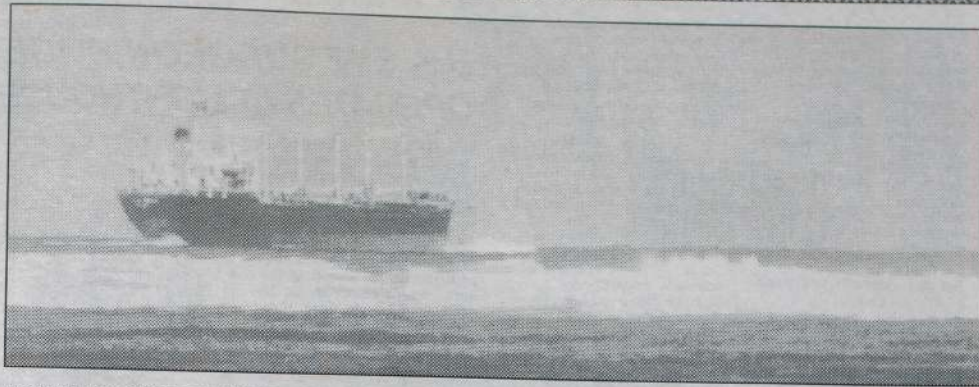
'Vasco da Gama Commemoration Week', will run from April 8-15, 1998 - during the Easter Weekend holiday.

U.S. EYE SURGEON ROGER DE HAVEN OPERATES AT LIGHTHOUSE FOR CHRIST

Dr. DeHaven, who has performed over 10,000 cataract procedures is donating his services to raise funds for the less fortunate and the extensive lighthouse coast province free eye camps.

He will be performing phaco emulsification techniques, similar to those currently in use in the USA, for patients who will otherwise travel out of the

country to receive the benefits of this procedure.

Phaco emulsification uses an ultrasonically driven needle to fragment the lens into tiny particles which can be aspirated through a smaller incision than that required for conventional surgery.

A smaller incision allows faster recovery time, added safety, and less chance of post operative astigmatism.

Dr. DeHaven will have time to perform about thirty procedures before he lives September 28.

"FUN DAY" ON DIANI BEACH TO AID RED CROSS

THE HOLY Ghost Cathedral, Mombasa, and the Catholic Church, Likoni, are most grateful for any help in their gigantic task of looking after families who fled their homes as a result of acts of violence against fellow Kenyans.

However, none visualised they would be staying so long in waiting for the situation to improve before they could return home.

The Cathedral is presently accommodating 810 'local' refugees and the Likoni Catholic Church 1200.

There has been a drop in the number at the latter, with some of the children having returned up-

country.
When Linda Davies, Resident Manager of Inspirations (which is about fifth largest tour operators in the UK) passed the Likoni Catholic Church the other day she saw the Red Cross delivering lots of food she thought 'I wonder what we can do to help'.

Linda, together with her inspirations team, has organised a Day's Outing on Diani Beach with lots of fun and games, for both young and old, as well as a super lunch at Forty Thieves on **Sunday, September 28.**

It is all to raise money for the Kenya Red Cross to help in feeding

around 2,000 'local' refugees at these Catholic centres.

Said Linda 'the Red Cross relies very much on donations and we felt we would like to help this massive feeding exercise'.

Kenya's tourism industry at the coast is also suffering as a result of these sporadic acts of violence.

COMPASSION

There has been a big decline in the number of tourists coming here as well as business generally.

Despite this Linda feels there is a great feeling of compassion by those in the industry who would like to do something to help.

Such positive action she feels might also help counter negative reports about Kenya in the press.

The Kenya Red Cross Society, Mombasa Branch, has been desperately seeking support from well-wishers in the form of cash or kind to help care for these distressed people.

Only a trickle of help has been forthcoming so far from a recent appeal by its chairman, J. A. Molu who after a call from Linda Davies of Inspirations feels more optimistic that others might be contemplating initiating help for the Red Cross.

