Export Process Zones Are The Future - Mturi

A GREAT DEAL of effort is needed to bring the operations of the Kilindini Port to satisfactory levels of performance and eventually to world class status, says new KPA chairman Jonathan Mturi.

"There is need to establish EPZs and export oriented IDAs in the Coast Province with optimised planning and provision of infrastructure and services. The proposed Dongo Kundu EPZ on the southwestern mainland of the port and the connecting road and rail fixed crossing across Mwache Creek was envisaged and planned with fully optimised logistical arrangements in mind."

Its wide-ranging report entitled: "Logistical Implications In The Development And Operation Of Export Processing Zones: Opportunities For

Global trading, globalised shipping, electronic commerce and seamless transport facilitated by containerisation, have brought about many new expectations in the market place.

Investment In The Coast Province'

Mr Mturi goes on to suggest: Kenya's vision for attaining a Newly Industrialised Country (NIC) status by the year 2020 is an export driven process.

This process will be closely related to and affected by global trends in trading and shipping.

As the world has become a 'global village' global trading is the order of the day and the trend will even be more intensified in the next millennium.

Global traders source raw materials and unassembled components from various parts of the world to selected locations where finished goods are manufactured or assembled for

final distribution.

This process has been helped considerably by globalised shipping and advanced information technology to create locational and logistical advantages which go beyond the traditional concept of locational economics in manufacturing production.

GLOBAL TRADE

The modern Export processing Zones (EPZs) are based on the advantages of these new processes.

Global trading, globalised shipping, electronic commerce and seamless transport facilitated by containerisation, have brought about new demands and expectations in the market place.

The port of Mombasa will play a pivotal and vital role in the export driven process of Kenya's industrialisation and the EPZs and other export oriented Industrial Development Areas (IDAs) will be key prime movers in this process.

In this respect Kenya as an industrial or investment location will be competing among other countries trying to attract international investors.

Investment opportunities in the Coast Province must also be seen in this light.

Apart from the King'orani Export Processing Zone there has so far been no serious effort towards the establishment of fully fledged EPZs in the Coast Province.

Generally the majority of EPZs in the world are located in and around seaports.

This also reflects the fact that over 70 per cent of the world international trade is transported by sea.

Logistically the Coast Province is a place of possibilities and potential rather than actual

opportunities.

Mombasa is currently served by a total of 19 shipping lines offering regular and frequent liner services to worldwide destinations.

The port of Mombasa has been performing rather poorly in recent years.

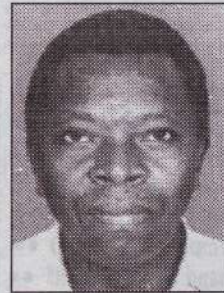
A great deal of effort is needed to bring the operations of the port to satisfactory levels of performance and eventually to world class status.

There is need to establish EPZs and export oriented IDAs in the Coast Province with optimised planning and provision of infrastructure and services.

The proposed Dongo Kundu EPZ on the southwestern mainland of the port and the connecting road and rail fixed crossing across Mwache Creek was envisaged and planned with fully optimised logistical arrangements in mind.

It should also be considered feasible to plan and establish EPZs and IDAs anywhere within a 60 kilometer radius of the port of Mombasa and achieve quite efficient logistical arrangements.

There is plenty of suitable land in both Kwale and Kilifi Districts.

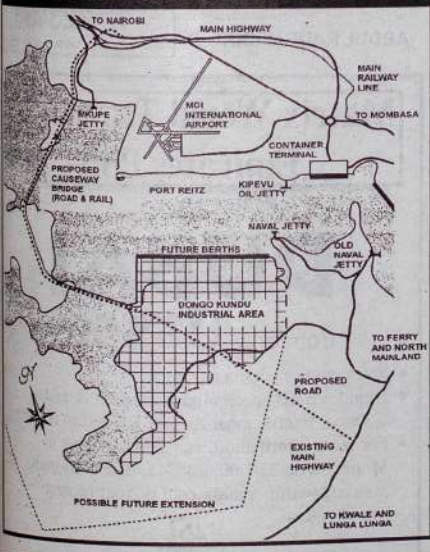

Re-Opened 'Refinery Road' Is The Perfect Example Of Job Well Done

THE WORLD Bank aided roads rehabilitation projects slated for Mombasa and the Coastal are in progress.

