RECESSION HURTS TOURISM FROM EUROPE AS 'KENYA AIRWAYS' LAUNCH NEW FLIGHT

Sub-Saharan Association Of International Schools Meeting Up In Mombasa

ONE HUNDRED delegates from the Association of International Schools in Africa - a professional body representing around 75 schools in sub-Saharan Africa met together at Mombasa Inter-Continental Resort for a two day Administrators' Conference.

Itwas presided by a reception on the hotel's Pool Terrace where they were officially welcomed by Dr. Robert Ambrogi, Senior Staff Member, International Schools Service, New Jersey, USA, and had the opportunity of meeting the Aisa President, Tom Hunt from Libreville, Gabon.

Among them were many Americans and dropping in to say 'Hi' was Brigadier General Frank Libutti, Commander of the US Joint Task Force Provide Relief which since August 21 has been flying famine relief to four drought stricken areas in Somalia and northern Kenya.

He invited them, if they could find time, to come and see their operation at Moi International Airport.

He also mentioned that the hotel was providing a 24 hour catering service there which was greatly appreciated by the troops.





Johannesburg-Mombasa commencing Monday, October 26 with an Airbus they have wetlased.

Meanwhile, the tourism industry is calling for more aggressive marketing campaigns at the World Travel Market and in Australia, New Zealand, Middle and Far East countries.

In addition, the industry is now bent on creating a new image for Kenyabased on recommendations from the very successful Eco-Tourism Workshop at Nakuru with tourists, as well as residents, benefiting from a much improved and less polluted environment.

In the promotion of Kenya as an Eco-Tourism destination it is proposed that hoteliers and tour operators and others who meet the standards laid down will stand to benefit under a Green Certification scheme as being environmentally acceptable.

The four-day Eco-Tourism Workshop entitled 'Ecotourism and Sustainable Development' was organised by Wildlife Services International in co-operation with the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife, Kenya Wildlife Service; Kenya Association of Tour Operators and African Centre for Technical Studies

Such has been the impact of its resolutions on the tourism industry at the coast that MCTA, KATO and KAHC are organising an Eco-Tourism Conference, its theme being 'A New Image for Kenya' at Severin Sea Lodge on October 28 commencing 2.45 pm.

The Minister for Tourism and Wildlife, Mr. Noah Katana Ngala, will be guest of honour, and senior government officials, as well as those connected with the tourism industry are being invited to participate.

It is an opportunity for those at the coast to understand more clearly what 'Eco-Tourism' is all about and to form a pressure group of 'decision makers' to act upon resolutions passed.

Speakers will include David Western, President Eco-Tourism Society, who works with Wildlife Conservation International, Nairobi, his subject being 'Eco-Tourism - the Kenya Challenge'; Steve Shelley, Director of Price Waterhouse (Tourism) on 'Marketing and Promotion of Eco-Tourism'; Dr. C. Gakahu, Conservation Biologistwith Wildlife Conservation International, who will explain resolutions from the Eco-Tourism Workshop at Nakuru.

Local speakers will include Karl-Heinz Straus, chairman of KATO's Coast sub-committee on 'The Commitment to the Environment by Local Tour Operators', while Andre Janssens will speak on the 'Role of Overseas Tour Operators towards Eco-Tourism'.

Beat Koch, Deputy Chairman, KAHC, Coast, will address the gathering on 'The Role of the Hotel Operation on the Environment'.

The main aim of this conference is to create a general awareness of what was discussed at Nakuru and to join the Eco-Tourism Society of Kenya when it is formed.

Reference was made at the MCTA meeting to the delegation of European tour operators led by Martin Brackenbury, President of the International Federation of Tour Operators, who were in Kenya recently to discuss issues of common interest with leaders in the tourist industry and government officials, the main areas of concern being harassment of tourists by beach boys and general hygiene in hotels.

Mr. Brackenbury is quoted as

saying that 'negative publicity in the overseas media had seriously dented Kenya's image. He predicted that the number of tourists coming to Kenya would drop significantly next year because of adverse publicity and other factors unless quickly addressed'.

PROFESSOR CARTWRIGHT

One of the outcomes is that Professor Cartwright, a Thomson's Medical Advisor has been invited to come and do tests and research on water systems.

His report is eagerly awaited by the industry which will act accordingly.

Meanwhile, the tourist industry at the coast was overjoyed to hear that aloan of US Dollars 200 million to finance the second Mzima Pipeline to Mombasa had been negotiated, while another loan will finance the rehabilitation of existing works to provide a temporary solution to the recurring water shortage at the coast.

The Mombasa Water Pipeline Board is also being revived to oversee the implementation of water projects in the Coast Province.
