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HUMANITARIAN DISASTER

TERRIBLE WEEK OF KILLING, LOOTING, ARSON AND SENSELESS VIOLENCE'

Kenya Red Cross Society, Mombasa Branch Chairman A. A. Molu, writes:

FOLLOWING THE violence in Likoni (Mombasa South Coast) more than 2,000 people men, women and children have camped at Likoni Catholic church.

Women and small children sleep in the Church while men and young boys sleep out in the open.

The Mombasa Branch of Kenya Red Cross Society initially provided First Aid and later established a medical centre where a fully qualified doctor, clinical officer and five qualified nurses are in attendance.

High protein biscuits were distributed to small children.

It has also provided sanitation chemicals, equipment and the service of spraying the toilets and garbage dumps.

Further violence erupted at Likoni. VOK (KBC relay station) Maweni, Kisumu and Shauri Moyo and Likoni (Mombasa North Coast).

Chairman of the K.R.C.S. Mr. A. A. Molu and the Refugee Project Co-ordinator of K.R.C.S. Mr. Farid Abdulqadir visited all the above places to assess the situation with a view to providing relief materials.

The Red Cross with its meagre resources cannot handle the relief work alone and therefore it is appealing to kind and philanthropic people of Mombasa to come forward and give support either in cash or kind.

The relief items will consist of maize meal, Maize, Beans, Tea leaves, Sugar, Oil and charcoal.

Donations in kind of the above items or in cash would be highly appreciated.

Cheques should be drawn in favour of Kenya Red Cross Society-Mombasa.

Cheques and cash will be officially acknowledged.

KENYA Tourist Board Chairman Peter Mbogua, wrote earlier in the week to Hon. J. Kalweo, Minister of State, Office of the President, Nairobi:

AS A RESULT of the disturbances in the Mombasa area there has been much negative publicity about coming to Kenya for holiday.

This is generating many cancellations and is causing the foreign tour operators to reconsider Kenya for their clients with immediate effect for this season.

We know that the Police deployment in Mombasa has been greatly strengthened and hopefully this will restore peace in the area.

However, we very quickly need to restore the confidence of the overseas tour operators and the potential tourists that Kenya is a safe place to come for a holiday.

To achieve this a statement from

the government at the highest level is needed immediately.

This statement should outline the steps being taken by the Government and if possible that the situation is now under control.

The statement could usefully also explain that the incidents have been localized and not directed at tourists or tourists areas and that no tourists have been involved in any way.

Unless we can now restore the confidence of the international travel industry the consequences will be disastrous.

For instance 12 charters per week to Mombasa are likely to be cancelled.

(We have already been informed that one charter series from Italy has been cancelled with immediate effect).

With this kind of cancellation level the following will be undermined.

* The 150,000 jobs in the Tourist Industry

- * The 1,279,006 million Kenya pounds in foreign exchange earnings.
 - * The Tax Revenues generated to the Treasury through tourist spending.
 - * The earnings of the Agricultural and Fishing sectors from supplies to the hotels and restaurants.
 - * The ability of present investors to service their existing loans.
 - * The earnings of Curio and other suppliers and the Transport sector.
 - * The general economy of the country as the Tourist sector can be a barometer and leader of the other sectional investments.
- We urge you sir to urgently consider our request for a Government statement to issue immediately in order that we can arrest the present deterioration in tourism confidence.
- For your information I am enclosing some recent press cutting and notes from overseas tour operators.

MOMBASA MAYOR Al-Haj Cllr. A.S. Mwidani, OGW, writes:

THE STATE of insecurity in Mombasa has caused a lot of panic and I wish to take this opportunity to appeal to the residents to live in peace and harmony.

Mombasa people are known to be hospitable and the acts of thuggery which have been seen in the last few days are contrary to the peaceful co-existence which the people are known for.

The thuggery has caused loss of life and property and those behind the evil act should abandon their mission and let the people live peacefully.

Kenyans should promote peace and stability amongst themselves and fight tribalism which is the worst enemy.

The people should assist the security forces to fish out the thugs.

It is obvious that these bad elements live amongst the people and they should be exposed to the authorities for the necessary and appropriate action.

This thuggery should also be stopped to avoid it erupting to tribal clashes and I am appealing to all leaders in the Coast Province to work as a team to preach peace and stability, unity and co-existence amongst all Kenyans.

KENYA Tourist Board chairman Peter Mbogua, writes:

THE CHAIRMAN of Kenya Tourist Board met today with representatives of the Kenya Association of Tour Operators, Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers' and the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife to review the situation in Mombasa area.

After which a meeting with the Commissioner of Police took place.

The industry bodies and the Commissioner of Police reported that no tourists have been involved in any of the problems nor have tourists been targeted.

The Kenya Tourist Industry and the Overseas Tour Operators at the Coast are closely monitoring the situation on a continuous basis and advising on any necessary action to be taken to guarantee the safety of tourists.

The Kenya Tourist Board and the industry bodies are liaising with the Minister of State in the Office of the President in Charge of Internal Security on further measures to be taken.

In the meantime the tourists industry has been assured of the Government's commitment to bring the disturbances to an end.

IN A JOINT statement Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association chairman Najib Balala, Kenya Association of Tour Operators Coast Chairman Karl Heinz Strauss, and Kenya Association of Hotel Keepers and Caterers' Coast Branch chairman Joshua Mwendwa, write:

THE UNFORTUNATE violent incidents in the last few days which seem to have a tribal undertone have led to wide press coverage locally and overseas and has resulted in uncertainties in the main tourist source markets.

As an Industry we believe that the tourists are safe to travel to Kenya and also at the coast.

Safaris and excursions are done normally.

The assessment of the tourism industry is that the attacks are not tourist related.

The tourism industry monitoring the situation constantly and have established a 24-hour networked communication set up linked to the Police from which incident are reported and an immediate emergency system can be activated hence minimising risks and potential danger averted.

The police have assured us that the situation is under control based on a beef up of the security forces and arrests made.

