Kenya Ports Plan Eldoret Inland Container Depot

THE PROPOSED KENYA Ports Authority Eldoret inland container depot currently under construction is scheduled to be completed by July 1993.

This was disclosed by the managing director KPA Mr. Philip Okundi when the corporation chairman Mr. Stephen Mwakisha led a KPA board of directors on a courtesy call on Uasin Gishu district commissioner Mr. K.P. Langat and the mayor of Eldoret Councillor Hussein Kitur in Eldoret.

Mr. Okundi said that the Eldoret inland container depot (ICD) exemplified KPA policy objective of bringing port services closer to upcountry users and transit countries so as to make their use of the port of Mombasa more economic, by cutting down on transport cost.

He added that once operational the ICD will serve as a "dry port" which will be connected to the port of Mombasa container terminal by a special regular "Railtainer" service operated by the Kenya Railways Corporation, similar to the one currently serving the Nairobi inland container depot at Embakasi.

Mr. Okundi further said that the depot will bring port services right into the heart of farming, commercial and industrial activities within and around Eldoret town and will also cater for transit traffic to and from hinterland countries of Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi, Eastern Zaire and southern Sudan.

This project, he added, which was of economic importance to the country had been made possible by peace and tranquillity prevailing in the country and will also benefit the neighbouring countries.

Mr. Okundi said that an initial traffic survey conducted for the facility had indicated the depot could handle initial about 13,000 teus annually and the figure will increase gradually.

Malindi Bay - Row Rages On

TOUR TRADE AND ENVIRONMENTALISTS OBJECT ON LAND ALLOCATION

AN INJUNCTION OF EXECUTION to halt any development of reclaimed land in front of beach hotels on Malindi Bay which has been demarcated and allocated to individuals without prior consultation with Malindi residents, Municipal Council, hotels and environmental specialists, is being considered by the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association's Malindi sub-branch.

This was reported by its secretary, Godfrey Karume, when addressing the MCTA's Committee Meeting at the Oceanic Hotel.

He produced a plan showing how the land had been sub-divided into plots from Lawford's Hotel to the Malindi Golf Club. It also included a road giving access to these new plots.

Mr. Karume is Executive Manager of Eden Roc Hotel in front of which a developer is planning to erect forty apartments.

He said that MCTA's Malindi sub-committee would be meeting within the next few days to consider engaging a lawyer to press for an injunction should the issue remain unresolved.

Said Mr. Karume 'I am a Nominated Councillor on the Malindi Municipal Council representing the tourist industry.

The Council unanimously objected to these allocations and resolved that an immediate objection be made on the following grounds.

Such allocations would deprive

Mwananchi would be denied their enjoyment of the beach.

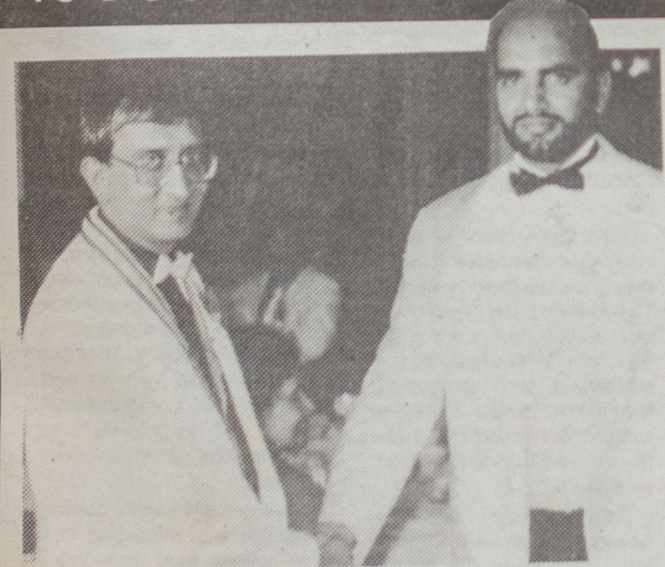

THE STUDENTS OF St. Paul's High School and St. Joseph's Convent, Belgaum, have been in Kenya for over 70 years.

At the peak of Goan migration to Kenya there were in 1958 over 250 former students primarily in the civil service, railways, customs, police and the teaching profession.

With Independence in 1963 an exodus began of these Goans who are now in England, Australia, Canada, United States and several other countries.

Today their numbers in Kenya are barely 20 and include a former chairman of the Kenya Medical Association and founder of the Kenya Ear Foundation, a former provincial surgeon, accountants, tour operators and journalists.

