SEYCHELLES COMBAT POLLUTION

THE GOVERNMENT of Seychelles has launched a campaign for the prevention and control of marine pollution in the Indian Ocean, writes Gray Phombeah.

This announcement was made by the Minister for Transport and Tourism, Mr Mathew Servina during a five-day Seventh Council Meeting of the Port Management Association of Eastern Africa held in Victoria, Mahe recently.

The meeting was attended by delegates from Kenya, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Mozambique, Madagascar and Sudan, as well as I.M.C.O., U.N.D.P., E.C.A., U.N.C.T.A.D. and U.N.E.P.

The Governments of Kenya and Madagascar have already committed their support and participation in the campaign, and it is expected that other nations in the regions and international organisations will follow suit soon.

The campaign launched by the Seychelles government has too been endorsed by the Inter-Governmental Maritime Consultative Organisation (I.M.C.O.) during its recent meeting in London.

According to Ministry of Transport and Tourism sources in Victoria, anti-marine pollution measures include combating thousands of tons of oil that are either jettisoned or pumped into the sea by passing ships every year, which in the long run would have disastrous effect on marine life and beaches.

Mr Servina observed that countries of the Indian Ocean were already being threatened by the danger of marine pollution.

BREAD BACK FOR XMAS

HERE WILL BE enough bread for Mombasa residents during Christmas, reports Gray Phombeah.

According to a spokesman for Seifee's Bakery, the wheat flour situation has now improved and so production will be increased in time to meet the demand expected during the festive season.

However, due to higher production costs of some varieties, customers may be unable to get all the types they want.

"We had a ten per cent price increase on standard bread a month ago, but it did not include variety loaves like milk and nut loaves. Faced with higher production costs, we cannot produce enough to meet the demand, especially during Christmas," said the spokesman.

The good news about the bread came as the town was being decorated in a sparkling mood to the pomp and ceremony which accompany Christmas holiday.

Christmas trees and flowers were to be seen in many offices and hotels in town.

Small "price-cut" posters and "bargain" offers were posted on shop windows along Digo Road and Moi Avenue, changing the face of the town.

Incidents are expected to occur in shops and supermarkets as last-minute purchases this year.

Boom

A survey showed that despite a shortage of money, price increases and the wrath of inflation some shop-owners are doing brisk business while restaurants and hotels were stepping up for the season.

The manager of Kenya Wines and Spirits said that mounting sales from retailers pointed to a sales boom ahead: "It has been a busy time since last year and we are now preparing for the big rush during the Christmas and up to Monday."

Retailers, bar-owners and liquor retailers also expect to do good business as the price increases on goods introduced last June.

Musau Charles Mutua set a studio record by obtaining the maximum mark of 99 out of a possible 99 marks in Grade 2. James and Iqbal Dhanji both passed Grade 2 each obtaining 85 marks. Nuzhat Tapya passed Grade 1 with 85 marks.

Hazel Connington, a finalist herself and an assistant teacher of this Studio, takes the credit for training Musau Charles Mutua, Patrick Kalume, Kelvin Gilbert Pragassa, Zoreen and Iqbal Dhanji. Inge Bosse, also a finalist and assistant teacher of this Studio and music teacher in a private school in Mombasa, entered Nuzhat Tapya for Grade 1, who passed with 85 marks.

Ed teaches music at a private school in Mombasa and since 1975 has been entertaining on the piano in the hotel's grill room five nights a week.

Edmund Silveira, one of the top musicians at the Coast, comes from a musical family and has gained many diplomas in music.

He had an American tutor at Mombasa, a Mrs Rogers, who taught classical music, and in 1955 joined with his father, Ubaldo (now deceased), in playing at private functions. Ed playing the piano and his father on the drums.

In 1958 he became interested in jazz, mainly of the modern style, being greatly influenced by the works of Oscar Peterson, George Shearing, Erroll Garner, Nat King Cole and Bud Powell. Ed is keen on 'funky' music as well.

Joe Nazareth joined the famous Jambo Boys in 1959. He is one of the top drummers at the Coast, as well as being a very fine accompanist. He is equally adept as a soloist, and has been influenced greatly by Joe Morello, Art Blakey and Max Roach.

'Jonjo' started playing bass in 1960 and is believed to be the only string-bass jazz musician in Kenya (acoustic).

