Four professionals from, London's Est End (brought to Kenya by Swissair) who have just concluded a highly successful Noel Coward Week at the Norfolk Hotel, Nairobi, will be giving three shows at Nyal Bech Hotel on May 8, 9 and 10. Sir Noel Coward, a renowned dramatist, director and star dies in 1973. He left behind him over 50 plays, 25 films, hundreds of songs, two autobiographies, a novel, several volumes of shoft

stories and countless poems, sketches, recordings sand apintings. He is the most taloented and talked about figure in teh English speaking theatre. Song swhich he composed and sang included the highly notalgic London Pride; If Love were All; I'll See you Again; his verypersoanlised Talent to Amuse and Mad Dogs and Englishemen.

Bringing these to you in revues, comedy, tragedy, his highly romantic music and some of his wittiest quips will be Gerry Tebbutt, whose name is now as familiar to theatre-goers in

FRANKFURT (INP) - Women's contributions to the publishing in Kenya and the portrayal of women in the Kenyan literature were discussed at a seminar which was held in Bad Homburg just before the 43rd International Book Fair in

The week-long seminar, the first of its kind to be held in association with the book fair, was organised jointly by the World Association for Christian Communication, London

and the Evangelical Mission Work in the Federal Republic of Germany

It gave an opportunity for women authors and publishers from 14 developing countries to exchange views on the problems facing women in their countries and on their depiction in the Third World literature.

Kenyan delegate Mrs Asenath Bole Odaga, a scholar on oral literature and publisher of books, presented a paper at the seminar on "Women in publishing in Kenya."

She told the seminar that women were being depicted very negatively in her country's literature. She also spoke of her long research on Kenya's oral

Germans Now View Kenyan Woman In **A Literary Context**

Mrs Odaga says the seminar participants from Africa, Asia and Latin America were unanimous in their view that women were being marginalised and depicted very negatively in their national literature.

"We are all of the same opinion that the negative depiction of women begins right from the school," she said in an interview:

Immediately after the seminar, the seminar participants moved from Bad Homburg to Frankfurt to present a selection of books from their publishing houses in a collective display of Third World publications organised by the World Association for Christian Communication.

In the course of the book fair, they also made a survey on how women are depicted in the books published in the industrialised countries and some developing nations not represented in the

Books from Kenya were wellreceived by the trade visitors and book fans at the book fair. Some of Mrs Odaga's books, including the "Study of oral literature" received inquiries on translation and publishing rights.

The Kenyan exhibits inlouded several publications of Mrs Odaga's Lake Publishing Hosue in Kisumu, her novel "Riana" as well as several school and university books and children's literature. She says she is quite please with the interest shown in Kenyan books by the visitors.

A record number of 8,412

exhibitors from 90 countries presented their books and other publications in this world's largest book market which was organised by the German Booksellers' and Publishers' Association.

The Federal Republic of Germany which traditionally fields the largest contingent of exhibitors presented a total of 2,236 publishing houses in the first all-German participation in the book

African literature has become growingly popular among the German readers since "black Africa" was featured as the focal theme of the Frankfurt Book Fair in

FOREIGN AFFAIRS

Every year, a number of African titles are translated into German, thanks to an initiative by the Frankfurt-based Society for the Promotion of African, Asian and Latin American Literature which is supported by funds from the Federal Ministry for Foreign Affairs in Bonn.

In order to inform the German reading public more about the African literature and to introduce less known authors a new literary magazine entitles "Afrikanissimo has been launched by the Peter hammer Publishing House and Kyril and Method Publishing House, two leading German publishers of Third World literature.

Mombasa-Based Salvage Tug Rescues Fishing Boat

A CRY OF "SAIDIA" went outlast Friday from the Korean owned, though Panamanian registered long liner No. 81 Satellite which was reported immobilized with main engine failure roughly 30 odd miles north of Mombasa. Salvage tug Barbara one of locally based Murri International tugs was promptly dispatched to the scene in order to render assistance.

1990 Lloyds Standard Form of Salvage Agreement was signed after having been taken across by La Bestia, and the stricken long-liner subsequently brought into Kilindini by the Barbara.

Safe Delivery Certificate was then signed thus concluding another successful operation by the salvage company. *No. 81 Satellite* is presently at the A.M.G.E.C.O. yars, where I understand necessary repairs will be carried out.

