Coast Polio Plus Committee Aim For Kilifi District

THE COAST POLIO Plus Committee of all the six Rotary Clubs at the coast is to launch an ambitious programmes to assist in the eradication of six vaccine preventable diseases in the Kilifi District.

To achieve this in collaboration with the KEPI management team and the Kilifi District Health officials the Rotarians have organized a seminar this Sunday July 26 at the African Dream Village in Malindi.

Some 100-120 vaccinators from

the 42 health facilities in Kilifi District who provide immunization services will attend this seminar along with other Rotarians and invited dignitaries.

The seminar will update the vaccinators on The Kenya Expanded Programmes of Immunization, The Vaccine Preventable Diseases, The Cold Chain System, Immunization schedules, policies and techniques and will also impart knowledge on the forthcoming immunization days scheduled for August 23 1992, September 20 1992, October 18 1992 and November 15 1992 when immunization will be carried out in all the 42 health facilities in the Kiliff District where Rotarian and other volunteers will go and assist the vaccinators in providing immunization to babies.

International Immunization

At present the immunization coverage in Kiliff District is 52 percent and this exercise will probably raise it to over 70 percent and it is estimated that about 20-25,000 babies will benefit from this exercise.

This programme has been launched by the Rotary International as 'Polio Plus Programmes' and it aims at eradicating polio from the face of the earth as was small pox eradicated.

HEALTH TIPS

Living With STRESS At The Workplace

THE LIVES OF most adults are built around their work, so much so that their emotional and physical wellbeing are alarmingly dependent on factors that happen there.

A branch of medicine called health occupational concerns itself with making the workplace physically healthier but what is relatively new is the emphasis of making work psychologically satisfying as

When we consider that more than half of the time awake, and at least two thirds of the average lifespan of most adults is spent at work, the reason for so much research into the workplace becomes obvious.

One area of particular interest is that concerning work stress, which in turn may affect the productivity of employees.

In general too much work stress tends to be overwhelming and too little makes work monotonous and boring.

It is important though to realize that we all need a certain amount of stress to make a job challenging and exciting.

The word stress has meanings. various Engineers use it to designate a force which if increased beyond a certain point, will deform the structure to which it is applied.

When we use the word psychologically, we may apply it either to a particular situation or the individuals reaction to it.

Thus travelling in the rush hour is a stress situation for many people, and the person who suffers from being subjected to the crowding and discomfort of that hour is referred to as 'being stressed' or showing a 'stress reaction'.

In its simplest usage stress refers to a state of affairs in which an individual is subjected to a stimulus (or stressor) from the environment which he does not like, or which is against his will.

If a man is subjected for long periods to enough of such painful stimuli he will show signs of being 'under

In this sense stress is the reaction of the person and

stressors are the painful stimuli.

A very common cause of stress is being compelled to work for a boss who is inconsiderate or unpleasant. but from whom it may be impossible to get away if no other job is available.

Whether a stimulus is stressful or not will depend not only on its intensity and duration of application but also on how sensitive and susceptible the individually to such a stressor.

In other words how serious the person perceives the threat to be determines how much he suffers.

Hence what contribute to stress in some people may not be as stressful to others.

Coping mechanisms (mentioned in earlier article) play a large partin modifying the stress, which is beneficial, but sometimes

they hide the extent of the stress from the subject himself.

One might imagine that any individual suffering from stress would easily understand his own reaction and take remedial action. However, this is not the case.

Many people are quite unaware of how seriously stressed they are.

For example, if a man cannot leave a stressful job due to circumstances, may actually manage to convince himself that things are not so bad after all.


He will fail to recognise the body and emotional symptoms that will therefore develop due to the stress.

The reaction we call work stress is actually a combination of emotional and body responses to stressors or threats. Anxiety, frustration and hostility may occur.

Body arousal similar to that described in the article on anxiety tends to be the norm as the body prepares to fight or flee from the perceived stressor.

