

THIS IS THE first half of a twopart series on Mombasa's Child Welfare Society. It can be divided into *Emotional* and *Financial*, and we are starting with the second.

At another stage we'll take you on a visit to the home, Mji-wa-Salama, but, being pressed for time and money, we'll now give you a few facts and figures.

THE PAST

The Child Welfare Society of Kenya started simultaneously in Nairobi an Mombasa way back in 1955, headquartered in Nairobi, with Councillor Mrs Simpson as its Chairperson.

Mombasa's Chairman was, and still is Mr. Lance Jones Bengo. Up until 1969 there was no building for the children as such, only the society which nevertheless did its good work. Then along came the home, Mji-wa-Salama, which was the brainchild of the Rotary Club of Mombasa.

After the much publicised and tragic death of "Baby Charo" (a dust-bin infant), Mombasa's Round Table No. 25 took upon itself the great task of providing a baby wing. This nine-year old fine construction has all modern facilities.

Of course, there is still the upkeep of the home.

Until very recently, when events took over and Norad (Norwegian Government) had to drop out as a major donor through no fault of its own, things were not too bad, and this overseas agency managed to fence in *Mji-wa-Salama* and concrete an open space.

But now, to.....
THE PRESENT

Mji-wa-Salama is very depleted personnel-wise.

Geart part-time worker, Mrs. Modi, has retired and gone to live in England, and Mrs. Farrah, another executive, has also left for retirement.

In the actual home the positions of Case Worker and Executive Officer have had to be amalgamated, and this full-time, employed worker, has under her no trained staff but only four minor employees - the financial situation not allowing more fully-trained staff.

Besides Mr. Lance Jones Bengo - the stalwart starter mentioned

above - there are a few office holders.

These are: Vice-Chairman, Mr. J.M. Njoya, who has his own office in Jubilee Building; Mr. Surendra Lakhani (Treasurer, who will accept fees and-or donations - his telephone is Number 493218); and Mr. Vinod Dattani, Executive Member, who does much behind the committee scenes.

The 1992 average cost per child (annually) is estimated at K.Shs. 20,000/-, and the current financial situation is serious to put it midly.

And, consider that there are between 40-50 children at any given time in the home. But all is not lost! The Child Welfare Society has land, and what it



As far as bookings are concerned, Roberta said worldwide these are up on last year'.







cables are underground and a new method of sealing them for corrosion is to be used.

Referring to consumer complaints over being charged for international calls they had not made, Mr. Mutruku revealed that a special K.P. and T. intelligence unit had been set up to catch those involved in this illegal practice.

Some K.P. and T. engineers had been caught and sacked but, said Mr. Mutuku 'other clever people outside K.P. and T. are also involved'.

He mentioned that soon all K.P. and T. engineers will be in uniform and have an identification badge and number.

He also explained about the new billing system.

'Rental Charges' billed for in the past had now been changed to a 'Standing Charge' which is for the maintenance of cables and lines from the road to building.

He also mentioned that portable cordless telephones are now legal in Kenya, but pointed out that their range is only 200 metrtes.

in the cost of telephone calls and postal charges which had never been properly publicised in the press

of 1,200 was the largest ship built for the royal navy since the 1950s when she was laid down in July 1973. She was launched by her majesty the queen on May 3 1977.

She served with distinction in the Falklands war of 1982 and has now been joined in the royal navy fleet by her sister ships HMS lilustrious and HMS Ark Royal.

Invincible is distinguished from conventional aircraft carriers by her revolutionary 12 degree ski-jump at the forward end of the flight deck. This British invention enhances the performance of her sea harriers,

A ship like *Invincible* must be capable of prolonged operations at sea. In the Falklands campaign for example the ship spent 166 days continuously without going into harbour.

To provide this type of endurance her ship's company contains men and women from all branches of the Royal navy. The range of professional skills is remarkable varying from pilots to divers, from seamen to chefs, from engineers to aircraft handlers and from warfare specialists to weather forecasters.

HMS Boxer is primarily designed for anti submarine warfare but is also well equipped for self defence and attacking targets above, on or below the sea surface. Launched in 1981 she was accepted into naval service in December 1963.

Her crew of 265 men and women are all experts in their own fields and in a modern complex warship like Boxer emphasis is increasingly placed on technical skills.

RFA Fort Austin is designed to replenish warships with stores while underway. She is able to do this anywhere in the world and can operate in a nuclear environment if necessary.

RFA Bayleaf is a specialised fuel replenishment ship of 38,000 tons and can refuel ships while underway. She will be berthed with Fort Austin at buoys in Killindini harbour. HMS Boxer will be at Mbaraki and HMS Invincible will be alongside in Killindini.



MUSLIMS AROURD THE WORLD MARK "IDD-UL-HAJJ" HOLIDAY

"Idd-Ul-Hajj" Is Great Day Which Marks

End Of The Holy Pilgrimage To Mecca ...

MUSLIMS THROUGHOUT ISLAMIC world have been celebrating Iddul-Hajj to mark the end of Hajj or Pilgrimage in Makkah.

Iddul-Hajj is one of the greatest festivals of Muslims which falls on the 10th of Dhul-Hijjah, immediately after the completion of hajj rituals.