Tarpon Santiago, she of the 'meandros' decorated smoke stack, returned to Kilindini on Monday, and is to load a consignment of military equipment, (vehicles) destined for the Kenyan contingent of the UN Peacekeeping forces in Yugoslavia, or what's left of it.

Mitsui Kinkai Kisens' vehicle carrier, the 1983 built, 10538 DWT Crystal Ace should by now have already have called and discharged her 237 vehicles plus some other cargo. She has a carrying capacity for some 3,000 vehicles.

Sailing out on the same day, although earlier in the morning was another 'In ballast' tanker. She being the *Altus* minus her 75,000 tonnes of crude oil.

I would imagine that most of you must have by now read or at least heard of the tanker *Katina P* which developed a crack in her Number 3 starboard tank whilst on her way from South America to the Gulf laden with fuel oil week before last, and then stranded herself on a sand bank some miles north of Maputo.

She was refloated last week and then towed out to the high seas by the South African 'super tug' John Ross where transhipment of the fuel oil was to take place.

"JACK KNIFED"

Unfortunately the convoy never reached the 'designated' point for the 'old girl' *Katina P* that is, having beeen built in 1966, decided to call it quits and according to reports 'jack-knifed' and sank.

She was one of the Polembros Shipping Company twenty vessels, all of which are tankers/ Obos

Interesting to note is that the twenty vessels aggregate 494 years, averaging 24.7 years each, with fifty percent of them built in the sixties, and averaging 26.6 years each. Oldish.

"If To Talk Of Freedom Is Meddling, I Plead 'GUILTY' To That Charge ..."

"Kenya Today - An American View"; Specch to the Rotary Club Of Mombasa, delivered by H.E. Smith Hempstone, United States Ambassador.

TWO PEOPLE CAN look at the same landscape and, if asked to describe it, relate very different views.

To one, the mountains may look grand and challenging; to the other, they may look dangerous and threatening.

To one, rivers appear to be barriers; to the other, they are arteries of communication.

The absence of clouds in the sky to the one implies fair weather; to the other it means drought.

Is the glass half-empty or halffull? It's largely a matter of perception.

By the same token, I do not pretend that what I am going to say to you this evening necessarily is the entire truth, the total reality of Kenya.

It is simply my perception of that truth.

I came here more than two years ago, and I came not as a stranger. Yet, at the end of the day, although I love this land nextonly to my own, I see Kenya through the prism of American eyes.

This, then, is my perception of the truth, and only that.

In the best of times, life has never been easy for Kenya. You have no navigable rivers, minerals or petroleum, and little hydroelectric power. Your population is growing at a disastrous rate.

You are far from your markets and your principal agricultural exports of coffee and tea have many better-placed competitors.

Tourism, as you here in Mombasa know better than most, is a fragile money-earner, dependent on many internal and external factors over which you have little or no control.

In the best times, Kenya has needed hard work, good management and luck to turn a profit. And recent years have not been the best of times.

This year, 1992, is likely to prove one of the worst since Kenya attained independence in 1963.

You all know the reasons for this; drought, corruption, mismanagement, government red tape, parastatal inefficiency, political uncertainty and the decline in the West's confidence in Kenya to spend foreign aid wisely and well.

ASSISTANCE

Two years ago, in a speech to the Rotary Club of Nairobi, I warned that, faced with infinite demands on its finite resources, the United States would not maintain high levels of economic and military assistance to nations that do not share our ideals, which do not protect human rights, cherish the rule of law and expand democracy.

Thatwarning was ignored, and you have seen the consequences.

All of us, as the Chinese say, have been condemned to live in interesting times.

In my own lifetime, I have witnessed the rise and fall of Nazi Germany and fascist Italy, the dissolution of the colonial empires of Britain, France, Belgium, Holland and Portugal, the military defeat and economic resurgence of Japan, the stirrings of democracy in China and the dissolution of Soviet Communism.

From the Vistula to the Volga, church bells are pealing once again as long-suppressed peoples regain their freedom and their faith, groping for a future that is still elusive and uncertain.

The same thing is going on in Africa, from the Bight of Benin to the Straits of Bab el-Mandeb.

