KENYA WILDLIFE SERVICES OFFICIAL SEEKS UNDERSTANDING FROM LOCAL FISHERMEN, TOURISTS AND HOTEL OPERATORS

A SUB-COMMITTEE ON THE 'Environment' has been set up by the Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers', Coast, to consider proposals from the Kenya Wildlife Service regarding the future management of marine parks and reserves and their funding.

The chairman is David Thompson, General Manager, Whitesands Hotel, and the sub-committee will comprise two representatives each from the north and south coast, Mombasa and Malindi.

It will meet before the end of June, followed by a further meeting together with KWS and representatives from KATO, MCTA and others involved in the tourist industry.

A recent committee meeting of KAHC, Coast at the Manor Hotel had been addressed by a KWS team with a proposal to change the system of revenue collection in

respect of the Mombasa Marine Park and Reserve.

The proposal was in the form of an overall fee being charged to all tourists staying at beach hotels which hoteliers will themselves collect on behalf of KWS.

It would be a very small sum of around Shs 50/- covering a specified period which, it was suggested, could be included in the cost of the holiday package.

It would also indicate that the hotel is environmental friendly which will aid its marketing strategies in today's more environmental conscious world.

It would enable KWS to undertake more management activities in the Mombasa marine park - protection of the reef, beach and so on.

This will come out much cheaper for the foreign tourist who is being asked to pay Shs 180/- per visit to the marine park at the moment.

The team from KWS who had come to 'share their ideas' with KAHCwere Robert Bensted Smith, Policy and Planning Advisor; Patrick Mwiti, Legal Officer; Anderson Koyo, Senior Warden (marine) all from KWS Headquarters, and M.O. Opiyo, Warden Mombasa Marine Park.

Their visit was a follow-up to a workshop held two weeks earlier at Nyali Beach Hotel to deal with the crises concerning the Mombasa Marine Park and Reserve which included escalating campaigns for its de-gazettement and pressure from the highest levels of government to tackle problems concerning the livelihood of boatmen and fishermen stemming from the restricted areas in which they can operate.

Early 1992 there was a serious problem over revenue collection resulting in KWS having to devote its manpower resources to patrolling the beach and controlling beach boys to ensure that KWS received the revenue due to it.

TICKETS

It had involved chasing people up and down the beach to see if they had tickets when entering the marine park.

Said Patrick Mwiti 'at present our enforcement of the law is limited because what the law requires us to do is to charge anyone entering the park which begins from the highest water mark on the beach.

All those who walk beyond that we are supposed to charge. However, because of many problems we have only enforced it in a limited way on those who actually go out to the corals'.

It was mentioned at the meeting that tourists just cannot understand why they have to pay to walk along the beach, which is a public area. PRIVERSMILE

goodwill of the marine and coastal environment

For us to ensure that this environment remains in a stable form to continue attracting tourists it is imperative that there is some input into its management and sustenance.

Continuing he said 'you depend on a properly maintained environment, because if the coast is polluted and the reefs completely destroyed and the waves from the sea come direct to the shoreline the first thing to go will be your

Adding 'damage to the coral reef through the anchoring of boats, people walking on and breaking them, although you may not see it now, will have a direct bearing on the future of your investment in these areas

That is why we cannot really work in isolation from you. We have to plan together as a team concerned about the common

In referring to the general cleanliness of the beach he mentioned that some hoteliers are discharging waste from the kitchens and laundry directly into the sea, also burning seaweed on the beach.

All these, he said are contributing to the pollution of the environment.

To maintain its cleanliness will require team work and, perhaps, the setting up of a consultative and management committee where hoteliers, KWS, government and non-governmental organisations will be involved to ensure each party is playing the game according

With such a concerted effort I am sure we shall be able to keep the beaches very clean.

He said that because of problems with the Mombasa Marine Park and shortage of manpower they had been forced to divert available resources to such things like chasing revenue.

However, said Mr. Koyo'we have done quite a bit in terms of clearing'. Adding 'as far as this happening along the entire coastline, it is question of co-operation between hoteliers, KWS and all other parties concerned.

I am sure that with the goodwill of all concerned it is quite possible to

We will have to prove to tourists and hoteliers that the money we shall be getting from them is being invested for their good. KWS is willing to take up that commitment'.