St. Paul's Students Celebrate

They work in Nairobi, Mombasa and Nakuru.

The still youthful bunch who were studying in Belgaum in the thirties, forties and fifties met on Sunday June 28 1992, feast of St. Peter and Paul, at Joaquim D'Souza's garden home in Gigiri, which is the UN headquarters of UNEP, HABITAT and other UN agencies. An open-air thanksgiving Mass was celebrated by Fr. Tony D'Souza, SJ, who is now on the staff of Nairobi's Holy Family Basilica. Tony left St. Paul's in 1957.

Former students included Dr. M.J. (Manu) D'Cruz, FRCS, Cynes Coutinho, Albert D'Souza, Saude George, Arthur Azavedo, Wilfred Maciel, Joe Pereira, Willie Lobo and Cynthia Kyte Dantas (St. Joseph's Convent).

Joaquim D'Souza (St. Paul's 1947), his wife Martha and two charming daughters Hayley and Tansy were the hosts.

A homely buffet of Goan food was served. There were drinks -

alcoholic and non - even a bottle of fiery Goa Cajel from Margao!

"With liquids and bitings there was warm lubrication to help the oldies talk of their youth in Belgaum and refer to unknown, known and passed away school friends.

"All with affection and love. Those were the days, my friends ... was the common thread of conversation.

"There was nostalgia and a touch of uninhibited togetherness with the old Belgaumites and their spouses recalling days of youthful gay abandon, calf love and even sacrifices due to limited family resources and even war time rationing!"

But above all a joyful sense of gratitude to the Jesuits, the Canosian nuns, the teachers, fellow classmates and genuine sentiments of affection for those wonderful years in Belgaum.

HEALTH TIPS YOGA, HYPNOSIS AND MEDITATION

WORKING UNDER AN unpleasant boss will give anybody anxiety. The Japanese are said to have an innovative way of releasing this tension. They go into special soundproof rooms with effigies of their bosses and scream, punch or tear at them till their affect is released. Then they are able to smile at their bosses the next day.

There is a large difference in how much stress is needed before people succumb to anxiety or any other emotion. Some need a lot more than others and psychologists formulate that this is a measure of how good their coping systems towards stress are. Let us consider how you cope with threatening situations.

Defense mechanisms are the first step to dealing with your stress causing situations. They modify how you interrupt the threat. For example, two people of similar backgrounds may be sacked from the same job. One may be devastated but his colleague looks at his sacking merely stoically. The different responses are largely as a result of their defence mechanisms.

Denial, projection, aggression, repression, rationalization and reaction formation are examples of defense mechanisms. Denial is a state where a person absolutely refuses to believe that his problems are there.

The number of people who still refuse to believe that AIDS exists illustrates this well. Projection is well described by the biblical adage, seeing the speck in the eyes of others and ignoring the log in your own.

Here the tendency is to see others as having more weaknesses than yourself. The defence are often quite unrealistic but serve the function of protecting the person's self concept. More on these defense mechanisms can be found in textbooks on psychology.

The second step in coping behaviour is how you deal with the threat itself.

These actions can be adaptive in that the threat is dealt with and the anxiety reduces, or maladaptive which often times merely delays the consequences of the threat themselves.

Good adaptive behaviours include

problem solving, sharing the problem with others and soon. Poor responses include persistently denying that the problem exists or turning to alcohol and drugs to achieve without resolving the problem.

To deal with anxiety you could try and reduce the symptoms of tension and/or deal with the cause itself. Tension reduction can be achieved by:-

- Vigorous exercises in a favoured sport, use of hobbies or amusement to get your mind off the threat.

- Avoiding or escaping anxiety by physically removing yourself from the threat where possible, such as going for a stroll.

- Sharing your positive or negative feelings with relatives, friends or even a professional.

- Learning a deep relaxation technique. In this arousal is systematically reduced each time anxiety levels rise unacceptably. Yoga, self hypnosis, meditation and

autogenic training have their advocates but progressive muscular relaxation is the easiest to learn.

The cause of your anxiety can be dealt with through problem solving. This technique is often taken for granted but you may recall that high anxiety levels can seriously impair its effective use.

Problem solving involves several stages.

Seeking information about your problem, laying down options for its resolution, considering each option for its chances of succeeding, practicing the most promising option and finally its execution are important stages. Success is also good for your self esteem. In some cases it may not be possible to eliminate the cause of your anxiety.