New ape discovered

NEW monkey sub-species has been sighted in a mountain nest near Kilombero Sugar estate in Morogoro region by the University of Dar es Salaam scientists, Felix Kaiza sports from Dar es Salaam.

Scientists K. Bulstrode and A. Rodgers made the 'discovery' during a survey of primate population in Uzungwe mountains in Kilombero. The monkey is known locally as 'Kibaga' in Kihhehe and 'Makos' in Kipogolo.

This is the first time in more than 20 years that gibbons have been recorded in Tanzania and the first time that mangabey have been recorded in the country.

Both scientists say that the monkey has been identified as the mangabey (Cercopithecus). Its nearest relatives are found in Kenya. Other related sub-species are also found in Gabon and Zaïre.

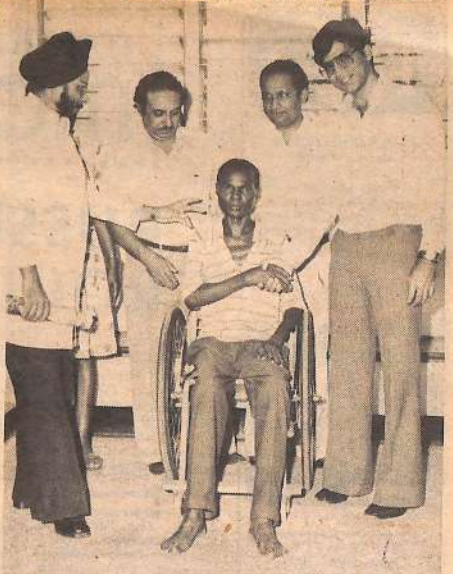

Fighting against sea pollution

"It is high time that countries in this region become concerned and take measures to prevent the situation from becoming worse" he told the delegates.

According to observers the Seychelles government had special reasons to express its grave concern over the issue by virtue of its isolated position in the path of the sea lane used by giant oil tankers plying from the Persian Gulf to Europe via Cape of Good Hope.

In the event of an oil slick the adverse direction of winds and currents would greatly jeopardize the islands' fishing and tourism industries — which until now are the mainstays of its economy.

Meanwhile, the Government of Seychelles is still faced with the problem of protecting its fisheries from over-exploitation and poaching by foreign vessels.

The Seychelles Exclusive Zone which covers one million

square kilometres of the Indian Ocean is reputed as the most important single fishing ground for deep sea tuna in the entire Indian Ocean and Western Pacific, and boasts of other exploitable species of fish.

The Government has recently purchased a fast and long range patrol vessel named Junon which is expected to arrive from Britain this month, and a maritime island aircraft expected early next year. The Government has so far been relying on one converted coastal minesweeper, named Topaz.

However, despite laws controlling the legitimate fishing on Seychelles waters by licensed foreign vessels, government officials see no possibility of eradicating poaching completely in such a vast expanse of ocean — twice as large as France!

But it is hoped that when both Topaz, Junon and the maritime islander aircraft are in operation, backed by stiff sentences for those caught fishing illegally, the rate of poaching on this part of the Indian Ocean will have been reduced drastically.

An end to shortages?

ALL COAST residents must have breathed a sigh of relief on receiving the information that the bread shortage is over — at least for the moment. The assurance by Seifee Bakeries should bring good cheer to everyone who has been desperately trying to plan a Christmas menu without flour and bread.

Those responsible for distributing wheat flour say that more imports next year will ensure a plentiful supply until October when Kenya's wheat crop is expected to come on the market.

We devoutly hope so. However, unless there is an unrelenting campaign against hoarding and smuggling the extra wheat flour is unlikely to appear on shop shelves.

The same goes for rice. The National Cereals and Produce Board, which introduced two-kilo bags recently to combat hoarding and then explained away the continuing shortage by saying that the packing machines had packed up, is now expected to revert to the 20-kilo bags.

The reason? The machine can pack more rice in 20-kilo bags than in two-kilo bags!

Theoretically, this will make a larger quantity of rice available to the consumer for Christmas. However, Father Christmas notwithstanding, unless a close watch is kept on distribution at all levels, the consumer likely to benefit most from this will be the one in Uganda.

It is encouraging to note that the authorities have voiced determination to continue the crackdown on smugglers and hoarders. We hope that plans are also in hand to increase rice production so that imports do not become necessary.

Christmas is supposed to be a time of goodwill to all men. As those responsible for the shortages in this country attend church services and feast in plenty, let them, too, reflect on the disservice they are doing to their fellow men.