Often however, the body can do neither and as the tension builds up over time it produces consequences which shall be discussed in the next few articles.





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MASONS OPEN UP DOORS TO **PUBLIC**

FREEMASONS THROUGHOUT the world are this month celebrating their 275th Anniversary

As a contribution to this festival. coastal Freemasons decided to hold an open-day on Sunday July 19 and admit non-Freemasons into their 'holy of holies', their temple situated on Nyerere Avenue Mombasa, where all Masonic ceremonies take place.

Representatives of all four of the Craft Lodges and the two chapters who regularly meet there were on hand to explain to the many members of the public, of all races, who visited them, what Freemasonry was all about.

Care was taken to explain the three basic principles on which the Masonic movement is founded -Brother Love, Relief (Charity), and the pursuit of Truth.

It was further explained that Freemasonry was not a secret society, but a society with certain secrets, and that these secrets merely involved the words and signs used to identify Freemasons with one another and the degree in Freemasonry that the particular Freemason had achieved

Stress was made on the charitable nature of Freemasonry that funds were donated and collected only from Freemasons themselves, and not from the general public, but their charitable bequests, which run to millions of pounds Sterling annually, are made to both Masonic and non-Masonic institutions throughout the world.

Visitors were also informed that the Freemason Lodges comprised all races and religions, that no political affiliation were permitted. andin fact both politics and religion were subjects forbidden to be discussed by Freemasons who take a solemn vow to uphold and support the Government and the laws of any country in which their Masonic Lodge is situated.

After a short talk which covered the generalities as above, a guided tour of the temple was conducted and the various furnishings of Lodges and their symbolic meanings were explained.

Lively discussions followed and many interesting questions raised by visitors were answered by a panel of senior ranking Freemasons who attended for that

It is hoped that this event will take place annually in order to dispel some fears still held by the public that Freemasonry is a Secret Society, and not a society which like any other institution, have their little but quite innocent secrets

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"Despite The Set-Backs, Kenya Is More Democratic Today Than Six Months Ago" Says Top U.S. Official

WASHINGTON - "U.S. policy in Africa is designed to promote maximum African participation in the political and economic lives of their countries," it has been observed by Herman Cohen, assistant secretary of state for African Affairs.

Speaking before the House Africa subcommittee, Cohen said that the United States supports fair, equitable and open systems, and "like Africans, believe that these are the keys to sustainable democracy, development and progress.

Cohen noted that three-quarters of all sub-Saharan countries are now involved in a democratization process and nearly 30 have launched economic reform programs supported by the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund.

The assistant secretary addressed specific concerns about U.S. policy which he said was designed to promote maximum African participation in the political and economic lives of their countries.

"We support fair, equitable, and open systems as we, like Africans, believe that these are the keys to development and progress.

"We are responding to African demands for better and fairer political and economic programs multiple centers of power, open participation, transparency in government, structures which allow free and fair elections, freedom of the press and respect for civil and political rights.

"Today three quarters of sub-

"Almost thirty African governments have launched economic reform programs supported by the IMF and World

"The United States strongly supports this fundamental shift and believes it is fully compatible with and complementary to moves

"Moreover, the government has agreed that Commonwealth observers can monitor the elections, and in recent months it has released key opponents from

most disquieting "The development, however has been the recent ethnic violence in Western Kenya. It has claimed hundreds of lives, left thousands homeless and displaced over 100,000 persons.

"Many observers, including church leaders, believe the

democratic and open society, the key to this is free and fair elections.

"We are urging the government to hold such elections soon and to accept widespread monitoring by international and domestic election observers.

"This can best ensure the election outcome is fully democratic and credible.

"In November 1991, to underscore our concern about the need for political and economic reform in Kenya, we decided, with other donors, to withhold fastdisbursing assistance to Kenya.

"The United States withheld \$28 million of its planned FY 92 economic development to Kenya. Progress remains too modest, and the setbacks too profound, to warrant releasing these funds at this time.

