RETURN OF THE GAME

DETERMINED and continuous efforts by the Kenya government in its conservation of our wild life heritage — by putting first a ban on hunting and then a complete stop in the dealing of game trophies, and a positive fight against the menace of poachers — seems to be paying off handsomely.

Having driven from Mombasa to the Buffalo Springs Lodge in the Samburu Game Parks and other remote outlying areas in that region during the last few days the number of animals my friends and I saw was frankly amazing.

With the exception of Lions, ten of which were seen by other visitors in Samburu two nights earlier, we saw all the animals we wanted to see.

These included two cheetahs, large herds of elephants and zebras, gazelles, oryx, Thomson's Gazelle, waterbucks, impala, kongoni, rhino, buffalos, crocodiles, hyena, warthog, roankeys, lesser kudu, baboon, dik dik and bush buck.

I hope that it was not just our luck that we saw all these animals and that other visitors going through our various game parks can confirm this report that "the animals are back".

FERROL ON FOOD

BAIN MARIE:
This is the French name for a double saucepan like a glue-pot. It appears in Mrs Glasse's COOKERY BOOK 1796 under its Latin name, Balneum Mariae, hence the name St Mary's bath of Ben Johnson's Alchemist II. The name is supposed to be due to the gentleness of this method of heating. It is used for sauces which might curdle easily, and the

method is essential for baking delicate custards in the oven or pates as it slows down the cooking method effectively. Hoteliers use professional Bain Maries but a double saucepan is most effective and for oven baking, simply half fill a roasting pan with water and stand the container you are using for the custard or pate in this at the start of cooking.

It is a useful method of keeping delicate sauces at an even temperature. Remember that the water in the lower half of the pan should not, ideally, touch the bottom of the upper half.

BASTING:
To spoon juices from the meat over the joint to keep it moist. The same term applies to frequent applications of melted butter or marinade used to flavour meat. It prevents the drying out of poultry and game in particular during cooking.

BARDING:
This is a method of threading strips of pork fat into game meat which is usually unfatty — by way of compensation tiny strips of the fat are inserted into the meat.

A barding needle can be purchased for this purpose but the tip of a sharp knife can be used effectively for 'plugging' the meat with the pork fat.

BAKING BLIND:
This is the method by which un-filled flan's or tarts of a certain type are baked. The base of the uncooked pastry shell is generally pricked with a fork, then a disk of grease-proof paper is placed on this.

Crusts, rice or haricot beans (uncooked) are used to weight the base and keep it flat during cooking. The pastry case is allowed to cool before filling with required fruit or sauce. Use the method for BANANA CREAM FLAN which is a very pretty flan to serve.

BANANA CREAM FLAN:

- 1 pastry case (recipe follows)
- 6 bananas
- 1 1/2 ounces cornflour
- 3/4 pint of milk
- 1 ounce castor sugar
- grated rind and juice of one lemon
- 2 egg yolks beaten cream

APRICOT GLAZE:

- 4 tablespoons apricot jam
 - 6 tablespoons water
 - squeeze of lemon or lime juice
- Blend the cornflour to a smooth paste with six tablespoons of the milk. Heat the rest of the milk to boiling point and pour over the cornflour. Stir well and add the sugar and lemon rind. Simmer for 5 minutes over a gentle heat and then put aside to cool.

Mix the lemon juice with the egg yolks and add to the sauce, blending until cool. Peel and slice the bananas thinly. Stir two of these into the sauce. Pour this custard into the cooled flan case.

Arrange the remaining banana slices overlapping closely on top in a clockwise direction until entirely covered. Prepare the glaze by heating all the ingredients for the apricot glaze together. Brush this when melted, over the banana taking care not to disturb the uniformity. Hand cold unsweetened cream separately. Serves six.

If you find the glaze is very thin, simmer a little over five minutes. It can be stored and reheated as required.