INDUSTRY REQUEST 'GOVERNMENT STATEMENT'

TOURIST Industry at the Coast is urging Government to issue a statement to restore the confidence of tourists in coming to Kenya.

This comes in the wake of an increasing number of cancellations while some tourists already in Kenya have shortened their stay.

For Abercrombie and Kent it was reported that the m.v. Symphony with 950 passengers from South Africa due to arrive at Mombasa on August 20 had been diverted to Zanzibar.

About 200 were taking excur-

sions during the day they were in Kenya resulting in a big loss not only to the tour operator but Kenya generally.

The ship was on Charter to Crystal Cruises, S.A. and her visit to Mombasa was cancelled just 48 hours before hand.

On Monday an Italian Charter Aircraft had arrived at Mombasa with only 98 passengers instead of 220 originally booked.

Cancellations were also coming from the German market and elsewhere with tour operators

finding it difficult to assess to what extent these might be in the period ahead.

The press briefing which took place at the MCTA's Information Bureau was given by:

Chairman of the Three associations at the coast - Najib Balala, Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association, Karl Heinz Strauss, Kenya Association of Tour Operators and Joshua Mwendwa, Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers' and was also attended by leading tour

operators and hoteliers.


The industry also decided to write to the Ministry of State, i/c Security, suggesting a meeting with the international press based in Kenya to brief them on the true situation at the coast.

The industry feels that the market faces uncertainty due very much to the press overseas being unfair to Kenya alleging that some reports are based on rumour rather than on fact.

The three tourist associations emphasised that there had been no reports of any tourist injured or targeted, and that the situation at the coast is calm.

It also wished to assure tourists that they are not restricted to their hotels.

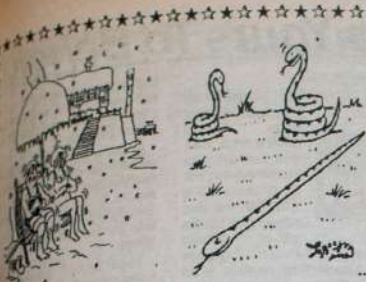
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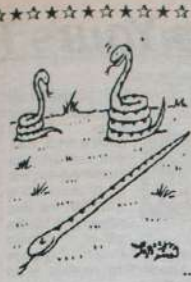

Remembering that the 'Islanders' recent concerts have been 'Full House' ones, you are advised to book early.

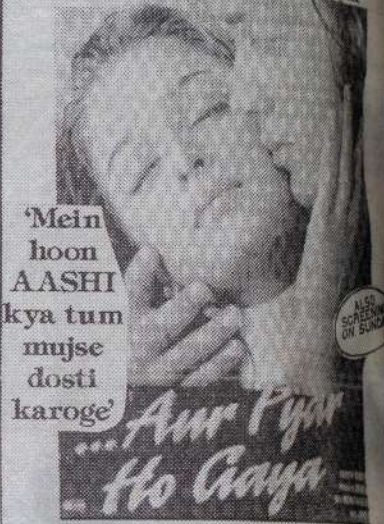

We were a sprawling old joint family home, with its complex relationships and musical ambience.

My maternal uncles were known for their Urdu and music inclinations.

We had this old gramophone and many and many 78 rpm HMV records.

K.L. Saigal's records were in plentiful.

My late dad, a humble man, was an ardent fan of Saigal.

His eyes used to shine when he talked about Saigal sahib.

Daddy was one of those who was unable to erase the nostalgia

of K.L. Saigal era.

My heart yearns for those days, "I remember winding the gramophone when records were put on it to play.

Songs flowed and perfumed the atmosphere.

"Gham diye mustaqil, Itna nazuuk hai dil, Haae haae yeh zaalim zamana"

"Aae katib-e-taqdeer mujhe itna bata de, kyun mujhse khata hai tu kya maine kiya hai", "Jab dil hi toot gaya, hum jeeke kya karenge"

The last song was played during his funeral procession, as he had wished it.

Saigal took his final bow from this world on January 18, 1947.

seven months before India became independent.

He breathed his last at his ancestral home in Jalandhar

where he had gone from Mumbai to recuperate from his persistent illness.

He was 43 years of age when he died.

Fifty years after his death KUNDAN LAL SAIGAL is still a favourite of many old timers...

His magical singing held a sway over his many admirers in the subcontinent then.

Life was slow, living was simple.

The novelty of Urdu Zaban, lyrics and music fascinated the masses.

What a change, dive from the niceties of language.

Where are the rich proverbs and similes in our daily speech?

Travelling By Matatu To Our Traditional Towns Of Naguru, Gerijo, Eltoret, Kachmeka, Kisumo, Pungoma And Pusia

For the rough and tumble of the countryside, the transporters convert pickups into matatus.

Two benches on either side of the load bed, a box added on top to protect passengers from the elements and a central rail to cling on to when the going gets tough; that is the simple matatu.

The operators, just like their town cousins want to reap maximum benefit from the vehicles so they are also overloaded most of the time.

A matatu will not leave the bus stage until the front grill of the vehicle is facing the sky.

That is the simple measure used to determine when it is time to depart.

One look will explain why.

The top cargo carrier is loaded with sacks of assorted produce irrespective of the direction the matatu is headed.

The front bench next to the driver will have a minimum of two passengers but more often is reserved for mothers, hence there will be two mothers, with infants and all the necessary 'keep 'em quiet' paraphernalia.

The passenger cell at the back will be filled to capacity including the aisle between the facing row of seats.

Adults sit on the benches whilst children in the early teens are lined up in the middle.

To complete the picture, one finds that there are inevitably three manambas associated with each vehicle.

They have no seat as they are not generating any revenue for the vehicle.

There is a special bar at the

back of the vehicle onto which they hang whilst standing on the step-up into the passenger cell at the back.

