Big Price Cuts Help Bookings

AIRLINES AND HOTELS OFFER DEALS ON KENYA HOLIDAYS

MAJOR TOUR operators in Germany report a healthy increase in bookings for Kenya compared to last year while in order to encourage earlier bookings L TU International Airways has reduced air fares here.

Coupled with recent tariff reductions by Kenyan hoteliers these more attractive holiday packages are, consequently, attracting increasing bookings for Kenya's coming high season.

This was reported by Chris Modigell, Group General Manager, Alliance Hotels, who had been on a grand marketing tour of Europe which, so far, has included Switzerland, Austria, Holland, Germany, Belgium and France.

Mr. Modigell has been aptly described as 'Kenya's flying ambassador for tourism'.

Continuing, he said it is hoped that Condor will follow suit and lower airfares, particularly for the summer '94 season'.

Mr. Modigell believes that this move will eventually reduce the number of often ridiculously low special offers.

These he says 'have included a holiday in Kenya for as little as DM 1100 during the current mid-season'.

This, it is felt attributes to the image loss Kenya has been suffering over the past years.

Likewise, in the United Kingdom a week's holiday here, including flight and half board accommodation, has been calling for as little as £299 or even less.

Mr. Modigell strongly feels that in order to ensure competitiveness on the world tourism market, as well as to boost job opportunities here, price slashing alone should not be our priority.

He believes that the major priority must remain that of not only maintaining, but improving our product.

Adding 'satisfactory solutions to

leading German tour operators produces annually 800,000 long haul destination brochures at a cost of DM 8.0 million.

Declared Mr. Modigell 'he, together with others, is obviously only interested in featuring destinations and hotels which sell.

Instability and insecurity no matter how good the product is, continues to create a negative reputation in a world offering a large selection of holidays.

Only recently, on September 13, the *International Herald Tribune*

Special Report by NETA PEAL

headlined a news brief 'Tourists Are Avoiding Mombasa'.

It read 'Kenya's Indian Ocean port city normally popular with guests staying in nearby beach hotels, after Moslem youths rioted twice in its Arab quarter last week.

The town was quiet on Sunday after rioting on Thursday and Friday, but police were conspicuous on the streets'.

Mr. Modigell continued 'while Kenya no longer ranks among the top players in this highly competitive field, the combination of a beach and safari holiday she can offer remains unique, but needs to be more vigorously and professionally marketed'.

He went on 'Kenya Airways our national carrier, barely manages to fill a few seats on its once weekly stop in Frankfurt from London enroute to Nairobi.

Mr. Modigell also mentioned that with recession in Germany taking its toll (Mercedes Benz recently announced job cuts for some 44,000 of its staff) it is envisaged that the real impact on tourism will only be felt next year as unemployment and living costs rise.

As far as the potential for long haul destinations from former East Germany is concerned he said 'this remains minimal as the population continues to struggle with economic hardships and high unemployment figures.

Booking trends like in many other countries are more and more on a last minute decision, often based on special offers'.

From a recent visit to Holland Mr. Modigell reports that the

Visitors come to the home, or a hotel guest suddenly wants ice-cubes.

No struggling for those who use Kanji Hirji Shah's latest ice-cube trays.

A few establishments require chafing dish compartments.

Remember that this shop has them.

Anything you might want, not mentioned by us, is likely to be there. Simply ring on telephone 224720 or 222428.

We've left till last the crockery arrived this week - because it is best.

There are 32-piece dinner sets with floral borders, or overall patterns like the coaching scene not far away from the willow-pattern colour, or a breezy tree pattern in maroon.

In the three Sciences, Physics, Chemistry and Biology the pass percentage was 96 per cent and above and the quality of the passes was excellent as was also true of English Language, Economics, Geography and

History. Headmistress Mrs. Joyce Haji told COASTWEEK:

"What is most gratifying for the Coast Academy is that many of the pupils have stayed on for 'A' level courses which are being

KEEN NORTH COAST VOLUNTEERS JOIN IN 'WONDERFUL WATAMU' BEACH CLEAN-UP

MORE THAN 100 local volunteers joined hands in Watamu, Sunday, September 26, to stage Kenya's - and Africa's - first ever beach clean-up.

The Kenya effort coincided with the annual International Beach Clean Up Day organised by the U.S.-based, non-profit, Centre for Marine Conservation.

With the support of the Kenya Wildlife Service and Watamu Marine Park Warden, Dickson Waruinge, the enthusiastic volunteers spent the morning combing Watamu beach free of miscellaneous debris, filling 100 plus bags and netting over 1,300 kilograms of rubbish in just three hours.

Shoes, trousers, toothbrushes, and empty medicine bottles were among the more unusual pieces removed from the beach, but the overwhelming bulk of the garbage consisted of shredded plastic.

According to local coordinators, Helen Timmis, Olendo David and Dr. Gary Mullins, neither tourists nor

beach-goers bear the brunt of blame for turning Kenya's beaches into insanitary landfills.

"Both the nature and the sheer volume of rubbish we collected today clearly point to large scale dumping in Kenya's coastal waters.

Some of the debris may have been dumped off-shore by passing ships, but, again, the

nature of the waste material - shoes, trousers, that kind of thing - more likely suggest that municipal rubbish is somehow entering the sea", stated Dr. Mullins.

Whatever the source of the mountains of garbage, members of the group challenged local authorities to find the sources, contain them or relocate them if necessary.

Ocean pollution of this scale, they warned, can result not only in the injury or death of marine wildlife, but can also seriously tarnish Kenya's image as an international holiday destination, an image which for a variety of reasons has already suffered over the last few years.

