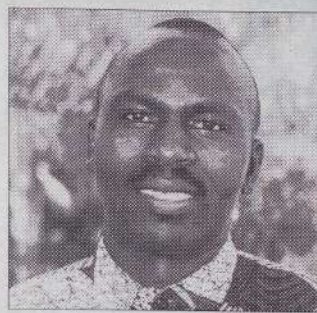

## KWETU - New Training Centre For Sustainable Development At Coast

ASK ANYONE of goodwill whether it is better to give the needy a hand out or the means to earn a living and the answer is blindingly obvious.

The problem is that for most people the only way they can help is by giving a street child 5/- or an unemployed school leaver a Saturday job washing the family for example.

Fortunately Ulrike Neubert does not fall in the same category as "most people".

She starts off with the advantage of being the Director of the German Institute in Mombasa.

She has another advantage in being one of the initiators of the "Women's Network" centre in Mombasa.

With such experience it was easy for her to see the possibilities in a piece of land along Mtwapa Creek when it came up for sale.

She bought it and set about the lengthy - and from most people's perspective - wearying job of turning it into a holistic small holding which would not only give employment to the

unemployed, but would also through the involvement of the newly employed, spread new techniques (organic farming, solar cooking, fruit and vegetable drying, marine farming) among the coastal population.

So it was that 'KWETU - a training centre for sustainable development' was formed in September '96.

### Special Report By Correspondent

Finding ten bright, unemployed school leavers to start the scheme was the easy bit.

Funding it is more difficult.

Hopefully once Kwetu starts selling its produce it will be self sustaining.

The initial stages of oyster and prawn farming has been completed, as has organic farming.

Solar cookers of improved design have been made by the students, and sold, but the most promising line to bring in the much needed cash very soon, lies in food processing.

Jams and preserves are made from organically produced fruits and a new line, which is on sale to the public by now, is solar dried fruits.

These Solar dried fruits - which include tomatoes - are an ideal way of utilising fruit when there is an over abundance.

Not only are they extremely tasty, but they contain no artificial preservatives and so are much more nutritious than factory produced dried fruits.

KWETU hopes to teach these techniques to the local communities as well as finding a source of income for itself.

Herbs, some of them widely known in Europe and elsewhere, some indigenous to the East African Coast, are on sale too for culinary or medicinal use.

There is a lot more going on at KWETU apart from the acquiring of practical skills.

It has to do with developing a sense of responsibility among the young, teaching them self respect and self reliance.

All qualities which future employers will appreciate; these are the qualities which will give hope to those who at the moment live in despair of ever improving their lives.

Chris told guests 'times are not very funny at the moment and the hardest task in my 22 years with Alliance Hotels was to send some 300 staff home because of the dramatic drop in business.

Here in Kenya 'he explained 'there is no unemployment benefit and with so many unemployed jobs are hard to find'.

Among the guests were some who usually stay at Africana Sea Lodge, said Mr. Modigell 'it will re-open on December 1st'.

The Chairman took the opportunity of assuring the Deputy PC that 'our association and other industry stake-holders fully appreciate the effort of the government in bringing about calm to the coast region'.

However, he went on 'we all must assist in putting tourism back on its two feet again' and suggested that in mass education programmes and Barazas tourism needs and benefits should be fully explained and understood by the local people.

The chairman noted that the Kenya coast attracts around 70 per cent of the country's tourist traffic income.

560 hotels offered some 35,000 beds, as well as about the same

number of job opportunities.

Related industries, he said, account for an additional workforce of some 120,000, explaining that each employee is possibly the 'breadwinner' of an average of six dependants per family.

# Roundabouts That Start Moving In The Night

THE ROADS in our town continue to get worse.

There is nothing that can be done in the short term to repair them, even temporarily.

The amount of water falling from the sky will not allow any meaningful work.

It is thus up to road users to make the best use of whatever is left of the road and its verges. A little courtesy won't hurt (as the advert says).