One count found that a Toyota Hilux converted into a matatu had some three adults and two toddlers in the drivers compartment, fourteen adults seated in the passenger cell, six teens squashed into the aisle between the adults and four fellows hanging out of the back of the vehicle making a grand total of twenty nine people

attached to the vehicle in some form or other.

This was the norm.

One such vehicle was travelling from an urban centre in the west of the country.

The time was dusk and visibility was at its worst just before the sun set.

The matatu was smoking it's way up an incline sandwiched in a convoy with other similarly loaded vehicles.

A fellow in a Musso was being held up by all this traffic and was getting impatient.

Eventually he decided he would leapfrog one vehicle at a time when the opportunity presented itself.

These opportunities were not so easy to come by.

He decided to make a dash whenever there was the slightest gap.

This worked most of the time till he decide to repeat the manoeuvre on a blind brow.

A speeding vehicle travelling in the opposite direction forced him to cut back into the space behind our overloaded matatu.

The driver of the matatu, sensing the possible danger had also decided he would slow down and let the Musso man slip into the space in front.

The result of these two decisions was that the Musso ploughed into the back of a braking matatu.

The braking action caused the back door of the matatu to swing back in.

The Musso caught the door on its closing swing and crushed

the legs of the four chaps who were hanging onto the back of the matatu causing them life threatening injury.

The rest of the passengers escaped with minor injuries but plenty of shock.

The sad thing is that the country probably has the highest number of traffic cops per capita.

PERMANENT ROAD BLOCK

They are very visible on almost every major road.

There are permanent road blocks in a lot of the places.

These matatus do not seem to care for the fact that there are law enforcement people in every nook and cranny.

Gone are the days when they would flash at each other to warn of the presence of the boys

in blue.

They just drive to the road blocks and casual checks and drive straight out again still in the overloaded condition.

The same scene is repeated time and time again on the roads.

What happens there is common knowledge and it is an indication of the level care that we have for our own lives.

Those who own the vehicles, those who operate them, those who use them and those who are supposed to ensure they stick to the law contribute to this rot.

If only one of them decided to change and stick to their guns steadfastly then some change would come through in time.

As Kachumbari says, it is difficult to remember the word 'care' when everyone is out there fighting to save or earn the extra shilling to help ends meet.

Getting "More Of Africa" On The INTERNET

MY DREAM, where people wherever they may be can communicate with others in the world, irrespective of language barriers, is not conceivable, for Internet has been doubling its membership since 1969.

Should it continue to do so at its present rate, every man, woman and child on planet earth could have an E-mail address by mid-2000.

Said John Perry Barlow from America who is co-founder and vice-chairman of the **Electronic Frontier Foundation**, when addressing a press conference in **Africa Online** offices in Mombasa's Cannon Towers, Moi Avenue.

EFF is an organisation which promotes freedom of expression in the digital media. Africa is catching up fast with internet, thus putting her on a level playing field on cyberspace.

Said Mr. Barlow 'it makes it possible for people in Africa to have a dialogue which crosses national boundaries that are being set up by telecommunication systems.'

Unfortunately, most of the governments in Africa derive their authority from having control over information via radio and TV stations.

But if you move a broadcasting system to one where everyone is a broadcaster, it makes it very hard to control information.

CENSORSHIP

Furthermore 'he went on 'it is very easy for an Internet to be widely distributed in a fashion that it is almost impossible to shut it down'.

Adding he said Internet was always survive nuclear attack as censorship is seen as though it causes malfunction and simply falls around it.

Mr. Barlow advised the press that he was trying to cover at least 10-15 countries in different parts of Africa, primarily in the sub-Saharan region, in stages.

So far, he had visited Ghana, Kenya and the Kinshasa Airport!

He explained that the **Electronic Frontier Foundation** had originally been formed to ensure the First Amendment to our American Constitution which guarantees, supposedly, freedom of expression, would apply to digital communications as well as to the print media because government was leading visual communication in a much different way.

He went on soon he realised that most of the planet do not have a First Amendment and that furthermore, internet as it spreads is going to cause a general re-negotiation of the existing power relationship on the planet starting with the erosion of the boundaries of nation states.

Adding 'There are a lot of people who have a lot at stake in maintaining those boundaries whether they make any continued economic sense or not.'

So what the **Electronic Frontier Foundation** is doing is to try to settle an amicable negotiation between the existing physical governments of the world and gathering of social and commercial space that is created by Internet - that is cyberspace.

Mr. Barlow explained the reason that this part of the world, the southern hemisphere, was left out of the industrial revolution that most of the people in it had no sense of time.

It made them ill-equipped to be turned into inter-changeable machine parts, for, in order to have

a successful industrial economy you may have to be equally amenable to becoming part of the machine and becoming a machine yourself and regulated very strictly by time.

Adding 'time is not an element in the information economy. The currency of exchange in information economy is intention and not time.'

In any event you have a large part of the climate that is highly under-utilised, where the brain power is every bit as equal to the rest of the world, but that does not have an industrial infrastructure and I would suggest does not need one, and should not get one in that sense, because there are other things you can do to avoid all those idiot mistakes that get made when they get industrialised.

So I have been writing about my experience and feel that southern hemisphere is certainly likely to become much more successful than most people in the northern hemisphere except.

He continued 'unlike the telecommunication systems we have built before, Internet grows from the outside rather than from the centre from the individual capitalisation.'

In America you can practically go to any place there and not know where you are because it is all the same.

This has been considered to be a good thing.

But in the information economy any difference has value - especially cultural difference.

Now we can start to harness that voltage gap.

Furthermore, we can harness it so that places are still quite culturally different can still move up-stream instead of being bombarded continuously from above with satellite programmes - Dallas, Santa Barbara and CNN.

You can start to talk back and I think you have more to tell us at this point than we shall tell you, because we all know that this mass collective hallucination we have created ourselves in TV is completely dissociated from experience.'

Expounding further about Internet he said 'it is also possible for anything that a human being can create with his own mind to be reproduced infinitely at zero cost and distributed to anybody in the planet who is interested in it without the industrial process of making books, records and film strips.'

