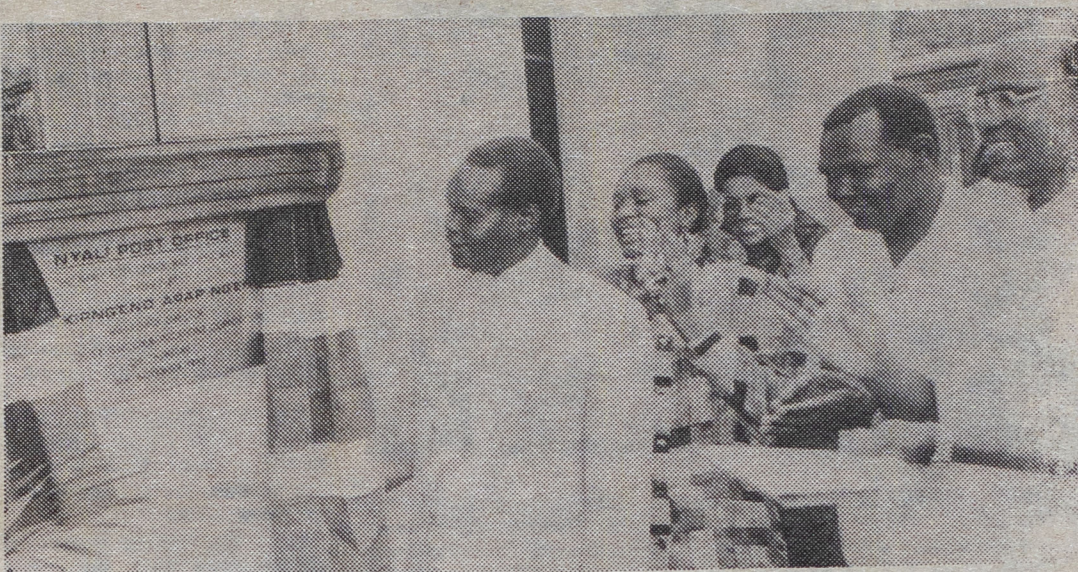
The ship's heavy fuel was taken off between Friday and Sunday in preparation for the float attempt.

MANAGING DIRECTOR KIPNG'ENO ARAP NGENY OPENS NEW EXCHANGE AT NYALI

THE KENYA Posts and Telecommunications Corporation will soon introduce a call-barring facility in its modern exchanges to prevent unauthorised callers from using subscribers sets.

This was said by the KP and TC Managing Director, Mr. Kipng'eno Arap Ng'eny recently while officially commissioning the Nyali Post Office and 6,000 line Digital Exchange.

Mr. Ng'eny said the new facility will also curb increasing complaints from the public about high telephone bills.

Mr. Ng'eny said the international community, particularly investors, had expressed confidence in the Kenya's economic potential.

He was accompanied by the corporation's General Manager, Telecommunications Service, Mr. Mark Omondi, the acting General Manager, Postal Services, Mr. Daniel Kiago, and Coast Regional Manager, Mr. Peter Mutuku.

Addressing workers and area residents, Mr. Ng'eny said the exchange is now the third biggest in Kenya after Kisumu and Nakuru.


He said KP and TC had invested KShs. 40 million in the project and appealed to the business community in the area to make maximum use of the facility.

"KANU And The Opposition Parties Must Eschew Violence And Agree To Accept The Verdict Of The People If It Is Rendered Fairly And Freely"

HIGHLIGHTS from a speech by Smith Hempstone, American Ambassador to Kenya, to the Bahari Rotary Club of Mombasa, at the Nyali Beach Hotel.

THIS IS A historic moment in Kenya's history.

A moment of great turmoil:

turmoil that I hope will make the birth of man's greatest gift to himself, democracy.

The signs are, I believe propitious, although it will require the good will of many to make of this promise a reality.

The election that will be held

five weeks from now, on December 29, may not be totally unblemished. Indeed, it would be surprising if it were.

But we can all work and hope for an election that is reasonably free, fair and representative.

Rome may not have been built in a day, but a start can be made. And there can be no turning back from freedom's road.

Democracy has to be won anew every day, and I have great confidence that the coming generation of Kenyans will build a better Kenya on the foundations of the election of December 29.

KENYA still has to learn that one's political opponents need not become one's enemies, that peaceful dissent should not be equated with sedition, that all Kenyans are God's children and that each is placed upon this earth to serve a purpose higher than self.

And I hope that on December 29 every Kenyan will remember that his right to clench his fist ends at his neighbour's nose.

The Coast can, and I hope will, set an example in this regard.

THE GOVERNMENT of Kenya and the ruling Kenya African National Union have a great opportunity for service in the next five weeks.

