period cannot be overlooked or minimised; it has become part and parcel of our political history.

Having used Kiswahili as an effective weapon in the struggle for independence, we should not rest on our laurels and assume that it has performed its function, and there is, therefore, no need for us to take it seriously.

On the contrary, now is the time for us to assign to it the important task of interpreting our approaches to the problems of our free country and making our people aware of the world around us.

Our awareness of the importance and supremacy of Kiswahili must make us be fully committed to its promotion, for it inspired

us and we used it during the colonial period to rest our political freedom; now it must equally inspire us to recognise its worth as an effective instrument for interpreting the soul of our nation.

One way by which we can take Kiswahili seriously is to give more attention to its teaching in our schools (both primary and secondary) and higher institutions like teacher-

training colleges and the university, and chalk up, and embark on, a programme of serious research into its literature, lexicography and related features, for it must not be forgotten that Kiswahili originated in Kenya: that is

promoting it. As Kenya is part of East Africa larger scale that of Africa and is the of Kiswahili, she has the impenetrable task of developing it to the extent that one day the dream of the supra-tribal and continental Africa may be realised.

In many circles it has already suggested that it be used as a language of Africa as it is the only indigenous that is most widely spoken.

It is unlikely that Arabic, a language spoken extensively in northern Africa understood in a wide area south of that has been Islamised, can be a common language of Africa. It is a venture to question this assertion: it is simple: it is because Arabic, although one of the languages of Africa a thousand years, has its culture elsewhere.

Kiswahili is indigenous to Africa, roots lie firmly and surely in the soil of Africa. It has the distinct advantage of being a tribal language any language made the people of East Africa a they are one people and can cross tribal, regional and national boundaries in Africa and thus assume dimensions and thereby unify Africa.

This may sound like a dream, some dreams have a degree of reality to come true? Can't the dream of Kiswahili the continental language materialise if we are fully committed to its development and promotion?

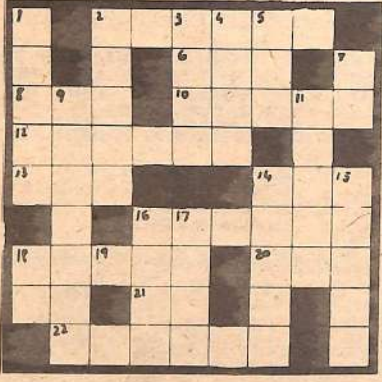

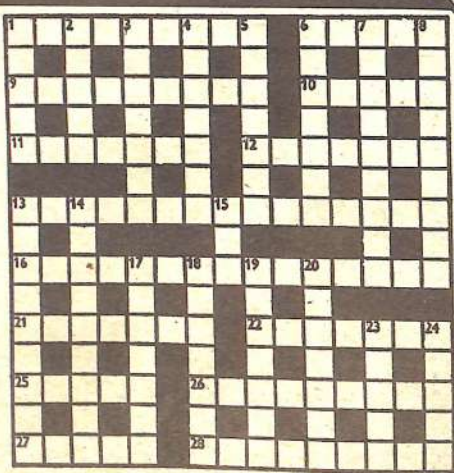

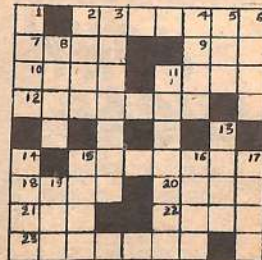

THE FLAG of Kenya was adopted in 1963 when the country gained independence from Britain. It consists of black, red and green horizontal stripes (from the top) with a thin white stripe between each colour. The black colour stands for the people of Kenya, the red for the blood shed by the people in the fight for independence, the green for agriculture (the main source of income of Kenya) and the white for peace and unity. The central motif comprises a shield, in front of two crossed spears standing for the defence of the country. Green, white and red

vertical stripes form the basic flag of Mexico. The national emblem is placed centrally in the white stripe and depicts an eagle holding a snake in its beak, perched on a prickly-pear plant. This emblem is based on an old Aztec legend. Green provides the background for the flag of Saudi Arabia. A white sword is pictured on the lower portion. Above this white Arabic characters proclaim that there is no God but Allah, and Mohammed is the Prophet and Allah. This is the Muslim declaration of faith.

DRY TIMES AHEAD

ABOUT 30-40 PER CENT more water is needed to end the current water shortage in Mombasa, writes Neta Peal.

The shortage has been caused by increasing demand as a result of the many developments in the area, according to the general manager, Coast Province Water Branch of the Ministry of Water Develop-

ment, Mr O. S. Cege.