This also makes it possible for all those ideas that didn't have a mass market to be distributed quickly and easily and to self-reproduce.'

Continuing he said 'now it is possible for minds to communicate quite directly and I believe that in fact we are in the process of doing is creating a nervous system for the entire planet in which every mind in the world will be continuously connected sometime in the not too distant future.'

So I am here to see what is necessary to wire Africa.'

In reply to a question Mr. Barlow said, 'we have members in many countries and made a conscious decision not to have chapters in the usual sense of the word.'

'We have encouraged people in other countries who admire the work we have come up with their own version of it.'

'We don't tell them how to do it. We know they have their own cultural requirements and understanding, their own way of interacting with cyberspace where there is actually a culture - that is somewhat more universal. Interestingly enough, it seems that no matter where you come from, if you spend enough time online there are things that change your understanding on what it is to

be human and the value we place on the free flow on ideas and the conversational relationship that is now made possible.

Almost all information has been in one way flow from people with printing presses to the people who can afford books.

Now it is possible for the world to engage in a perfectly equatorial conversation where anybody anywhere can talk to those elsewhere.

That is my dream coming true!

Mr. Barlow is a man of many parts. He is a retired Wyoming cattle rancher and co-wrote for the 'Grateful Dead', a rock 'n' roll and country band from 1971 until their demise in 1995.

He was the first person to use William Gibson's science fiction 'Cyberspace' in its contemporary sense.

He is a writer and a lecturer on subjects relating to the virtualisation of the society and is a contributing editor of numerous publications, including communications of the ACM, Microtimes and Mondo 2000.

He has been a contributing writer for 'Wired' and 'George' since their first issues.

He is a commentator on computer security, digital cash and commerce, digitized intellectual property, and the social and legal conditions arising in the global network of connected digital devices.

PARTNERS

He also works as a consultant on these matters with the **Vanguard Group of CSN**, the **Global Business Network** and **Diamond Technology Partners**.

To assure the liberty of Cyberspace he wrote the widely distributed Declaration of Independence of Cyberspace as well as the economy of the Ideas, regarded by some to be a seminal work on the future of copyright.

As a consequence of these and other essays, he was called 'the Thomas Jefferson of Cyberspace' by **Yahoo Magazine**.

Accompanying Mr. Barlow was Dimitri Negroponte who works for **2B1 Mission**.

He explained that this had been formed at the beginning of the year with sole purpose of connecting all the children around the world.

An 'amazing statistic' they had found was that of the 1.2 children on this earth, 1.1 billion live in developing countries of whom 85 per cent have never made a telephone call.

Said Dimitri 'we are connecting the children of the world as a significant step - indeed the biggest possible step towards creating a unified planet.'

Our vision projects a world whose people understand one another and are accustomed to sharing conversations, friendships and projects across what are still barriers of nationality, geography, culture and language.

In our vision people treat the entire planet as their home, and are accustomed to seeing the care as their personal concern.

Perhaps what is most special is that we see children playing a significant role in achieving this state of the world because they are the 'computer generation' and are innately the best long term advocates for global values.'

Asked if there was now need for a common language in the world to facilitate communication between people, Mr. Barlow replied 'the real question is whether or not we can come up with a combination of machine intelligence.

There is an awful lot of under-utilised brains in the developing world that could be put up to the purpose of translation and to make money this way, regardless of where located.'

Dimitri continued 'inherent in this way of children is an answer to serious questions about whether it can be right to talk about bringing computers for children to countries where medicine and even food and in desperately short supply.

It is our deepest conviction that opening the horizons of the minds of children is the ultimate investment for breaking out of the vicious circle of poverty and illiteracy.

Sooner than skeptics can imagine, connection with a bigger world of people with ideas (hopes and dreams) will be possible and will be more than repay the investment.

Taking the evolution of the Net and the Web as models 2B1 sees its role as enabling the development of a web of initiatives.

We imagine that most of these will be local initiatives, though some will be global, many will be grassroots actions, though some may be actions by governments of International organisations.

In some cases 2B1 will be able to offer needy organisations material help in the form of money or equipment.

It will be able to do this because it also offers people or companies who have resources and who share its goals a channel through they can contribute in cash or kind to furthering the shared vision.

The first donor was **Isao Okawa**, chairman of **Sega Enterprises** who has made a significant contribution to support the planning, start-up work and initial funding to be provided by 2B1.

Additional funding is being provided by **Kazuhiko Nishi**, chairman of **ASCH Corporation**.

With all these developments taking place one can perhaps foresee an era of greater understanding emerging among the people of the world through dialogue with each other and the erasing of misunderstandings which lead to decimating wars and ethnic/tribal/religious clashes.

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AMREF - Its People Who Matter

AFRICAN Medical and Research Foundation (AMREF) is an independent non-profit organisation which has been working for 40 years to improve the health of the people in Eastern Africa.

AMREF, with its headquarters in Nairobi, was founded in 1957 and is one of the few international non-governmental organizations based in Africa.

Forty years ago, a young Nairobi-based surgeon, Michael Wood, saw the need for surgical help in remote rural hospitals; he offered his services and, initially, he travelled by road to these areas.

It soon became apparent that travelling by air would allow him to make better use of his time, to go further afield, and would save money.

So, he learned to fly.

Connecting these rural hospitals by radio provided better communication, and hence more efficient planning and extension of the services.

This surgical service by air, plus the radio network, were the beginnings of the **FLYING DOCTOR SERVICE**, which set up in a temporary building at Wilson Airport, Nairobi.

An expanded version of this flying service became the **AFRICAN MEDICAL AND RESEARCH FOUNDATION**, when it registered in 1957.

In 1962 the Health Education



AMREF's imoregnated Bednet Programme Manager Anne Gichohi, and a bednet maker proudly display one of their products.

Department was established concentrating on the production of health education materials.

In 1965, the Ground Mobile Unit started safaris to provide maternal and child health services to nomadic communities.