They will bring honor to themselves and earn the gratitude of generations of Kenyans yet unborn if they use the five weeks remaining to them to create the conditions for an election of which Kenya and Africa can be proud.

An election that affords an equal opportunity for every

Kenyan to vote accordance to his conscience, an election free of intimidation, deceit and rigging.

While the playing field is still not level, there are signs that the government and KANU understand that the world is watching, that history will be their judge.

The obligation on the government and on KANU is the greater because they have more money and power at their disposal.

But the opposition parties, too, have a responsibility.

They and KANU must eschew violence and agree to accept the verdict of the people if it is rendered fairly and freely.

I have faith in the people of Kenya. I have faith in their maturity, decency and sense of fairness.

Kenya can set an example for all of Africa by holding an election that is free and fair.

If Kenya is to maintain its political stability and regain its

prosperity, there is no other way. Let each of us do what he can to see to it that December 29 ushers in a new dawn of justice, progress and reconciliation. "It can be done, it must be done".

IN CONCLUSION, then I salute the many good works of the Mombasa-Bahari Rotary Club. I commend you for your ideals of fellowship and service.

"You of many faiths and ethnic backgrounds have helped to make the Coast the tolerant, easy-going, generous place it is. You have set an example for all.

If the political leaders, warlords and gunmen of East Africa will only listen to your words and pay attention to your deeds, all will yet be well in this blessed corner of the planet earth we call Kenya.

Your fathers and your fathers' fathers - black, brown and white - made this land, I doubt not that you will prove worthy of your lineage, your faith and your ideals".

HEALTH TIPS

Keep Off Drugs Once You Have Dried Out!

YOU ONLY need to see a heroin addict going through withdrawal to understand the agony of drug abuse.

Within six hours of stopping the drug he becomes restless and anxious, starts craving for another 'fix' of heroin and develops a host of symptoms including sleeplessness, tears, runny nose, yawning, vomiting, abdominal cramps, diarrhoea, muscle aches and pains. These last two to four days.

Addicts half crazed by these symptoms may roam the street looking for heroin, or the money to purchase it, sometimes turning to crime for this purpose.

The withdrawal phase is unpleasant and feared by addicts, but it is rarely fatal.

Though it can be made less painful by medication, some countries like Indonesia and certain drug centres let addicts feel the brunt of the experience to discourage them going back on heroin, the so called 'cold turkey' method.

I think this is rather extreme and not having seen research that supports this method, would not recommend it in our setting.

According to Western statistics the death rate of male heroin addicts is 20 times that of the rest of the society and females five times.

And this is growing with the rise in the number of heroin addicts who have

AIDS. This makes heroin addiction an ominous matter.

As always, it is best not to get involved in drugs in the first place. But if you are an addict already you need help.

For some reason too few heroin addicts are willing to let others know their problem and even fewer approach helpful agencies for treatment.

As 'cold turkey' is too unpleasant the assistance of a doctor familiar with these

problems is needed to help get the drug out of the system.

The hardest part comes later.

Keeping off the drug once you have been dried out.

The same old friends (usually addicts themselves), the environment and emotional pressures comes back to haunt addicts and tempt them to get back on heroin.

In most cases they succeed.

It is thus advisable that a former addict move to an entirely new environment and join a group that encourages him to keep off heroin such as Narcotics Anonymous in Malindi and Mombasa.

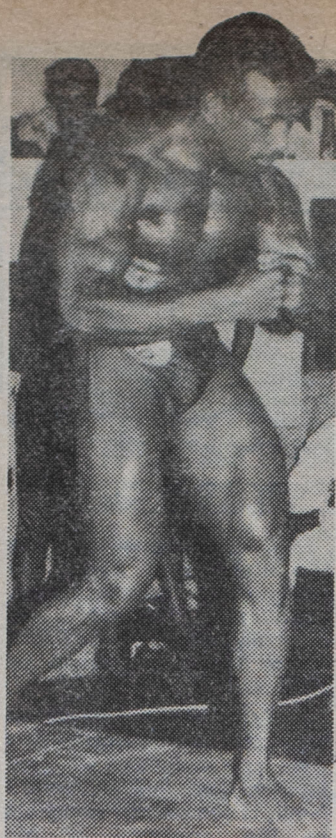

In December a Childrens Holiday Art Club is being organised. The Coast Art Circle can be contacted at P.O. Box 86202, Mombasa.