Operating under the banner, "Taking Care of Kenya", the conservation-minded volunteers extended their deep appreciation to the sponsors who had donated materials for the clean-up; Turtle Bay Hotel, Ocean Sports, Blue Bay Village and Hemlingways.

AquaVentures Diving was also given recognition for providing the prizes to those individuals collecting the most rubbish.

Encouraged by the success of the Watamu sweep, a major clean-up along Mombasa's beaches is scheduled for October 10.

Organisers say they hope the beach clean-up will become an annual coast event.

Plans are now also in the making for underwater clean-ups offshore Watamu and Mombasa.

The public and community service organisations are encouraged to participate in and to sponsor the October Mombasa beach exercise.

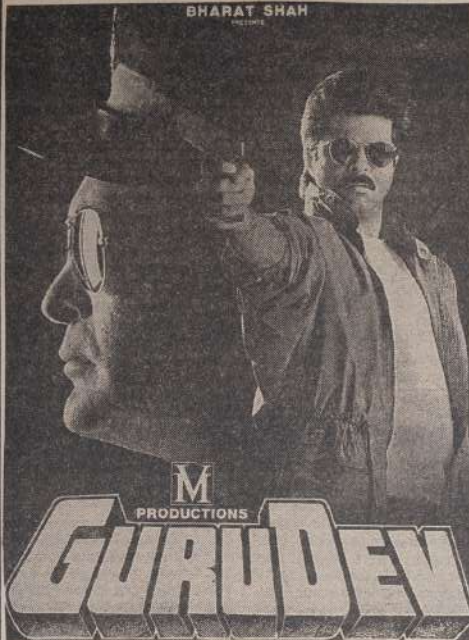

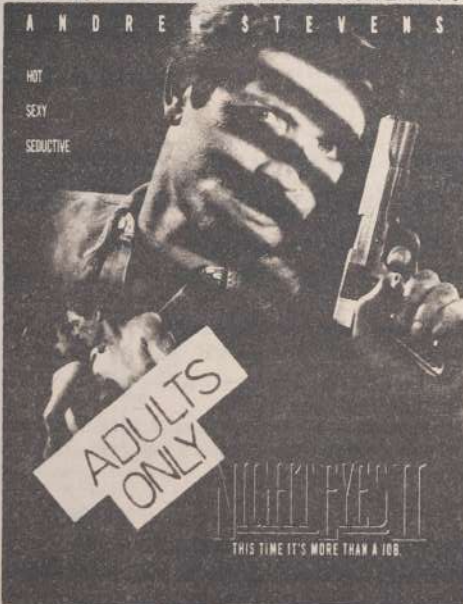

A SEXY THRILLER

It's 'Action Stations' With Sordid Goings On Along The United States Border

EXTREME PREJUDICE will be shown today and tomorrow at Kenya Cinema. The dust and grit of *Extreme Prejudice*, based as it is at the border between Mexico and the United States is perhaps reflective of the sordid goings on in the underground gangster world characteristic of almost all borders.

But here is some fine acting, some very tough action and surprise, and some kind of story.

Nick Nolte is the melancholic cop with Dirty Harry's demeanour - not once does he smile in the entire film - in this outpost.

As Jack Benteen, Nolte creates a genuine lonely hero, cynical about government, but still loyal to the principles for which he joined the force.

Still, there is in the ruthlessness, he often shows in apprehending the Mexicanos, a sardonic streak, his cowboy attire going so with this calculated swagger and self justification because he is an upholder of the law.

On the other side of the river is Powers Boothe as Cash, the best hustler I have seen in a long time.

Cash and Jack were the best of friends in their youth.

They even shared the same girlfriend, Surita (Maria Concita Alonso), which makes it just that little bit more excruciating that one is now the hunter, the other the hunted.

Cash has this very serious drawl in his voice and a brittleness to his character that one just knows is going to break up sooner or later.

Jack seems to know this and advises his friend to just give up crime and go back home.

But, "I am in it too deep", says the gradually-disintegrating Cash.

Starting at Lotus Cinema on Sunday is an Adults Only film *Night Eyes 2*, a hot, sexy and seductive movie which is more than a sexy thriller.

Foreign diplomat Hector Majenes and his very rich and beautiful American wife Marilyn ride in their limousine through the gates of their grand estate.

But when they leave the car, sniper fire pins them to the ground.

are able to realise a dream that we, as a museum, have had for many years'.

Adding 'Kenya, particularly the tourism industry, is under pressure to be able to compete with other destinations in terms of attracting more tourists here.

'Consequently, there is need for us to diversify what we can offer tourists who are also becoming increasingly selective.

'Meanwhile, the museum is

increasingly under pressure to become self-sustaining.

'Therefore, in creating this partnership with the private sector

I think we are able to realise an opportunity that has yet to be explored in my view - that of cultural tourism.

'I believe this offers an opportunity which can not only benefit our tourism industry but also help institutions like the museum in promoting the diverse cultural heritage that we have in this country'.

Adding 'so really this is a trial on our part and I hope we can succeed, because if we do, then the potential for exploring other areas where similar partnerships might be created can perhaps be realised'.

He told guests who were mainly from the tourism industry 'enjoy the show and perhaps contemplate

on what other avenues the tourism industry and museum could be partners in'.

The scriptwriter was James Falkland who is well known in Kenya and is the Director of the Phoenix Players, Nairobi.