Many of AMREF's operations are based in Kenya where the Foundation has its headquarters.

By mid 1993 AMREF was running over 30 projects in Kenya.

Today AMREF runs over 80 health related projects, including

the world famous Flying Doctor Service, in several African countries.

SPECIALIST OUTREACH

The original Flying Doctor Service has continued but expanded in scope and coverage.

Today AMREF and government surgeons and specialists fly to hospitals in remote areas of Kenya providing much needed specialist services and training.

The specialists visit these remote hospitals every eight weeks or so, carrying out operations.

During such visits the medical staff at the hospitals have an opportunity to upgrade their skills and knowledge through consultation and instruction.

In Kenya the Specialist OUTREACH Programmes covers the Coast, Eastern and Rift Valley provinces.

The flight clinics and the specialist programmes, not to mention the evacuation services, covering a

wide area in remote countryside, require precise co-ordination.

With a network of over 100 stations all over the country, the AMREF radio network provides medical personnel in remote rural health facilities with contact in case of emergencies or for simple referral queries.

EDUCATION FOR HEALTH

AMREF's Health Behaviour and Education Department undertakes the education for the community health action programme.

This programme was started in 1985 with the aim of developing projects which are tested in the field using limited seed funding and local resources.

Project activities include, for example, the construction and use of pit latrines, protection of springs, nutrition education and training of Community Health Workers, Traditional Birth Attendants and Training of Trainers.

In Kaloleni, Kilifi District, a joint AMREF-Government of Kenya project aims to improve maternal child health/ family planning promoted through community participation, disease prevention, environmental health and income-generating activities for women.

Other activities include increase in immunization coverage and contraceptive use as well as reduce malnutrition.

The project also assists in the provision of clean and safe drinking water by helping communities to dig wells, protect springs, and construct latrines.

Kaloleni is just one of many rural areas that benefit from the support of such Programmes.

A.I.D.S. CONTROL

Currently AMREF is involved in a number of AIDS control activities in Kenya.

The trans-Africa highway (Mombasa to Malaba) project is designed to promote HIV/ STDs prevention through adoption of behavioural patterns which protect people against HIV infection.

The project does not only concentrate on the truck stops, but addresses communities around as well.

AIDS has been integrated into Community Based Health Care program through training of community health workers, traditional birth attendants, teachers, women's groups, church representatives and other leaders.

AMREF lays great emphasis on the control through early diagnosis, treatment and referral of STDs as an important intervention in HIV/AIDS prevention.

RESEARCH

The Foundation has, over the years, been involved in conducting medical research on problems directly relating to the health and well-being of rural East Africans.

AMREF's pioneer work in 'hydatid' disease is perhaps the best known of this research work.

Parts of Turkana District have the highest incidence of hydatid disease in the world.

Since 1983 Malaria Research has become an important addition to the Foundation's work, especially with the increasing resistance of the parasite to chloroquine.

In collaboration with the Ministry of Health, World Health Organisation, Kenya Medical Research Institute and the London School, AMREF was involved in a trial of the use of insecticide treated mosquito bed nets in prevention of malaria in Kilifi.

The study demonstration showed a 33 per cent reduction in childhood mortality and 44 per cent reduction in hospital admissions caused by malaria.

Nahashon's cocktail was '*Innocent Jackie*' so named after a girl he once knew who kept rejecting him until he prepared a special cocktail for her.

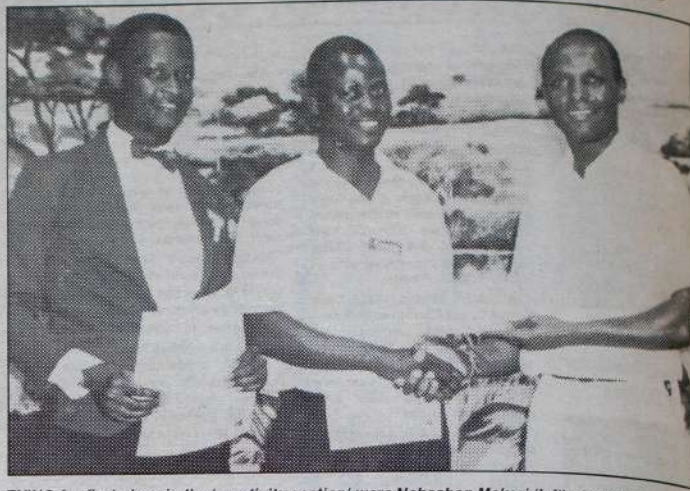
Said Nahashon, amid much applause 'she then could not resist my charm!'

NACH EINEM Jahrhundert und fünf Generationen fällt der Vorhang, um den Betrieb eines Geschäftes zu beenden, das seit über fünfzig Jahren am gleichen Ort - in City House in der Moi Avenue im Zentrum von Mombasa - geführt wurde.

Der "Coast Zanzibar Curio Shop" - bei Kenianern und Touristen bekannt als "Zanzibar Shop" - hat beschlossen, sein Geschäft stillzuliegen und das gesamte Warenlager in einem Ausverkauf zu halben Preisen abzustufen.

Das Geschäft entstand 1856 in Zanzibar während der Regierungszeit von Sultan Sayed Said, Vorgänger des legendären Sultan Sayed Bargasch.

Mulla Mohamedhai Noorbhai, der fünf Söhne hatte, begann mit einem kleinen Antiquitätenladen, der später von seinem Sohn Abdulhusein, zusammen mit seinen Brüdern Noordin und Kassamali, erweitert wurde.

Abdulhusein hat zwei Söhne, Yusufali und Gulamhusein, und als er in der Hauptstraße von Sansibar ein neues Geschäft eröffnete, erhielt es den Namen "Yusufali and Gulamhusein".

Es war auch unter dem Spitznamen "African Curio Museum" bekannt, da es mit afrikanischen und arabischen Antiquitäten, Elfenbein, alten Schnitzereien und alten Briefmarken handelte.