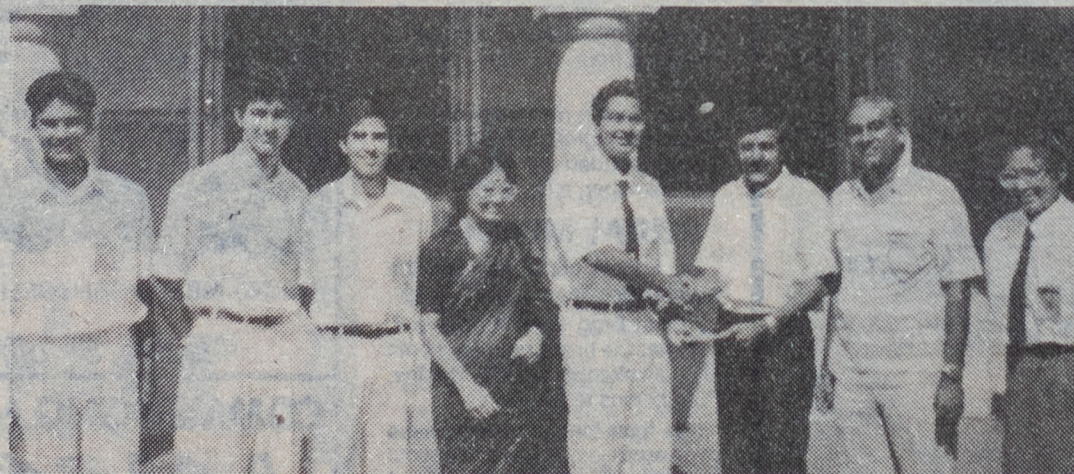

AUDITIONS FOR *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat* were held some time in May or early June this year: as always with major musicals, the directors had a difficult task in finding suitable talent for the leading roles.

Jaqui Freeman was an obvious choice for the "Narrator" - but would she be available when the production finally took off?

Apart from the "Narrator", someone was needed to take the role of "Mrs. Potiphar."

The male roles were far more difficult to cast: apart from "Joseph" himself, there are five other main roles to fill, and at least 11 more men are required for Joseph's brothers.

During early rehearsals, the directors were very uncertain whether "Joseph" would ever really take the stage: some of the chorus were present one week, and not the next; several

intending actors dropped by the wayside as the weeks progressed...it was quite a nightmare for all concerned.

Came the technical and dress rehearsals: the set was still to be completed; the synchronisation of the cordless microphones caused a major headache; fuses were blowing noisily in the orchestra pit, and though not actually spoken, many must have wondered:

"Will it really be all right on the night?"

Typically, the audience appeared to have the same doubts initially. On curtain up, there was not quite the normal

spontaneous applause that has greeted other L.T.C. shows.

Nevertheless, the opening number by Jaqui Freeman quickly set the mood: Jaqui is stunningly dressed in black for the first act and later dons a pair of white slacks for the latter half.

She gives a superb performance throughout - a magnificent display by the talented professional that she is, and her gentle encouragement of the other leading characters and of the chorus as well - a quiet smile here, a subtle move of her hand there, generates confidence in

the entire cast, resulting in a truly magnificent evening's entertainment.

Several numbers bring the house down in thunderous applause: the gentle over-acted dance of "Mr. Potiphar" (Dominique Schep) and his evil missus (an outstanding performance by Pauline Groom - what a talented all-round lady she is!); the fantastic take-off of "Elvis the Pelvis" by Rob Cork are but a couple of the highlights of the evening.

There are other aspects of the production which are excellent: Mr. Bhoja who has rapidly become L.T.C.'s "resident tailor" has surpassed himself in the design and colour of the costumes: quite apart from the quite spectacular multicoloured Dreamcoat.

"Joseph" (confidently played by Tony Armitage in his first major role on stage) is fully justified when he boasts "I'm a walking work of art" and the biblical Jacob would have been truly proud of his tailor!

Then too, the ladies' costumes in Potiphar's chambers, and later as Pharaoh's ladies in waiting are resplendent...

There are too many plusses to

mention and generally the evening zips along from one jolly number to the next, the performers being ably led by the small orchestra which Philippe Zimmerlin had managed to assemble, and transcribe the score to suit the instruments available.

MESSAGE

Let one be accused of being too starry-eyed about the performance, a couple of minor criticisms: "Joseph" was originally performed at St. Paul's Junior School in London, by children.

Sadly, no children appear on stage, presumably because they were busy elsewhere with their studies. Nevertheless, Jacob's family is somewhat incomplete in the absence of his grandchildren.

Secondly: in the number "Joseph's Dreams", although the Brothers are very scathing

and threaten to do him in, one feels that they menace "from afar" - might not the message have been even more convincing if one or two of the Brothers had come up behind him as he sits alone, and mimed their intended actions prior to finally grabbing him and throwing him into the pit?

But in the overall exuberance of a thoroughly enjoyable production, these are but minor irritations, certainly not noticed by most of the audience.

All in all, "Joseph" is a very worthy finale to The Little Theatre Club's 40th Anniversary year, and matches up excellently to all the previous musicals and pantomimes that have been staged during the last four decades.