It is probably one of the most concise and spellbinding accounts of the Portuguese presence on the Kenya coast ever written.

At its opening, James Falkland took the opportunity of conveying his personal thanks to all who had helped put the show together, including the Curator and staff of the museum for their enormous co-operation and hard work.

Over 2,000 years ago Mombasa was already a major trading centre on the East African Coast.

Taking control of Mombasa Island (once known as 'Mvita' - the island of war) the Portuguese built a secure defensive fortress to

dominate and control the then harbour entrance.

The story is a most colourful and vivid account of 400 years of history of Fort Jesus enhanced by fire light, smoke and sound by Jahazi Marine dramatising the Fort under its many sieges, with a big 'bang' marking the blowing up and sinking of the Santo Antonio de Tanna, a Portuguese 42 gun frigate (built in Goa) just in front of Fort Jesus when she was attempting to relieve the besieged garrison in 1697.

The Fort, built on a massive natural foundation of coral rock, is one of the finest examples of military architecture of the late 18th century.

During its eventful history it changed hands nine times and from 1741 - 1837 was controlled by the Mazrui family of Oman, and from 1837 - 1895 was controlled

directly by the ruler of Oman who established his administrative centre in Zanzibar.

The Son et Lumiere show was followed by a Portuguese, Swahili and Arab style BBQ dinner on the elevated St. Mateus Bastion overlooking the sea, the catering being in the hands of Jahazi Marine which has its own restaurant in Tudor Creek.

The show is staged in the Passage of Arches, in front of the Captain's and Mazrui House, with colourful flags as a backdrop.

It is produced by Andy Stuart and directed by James Falkland. It takes place several times a week and in different languages and is part of Jahazi Marine's 'Mombasa by Night' programme.

It starts with tourists being collected from their hotels for a short show safari to see historic Mombasa Island, then on to Fort Jesus for the Son et Lumiere show, followed by a BBQ dinner on St. Mateus Bastion.

Afterwards there is a visit to the Casino at the Oceanic Hotel, the programme ending at the Bora Bora Nightclub's midnight show before returning to their hotels.

JAHAZI MARINE Limited have master-minded yet another winner - a brilliantly and professionally produced Son et Lumiere with Kenya's leading actors and producers giving a most captivating account of the tumultuous history of Fort Jesus and the East African coast dramatised by music and sound effects by Nabil Sansool, a very talented musician, composer and producer at the coast.

The idea of staging a Son et Lumiere show in the 400 year old Fort Jesus on a regular basis for tourists from overseas and local people emanated from Andy Stuart, Managing Director of Jahazi Marine.

He has introduced quite a few unique tourist attractions including 'Floating Market' at Maunguga which features in its 'Discover Mombasa' programme, while Son et Lumiere has been incorporated into its 'Mombasa by Night' programme.

This starts with a show trip at sunset to Mombasa's historic Old Fort and ends with a visit to a casino and nightclub.

HEALTH TIPS

Suicide Attempts

A YOUNG married woman found out that her husband had a girlfriend.

When he mistreated her she went out, bought insecticide and drank some in the house while leaving the door open.

Her husband, who was nearby, heard her vomiting, saw the can of poison and rushed her to the hospital promising never to see his girlfriend again.

The lady achieved her objective.

Compare this with another young man.

On receiving the boot from his girlfriend he climbed to the top of a coconut tree unseen and jumped.

He sustained multiple fractures but survived.

When seen by the doctor he was found to have severe depression.

The motives of suicide attempts vary.

No doubt a proportion of them intend to get rid of themselves and characteristically plan their act well, hide against discovery, write a note and use dangerous methods.

No one can convince me that a chap who shoots himself in the head and survives was not serious.

Or that someone sustained multiple fractures (above) to attract attention.

But the vast majority of suicide attempts, according to researchers, are not intended to kill the victim.

There is often no clear advance planning, no attempt at secrecy, nor do the persons knowingly use dangerous methods.

Occasionally, though, death results out of ignorance of how toxic the

ingested poisons really were.

The large majority of suicide attempts are done by young people, usually girls, who come from low socio-economic backgrounds.

About a half are under the influence of alcohol at the time of the act.

Another characteristic is that most of the attempts occur just after some stressful circumstances such as family problems and sacking from employment.

When interviewed after the act many of the victims are uncertain why they tried to kill themselves in the first place.

Some attempted suicide as a blind reaction to unbearable stress.

Others say they did it to gain the attention of other people often after more conventional means of doing so had failed.

Allied to these, but worth distinguishing are those for whom the act had been a means of making others around them feel anxious or guilty.

A bizarre motive sometimes given, though often not explicitly, is that of testing fate.

Here survival is seen as indicating that his fate is to live on.

The small group of suicidals who clearly want to kill themselves are similar in description (age, sex, etc.) to the group who succeed in killing themselves (last week's article).

Repeat suicide attempts are common and some eventually succeed in ending their lives.

All suicide attempts must be taken seriously.