RICH PASTRY CASE FOR FLANS AND TARTS:

- 1 ounce butter
- 1 ounce lard
- 4 ounces plain flour
- pinch of salt

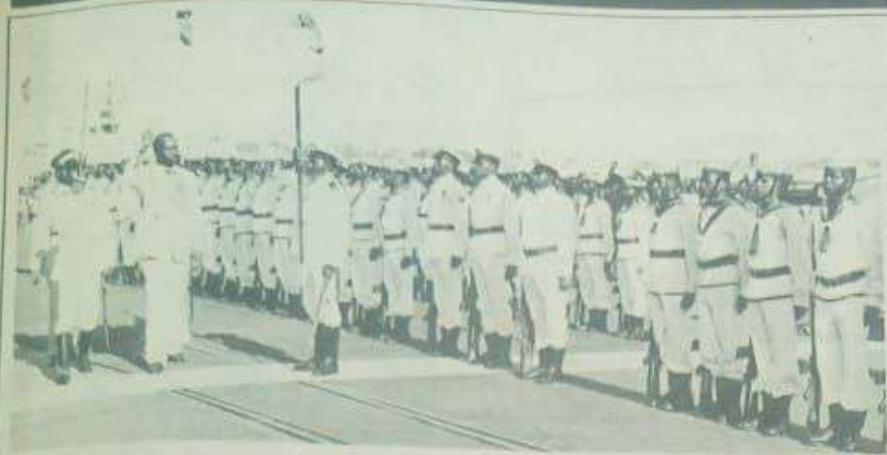

THE Red Cross Koblenz Hall in Mombasa's Moi Avenue has celebrated its first anniversary together with seven young people from the Koblenz Branch of the Red Cross Society in Germany who were on an exchange visit as guests of the Mombasa Branch.

The Koblenz Hall was officially, on January 6 last year, opened by President Daniel Arap Moi — then Kenya's vice president.

The German group, comprising five girls and two boys, was accompanied by Dr Kurt Schmidt, a lawyer and vice-president/treasurer of the Koblenz Red Cross branch.

He conveyed greetings from his members and hoped that "this spirit of Red Cross internationalism would grow".

He also mentioned that they would be pleased to be of any further assistance to the Mombasa Red Cross branch.

It was a donation of Shs 200,000.00 from the Koblenz Red Cross branch which made completion of this hall possible.

DANCE

As a gesture of appreciation, Mr Abdul Hussein Mulu, chairman of the Mombasa branch, presented Dr Schmidt with two beautiful brass-studded hand-carved stools from the Old Town workshop of Bashir Chando, and together they formally cut the anniversary

cake. The German girls performed a modern dance which brought forth many appreciative whistles from Mombasa's Red Cross boys. They were again greatly admired when they sallied forth in the maxi kitenge dresses they had received as gifts.

Meanwhile, the leader of the German group, Bernard Kaulhold, was presented with a magnificent curved Arab sword from Mombasa colleagues as a symbol of 'bravery and courage', also quipped Mr Mulu "to help keep the girls in order!"

Among the guests at the party was Mr Strothmann, general manager of Achelis Kenya Ltd representing the Deutsche Kenya Club, and his wife, also Mr E. Habwe, chairman of Kenya External Communications.

The Koblenz Hall is a very popular venue with many functions including Harambee meetings, wedding receptions, sports seminars and dances taken place there.

In July last year ten Red Cross members from Mombasa visited Koblenz and had a most enjoyable time — and at the anniversary party were presented with a pictorial record of their visit.

To ensure their German guests enjoyed themselves in Kenya, young Red Cross members raised the fantastic sum of Shs. 24,000.00 to help finance

their visit through a sponsored charity swim at the Mombasa Women's Association pool.

This was mainly due to the infectious enthusiasm of Faheem Parkar, a non-member, in popularising the event, aided by Abbas Gedi, the society's assistant training officer and news letter secretary.

Faheem, 18, is quite an outstanding young man having won the Presidential Gold Award and climbed to the top of Mt Kenya.

Meanwhile, girls of the Voluntary Aid Detachment — not to be left out — had raised Shs. 1,000.00 through a film show at the Koblenz Hall organised by Miss Fakhera Haji.

While at the Coast, the German Red Cross group visited that superb environmental experiment by Rene Haller, agronomist with the Bamburi Portland Cement Co., who has transformed a disused lime quarry into a beautiful forest.

WONDERS

They also visited the Aga Khan School for Deaf and Dumb children and witnessed the wonders being achieved, and observed traditional African craftsmen in action at the Akamba Handicraft Industries Co-operative Society, Changamwe.