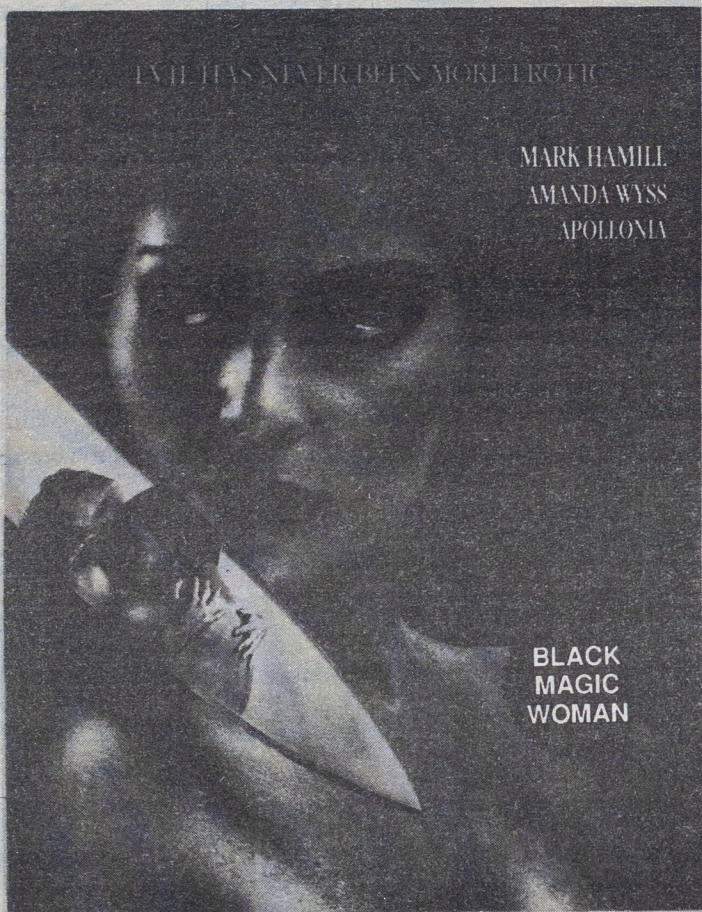

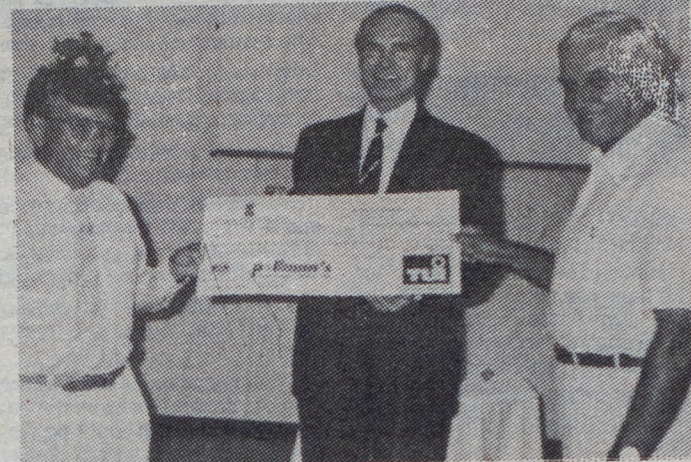

Fearless Freighter Heads For Somalia With Red Cross Relief Cargo

SUNDAY AFTERNOON SAW the departure of the 15249 DWT I.C.R.C. chartered freighter *Rattana Naree* bound obviously for various ports along the Somali Coastline with the usual assortment of food and medical aid for the devastated population. Whether or not the bulk of the aid reaches those it is supposed to reach depends very much on the mood it would appear of the so called war lords. Nevertheless, the I.C.R.C. have amongst others been persistent in shipping the aid to the country.

The Murri International Salvage Company supply vessel *Steve B* was the first vessel to be chartered out of Mombasa by the Red Cross and was therefore the first vessel to deliver humanitarian aid to the place, in February of last year.

An unusual vessel, in so far as ports of registry are concerned, is presently alongside the ex KFI jetty at Liwatoni.

She is the Dublin registered *Emerald Aspen* ex *Extrelago* built in 1981 with a DWT of 2,257.

A large parcel of Palm oil is arriving at the beginning of December aboard the *Akademik Vekua* with a reported 15,000 tonnes of the commodity.

By the way, the cat onboard *Bison 1* gave birth to three kittens roughly twelve hours prior to the successful refloat operation, so it goes without saying that one of the kittens will inevitably be named *Khalaf*.

Congratulations to M.I.S.O.C. at the culmination of yet another successful salvage operation.