"Significant additional progress is required, we are, however. prepared to provide, in concert with the other donors, election assistance to help Kenya hold genuinely free and fair elections.

"We are urging the government to create a climate conducive to truly free and fair elections.

"This includes announcing a firm election date, thus eliminating a key element of uncertainty; it also means creating a level playing field by stopping harassment of the opposition and ending the ethnic violence.

"The government should also move to ensure that the election commission has the confidence of a broad spectrum of Kenyan

"The recent appointment of new commission members who enjoy widespread respect is a step in the right direction, which should be continued.

"We are also urging the government and opposition alike to move beyond the rhetoric of confrontation to embrace dialogue. thus ensuring a successful substantive transition to democracy.

"In this regard, we believe the opposition call to boycott voter registration is ill-advised. There are irregularities in the registration, and the government should extend the registration period beyond one month, which is insufficient to get the job done.

"But it is still unclear whether the irregularities are a deliberate attempt at fraud or the result of

"Six editors and journalists currently face sedition charges, and last March, the police brutally clubbed and tear-gassed peaceful protesters in Nairobi, including mothers protesting the detention of their sons.

However, judging by the reaction by many interested parties, too much blame is being attributed to the meteorological drought and insufficient blame on the lack of necessary framework to meet the "one in 16 year event".

Growing population and greater economic expectations are attempting to extract more from our natural climate and rainfall variations than is available.

It is these social pressures that need more attention in order to cope with severe droughts which are characteristic of our summer rainfall regime."

Across Southern and Eastern Africa, the drought is being blamed for shortages that could have been avoided with appropriate planning and management.

In Zimbabwe and Kenya, maize

stores that were reserved for such emergencies were sold off before the drought struck.

Power and water shortages would have been less severe with proper environmental planning of dams, better maintenance of distribution systems, more efficient use of water and energy resources, implementation of appropriate alternatives, better management and pricing policies and less corruption.



"Unless there is widespread registration, many abuses will go undocumented, making it difficult to determine whether there is truly a systematic attempt at fraud.

"And Kenyans who fail to register will lose any say in the choice of Kenya's leaders in the event of free and fair elections.

"The government, for its part, should move promptly to address effectively the complaints about the fairness of the registration process and the composition of the election commission.

"Besides these political issues, I must mention two other matters that demand attention.

*One is the drought that is afflicting Kenya. The U.N. estimates that almost one million Kenyans will require food assistance due to drought.

"In the worst hit areas of the northeast, malnutrition rates among children under five are as high as 72 percent-with 28 percent of those categorized as acutely

*These shocking statistics parallel conditions in some parts of war-torn Somalia

The international community is now mobilizing assistance. The U.S. government has committed \$700,000 in disaster assistance funds to move food by air and road.

"We are working on providing 6,000 MT of blended foods, worth over \$3.4 million, as soon as possible

"We will continue to work with other donors and seek additional resources for food and non-food relief for those suffering from the

"Before ending my comments on Kenya, I must underscore our concern about the influx of refugees from Somalia, Ethiopia, and Sudan.

"In less than a year, the number of refugees in Kenya has soared from under 50,000 to over 300,000.

"To its credit, Kenya, previously a reluctant host of refugees, has generously accepted the recent inflows and is cooperating well with international relief organizations.

"But it cannot cope by itself with the burden. In response the crisis, we have given \$8.5 million to the UNHCR's Emergency Appeal for Kenya.

"We have also provided funds to NGOs such as CARE and the International Rescue Committee to work with the UNHCR in assisting refugees in Kenya.




"What we are and what we are growing into is more important than how old we are, thus we need to be anchored to the rock that is unchanging and eternal."

ALTHOUGH KENYA'S FISH production had risen to close on 195,700 metric tons by 1988, the volume of fish caught along the coast has remained static at around 10,000 metric tons for the past decade.

Commercial fishing still provides a reasonable livelihood for a substantial number or families living along Kenya's Indian Ocean shores but many boat owners today have switched to catering for the more lucrative tourist trade, or combine their traditional occupation with taking tourists on boat trips.