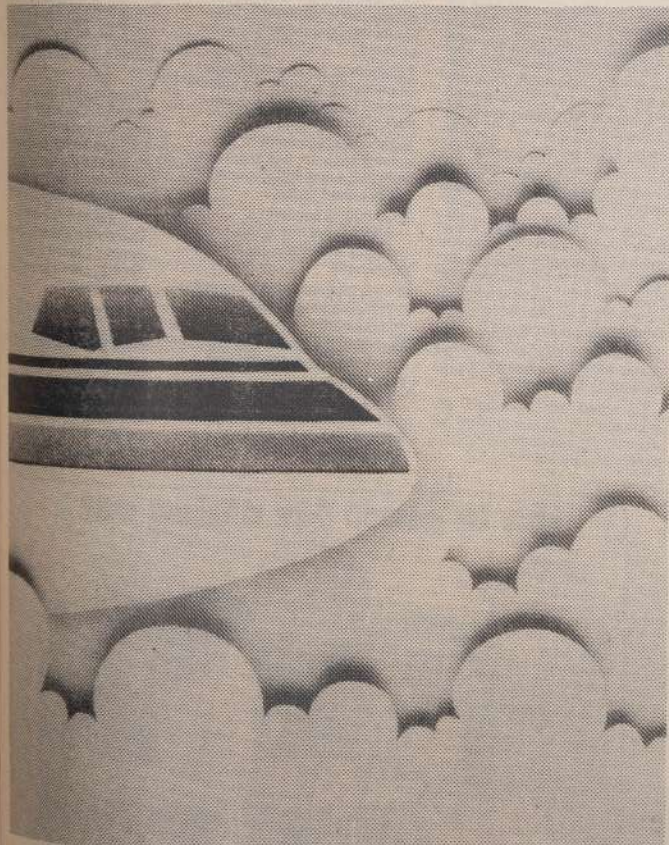

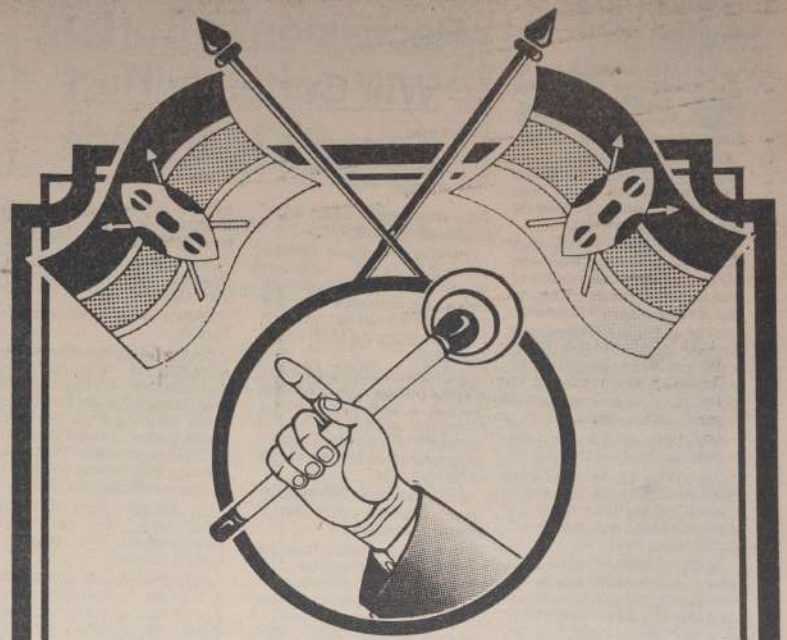

disadvantage with many other destinations.

Mr. Modigell mentioned that in order to cut costs of a holiday package leading Dutch tour operators have pulled out of Melind in order to reduce transfer charges.

Several operators in Holland, he said 'are wondering why Kenya Airways cannot route via Amsterdam at least one of their six flights to London a week.'

Adding in this nation of 17 million people the potential is there and the serious drop in number of visitors is clearly attributable to the lack of suitable flights to Mombasa.

As far as Belgium is concerned Mr. Modigell reports 'this country, together with France, has over 12 per cent contributing to the total 17 million people who to date are out of jobs in EEC countries.'

Fears expressed are that the number will continue to rise.

Continuing Mr. Modigell said 'such has been the successful operation of the Sobel air charter Brussels-Mombasa that it will continue into 1994'.

Adding 'it remains to be seen how traffic develops during the forthcoming high season as 60 per cent of Belgians travel traditionally to long haul destinations during the summer months.'

Additional charter flights are planned for the Caribbean thus further reducing the potential for Kenya from this relatively small market where NVB Neckermann Belgium and their sister company Sunsnacks control some 60 per cent of the market after the merger of these two companies.

Referring to Scandinavia Mr. Modigell notes that 'business is on the increase particularly as Sweden edges out of the recession, the Swedish krona stabilised and the export industry strengthened.'

The once weekly KQ flight from

Copenhagen and Stockholm is fully booked months in advance.

However, the much needed second rotation, although requested, was not approved forcing potential clients on to other carriers, or to travel via London on KQ thus making it a much longer journey.

Said Mr. Modigell 'it is debatable whether the apparent cost cutting exercise of deciding to close the Stockholm office rather than of expanding with a second flight on this potential growth market comes at the right time.'

Adding, 'however, it is obviously needed with the current aim to make KQ profitable'.

He went on 'publicity over the cancellation of aid payments from Denmark and reduction in payments from Sweden together with the apparent lack of promotional campaigns for Kenya, particularly from the Tourist Office, Stockholm, which as usual has only little funds, are not helping improve tourism to Kenya.'

DEVALUATION

As far as Finland is concerned (from where there used to be charters into Mombasa for many years) business is virtually at a standstill due to the grave economic situation, also the loss of purchasing power of the Finnish mark which fluctuated even more than the 30 per cent devalued Swedish Kroner.

Particularly after a very wet

summer people are fed up with listening to doomsday speeches and forecasts.

They want to travel again which make the entire market extremely price sensitive.

There is also growing interest in Norway.