Said a spokesman "we need every drop we can get". Demand was soaring all the time — but there had been only modest increases in water sources. Consequently, all systems were running flat out — and there were no reserves.

The situation would only be completely alleviated when the E35 million Sabaki Water Scheme comes into operation providing about 10 million gallons a day from the Sabaki River, Baricho, to supplement supplies along the north coast and Mombasa Island.

This, it is hoped, would be about mid-1980.

PEMBA RIVER DAM MAY HELP OUT MOMBASA

As far as Mombasa north mainland is concerned, he said "we cannot get more water there". The spokesman explained "over the past two years we have been able to balance out the distribution of water in this area. Providing nothing goes wrong, the water is reasonably shared out. But", he pointed out "any minor fault can upset the delicate balance of supplies".

It is water from Marere and Merina Springs pipelines which feed an area from Kilifi on the north coast to Diani on the south coast. It is providing "slightly over 10 million gallons a day for distribution to five major zones — Mombasa west mainland, Mombasa south mainland, Mombasa Island, Mombasa north mainland and the Sokoni/Kilifi complex.

The branch is hoping that a dam built on the Pemba River will, in the next two weeks, be helping supplement supplies to Mombasa Island.

The spokesman pointed out that although, officially, water is only available from 6a.m. to 6p.m. each day, as and when supplies improve so they are passed on to the consumer. Only recently, he said "water had been available up to about 6p.m. at night".

The south coast is in a much happier position with virtually a 24 hour supply of water, with any restriction being due to breakdowns, or limitations of

TOURISM UP IN THE SEYCHELLES

DESPITE experiencing a decrease of visitors from certain tourist markets, the latest figures released last week by a Kenyan press group on the amount of visitors alighting on Seychelles shores, show an overall increase over last year.

This year's number of visitors has reached 67,712 — 26 per cent increase over last year's figure.

France still leads with a total of 12,971 tourists representing

a 27 per cent increase over 1978. Next are the United Kingdom and Eire with 11,404, followed by Italy 6,912 and West Germany with 4,093 visitors. Both figures represent a 36, 69 and 25 per cent increase respectively.

Seychelles in 1977, 64,995 in 1978 and over 73,000 are estimated for 1979.

According to the statistics, there is also a clear and continuing indication of growth from the Middle East which has realised a 227 per cent increase over last year, followed by the Indian sub-continent with 163 per cent.

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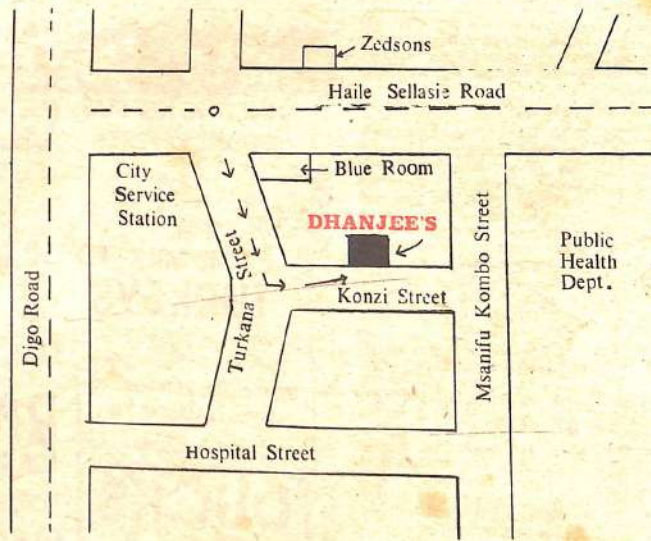

PROBLEMS OF MAKING REAL MARRIAGES WORK

THE Seventh-day Adventist Church latest issue of "The Keen Observer" publication has some disturbing information about social trends in the modern society. For example, in an article entitled "Is Marriage out of date", the publication notes that marriage is the oldest institution known to man although nowadays there are those who maintain it is out of date and it is almost coming to an end.

In the cities of present-day Africa, separation and divorce are on the increase. Although the publication does not give statistics since many marriages are not registered, it argues that men and women are leaving their partners and sometimes their children to move in with someone else who appeals to them.

Reasons for this breakdown are varied. According to the publication, one is the influence from the western world where sometimes two out of three marriages are dissolved. Another reason is that today women are better educated and receive better pay, making them more independent and not willing to tolerate bad treatment from their husbands.