OPINION ABROAD

Chief Ramokgopa's Appeal

South African government of Prime Minister P.W. Botha has made several recent pronouncements which, if carried out, would improve conditions for the blacks who make up the great majority of that country's population. Blacks have been granted rights to join trade unions, for example. Botha has questioned other laws that perpetuate the system of apartheid. Sadly, a dispatch last week from our correspondent reveals that South Africa is still resettling blacks against their will. Pronouncements, therefore, may be propaganda.

George Ramokgopa, of the town of Mankweng, has learned that his 50,000 people and the 30,000 members of a nearby village will be resettled from what they regard as the land of their birth to an area "with a single flowing river, that is unsuitable for raising animals, and unarable." Noting that his people now inhabit land that has no rivers, and the climate is neither too hot nor too dry," Chief Ramokgopa has asked for help to Pieter Koorhof, Minister for Black Affairs, who last year managed to block the destruction of the black town of Crossroads.

Forced relocations of entire communities are part of a policy adopted by South Africa in 1948. It allows the government to divide the nation into separate parts for whites, blacks, Asians and "coloreds" — people of mixed ancestry. In some cases, whites have been moved from ancestral lands. In most cases, blacks have been chased out of white areas to the so-called black "homelands," usually places that are hard to farm and develop.

The policy, of course, lets some white South Africans dream of an all-white nation. But the plight of Chief Ramokgopa's people demonstrates the cruel costs of those dreams. Koorhof does not see much hope for the blacks' latest appeal. He says whites in the Ramokgopa area have long been promised the chance to acquire the land of the blacks. Chief Ramokgopa has urged his people to remain calm, and pray.

Matatus vs. buses

WITH the ever-increasing number of matatus on our roads, the rate of accidents involving this controversial means of transport has alarmingly rocketed up.

Almost everyday newspapers carry tragic accident reports involving matatus, and more often than not we hear of numbers of innocent lives lost as a result of these collisions.

Despite all these tragedies, matatu operators are carrying out their trade which is earning them good profit.

On the other hand, the K.B.S. management, time and again, has complained of huge losses and a considerable reduction in the number of bus users since the introduction of matatus.

Despite the fact that matatus are known to be dangerous and risky. Most wananchi prefer transport by matatus to buses. I feel that this is due to the following factors:

First and foremost, matatus are cheap and fast. It is said that a matatu can cover in five minutes a distance which would normally take a bus twice that time. Matatu operators even agree to drop passengers right at their offices.

However, it should not be forgotten that matatus have been known to break down in the middle of heavy traffic, thus causing great inconvenience to other road users, and that many of these vehicles are not even fit to be on the roads.

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SEARCH FOR ENERGY FROM SEAWEED

IN THE current search for alternative sources of energy for the post-oil era some attention is being focussed on the potential of seaweed.

For example, a British scientist claims to have worked out detailed plans which could mean that in a decade or so part of Britain's electricity supply would come from generating stations using dried seaweed as their fuel.

In the United States a research project envisages the creation of "ocean farms" to harvest a giant form of seaweed called kelp. This would then be 'digested' by microbes to produce methane gas on which power stations could be run.

Both concepts form only a small part of the research now being undertaken into the role that biomass can play in meeting the world's future energy needs. The term includes all types of organic matter and is therefore potentially among the most plentiful of the Earth's renewable energy resources.

Moreover, biomass enjoys an advantage over other renewable sources such as sun, wind and wave power in that its energy is automatically stored for use when needed.

The British scientist, Ronald Pearson, of Bath University, has developed an "aquatic biomass engine" to dry seaweed. He proposes to draw on the world's largest concentration of growing seaweed, the Sargasso Sea area of the Atlantic Ocean for his energy source.

With a fleet of 150 ships, each of 250,000 tonnes, ferrying the material, he estimates that about half of Britain's energy needs could be met. He also calculates that the dried seaweed equivalent of a tonne of coal would be available at a cost of about \$14 whereas coal for power stations currently costs more than \$50 per tonne.

Mr Pearson makes another claim. He says

he is convinced that oil can be produced from seaweed at a cost comparable to that of extracting it from coal.

The American experiment, being conducted off San Diego, California, involves growing kelp in nets over a 2.8 hectare area of sea. This species of seaweed grows at the rate of 45 centimetres daily, to reach a length of more than 60 metres in six months.