Viele dieser Artikel fanden ihren Weg in verschiedene Museen in aller Welt.

Nach dem Ersten Weltkrieg entwickelte sich die Wirtschaft in Kenia enorm.

Nach Ablauf des Mietvertrages für den Antiquitätenladen kam der Gouverneur von Sansibar, ein Stammkunde, in das Geschäft, und nachdem er den neuen Mietvertrag gelesen hatte, gab er der Familie den Rat, diesen nicht zu unterschreiben.

Sie sollte sich überlegen, ob sie nicht nach Kenia gehen möchte, wo die Aussichten für ein Geschäft

äußerst vielversprechend seien.

1930 wurde der große Schritt gewagt. Abdulhusein kam mit seinen beiden Brüdern und seinen zwei Söhnen nach Mombasa.

Der Schlussverkauf in Sansibar war so erfolgreich gewesen, daß ihnen genügend finanzielle Mittel zur Verfügung standen, um in Mombasa neu anzufangen.

Das Geschäft florierte, und 1936 gingen Abdulhusein und seine beiden Söhne Yusufali und Gulamhusein nach Nairobi.

Der Laden in Mombasa wurde den Brüdern Noordin und Kassamali überlassen.

In Nairobi eröffneten sie den "Zanzibar Curio Shop".

In Mombasa wurde das Geschäft, das bisher immer noch "Yusufali and Gulamhusein" hieß, ebenfalls in "Zanzibar Curio Shop" umgetauft.

Im Laufe der Jahre hat der "Zanzibar Curio Shop" viele Antiquitäten gekauft und verkauft, von denen heute manche in Museen zu sehen sind.

Im Fort Jesus Museum in Mombasa ist eine Kollektion mit altem chinesischem Porzellan, die eine Mrs. J. C. White dem Museum überlassen hatte.

Die meisten Stücke ihrer Sammlung hatte sie im "Zanzibar Curio Shop" gekauft.

Handtaschen

Der "Zanzibar Curio Shop" war auch ein Pionier im Fellgeschäft.

In den eigenen Geschäftsräumen wurden Handtaschen, Brieftaschen, Gürtel etc. aus den Fellen von Leoparden, Löwen, Geparden und anderen wilden Tieren produziert.

Auch Elfenbeinschnitzereien wurden dort hergestellt und aus anderen Ländern importiert.

Der "Zanzibar Curio Shop" in Nairobi beschäftigte einen Goldschmied aus Caylon, der Edelsteine und Halbedelsteine in

18 Karat Gold faßte.

Dieser Mann hatte jahrelang beobachtet, daß die Krallen von Leoparden und Löwen achtlos als Abfall weggeworfen wurden.

Eines Tages faßte er eine solche Kralle versuchsweise in Gold und versah sie mit einem kleinen Ring als Anhänger.

Diese Idee erwies sich als ein Millionengeschäft, denn kurze Zeit später verarbeitete jeder Goldschmied in Kenia Hunderte von Löwen- und Leopardkrallen zu Anhängern, Ohrringen, Manschettenknöpfen und Krawattennadeln.

Diese in Gold gefaßten Krallen waren enorm beliebt bei Kenianern und wurden auch von den Touristen als Souvenir gekauft, bis die Regierung 1977 die Jagd und den Handel mit allen Arten wilder Tiere verbot.

Alte Briefmarken waren eine weitere Spezialität, und im "Zanzibar Shop" wurden viele seltene Marken gekauft und verkauft.

Die Familie reiste weit herum, vor allem in Indien und im Fernen Osten, auf der Suche nach Antiquitäten und anderen interessanten Artikeln.

Abdulhusein starb 1943. Seine Söhne Yusufali und Gulamhusein erweiterten das Geschäft in Nairobi.

Yusufali, 1911 in Sansibar geboren, hatte drei Söhne, die alle in Nairobi auf die Welt kamen und schließlich die beiden Geschäfte in Nairobi und in Mombasa erben.

Nachdem die Jagd und der Elfenbeinhandel verboten waren, konzentrierte sich die Familie auf alte Sammlerstücke, einheimische exklusive Schnitzereien, Geschenkartikel und Souvenirs aus vielen Teilen der Welt, Edelsteine und Schmuckstücke, alles Artikel, die nach 1977 allgemein in Kenia in reicher Auswahl angeboten wurden.

Mustafa, der jüngste Sohn von Yusufali, ging nach Deutschland, um eine Ausbildung als Gemmologe zu erhalten und übernahm den Laden in Mombasa.

Er hatte aber noch andere Pläne.

Während seiner Auslandsreise war ihm die Firma "Ziebart

TidyCar" - die Spezialisten für Rostschutz und Autozubehör - aufgefallen, die weltweit Konzessionen erteilt.

In der Familie, die bisher immer nach Osten gereist war, um neue Ideen zu finden, gab es auf einmal ein Mitglied, das eine ihnen ganz unbekannt Geschäftsidee aus dem Westen in die Tat umsetzen wollte, wovon sie nie geträumt hätten.

Das neue Geschäft, das vor rund zehn Jahren in Mombasa mit einer "Ziebart TidyCar" Konzession begann, hat sich so gut entwickelt, daß Filialen in Nairobi und anderen Städten in Kenia errichtet werden sollen.

Mustafa Yusufali

Die beiden Söhne von Mustafa Yusufali, Abizer und Taher Yusufali, erhielten eine umfassende Ausbildung und Zertifikate von der Muttergesellschaft "Ziebart TidyCar U.S.A.", und in der Installation aller Ziebartprodukte sowie Marketing, Verkauf und Management.

Der "Zanzibar Curio Shop" in Nairobi wurde erweitert und wird von Mufadal Yusufali in fünfter Generation umsichtig geführt.

Andere Familienmitglieder sind erfolgreich tätig in der Pharmazie und Elektronik oder beschäftigen sich mit Eisen- und Haushaltswaren und dem Immobilienmarkt.