The publication further asserts that the home is the foundation of society and when the sacred bond of marriage is tampered with mankind suffers. The increase in crime among the youth and the many unhappy people are a result of the breakdown of the home.

And a recent review of the state of Christian marriages in Africa established that "Christian marriage is a mess. It doesn't take any research to establish that". The review was commissioned by Anglican bishops.

This situation made the National Christian Council of Kenya pass a resolution that members of the organisation should focus their attention on the family, its problems and how these can be tackled.

The organisation tried to encourage discussions which would point out sources of disharmony in families. Such discussions are expected to eventually convince many people that if you want to maintain a healthy family life, you have to be open for discussions with your family.

To make such discussions possible you have to spend some of your time with your family.

Some people extend their working hours into the night at the expense of their

families. Some children don't see their father because he comes home late and when they leave for school he is still sleeping. Such a husband might argue that he comes home late because he is trying to make money for the family.

But wives who are bored because they never see their husbands except in the small hours maintain that such husbands should know that their families need them and not just their money. This situation leads to constant quarrels between wives and husbands which may lead to a marriage breaking up.

As some social workers state, a lot of problems can be solved if there is communication within the family. But it is still a challenge for social workers to find realistic ways in which a couple can communicate. In some families, members are strangers to each other.

A man who gets his pay and goes and spends it on drinks and women is not going to talk to his wife in case she asks him for money. Also a woman is not going to embrace a man who, without any explanation has not been home for a week.

Some people believe that the way the family income is used can be the single most important source of conflict in a family. In some cases, husbands make all the decisions on how money should be earned and spent. They sometimes make mistakes which lead wives becoming quarrelsome.

Wives are not blameless in this aspect. Some of them drive their husbands crazy by demanding things they simply cannot afford. This may lead to a husband leaving his family or taking to drink to forget his demanding wife.

At this point it is worth noting that marriages are failing even among couples who have no financial problems. Many reasons have been advanced as to why marriages often fail in modern societies.

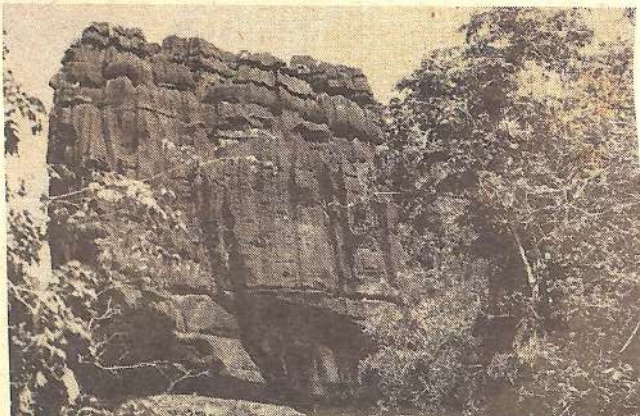

Impressive scenery hides a wealth of... Cornwall of...

Only a hour's drive from Mombasa, a road branches off from the Mariakani-Mt. Kenia road and follows the foot of the escarpment to Jaribuni, famous for its one shop, numerous goats and the "Jaribuni drift".

Here where the Ndzovuni River crosses the road enroute to the Sea, there is often only a slight trickle of water but occasionally it turns into a raging torrent normally just in time for the Safari Rally at Easter.

Whatever the depth, the local authorities encourage you to cross so take care: the new highway built along the line of the Sabaki Water Project, you soon find yourself in limestone country, and the Njora River goes through the forest to avoid an area permanently flooded section of the river, descend to the sandy riverbed; it is sometimes almost completely dry but was there a few weeks ago there was a quietly flowing stream.

On either side were the grey cliffs of limestone, in places blackened by the lichen. Exotic vegetation, aloes, euphorbia, dracaena and the prehistoric cycad contributed to the lost world appearance of the valley.

Monkeys hurled themselves through the trees, startled at the approach of a stranger, rock hyrax sunning themselves on the ledges, fled into the cracks but soon emerged to stare in curiosity.

LEAPING LIZARDS

A large monitor lizard thumped off a rock into the river and swam swiftly into the dense and overhanging vegetation on the bank.

Branches at least two feet over my head were full of dried grass and twigs, evidence of the great river which had run down here earlier this year.

Then, round a bend in the river, a startling sight: the whole gorge was blocked by a wall of and tumbling mass of boulders, the river flowing out from a rectangular exit to the side.

I scrambled into the opening and found myself in a perfectly oval passage about four feet high.

Using a torch I waded up-stream for a few yards before reaching a right hand bend.

