The brass band of Salvation Army School for the Blind will provide music to the merriment of all the particpants.


For convenience sake the founder's day will be observed on Sunday May 10 1992 by the Mombasa Branch.

The Cultural Centre will not be far from the Bombolulu Workshops and Showroom and

will comprise small villages of different traditional homesteads where ethnic crafts are made.

A large showroom is also planned.

Said Mr. Seifert 'the Ministry of Culture and Social Services and National Museums of Kenya have offered assistance to ensure that everything is authentic'.

The search is prsently on for

an experienced manager well versed in Kenya's cultural background. Said Mr. Seifert 'we have advertised and hope to get a manager soon to help'set up this Cultural Centre'.

He went on 'we shall need a wider access road, and within the présent Bombolulu compound changes will have to be made to absorb this new development'.

Adding 'we still have a big portion of land once used for horticultural training purposes'.

Plans are not stopping there for the second phase of this development envisages a restaurant specialising in ethnic food-including Swahili cuisine.

Starting in May is a new Project Manager for Bombolulu Workshops. He is Joseph Wandario who was Production Manager at Simbarite for eleven years and for around three years was manager of the Christian Industrial Training Centre at Thika.

He will be trained to take over from Mr. Seifertas Administrator Manager by the end of the year. Mr. *Seifert then becomes the full-time Executive Officer of APDK, Coast, basically in charge of planning, supervision and all activities concerning the Port Reitz Polio Clinic, Likoni and Bombolulu Workshops, also the Likolulu shop in the NSSF Building, Nkrumah Road.

He revealed that they are also planning to go into 'Community Based Rehabilitation' - a new programme in the coast

He mentioned that the last of the old structures in the Bombolulu compound have been demolished and are being replaced by a further twenty rooms for staff.

in addition, four houses are being built for management. Said Mr. Seifert 'with house rents increasing all the time it is better if we can provide accommodation management and staff'.

With the growth of administration work, four new offices are planned.

Danish Tourists Give **New Wheel-Chairs To Physically Disabled**

'OVER THE MOON' with excitement at having their own wheelchairs were five employees of Mombasa's famous Bombolulu Workshop for the Handicapped who gave a big 'Thank You' to all who had helped provide them.

They are a gift from Denmark, the initiator being Ruth Tengsteds who last July, together with other Danish tourists, were takien to see this APDK project which now gives employment to 180 physically handicapped young men and women, while thirty-two are 'trainees'

It was the first workshop for the physically handicapped to open at the coast and has gone from strength to strength with growing local and export markets.

Taking them there was an enthusiastic supporter of this project, Mrs Gerda Kronborg Nielsen, DSB's Travel Liaison Officer based at Nyali Beach Hotel. She is the Hon. Vice Consul for Denmark, her husband, Joergen Nielsen being the Consul for Denmark and Finland at Mombasa. 'DSB' is a tour operator in Denmark.

Gerda does much to promote tourism to Kenya which has included helping with the organisation of last year's 'Miss Denmark' contest at Nyali Beach Hotel which gave much publicity to Kenya. It was not only some delightful finalists who came here but top entertainers, press and readers of Billed Bladet magazine which had sponsored the contest. All went on safari with UTC - films of which, together with the contest, have been shown in Denmark.

On the night of the 'Miss Denmark' contest there was also a fashion show by Bombolulu and among the local models were these

Billed Bladet is the largest magazine in Denmark with half a million readers a week.

When visiting Bombolulu, Ruth

Tengsteds was most impressed with the quality of handicrafts and fashionwear being produced and inquired if all employees had a wheelchair. The answer was 'no' and she was told that those available were shared among

She indicated there might be some available in Denmark which their owners had discarded for new battery driven models.

She asked if they were interested in getting some more and the reply was a resounding 'yes' as all have a desire for greater mobility.

Two months later Gerda received a letter from Storestroms AMT of Vordingborg - one of the municipalities in Denmark inquiring if Bombolulu was still interested in having some wheelchairs. If so, their name would go on the waiting list of applicants.

Said Gerda 'everyone was later delighted to hear that five wheelchairs were being made a available to Bombolulu.

With the help of Leman Air Freight they were transported to Copenhagen Airport and with the assistance of the Kenya Airways Area Manager for Scandinavia,

Finn Bluhme (a great lover of Kenya) they were air lifted here with Shipmarc undertaking their clearing. All services being rendered without charge.

Added Gerda 'Ruth is such a great friend of Bombolulu that she has indicated that when she returns

in June with her family they are going to fill up their suitcases with clothes for all the children there.