The plan is to harvest the weed at the end of this period, and it is estimated that "ocean farms" with a total area of about 1,200 square kilometres could meet the U.S.'s entire natural gas needs.

Seaweed is not the only aquatic plant being considered as an energy source. Thus, in Canada, the possibility of harvesting and drying the thousands of tonnes of weeds which grow in that country's lakes and waterway is being investigated.

WASTEFUL

A similar potential exists in the U.S. where at least \$100 million is spent each year in clearing weed-congested lakes and rivers.

It has been estimated that up to half the world's population is already dependent on biomass in its simplest forms such as wood, agricultural waste and animal dung for its fuel needs. But, especially with wood, it is all too often a wasteful and ecologically damaging use.

Spurred on by the spiralling cost of the world's diminishing oil supplies, many countries, both rich and poor, have embarked on research and development programmes involving biomass.

Fortunately, however, for climatic and other reasons, developing countries are well placed to take advantage of the large-scale and more efficient biomass conversion systems which are expected to be perfected in about another decade.

ERROL ON FOOD

Christmas Dinner

Young and old alike, Christmas brings its own special magic. Who can escape the chopping, the chaos of wrapping paper, the wretched fairy lights for the tree which never seem to work at the last minute, the over eating, the influx of guests or the family drama? And when all is said and done, who really wants to escape them?

However there are a number of practical problems which do amount as Christmas converges which largely fall on the shoulders of the housewife. She cannot escape the extra work and while it is certainly a time when few women regret the effort involved, it takes a practical and efficient mind to organise things so well that the schedule flows laxly for her own enjoyment and for the unforeseen circumstances to keep in.

It is just as well we are not in the 16th century, having to struggle with a boars head or even the whole hog, or roasted on Christmas morning. To ease the pressures, at least in the hope that this guide may help. I am presenting a programme this week which may help over the next few days of hectic activity — I have made this a luncheon rather than dinner, for the latter actually has all day in which to prepare things, it is the housewife with young children, who is obliged to

have the festive meal in the middle of the day who really needs help.

It is for those who want to be organised but are not quite sure how to tackle the problem, I have chosen a very orthodox menu as a sample for time consumption in terms of preparation but the dishes are easily switched. Just allow enough time for the cook or yourself to prepare the ingredients bearing in mind that the refrigerator will be packed to bursting point and therefore less efficient. That extra ice will be required for drinks.

It may be as well to order ice from the Mombasa Ice Factory and chill extra beers and drinks in a cool box or even the bath. And that every available saucepan, plate and shelf will probably be working overtime.

CHRISTMAS EVE:

Prepare the bread sauce, rum sauce or brandy butter. Even if you feel it is too soon to make the bread sauce, the crumbs can be made, the onion stuck with cloves and immersed in these to permeate the crumbs with flavour in advance. Get the Christmas pudding ready for steaming.

Stuff the turkey at both ends and sew up. Keep in the refrigerator already buttered and wrapped in aluminium foil and placed in its roasting pan if there is room so that all you have to do is move it from the fridge to the preheated oven.

Calculate the number of hours you will need for the turkey to roast. This is based on 15-20 minutes per pound. The table which follows allows for a 13-14 pound bird but one should work on the following basis:

10-14 pounds allow 15 minutes per pound plus 20 minutes extra. A 14-18 pound bird should be roasted on the basis of 20 minutes per pound plus 25 minutes extra. Oven temperature should be around 325 for the smallest turkey and 300 or Gas regulo 2 for the large turkey. As the time draws near to the meal, the foil can be removed and the skin allowed to brown, increasing the heat if necessary.

CHRISTMAS DAY:

9.15a.m. Set the oven regulo to Mark 3 or 350F.

9.30a.m. Place the foil wrapped turkey in the oven. Every so often baste the bird, make sure it is cooking evenly.

11.30 Put the Christmas

pudding on to steam.

11.50 Prepare the grapefruit or melon as required and return to fridge to chill.

11.30 Par-boil the potatoes if you favour this method before roasting.

12.15 Put these into their fat at the base of the oven to roast

12.50p.m. Cook sprouts in boiling water

12.55 Grill bacon rolls and sausages

1.10 Cook the prepared rum sauce and make coffee. Cook frozen peas, reheat the bread sauce.

1.20 Start dishing up ready to sit down for Christmas dinner at about 1.30p.m.

A few additional points which will add to the success of your planning: Do everything possible in advance as long as it is not to be the detriment of the food you are serving. The giblets can be boiled up ready for stock for the gravy, before the stuffing is made and the liquor kept in the fridge, already seasoned.