Along another passage, partly blocked by a branch washed in by the floods, the glimmer of daylight and I emerged into an underground cavern lit by a shaft of sunlight streaming down from a hole in the ceiling seventy feet above.

Creepers hung down, brilliantly green in the sun, and against the blue sky high above rose the towering pinnacles of limestone.

BLACK MAMBA CLOSE-UP

A strange squeaking from all around: thousands were roosting in the narrow passages. What a place to explore — word of caution, these passages are complicated and as I later discovered, are not easy to get lost in. You literally need a piece of string or a piece of chalk.

There are only two things to worry about when walking in this part of the Coast: snakes and bees.

The former almost invariably sensibly coming and slide out of the way, but I once got within two feet of a black mamba sunning itself after a shower of rain, very far too close.

Bees can usually be heard, of course, frequent rocky places so do watch out for them.

There are leopard in this area but tend to avoid contact with humans.

Thoughts on Jamhuri Day

IN THE past 16 years Kenyans have seen their country pass through remarkable changes. Under the first President, Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, political control at every level was successfully transferred to the hands of indigenous Kenyans and a beginning was made in taking over control of the economy through Africanisation and a self-reliance drive.

Under President Daniel arap Moi Kenyans have witnessed a determined Government drive against smuggling and other forms of corruption.

The standard of living has gone up in the 16 years since independence although, admittedly, the national cake could have been shared out much more fairly. President Moi has promised to deal with income inequalities in Kenya, especially those between urban and rural areas — but the job will be difficult. It will need the co-operation of all Kenyans.

There are many things to celebrate on this 16th anniversary of our independence. However tough times lie ahead and Kenyans cannot afford to be complacent. Inflation is bound to become worse, especially for the low-income groups if past experience is any indication. Food shortages need to be resolved. Lack of housing is still a major problem in urban areas. Employment opportunities need to be increased all over the country.

All these problems can be solved only if every Kenyan acts in accordance with the Nyayo spirit. Too often in the past, Price increases and other measures which should not have affected the majority have done so because of unexplained increases in the cost of basic foodstuffs. Transport costs have risen while services have deteriorated. It is unfair to ask low-income Kenyans not to press for higher wages when they see the rich getting richer while they themselves become poorer.

KHOMEINI IGNORING TENETS OF ISLAM'

Ayatollah Khomeini has been held in high esteem and reverence as a great revolutionary hero and spiritual leader of

Iran whose strong religious beliefs spoke up for the oppressed people against the autocrat and who moved proudly and patriotically to die passionately for the rights of the individual.

He condemned and denounced the tyrannical andocratic monarchy of the Shah.

The Holy Quran says that a ruler will be judged on 'Day of Judgement' for the deeds done to the masses. Indeed, every misdeed is held accountable.

Many of those being led on a wrong path while knowing well that it was wrong will eventually ask: 'Why did you not speak up?'

Iran has moved Khomeini to the political arena and his Government has caused him to be deported from the life of a political exile in France.

The Shah's regime was exalted with the most terrible crimes committed by 'dreaded S.S.' of Iran — a criminal gang of professional thugs known as SAVAK.

His organisation, whose job was similar to Idi Amin's State Security Bureau in Uganda, was to flush out and eliminate Government elements.

Many pro-Shah supporters were brought to trial in an Islamic court and punished — some very harshly, which earned Khomeini a lot of criticism, which he rightly deserved.

Sadly, today Khomeini has become what the Shah was during his reign — a dictator who wished to run an entire nation without lending a sympathetic ear to others who knew far better how a proper Government should be run.

By approving and giving the go-ahead order for the seizure of the United States Embassy and holding innocent people as hostages, and in trying for their lives in exchange for the Shah, extradition of the Shah, Khomeini has not only violated international diplomatic laws, international law, but also the very religion he has sworn to uphold.

As a man well-versed in Islamic matters Khomeini has forgotten that Islam is a religion of Love, a religion of Humanity, a religion of Forgiveness and Goodwill; a religion which strongly regards Human Rights, and considers their violation as a great sin and evil.

Some prices actually go down with time

ALTHOUGH we live in an inflationary era and prices are rising all the time, some goods have actually fallen in price in real terms in recent years.

To establish whether prices are rising or falling in real terms, it is necessary to relate prices to incomes and to measure how much it costs to buy a particular item in terms of the time worked to earn the salary needed for its purchase.

For example, when black and white televisions first became popular in the U.K. in the early 1950's the average price was in the region of £50.