Mr. Molu was happy to report that they are now getting a lot of

support from the International Committee of the Red Cross, International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies

However, more local support was also needed.

For those who need it, UTC has offered 'Free' transport from Mombasa island on that day.

Kicking 'Polio' Out Of Africa

"KICK POLIO Out Of Africa" is the theme of a campaign to erase Polio from Africa.

Some 25 of the 48 Sub-Saharan African nations have embarked on national immunization days (NIDs).

World Health Organization (WHO) experts attest that concerted efforts by all of these nations to conduct NIDs from June 1996 through 2000 are essential to eradicate poliomyelitis - the wild polio virus - from the face of the continent.

Rotary's PolioPlus programme has contributed US Dollars 65 million to Polio eradication campaigns in Sub-Saharan Africa.

Nearly 50 million children under the age of five years, in the Sub-Saharan Africa are targeted to receive oral Polio vaccine.

In Kenya, the national polio eradication campaign was launched by Minister for Health, Hon. Jackson Mulinge.

To participate in the present campaign, Rotary District 9200 Governor Nelson Kawalya was in Mombasa.

He joined the Coast Rotarians on Saturday at the Pandya Memorial Hospital, KMA Auditorium and gave a key note address to the media, invited dignitaries and Rotarians.

This was followed by an open forum discussion and queries.

The governor was assisted by his District PolioPlus Officer for Kenya and Coast PolioPlus Chairman Varinder Sur.

The National Immunization Days will be repeated each year during August and September in all the East African Countries which is essential as the virus knows no boundaries.

Rotary International will endeavour to achieve this goal and celebrate a Polio Free World at its Centenary in the Year 2005.

BIG BEACH COASTAL CLEAN-UP

THIS YEAR'S International Clean-Up on the Kenya Coast on September 20 will also include an underwater debris collection which is being co-ordinated by Kenya Wildlife Service and CARES.

Divers from Barraouda Diving School will dive up to about 50 m and will also be rescuing stranded Marine Wildlife.

This additional effort will make the International marine debris

data-base much more comprehensive.

The Coastal Clean-Up will be officially launched at Jomo Kenyatta Beach starting from 9.00 a.m. with trash being collected from Malindi to the South Coast.

In 1993, Kenya became the first African MARPOL (International Marine Pollution Treaty) signatory to join the International Coastal Clean-Up.

Since then this annual event has taken place in Kenya and in 1996, 1904 volunteers collected 10.8 metric tonnes of inorganic refuse from Watamu to Wasini Island.

That year the number of participating countries in the world rose from seventy to ninety - the clean up taking place in 4755 sites covering 14,523 kms.

More than 180 animals in this International Exercise were discovered entangled in debris compared to 159 in 1995.

Ten were lucky enough to be released. They included a shark, three seagulls, a pelican, two fish, a crab, a lobster and a loggerhead sea turtle.

CIGARETTES

The fishing line was again the number one entanglement culprit, with 74 entangled animals followed by fishing nets (24) and plastic bags (23).

Animals have no defence when they encounter debris in the wild.

They may mistake it for food or they may become entangled in it and unable to release themselves.

Analysis of the inorganic garbage collected in 1996 revealed that 61.24 per cent was made of plastic.

For seven consecutive years cigarette butts have been the most abundant debris.

Of 608,759 found 5,573 were underwater.

62.54 per cent of the debris collected was recycled material such as plastic bags, caps, lids, straws, bottles and cups along with glass pieces and meal cans.

The list highlights a critical issue, that of citizen responsibility and environmental stewardship.

People are the cause of this pollution problem.

They are also the solution.

Volunteers in last year's clean up on the Kenya Coast included Marine Park Rangers from Kenya Wildlife Service, Hotel Guests and Staff, Boat Operators, Kenya Scouts, WCK Members, Girls Guides and many private citizens.

Standardised data collecting cards developed by the Centre for Marine Conservation are used to record more than 80 specific debris items in eight categories - plastic, formed plastic, glass, rubber, metal, wood and cloth.