He then referred to the problem of silt from up-country being washed into the sea from the Sabald River at Malindi which is destructive to the growth of corals and could affect hotels, as well as tourism in

He said that KWS had indentified the source of the problem but to address it would need a lot of

He also noted that a filtration system at Malindi would be very expensive. However, with a concerted effort by all parties concerned there is a possibility of the problem being addresed in one way or another.

Added Mr. Smith, KWS Policy and Planning Advisor 'I think when

Explaining the KWS position and what it is trying to achieve Mr. Smith said th KWS is a parastatal its principle goal being to conserve the bilogical diversity and natural resources of the country while trying to facilitate economic

'Most of our managment is aimed at protecting the environment, trying to prevent possible forms of destruction to it and trying to control the activities of tourists.

Here Mr Smith added we are

Said Mr. Smith I am sure you are all aware we are trying to get a fairly substantial capital input from donor agencies.

We are trying to do something about it. We have started to put more resources into Mombasa. The Mombasa Workshop was an effort to come to grips with some of these problems and some quite positive things have come from it.

We have begun to get good cooperation with the boatmen by helping them form an association.

In a perspective on what coast hoteliers need Mr. Smith said 'I would say that most of all they need the environment to exist.

They need the beaches and these are only there because the reef is protecting and feeding them.

You want your tourists to be happier and enjoy themselves more and you will be wanting to have fairly good environmental credentials yourselves.

In your marketing activities you want to be able to say that you have good credentials and you are taking steps to protect the environment.

You want to be seen to be doing that because it is something that helps the marketing process.

What we would like to propose to you is that we change the system of revenue collection either for the whole coast or, perhaps more sensibly just Mombasa, to see how

you get onto very difficult problems such as siltation, pollution, nutrient levels in the water here, something we need to do is proper research and ecological monitoring.

Pollution is coming from things being dumped at sea, also from hotels which is changing things like nutrient levels. But, he said we do not know if it is changing them enough to hinder coral growth because corals do not like high nutrient levels.

If we do that sort of study we would know the magnitude of the problem we are dealing with and work out how we can deal with it.

In addition, there is the aesthetic side - the sight of rubbish on the beach and as Mr. Koyo has said we would certainly do our bit to solve that problem

Mr. Smith told hoteliers 'we are here to discuss with you some ideas to try and get away from crises management of the Mombasa Marine Park and to find a system that is more workable and where available resources are being utilised into positive management by really protecting the area and working for everyone's also trying to enhance their enjoyment of the area as well as making information available to them and helping promote Kenya.

Another important management activity of KWS is that of working together with local communities. It was realised he said 'that you

cannot manage the parks and reserves in isolation from the surrounding communities' Mr. Smith then listed other activities of KWS which include

the training and welfare of staff,

development of facilities, purchase and maintenance of equipment. He told KAHC members 'we get some equipment donated but utlimately we have to replace


vehicles, boats etc. ourselves. There are also administrative activities such as collecting revenue trying to prevent fraud, the general running of office etc.

All these activities cost money and KWS is a self-financing organisation.

It has not received any money from government for a long time, but in any case it had been government's intention to reduce its contribution to zero by, I think,

it goes from a ticket based system to some sort of fee charged to all tourists.

I would say that in principle there is one fundamental justification for that in that tourists come here not only for the beach and to swim but for the environment.

If that environment is going to continue being there and is going to be protected as the population and competition for its resources grows, then somebody has to be managing it.

And this has to be paid for. To me it makes sense that all the tourists who come contribute to that management cost. At the moment the only ones who contribute is a very tiny percentage who actually go out and visit the corals themselves.

They pay a lot to do so and that is the source of our conflict with the boatmen and some of the water sports people that the amount that each foreign tourist has to pay to KWS is shs 180/- each time they enter the park.

It is enough to actually dissuade some from even taking a trip to the

Whereas if we spread the load across all the tourists we shall be talking about a very small amount, on average perhaps, say Shs 50/- per holiday, or something like that

When you compare this to what the average inland tourist contributes to KWS - it is minute. Probably a typical inland tourist might visit five parks at Shs 450/-a go, that is Shs 2250/-.

One advantage of the proposed new system is that it allows KWS to collect the revenue and it is fair on the boatmen.

We are then not competing with them. At the moment they are our revenue collectors and that is not working.

Another advantage of this new system is that it will allow us to start spending money on conservation and on working with people instead of chasing tourists up and down the beach looking for tickets.