Most workers at that time received a salary of around £5 per week so that the real cost of a television was the equivalent of ten weeks salary.

Nowadays, a similar set will cost £90, but weekly salaries have increased to £80, so that the real cost of televisions has fallen as it now takes only slightly more than one week's salary to buy a set.

In a similar way, the real cost of calculators has fallen over the last ten years. When first introduced the market for them was limited and confined to the better off section of the community, but now they are within the reach of most people.

When such electrical goods initially come onto the market, their price is inevitably high because production is in relatively small quantities and there are heavy research and development costs to be recouped in the shortest

possible period of time.

As soon as people see potential uses, however, intensive advertising campaigns are undertaken, the market expands and an increasing number of consumers them.

As a result, the scale of production increases and can use their physical more efficiently, components at lower price also gain economies in fields as administration, transport and marketing.

Costs of production with the effect that manufacturers can charge lower prices, and consequently market expands again.

At the moment video recorders are selling in at a price in excess of 30,000=, but only be the world wide market has small until now.

In Europe and Japan North America the market taken off in recent months with the result that their has started to fall considerably.

The November 1978 throughput was 1,672 tons higher than the corresponding month this year. A total of 193,141 tons comprised of 109,781 tons of imports and 83,360 tons of exports were handled in November last year.

Seventy two general cargo ships called at the port over the month of November as compared to 65 ships that called over the month of October.

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DON'T GIVE OLD TYRES THE BOOT

If you have any old motor tyres — do not throw them away, but take them to the Polio Clinic at Mombasa's Port Reitz — where good use can be made of them, writes Neta Peal.

This appeal was made by Dr. Geoff Cunningham, Chairman of the A.P.D.K. Coast, when addressing guests including District Commissioner, Mombasa, Mr Francis Cherogony and assistant Director of Medical Services, Ministry of Health, Dr A. K. Gikonyo, during 'open day' to mark the 21st anniversary of the A.P.D.K. in Kenya.

He said that rubber strips from these tyres were used on clogs being produced for disabled children there.

Speaking about the future of the clinic, Dr Cunningham said "the need for it will continue in the foreseeable future as despite vigorous vaccination programmes they had found a cyclical pattern of breakthroughs in polio attacks over the past five years".

During 1978, the clinic registered 160 new patients, of whom 104 were polio victims. This year, between January and October, there had been 117 new cases, of whom 74 related to polio. They were not from Mombasa alone, but from other districts of the Coast Province, also a few from Kitui and Busia.

Their 'greatest problems' at the moment he said were to find not only sufficient funds to re-start the mobile clinic and revive channels of communication with district hospitals, but also a full-time qualified physiotherapist locally.

Netherlands

The mobile unit had to be discontinued as physiotherapists were no longer available from the Netherlands Volunteer Service as it was considered they could now be provided in Kenya.

The clinic, also, has been without a qualified physiotherapist for some time and the situation had been reached where for 3 1/2 months Anthony Karisa, workshop manager, was helping in whatever way he could to keep the service going.

The situation had been 'saved' with the advent of Mrs Elizabeth Okelloka, an occupational therapist who had worked with disabled and crippled people throughout her career. She was 'standing in' until a qualified physiotherapist could be found locally, when a post would be created for her to continue working at the clinic.

Calling for "more co-operation between government agencies and voluntary service organisations" Dr Cunningham also thought "the time had come when government participation must increase, as it was becoming more of a burden on people and their resources to keep the momentum of such projects as this going indefinitely".

Much more

Referring to the fact that 1980 had been designated by President Daniel arap Moi as 'The Year of the Disabled', Dr Cunningham said "let us hope that during this year we may be able to do much more for unfortunate and crippled children in the Coast Province".

Thanking members of A.P.D.K. for the "good work they are doing" also voluntary organisations such as the Mombasa Round Table No. 3 as well as doctors, nurses, teachers, physiotherapists and the Katherine Bibby Hospital, Dr Gikonyo — representing the Director of Medical Services, Dr W. Koinange — said "it was good to see such interest being taken in training and helping generally physically disabled people to find a place in society so that they may earn a living and support themselves, thereby easing the social problem with which the country is faced".

His Ministry was very grateful to voluntary organisations for what they are doing towards improving the health of the community" and Dr Gikonyo said how very impressed he had been by the

work being carried out by the polio clinic.

He has particularly struck as well by the fact that its workshop was producing calipers and crutches at a much cheaper price than in hospitals.

"What was needed" he said "was not prestigious — but simple things — so that the less fortunate members of our community can afford to buy the equipment they need".