An appeal has been made by the Co-ordinating Committee for donations in cash or kind.

The International Coastal Clean up exercise first began on Texas beaches in 1986.

The Centre for Marine Conservation (CMC) sponsored

its first Coastal Clean-Up in 1986 when 2800 volunteers collected 124 metric tonnes of trash from 122 miles of the Texas shoreline. The clean-up went national in 1988 and one year later became an international event.

Commencing on Tuesday at the KENYA CINEMA will be an action thriller *Sweeper*, starring C. Thomas Howell, Ed Lauter, Kristen Dalton and Janet Gunn.

At the LOTUS CINEMA from today through until the next week is Tommy Lee Jones and Will Smith in the fictional *MIB (Men In Black)*.

Playing Golf Under Gun Fire!

UNUSUAL circumstances will normally elicit unusual reactions.

If one were to walk to a house, open the door and come face to face with some snakes slithering on the floor, there are two possible reactions.

The most likely one is that the person will quickly close the door and take flight.

This is driven by our natural instinct for survival and the way we have been conditioned to think about snakes.

The unlikely reaction is where one would leave the door open and retreat to a safe distance and observe what the snakes do next with a view to eventually returning to evict them from the house and take possession.

If one had never seen a snake before and had never even been told about what they are capable of doing, they would most likely just stop and stare at the reptiles in fascination (or terror).

The snakes would probably lose interest and go away after some time.

Human beings are conditioned by their experiences right from the time they are born.

Their reaction to unusual circumstances is strongly influenced by the conditioning they have been through.

This is illustrated in an incident that Kachumbari told me about but which to this day I believe is highly unlikely to have happened but, here goes.

Kachumbari had travelled to a Far Eastern country to explore for business potential.

Whilst there, he took the opportunity to visit some friends of his.

During the weekend of his visit, the friends decided that they would

take him for a round of golf at their local club.

Local meant a drive of nearly fifty kilometres, so the whole thing turned out to be a day's outing.

On the way to the golf club they passed several groups of soldiers walking by the roadside fully armed.

The country was still under martial rule and the sight of soldiers among civilians was not unusual.

When they got to the club, they kitted out and started their round of golf.

Kachumbari had a tough time getting round the rather tricky course because of the unusual hazards presented by the course.

It was a very hairy course with plenty of ponds and streams as well.

When teeing off at one of the holes that was at the extreme end of the course from the club house, Kachumbari's ball flew out of the course into an adjacent housing estate.

As he stood there shaking his head at losing another ball he heard what sounded like gunshots coming from the estate.

His hosts quickly took him into the shelter that was next to the tea box.

The club had provided these during the early days of martial rule when the soldiers were slightly too trigger happy and tended to fire at people for fun.

The sheds offered some relief to golfers when things got hairy.

The sound of gunshots only lasted for a few seconds but it was enough to rattle Kachumbari who had not been exposed to living under the law of the gun.

His hosts ignored the incident

and were about to tee off when they heard a large number of gunshots approaching where they were.

They quickly got back into the shelter and waited as the gunshots first approached and then faded off into the distance.

They resumed their game but by this time Kachumbari had lost interest in the game and was only keen to complete the round and get back to the safety of his plane and homeward bound.

They completed the round without much more incident.

Later in the evening, during the club night, more members came in and amongst them was the local army chief.

He soon had a crowd round him.

The people gathered there hoping to hear what had necessitated all the gunfire in the afternoon.

The army boss declined to tell but after a few glasses of the local rice wine, he seemed to mellow down and he then opened up.

He told the gathering around him that the afternoon's show of fire power was totally unrelated to any threat to the peace in the area but was as a result of an unusual incident in the army camp adjacent to the golf club.

GUARD DUTY WITHOUT THE SERGEANT ...

At some point in the afternoon, one of the soldiers who was on guard duty decided to take a nap away from the watchful eyes of the sergeant in charge.

As the fellow slept, he all of a sudden heard what appeared to be loud gunshots quite close by.