Some of those with vested interest in the status quo fear this process. They tell you it will bring nothing but bloodshed, chaos and misery. These are prophecies that easily can become self-fulfilling.

Democracy is a messy process, and it is hard to make an omelet without breaking eggs.


But it need not be thus. Change is inevitable. Life itself is fraught with difficulties, but which of us would prefer the quiet of the grave?

We have only two options: to accept change and manage it for our benefit, or to become its victims.

I welcome change, and my government welcomes change.

We do not welcome change for the sake of change but because change frequently is necessary to progress. We are the world's first republic and ours is a revolutionary heritage.

We have our imperfections but we do truly believe that men are born free and equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights, that among these rights are life,

liberty and the pursuit of happiness, and that governments are instituted among men to protect these rights.

Democracy is not something that can be legislated. It has to be fought for everyday and jealously protected in the watches of the night.

It is rooted in a loyal opposition and a free press. It depends upon the courage of the people and the vision of their leaders.

It flourishes in the soil of tolerance, fair-play and respect for the rights of others.

Democracy is difficult, messy and dangerous. But is there a man so mean he would not be the master of his own destiny?

At the end of the day, democracy is the best system yet devised by men for their own governance. And no man can stand against the tidal wave offreedom sweeping across the globe today.

Freedom is its own reward, and that reward is sweet: the right of free speech, of freedom of worship and assembly the right to a free and fair trial, the right to be secure in one's person and possessions. but it also has more tangible benefits.

Freedom unleashes ideas and energies only faintly imagined. It produces renaissances in art and literature.

Free men, untrammeled by oppressive governments, work harder and produce better goods than those who are not free, because they know they and their children and their children will benefit from the fruits of their labor.

Men who are proud of their government will make their government proud of them.

Kenya today, as this American perceives it, stands at a cross-road. Multi-party democracy, to which the government is committed, has been authorized but not fully implemented.

PRIVILEGES

For elections to be free and fair, and I must underline this, all political parties must have the same rights, privileges, protections.

The government's record on human ringts is better, but it can and should do more.

There is greater freedom of speech and travel today than there was when I came here two years ago, but netiher is fully guaranteed. The press is freer than it was in recent memory, but, as we witness now in the case of Society magazine, it is still periodically under assault.

Opposition is tolerated, but only just: many in high places still equate disent with sedition.

Last but not least, there must be peace in the land. Each side blaming the other for the current violence in Western Kenya serves no purpose. The situation cries out for restraint and statesmanship.

Everybody knows what was wrong with the old system, and everybody knows what needs to be done to put it right.

All that is needed is the political will, the commitment, the courage and vision to move ahead into the more dangerous, difficult, better and more prosperous Kenya that lies just over the horizon.

I have not the slightest doubt that you will opt for that better and more prosperous Kenya.

Are the people of Kenya less worthy and courageous than those of Senegal, Congo (Brazzaville) or Zambia? I do not believe it for a minute.

Is democracy something only the white man can make work? That is a racist notion and I reject it entirely.

Kenya can and I beleive will make democracy work. What is needed is a renewed dedication to the concept of nationhood and the commonwealth.

Public office must be seen as a public trust, not an opportunity for personal aggrandizement.

The poor must be fed, the children educated and the weak protected.

Tribal loyalties, already weakened by the impact of urbanization must give way to the notion that every citizen of this country is Kenyan, first and last.

Let me say at this juncture that the United States government does not now and never has had a favourite Kenyan presidential candidate or a preferred political party.

There is not now and never has been a fund earmarked for the destabilization of the KANU government. What we do care about - and we care about it a great deal - is that the political process should be free and fair.

Because only when the government of the day enjoys

the genuine mandate of the people can there be peace, stability and progress. And that is what the United States wants for Kenya. that and only that,

There can and will be nuances and shades of difference between democracy as practiced in Kenya and democracy we know in America and Europe.

We fully recognize that Kenyans have a culture and a history that is different from our own and that these will be reflected in the way they govern themselves.

There is nothing that is shameful and much that is admirable in that.

But history, particularly recent history, has shown that when it comes to the fundamentals, all men desire basically the same thing; freedom of speech, free, fair and regular elections, freedom of worship and assembly, a decent return for the seat of their brows.

And if you choose this path, I can assure you that the United States will do what it can to help you realize that dream.