Saying that the Ministry was doing everything it can to help voluntary organisations, including the A.P.D.K., he said that "as more local physiotherapists are trained we shall always remember to post, or second some, to the A.P.D.K."

He went on "we also feel there is a need for financial support, and I am sure government is doing this to a limited extent, but as our economic position improves so we shall continue to

increase the grant".

Dr Gikonyo suggested it might be better at this stage "when we do not have many qualifying as physiotherapists for the mobile clinic to visit areas where district hospitals have their own physiotherapist" By integrating this service, he thought more could be achieved.

Symbol

The polio clinic stands as a remarkable symbol of achievement by a small band of Round Tables (Mombasa No. 3) who in 1964 saw the urgent need for something to be done for polio victims at the Coast.

Following an extremely successful project by Kampala Round Table No. 2 which pioneered treatment of polio victims in developing countries under the direction of Professor R. Huckstep, they converted a small unused building which

had been condemned in the Port Reitz Hospital complex into a clinic.

The British V.S.O. and Netherlands Volunteer Service assisted by providing qualified physiotherapists. The Wembley Pool was donated in 1966 by the Wembley Round Table, U.K., while money to refurbish the building came from the Albert Pereira fund.

An ambulance collects the children and takes them to the clinic for treatment, while Anthony Karisa, workshop manager, who has been there since 1966 is doing a wonderful job in making calipers and crutches.

The Round Table No. 3 ran the clinic successfully for many years — but as it is not their policy to get too involved in any one project, the Coast branch of the A.P.D.K. was formed in 1971 to assume responsibility for it. However, the Round Table continue to



give financial support.

Dr Cunningham paid tribute to the volunteers from overseas who had done a wonderful job; to Mr Rowland McVicker, orthopaedic surgeon, who had kept the whole treatment set-up going by performing operations on crippled children free of charge since 1966; the Katherine Bibby Hospital for providing two amenity beds in the children's ward and the use of their operating theatre. Said Dr Cunningham "they take only a token fee for the beds, and nothing at all for the operating theatre".

He was applauded when he said in view of its financial plight, the hospital is not really in a position to give anything away, and felt that "full recognition of what it is doing towards the care of disabled children of the province should

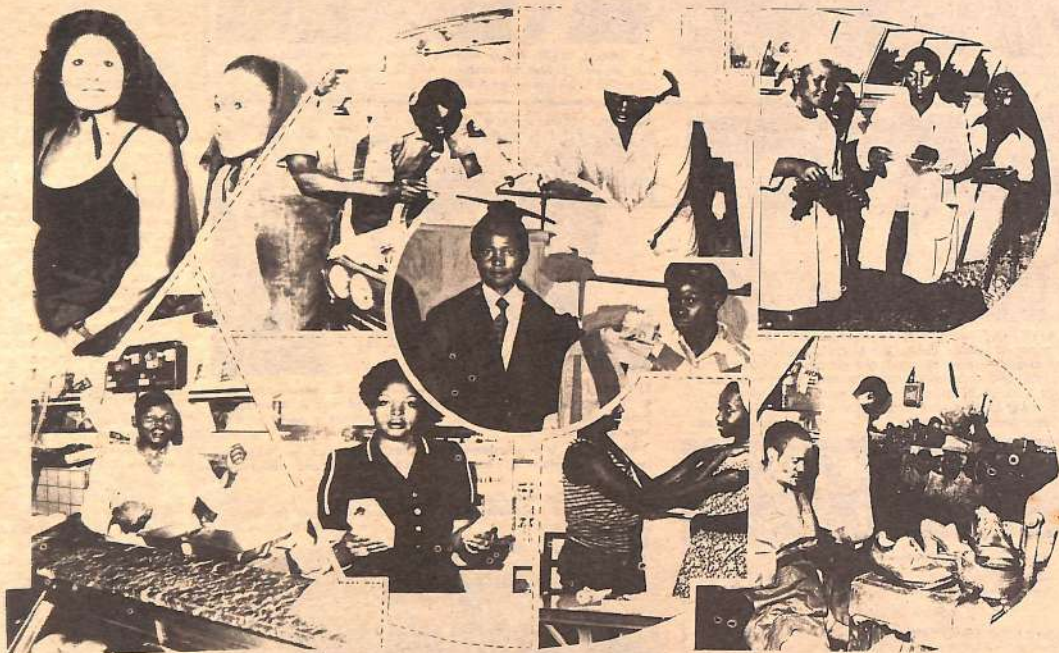
be given, for over the years this must amount to a considerable sum".