Ein Besuch im "Zanzibar Shop" lohnt sich, es ist eine Fundgrube, wo Sie ungeahnte Schätze entdecken können.

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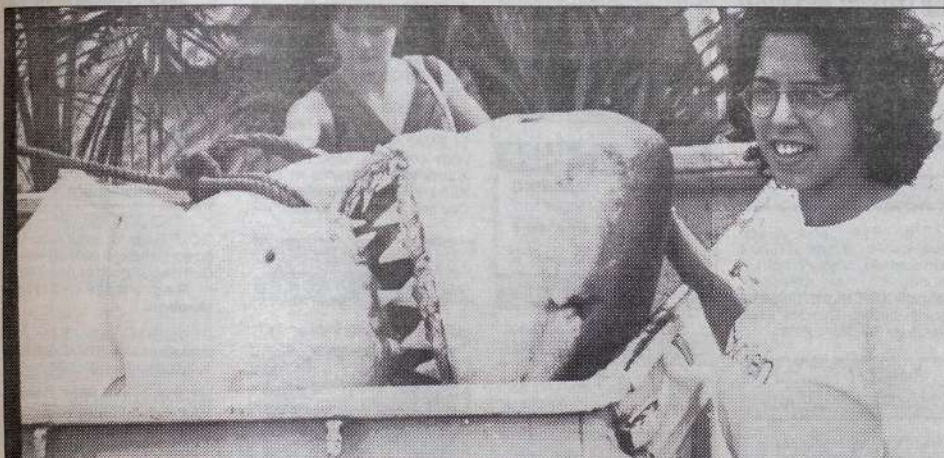
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Der "Weiße Hai" von Malindi

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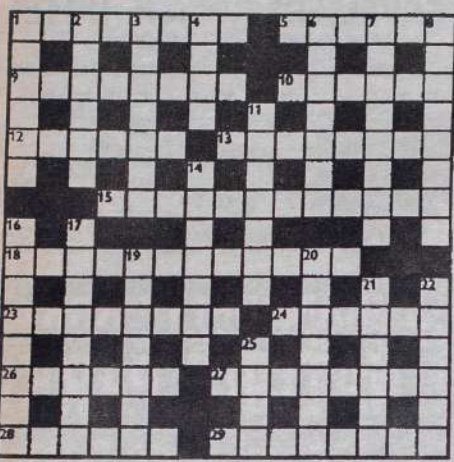

A Super 'First' 30.5 Kgs. Sailfish For Susan Mukiri From Uthiru - While Fishing From The Leven Bank

ZANZIBAR beckoned me again last week, just when the fishing reports from the Kenya north coast were starting to look good.

The stories from Watamu were of 'mingi' Black Marlin and Sailfish and I had to fly south!

What should have been a quick three day trip dragged on over the weekend and I finally managed to get a flight back on Tuesday evening.

On Monday I had finished my work on the 'Italian Riviera' and headed up to Nungwe on the North/East tip of the island for a repair on the dive boat of East Africa Divers and for a bit of socialising with Peter Findlay, owner and captain of the 33 ft 'cat Chinook.

As a point of interest, all the hotels on the East coast and up at Nungwe were 'full', as were the ones I checked in the town area.

That is a serious amount of tourists!

Peter informed me that he was doing two charters on the Tuesday and invited me along for the morning one.

He had five guests for the trip, two lads and a young lady from Australia and a chap from New Zealand together with his companion from Nairobi.

This was the first fishing trip for the Ausi girl, who's name I have mislaid and for Susan Mukiri from Uthiru, it was her first time on a boat.

Tuesday morning prompt on 06.30 a.m. the team sort of arrived and we headed out to Chinook.

After showing the guests around the boat and giving a quick lesson on fighting a fish, we set off.

Peter decided to head west and see if we could find some Yellow Fin Tuna which had been reported in the area.

This decision was also prompted by Susan's inexperience and by the condition (or lack of) of one of the Ausi team who had discovered 'how good South African wine is'.

The other option was to head north to Leven Bank where Peter had raised a good size Black and

boated a nice Big Eye Tuna a couple of days earlier.

Leven is often very productive but it gets rather rough if the wind is blowing.

Which it was that morning. Peter is a 'democratic captain' so he set five lines and asked each of the team to choose their rod for the trip.

As the lines were being set, Peter showed me a small YO-ZURI plug which he had converted into a teaser, rigged ahead of a 10 cms. pink squid, which is a killer for Sail!

This rig was dropped back from Susan's rod and within five minutes her 30 lbs. line was screaming from the reel.

As no one saw the strike and as the fish did not jump we thought it was a Wahoo or King and we all settled down to watch Sue fight her first fish.

On its first run the fish had taken about 400 metres of line so it took a lot of hard pumping to get the fish back close to the boat.

At the first sight of the fish I looked to be a very big Wahoo so Peter asked me to leave the wheel and gaff the fish.

As the rig was only a short double line and an even shorter wire trace the fish had to be fought right up to the boat and as I made the sweep with the gaff I suddenly froze as the Wahoo had a long bill.

I have never gaffed a Sailfish and turned to Peter for guidance as I thought he would decide to tag it for release.

But as it was a 'first' for Susan in went the gaff and on board it came.

Weighing in at 30.5 kgs. it was a very nice first.

It was also the first time any of the others had seen a big fish so I suppose the kill was worth while.

When I questioned Peter later about this he told me that he actually does release most of his Sail, Broadbill and Marlin, as well as a lot of other fish caught from Chinook.

Infrequent bookings does not allow the purchase of tags.

This means that a lot of useful information is being lost, which I think is really sad.

Particularly as the number of Sail caught by the locals and sold in the Zanzibar market is nearly as high as those tagged and released in Kenya and it would be interesting to find where they come from.

May be the Billfish Foundation or KASAC could do a bit of 'Harambee' and send Peter some tags, which I know he will put to good use.

After boating the Sail, we carried on westwards and very soon our Ausilass was fighting a King which was duly boated and ended the action for the morning.