Some are going on full blast whilst some are stalled due to the usual suspicions surrounding the circumstances under which the work started.

For most of us it is business as usual. Some of the work is excellent whilst the rest leaves doubts as to the longevity of the remedies applied.

We have always spoken against recarpeting of roads in this column.

Time and time again we have been shown to be correct in our concern.

The culprits here are not the people who apply the tar but those who tell them to.

Recarpeting of roads is purely cosmetic and is unlikely to last beyond the first drops of rain unless painstaking care is taken to repair the substrate.

Filling potholes immediately prior to recarpeting will not help.

The most common fault is to repair the roads without repairing the drainage.

This fundamental fact is ignored over and over again and it results

in throwing good money away as the roads deteriorate under the attack by floodwaters and

vehicles, especially heavy commercial vehicles.

An example of good work done is the recently re-opened Refinery road.

Most of those who work in the area had abandoned the road due to the deep pond halfway down the road.

The pond was so deep that even intrepid adventurers in safari prepared four wheel drives would not dare venture into the water.

Though the work was painstakingly slow, the end result has been worth the wait for those who have had to endure the matabu madness and pothole menace on the Magongo road.

The drainage has been properly rebuilt (well, along most of the road at least) and this should

auger well for the life of the thoroughfare.

However, the longevity of the road will depend on the maintenance of the drainage and the correct usage of the road.

As is the case for all refurbishment works, maintenance of the facilities is paramount.

Local authorities in this country have to rise above the mantle of political winners to become and be seen as service providers.

There are bodies willing to put monies in to rehabilitate the infrastructure.

However, our Town Fathers must rise above looking over their shoulders and look straight ahead at the task they have offered themselves to do.

The responsibility for the maintenance of the facilities and the well being of the urbanites is theirs.

That people sacrifice a part of their hard earned cash to pay for such facilities and amenities means that they must demand to see the services expected.

Kenyans are becoming more and more voluble what they expect for whatever they put in.

The volume of the demands and expectations will increase as wananchi feel the pinch of having to provide things they expected to be provided by the Town Fathers.

Over the next few months, the road repair programme will be seen in many parts of the town.

As a sign of responsible leadership, wananchi will hope

that regular drainage maintenance and area cleansing is to follow behind the rehabilitation programme.

Whatever the cost of this service that should normally be provided, it must be made available if only to show that the Town Fathers are sensitive to the changing needs and aspiration of the populace.

A new fad that is sweeping through most service providers is that of "stakeholder consultation" and "capacity building".

A lot of time is spent on these activities which are looking to the future prospects of being able to sustain whatever plans are being put into place now.

Whilst involving the local populace is welcome, those people paid by the monies wananchi provide have also got to be sensitised or bullied into their current responsibilities.

These they must carry out in a cost-effective manner to win back the confidence that whatever future plans they have will work.

For the commuting mwananchi a smooth uncluttered road will be the best gift they can be given to signify the Town Fathers' seriousness to service.

As Kachumbari says, one wants a clean lean town.

THE FOUR Nations LG Tournament held recently in Nairobi was by far the best the Kenya Cricket Association has ever organised, notching a mark for Kenya in international cricketing circles.

This is the third year that the Association have put up a world class tournament much to the excitement and enjoyment of cricket fans in and around Nairobi.

However, the performances put up by South Africa, India, Zimbabwe and especially the young Kenyans on the Nairobi Gymkhana cricket field, surpassed even that of the World Cup held in England earlier this year thrilling Kenyan cricket fans.

Despite losing all their matches the Kenyan team has improved and matured and improved tremendously in the last three years, and if they continue in the same direction then I am sure we will see a very strong and able team by the next World Cup.

In a thrilling see-saw final watched by a jam packed crowd, South Africa were the eventual winners, beating India by a mere 26 runs.