They number forty-seven and have their own nursery school run by parents. Money collected as fees go towards the payment of teachers' salaries'. Bombolulu has made available its social hall, as well as providing nursery school equipment.

Said Mr. Seifert 'these two

ladies worked together enabling us to have a new range of items, and we are most grateful to

He went on 'we have also a full-time Sales Manageress, Constance Kalela, who took over from Shamseen Ebrahimji, part-time Sales Manageress for Jewellery and Fashionwear who married and left for the UK'.

'Sales' he added 'are doing very well and despite the Gulf War and recession in the USA and Europe we managed to increase our general turnover by 50 per cent last year'.

We also managed to attract many more new customers on export markets and early this year shipped a lot of our woodcarvings to Sweden.



Our Heritage Of Faith

NOTLONG AGO, somebody said "I make all the friends I can, everywhere I can, you never know when you will need them or what you will need them for. Sooner or later, anyone comes in handy."

Thinking more about this, I realised that each person is priceless, irreplaceable and must be respected responsibly.

David Augusburger defined: Well what makes us see people as valueless:

Jealousy: the attempt to put ourselves in place of our neighbour.

Pride: the struggle to place ourselves above our neighbour.

Deceit: the tactic to enrich ourselves at the expense of our neighbour

Betrayal: the scheme to advance ourselves behind the back of our neighbour.

Lust: the short cut to intimacy for ourselves in spite of the other. These things make us use and abuse people, and I believe we do this when we engage in either a war of words or weapons with our friends or neighbours.

Elton Trueblood in his book "Alternative to futility" says: "Actually most of us like war better than we like peace. We like it because itsaves us from boredom, mediocrity, and dullness.

With her hands folded in the traditional Indian greeting of 'Namaskaar', shewelcomes you for a pleasant flight. As you step inside the aircraft, another hostess guides you to your seat and requests you to fasten your seat belt for your safety once you are comfortable.

Sit back and relax. If there is anything you require, just call a member of the cabin crew by pressing the button near you.

Soon you hear her pleasant voice on the public address system welcoming you formally and giving you the details of your flight. Then she comes round offering you some sweets before the take off.

Cool and cheerful, the Air India hostess glides up and down the aisles after you are airborne. You are helped with your headphones to enjoy the different channels of inflight music and the film and video shows

For the infants, she makes sure about that important milk bottle or baby food. For the toddlers, she brings some toys to keep them busy. Just reach for the call button and you can get a pack of playing cards or additional reading material.

Very soon she trundles along with a drinks trolley to take your orders for soft drinks and cocktails. Before very long, it is meal time and she is busy serving you vegetarian and non-vegetarian meals.

After serving tea or coffee to round off the meal, it is time to pick up the trays but there is no rest for her for then it is time to bring along Duty-Free items for

Once you are enjoying the film on board, she is busy with the pursers to account for the Duty-Free items sold and clean up the service area - in addition to attending to any special call indicated by a red light above any seat.

In the Business Class, she is even more considerate for she has fewer passengers to attend to. She is always on the move to make your flight more enjoyable.

What makes an Air india hostess? Glamour? Beauty? Personality? It is difficult to single out any one quality that sets her apart. What indeed distinguishes her from her counterpart in other jobs is a happy combination of all these qualities.

between 19 and 25 years of age.

The world's first air hostess was Ellen Church. She was a qualified nurse who was hired, back in the early Thirties, by Boeing Air Transport, a predecessor of the present United Airlines, the biggest domestic airline in the USA. She helped recruit seven other girls to fly on the San Francisco-Chicago route.

Today, thousands of young women all over the world are attracted by the glamour and excitement of a hostess' job with international and domestic airlines.

Backin 1946, when an Air India advertisement appeared in Calcutta newspaper, scores of girls thronged to the Great Eastern Hotel for interviews, a memorable sight never since repeated. To train the chosen few, Genell Moots, a senior hostess from TWA, flew into Bombay at the invitation of Air India.

PASSENGERS

Since then, Air India has trained thousands of girls in the art of looking after passengers and in the process has developed its own particular brand of 'personalised service' which reflects the traditional concepts of Indian hospitality. This has become its most distinguished mark in the intensely competitive world of international air transport.

To keep pace with the changing requirements, Air India has gradually expanded and modernised its Cabin Crew Training School at its base at Bombay Airport. The school has a full-scale cabin mock-up of Boeing 747, fully furnished and complete with functional galleys.