He quickly woke up and got his machine gun and decided to fire into the air to frighten off what he thought was an attack on the army camp.

This gunfire galvanized the soldiers at the main camp into action and they also armed

themselves and set off in the direction where the earlier gunfire seemed to be coming from and from time to time to try and catch the would be attackers to fire as well so that they could be located.

The soldier who had been sleeping realised that he would be found out so he stopped firing and sneaked round the camp back to the main gate.

From there he ran after his mates with his gun at the ready.

The soldiers found nothing that they could attribute the gunfire to.

It later transpired that the fellow who started the whole event had been spotted by one of the other soldiers who reported to the incident room what had happened.

They took the napping soldier back to the truck in which he had been sleeping so that he could explain in detail what really happened.

When they got there, they found a golf ball lying in the floor of the drivers cabin.

The ball had flown into the cabin from the adjacent course and then ricocheted off the walls of the cabin.

Army trucks tend to have no trimming in drivers cabin hence the ball was hitting bare metal.

This sound was what the soldier had mistaken for gunfire leading him to start an unnecessary chase by the soldiers at the camp.

The embarrassed army chief then asked who might have hit the ball in that direction.

The golfers all looked at each other but no-one was ready to admit that their ball was the one that had started the afternoon's unusual activity.


The soldier is conditioned to return fire when he hears gunfire.

He did exactly what he had been conditioned to do when he was faced by what seemed to be an immediate crisis ... no time for rationalisation or analysis of the source of the noise.

As Kachumbari says, human beings will resort to instinct whenever faced with what they perceive as dangerous situations and where time is at a premium.

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Climbing Kenya's Magic Mountain!

CLIMBING MOUNT KENYA is a physical, emotional and religious experience.

It is also an exhausting, exhilarating and often humbling adventure across one of Kenya's most fascinating landscapes.

Before getting down to the 'actualities' of the climb, here are a few details which may be of interest to those who have not yet come into close quarters with its strange and haunting beauty.

AN EXTINCT volcano which last erupted 3.5 million years ago Mount Kenya was gazetted a National Park in 1949.

This unique environment is now considered so special that UNESCO has declared the entire area an 'International Biosphere Reserve'.

Within the 715 square kilometre park are 81 plant species endemic to the mountain, as well as a wide variety of African wildlife.

The elevation range is approximately 3,200 metres to 5,200 metres and includes several distinctive vegetation zones.

Gallery forest, bamboo, giant heath and 'hagenia', moorland, tussock grasses, Giant 'Senecia' and 'Lobelia' - and, at the very uppermost elevations, rock and ice.

Temperatures range from 30° C (90° F) down to minus 15° C (0° F)

Every year more than 15,000 people visit the Park - to hike, visit the snow line and, some, to climb the mountain.

MOUNT KENYA, or 'Kirinyaga' to the native Kikuyu tribes people, was in aeons past considered the holiest of places, magnificent and terrifying, the ultimate sanction of God and Nature.

Peter Beard in his book 'The End of the Game' records:

"The Kikuyu said its whiteness had been put there by God, *Ngai*, to keep it holy, and that he had wrapped it up in biting cold to sanctify its holiness.

"No one had ever dared to go there.

"European discovery and eventual conquest of this home, this whiteness, marked the beginning of an era of encroachment."

The German evangelist Johann Ludwig Krapf was the first White man to see the mountain in 1849.

Missionaries (Rebmann and Hannington) and explorers (Thompson, von Hohnel, Teleki, Gregory and Kolb) later reported before incredulous European audiences of this 'Mountain of Snow on The Equator.'

After an epic six month expedition from London and Marseilles British geographer and politician Sir Halford John Mackinder successfully reached the summit at noon, on September 13, 1899.

As conqueror Mackinder got to name the three highest peaks:

'Batian' at 5,199 metres, then 'Nelion' 5,188 metres and, lower down, the 'Point Lenana' 4,985.

BATIAN and NELION were two famous Maasai 'labons' (tribal chieftains).