Kenya Ports Authority Managing Director Philip Okundi Attends Top-Level Seminar In Kampala

THE KPA Managing Director Mr. Philip Okundi has assured Uganda exporters and importers that the Port of Mombasa will continue according efficient services to Uganda Cargo passing through the Port of Mombasa.

Mr. Okundi who was addressing a well attended Seminar for Uganda Shippers at the Uganda International Conference Centre in Kampala last week informed the Seminar participants that Uganda was the biggest user of the Port of Mombasa amongst the transit countries and accounts for 57 per cent of the total transit traffic through the Port of Mombasa annually.

Mr. Okundi further disclosed that Uganda traffic through the Port of Mombasa has registered a steady upsurge over the last five years. In 1991 the traffic registered 303,200 tonnes compared to 300,271 registered in 1990.

He added that this year Uganda traffic was likely to register an all time high tonnage since the first half of this year the traffic has already recorded 206,742 tonnes compared to 133,307 recorded over the corresponding period in 1990.

The seminar which was jointly hosted by Kenya Ports Authority, Kenya Railways Corporation and Uganda Railways Corporation was attended by representatives of various organisations including exporters and importers, Uganda Clearing and Forwarding Agents, Uganda Revenue Authority, Bank

of Uganda, representatives from Northern Corridor Secretariat and the business community in Uganda.

The Chairman of Uganda Clearing and Forwarding Agents Association Mr. Patrick O. Adengo also attended the Seminar.

The Seminar which was officially opened by the Ugandan Deputy Minister of Works, Transport and Communication Mr. Nasasira was aimed at enlightening the Uganda shippers and businessmen on shipping, port operations rail and road transportation aspects so as

similar to the one currently serving the Nairobi Inland Container Depot.

Mr. Okundi further informed the participants that the inland Container Depots at Kisumu and Eldoret will drastically reduce transport costs for Uganda shippers and thus make their use of the Port of Mombasa more economical.

These facilities, he added, are in line with KPA's long term objective of bringing port services closer to its users.

The Seminar which was chaired

Kenya Railways and Uganda Railways with regard to joint marketing efforts and strategies, operations, locomotives and rolling stock.

The two Corporations were, however, urged to consider giving tariff rebates based on volume of traffic offered by individual customers.

The acting Managing Director of Uganda Railways Corporation reported that his organisation was finalising arrangements to rehabilitate the Kampala-Kasese line and the construction of a

Northern Corridor route.

Mr. Okundi who was a on a five day marketing mission to Uganda led a strong Kenya delegation to the Seminar which included the Chairman of Kenya Clearing Forwarding and Warehousing Association Mr. John Msafari, the Managing Director of Sigonon Freight Limited Mr. G.B.O. Kideka and the General Manager of Mitchell Cotts Mr. M.R. Freri and Kenya Railways Corporation officials among others.

During the visit the Kenyan delegation held business discussions with the Ugandan Minister for Transport and Communications Mr. Ruhakana Rugunda, the Minister of State for Finance and Economic Planning Mr. Mathew Rukikaire, and the Minister of Commerce Co-operatives and Marketing Mr. Richard Kajjuka.

Mr. Okundi and the delegation also met and held discussions with the Chairman of Uganda Association of Manufacturers Mr. Joseph Murwana, the Vice Chairman of Uganda Chamber of Commerce and Industry Mr. S. Yara.

The delegation also met with major users of the Port of Mombasa in Uganda among them the Managing Director of Uganda Coffee Marketing Board Mr. Nagimesi and the General Manager of Lint Marketing Board of Uganda Mr. James W. Obbo.

Others in the Kenya delegation were the KPA Manager Traffic and Operations Division Mr. J. Makau, the Marketing and Public Relations Manager Mr. Alex Kabuga, the Chief Operations Officer Mr. Marwan Rashid, the Manager Inland Container Depots Mr. Lucas Obondo and an Assistant Marketing Officer Mr. Erasto Magak.

Others were the Kenya Railways Business Manager Mr. Francis Ikamba, the Mitchell Cotts Assistant General Manager Mr. J. Muttimos, the Sigonon Freight Limited Commercial Manager Mr. W. Simbah, the Computer Systems Analyst Mr. A.H. Taib and the Kenya National Shipping Line Commercial Manager Mr. P. Nyaoka.

These facilities, he noted, will serve as "dry ports" and will be linked to the Mombasa Container Terminal by a special regular railtainer services to be operated by Kenya Railways Corporation

by the Chairman of Uganda Railways Corporation Mr. John Kawanga and attended by the acting Managing Director of Uganda Railways Corporation Mr. Enos Tumusiime commended Kenya Ports Authority move of constructing the Inland Container Depots noting that these Depots will reduce handling and transport costs for Uganda importers and exporters and speed up the clearance of cargo.