Bulish behaviour will cause a lot of harm and injury according to what Kachumbari found out. A chap had passed the Changamwe roundabout in the early morning recently and was driving past the shops in his slightly ageing Corolla.

The area has recently taken a pounding as all traffic that would normally use Refinery road has diverted to the Magongo Road as a result of the large lake that has developed near the Kenya container Terminal premises.

The road has seen the growth of such large potholes that even the drivers of the very large articulated vehicles slow down lest they damage the suspension of the vehicle.

I witnessed an articulated lorry grounding its suspension as it slowly entered one really serious pothole.

The fellow driving past the shopping centre must have been new to the area since, as Kachumbari told me, he stayed on the left of the road and kept slowing down to navigate his way through potholes.

## CHANGAMWE

The more seasoned drivers knew where the potholes were and were weaving their way along the road without reducing speed in the manner most of us are accustomed to.

A large bus was approaching from the opposite direction and the driver also appeared to be new to the route.

He however learned very quickly to appreciate the size of the potholes after being admonished by his passengers when he hit a few big ones and shook the passengers to the bone.

From his vantage point he was able to discern the approach of

potholes better than someone in a saloon car.

As the bus driver was approaching the Changamwe shopping centre, he suddenly realised that what had appeared to

be a pool of water was in fact one of the mega potholes on that section of road.

It happened to be on the left side of the road stretching from the edge of the road inwards.

He swerved to the right to avoid getting into the pothole without really considering oncoming traffic.

The bus blocked the way of the Corolla and the driver of the car had no time to take evasive action and rammed into the right front side of the bus.

The small vehicle was almost totally written off by the accident.

This shows discourteous behaviour on the road.

It is still a jungle out there where size is what matters most and rules are ignored.

Why do drivers guide their vehicles to the opposite lane when the vehicle that should be there by right is occupying the lane?

Why do matatus always seem to stop at the point on the road where there is a large pothole on the opposite lane so that one cannot overtake?

There are a lot of drivers who should be taken to see a shrink.

We know that people's psyche changes the minute they are behind a steering wheel, but the changes that happen to Kenyan drivers is beyond comprehension.

It also raises the question, once again, of the cost to the national economy of badly maintained infrastructure.

As we have said before, it is not merely the fact that the potholes are eyesores and an inconvenience.

It is not also because people get washed with muddy water and

garbage gets ground into a thick slurry like soup which fills the potholes and every possible drainage system so that it clogs.

The cost in terms of the additional time it takes to get to places is unnecessary.

The increased cost of maintenance to personal and commercial vehicles is unnecessary.

The reduced number of visitors leading to reduced income is unnecessary.

The list is long.

Yet those charged with keeping the infrastructure in good condition get away with

it.

They earn their daily bread fairly or otherwise.

Just as the pothole is like the

small sore that symbolises that all is not well with the body, the issue of accountability is a thorny one that needs careful diagnosis and treatment.

The crumbling infrastructure caused Kachumbari to have a rather embarrassing experience recently.

He had been at one of the local joints in Kisauni cracking a few cold ones with some friends he had not met in along time.

As is typical at the moment, it started raining in mid evening and it continued till late into the night.

About closing time, it occurred to Kachumbari that he would have to drop his mates as the matatus had ceased to operate for fear that they would have to negotiate big lakes on the old Malindi road that runs through Kisauni.

He offered to drop them off in Kiembeni where they lived.

He was shown a very convoluted route to where these fellows lived that he was not sure he would find his way out again.

He was however able to get back onto the main road outside the estate.

As he drove along in the rain, he saw a dark patch on the road which he first thought to be a patch of water.

As he approached he saw that it was roundish and appeared to have some height above the road surface. He decided he would travel round the apparent mound in the road.

The minute he started to steer round it, the mound came to life and started to move in all directions.

He had to quickly stop and take stock of his own situation.

He was convinced that he had not had too much to drink and that he was not going bonkers.