Just occasionally, I have been accused of meddling in Kenyan politics. If to talk of freedom is meddling, I plead guilty to that charge.

Some nations are known by their exports. Some export great automobiles. Some export cricket bats and wigs for judges.

America sometimes is associated with Mickey Mouse and MTV. But if Americans are true to our heritage, America's greatest exports have to be ideas and ideals.

Amercia is the home of freedom, liberty and economic opportunity. That is what has drawn millions of people from every land to the United States.

In the early days of World War II, in the long night of the Cold War, America remained the last best hope of the world. We did not fail the world then, and we will not fail it now.

But only Kenyans can be the architects of this country's future. You and you alone, must determine how and by whom you are to be governed.

Only you can decide what of the old you ought to keep, and what of the new you should

This is a hard charge, but one that I have no doubt you will be equal to. This is a historic moment and yours is a fortunate generation. For you will shape the new democratic and oprogressive Kenya of tomorrow.

If you are worthy sons of your fathers, all will be well. I and my country certainly wish you well in this challenging and exciting





Dr Leakey mentioned that KATO had asked if the Kenya Wildlife Service could bring some influence to bear on foreign governments that had put out travel advisories which had been injurious to our tourist industry.

'As you already know' he said 'the German Government has already withdrawn its travel advisory and we have had discussions with other governments. On April 28 we shall be taking representatives from the American, British, German and Japanese governments (whose nationals are its main visitors) to the Maasai Mara for an on the ground inspection of the arrangements security presently obtaining there'.

Adding 'we shall also brief them fully on other security arrangements that are in effect elsewhere in the national parks

Said Dr Leakey 'it is likely we include several representatives of the Western media who have been responsible for carrying a lot of negative articles on Kenya'.

"BACK TO NORMAL"

He emphasised the fact that 'I will not be making promises about security if I am not sure that these promises can be upheld'.

Therefore, he said what we shall be doing is indicating the progress that has been made without promising that everything is back to normal'.

'We however. can demonstrate that we have gone a considerable distance in the last six weeks from where we were and if we can maintain that momentum we can go a considerable distance further.

I believe that that in itself will bring about some desired

improvement in the exposure we have been getting abroad'.

Dr leakey, recognised as one of the Kenya's best PRs in the tourist industry, revealed that he had been asked by the KATO chairman, Sam Mwaura, to make a short visit to the USA and Europe to address 'carefully organised groups about the arrangements that have been put in place in Kenyawith regard the security of tourists in the wildlife protected areas'.

Explained Dr Leakey 'the exact time has yet to be decided. I believe it should be slightly later than now because I would only feel confident in making firm statements after a few more weeks have elapsed. It will, therefore, probably take place in June or July'.

He told those in the tourist industry 'the general situation in our wildlife protected areas is fairlygood. In the national parks at the moment I think people are as safe as they have ever been.

We have extremly good officers and men on the ground, also air and foot patrols and we are pretty certain that tourists in any of the national parks are very safe'.

However, he said 'the situation in the national reserves is difficult because, as all of you KWS has no know, responsibility in those areas (mentioning specifically Shaba, Samburu and the Maasai Mara). Nonetheless he said 'I think the situation is considerably better today than it was even a month

He went on to explain that in March KWS had been asked to join with other units of the security forces to put an end to banditry in the Maasai Mara.

Said Dr Leakey 'when I first moved my men into that area (the Maasai Mara) I believed the difficulties there were not as great as we had faced elsewhere. We were dealing with bandits important for us to continue to get the co-operation of the tour operators. Quite often drivers see something unusual. If they told us we could quickly investigate. 

categories - there were peop,le holding up tour buses on the road at gun point, beating tourists and sometimes going off with cameras, travellers cheques, passports and clothing.

There were also other criminals, who were responsible for stealing from lodges and camps, but without using any personal violence.

Then there were the usual cattle rustling problems that go on in that general area, and of course the theft of revenue'.

said to be armed which we found were one or two 12-bore shot guns.

These were not the kind of people we had been dealing with in the Tsavos who were carrying AK47s and other very sophisticated weapons. In the Maasal Mara we were dealing with people who had one or two shotguns.