The Seminar also commended Kenya Ports Authority for according Uganda cargo through the Port of Mombasa attractive concessionary tariff rates which became effective last month.

These rates the Seminar noted will encourage Uganda shippers to augment traffic through the Port.

Addressing the Seminar the Uganda High Commissioner to Kenya Mr. Joseph Tomusange lauded the improved political relationship between Uganda and Kenya and noted that this augured well for increased business activities between the two sister countries.

He thanked the Kenya Ports Authority for the services rendered to Uganda cargo through the Port of Mombasa.

The Kenya Railways Divisional Manager Business and Operations who represented the Kenya Railways Executive Chairman at the Seminar said that his Corporation will soon start running block trains for transit cargo from Kisumu and Malaba to the Port of Mombasa.

The Seminar appreciated the co-operation being enhanced between

Germany's Touristic Union International Honours Kenyan Efforts On Eco-Tourism

KENYA HAS been greatly honoured by Touristik Union International - the largest tour operator in Europe, which chose Baobab Trust as the recipient of its first International Environmental Award.

Receiving a 'jumbo' size framed certificate and cheque (Shs 200,000/-) at a ceremony at Severin Sea Lodge for its 'pioneering projects in the areas of environmental training, conservation of the species and afforestation in Kenya' were the founders of the Baobab Trust - Dr Rene Haller, Managing Director of Baobab Farm Limited (creator of the world famous Bamburi Nature Trail) and Robert Brenneisen, Managing Director, Bamburi Portland Cement Company.

Flying to Mombasa to personally present the award was Dr. Michael W. Iwand, TUI's dynamic Environmental Executive Director - the highest ranking environmentalist in Germany.

He told guests from the tourist industry and government that 'the award is intended to help the founders of Baobab Trust continue with their epoch making work.

It is also to show the population of Kenya, as well as international holidaymakers how important it is to protect our environment'.

Continuing he said 'their work shows a unique combination of fantasy, gift of observation, thinking ahead, the ability of integration and persistence making it possible to build up ecologically and economically self-supporting systems.

He noted that the new functions of Baobab Trust comprise projects of environmental education in general, re-afforestation and the

protection of sea turtles.

Said Dr. Iwand 'this ecological safeguarding of the future ought to be encouraged, and on behalf of TUI International Environment Board I wish Dr Rene Haller and Robert Brenneisen continuing success as they have achieved with the Bamburi Nature Trail'.

Adding 'Rene's enthusiasm is catching and by his determination, experience and creativity he has been able to make the impossible, possible.

He is 'an admirable Ambassador for Eco-Tourism in Kenya.

However, let us not forget the commitment of Mr. Brenneisen and the partnership of Bamburi Portland Cement Company in this activity'.

Declared Dr Iwand 'environmentalists need allies such as these' and, amid prolonged applause, congratulated all concerned.

Seated among guests was Dr. Rene Haller completely stunned not only by such a long and glowing tribute but also by seeing himself, and his staff, at work in the Bamburi Nature park on a film screened during the presentation ceremony.

Only recently a 45 minute film on Germany's most popular TV channel entitled 'Wasteland to Garden of Eden' was seen by millions of viewers in Germany.

Among those at the ceremony at Severin Sea Lodge was Mr. Peusi, the 'All Africa' correspondent for this German TV channel.

Also filming this event was a TV team from South Africa Broadcasting Corporation responsible for its 'Fifty-Fifty' programme concerning the environment produced by Erald Felix.

They were in Kenya for ten days and Erald and his team had already visited and filmed the Bamburi Nature Trail.

The other producers from this broadcasting corporation were also in Kenya they producing programmes entitled 'Agenda' and 'News Line'.

Kenya's KBC was also covering the award ceremony.

Dr. Iwand mentioned that in twenty years Rene Haller had transformed a devastated quarry into a tropical paradise and had been honoured by the UN Environment Programme with its Global 500 Award.

He also noted that the President of Kenya had characterised, only recently, the Bamburi Nature Trail as a national institution and an outstanding example of the importance that nature and the environment enjoy in Kenya.

Last November, the University of Basle, Switzerland, honoured Rene by awarding him an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Natural Sciences.

Dr. Iwand mentioned that soon after his return to Germany he would be addressing a group of journalists especially interested in Eco-Tourism and telling them about this award and what Kenya is doing

in this direction.

He said that Germany in particular is pushing Eco-Tourism and many other countries are doing likewise.

Referring to COASTWEEK's article on the Mombasa Eco-Tourism conference he declared 'what a discovery to find such a very informative article on steps being taken towards eco-tourism in Kenya'.

Adding 'I would like to receive such information'.

(In COASTWEEK's special issue

in Spain. Said Dr. Iwand 'I have started making hotel presentations there and advising what TUI is doing on environmental matters which has included two pages in 30 million brochures headed 'Even the Environment Needs A Holiday'.