There was also a big "thank you" to Dr Robert Davidson, and his associate, who give their services free of charge as anaesthetists.

Dr Cunningham pointed out that "despite the tremendous amount of work undertaken by the clinic, running costs amounted to a very modest Shs. 140,000/= a year. A great factor towards its success, however, had been the Ministry of Health's assistance in providing nursing staff and meals for in-patients.

CZECH FIRM FINANCES NEW GLASS FACTORY FOR TANZANIA

A 376.2 million shilling sheet glass factory, first of its type in East and Central Africa is to be built in Dar es Salaam by two parastatal organisations.

The factory which will be owned by the Tanzania Saruji Corporation and the Building, Hardware and Electrical Supplies Company Limited (BHESCO) will have a production capacity of 15,000 tons of sheet glass a year — four times the country's demand. About 75 per cent of the total output will be earmarked for export.

The Saruji Corporation has also signed an agreement with a Czechoslovak trade firm — Messrs Pragoinvest for the construction of a 112,920 million shilling ceramics factory in Morogoro. BHESCO and another parastatal — Household Supplies Company (HOSCO) will also have shares in the venture. When completed it will have a production capacity of 1,000 tons of table per year.

The Finnish Government will grant Tanzania 268 million shillings for development projects over the next few years. The funds will be used for the rural water, forestry and construction sectors.

Studies aimed at establishing modern fish breeding in villages ponds (Aquaculture) on Tanzania mainland are nearing completion — thanks to a three-year Aquaculture development programme at all regions on Tanzania mainland funded by F.A.O.

Under the programme, the government will rehabilitate most of the existing 600 ponds, improve fish culture techniques and establish 100 new ponds. The programme has covered Arusha, Morogoro, Mwanza, Kilimanjaro, Kigoma and Ruvuma regions.

The Ministry of Agriculture is to spend 15.9 million shillings on a wheat research centre in Arusha and on establishing permanent wheat farms in various areas of the country.

The project aided by Canada will be launched early next year and work is expected to be completed by 1982.

About 16,000 residents Dar es Salaam near the port will have to be resettled to pave the way for the development of the harbour side land.

Since the residents at Shimo la Udongo have not been allocated plots, they are considered as 'squatters' under the law. They will however be paid compensation.

The newly-established Tanzania Professional Centre will hold its first general meeting at the Muhimbili Medical Centre. The members who represent professional organisations will discuss the setting up of the centre which is to be funded by the Common-

- A 900,000/= nail plant Iringa which was completed last April has not started production due to a shortage of spare parts and is making motor spares to offset losses.

But production has resumed at the Mahonda Sugar Factory in Zanzibar after a six-month suspension due to a shortage of spare parts. The company lost 11.3 million shillings.

The factory with a capacity for 8,000 tons of sugar a year has ordered 4 million shillings worth of spares from the U.S.A. It can also produce 1 million bottles of brandy and vodka per year.

The World Food Conference — an off-shoot of F.O.C. — will hold a two-week meeting on food strategies at the Agricultural International Conference Centre in June next year.

MWANZA

- The Mwanza Development Corporation (Mwadeco) will put up factories specialising in producing paper and spectacles frames.

And in Dar es Salaam, the third international meeting of the secretary-general of Unesco's national commissions has been urged to consider ways of reducing dependence and documentation between the secretariat and member states and national commissions.

- Tanzania husbands have been told by the Minister for Manpower Development, Abel Mwangi that they should join their wives who are studying abroad, he noted.

The Minister nominated members of Parliament to a decision last year to encourage wives to join their husbands abroad was taken to avoid possible splits in marriages.