Winning the toss, Indian captain Ajay Jadeja correctly put in South Africa to bat on a wicket that promised to be a batsman's joy during the latter part of the day.

Opening bowlers Venkatesh Prasad and Debasis Mohanty and the outstanding Indian fielding did an excellent job of restricting the South Africans to 37 for 3 by the 15th over, taking the very important wickets of opening batsman Lance Klusener (bowled by Mohanty for a duck in the second over), Jacques Kallis and Jonty Rhodes (caught by Saurav Ganguly off Prasad for a duck).

Captain Hansie Cronje then set up a hard hitting partnership of 78 with opener batsman Herschelle

Gibbs (who had survived two very close run outs).

A change of bowlers and the bowling sides at almost every over did nothing to restrict the onslaught of the South African batsmen, who despite not having very high individual scores managed to finish off at 235 for nine.

Gibbs, whose 84, which included six fours and three sixes (this despite a foot injury and vomiting) earned him the Man of the Match award, Cronje (39 off 41 deliveries), Derek Crookes (25 off 28) and Shaun Pollock (23 off 24, not out) were the main scorers for South Africa.

Of the bowlers Venkatesh Prasad (10-5-21-2) and young debutant V. Bhardwaj (8-34-11-3), the latter was very rightly adjudged Man of the Tournament showed their mettle while the rest of the bowling side failed to click.

Chasing a reasonable target, the Indian batsmen just never found their ground, with wickets falling very regularly despite some crucial fielding errors by the South Africans.

Openers Sadagopan Ramesh (8) and Saurav Ganguly (10) were gone by the eighth overs.

Rahul Dravid made a painstaking 30 off 65 deliveries.

Wicketkeeper M. S. K. Prasad, who has earned himself a place in the Indian squad with his fine antics behind and in front of the stumps, scored a reasonable 63 off 90.

Prasad had to be helped off the

field half way through his batting due to injury, but came back on to try and salvage the Indian innings.

At this stage the Indians

bowlers, with commendable figures coming from Derek Crookes (9-0-47-3), Shaun Pollock (9-0-28-2) and Lance Klusener (7-0-33-2).

This year, as a first, the KCA had invited local and foreign press journalists from leading newspapers of all the playing countries to which there was a positive response.

A special Press Box was put up, complete with a business centre, extra telephone lines and electrical connections to enable the reporters send their articles on the super highway to their bases back home.

All the journalists present commended the set up and organisation by KCA, despite minor hitches which are common in all first time events.

A spokesman for the KCA has promised that they will definitely learn and make amends from whatever shortfalls present this

time, for their future events.

The only other major drawback in this tournament was the failure by Kenya Broadcasting Corporation to televise these matches live.

One could only watch the matches on television of one had a satellite and subscribed to Zee-T.V.

This is out of the reach of the majority of Kenyans and especially for those living outside Nairobi, it was quite a disappointment.

I am sure it would have been enjoyable for all interested Kenyans to have been able to at least watch those matches played by Kenya and the final live, which in turn would have generated more interest in the game for others too.

I was present in Nairobi for the India-Zimbabwe game and the final and I tried to obtain a short interview of the Indian captain in the two days that I was there.

Unfortunately there was a communication barrier and it was not possible to even speak to him.

From the little that I saw, both teams (but more so the Indians) were mobbed by supporters for autographs and photos wherever they went.

This meant that in between games, practice sessions and so on, so much time was wasted, that I wonder if they ever got enough rest or enough time to plan strategies and so on.

Perhaps the KCA should have arranged half of one of the off days so that cricket fans could have an equal opportunity to meet their favourite cricketers and take pictures with them in a more organised manner.

However, a lot of credit goes to the KCA appointed facilitators of the two teams, namely Zafeer Deen (India) and Sanjay Suchak (South Africa) who did an excellent job of looking after their teams, right down to their baggage (unfortunately I did not get a chance to observe the other team facilitator so cannot comment).

A huge pat on the back for KCA for their hard work, excellent planning, organisation and a tournament very well hosted.