In addition, leaflets and booklets had been produced giving clients environmental information and advice.

He mentioned three hotels on the Kenya Coast which had taken steps to conserve and protect the environment. They were Robinson Club Baobab, Diani Reef Grand Hotel and Severin Sea Lodge.

He revealed that on hearing about the environmental policies of the latter, TUI had promoted these activities as a pioneer project of major interest to environment minded people in Germany.

Details of the hotel's policy had appeared in millions of brochures.

Declared Dr. Iwand 'according to these fine examples from the accommodation front, official tourism promotion bodies could only be advised to co-operate even more closely with tour operators so as to combine local and foreign know-how'.

He noted that eco-tourism is developing rapidly as a key issue in Kenya. There had been a seminar on Sustainable Coastal Tourism analysing quite precisely the environmental impact of tourism on the Kenya coast and offering solutions.

This year there had been two conferences on Eco-Tourism, one in Nakuru and the other at Mombasa.

'The outcome of the first, organised by Wildlife Conservation International had been really

remarkable in that from it had come a National Eco-Tourism Action Plan and the decision to form an Eco-Tourism Society of Kenya.

An Action Plan would as well be essential for the planning process of tour operators, especially those who produce large numbers.

Said Dr. Iwand 'again the papers presented were brilliant and state of the art. One month later, Severin Sea Lodge hosted an Eco Tourism Conference with particular reference to the coast hotel operation on the environment'.

Here Dr. Iwand complimented Andre Janssens, Resident Manager, Neckermann, Kenya for 'pushing such a conference at the coast'.

Once more, he said 'the outcome was impressive with Action Plans by Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers' and Kenya Association of Tour Operators being signed by many of its members.

He noted that KAHC's Environmental Sub-Committee under the chairmanship of David Thompson aimed at improving environmental conditions along the coast and in beach hotels.

A scheme to raise funds for Kenya Wildlife Service to protect marine parks and the coral reef was under discussion, as well as that of ensuring proper sewage control in all hotels by introducing sewage plants.

Said Dr. Iwand 'we need an environment management plan for hotel areas and destinations in general'.

Addressing guests Mr. G.N. Macharia, Director of Tourism, Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife said 'tourism is very important to Kenya being the country's largest earner of foreign exchange and everything must be done to sustain it'.

Nearly 75,000 Kenyans are directly employed in this industry.

COMPETITION

However, said Mr. Macharia 'we can no longer take tourism growth for granted. In order to face stiff international competition Kenya is now paying a lot of attention to environmental issues in the management and planning of tourism'.

The country is becoming increasingly aware of the need to re-define its strategy with a view to harmonising the promotion and development of tourist facilities and

attractions within the concept of eco-tourism'.

He said that the Eco-Tourism Workshop at Nakuru had been an important milestone in the attainment of environmental conservation in Kenya.

He noted, however, that Kenya has been a pioneer in wildlife conservation management dating back to 1898, and that KWS, established in 1990 with the backing of bi-lateral and multi-lateral donor financing, was doing very well.

It was charged with the responsibility of ensuring that our valuable wildlife heritage is preserved and protected for the benefit and enjoyment of all visitors both foreign and local.

Within a short period he said 'KWS managed to eliminate the poaching menace, and security of visitors in our national parks and reserves is now guaranteed'.

Referring to the Eco-Tourism Workshop at Mombasa, at which he was present, Mr. Macharia said 'I felt very proud to see so many KAHC and KATO members signing their commitment to Eco-Tourism'.

We hope that hoteliers will comply with the five point action plan and that tour operators will abide by their commitment to the protection of the environment and support of eco-tourism'.

He noted that tourists are becoming very environmental conscious and want good value for their money in a holiday destination which is not polluted.

He congratulated Rene Haller and Robert Brenneisen, recipients of the TUI award, and on behalf of the Kenya Government and his Ministry said 'we will do everything possible to encourage the environmental action plan to which we are committed'.

Adding 'that is why we participated fully in the Nakuru and Mombasa Eco-Tourism conferences'.

He concluded 'the environment is very crucial to our tourism, and we should protect it'.

Said Mr. Michael Ratajczak, TUI's Resident Manager in Kenya 'Eco-Tourism is a new image for

Kenya and we can only congratulate government and the tourist industry for the magnificent results from conferences on this subject'.

However, he stressed the urgency of doing something soon so as to secure Kenya's beaches as a quality product in view of the serious competition coming from Central Europe including Austria, Switzerland and Germany.

He revealed that hotels there had been forced to switch over to 'Eco-orientated management' because clients are becoming increasingly aware that nature has

to be protected.