In fact, the 747 mock-up is an

exact replica of a Boeing 747 cabin and is so realistic that one can hardly tell the difference between the aircraft cabin and the mock-up.

Besides the mock-ups, which also serve as classrooms, there are separate classrooms for lectures so that more than one batch of hostesses can be trained at the same time.

The 16-week on ground and

service, grooming, speech and voice training. Yoga and karate also form part of the training syllabus.

INSTRUCTORS

Gradually the emphasis shifts to practical demonstrations and practice in the mock-up. Under the watchful eye of an instructor, trainee hostesses learn everything from how to greet

sessions, an instructor sometimes plays the role of a 'difficult' passenger, to enable them to handle real life situations.

As part of the training, a comprehensive course in First Aid is also conducted by one of Air India's Senior Medical Officers, who ensure that the qualifying standards laid down by St. John's Ambulance aremet.

form a very important part of the curriculum are conducted in a fully equipped safety mock-up where simulated evacuation drills are held. They are also given a wet-drill training in a swimming pool with the actual depolyment of lift raft and use of survival equipment.

An air hostess would be less than a 'hostess' if she was not properly groomed. Air India, therefore, lays great stress on good grooming. A special classroom has been equipped as beauty pariour. Air India also engages a Beautician on contract to conduct grooming

On successful completion of ground training, an air hostess is first sent out as trainee on all the aircraft types that Air India operates under the charge of either a Deputy Chief Hostess, or a senior Check hostess, or a Check hostess for practical inflight training. She is allowed to fly 'solo' only after her inflight performance is reviewed by the Cabin Crew Training Centre.

The Chief Air Hostess sums up the training of an air hostess thus

"An Air Indiahostess is trained not to be a mere stewardess, but a good hostess, to make every passenger on board an Air India plane feel that he or she is a special guest of Air India rather than just a passenger on board."

Most important of all, she has to learn to smile - even under stress. To keep fit for flying, an air hostess has to ensure that she is always slimand trim. This means eating the right type of food and exercising regularly to look after her figure and skin.

To most people, the job of an air hostess means a lot of fun with the chance to visit far off places, staying at five-star hotels and lots of sight-seeing.

The other side of the picture is the non-stop hard work during a long flight, catching up with sleep and adjusting the body clock to different time zones.

But it's all worth iti



inflight trainingcourse covers both the theory and practice of inflight service. For the first few weeks, such subjects as the history of Air India, aircraft types, routes, passengers documentation, travel regulations and tourism are covered.

These are followed by subjects directly related with inflight service such as food, wine, cheese, liquor and meal passengers to making them comfortable, to taking orders for drinks.

The climax of the training programme, of course, is the 'wet run' when the trainees learn how to serve meals, both in the first class and economy. Here they learn what it is to be a good 'hostess', gentle, gracious and solicitous combination western efficiency with eastern charm.





Continuing the Vice President said'l understand that the Ministry of Tourismand Wildlife is seriously examing the proposed Tourism Promotion and Marketing Board and I look forward to hearing of the progress of these discussions'.

He went on 'the Kenya government appreciates the role of the industry in generating foreign exchange. To this end government will continue to look for the best ways of helping the industry to ensure its steady growth. Members will, however, appreciate that the economy as a whole is going through a difficult period with unstable weather conditions and a somewhat depressed international environment'.

ATTRACTIONS

He urged the industry to continue with the important role it has been playing over the years in the promotion of tourism in this country. Adding our bestadvertisement are those tourists who go back enthusiastically to their countries and by word of mouth spread the good news of the courtesy, value for money and the unique attraction of their holiday in Kenya'.

The Vice President then referred 'to other areas of concern to the tourist industry which come to the Treasury in the form of requests for funding to impove and maintain the infrastructure like roads, airstrips, airport facilites etc'.

He said 'plans are underway to correct the situation at Mombasa Airport and to improve the general infrastructure covering these areas. The responsible Ministries have made submissions expressing appropriate prioritisation when preparing their 1992-93 budget presentations'.

Continuing the Vice President said 'the world and, therefore, the tourist industry has become increasingly conscious of the need to protect the environment.

Clean water and an unpolluted environment are valuable assets and are likely to be topical subjects at the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development scheduled for June this year in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

Kenya's international image. 'Remember' declared the Vice President 'you may be our most influential ambassadors'

At the conclusion of the Vice President's speech, the Tourism Minister, Mr. Noah Katana Ngala mentioned that as a KATA function in Nairobi where he had been Guest of Honour he had stated how appropriate it would be for KATO's next quarterly meeting and luncheon to take place at the coast where about 60 per cent of Kenya's tourism industry is concentrated.