KCA is now in the midst of planning a trip for the Kenyan team to India sometime early next year, while they will definitely be sending a team to the Youth World Cup in Sri Lanka, again early next year.

Kenya will also be hosting the Africa Cup in Nairobi, some time in February which will include development teams from South Africa, Zimbabwe, Kenya, Namibia and Uganda among others.

More cricket will be in store for fans in March when we will again host the Eight Nation Tournament with Kenya, Holland, Ireland, Scotland, Bermuda, Canada, U.S.A. and Namibia.

If this happens it will adversely affect the business presently being promoted by African Horizons as bookings start increasing.

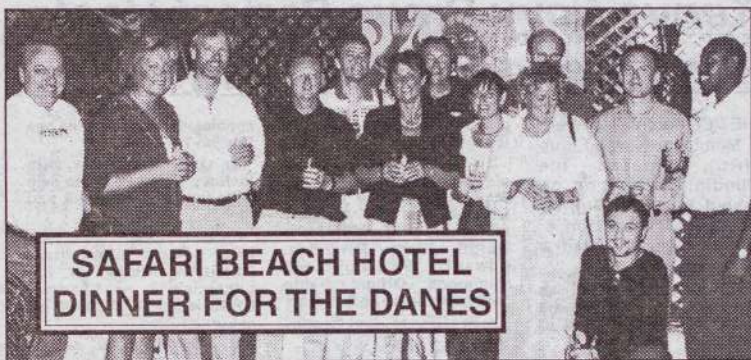
'Since writing this article it has been confirmed that Kenya Airways will stop operating their weekly direct flight from Copenhagen as from April 28, 2000.

LIONS WORLD SIGHT FIRST DAY

Lion Clubs International marks the World Sight-First day to redouble efforts to fight against blindness. Sight is a God given sense and it is a right for all human beings to enjoy good vision. Sight is vital for normal enjoyment of life. While we mark the Lions World Sight-First Day we would like to enlighten the public in general some of the causes of blindness in our Country.

MAJOR CAUSES OF BLINDNESS

The major causes of blindness in Kenya and the majority of developing countries are;

- (1) Cataracts
- (2) Glaucoma
- (3) Trachoma
- (4) Corneal Scars
- (5) Nutritional blindness

Other causes of blindness such as blindness arising from Diabetes Mellitus and injuries are now increasing in this country.

CATARACTS

Opacification of the ocular lens is referred to as cataract. Opacification of the ocular lens is a normal process of ageing (SENILE CATARACTS). However a child may be born with cataracts (CONGENITAL CATARACTS) and may occur in childhood and juveniles (DEVELOPMENTAL CATARACTS). Cataracts are also associated with some diseases like Diabetes and abnormal concentration of calcium in the blood. Some medicines may also cause cataracts. Cataracts causes blindness by preventing light from entering the eye. Cataracts are major cause of blindness in our country. However cataracts are treatable by surgical operation.

GLAUCOMA

The term Glaucoma is used to describe a disease process in the eye where the pressure inside the eye (Intra-ocular pressure) is increased to exceed the normal accepted level. This increased intra-ocular pressure then damages fibres of the optic nerve gradually. As a result, blindness is very gradual and generally painless. There is an acute form of Glaucoma, which causes severe pain and headache, but the more common is chronic simple glaucoma, which is very gradual and painless. Glaucoma occurs in all ages although it is generally blinding in middle age and old age. Glaucoma is a major cause of blindness World over.

TRACHOMA

Trachoma is a chronic infection of the cornea and conjunctiva of the eye and a truly major cause of blindness in some communities of our country. It presents as follicular inflammation of the conjunctiva and cornea and results in cornea Scars and vascularization and distortion of the eye lids. Distortion of the eye lids results in the eyelashes being in turned (ENTROPION) or out turned (ECTROPION). In-turned lids (ENTROPION) cause constant trauma on the cornea of the eyeball resulting in ulcers and scars. Ectropion causes exposure of the eye and dryness (decalcification). Trachoma is caused by an infection with microorganism called CHLAMYDIA TRACHOMATIS. There are several strains of Chlamydia labelled A,B,C,D through collectively referred to as TRIC agents (Trachoma - inclusion conjunctivitis agents). Some strains of TRIC agents are sexually transmitted therefore causing conjunctivitis in the newborn. The sexually transmitted TRIC agents are health hazard in some communities.