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
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Many More Overseas Tour Operators Joining M.A.C.T.A.

THE MOMBASA AND Coast Tourist Association is growing in strength with many overseas tour operators now joining. This was observed after twenty four tour operators had met informally to hear more about the association and how it helps maintain and uplift standards in the tourist industry at

The 24 operators handle 400,000 tourists a year and it was noted that over 60 per cent of the tourists visiting Kenya stay at the coast.

Inviting them for this get-together was Ernst Hoffmann who represents overseas tour operators on the MCTA committee.

He is the Resident Manager of Touristic Union International one of the foremost tour operators in Europe who received enthusiastic assistance in organising it from Andre Janssens, Resident Manager, Neckermann - one of the largest tour operators in

At a recent MCTA committee meeting at the Oceanic Hotel, Mr. Hoffmann reported that as a result of this meeting with tour operators many had joined MCTA and it was proposed that a sub-committee of the association be formed under his chairmanship.

Said Mr. Hoffmann 'I have represented overseas tour operators on this committee for many years and felt I could do this more successfully if I had their mandate. Our common problems can then be cancelled through

He said that those attending were tour operators from the UK, Germany, Switzerland, Belgium, France, Italy and Holland.

After briefing them fully about MCTA, Mr. Hoffmann said they had discussed a number of matters including security and adverse publicity about Kenya in the overseas press.

In many cases this is being blown up out of all proportion while steps the government are taking to improve security were omitted.

Such publicity had resulted in many tourists deciding to go elsewhere for a holiday.

He told the MCTA committee 'it was considered there is a definite need for more security in the town and along the coast, and a need for a more efficient service from the

He said 'It is not only protection the police are supposed to provide but also the administrative side in attending to tourists when they call at police stations'.

He said 'they are received nicely in some, while others are not very friendly

It was also necessary to have police stations better equipped to deal with any incidents that may

Often he said, when incidents occur the police have no means of transport to visit the scene. Either they have no vehicle, or it is not available, or there is no petrol.

Said Mr. Hoffmann that is what we mean when we say 'not well

With the world much more environmental conscious tour

operators felt there was need for more positive action on environmental problems at the coast, such as keeping the beaches clean and not putting sewage into the sea.

While appreciating that such things take time, it was felt that hoteliers should start making plans to protect the environment.

He went on 'hoteliers in the private

sector have tackled problems over water and power by having their own boreholes and generators. It had been a costly exercise.

But he pointed out 'the future of tourism is not healthy when you hear that only about 50 per cent of the demand for water can be met

'Work on bringing more water to the area should be speeded up and new sources sought to meet the ever increasing demand with an increasing number of hotels and houses being built'.

Tour operators also discussed charges being made by doctors visiting tourists in their hotels.

It was felt that some were overcharging, but so far had been unable to ascertain if any standard fees are laid down.

The declining standard of service by Kenya Railways in its restaurant cars was also discussed which included cleanliness of waiters'

It was hoped that KR would give this speedy attention so that tourists will have no further complaints.

It was proposed that a subcommittee of overseas tour comprising operators representatives from all companies bringing tourists here be formed and that meetings be held every second or third month.

Asked about tourism trends by the Acting Chairman Rahab Mwendwa (MCTA's First Deputy Chairman) Mr. Hoffmann said that as far as the summer season is concerned bookings from Germany and Switzerland do not look very promising.

Adding we are all struggling to keep our charters operating'.

He said I do not know the exact figures but if I said that bookings are down by say 25 per cent I would not be exaggerating'.

As far as the winter season is concerned it is too early to predict.

Said Mr. Hoffmann 'we hope that the situation will improve and that potential tourists will have the confidence to come to Kenya'.

He said that the downfall in tourists had been put down to recession in Europe

However, said Mr. Hoffmann 'I cannot underline that because as far as Germany is concerned other destinations are doing well'

He revealed that Germany is expecting a recession next year.