Legend has it that 'Mbatian', who died in 1890, was the son of Sipeet, son of Sitonik, son of Kipet, son of Parinyombe, son of Kidongoi, son of E-Signalishi, son

of Ol-le-Mweiya, the first Maasai:

Who came down from heaven and sat on the top of the Ngong Hills, beside the marsh of Nyarobi (Nairobi) 'place of cold water'.

Nelion, or 'Nelieng' was the brother of 'Mbatian'.

Lenana or 'Olanana', son of 'Mbatian' or 'Mbatiany', was 'labon' of the Maasai at the time of Mackinder's triumph.

The Maasai name for the mountain was 'Ol Donyo Eibor' ('The White Place'), but it was the Kikuyu/Embu name of 'Kirinia' (and, possibly, the Wakamba name of 'Kya Nyaa') which

If you are coming up from the Coast a sensible schedule would include first night in Nairobi, second night in Nanyuki or Nyeri, third night at Naro Moru, fourth night Meteorological Station (3,050 metres), and two nights at Teleki Lodge or Mackinder's Camp (4,300 metres) before climbing 'Point Lenana' and returning to base.

Proving that there is always an exception to the rule: well-known mountain climber Iain Allan of Nairobi is reported to have run up to the mountain from the Park Entrance at Naro Moru, climbed 'Point Lenana' and returned to the main gate in just 12 hours ...

terrain is both fascinating and fulsome.

Another warm and wonderful character is one Sammy Gaita, manager of the 'Mountain Store' - who for the past 25 years has been equipping individual climbers and complete expeditions.

FOR our particular safari general manager James Mbugua had arranged for several enthusiastic and experienced staffers to accompany us up the mountain, including 'guide' Richard Mugo, of Kamagura, Nanyuki, and 'porters' David Gichunju and Erastus Kinyua, both from Naro Moru.

THE ACTUAL safari or climb begins with a comfortable car journey through Naro Moru and its outlying farmlands before reaching the forest area and the Park Entrance.

Familiar names like Matiba, Mathenge and Kibaki own the larger and well managed estates before the settlement schemes and their 'zero-grazing' farmers.

Rural scenes ... of women in rubber boots, with head scarves, escorting animals to market, assorted children underfoot, wild flowers in profusion.

On delivery at the Park Entrance (2,400 metres) the car continues with porters and gear to the Meteorological Station (3,000 metres), while your party and a guide commence an eight kilometre hike through the cedars and bamboo forest.

Here are indications of buffalo, elephant and leopard, game trails and a few shy birds - Hartlaub's Turaco, silvery cheeked hornbills, white faced hoopoes, red fronted parrots, green ibis, sunbirds, bee-eaters and francolin.

After a good lunch and rest at the Meteorological Station Lodge run by Alliance there is a further 400 metres 'acclimatisation' walk towards the Radio Relay Station.

The 'Mountain Map and Guide' correctly suggests:

"You will now discover muscles you didn't even know you had, and at times you will consider yourself a prime candidate for a lunatic asylum.

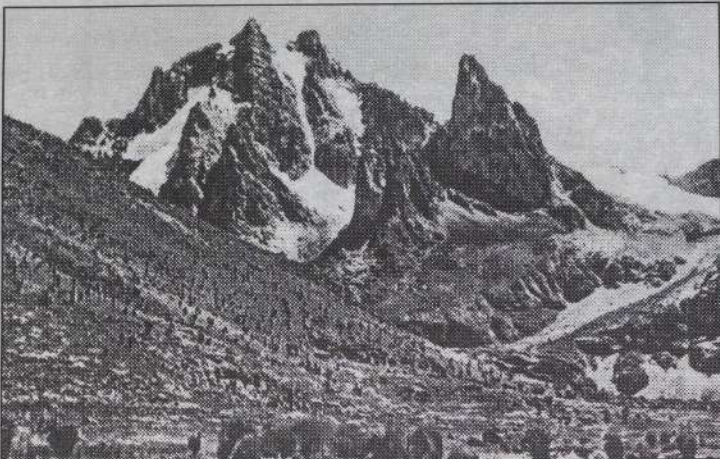
"But don't worry, this is quite normal on such a mountain.