However, Denmark remains the mainstay of business from Scandinavia accounting for approximately 60 per cent of the traffic resulting from the long-standing efforts of the KQ offices in Copenhagen headed for many years by Finn Bluhme and a very able and dedicated KQ team.

Mr. Modigell reports on France 'with over 12 per cent unemployment France remains in serious recession'.

Adding 'Kenya's advantage here is that the traditionally strong French traffic to the Senegal has substantially reduced following instability, strikes and insecurity in this West African nation.'

KQ continues to operate three weekly rotations successfully in addition to Air France flights into Kenya.

Air Evasion operates a direct charter into Mombasa and competition is rapidly growing with African Safari Club having entered this market leading to further price slashing.

However, the potential for this very large market is not yet fully exploited and consumer awareness must be stimulated with increased promotional drives by

our industry.

Mr. Modigell was in Switzerland early September and reports that both Hotalplan, Switzerland and Privat Safari had expressed concern over low bookings during the summer season.

The second Balair rotation was cancelled, it being not so much a question of price, but the fact that Kenya is out of fashion.

There is a general reluctance to book for Africa and Kuoni Switzerland has cancelled its South African programme.

Mr. Modigell said that concern is being expressed for the next high season with the T.E.A. charter being approximately Sfr 600 cheaper than Balair, thus further lowering the already damaged image of Kenya.

One Balair airbus per week is scheduled.

Last year there were two.

Of interest is the fact that among other destinations, Balair is operating four flights a week to the Dominican Republic, with extension to Cuba and Jamaica, and three to Miami USA with extension to Cancun/Mexico.

CAMPAIGNS

He noted that Balair was refused traffic rights via Nairobi - this request being made so as to cater for safari clientele.

Mr. Modigell continued 'the Kenya Tourism Office, Zurich, continues to be described as not very effective, the available budget being eaten up by office rent and a staff that needs to be expensively housed, plus school fees at the International school.'

He noted that all competitive destinations have frequent promotional campaigns and functions, whilst nothing is being done to re-create a positive image of Kenya.

From Austria comes the good news that Lauda Air will be operating a 149 seater Boeing 737 into Mombasa once a fortnight as from November 8, and one flight a week as from Christmas until the end of March 1994.

Operators with allocations on this charter are Tourop Austria and Gruner Touristik - (featuring Alliance Hotels) - as well as Belmonto and Kathago Reisen.

Said Mr. Modigell 'since last year's planned charter rotation was cancelled, operators are cautiously optimistic due to the relatively low charter seat price being offered by Lauda Air.'

However, a hindrance for increased bookings is that Hungarian nationals need visas to enter Kenya.

This very large and potential market, within driving distance of Vienna Airport, cannot be exploited as it takes up to three months for Hungarians to obtain a visa for Kenya through the British High Commission in Budapest.'

Mr. Modigell asks 'why can't visas not be issued through the Kenya Consulate in Vienna?'

He noted that operators are increasingly making use of Austrian Airline's flights to Nairobi, particularly for safari clients.

THE ROUND Table movement was founded in 1927 by Louis Marchesi who, in a statement of philosophy, is quoted to have said, "I differed from the founders of other movements with an appeal to youth who were crystallizing at that time.

My stand was not only diametrically opposed to theirs, but also differed from many of my generation.

Even as the idea of Round Table was coming to me, the youth in this country and many other nations were being seduced by and attracted to creeds which followed violence as a dynamic, not love, revolution as the instrument of change not conscience, power as the reward, not service.

This fraudulent conversion of the assets of youth - its idealism, its energy, its enthusiasm ended in the moral bankruptcy of a world war."

We have inherited a movement which was created on those high ideals and proud traditions.

We have become involved in the affairs of our communities to prove by example that people of different backgrounds can work together for the mutual benefit of the whole community.

Founding of the Association of Round Tables in Eastern Africa

The movement blossomed through the five continents through these ideals and was introduced to Eastern Africa by Keith Pascall who had been the President of Round Table in Great Britain in 1930.

The Eastern African introduction bears a striking resemblance to that of Marchesi's.

Keith Pascall was asked to address the Nairobi Rotary Club on May 8, 1952 but instead spoke about Round Table.

A meeting of potential members was arranged at the New Stanley Hotel as a result of Pascall's address and a founding meeting convened at the Norfolk Hotel on June 5, 1952 when Nairobi Round Table Number One came into existence.

The movement grew rapidly and spread to Kampala, Mombasa and Dar-es-Salaam and the first national convention of Round Table in Eastern Africa held on May 27, 1954 with Keith Pascall the Convention Chairman.

The movement spread and overflowed into Aden, Addis Ababa, Mauritius and Seychelles.

The first meeting to form Mombasa Nyali Round Table Number 25 was held in Chris Fryer's house with Akram Sheikh, Gurdeep Nayer, Chas Atkins, Tom Muchura and Jim Ainley attending and agreeing to sell Christmas cards as our first fund raising project.

Mombasa Nyali Round Table Number 25 sponsored by Mombasa Round Table Number Three was formally inaugurated on February 25, 1979 with Ted Kabetu, John Mbugua, Brown Ondego, Edwin Yinda and George Walreri inducted as members.

Nyali Round Table Number 25 adopted the SOS Children's Village as its first project establishing contact with the UK Inter-Club Aid Programme and Round Table Austria National Project.

Through this project our international contacts spread to Denmark, France, Germany and South Africa.

Mombasa Nyali Round Table Number 25 jointly and successfully hosted the Ring-Up-Up Television Auction with Mombasa Round Table Number Three from the date of our inception as our Number One fund raising project.