Check that the carving knife or knives (even better to have more than one) are razor sharp. Buy frozen peas, saving time in preparation or Surprise peas which are a good alternative.

Open the tinned cranberry jelly the day before, place it in its bowl so that it only has to be put on the table. Check that the silver is clean, that the mats or cloths to be used are spotless and starched if necessary, NOW.

And finally keep lots of cheese and eggs in the larder for unexpected guests during the days which follow.

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THE STRONGEST BEER IN AFRICA

MAMBO GICHUKI reports

YOU may easily understand why nobody earns my admiration more swiftly than does the master brewer.

Blending malt and barley and fermenting it to that golden essence of perfection which delights the eye and seduces the tongue is no simple matter.

Long before Midas was churning gold bullion out of stone, brewers were dedicating themselves to the study of the alchemy needed to compose the perfect beer.

These practitioners of art and craft were to be followed thousands of years later by a worthy successor: Michael Karanja, 40, a mild, quiet-spoken university graduate, well versed in the ancient and modern lore of brewing, has almost achieved the summation of his venerable profession.

It is Mr Karanja, if you did not know it, who toiled long hours over the bubbling vats of Kenya Breweries, tending his mix of hops and barley and water, muttering the time-honoured incantations of his forebears, to create one of the great beers of our time — Tusker Premium.

Naturally enough, as one of Kenya's master drinkers, I wished to accord Mr Karanja the accolade his craft deserved — and so I slipped along to his fourth floor office in Ruaraka where I raised a brewery-fresh glass of Premium to toast him and his achievement.

Delectable Concoction

Sad to say, I was apparently a little late. Days before, the regulars at Michael's local hostelry — the Castle Inn, only a crate's throw from his office — imbibing freely of his delectable concoction, had duly paid him their own tribute.

But Mr Karanja, Kenya Breweries production director, deserves all the honours he receives — to only a rare few is it given to be the friend of millions.

He began learning his craft

at Makerere University from where he graduated with a B.A. in chemistry — and moved to Edinburgh, Scotland, to take a diploma in brewing at Heriot-Watt University.

Murang'a-born Michael joined Allsops in 1964 — shame on him, he told me "for the life of me I can't remember the first beer I ever drank" — and almost at once began winning gold medals in international brewing contests. A feat, I might point out, no less significant than picking up the odd Olympic Gold.

By 1972, the distinguished judges at the world's top brewing contest were quaffing copious quantities of White Cap, smacking their lips, calling for another glass — and deciding it was easily the second greatest lager beer in the world.

The time for Karanja's masterpiece had not yet arrived, but all COASTWEEK readers will be glad to know that its aroma first sweetened the air of the day at the Mombasa brewery.

After months of experiment, and the permutation of more than 20 'formulations', production was moved to Ruaraka where Michael was able to keep a brewer's eye on it. The result of these two years of unstinting self-sacrifice is now with us.

But long before it was placed before the public, a privileged elite — master drinkers all — were invited for tasting sessions in the elegant board room at Ruaraka.

You could, I suggest, pause here for a moment's silence since on the four occasions on which I was invited to join the panel I was languishing in a hospital bed.

Despite the tasting sessions, however, the secrets of Premium will never be revealed. The closest confidence Michael would disclose was "that it is definitely the strongest beer brewed in Africa".

Altogether there were 10 tasting panels, I learned, constituting what Michael called a "cross-section" of the drinking public.

I corrected him, naturally, by pointing out that far from

being a "cross-section" they must have been a "happy section".

"I like an odd glass of beer — usually a White Cap or an Export" he told me. "But now I think I will change to Premium". I hope so. Not to drink his own brew would be akin to Picasso never looking at his own paintings.

Premium has already won Michael a gold medal. And the Breweries tally for 1979 is six overall.

Beers worthy of their awards

If their beers are worthy of awards so is their management. In spite of massive inflation, the brewery price of beer is still under two shillings a bottle. This may well qualify for the description of a "staggering achievement". Not literally, of course.

The rest of the money the customer pays goes, so to speak, to lubricate the wheels of development in Kenya. The biggest revenue earner from the efforts of Kenya Breweries is the Customs department which raises more cash from beer than from any other single organisation or product.