Mr. Ratajczak mentioned that today it is children who force their parents to take vacations at environmental friendly venues.

These children were being highly motivated about environment protection in their schools.

When they grow up, he said 'you can bet they will choose only destinations where eco-orientated hotel management guarantees unspoilt nature'.

'In all aspects of life in Europe, environment protection is becoming most important'.

He revealed that from the beginning of 1994 in Germany's big cities only cars with catalysts will be allowed (only 30 per cent have them now)

Recently, there had been an Ecological Symposium bringing together 250 participants from all industrial companies in Germany.

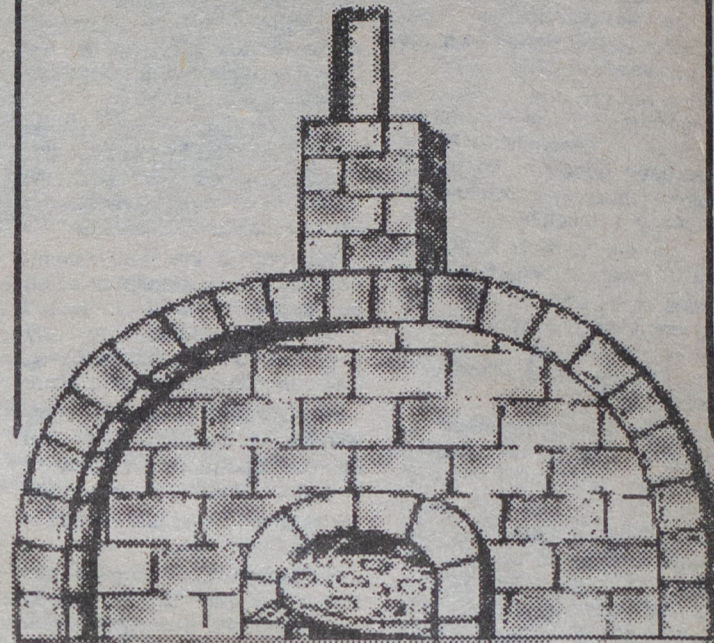

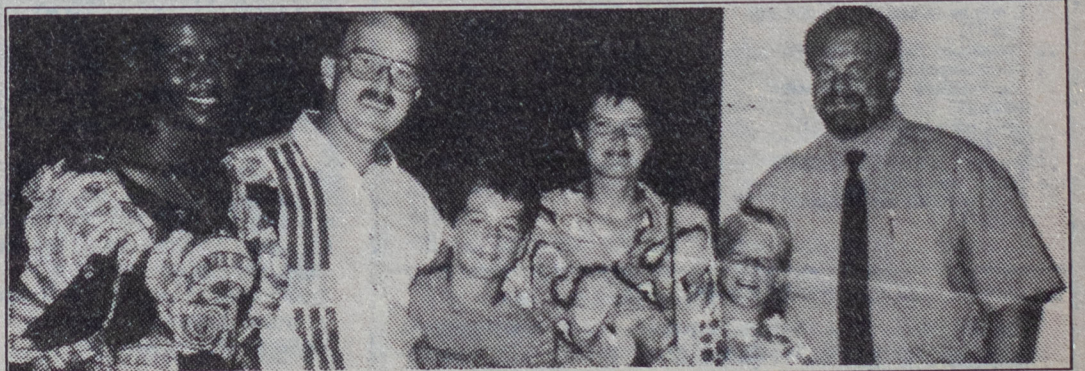

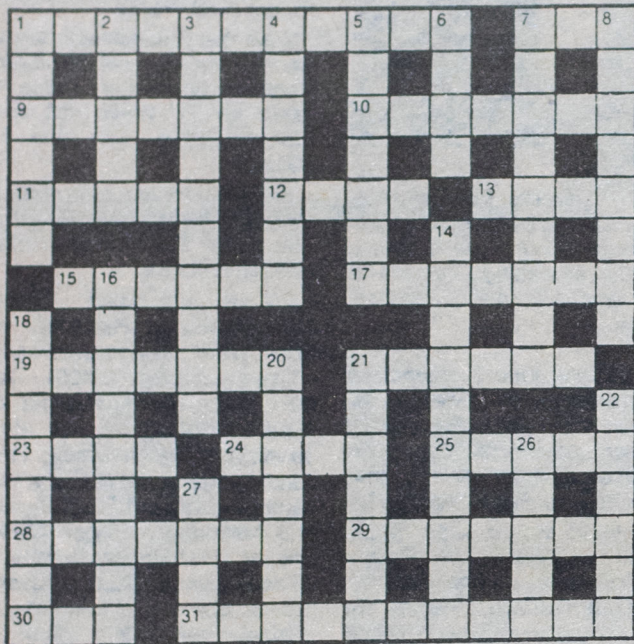