NUTRITIONAL BLINDNESS

The most common form of this blindness is that arising from inadequate intake of Vitamin A. Vitamin A deficiency occurs commonly in the developing world. The most common types of this blindness are XEROPHTHALMIA literally meaning dry eye and KERATOMALACIA denoting melting of the cornea of the eye, the last stages of Xerophthalmia. Vitamin A is abundant in nature. Vitamin A is a fat soluble vitamin commonly found in cod-liver oil, liver of fish, poultry products including eggs, milk and milk products, carrots and majority of dark green leafy vegetables. Vitamin A deficiency occurs at any age but the common ages are 1 to 6 years. The features are those of night blindness, clouding of the cornea of the eye, drying of the eye, cornea ulcers, scarring of the eye and ultimately necrosis of the cornea.

CORNEAL SCARS

Measles is the commonest cause of scars especially in children. Injuries, nutritional causes, trachoma; all may cause scars on the eye leading to blindness. OTHER causes of blindness include Diabetes, hypertensive retinopathy, road traffic accidents, and unattended short and long sight.

LIONS ARE CONQUERING BLINDNESS

Lion Clubs have put themselves on the forefront to fight blindness. Each Lions Club has SIGHT - FIRST programme. These programmes are reported to Lion Clubs International Headquarters. Among the programmes to combat blindness include:

MASS SCREENING: Screening patients during eye camps identifies people with different disease such as glaucoma, cataract, trachoma and nutritional blindness. These are thereafter treated. Treatment is usually free of charge or with minimal charge.

OPERATION: Free cataract operations are conducted either in eye camps or in Lion eye centres. The preferred operation is cataract surgery with intra-ocular lens implantation. Several million surgeries world over are being performed by Lions Clubs.

TREATMENT: Various diseases such as glaucoma, nutritional diseases as Xerophthalmia and Keratomalacia, and trachoma may benefit from medical treatment and counselling. These medicines are normally offered free of charge.

DISTRIBUTION OF GLASSES: Reading glasses are normally distributed in eye camps for those who require them.

DIABETES AWARENESS: Programme helps to educate the masses on diabetes and its effects on the community. Diabetic screening also helps to identify potential victims and prevent blindness.

bunch at Likoni the two Toppers managed to get clear and run away on the second leg.

For the two man boats it was a good spinnaker run back for the first return to Club and Vanguard made the most of it, with some good spinnaker by Neelam Shah they had by Club buoy left more than a hundred metres of clear water between themselves and the other Bosuns.

The 420s had mixed the crews and helms to give training and experience to other sailors, only Samuel Ndaru and Stephen Ogada had stayed together in Mikoni Mingi and the difference was palpable.

They went after the Toppers and Bosuns with a vengeance as the others wallowed in their wake.

Meteorite and Tally-Ho I were the only two Ospreys in the race and by the third mark Tally-Ho I was catching the tail-end Charles'.

They went past Centurion immediately after K1 and fairly flew across the bay only to hit the wind shadow of a large ship and roll over in the water.

Centurion 'poddled' up and passed them as they floundered around in the water trying to right the boat.

Young Teizeen Mohamedali was with Alastair Barnes in Stother and Pitt, she is a try lass and at one point when the boat was up and running fast Teizeen had to brace herself with both feet against one side of the boat and grip the tiller in both arms to keep control.

She looked like she was in a wrestling match instead of a sailing race.

As the tail-enders were coming through the fourth and fifth marks they were amazed to see Free Willy sailed by Faizan Kasmani heading for the seventh mark; right on his heels was Nausheen Mohamedali in Trophy Sieger and nobody else was in sight.

The two toppers had flown over the course and even in the strong wind they stayed upright the whole time.