Here successful coping consists of adjusting to it in ways that are least harmful.

Each situation must be carefully considered on its own merits but some of the techniques already mentioned could come in very useful.

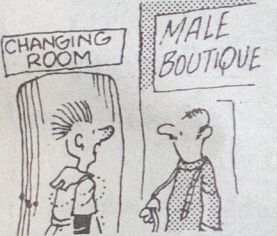

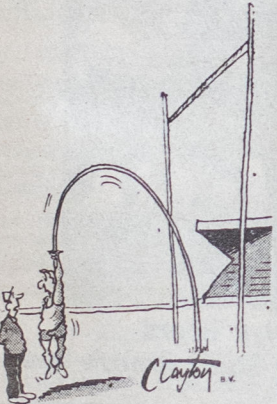

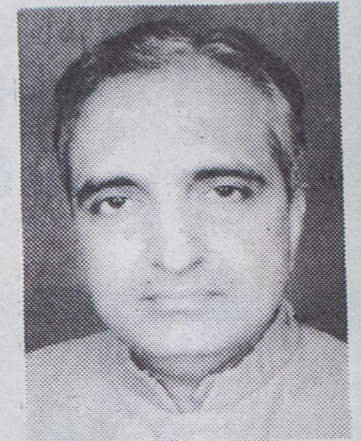
He has worked as a Professor of Accountancy, Auditing and Taxation from 1957-1964.

Faraj Dumila Featured In Special Radio Programmes For Tanzania

"CULTURE STARTS WITH the people as creators of themselves and transformers of their environment. Culture, in its widest and most complete sense enables men to give shape to their lives. Culture is not freely received but built up by the people."

This was the major theme of six half-hour programmes over Radio Tanzania - both Zanzibari and Dar-es-Salaam by Coast Culture writer, Faraj Dumila during his recent visit there.

Mr. Dumila accentuated that is the vision of man and of the world and is thus system of thought, philosophies, science, beliefs, arts and languages.

"Culture is a dynamic means of edifying the nation over and above tribal or ethnic divisions and African unity above all forms of chauvinism because it is a constant search for the people's creative conscientiousness."

In his talks over the radio, Faraj Dumila extensively quoted the late Mbiyu Koinange's epithet:

"Now that we have freedom we are responsible for shaping the types of societies we want in our respective countries. This parallel with our campaign for economic independence.

"We also strive for intellectual as well as spiritual independence which will facilitate meaningful cultural growth.

"I am under no illusion that the struggle for the cultural freedom is going to be any easier than that of political and economic freedom. In fact in some aspects it may prove to be more difficult because of the illusive and imperceptible nature of the enemy."

In his talks Mr. Dumila appeals to East African Kiswahili speaking community to create a viable and meaningful market of exchanging thoughts, creative commodities and ideas which would enable the Kiswahili integrated culture to be an indestructible instrument of harmonious understanding between and among people of East African territories.

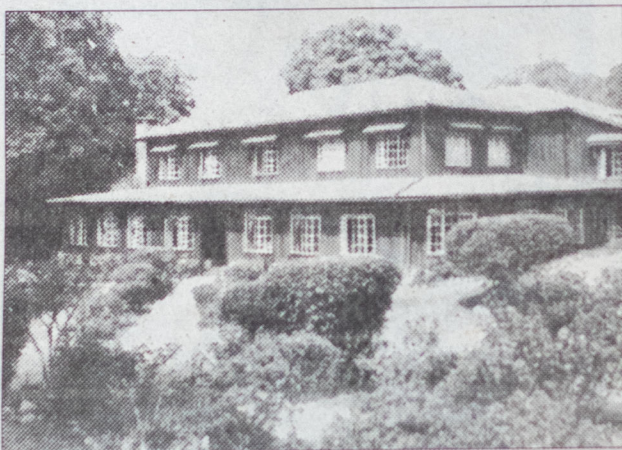

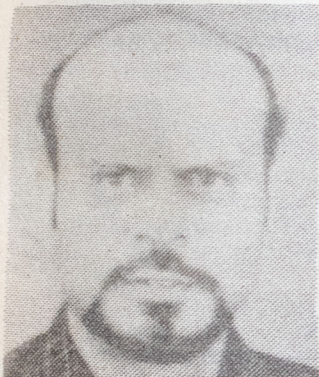

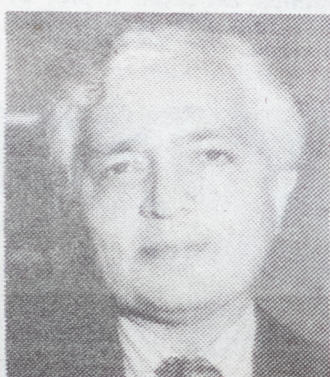

He played a very prominent part and in fact was the inspiration in the rescue of over 900 refugees from Somalia during December last year.