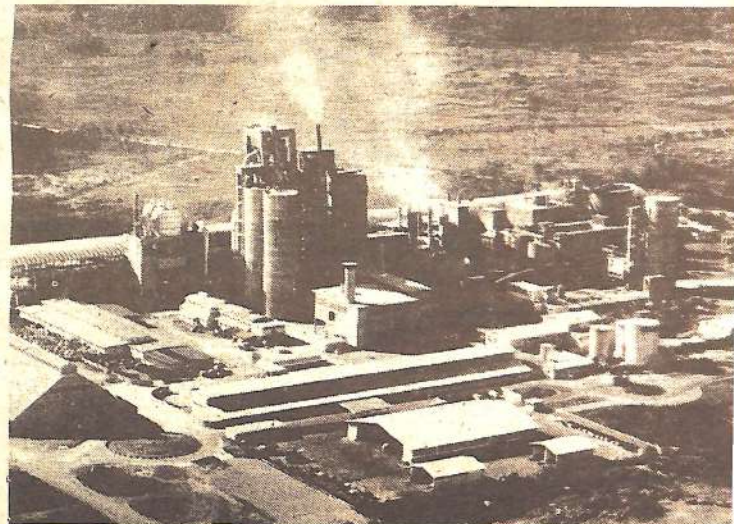

SHEILA MURUMBI'S SPICED TRIPE STEW.
This is a substantial start to economical, but very good. Mrs. Murumbi is a superb cook and so is her husband will almost certainly not be needed by those who try this tripe for themselves.

1 pound of tripe
4 leaspoons salt
5 mints of cold water
2 1/2 tablespoons of vegetable oil
1 large onion sliced
2 1/2 teaspoons chopped garlic
1 green pepper chopped
2 ounces finely chopped chillies
6 firm medium tomatoes sliced
3 1/2 teaspoons Worcester.
2 1/2 teaspoon vinegar
1 teaspoon oregano

Boil the tripe in the water removing any scum which forms on the surface. It will float off very hot then add the onion, garlic, green pepper and chillies and cook for two with a wooden spoon.

The vegetables should become soft but should not be carefully then add the tomatoes. Worcester sauce, vinegar, oregano, salt, pepper, the capers and leafy stirring occasionally until most of the liquor has evaporated.

Slice the tripe in small, thin strips. Add to the sauce, bring when it bubbles. Hand Farnesian cheese separately.

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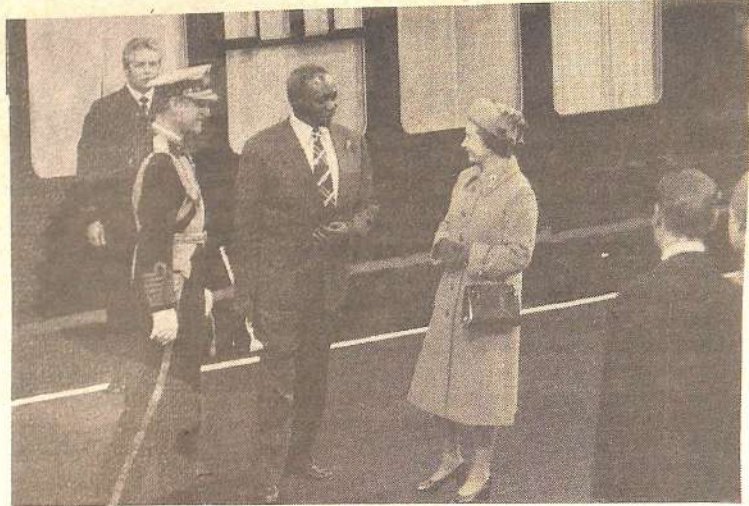

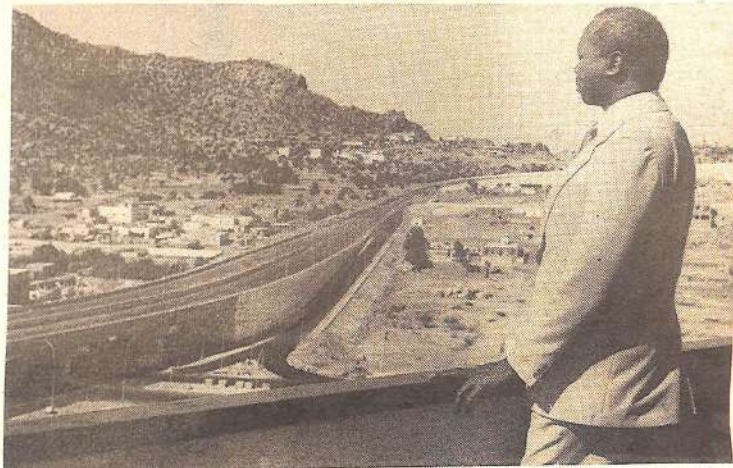

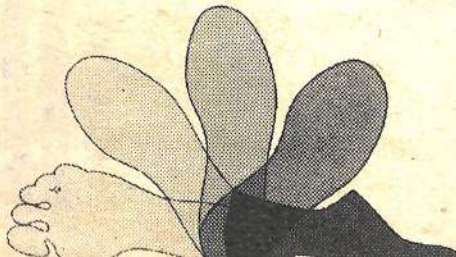