This day is also known as Iddul Adh-ha which means the Idd of Sacrifice.

During this Idd Muslims normally slaughter animals to sacrifice.

This is in memory of the sacrifice of Ismail, whose father Prophet Ibrahim wanted to slaughter him.

Prophet Ibrahim, while he was sleeping one night, saw in a dream that he was offering his son, Ismail in sacrifice.

Ibrahim knew that his dream was a divine inspiration and it had nothing to do with the whispering of satan. This is because what the Prophets saw in their deams was a message from God.

On the 10th of Dhul-Hijjah Prophet Ibrahim took his beloved son Ismail away to the outskirt of the town at a place called Mina.

It is here that he was going to sacrifice his son. He told him calmly about the dream:

"O my dear son!" I see in vision that I offer you in sacrifice. Now

see that what is your view?"

Prophet Ibrahim wanted his son to offer himself as a sacrifice to Allah. He knew that his son was always obediient to him.

He could have taken the decision of sacrificing Ismail without consulting him, but Ibrahim did not substituted a ram to be slaughtered instead of Ismail.

The holy Quran says:-

"When they both surrendered to Allah and Ibrahim had flung Ismail down on his face, we called unto him; O Ibrahim! Thou hast already fulfilled the vision. Lo! Thus do we difference is that Zakatul-Fitr is given on the day of Iddul Fitr while animals are sacrificed on this occasion of Iddul-Adh-ha.

The sacrifice consists of slaughtering camels, goats, sheep and cattles which begins after Idd prayers until the sunset on the

third day, that 12th of Dhul-Hijjah.

Some people have the habit of

slaughtering their animals the night

This is wrong because they miss

a very great sunnah of sacrifice

The Prophet has the following to

say on the importance of sacrifice

"There is no action which is more

pleasant in the eye of Allah which

the son of Adam can do on this day

than the shedding of animals,

therefore rejoice its performance*.

The companions of the Prophet

before Idd.

asked him: "O Messenger of Allah what is this the shedding of blood (sacrifice)?"

The Prophetreplied: "The way of your forefather Ibrahim."

They asked: "What gains for us in it O Messenger of Allah?"

He replied: "There is one reward of every hair of the slaughtered enime!"

It is sunnah to call the family members to witness the first drops of blood of the slaughtered animal as the holy Prophet used to do, may be for the following reason as he is reportd to have said:

"The blood of the slaughtered animal certainly falls in a place near Allah before it reaches on the ground, so make yourself purified with it".

This means that the sacrifices are accepted by Allah promptly even before the blood falls on the earth.

This shows and proves the importance and blissful significance of sacrifce.

Imam Muslim relates that when the Prophet Muhammad wanted to sacrifice he used to call his wife

Aisha to witness the shedding of blood.

The meat of the slaughtered animal shouldbe divided into three equal portions, one for the poor and needy, the second for neighbours, relatives and friends and the third for oneself.

It is not good to eat all the meat with the family alone or selecting the best part for yourself because Allah hates such practice.

He says: "By no means shall you attain righteousness unless you give freely of which you love" (3:92).

In addition to that the hoty Prophet have emphasised in his hadith: "None of you shall enter Paradise till you love for others what you love for yourself" (Muslim).

This is another way by which our religion, Islam wants us to share and feed the poor and needy on such special occasions.

Therefore, this historical event have left behind for us a big lesson that we should be always ready to sacrifice our precious and valuable things for the sake of Allah.

Although Ismail was ayoung boy, he was ready to sacrifice his life in obedience to Allah's command. When Allah, our Creator commands us to do something, we should do it at once wihtout any hesitation, even if it means losing our life.

Finally, I wish to extend my sincere and warm Idd greetings and message to all Muslims during this special occasion. Mine is to say Idd Mubrarak and Hajj-maqbul,

Ismail was not hesitant. Without any fear and fright he said to his father:

"O my beloved father! do as you have been commanded. You will find me if Godso will one practising patient and constancy".

This was indeed a great trial as the sacrifice was required from both lbrhaim and Ismail. The father was to sacrifice his only son and the son was to sacrifice his own life.

When Prophet Ibrhaim had layed his son on the ground and he was ready to slaughter him, Allah reward the doers of God. That verify was a clear test, then we ransomed him with a tremendous victim" (37:103-106).

This devotion of Prophet Ibrahim earned so much pleasure from Allah that Muslims were commanded to commemorate this event every year.

That is why all the Pilgrims at Hajj must slaughter the animals to remember the event.

It is for the same reason that Iddul-Adh-ha is celebrated as a mark of joy on the survival of Ismail from the great ordeal.

to bring in the society the progress needed.




The true sense of Unity is evidently manifested and practically demonstrated through their simple uniform the pligrims are enforced to put on during their performances the various arduous rites.





Bombolulu plant neues Kulturzentrum an der Küste

BOMBOLULU, die Werkstatt für Körperbehinderte in Mombasa, hat große Pläne und ist damit beschäftigt, ein neues Kulturzentrum aufzubauen wie die Bomas of Kenya" in Nairobi, was eine große Attraktion sein wird.