On close examination he found that the moving mound was in fact a herd of goats that had huddled down for the night in what used to be a roundabout on the road.

Some bits of the original kerb were still there so they all slept inside the kerb.

Because of the close breeding that tends to happen in town goats, most of the herd were a dark colour.

He continued on his way home once his heartbeat slowed down.

As Kachumbari says, driving in Kenya must be one of the most enriching experiences that any driver on the continent can have!

SINCE THE bridges along the road to Lunga Lunga North and South of Shimoni peninsula collapsed due to the flooding of all coastal streams in Southern Kenya, the inhabitants of Shimoni have been cut off from any supplies.

## 'ECO<sup>2</sup>TERRA International' Assisting Mzizima Flood Victims Near Shimoni

Though the local authorities worked hard and succeeded to build three temporary crossings between Msambweni and Ramisi,

the major bridge crossing the Ramisi River still cannot be used by any vehicle, since repair works on the bridge are quite difficult.

People of the peninsula began to suffer very seriously, after much of their stored food supplies and staple food crops like maize and cassava were destroyed by torrential rains.

While Shimoni itself could receive some relief food, brought in by Kenya Navy, the smaller villages in the central part of the peninsula are difficult to reach due to the cut road links and the swallow sea.

"ECO<sup>2</sup>TERRA International" in close co-operation with the local authorities and with additional funding received from the French Government for the victims of the Kenya floods, have succeeded now to bring relief to the most vulnerable people of Fikirini area in Mzizima Sub-Location.

### RELIEF FOOD

In a specific operation during the whole last week, the relief food was brought in by lorry to Bodo on the coast and then transported by boats which could reach through

the shallow sea to Mwazaro.

From there the food was distributed to the most affected people of Tswaka area: Fikirini, Mwambao, Kiwambale, Mkuyuni, Kidimu and Nguniyu.

More than 2000 women and children as well as the elderly and sick people could benefit from assistance, which had started only three days after the request was received.

In separate statements to the French Embassy in Nairobi, the District Officer of Msambweni Division, Mr. Nyule Ngumbao, as

well as the local chief, Mr. Faisal A. Mohammed, thanked the Government of France for the generous support, which helped "ECO<sup>2</sup>TERRA International" to implement the assistance so successfully.

While DO Ngumbao and Chief Faisal praised the enduring efforts of "ECO<sup>2</sup>TERRA International" to assist the needy people in the most remote and difficult areas, Chief Faisal stated:

"Everybody was happy on the scene".

However, "ECO<sup>2</sup>TERRA International" spokesperson Rosemary Wangari expressed concern over the future food security of the area since most of the cassava tubers are rotting and not much is left to bridge the gap until the harvest of the freshly planted maize.

THE NEW rule for British Passport holder entering Kenya was received with shock by many in the industry both here and abroad.

Among them were Fred Finn, the most travelled man in the world, and Chris Modigell, Group General Manager, Alliance Hotels - both dedicated to the promotion of Kenya's tourism industry which until recently had been the country's largest earner of foreign exchange.

Both were heading for the World Travel Market in London to help resuscitate tourism which had slumped dramatically following the outbreak of tribal violence unrest on the Kenya coast.

Such were the exaggerated reports about it in the press and on television that they scared tourists away resulting in about 50 per cent drop in bookings with tour

operators having to drastically reduce the number of charter seats (about 13,000) into Kenya for this 'winter' season.

With the co-operation of hoteliers, 'special offers' were made while several leading tour operators were quick to invite travel agents here to see for themselves that Kenya remains a peaceful and lovely holiday destination, just as before.

With hotels, much emptier, hoteliers have been doing their best to survive while a few have closed.

Some 5,000 workers have either been laid off or sent on a compulsory leave.

The industry is in urgent need of assistance from government and the Mombasa and Coast Tourist Association, Kenya Association of Hotelkeepers' and Caterers and Kenya Association of Tour Operators have suggested to government a moratorium of at least six months on all tax collection, inclusive of VAT, telephone and electricity charges with immediate effect.