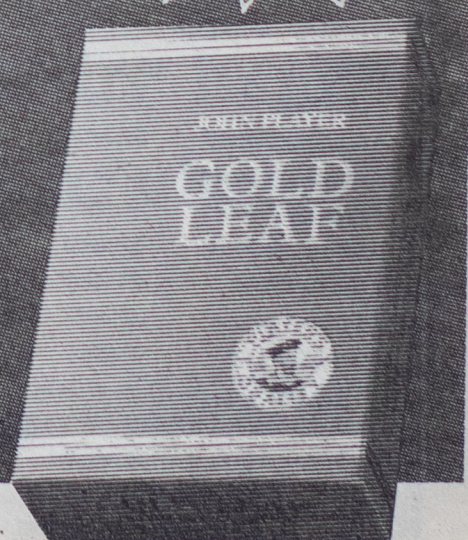

Port Sees Numerous Vessels Under Charter To The I.C.R.C.

THE UNISTAR LINES *Swan 1* arrived and dropped the hook at A anchorage on Saturday morning to await space at one of the container berths which at time of writing are occupied by the *MSC Laura*, *WEC Rotterdam* and *Heron*. However *Swan 1* should have taken the place of *WEC Rotterdam* at Number 16 by now.

The Dutch research vessel *Tyro* entered last Thursday morning as anticipated and berthed at Mbaraki North, with the little French naval vessel *La Reuse* taking up portion of Mbaraki South.

Tyro was meant to have sailed out on Saturday, but I see that she sailed out on Sunday, so a little delay experience there.

The locally based supply vessel *Fish Eagle* arrived back in town towing the barge *Nyuni* which has been used to ferry food stuffs and medicines from ship to shore in Somalia.

I understand that they will soon be introducing an innovative method of moving the barge from buoy to shore using the EBOS system.

For those Malagasy who yearn for the 'green green grass home' you don't have to look too far.

There's quite a bit of it growing on

the barges *Morondava* and *Andromesy* (named after towns there) and presently tied up to the buoys at Liwatoni).

I guess the soil was brought onto the barges by the machinery being loaded and discharged and just took seed. Interesting sight nevertheless.

I spotted the *Marco Polo 1* arriving back in port on Saturday.

She as mentioned in last week's column is one of the numerous vessels under charter to the I.C.R.C., although she has the Red Cross emblem on her accommodation sides and front, she does not sport the emblem on her ship sides as I believe is customary. Maybe just an

oversight.

Holbud Limited managed *Ar Razique* and *Al Johffaare* expected in this week carrying 14,000 m.tonnes bagged sugar and 12,000 m.tonnes bagged fertilizer respectively.

Due in this Friday is the 27123 DWT Bulk carrier *Friendly Islands* with 25,000 mt.coal for discharge at Mbaraki and destined as usual to the B.P.O. Company.

Friendly Islands forms part of the Soc. Anonyme Monegasque D'administration Maritime et Aerienne. So it would appear that the company is engaged in both marine and aero transportation.

The fleet comprises of some 47 vessels, totalling 2,719,815 DWT. Most of the fleet are bulkers, with just eight OBO's comprising a total of 1,250,000 DWT's.

A further 26,250 tonnes of bulk maize is due to arrive aboard the *Andros Oceania* this coming Wednesday.

Also a couple of vessels coming in with cargo of frozen tuna, they being the Spanish registered *Txori Urdin* and the *Eguzkia*, the latter a reefer and the former a fishing vessel, so I would imagine that the *Txori Urdin* will be coming in to discharge her catch.

Both vessels form part of the Compania Internacional de Pesca Y Derivados fleet and will no doubt supplement the number of Spanish registered fishing vessels and reefers that have made their base here not so long ago.

The *Doctor* and *Marjorie Lykes* are in port, with the *Marjorie Lykes* taking the place of *Doctor Lykes* at Number 18.

Marjorie Lykes is then scheduled to shift to conventional cargo berth Number Two with her place at the container berth being taken by the *Lady Dona*.