Through surveillance and Intelligence work we were able to satisfy ourselves that over the last 14-15 months when there had been over 22 incidents in the Maasal Mara no more than 12 key people were involved in terms of organising and carrying out these crimes'

Declared Dr Leakey 'we have the identity, names and pictures of most of them and they know this and most of them also know what is likely to happen to them If they come back to the Maasal Mara'

Yesterday, he said 'several people who have certainly been involved in previous incidents were charged in court for being In Kenya illegally under forged documents. A total of several people were jailed for sentences ranging from three-nine years. Some' claimed Dr Leakedy 'were clearly responsible for past Incidents but because there was no evidence upon which they could be charged (and as such would have been thrown out of

court which would have done us no good) so we put them into court on lesser charges knowing that those would result in effective prosecution'.

He went on 'there are a few additional people who need to be brought to justice and I believe that this will happen fairly quickly'.

Consequently, he said 'I think the security situation in the Maasal Mara is considerably better than it has been for a very long time.

Nonetheless, it is an area close to an international frontier and one we have less control over than we might have otherwise

Consequently, there will always be a danger of incidents in the Maasai Mraa, but i do not believe that the danger should continue to result in the sort of incidents that we have had, and it is our intention to remain in the Maasal Mara'.

Added Dr Leady 'It is extremly

It is our Intention to tighten up and once we discover who is cheating us to ban them from parks for a year and then possibly ban them

We have got to stop this cheating and stealing if we are going to make this thing work. We cannot do it alone and need

He revealed that they had received enormous cooperation so far'.

Referring to the great fear that entry fees will rise again, Dr Leakey told tour operators 'I do not expect this to happen Immediately. We are doing a study at the moment on tariffs and next time there is a significant change we hope that some will be downwards as well as upwards'. Adding 'we wish to use pricing as a means of regulating the density of visitors to certain areas'.

He went on 'government is not providing us with the resources from the tax payer to run this operation. We depend on cash as revenue. If most of our cash is being stolen then we will have to put the prices up. If we get the cash we are entitled to get, then we can hold things pretty much as they are. It is in Kenya's interests to do so because it will contribute towards the growth of the industry'.

GOVERNMENT URGED TO "ABOLISH AIRPORT TAXES"

"WE HOPE THAT with the formation of a National Tourism Promotion Board we will be able to speedily achieve more positive results in marketing Kenya and to solve other issues related to tourism".

This was stated by the chairman of the Mombasa and Coast Tourism Association, Zui Harunan, AT A WELL ATTENDED ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD AT THE REEF HOTEL RECENTLY.

Guest of honour was the Director of Tourism, Mr. G.N. Macharia, while other VIP guests included Councillor Latif Ubwa, reprsenting the Mayor of Mombasa; Osman Abatano, District Officer, representing the district Commissioner, Mombasa Joshua Mwendwa, chairman of the Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers' and Sam Mwaura, Chairman, Kenya Association of Tour Operators.

The chairman went on 'our association is very much involved in the promotion of tourism and is always prepared to assist in every

way possible in the maintenance of high standards so as to attract more tourists and thus keep our industry as the top earner of foreign exchange.

We are grateful to our beloved President Moi for his continuous efforts to maintain peace, love and unity in our country and of being the Number One promoter of Kenya'.

In his annual report the chairman noted that Kenya's tourist industry is one of the most highly taxed in the world.

Consequently, MCTA was recommending total exemption from import tax on 'mini' buses and all other imported tourist vehicles, including spare parts, also on the more essential hotel equipment.

It also recommends that instead of between 18-24 licences hotels should just have one comprehensive licence. It would save time as well as money.

However, said the chairman 'we are grateful to government for having removed VAT on the sale of food, drink and other faciliteis provided by hotels'.

MCTA also recommends, if possible, the removal of VAT on hotel accommodation and instead to allocate a certain percentage to be collected for the promotion of tourism which could otherwise be used for the proposed National Toruism Board finances.

Other recommendations were that the airport tax be abolished or included in the air ticket fare, or residents be permitted to pay in Kenya shillings when travelling abroad.

Also, that the Kenya currency residents are allowed to take out of the country be increased from Shs 200/- to Shs 400/-.

It was noted that the cost of a taxi from Jomo Kenyatta International Airport to the City Centre is now over Shs 200/-.