Tourism related industries also have all been very seriously affected.

Consequently there were high hopes at the World Travel Market much could be achieved in putting Kenya's tourist industry back on its feet again, and repairing the country's tarnished image.

Then just two days before the opening of the World Travel Market, came the government's announcement requiring British passport holders entering the country from Nov. 15 to have Visas.

With a single entry at £40 per person - the cost of a holiday here has shot up as tour operators endeavour to attract tourists back with 'special (cheaper) offers'.

### BAD TIMING

It could not have come at a worse time. Declared Chris Modigell 'such a Visa requirement by British passport holders right now is absolutely ridiculous'.

Added Fred Finn 'my feeling is that, if possible it should be dropped immediately'.

It means that a family of four with a holiday already booked will have to stump up an extra £160.

Fred Finn is not only much travelled but brings many holiday,

incentive and conference groups to Kenya and has his own travel programme 'Finn's Destinations' on TV.

He writes travel articles, a recent one appearing in Signature magazine, and films about Kenya - his latest seen on ITV being about Alliance Hotels.

He revealed that he had an 88-strong group coming to Kenya in February.

As it will now cost them an extra £3,520 in Visa fees, he doubts if they will come.

Continuing Mr. Finn said 'England is the most competitive travel market in the world, offering the most destinations, but if a family of four have each to pay £40 extra to come here they will quite probably go elsewhere, like Florida'.

Tour Operators in the UK have voiced their disappointment and of being 'utterly aghast' at this Visa requirement, and suggests that it be re-considered.

Said the chairman of Mombasa and Coast Tourists Association, Najib Balala 'this Visa requirement could not have come at a worse time when tourism and related industries, have been badly hit.

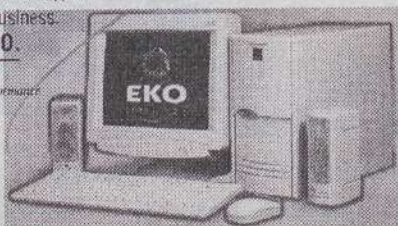

guest to Kenya who's confidence in the country could not be easily undermined by the negative publicity as witnessed in the European Press.

He appealed Mr. Santi to help counter the negative publicity by giving the correct account to his television station viewers.

## "It Is Up To Local Journalists" To Counter 'Bad International Publicity' About Kenya

KENYAN journalists could play a key role in promoting the local tourism industry which is currently experiencing low occupancy due to bad publicity on the country by the international media.

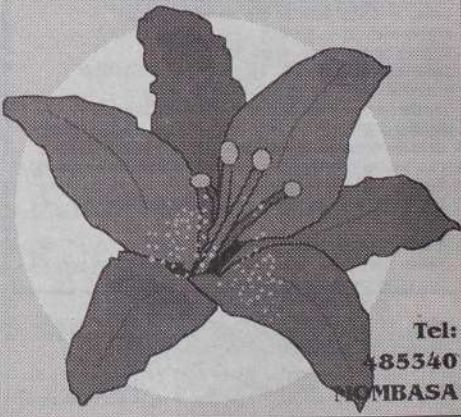

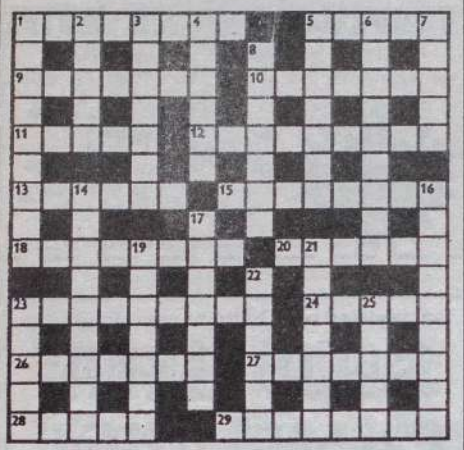