Other fund raising activities include the Mount Kenya climb, film shows and the supplement in the newsprint.

Mombasa Nyali Round Table Number 25, like any other Table, has varied activities which have given encouragement to high ideals and ethical standards in professional and business life, the development of acquaintance among young men of different vocations and the quickening of the individual interests in everything affecting life.

Apart from many meetings and social interaction, the Table has grown in strength and further adopted the Mji Wa Salama Children's Home as a project, built the Likoni ferry public shelters and constructed our pet project - the Haribhai Hirji Lakha Round Table Clinic; have just completed the Ribe Health Clinic together with many other smaller projects in the community we live in.

The Mombasa Nyali Round Table have hosted the 1983 Association of Round Tables in Eastern Africa Annual General Meeting where Tom Muchura was elected Chairman.

Laterly, Mombasa Nyali Round Table Number 25 also successfully hosted the 1991 ARTEA Annual General Meeting.

In our fourteen years existence we played host to several smaller national conventions of the Association.

In the forty one years of the Association of Round Tables of Eastern Africa - ARTEA's existence, they hosted the 1979 World Council of Young Men's Service Club's conference in Nairobi.

The pinnacle of success and achievement for Mombasa Nyali Round Table was the hosting of the World Council of Young Men's Service Club's conference in 1986 jointly with Mombasa Round Table Number Three under the able leadership of Akram Sheikh as the Convenor.

This conference brought together 600 young men and their spouses from the Americas, Europe, Australasia and Africa.

WITH THE success of Haribhai Lakha Clinic behind us, we at Round Table Number 25 on request from the residents of Kariji circuit to build and donate a small clinic in that area, set about on the task on hand.

A feasibility was carried out and it was decided that the project would benefit the local villages in the Kariji circuit immensely.

The circuit is in Ribe, Kilifi district about 18 kms from the turn off at Mazeras on the main Mombasa - Nairobi road.

There are seven schools in the vicinity and no medical facilities, save for a clinic operated from a makeshift, semi-finished structure built on a plot belonging to The Methodist Church of Kenya, after the original clinic build years ago had deteriorated beyond repair.

The only other medical facility is the cost sharing Kaloleni Hospital some distance away.

With the consent of The Methodist Church of Kenya,

the plot owners, we embarked on our new project with the usual Round Table Number 25 zest.

A permanent structure of a total area of 168 Square metres was built of coral stone and cement.

The structure comprises of Doctor and Clinical Officer's room, a large treatment room, a waiting room with a sitting capacity of over 60 patients and an extra room wherein

services such as K.E.P.I. and Mother and Child Health Care can be accommodated.

Toilet facilities and nurses quarters were also built.

The total cost of the project is approximately Kshs. 2.0 million and was carried out, over a period of 2½ months, by VAPCO Construction Company under the supervision of architect, Mr. A. Haq Khandwalla whose assistance we are highly indebted to.

We would now urge the relevant authorities to upgrade this dispensary to a sub-health centre, increase

the staff and medicines required to elevate the medical facilities in this deserving area.

We are also approaching other N.G.O.s for family planning programmes to be initiated.

The clinic will be run by a committee consisting of representatives from the local wananchi, The Methodist Church of Kenya, health and other local authorities, N.G.O.s and The Round Table. The support staff duties will be performed by local residents.

The idea of involving beneficiaries in the running of donor project, we believe will ensure smooth running and better utilisation of the facilities.

This will enable us to concentrate on other projects in the rural Kenya and provide this basic health care requirement, certainly a major contribution towards "Health For All By The Year 2000".

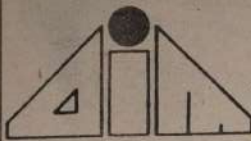

Haribhai Hirji Lakha Mombasa Round Table Clinic Helps Mtongwe Residents

HARIBHAI HIRJI LAKHA - Round Table Clinic Mtongwe, a Mombasa, Nyali Round Table Number 25 Project.

CURATIVE SERVICES.

The Round Table Clinic at Mtongwe is situated four kilometres from the Likoni Ferry on the main Mombasa - Diani road.

The clinic is a service project of Mombasa, Nyali Round Table Number 25.

The Ultra Modern building was constructed at a cost of Kshs. two million, with the assistance of the Kinsmen Clubs of Canada.

One section houses the Outpatient department with offices for the doctor, clinical officer, a treatment room and a well stocked pharmacy.

This section details the curative services.

A separate section houses a fully equipped laboratory and antenatal cum family planning clinic.

Immunisation services will also commence soon.

The clinic also services as a major primary health-care centre to a large surrounding area, namely Mtongwe, Shikadabu, Likoni and Kwale.

The clinic is managed by Crescent Medical Aid (Kenya), a non-profit making charitable organisation.

The outpatient department presently sees over 2,000 patients a month.

Common problems treated include malaria, diarrhoea, upper respiratory tract infections, scabies.

Patients charges include examination, diagnosis and dispensed medicines, together with an injection, if necessary.

The clinic has a large modern laboratory, being the only one of its kind in this area, providing a much needed service to the local community.

Common examinations presently being carried out are thick and thin smears for malaria parasites, urine microscopy, chemical analysis of protein, sugar and PH in the urine, examination of ova and cysts of intestinal worms in the stool, haemoglobin estimation amongst many others.

Patients are charged a minimal fee, which is a fraction of the normal commercial fees.

ANTENATAL SERVICES

Antenatal care is a fundamental tool in reducing perinatal mortality and foetal wastage.

