Salvage Tugs Rescue Stricken Freighter Off The Nyali Coral Reef

THE MURRI International salvage tug Bison 1 has successfully completed the salvage operations of the III fated reefer Khalaf, which ran aground on the Leven Reef on Sunday November 8.

The ship's heavy fuel was taken off between Friday and Sunday in preparation for the re float attempt.

This helped ease the weight, which was towards the aft and mid ships of the vessel, and as much ship-borne equipment was moved forward thus further reducing the aft trim.

Naturally the ballasting/ deballasting of necessary double bottoms was also undertaken.

There is of course an enormous amount of calculations regarding trim and stability data to be worked out, more so in the case of the Khalaf which had been lengthened at one stage and no date whatsoever was available regarding the lengthening.

The Bison 1 stood by awaiting the optimum spring tide of Tuesday morning and during the course of the in coming tide gradually took the strain.

"KANU And The Opposition Parties Must Eschew Violence And Agree To Accept The Verdict Of The People If It Is Rendered Fairly And Freely"

HIGHLIGHTS from a speech by Smith Hempstone, American Ambassador to Kenya, to the Bahari Rotary Club of Mombasa, at the Nyali Beach Hotel.

THIS IS A historic moment in Kenya's history.

A moment of great turmoil:

turmoil that I hope will make the birth of man's greatest gift to himself, democracy.

The signs are, I believe propitious, although it will require the good will of many to make of this promise a reality.

The election that will be held

five weeks from now, on December 29, may not be totally unblemished. Indeed, it would be surprising if it were.

But we can all work and hope for an election that is reasonably free, fair and representative.

Rome may not have been built in a day, but a start can be made. And there can be no turning back from freedom's road.

Democracy has to be won anew every day, and I have great confidence that the coming generation of Kenyans will build a better Kenya on the foundations of the election of December 29.

KENYA still has to learn that one's political opponents need not become one's enemies, that peaceful dissent should not be equated with sedition, that all Kenyans are God's children and that each is placed upon this earth to serve a purpose higher

And I hope that on December 29 every Kenyan will remember that his right to clench his fist ends at his neighbour's nose.

The Coast can, and I hope will, set an example in this regard.

THE GOVERNMENT of Kenya and the ruling Kenya African National Union have a great opportunity for service in the next five weeks.

They will bring honor to themselves and earn the gratitude of generations of Kenyans yet unborn if they use the five weeks remaining to them to create the conditions for an election of which Kenya and Africa can be proud.

An election that affords an equal opportunity for every

Kenyan to vote accordance to his conscience, an election free of intimidation, deceit and rigging.

While the playing field is still not level, there are signs that the government and KANU understand that the world is watching, that history will be their judge.

The obligation on the government and on KANU is the greater because they have more money and power at their

But the opposition parties, too, have a responsibility.

They and KANU must eschew violence and agree to accept the verdict of the people if it is rendered fairly and freely.

I have faith in the people of Kenya. I have faith in their maturity, decency and sense of Kenya can set an example for

all of Africa by holding an election that is free and fair.

If Kenya is to maintain its political stability and regain its

Let each of us do what he can to see to it that December 29 ushers in a new dawn of justice, progress and reconciliation. "It can be done, it must be done"

HEALTH TIPS

Keep Off Drugs Once You Have Dried Out!

YOU ONLY need to see a heroin addict going through withdrawal to understand the agony of drug abuse.

Within six hours of stopping the drug he becomes restless and anxious, starts craving for another 'fix' of heroin and develops a host of symptoms including sleeplessness, tears, runny nose, yawning, abdominal vomiting, cramps, diarrhoea, muscle aches and pains. These last two to four days.

Addicts half crazed by these symptoms may roam the street looking for heroin, or the money to purchase it, sometimes turning to crime for this purpose.

The withdrawal phase is unpleasant and feared by addicts, but it is rarely fatal.

Though it can be made less painful by medication, some countries like Indonesia and certain drug centres let addicts feel the brunt of the experience to discourage them going back on heroin, the so called 'cold turkey' method.

I think this is rather extreme and not having seen research that supports this method, would not recommend it in our setting.

According to Western statistics the death rate of male heroin addicts is 20 times that of the rest of the society and females five times

And this is growing with the rise in the number of heroin addicts who have

This makes heroin addiction an ominous

As always, it is best not to get involved in drugs in the first place. But if you are an addictaiready you need help.

For some reason too few heroin addicts are willing to let others know their problem and even fewer approach helpful agencies for treatment.

As 'cold turkey' is too unpleasant the assistance of a doctor familiar with these

problems is needed to help get the drug out of the system.

