

HEALTH TIPS

Nerves, Tension And Head Aches

ARE YOU troubled by headaches?

It is reassuring that in nine out of 10 cases of headaches the cause is trivial and harmless.

It comes as a surprise to most people that the brain itself does not feel pain and that most headaches originate somewhere else.

Headache poses certainly the commonest, probably the most ambiguous and sometimes the most difficult problem for clinicians.

It, like fever, is not a disease but a symptom of another underlying illness.

Fortunately for us the many diseases that cause headache do so through a fairly understandable way.

The structures on the skull are all sensitive to pain, while of those inside the skull only the blood vessels and the tough fibrous layer lining the bone (the dura matter) are pain sensitive.

So in tracing the source of headache doctors usually begin by examining the eyes, ears, nose, sinuses, teeth, mouth, neck bones for possible disease.

Occasionally, especially in the elderly, nerve diseases may cause pain.

But probably the two commonest sources of headaches are the muscles and blood vessels of the head.

Muscle tension is common among people undergoing psychological stress.

In the head muscles, it is felt as pressure or tightness, usually of the forehead.

Others describe it as hotness, crawling or needle

This type of headache tends to get worse as the day progresses and is to blame for the use of many pain killers and sleeping pills in the evening.

Headaches associated with problems of the blood vessels of the head is typically throbbing or pounding in nature.

Such headaches as arise from hangovers, fever and migraine are thought to be caused this way.

High blood pressure occasionally presents with a headache.

It is the few cases where headaches is a sign of serious underlying problems within the skull that causes all the trouble.

Such conditions as meningitis infection, bleeding and growths in the brain that do cause pain force doctors to take every complaint of headache seriously and to thoroughly exclude them.

But usually these conditions do not cause headache alone.


There may be fever, stiff neck, changes in consciousness and so on that point to the diagnosis.

Southern Air Transport Team Fly Famine Aid Into Somalia

PLAYING AN important and growing role in the flying of famine relief supplies to Somalia from Mombasa's International Airport is Southern Air Transport of Florida,

It started its operations at Mombasa in March with two aircraft and now has seven, six carrying out three flights a day into Somalia on behalf of the International Red Cross, United Nations and the Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance of the State Department of the US.

Personnel involved has subsequently jumped from thirty to just over fifty, all of whom stay at Nvali Beach Hotel.

Said William Langton, President and Chief Operating Officer, Southern Air Transport, Florida, who was on a recent four day visit to Kenya'we have just over twenty operating bases around the world and as soon as Mombasa is mentioned nearly everyone wants

Mr. Langton arrived at Nyali late evening on December 1 after his trip to Somalia and found waiting for him not only his team from Southern Air Transport but also a supper party hosted by the hotel giving him the opportunity of meeting them socially before returning to America the next day.

In an interview he mentioned that his visit was also connected with the increasing amount of work they will be undertaking as the US Military (Joint Task Force Provide Relief) withdraws in a phased programme from its relief operation at Moi International Airport.

ExplainedMr. Langton'it requires some changes in our operation'.

He went on 'it was the US Military's original plan to come in and get things organised and then

slowly phase out. How quickly this can be done is somewhat dependent on how the rest of the relief operation can take over'.

Adding 'they (the military) were told by our President to get things moving at Mombasa with the US committing 240,000 tonnes of commodities to be delivered to



Mombasa Tugs Join U.S. Military Effort To Secure Mogadishu

ROUGHLY FIVE MONTHS ago, this column's headline mentioned that Saturdays held an uncanny allure for salvage vessels. It would appear that this appears to hold true, and could even be expanded to read 'week ends'. For the locally based Murri International Salvage tug's Bison 1 and Barbara both sailed out late last Saturday evening bound I understand for Mogadishu where they have been engaged to assist with the berthing and unberthing and general harbour duties in connection with the US Millitary Sealift Command who commenced operations there earlier on this week to secure the port and air port in order to initially assist with the safe passage of relief supplies and medical aid.

However, talking of week ends holding an 'allure', the Barbarawent out to offer assistance to the Khalaf which had run aground on the Leven reef on Sunday, November

On Friday August 14, Bison 1 sailed for Mtwarawhere the general cargo vessel Sir Khan had run aground.

On Sunday August 23, the Bison 1 left Mtwara and proceeded to the Luis which had suffered Main Engine failure off Ilha Tambuzi.

On Sunday July 19, Bison 1 was readied for sailing to offer assistance to the Al Raziqu which had suffered damage off the coast north of here.