At the Round Table Clinic, great emphasis is placed on antenatal services.

Expectant mothers are checked for haemoglobin, urine, blood, pressure, uterine growth, material weight and foetal well being.

Thus any problems are detected early and either treated at the clinic or referred to Coast Provincial General Hospital for specialised care.

The clinic is run by a registered midwife in consultation with the resident doctor.

FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES

Since Kenya's population growth is one of the highest in the world, any health care clinic must concern itself with family planning.

The Round Table Clinic is geared towards becoming a major family planning centre in the Coast Province.

Presently the clinic is in its first phase and offers medical check-ups for patients, family planning advice, condoms, foaming tablets, contraceptive pills and injections.

Women from the nearby villages are being trained as community based distributors of family planning services.

Insertion of intra-uterine contraceptive devices will be started in the second phase of the project.

Future expansion at the clinic will include the provision of tubal ligation and vasectomy services.

Family planning services are provided free of charge.

IMMUNISATION SERVICES

Under the Kenya Expanded Programme for Immunisation, the under fives clinic will shortly commence at the clinic.

Initially it will be held once a week, gradually increasing to daily.

The clinic will be the only immunisation centre in the vicinity.

The under fives clinic will regularly monitor growth of children

from birth to five years of age, give advice on nutrition and balanced diet, advocated breast feeding, screen for any illnesses and administer vaccines to immunise the children against major diseases, namely tuberculosis, whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus, polio and measles.

FUTURE EXPANSION

The Round Table Clinic will be expanded to provide more services according to the needs of the community.

The following are being considered.

- A rehydration centre - diarrhoea and vomiting especially in children can lead to dehydration and in the very young cause death. The clinic would offer easily accessible rehydration facilities.

- Dental Clinic - Dental services south of Likoni ferry are non-existent. The clinic would fill a vital gap in medical care for the community.

- Maternity - The construction of a maternity and labour ward is an urgent requirement in the area to enable the clinic to become a fully comprehensive maternal and child health centre.

The expansion of the clinic will depend on the availability of funds.

FINANCES

The Round Table Clinic has been built and equipped with funds raised during the annual Ring-Up TV programme, and other fund-raising activities of Mombasa, Nyali Round Table Number 25.

The recurrent expenditure of the clinic is met from the nominal fees paid by the patients.

Deficits, in the initial stages are being financed by Mombasa, Nyali Round Table Number 25.

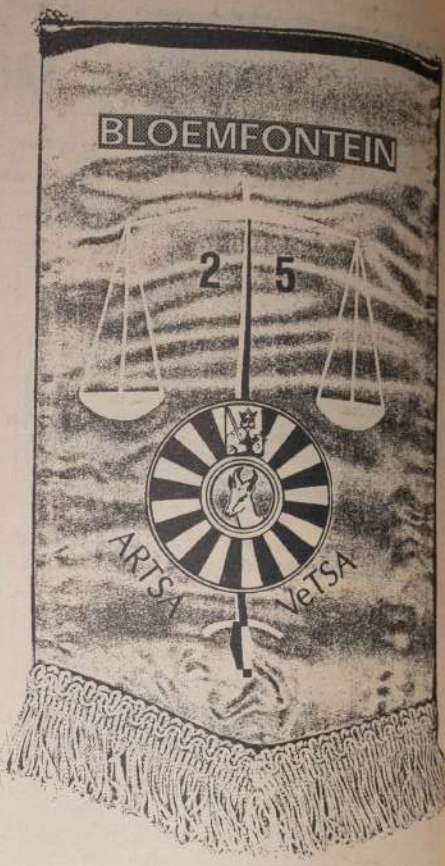

INDIANS FROM INDIA, INDIANS FROM TEXAS, AND REMAINS OF THE 'ANCIENT MARINER ...'

A COUPLE OF NAVAL VISITORS in, both having something directly or indirectly to do with Somalia. The Indian Naval Vessel *Suvarna* arrived in port last Tuesday after duties at the port of Mogadishu, and one of the US Navy operated Military Sealift Command ocean-going salvage tug's *Apache* arrived the other day together with a barge all the way from Somalia.

They are indirectly involved with Somalia in so far as they are or were scheduled to load the remains of one of the US helicopters which crashed and sunk off the coast of Somalia some time ago, with the loss of two lives.

The barge was located, and recovered and raised by another M.S.C. ocean-going tug, the *Catabwa* around May of this year, discharged and then taken to the Military base at the airport where preparations amongst other matters were made for its repatriation.

Understand that the barge has suffered some structural damage whilst being towed down, and will have to undergo some fairly extensive repairs prior to being seaworthy again.

There are some seven tugs of this class (*Powhatan*) and apart from being naturally identical, they are all named after various Indian American tribes.

The *Catabwa* is named after a tribe which occupied the area around the Catabwa river, situated in what is now North and South Carolina.

Whereas, the *Apache* is obviously named after that particular tribe which has gained notoriety as the whooping warriors of those infinite Cowboy-Spaghetti Westerns.

The Apaches, originally of Hopewellian stock, were daring seafarers, and occupied what is now part of New Mexico, Arizona and Texas.

The rig was, I understand, dismantled at Morondava and taken up to Majunga by barge where the various sections were loaded onto a vessel headed for Germany, from whence the rig came in the first place.

Interesting little vessel, belonging to the Tanzanian Coastal Shipping Line arrived in port towards the end of last week.

She's got her accommodation and bridge up fore'd with hold located aft, serviced by two cranes of five SWL each.