Only Mikoni Mingi looked like making a race of it with the two toppers, Samuel and Stephen had the 420 on its edge trying to make up lost ground.

At the end it finished exactly like that and the order was: First - F.

Kasmani in Free Willy; Second N. Mohamedali in Trophy Sieger Third - Mikoni Mingi with S. Ndaru and S. Ogada

Walter Brun Fishing Off Baloo Works His Magic On Some Very Fine Sailfish

WITH THE Eye Go Fishing competition coming up on Sunday, it is encouraging to know that good numbers of sailfish were present in Mtwapa waters last week, and it is to be hoped that they will be still present and in a taking mood.



They were being decidedly uncooperative during the week, with several packs seen finning but not taking, but Walter Brun worked some magic on them on Friday and ended with a good catch of four of these fine fish for his boat Baloo.

Another sailfish caught on James Adcock's boat Vuma on the Tuesday was a lifetime first for British angler Jack Nichols, and in a very sporting gesture he agreed to release it, so it was duly tagged and set free to roam the blue waters once again.

Jack was fishing with two other visitors from Britain, Keith Webber and Ian Sutcliffe, and the three of them enjoyed themselves so much that their enthusiasm was rewarded with a bonus day on James Adcock's Sesse canoe, Samvuke, fishing in Mtwapa Creek.

There, fishing with light lines in the area known as Shimo la Tewa, The Hole of the Grouper, they hooked a large fish and fought it

for twenty minutes before the line broke, prompting visions of the legendary giant Tewa of Swahili mythology, a fish so old it is encrusted with barnacles and scarred by epic battles, and so large that sometimes when it rises from the mysterious depths its cavernous jaws engulf swimmers, fishermen, passing canoes.

But some real giants of the sea were closely observed by Nigel Spencer and Neil Reed, when fishing in the Sesse canoe, Tengesi with crewman Kazungu, who first sighted enormous splashes: these turned out to come from two humpback whales, a mother and her calf that jumped more than twenty times in succession, a magnificent sight, especially when they each cleared the surface completely.

Conservation

As a result of so many recent whale sightings James Adcock checked his records going back over twenty-five years and found that whereas they used to be extremely rare, they are now seen every year in increasing numbers, surely the result of conservation efforts worldwide.

Back to the fishing and Tengesi, which brought in a barracuda of about 10 kilos, a kingfish of about five and two yellowfin tuna of the same weight as well as a couple of bonito, after a long day of hard work circling shoals of bonito, and chancing the empty-looking sea.

Much the same sort of result was recorded by a number of boats during the week; Bob and Julie Barker got a kingfish of 10 kilos on Vuma, Solitaire came in with a kingfish and a dorado; and crewmen Ali and Saidi Fau, fishing on their own in Bora Salama caught a 10 kilo wahoo and a garfish.

Something more substantial put a bend in the rod of Swiss angler, Marco, when he caught a Black Tip Reef Shark of 25.6 kilos fishing with James Adcock on Samvuke, and also another sailfish was caught on Frankie Pereira's boat Koko.

For the Eye Go Fishing competition on Sunday the dark horse will surely be the all-woman

team of Gil Parry, Val Fitzgerald, Ann Jennings and Celia Behrens, who will be fishing on Oona, employing all kinds of subtle tactics already refined in numerous meetings at The Moorings bar, and who have instructed James Adcock to be sure to load up adequate supplies of flags for every type of known fish, and also the Shall We Stop Hauling Them In Now flag.

This sort of angling enthusiasm reached its apogee, in masculine form, on Sunday when Karl Jennings startled the assembled company at The Moorings by suddenly leaping up with a hoarse cry, as though stung by a hippo fly, sending glasses scattering in every direction, and then leaping fully clothed and with spectacles still in place, into the swirling, spring-tide waters of the creek.

Every reveller in the place was instantly propelled to the railings and some of the more thoughtful

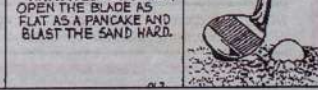