While action is being taken to tighten security in tourist areas, MCTA felt that 'some urgent action must be taken by government to remove or reduce the number of beach boys on the beach as well as in the town as they had become a great menace to tourists.

The association has suggested that all curio dealers operating on beaches, be moved to African Traditional Markets as soon as they are set up (it is understood land has already been allocated on the northand south coast) where tourists can buy from them there.

It would not be depriving them of

He said they deserve unreserved praise.

Referring to problems concerning water and electricity, the chairman said he hoped the authorities concerned would realise the inconvenience and financial loss that hotels and other tourist businesses have suffered due to the shortage of water and rationing of electricity.

MCTA has proposed that more water tankers be provided, without cost, by the National Water Conservation Pipeline Corporation to assist hotels.

The chairman mentioned that since last November over 15 beach hotels had paid over Shs eight million for the delivery of water by tanker.

The association also suggest the digging of more boreholes and to have all the necessary spare parts for pumps in stock, as well as







Continuing he said there are a lot of sceptics around. People saying we have to go down before we can come up, that there are no business opportunities, no water nor stability. From our standpoint we are going right ahead on the basis that things are going to be just fine.

We have had a few problems that we can deal with. As you have read in the newspapers we have raised very substantial funds to invest in 'protected area management'. The Americans, British, Germans, European Community, World Bank as well as other donors have come forward to put together a financial package of about Dollars 145 million and, despite donor hesitation generally, the KWS money is coming through without restriction'.

Declared Dr Leakey we intend to spend this money on plans we have drawn up and we would not do so if we did not feel there is a future for wildlife or tourism in this country. We believe there is a future, in fact-a good future.

I hope you will all join us in this effort to make things work and get it back where it should be'.

Referring to the downturn in holiday bookings presently being experienced Dr Leakey said 'I believe from my own investigations over the last few months that the greatest single contributor to this is recession in the West and not insecurity in Kenya'.

He had been told by some restaurateurs in London that for the past six-seven months there is simply not the spending public any more and the same applies in New York, Paris and other places. Said Dr Leakey 'apart from the low season problem that we have anyway, the effect of recession in the USA and Europe is biting and hurting us too'.

Adding 'I think until we are convinced that it is insecurity that is causing the dowturn we should not claim that it is because it will have the effect of perpetrating that downturn for a long time to come'.

"IMPRESSIONS"

Said Dr Leakey 'If we constantly say that tourist number are down because of insecurity, if those intending to come to Kenya continue to read that in the newspapers they will get the impression that it must be very insecure and decide against coming here'.

Adding 'I attended a meeting yesterday and got a fairly good impression that some very definite measures are going to be taken to try and bring the ongoing clashes in Western Kenya under control'. He pointed out that at the moment no foreigners or tourists had been injured in these so called ethnic clashes.

During question time Ernst Hoffmann, Resident Manager, Touristic Union International, said that as far as the German market is concerned Kenya was the only long-haul destination showing a significant drop in bookings. This was mainly attributed to security following a spate of adverse publicity on Kenya which takes time to redress'.

On the question of roads in game parks, Dr Leakey said 'over Shs 24 million had been spent in the past 12 months on roads. They had also placed an order for delivery later this year of sufficient road building equipment for the Tsavos'.

He went on Dollars 58 million is earmarked for road development in restricted areas.

Declared Dr Leakey 'In another year you will see a dramatic change in game park roads'. Adding 'I think we have done a very good job in the Maasai

Answering a question about the increased fees to marine parks he said 'over the last ten to 15 years since their establishment they have been allowed to get rather badly damaged by the uncontrolled throwing out of anchors, collection of corals and the general despoilation of the resource'.

He said 'we recognise that the marine parks are extremely important and we propose to invest heavily in the proper management of these areas

Said Dr Leakey 'as far as I am concerned I consider that marine park boundaries have been very badly drawn up, and in some cases are unworkable.

MARINE PARKS

The one at Mombasa is a case in point where the marine park boundary is basically the high water mark from the beach which is often inside hotel grounds. It means that when you take a stroll along the beach you are walking through a national park and if we are going to follow the law you should not be there without a ticket. But said Dr Leakey 'we shouldn' really charge you if you are just walking from your hotel to the waters edge for you have part to stay at that hotel'.