Spanish trawler *Albacora Quince* is presently in the African Marine Dry dock, where she's undergoing the usual treatment.

Another fishing trawler at her premises, this ones an Italian lady, who goes by the name of *De Giosa Giuseppe*.

Her situation is a little different, for she ain't being tarted-up for she's under arrest.

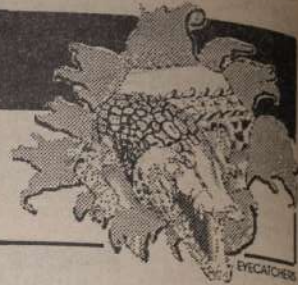

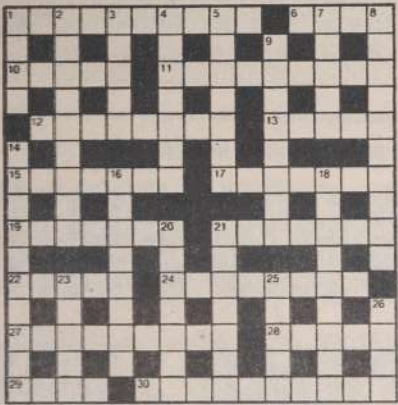

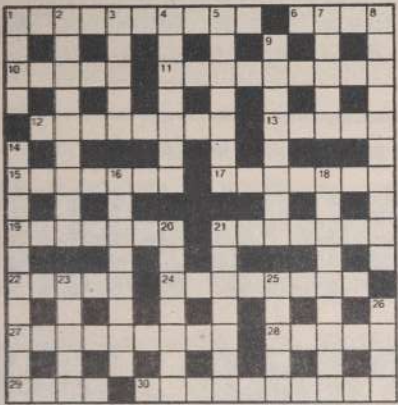

THE BRITS have always prided themselves as a nation of gentlemen.

In all their dealings with people they are the most sensitive to public opinion.

I will take, as an example, the case of the campaign against drink-drivers that was launched to coincide with the Christmas blitz last year.

An advert that was shown on TV had to be shown after 9.00 pm because it was considered too shocking to be shown when kids are likely to be awake.

This launch coincided with the move to introduce some experimental rehabilitation centres across the country during the course of this year.

The approach here is "experimental".

The idea is to do something similar to the German programmes with a view to reducing the period of automatic disqualification that follows a drink driving offence.

The experiment is to run for three years and is a follow up of work done by a private firm which offered voluntary rehabilitation courses ...

The private course was divided into eight sessions and spread (naturally) over eight weeks.

Most people attending did not believe that they could enjoy what would normally be considered a punitive course.

It started with the traditional dress down of the offender.

Each individual in the group had to go through a public examination of the offence by reliving the drink-drive offence.

They had to go into great detail on their behaviour during the course of that day and of the previous evening.

The course spent quite some time on dispelling some of the many myths associated with drinking.

A lot of people think that a jerry can of Hobson's Choice (a half litre of beer) is the equivalent to a tot of Johanna Mtembezi.

The truth is that the Export is closer in strength to one tot of JM.

Another myth is that a cold shower or a good sleep will sober one up.

(Some people in the local context believe that bone soup laced with chilli among other

things will sweat out the booze).

The truth is that time ... and the action of the liver ... is the only thing that will make one sober.

Some people say that they are better drivers after a few drinks while others believe that you can "drink yourself sober".

These are the traditional beliefs or myths that can be heard round the bar most nights.

There are others that have also developed over the recent past.

People are inclined to think that younger drivers tend to be more irresponsible.

The reverse is the case.

In fact they respond more to advertising and campaigns against drink-driving possibly because they are more likely to be targeted by the cops.

The middle-aged driver in his expensive suit and smart car is the most likely to offend.

The people on the course also watch a video in which a doctor tells them "We abandoned resuscitation on this young man twenty minutes ago" ... and then proceeds to pull back a sheet showing the naked body of a young drink-driver.

Similar tactics as in the German programme are employed.

What has not been clear to date is the degree of success that this programme has had.

It is expensive for a private institution to follow up its graduates in a systematic way.

However, now that the cops and local authorities have taken it on board it is likely that a better follow up system will be introduced so that the

effectiveness of the programme can be determined.

Where does all this leave our country Kenya?

We have a really long way to go before we start to tackle sensitive issues like drink-driving.

The mere enforcement of the basic Highway Code is already problematic for the boys in blue.

They can only respond to accidents and set up speed traps

WHAT ARE you thinking about? Yes you are thinking if you are alive today.

I am reminded of a visiting Guest Speaker at a Bible College where I trained said to us that:

"The easiest thing for anybody to do is to think, and the hardest thing for anybody to do is to think right".

Our thinking needs to be safeguarded from the Crass Secularism of our day which makes created humans the measure of all things no wonder one Secular educator wrote:

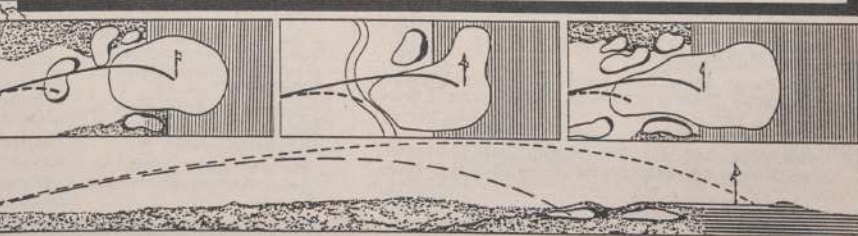