Adding 'one thing is certain and that is generally speaking tourism out of Central Europe, or even Britain, is not bad.

'Butas far as Kenyais concerned and I can only speak for the German market, we are not happy

Said Shafket Pervaiz, KATO's representative on the MCTA committee 'the British market has picked up slightly and aircraft are arriving full, but many are coming on cheap holiday packages.

Your Car Jack Is An Essential Piece Of Equipment - As Any Driver Who Has Been Caught Without One Knows

KACHUMBARI RECENTLY SPENT some time on the road interviewing drivers in Mombasa, Nairobi, Nakuru and

He also spent a few days in some smaller towns.

His mission was to find out how much people really know about their cars and whether they are capable of repairing simple defects.

In the process he also found out some interesting statistics about car owners. Let us look at the glaring ones first.

The first thing he asked each driver he interviewed was for him to produce the cars jack.

This is an essential piece of equipment as any driver who has been caught without one

It transpired from the population sampled that about 20 per cent of the drivers do not carry lacks in their cars.

The percentage was higher in towns than it was in the country

Those who did not have jacks were asked what they would do if they had a puncture and the

immediate answer was they would flag down the next car and ask to borrow their jack.

This suggests that Kenyan drivers are such gregarious characters that one fifth of the population of drivers go around without jacks on the premise that someone will have enough time to stop, lend them a jack and wait while they change a tyrel

A lot of people have experienced differently. It is not often that one pulls up when stopped by a seemingly stranded motorist at the

There have been too many well publicised muggings for people to risk stopping for a total stranger...yet there are obviously some who would still

The second question after the jack was whether the driver had any tools in the car.

Over 80 per cent of the drivers questioned had no other tools apart from the jack and the wheel

Some of the owners were not even aware that the cars they were driving were provided with a basic set of tools when they were first registered.

When asked what they would do in case their car stopped for no immediately apparent reason, the most common answer was that the driver would go to the nearest village or town and look for a jua kali mechanic to come and sort his car out.

This answer was also quite common among non matatu

Most of us are aware that looking after matatus is the mainstay of the out of town jua kali guys

Obviously the average Kenyan motorist has great faith in the jua kali mechanic.

The faith is probably well placed. Engine types in most models of car sold in Kenya have not really changed for quite a long time.

through Serving apprenticeship with the old master ensures that most jua kall mechanics are reasonably

competent to carry out roadside repairs. The worrying thing is that the

newer models of car are fitted with increasingly complex engines. The number of valves per

cylinder is increasing, electronic fuel injection is becoming a norm and engine management systems are cascading down the range.

Will the jua kali mechanic be able to cope with this?

One hopes so especially since during the survey another interesting statistic transpired.

Over 40 percent of the car owners interviewed had no handbooks in their cars.

This seems to suggest that they are not really interested in what goes on in the car so long as it gets them from one place to another.

The other questions asked were based on the owners knowledge of his car and the scores were abysmally low.

It was not unexpected. Where does this leave the motoring public? I would say at the mercy of the mechanic.

The more enlightened motorist joins the AA of Kenyaand hopes

that with their certification scheme and network of garages, help is never too far.

If one is near the major towns no problem, but in the less travelled areas one would have a problem.

Kachumbari has a proposal for the AA.

The jua kall mechanic is here to stay. The development of the informal sector is part of national policy and should be supported.

Perhaps it is time that a responsible motoring organisation set up an accreditation scheme for the jua kall mechanic whereby they would formally be tested on their understanding of the car and what to do with it should it develop a problem.

(Their scrupies should also be included in the accreditation process!!)

This would mean a spread in facilities available to the motorist in this large country without necessarily investing in a large privately owned national network that would be horrendously expensive to maintain.

As Kachumbari says, motoring organisations need to spread their wings!!



Let me assure them that I am happy with the friendly cricket played at MSC both as a player and administrator. MSC last year played 45 Saturday games.