"Console yourself with the thought that most of the others with you are feeling the same way, and often worse ... and that it can't go on forever".

But it does ...

AFTER A GOOD night's rest and hot breakfast it is time to watch the nearby campers chasing off avaricious vervet and curious colobus monkeys who have 'volunteered to assist' in disposing of any unwanted food.

Then on up the mountain and along the actual path, a wide swath

eventually became 'KENYA' - names for both the mountain and the country.

Apart from enjoying its numerous and entertaining facilities guests at Naro Moru River Lodges should make a point of meeting General Manager James Mbugua.

Ebullient, charming and well-informed, he is a mine of invaluable information about climbing the mountain.

He has been up many times on all the different routes and his local knowledge of the weather and

Richard Mugo has lived on and off the mountain for 17 years - on average climbing up to 'Point Lenana' three times a month.

He was to prove "an ever present help in times of trouble ..." and a source of constant inspiration.

At each night stop there was also a capable cook - who prepared warm and nutritious meals: going strong on soups and hot carbohydrates.



of deep, soggy, tramped mud, well marked with painted stakes to the dreaded 'vertical bog'.

Usually unpleasantly wet and messed up with buffalo tracks this can take up to three hours of very hard pushing and uphill stumbling.

At last onto the moorland and the first few glimpses of snow-covered Mount Kenya - performing an elegant sort of 'strip-tease' in the clouds, never fully revealing anything of interest, but always promising a little more.

The increasingly spare vegetation is now characterised by shrubs with small leaves, exotic heather, numerous alpine flowers, tussock grass, sedge, aromatic herb plants and sugar bush.

A couple more hours of heavy trudging and we are into the Teleki Valley, lined with Giant Groundsel, Giant Lobelia and carduus (giant thistle).

There are still a few birds, including a mountain owl; also the first of eventually numerous and very furry rock hyrax.

'NARO MORU RIVER LODGE' - ALLIANCE

OWNED and operated by the famous Alliance Hotels group on the Kenya South Coast, NARO MORU RIVER LODGE is the three-star rated base for climbing Mount Kenya.

Services and facilities include trout fishing, heated swimming pool, lawn tennis, squash, table tennis, horse back riding, sauna and mountain bikes.

However, what the lodge really specialises in are 'all-inclusive safaris' both up and around the mountain.

A Lodge spokesman explains:

"We cater to the needs of a range of visitors, from the nature admirer who simply wants to have leisurely day around the Lodge or a day hike to explore the unique forest of the lower slopes of the mountain - hoping to have that glimpse of the summits:

"To the more ambitious technical climber who wishes to have a go at the twin summits of Batian and Nelion."

Current offers from Naro Moru include:

- Mount Kenya Day Trip - (a relaxing walk up to 13,500 feet)
- Aberdare Mountain Day Trek (a walk and then picnic on 'Ol Donyo El Satuma' - at 13,120 feet the highest point on the nearby Aberdare range)

- Three-Day Foot Safari up Mount Kenya (minimum expedition for those wanting to climb Point Lenana)

- Four-day Foot Safari up Mount Kenya (for those seeking a more leisurely climb to Point Lenana)

- Five-Day Circumnavigation of Mount Kenya (scaling 'Point Lenana' and taking in the mountain scenery from all sides)

- Five-day Sirimon Trek (crossing over from one side to the other and taking in Point Lenana)

- Seven-day Timau Trek (a leisurely crossing, including Point Lenana, and much moorland walking).

Naro Moru River Lodge has its own 'Mountain Store' which can provide all necessary gear - from climbing boots to sleeping bags.

GENERAL INFORMATION:

Accommodation at Naro Moru River Lodge ranges from fullboard chalets to mountain climbers' 'bunkhouse' and camping ground.