It will also remove a lot of argumentabout the marine reserve boundaries and whether there should be a free zone or something like that because there would no longer be a specific entry fee to the park.

There would just be the fee charged through the hotel itself. Nobody is going to argue about where exactly the boundaries should be - the only remaining argument would be with the fishermen themselves about where the park boundary should be to determine where fishing is allowed - that issue remains.

All these arguments about free zones and how we ought to police them will disappear.

FISHERMEN

It would dramatically reduce the threat of degazettement. Fishermen are still campaigning for that at the highest levels and we are going to be working very hard to bring them around to our side, but it is going to take time.

The boatmen are beginnig to get organised but they have also been campaigning for degazettement, or the equivalent of it. If we can introduce this new system of charging they will be very happy with that as they will no longer have anything to do with KWS revenue.

'If KWS is going to be the ones to protect this area and ensure a future for tourism along this part of

the coast, then we are ready to do so if you are ready to pay for it.

KWS will deliver the goods if hoteliers will co-operate in making sure it can be paid for'.

Members felt they needed a clearer proposal from KWS on how the money is going to be spent, how the beaches are going to be kept clean and how the beach boys are going to be controlled.

The KAHC committee meeting under the chairmanship of Joshua Mwendwa, also discussed other environmental matters and hotels were asked to particularly look into the out-dated sewage systems and ensure no effluent is discharged into the sea.

It was felt that the treatment of sewage and its disposal should be part of the essential services provided by municipal and county councils.

While two hotels had installed theirown sewage treatment plants it is an expensive exercise for each individual notel to undertake.

EXPEDIENT

There are also many beach cottages along the coast. It was felt it would be expedient to have a sewage treatment works in each area to prevent the sea being polluted.

Members pointed out that the hotel industry is one of the most highly taxed, as well as paying large sums in the way of service charges.

It was felt that local councils should pay more attention to protecting the environment.

It was reported that hotel bookings are generally down at the moment (which was not unusual for May) and that the future does not look too bright.

The dip in tourism was attributed to recession in Europe as well as to the adverse publicity Kenya continues to receive in the overseas press.

Itwas also noted that more hotels are opening and some being extended - making more beds available on a presently depressed market.

The meeting had opened with everyone being upstanding to observe a minute's silence in memory of their colleague Mr. H.G. Mituri, General Manager, Trade Winds Hotel, who had died recently.

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

The Dutch registered research vessel Tyro arrived as scheduled last Friday, and docked at the Comarco jetty in preparation for an oceanographic research project which is anticipated to last some ten months, and cover the north western area of the Indian Ocean from Kenya to Pakistan.

The project will include the participation of scientists from both countries and naturally as well as those from the Netherlands Marine Research Foundation (SOZ) which has taken the initiative for this reserach programme, and considers both participating countries as 'partners in science'.

Briefly, the initial quest of the programme is to study the effect of monsoons in life in the coastal waters of Kenya. For the north western part of the Indian Ocean has a unique climatic character. with the South West monsoon blowing between April and September causing the water in the Indian Ocean to flow travel at



speed along the Kenyan coast.

In November the wind turns to the north east and a southward current develops. It is this swing in the monsoon that has large consequences for marine life.

During the S.W. monsoon an enormous quanity of cold water, rich in oxygen and nutrients, is sucked from the deeper layers of the ocean off the coasts of Somalia, Yemen and Oman.

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Consequently, plankton the 'summer' months. In 'winter' this situation changes dramatically.

No mixing with deeper water layers occurs, so during the N.E. congomes

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flourishes in these areas during

monsoon the plankton dies and is broken down by bacteria. Teh organic products of htis proces sink to the sea bed.

DUTCH REGISTERED oceanographic research vessel "TYRO" visiting Kilindini Port.

One of the aims of this programme, whichis named the Indian Ocean Programme (IOP) is to study in detail the development of plankton and its dying off, sample the sea bed in order to study marine life of the past as well as have an insight into the climatic changes in the world as a result of natural and human influences.

Now for a few words about the vessel herself. Tyro was born in 1967 at the Van der Giessen de Noord Yard, Ijsselin the Nederlands. Starting out life as a pallets carrier as well as being fitted out to carry "ngombi's". She's 84.23 metres long, with a DWT of

The cargo space consists of one hold and three twin decks. Powered by MWM main engines of six cylinders each giving out a combined BHP of 2999. She also has a bow thruster to facilitate positioning.