INVITATIONS

He added 'the coast is also my home and I am delighted to see that this event, after so many years, has taken place at Mombasa

He asked KATO to continue to 'make available future invitations to the Vice President who will always be ready to come and address this august association'.

Said the KATO chairman, Sam Mwaura 'tourism is a dynamic industry and since 1987 has been Kenya's single and largest foreign exchange earner'.

He attributed much of its steady growth to the weakening of the Kenya shilling against major international currencies which had boosted hotel and lodge occupanies'.

However, he said 'the industry may experince a serious reduction in numbers of visitors and length of their stay due to the decison to quote the overseas operators in foreign currenciés'.

Africa, with all its natural attractions, certainly has the potential to increase its market share by more than two or three per cent and in recognising the importnce of tourism therefore as an industry we should endeavour to create an enabling enviornment in order to attract investors to develop tourist facilities.

He mentioned that KATO had submitted a list of issues for consideration by the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife. 'The industry' he said 'feels that these factors if not seriously looked into could inhibit tourism growth'

They included 'security in national parks and reserves; cost of motor vehicles and other quipment used by tour operators; the proposed National Tourism Board; improvement ef the infrastructure; lack of marketing capabilities abroad and attitude by officials; airports, water, sewage and electricity.

Also the development and promotion of niche markets including safari cruises, white water rafting, instruction and schools for general aviation gliding; ballooning; filming, golfing, African pre-history and Islamic cultures; ornithological and butterfly safaris among others.

Referring to a world which is also becoming more environmental conscious, Mr. Mwaura said 'visitors wish to experince the realunspoiltuncommercialised Africa. As a result both up-market and budget tented safaris have grown very popular in the last few years'.

On domestic tourism he said 'Kenya's tourist industry is actively wooing the domestic tourist with considerable success.

Dhow Safaris, Crocodile Ponds, Snake Pits And Sea-Food At Aquamarine Restaurant

KENYA MARINELAND, situated on the beautiful Mtwapa Creek famous for its dhow safaris, traditional village, well-stocked aquarium, croc ponds, snake pits and first class entertainment by African dancers, acrobats, fire eaters and limbo dancers now has an excellent seafood restaurant, the Aquamarine with a 'Sizzling Fresh' Oriental Corner with open kitchen.

The open-fronted makuti roofed restaurant is spacious and well appointed with a Zanzibari style entrance - while the interior decor includes some interesting woodcarvings from their own Makonde wood sculptors in the Kenya Marineland traditional village. Wall hangings include stems of bananas and African kiondos.

In the centre is a heavily laden stall with locally grown exotic fruits.

The restaurant extends to the water front for al-fresco dining in the lush tropical setting of palm trees and colourful plants with a grand stand view of Kenya Marineland's dhow harbour as well as other marine activities on Mtwapa Creek.

The Aquamarine seats ninety people both inside and out. At night it is illuminated by lanterns, while onthe white stucco walls are simulated and coloured clam shells giving the restaurant a rosy glow. Adding to the romantic ambience is soft sentimental music, candlelit tables - while all dishes come adorned with a flower.

The descent to the waterfront is now much less laborious.

Adjacent is the Dhow Safari Restaurant seating 140 people and catering exclusively for those on dhow safaris.

Such is the popularity of these sataris that Kenya Marineland now has a fleet of five dhows, while another is being fitted out with the possibility of becoming an extra dining area.

Each day the Kenya Marineland coach collects tourists from their hotels for the dhow safari which departs at nine in the morning.

They sail out to sea and along the Kenya coast returning at 11 a.m. for a visit to Kenya Marineland's well stocked aquarium, snake pit and croc pond, as well as the traditional village to see the Makonde wood sculptors at work also women preparing traditional African food which they are invited to sample.

This includes Matoke, Roast



Maize, Maharagwe, cassava in coconut and chapatis. There are also madafus and Arab coffee to dripk

Colourful Maasai dancers entertain, as well as a troupe of acrobats who include fire eaters and limbo dancers.

Many tourists, both men and women, take the opportunity

offered of having their hair plaited the 'Afro' way by local hairdressers there. It is also popular with children.

Lunch on the waterfront Dhow Safari Restaurant follows, comprising BBQd sailfish, mishkaki, chicken tika, a variety of fresh salads and fruit, ending with Arab coffee flavoured with cardomen.