The hardest part comes

Keeping off the drug once you have been dried out.

The same old friends (usually addicts themselves), the environment and emotional pressures comes back to haunt addicts and tempt them to get back on heroin.

It is thus advisable that a former addict move to an entirely new environment and Join a group that encourages him to keep off heroin such as Narcotics Anonymous in Malindi and Mombasa.

AUDITIONS FOR Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoatwere held some time in May or early June this year: as always with major musicals, the directors had a difficult task in finding suitable talent for the leading roles.

Jaqui Freeman was an obvious choice for the "Narrator" - but would she be available when the production finally took off?

Apart from the "Narrator", someone was needed to take the role of "Mrs. Potiphar."

The male roles were far more difficult to cast: apart from "Joseph" himself, there are five other main roles to fill, and at least 11 more men are required for Joseph's brothers.

During early rehearsals, the directors were very uncertain whether "Joseph" would ever really take the stage: some of the chorus were present one week, and not the next; several

intending actors dropped by the wayside as the weeks progressed....it was quite a nightmare for all concerned.

Came the technical and dress rehearsals: the set was still to be completed; the synchronisation of the cordless microphones caused a major headache; fuses were blowing noisily in the orchestra pit, and though not actually spoken, many must have wondered:

"Will it really be all right on the night?"

Typically, the audience appeared to have the same doubts initially. On curtain up, there was not quite the normal

spontaneous applause that has greeted other L.T.C. shows.

Nevertheless, the opening number by Jaqui Freeman quickly set the mood: Jaqui is stunningly dressed in black for the first act and later dons a pair of white slacks for the latter half.

She gives a superb performance throughout - a magnificent display by the talented professional that she is, and her gentle encouragement of the other leading characters and of the chorus as well - a quiet smile here, a subtle move of her hand there, generates confidence in

the entire cast, resulting in a truly magnificent evening's entertainment.

Several numbers bring the house down in thunderous applause: the gentle over-acted dance of "Mr. Potiphar" (Dominique Schep) and his evil missus (an outstanding performance by Pauline Groom - what a talented all-round lady she is!); the fantastic take-off of "Elvis the Pelvis" by Rob Cork are but a couple of the highlights of the evening.

There are other aspects of the production which are excellent: Mr. Bhoja who has rapidly become L.T.C.'s "resident tailor" has surpassed himself in the design and colour of the costumes: quite apart from the quite spectacular multicoloured Dreamcoat.

"Joseph" (confidently played by Tony Armitage in his first major role on stage) is fully justified when he boasts "I'm a walking work of art" and the biblical Jacob would have been truly proud of his tailor!

Then too, the ladies' costumes in Potiphar's chambers, and later as Pharaoh's ladies in waiting are resplendent...

mention and generally the evening zips along from one jolly number to the next, the performers being ably led by the small orchestra which Philippe Zimmerlin had managed to assemble, and transcribe the score to suit the instruments available.

MESSAGE

Lest one be accused of being too starry-eyed about the performance, a couple of minor criticisms: "Joseph" was originally performed at St. Paul's Junior School in London, by children.

Sadly, no children appear on stage, presumably because they were busy elsewhere with their studies. Nevertheless, Jacob's family is somewhat incomplete in the absence of his grandchildren.

Secondly: in the number "Joseph's Dreams", although the Brothers are very scathing and threaten to do him in, one feels that they menace "from afar" - might not the message have been even more convincing if one or two of the Brothers had come up behind him as he sits alone, and mimed their intended actions prior to finally grabbing him and throwing him into the pit?

But in the overall exuberance of a thoroughly enjoyable production, these are but minor irritations, certainly not noticed by most of the audience.

All in all, "Joseph" is a very worthy finale to The Little Theatre Club's 40th Anniversary year, and matches up excellently to all the previous musicals and pantomimes that have been staged during the last four decades.

Hearty congratulations to the Directors, cast, backstage crew and all who have helped to make this the success it undoubtedly is!



Kenya Ports Authority Managing Director Philip Okundi Attends Top-Level Seminar In Kampala

THE KPA Managing Director Mr. Philip Okundi has assured Uganda exporters and importers that the Port of Mombasa will continue according efficient services to Uganda Cargo passing through the Port of Mombasa.

Mr. Okundi who was addressing a well attended Seminar for Uganda Shippers at the Uganda International Conference Centre in Kampala last week informed the Seminar participants that Uganda was the biggest user of the Port of Mombasa amongst the transit countries and accounts for 57 per cent of the total transit traffic through the Port of Mombasa annually.