"Full board guests enjoy our attractive modern chalets, built with local materials and located near our private trout stream."

Self-service log cabins are available for parties from town to seven: ideal for families and those wishing to prepare their own meals.

Cooking and dining facilities as well as bathroom and WC.

Self-service clients can still eat at restaurant, have use of the outdoor grill.

Climbers' bunk houses are wooden bunks and foam mattress cooking area, showers and WC.

The campsite, located adjacent to the lodge, shares the same facilities.

The lodge restaurant features cuisine with friendly service and atmosphere.

The open air grill at lunch time evenings are a big attraction.

HOW TO GET THERE

The Naro Moru River Lodge is 170 kms. (105 miles) from Nairobi, from the main Nairobi road adjacent to Naro Moru Town.

There are regular bus services from Nairobi and Nanyuki. Arrangements for clients to be transported to the lodge.

CLIMBING in the dark is a good thing - because if you could actually see where your 'guide' is leading up across the ice and volcanic rubble there is a strong possibility that common sense would immediately prevail and you would abandon the whole project!

(In fact at this point one of our party, exhausted, frozen and tired, did actually turn back and head home for the security of a still warm sleeping bag way down at 4,300 metres).

Your pulse rate compares favourably with an outboard engine, your breathing comes out in staggered gasps, and thankfully, just before dawn you reach 'Top Hut' at 4,700 metres.

Again the question is asked: 'Why and what on earth are we doing up at this hour and at this height?'

But after some warming tea Richard Mugo has his team up for the final assault on 'Point Lenana' just a few hundreds metres further up above the nearby Lewis Glacier.

Due to unusual climatic conditions the snow had frozen solid into a slab of ice along the climbing edge of the Lewis Glacier and instead of a slow walk up the side our party had to use an ice-axe and cut steps up for almost 100 metres.

It also meant some very 'hairy' moments of real-life rock climbing - one is encouraged to firmly grasp the mountain side at this point, as there is sheer drop of almost 1,000 metres on the 'off' side.

This was hard and difficult and delayed our actual arrival on 'Point Lenana' by almost an hour.

Here at 4,985 metres it was still very cold but most of us managed to remove some of our disparate head-gear to enable the mandatory photographs.

Extraordinary views over and across the mountain, right on to the Aberdares, Nairobi, the Ngong Hills, Ukambani and then a huge sweep of yellow and brown over towards Isiolo and Northern Kenya.

EVERYTHING GETS much easier when you are scrambling down hill, in fact we made 'Teleki Lodge' in just an hour and were back down the mountain in time for a late lunch at the Meteorological Station and supper (and a warm bath) at Naro Moru River Lodge.

Worn out muscles, tired features, stiff legs: you promise yourself 'Never Again!'

Later that evening you meet up with mountain veteran James Mbugua who consoles you:

"Women often tell me that Climbing Mount Kenya is just like experiencing child birth ..."

"God knows why we do it ...
 "But we keep doing it ... again ... and again."

(At this stage I was absolutely, completely and thoroughly exhausted - I couldn't have cared less whether there were blue whales mating in the mountain streams ...)

Seven hours heavy and difficult walking concludes with our arrival at 'Teleki Lodge' - similar to the Meteorological Station but now at 4,300 metres (and gaining ...)

THIS IS where the value of a good guide comes in: at the insistence of Richard Mugo we are virtually frog-marched out of the welcoming hospitality of the of the Lodge to undergo a further 90 minutes walk to 'acclimatise' for the next day.

Richard has promised rare and unusual sights!

After a nourishing hot meal and while still at rest it is very, very difficult to show any energy or enthusiasm for the out doors - whatever the attraction.

However, half an hour later, with the sun setting in the West, we make one final short safari a further

600 meters along the Teleki Valley ... and as you round the corner ... there it is!

The full, snow-covered Mount Kenya, awash in brilliant orange and pink sunlight, towering up above you, just hundreds and hundreds of metres of black rock and blue ice.