There are ten vessels presently under 'Admiralty Arrest' in Port, the latest appears to have been the *Nuska* for allegedly violating Tanzanian fishing regulations.

The M.V. *Baroon* is both under arrest as well as restrained from sailing.

The little reefer *Igloo Star* arrived on Tuesday morning with her cargo of 36 odd tonnes meat.

She has an enormous appendage in the form of a bulbous bow, more like some sort of huge proboscis appearing in no manner to be compatible or in proportion with the size of the vessel, however must be, for you just don't go around sticking things on the ends of ships.

She was built in 1971 and launched as the "Heero" changing name to the present in 1984.

She has an LOA of 73.5 metres, two holds and four hatches and forms part of the Erikson, Gustaf Rederiaktiebolaget fleet (tongue twister there) comprising 13 vessels, all but one reefers.

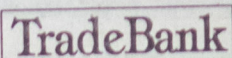



Das sich über 75 Quadratkilometer erstreckende Shimba Hills Nationalreservat in Kwale hat sich nach der längsten bisher registrierten Trockenzeit und nach dem verspätet eingetroffenen Monsunregen nun bestens erholt. Dieses üppige tropische Paradies konnten die Vertreter inländischer und ausländischer Reiseveranstalter (alle in leitender Stellung) ausgiebig genießen, als sie als Gäste von Block Hotels in der Shimba Lodge übernachteten, um das einzige "Baumhotel" an der Küste besser kennenzulernen.

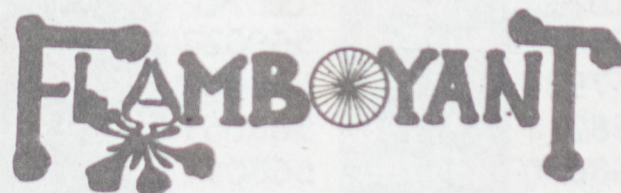

"Malindi Council Unanimously Objected To These Allocations (Of Reclaimed Land)" Says Mr Karume

The sea is likely to come back and any development on the reclaimed land in question would stand the risk of being submerged.

Said Mr. Karume 'I hope this council resolution has by now been sent to the relevant bodies of government'.

Continuing he said 'it is at that point that I brought the matter to MCTA because of the gravity of the situation'.

'Immediately a sub-committee of six people comprising hoteliers and plot owners was formed.

'After making representations to the District Commissioner, District Officer (the PC, he said, was not there at that time) we decided with the full support of MCTA to visit Nairobi to present a memorandum to the Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Tourism, with a copy to the Chief of the Civil Service.

'Afterwards, we called a press conference to brief the media about the situation'.

Said Mr. Karume 'Knowing that tourism is the Number One earner of Kenya's foreign exchange we expected an immediate reaction.

'However, that is not happening so felt that as it might be difficult to obtain an audience with the President we write an 'Open Letter'

to him instead pleading for the cancellation of the allocation which would adversely affect Malindi Sea View Lodge; African Pearl, Vasco da Gama Lodge; Indian Ocean (coming up) Lady Cheetah, Bougan Village, Palm Tree Club, Tamani Jua Cottages, African Dream Cottages, Malindi Casino, Eden Roc Hotel, Club 28, Lawford's, Blue Marlin and many others besides residential premises'.

He went on 'it has come to my notice that one of the allottees may have sold his plot just in front of Eden Roc Hotel to an Italian who has presented building plans for forty apartments there.

"AWARENESS"

'It, therefore, appears that land allocated is already changing hands. However' said Mr. Karume 'the drawing plans submitted to the council had been shelved and had not yet been deliberated upon'.

Adding 'however, it all indicates that if we keep quiet we are going to have to cry over split milk within a very short time'.

Consequently, we tried to create a public awareness of what is taking place.

He referred to the Bellhouse Gardens issue where after an

objection had been raised the developer worked day and night with many people to defeat any possible revocation.

'Malindi relies heavily on tourism' declared Mr. Karume 'and we fear that if this development goes ahead tourists will no longer come here as they will not want to see buildings in front of their hotels'.

The MCTA committee meeting took place on July 9. Mr. Karume mentioned that 'up to that time there had been no response, nor acknowledgement from anyone'.

The MCTA's Second Deputy Chairman, Mr. N. Balala, reported on the 'Seventh Tourism Workshop' held at Masinga Dam Lodge which he had attended.

Among the resolutions passed was one 'strongly recommending that the beach plots recently created by silt at Malindi should not be allocated to private developers, but be retained for the benefit of the general public.