No doubt, if you will forgive the pun, Premium will help increase their Bonds, too.

For not even Government duty increases will keep a good beer down. "Actually," says Michael "when we originally decided to create Premium we were looking only at the top

end of the market — the tourist and the top income group.

"But we were asked to produce it at a price that would make it available to the ordinary drinker".

How long it takes to bring a batch of Premium to the peak of fermented glory is a secret that Michael was not prepared to reveal.

But with more than a decade of gold medal successes behind him and his team of 37 brewers nobody need question his judgement.

Which makes it even more strange why the Kenya Bureau of Standards has chosen to adopt guidelines from the brewing industry of India to lay down as Kenya standards.

The answer, of course is that we should realise that sometimes Kenya's own standards are the pace-makers. By what athletic standard do you define world supremacy other than by Henry Rono?

By what standard do you define world lager supremacy other than by Tusker Premium?

Drinkers of Kenya and members of the Kenya Bureau of Standards, let us unite — let us honour the master alchemist in his own home.

Michael Karanja, we salute you. Thank you — and cheers!

Nyerere re-assure Tanzanians over Food Shortages

PRESIDENT NYERERE has assured Tanzanians the present economic problems facing the country were not as alarming as they were made to look.

He said the problems were of two categories — short-term ones originating in the country and long-term ones with world wide implications and for which the country had no control.

Mwalimu said this when explaining to the nation that there was no need to panic regarding the scarcity of such items as sugar or maize meal because they were available in the country.

The emerging shortages, he said, were mainly due to transportation problems.

Over the past few days, he said, he personally visited a few Dar es Salaam areas sometimes joining queues to see for himself the extent of the food situation and called a party leaders' meeting to explain to the nation what he had seen.

Discussing the long-term economic problems, President Nyerere said these were dictated by forces beyond Tanzania's control and would take a long time to solve.

These are the ones he referred to when he warned the nation of 18 difficult months, on the 'Heroes Day' in September, he explained.

Meanwhile, the National Milling Corporation has announced it is to expand its storage capacity to 528,000 tonnes of grain next year.

The N.M.C.'s present capacity is 266,000 tonnes which is far below the national demand. By June, this year, the corporation had bought 340,000 tonnes of grain which is 74,000 tonnes above its storage capacity.

The price of oils and lubricants in Tanzania has gone up between 41 and 56 per cent following a request from local oil companies. The companies had asked for a 73 per cent rise.

Price Hikes

To help finance next year's celebrations of the third anniversary of 'Chama cha Mafunduzi', the price of khangha is up by 2/3 and that of kitenge 1/50 per metre.

The new prices will remain in force until a new government statement is issued.

Some of the revenue might also go into next year's celebrations of the Peasants' Day a statement issued in Dar es Salaam said.

The Tanzania Fisheries Corporation (Tafico) has launched a Sh. 25 million

project to construct shore base in Dar es Salaam and buy six fishing vessels Japan. Construction work start at the end of next year.

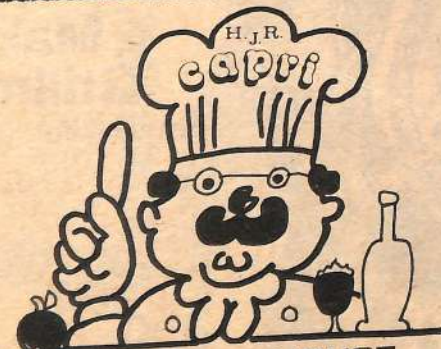

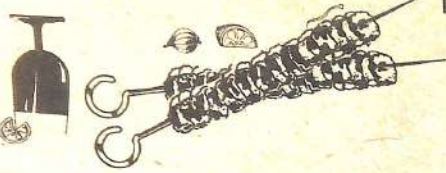

In Mombasa geboren, besuchte er die New Era High School und erwarb sich anschliessend gruendliche Kenntnisse in der heiteren Musik, vor allem kennt er sich aus in den neuesten Hits und Popschlagern.

Die Disco ist abends ab 21.30 Uhr geoeffnet und ist Montags geschlossen. Die Africana Sea Lodge und das angrenzende Jadini Hotel gehoeren beide zur Alliance Hotel Gruppe mit dem Parlamentsmitglied Mr Kenneth Matiba als Vorstandspraesident.