It is, quite frankly, a religious moment: similar to walking into a huge Gothic cathedral and staring up into the stained glass windows.

So quiet, so much bewildering 'gravitas', such beauty, such mystery, such calm.

You really can feel that special presence of 'Nga!' high up on his mountain holding up the evening sky.

AN EARLY MORNING approach on 'Point Lenana' means being dressed and ready to leave the warmth and comfort of the Teleki Lodge* at 3.00 a.m.

Swaddled in a heavy vest, two full sets of long-legged and long-sleeved thermal under-wear, three

pairs of thick woollen stockings, two woollen pull-overs, a padded down under-jacket, a water-proof windjacket, woollen cap, a woollen 'balaclava' head cover, heavy mountain boots and two sets of gloves (woollen inners), climbers take on a distinctly balloon-like appearance - very large and clumsy!

Tramping mainly 'up' and then along the frozen scree it becomes very, very ... seriously COLD!

(At times, even down to minus 15° C (0° F)!)!

There is one saving grace: a simply star-spangled sky.

A sparkling Jupiter lights up the bottom end of the Teleki Valley, while overhead a string of beautifully brilliant constellations -

Andromeda with *Cassiopeia*, *Perseus*, the *Pleiades* star necklace, then *Taurus* and finally *Orion*, with its two brightest companions, *Sinus* and (just before dawn) *Canopus* lighting up the Southern heavens and softly reflected in the white snow.

"Our safaris are demanding and if you are not physically fit, you will not enjoy them.

"Start a fitness training programme at least one month before your safari.

"Running, swimming, cycling and stair climbing are all good ways of toning up muscles"

SEASONS FOR CLIMBING:

Best climbing sessions are from Mid-December to mid-March and from Mid-June through to the end of September.

These traditional climbing periods are the most predictable, however the chances of encountering good weather on the mountain are equal throughout the year - so the timing of a safari is not critical.

GUIDES AND PORTERS:

Professional local staff provide quality service on all safaris.

FOOD ON THE MOUNTAIN:

Because of the difficulties in obtaining dehydrated or special 'mountain' foods in Kenya, all meals are either fresh or tinned produce.

"For our longer safaris our groups are re-rationed with fresh food by porters.

"Each of our mountain guides serves an apprenticeship in the lodge kitchen."

ESSENTIAL ADVICE:

Mountain climbing may be hazardous to your health, but not necessarily so ... just remember one thing: do not underestimate Mount Kenya.

It is a very serious and potentially dangerous mountain. People have died on Mount Kenya either from technical climbing accidents, getting lost and suffering from 'exposure', and finally from a high altitude ailment known as 'Pulmonary Oedema'.

Best to follow the simple rules:

"Pole Pole" (Swahili for 'go slowly'), take time to acclimatise, eat well, drink lots of fluids - tea is considered 'Dawaya Miima' (Swahili for 'medicine of the mountain'.)

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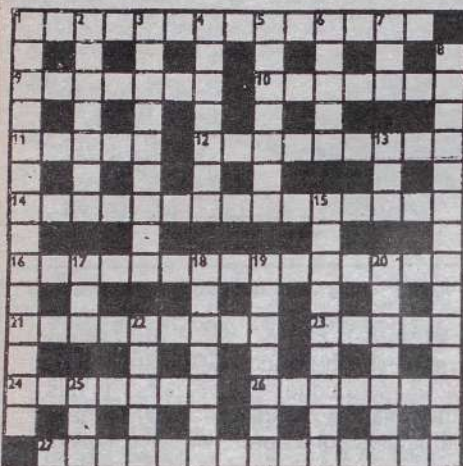

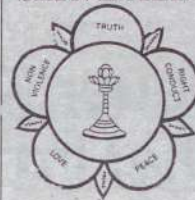

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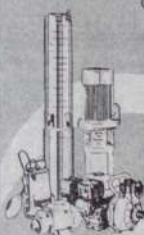
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Four Classes Take First Four Places In Mug