In addition, the natural forest recently grown therein should be protected and the former DO's office retained as a museum'.

The Domestic Tourism Council also endorsed the creation of a Tourism Board both locally and internationally and welcomed government initiative in formulating a Master Plan.

"REASONABLE"

It also recommended that qualified and competent professionals be retained in the Department of Tourism for reasonable periods as the department plays an important role in the marketing and promotion of tourism.

It also resolved that MCTA in consultation with other related organisations, formulate a Coast Tourism Action Plan to present to government for immediate action and that the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife overseas its implementation.

Cosmopolitans Aim For New Club House

COSMOPOLITANS SC, former Dar-es-Salaam soccer "Giants" are planning to organise fund-raising strategies for construction of a modern block for the club.

Club Treasurer Paul Ntwina said a number of donors had shown interest to help the club build a modern complex.

He said they planned to organise a fund-raising dinner during which several items would be auctioned.

Five years ago the building had been estimated at 18m but this is bound to jump as much as three times or more given the rate of inflation.

Cosmopolitan is one of the oldest football clubs in the country. Currently, the club is in the third division fighting to regain its status as a first division club, which it lost several years ago.

Meanwhile, the Zanzibar Football Association (ZFA) intends to register to the world's soccer body (FIFA), one of the Daily Newspapers reported yesterday.

The paper quoted reliable sources which said the move to seek registration to FIFA as an

independent country would enable ZFA to get all facilities from FIFA including attending its various meetings.

However, the reliable sources said that plans are at the final stage of ZFA to register the body to the Africa Football Confederation (AFC) and later lodge its applications to FIFA.

Sources hinted that ZFA in its application will ask FIFA to give them the same facilities like that

of the United Kingdom (UK) where three countries Scotland, Wales and England all under the UK but each has its own association to FIFA.

Tanzania at present is being represented to the FIFA and AFC meetings by the football association of Tanzania (FAT).

The Lighter Side Of The Law - When The Judge Went To Sleep Listening To Court

FROM TALKING TO a lot of my friends recently it would seem that most of them think that judges tend to be gruff and occasionally arrogant.

This reputation tends to make people not want to appear in court and would then do anything to avoid it.

The learned friends seem to know how to deal with the moods of "your Honour" and when one watches the proceedings in a court one is reminded of a theatrical performance where apart from the legal bonds, everyone else is a spectator and occasionally there is some amount of audience participation.

I refer to judges because of a story Kachumbari told me recently.

On a fine summer day, a man's car developed a mechanical problem.

The problem was such that the car could not be removed from the road completely.

He did what was required by law and laid out the warning triangle and in his case he went one stage further and also put an amber flashing light.

He then started to peer under the bonnet to see whether he could find out what was wrong with the car.

He could not do so quickly so he went to the nearest roadside emergency telephone and called the AA.

While he was doing this, the driver of another car who was badly situated in his lane and could not see the warning triangles lost control of the car while trying to stop and razed the warning triangles in the process.

The driver of the car following behind him did not react fast enough either and rammed into this car causing it to in turn alter the appearance of the rear end of the broken down car.

When he got back, the police were already there and were taking details.

There were some complications in terms of interpretation of certain aspects of the law applicable to

this crash and none of the drivers would let the cops have the final say.

They decided it would be best to go to court and get a learned opinion.

They each engaged their own counsel and on the appointed day they attended court.

As it was a hot summer day and the court building was designed to conserve heat rather than allow a

cooling draft, the inside of the building became oppressively hot as the day progressed.

The judges who had been appointed to arbitrate in the case got so bored with proceedings and started to nod off.

They were possibly simultaneously asleep in the courtroom.

At one council meeting, the mayor hit on what he thought was a brilliant idea.

He presented it and it was passed by the full council without any councillor opposing it.

The next time there was a crash, the works guys were there promptly and took the carcass of the vehicle involved away.

They also got some details about the crash from the police.

After collecting a few crash

vehicles, the works people splashed them with paint as in abstract painting but preserved pride of place for a moot technical detail.

In the most prominent place, they put the speed of the car at the time of the crash as was best estimated by the police.

They took the carcasses and then planted them on the road next to where the crash had taken place.

Thus all who passed there would know exactly what speed caused the damage they could see.

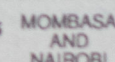
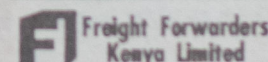