On Saturday July 4, Bison 1 sailed to position in the Mozambique channel where the Svea Atlantic had suffered main engine damage and needed to be taken into Majunga.

On Saturday June 20 both the Bison 1 and Barbara sailed for Kisimayu in order to assist with the docking and undocking of the sheep carrier Mukairish Alsades.

On Friday April 24 Barbarasailed to render assistance to the Korean Longliner No. 81 Satellite which had main engine problems and was in possible danger of grounding off Kilifi.

On Saturday February 22, Bison 1 sailed on spec to offer assistance to a vessel off Zanzibar however this turned out to be a 'red herring', and so it goes.

I see the Commonwealth of Soviet Republics flagged research vessel *Professor Rjabinkin* sailed out on Wednesday morning after completing the necessary at the Comarco jetty.

She is a self contained seismic and accommodation unit deploying up to 3000 m streamer and a high output sleeve gun array.

The vessel is able to survey continuously in deeper water areas and carries a specialist hydrographic scout boat to assist daylight operations in shallow or poorly charted locations.




Finally rapping up the available space at the conventional cargo berths is the Sue Lykes at Number 13 and the CMB Emblemat Number 17 doing the usual with containers.

These are as a result of the acceleration as the aircraft takes off and climbs.

Once on at cruising level then

this type of person will feel much better. However, should the plane come

across some turbulence then the feeling returns as the plane bounces up and down. One time I had a passenger in a

car and were bundu bashing in the ranch country around Maungu.

The beauty of driving around that area is that you are unlikely to meet another car.

One tends to then put their foot down and reach speeds that cops would not otherwise allow you to get to.

There is only a very, very remote chance that one might meet another loony like yourself also intent on driving at such speeds.

Anyhow I was driving at a reasonable speed along the bush roadwhen from the distance, I saw another road crossing the road we were on.

I did not think much of it until after we zoomed past it.

The car sailed into the air and landed a few metres further along. It was no problem as the car was

fitted with the type of equipment that would cope with this little jump.

My passenger, who had the job

of navigating, did not take too kindly to my driving.

As the car got airborne, the "g"

As the car got airborne, the g forces triggered a little nerve in his system and he emptied his

Thankfully it was rather late in the morning and there was little left.

After a good clean up is when I found out about his fear of flying andwe agreed that he would never come bundu bashing with me again.

Funnily enough, when we went through the same road several months later, this time with him driving, he also flew over the same intersection but nothing happened.

lam still trying to find out whether holding onto the steering wheel and being responsible for other people has a kind of a steadying effect on those people with flying sickness.

It might point to some sensor in the hand or arms that could be used to help those who suffer from being subjected to "g" forces. Who knows?

Which in fact brings me to new developments in vehicle control.

One of the most dangerous things inside the vehicle compartment is the steering wheel.

STEERING WHEEL

I remember not so long ago, the AA published a report on road safety and in it they asked us to imagine that a spike had been put on the steering wheel and the driver's possible reaction to driving hazards when he was driving with this spike pointing at his chest.

That was a good vivid way of aiding the imagination.

It was also a statement of fact.

Although it looks padded, the

centre of the steering can act as a spike in a collision.

Car manufacturers have recognised this.

Safety experts also consider the

rim of the steering wheel to be a hazard.

There is an increasing number of people who suffer lacerations of the head and broken noses as a

result of impacting on the steering

wheel during an accident.

More and more manufacturers are fitting air bags in the centre of the steering wheel which is supposed to blow up within micro speeds of an accident and prevent the driver from hitting the steering

One of the car manufacturers that has a strong connection to the air industry has decided to go one stage further.

wheel direct.

The new development in steering wheels is based on the use of an aircraft type joystick.

This will be linked to the wheels through a complex box of electronics.

It will mean that there is nothing in front of the driver for him to crash into and also that all the panel instruments are going to be more visible.

The drawback is that drivers have

had a "feel" for the road when using the conventional steering wheel.

One can feel bumps, stones and

all sorts of other things through the transmission of the impact through the steering system.

In this system one will have no

direct contact with the road and it can be quite uncanny. It is still early days and there are

It is still early days and there are a lot of things to be designed.

I understand that at the moment some systems are being tested and one of the add ons being developed is a box of tricks that will translate road conditions back to the joystick so that the driver will still be able to feel the electronic bumps rattles and so forth.

The problem at the moment is that there is a lot of interference from other things that leaves the driver wondering when he hit.

I wonder whether the experts would be able to develop an electronic signal that imitates the Nyali bridge bumps?

As Kachumbari says, technology that makes the car safer will surely take the pleasure out of driving.