In 1982 the Tyro the predecessor of SOZ (Stitching Onderzoek Der Zee) purchased the vessel so that she could roam the world's oceans as an innovative semi converted research vessel.

The innovation came in the concept of carrying containers which housed the research labs, for which there is room for thirty, as well as fixing anchorage points, a square 'A' frame at the aft etc.

What is particularly interesting is the adaptation in order to carry the containers as laboratories, and this offers a large degree of flexibility, in so far as the containers can be interchanged onboard, or place ashore temporarily, which will be part of the case here.

MTONGWE



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
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

SNEAKY WAYS OF CATCHING SPEEDING **OFFENDER**

MANY COUNTRIES IN the world are trying to find ways of optimising the use of the police force and especially the time spent on petty offences.

Some time back I wrote about those people who once convicted of petty offences in Kenya could end up doing community service instead of going to jail for a few weeks or

This is a way of keeping the jails free for the serious offenders.

Kachumbari was caught up in a punitive scheme that seems to herald a new approach to making people obey the law.

It involved sitting through lectures on the very subject one has infringed!

Cops in some states in the US did a study on the most common traffic offence.

They found that exceeding the speed limit topped the list in all the states involved in the study.

Since car registrations are computerised and it is easy to find people based on the registration number, they decided they would allow people three speed violations without hauling them in to face the law.

Each time a motorist was caught speeding it would be logged against his record.

On the fourth violation, the motorist would be asked to attend a special law class.

They would only know about it when they got a subpoena through the post binding them to appear in the class.

A District Attorney (D.A.) would take them through traffic law in detail and the whole exercise would take at least two days.

The way the Police hoped it would work was that people would get so frustrated at wasting so much time relearning what they thought they already knew that they would know better next time.

In fact, the course material was predominantly composed of analysing and discussing the violations that had been committed by the people in that particular class.

In the US time is expensive so for a salesman who had to attend such a class it meant loss of sales or points at his place of

The system reduced the speed violations over a period of two years by some twenty per cent once people got to hear about the sneaky way of catching speeding offenders.

Secret cameras were place at spots on highways where drivers were often tempted to overspeed and in urban areas where one least expected them.

They would also be moved around and the populace had to

play a guessing game with the cops.

More often than not, the cameras were moved in the middle of the night after their special housings had been in place for some time.

Kachumbari committed the necessary number of speed violations in one of these States and was duly summoned to attend his road traffic law

Among the people in his class were a couple of highly strung computer sales people who had to appear just as their company was about to launch some new software on the market.

They had been given very high sales targets and as far as they were concerned, sitting down and listening to the D.A. was a waste of time and they were losing sales and cash.

On the second day, after they had completed the course, one of the sales fellows realised that he still had time to try and make some sales.

He tore out of the class and the only thought on his mind was to get to a shopping centre some distance away that he had targeted as the hub of his sales effort.

He ran across the car park to his car and with tyres screeching, he shot out onto the road and headed for his sales

Less than a kilometre from where he was attending the lectures, he saw a flash from the corner of his eye and realised that he had been photographed as he committed his first speeding offence immediately after wasting time attending driving law lectures!

This made more distraught and it was no surprise when a few minutes later, in a tiny lapse of concentration he wrapped his car round a lamp post whilst trying to turn off the highway into the minor road that leading to his sales point

He was taken in for speeding and wilful damage of public property and because of the property damage so soon after his revision of the law, he was taken straight back into the next

In contrast to our cops, Police in other countries revert to being normal citizens once they are off duty.

They are not always right when they commit an offence.

It was amply illustrated recently when a Police chief in one of the Nordic countries was caught driving at 90 kph in a 70 kph zone.

It happened when the fellow was going on holiday with his family and was being subjected to the same pressures that you and I are normally subjected to in every day life.

He was charged by the young officer who had measured his speed and it was only when they were filling in the charge sheet in preparation for his court appearance that they realised he was a Police chief in his own

The local boss decided to proceed with the prosecution anyway.

Later, when asked by some journalists how he felt now that he had been formally requested to appear in court, the holidaying Police chief's only comment was to stay that "The law is the law!!"

As Kachumbari says, when will the law always be the law everywhere in the world? Perhaps when tea becomes an extinct beverage.