Einige Moebel und Einrichtungsgegenstaende in der 'Banda', die aus einem umgebauten Privathaus entstanden ist, stammen aus dem fruheren 'Brunners Hotel', einem der aeltesten Hotels in Nairobi.

An der Eröffnungsfestfeier hat Dan Trench, der Sohn der verstorbenen Maxie und Nelly Le Poer Trench, die interessante Geschichte der beiden Hotels erzaehlt, wie seine Eltern in den Zwanzigerjahren bei ihrem ersten Besuch an der Diani Beach gleich ihr Herz verloren, sich dort niederliessen und Truthaehne und Enten zuechteten.

Die Zimmer hatten Sandboden

Sie erwarben das Land zum damaligen Preis von shs 40/= pro Acre und fuer Vollpension verlangten Sie in ihrem kleinen Hotel shs 2/50 pro Tag. Im Jahre 1933 stieg der Pensionspreis auf shs 7/50 und wurde 1939 erhoehet auf shs 12/50 pro Tag. Die Zimmer hatten Sandboden und Makuti-dach und waren mit Suaheli-

betten und Oellampen ausgestattet.

Zement wurde erst bei der Erweiterung in den Dreissigerjahren verwendet; das erste stabile Gebaeude besteht noch heute als Boriti Bar.

Jadini blieb das Heim von Mr. und Mrs. Le Poer Trench bis zu ihrem Tod. Nelly starb 1968 und Maxie 1969. Ein Teil ihrer Asche wurde auf dem Areal der heutigen Africana Sea Lodge verstreut, das ihnen damals gehoerte.

Eine kleine Kapelle ist zur Zeit im Bau, die im Januar fertiggestellt werden sollte. Sie wird mit einer Gedenktafel versehen mit den Namen von Nelly und Maxie Le Poer Trench, die als Pioniere der Entwicklung der Hotellerie an der Suedküste foerderten.

Die beiden Hotels Jadini und Africana Sea Lodge haben zusammen 544 Betten. Den Gaesten steht es frei, die Raemlichkeiten beider Hotels je nach Wunsch und Laune zu benutzen.

1978 wurde die Africana Sea Lodge mit 72 Betten eroeffnet und mit dem 'Makaa' Grill, der sich auf Meeresfruechte spezialisierte. Es gibt zwei Tennisplaetze mit Flutlichtanlage. Demnaechst wird dort auch die erste Squashanlage an der Suedküste jense Gaesten zur Verfuegung stehen.

Beide Hotels sind immer gut besucht von einer international gemischten Kundschaft, vor allem aus Europa, aber auch aus Zambia. Es bestehen bereits Plaene fuer eine Erweiterung mit zusaeztlichen 48 Betten. Die Bauarbeiten sollen im Januar beginnen. Saemtliche Moebel wurden im Rehabilitierungszentrum fuer behinderte Jugendliche in Likoni hergestellt.

Die Lodge verfuert ueber eine Windsurfing Schule, die im Januar eine Regatta veranstalten will. Hamisi, der Leiter dieser Schule, ist zur Zeit der einzige afrikanische Windsurfer, der je an einer Regatta an der kenianischen Küste teilgenommen hat.

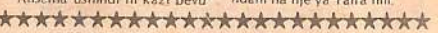

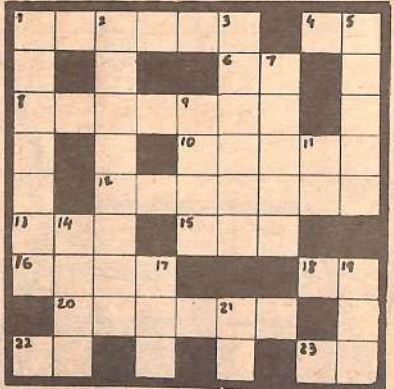

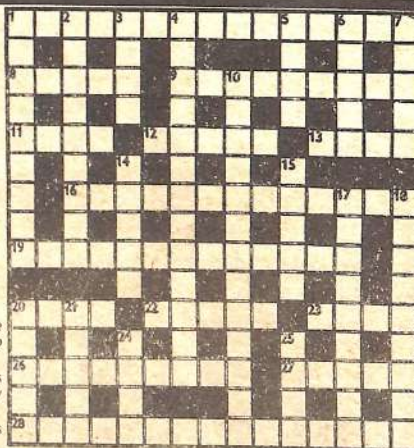