The only 'action' the boys saw that day was a few 'Z's and a lot of leg pulling after.

My action for the day was to drive the boat as the 'auto-pilot' was out of action!

This reminded me of a lot of competitions when Captain Andy had invited me to 'come along' only to find that I was just the driver for the weekend.

While chatting to Peter he told me of a story which many a charter captain could relate to.

A few weeks back he had a group of 'very experienced' fishermen, from the 'Riviera' who wanted to do everything themselves!

Chinook was pulling a couple of 'dead bait' from the outrigger's when suddenly an estimated 1,000 lbs. Marlin came up on one of the baits.

The monster had hardly got the bait in its mouth when the 'fisherman' (?) grabbed the rod and 'struck', pulling the bait straight out of the Marlin's mouth.

That fish could have drastically changed Peter's fortunes and he did not even toss the man overboard.

Back to our home waters. James Adcock has just returned from a long needed leave and tells me that the best part of the trip was Paris, although he did not tell me why.

His new season started well when young (16 years) Eric Paron

from Nairobi went out for a day on Vuma.

They came back with a 130 lbs. Black Marlin, which was Eric's first Billfish.

Reports from Pemba Channel Fishing Club is that the Striped Marlin have arrived but difficult to hook as are the Yellow Fin Tuna which have also been sighted in the last few days.

Further up the coast, Peter Hutchence from Nomads reports a nice Kobia of 18 kgs. boated

first hour of fishing.

Further north, up in Malindi Bruce Buckland, a well known light line 'fund' got a beautiful 237 lbs. Marlin on 30 lbs. line after a four and a half hour fight.

For the last couple of weeks there have been a lot of Black Marlin off Watamu but in the last few days they have been less plentiful.

Just to finish. I have never written about diving but Chris Jones of East Africa

Divers, Zanzibar the other day told me of a spine chilling story.

They were just finishing a two group dive in the beautiful Npo Gap, north west Pemba with one group having just reached the surface and the second group doing their ascent further in the Gap.

The dive dinghy, having seen the first group, headed into the saw when those still down saw every big Tiger Shark above them, heading out of the Gap.

Needless to say, they stopped their ascent and pinned themselves against the wall.

The Shark, presumably feeling threatened by the divers in his way and with the dinghy cutting of his exit suddenly made a dash for the open sea.

On his way through he actually hit the bottle of one of the divers with his tail as he made good his escape.

The divers under the surface were horrified as they thought that the Shark was making an attack on their friends on the surface.

Amazingly, none of those on the surface or in the dinghy even saw the Shark and they knew nothing about it until they got back to the mother ship.

For myself, I would rather have a Shark on the other end of a 50 lbs. line than swimming with it.

Keen Competition As Andy Burnard And Seif Patwa Race Their Lasers In Weddebowl Trophy

THE COURSES set for yacht races at Mombasa Yacht Club start and finish at a line extending from the Club House to a buoy laid off the Club.

Between the start and finish, however, yachts have to sail around a number of marks which may be the Ports' Navigation or mooring buoys, vessels at anchor or, on special occasions, buoys laid temporarily by the Club's race officials.

It is thus possible for the Officer of the Day, who is responsible for setting the course and for running the race to arrange a course to meet the requirements of a particular race, bearing in mind the nature of the trophy being sailed, the state of the tide and wind and several other practical considerations.

One of the problems faced by the person setting the course is that it is impossible to see all the marks from the Club House and this can lead to errors in course setting which may seriously affect the ability of yachts to sail the set course.

Recently a race had to be abandoned because an unusually high tide had submerged a mooring buoy which had been made a mark of the course and on Wednesday the Second Monthly Mug race was

also abandoned, but for a different reason.

Each of the marks of the course has to be rounded by yachts in the correct sequence and each must be passed either to the starboard (right) or port (left) side of the yacht.

A further Club rule is that, for safety reasons, yachts must not pass under or over the mooring lines of vessel and it may thus be that, if a vessel is moored between two mooring buoys which are set as marks of the course, it is impossible to sail around these marks in the manner demanded by the course requirements.

On Wednesday this situation arose when it was found that a vessel was moored between buoys K1 and K3.

The August monthly mug series must thus now be reduced to three races and the Sailing Committee will have to decide how best to allow for the missing race when the overall results of the Mug are calculated.

Sunday saw the second and third races for the Union Castle Cup contested by four boats.

The start of the first race was rather confused, due to the absence of the Club's regular Sunday starter who was unable to

report for duty, but the consensus of opinion was that the result be allowed to stand.

Andy Burnard took first place in Nyekundu, David Farr sailing with Joanna Pirker was second in Temeraire, Seif Patwa was third sailing Equalaser and Phil Jones and Liz Horne were fourth in Black Magic.

Phil Jones is the Manager of the popular Shelly Beach Hotel and had brought Joanna and Liz, who are currently enjoying a holiday at the Hotel, to the Club for the afternoon.

Neither had sailed very much before but both thoroughly enjoyed their experience of ideal sailing conditions.

Mombasa's conditions. The third race was properly run since the Club's Manager, Walter Cardoso, was provisionally on hand to act as starter and three boats got away well, leaving David Farr slightly behind, possibly because he was passing the time of day with Joanna rather than keeping his eye on the clock!

Andy Burnard again emerged the winner but David's late start meant that he had to be content with third place behind Seif while Phil again brought up the rear.

The first and second Weddebowl Trophy races for Lasers, which had been postponed from 27 July were run concurrently with these two races so that Andy Burnard and Seif Patwa, who had both sailed their Lasers, achieved two first and two second places respectively to carry forward to the third and fourth Weddebowl Trophy races when there will no doubt be more competitors.

Had the Knave lost to West's Queen, you would still be in a position to win West's Spade return, cash the Ace of Hearts, cross to Dummy's Ace of Diamonds, discard the Diamond 'loser' on Dummy's King of Hearts and lead the Queen of Clubs - making the 'Slam' when East has two or three Clubs headed by the King.