The dhow safari continues in the afternoon up the tranquil Mtwapa Creek with on board entertainment which includes guitar music and singing.

Sometimes three dhows are tied together for show time. It is also a great bonanza for photographers, as well as bird watchers.

The voyage ends at 3.30 p.m. with the Kenya Marineland coach waiting to take passengers back to their hotels after a very exciting day at Mtwapa.

Also very popular are the 'Sundowner' dhow trips up Mtwapa Creek to watch the sun set, while enjoying a drink. It is a sight not to be missed in Kenya. There is entertainment on board followed by a seafood supper on the water front restaurant.

The menu includes crab soup, chilli prawns, seafood platter and Crepe Suzette.

The Aquamarine Restaurant also offers a comprehensive wine list ranging from house wine to champagne. There is also an interesting cocktail list, one being a Mombasa Relaxer-a concoction of Kenya Cane, Dark Rum and Martell Brandy tempered with orange and passion fruit juices with a dash of syrup, and chilled.

The restaurant is open daily from 12.30 to 2 p.m. and from seven in the evening. It is predominantly a seafood restaurant offering soem 20 main courses. Fish and crustacea are purchased daily from local fishermen and, thus, are ocean fresh.

Red Snapper is in great demand there as it is very tender and cooks well.

Extremely popular among the 'Hot Starters' are smoked prawns - which are juicy and flavoursome and come served with two different sauces.

They are smoked at Kenya Marineland and are absolutely delicious. There are twelve different hot and cold 'Starters' to choose from including fresh oysters, also smoked trout with horseradish sauce. There are also lobster and crab soups as well as a seafood souffle.

"CALAMARI"

Popular among the main seafood dishes are Seafood Platter comprising pan friend lobster, prawns, fish fillet, crab and calamari flavoured with garlic.

"MBUTA" IS BETTER EATEN ... THAN WORN ON YOUR FEET

THOSE OF YOU who either live in or travel to our out of Kisumu regularly must have had your noses tickled by a very strong fishy smell. It is most prominent around the Kisumu airport.

The same smell also occasionally appears in the Ngong and Ongata Rongal areas. The Kisumu one is stronger and more persistent.

It is very difficult to get it out of ones nostrils once it has wafted

It is the work of the enterprising lake landers who collect the left overs from the mbuta processing factories and then fire cure them in order to preserve them and sell them off to the less fortunate folk in the

The similar smell in the nether regions of Nairobi is from the people who process the bladders of the selfsame mbuta for sale to overseas markets where the material is apprently in high demand and fetches quite good prices.

I have written before about odd smells permeating into cars and the reaction of the occupants of the vehicle to it so I will not go into it any further.

My interest in the subject of mbuta was aroused by Kachumbari telling me that there is now a process for making fish skin into a commercially viable product

I remember recently sitting at home and watching a KBC documentary on one of the research institutions, in Kenya, that had made a breakthrough in the tanning and working of fish skin.

They had succeeded in making it supple enough for shaping into wallets, handbags and similar carryable items.

Their only problem was that they thought the market in Kenya was not ready for fish skin to replace or compete with leather goods.

I cannot fully remember the details of the process and whether the scales were left on

Never fear, Kachumbari tells me that someone else has patented a similar process in another country and has already got some material into the

From what lunderstand, these technocrats are using salmon and trout skin for their product.

The reason for choosing such fish is that they are already considered a delicacy in their own right and as such it would appeal to a "snob" market.

They are the kind that would add mbuta moccasins, salmon slippers and bream brogues to their vocabulary with utmost

In Europe and the Americas, such a market would be substantial enought to justify

At the end of the day, armed with the results of the research and what appear to be right methods of exploiting them, we try to get funding to commercialise the process and cannot get it because either the process is not patented and one would not dare to risk investing in a process that does not have a "life" or someone else has beaten us to the post in some other country where such risks are well supported and funding

Indeed, the production of a car that is locally engineered is a very worthwhile objective.

It would prove that we Kenyans are technically capable of competing with the best in the

It would also mean that we could effectively have our destiny in our hands.

This is indeed the quest of every self respecting individual and nation.

However we have to be conscious of the fact that the world is moving at a very rapid rate and what may have seemed rapidly achievable at inception may be overtaken by events outside our control.

The investment in resources would never be paid back or if so, a captive market would be necessary to achieve a measure of success and that may not necessarily always be available.

As Kachumbari says, mbuta is perhaps better only eaten rather than worn on the feet as