Mr. Okundi further disclosed that Uganda traffic through the Port of Mombasa has registered a steady upsurge over the last five years. In 1991 the traffic registered 303,200 tonnes compared to 300,271 registered in 1990.

He added that this year Uganda traffic was likely to register an all time high tonnage since the first half of this year the traffic has already recorded 206,742 tonnes compared to 133,307 recorded over the corresponding period in

The seminar which was jointly hosted by Kenya Ports Authority Kenya Railways Corporation and Uganda Railways Corporation was attended by representatives of various organisations including exporters and importers, Uganda Clearing and Forwarding Agents, Uganda Revenue Authority, Bank



In addition, leaflets and booklets had been produced giving clients environmental information and advice.

He also showed on a screen TUI's Environmental Check List for 1992 covering hotels, clubs and holiday apartments in which their clients stay.

Declared Dr. Iwand 'Kenya had always been our most important long haul destination. Over the past two years bookings had been declining and it is now the Caribbean which is more popular'.

Adding 'I am trying to support Kenya, but in turn need your support by networking through communication about what you are doing and what is going on'.

He mentioned three hotels on the Kenya Coast which had taken steps to conserve and protect the environment. They were Robinson Club Baobab, Diani Reef Grand Hotel and Severin Sea Lodge.

He revealed that on hearing about the environmental policies of the latter, TUI had promoted these activities as a pioneer project of major interest to environment minded people in Germany.

Details of the hotel's policy had appeared in millions of brochures.

Declared Dr. Iwand 'according to these fine examples from the accommodation front, official tourism promotion bodies could only be advised to co-operate even more closely with tour operators so as to combine local and foreign know-how'.

He noted that eco-tourism is developing rapidly as a key issue in Kenya. There had been a seminar on Sustainable Coastal Tourism analysing quite precisely the environmental impact of tourism on the Kenya coast and offering solutions.

This year there had been two conferences on Eco-Tourism, one in Nakuru and the other at Mombasa.

'The outcome of the first, organised by Wildlife Conservation International had been really

Declared Dr Iwand 'environmentalists needallies such as these' and, amid prolonged applause, congratulated all concerned.

Seated among guests was Dr. Rene Haller completely stunned not only by such a long and glowing tribute but also by seeing himself, and his staff, atwork in the Bamburi Nature park on a film screened during the presentation ceremony.

Only recently a 45 minute film on Germany's most popular TV channel entitled 'Wasteland to Garden of Eden' was seen by millions of viewers in Germany.

Among those at the ceremony at Severin Sea Lodge was Mr. Peusi, the 'All Africa' correspondent for this German TV channel.

Also filming this event was a TV team from South Africa Broadcasting Corporation responsible for its 'Fifty-'Fifty' programme concerning the environment produced by Erald Felix.

They were in Kenya for ten days and Erald and his team had already visited and filmed the Bamburi Nature Trail.

The other producers from this broadcasting corporation were also in Kenya they producing programmes entitled 'Agenda' and 'News Line'.

Kenya's KBC was also covering the award ceremony.

Dr. Iwand mentioned that in twenty years Rene Haller had transformed a devastated quarry into a tropical paradise and had been honoured by the UN Environment Programme with its Global 500 Award.

He also noted that the President of Kenya had characterised, only recently, the Bamburi Nature Trail as a national institution and an outstanding example of the importance that nature and the environment enjoy in Kenya.

Last November, the University of Basle, Switzerland, honoured Rene by awarding him an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Natural Sciences.

Dr. Iwand mentioned that soon after his return to Germany he would be addressing a group of journalists especially interested in Eco-Tourismand telling them about this award and what Kenya is doing

remarkable in that from it had come a National Eco-Tourism Action Plan and the decision to form an Eco-Tourism Society of Kenya.

An Action Plan would as well be essential for the planning process of tour operators, especially those who produce large numbers'.

He noted, however, that Kenya has been a pioneer in wildlife conservation management dating back to 1898, and that KWS, established in 1990 with the backing of bi-lateral and multilateral donor financing, was doing very well.

It was charged with the responsibility of ensuring that our valuable wildlife heritage is preserved and protected for the benefit and enjoyment of all visitors both foreign and local.

Within a short period he said 'KWS managed to eliminate the poaching menace, and security of visitors in our national parks and reserves is now guaranteed".

Referring to the Eco-Tourism Workshop at Mombasa, at which he was present, Mr. Macharia said 'I felt very proud to see so many KAHC and KATO members signing their commitment to Eco-Tourism.







towed had to have an approved positive means of being hitched to the car The object would also need a bracket where the towing car's


number could be displayed for following vehicles. It would need to have reflectors and also a sign to say that it was

under tow.