They also visited the Red Cross branch at Kwaye, for it is Koblenz which is helping keep the mobile health unit running there by providing it with a new car and paying the salary of Miss Christina Mbwika.

Mombasa's Koblenz Hall is a

very popular centre seating some 250 people, with the Red Cross Society only charging maintenance costs for its fire. First Aid classes are held there every Saturday and are open to students and anyone interested.

Mr Mulu mentioned that the Red Cross would like to extend its facilities there by opening a health centre to serve the wananchi. The service, which would be free of charge, will be manned by a trained nursing sister, and they are presently looking for a volunteer.

In disbursing 'good cheer over Christmas, the Mombasa branch spent over Shs. 2,000.00 on gifts for patients in hospitals and at the polio clinic, as well as for the Port Ritz School for Physically Handicapped children. They also distributed three cartons of gifts from the U.S.A. to youngsters.

However, it is a big disappointment to Mr Mulu that the Red Cross does not have more members to enable it to extend its help in the community, and this year a membership drive is being launched. He would also like to see

more boys and girls coming forward to join the Voluntary Aid Detachment. After the necessary first aid training they assist at rallies, days of national celebration, athletics meetings and so on, and there is always a big demand for their services.

Mr Mulu also mentioned how grateful they are to Stirling Winthrop who are always willing to help replenish their first aid boxes with medicines, and to all others who help the branch in one way or another.

TOMBOLA

Mr Mulu has been involved in Red Cross work since 1956. He has been branch chairman for about six years and is presently also appeals and publicity officer. He is the branch manager of Kenya External Telecommunications at Mombasa.

Many people in Mombasa recall the fantastic sums of money Mr Mulu used to raise years ago for the Red Cross branch through tombola. On

one occasion it totalled about Shs. 60,000.00 exceeding the Red Cross budget for that particular year.

His wife, Khaironissa, has been secretary for more than ten years, and in a tribute, Mr Mulu said "it is really a contribution which has made the branch such a success." She went on "she takes so much trouble over everything".

Because the Red Cross has been unable to find a volunteer welfare officer, Mrs Mulu has been undertaking these duties as well. She looks after, not only the secretarial side, but the day to day welfare care and appeals from destitute people and those in urgent need of help.

Said Mr Mulu "whatever the Red Cross activity might be Khaironissa is there".

The Mulus are the backbone of the Mombasa branch of the Red Cross, putting in a tremendous amount of voluntary work, and would like to see others joining to enable the society to expand and be greater assistance to the community.

COMMENT

Travel trouble

THE DECISION by the Kenya Government to impose a 2000 shilling levy on all tickets purchased by Kenya residents to travel outside the Republic's borders will undoubtedly have an extremely restrictive effect on airline and travel agency businesses.

It will be a hard blow to Kenya's national airline Kenya Airways, whose efforts to stimulate travel overseas by Kenyans since its inception in February 1977 were already beginning to achieve heartening results.

Additionally international airlines, of which Kenya is fortunate in having over 27 operating into and out of "Africa's airlines crossroads" — Jomo Kenyatta Airport — and, to a lesser, though still important extent Mombasa International Airport, may well be forced to take a hard and serious look at the viability of their operations here, if the volume of local traffic is stifled by the restrictions.

Some airlines — those who are operating here on marginal profit may well decide to withdraw altogether. Thus Kenya will lose the jobs such airlines are providing as well as the substantial revenue earned from the landing fees at airports and all the ancillary requirements for their operations.

Similarly many international companies and aid organisations, who have established regional offices in Nairobi (as it is regarded as the best communications centre in Africa) may seek alternative bases from which to operate. Here again Kenya will be the worse off if they do. There will be hardship for many who have to travel with children — even infants on whom the levy of Shs. 2,000.00 will prove more expensive than the total value of their ten per cent rebate ticket!

Coming as it has hard in the heels of the Government announcement, that employers increase their labour force by ten per cent, travel agents and airlines could be squeezed to the limit; and some may not survive.

Efforts by the Kenya tourist industry to promote regional tourism, thereby offering attractive alternatives to the major tour operators of Europe and North America, as well as the Far East, could also be affected.

There is a programme (operated with the support of the Central Bank of Kenya) that Kenya residents travel to the Seychelles as an inclusive tour programme payable in Kenya shillings; obviously this programme will now prove totally unattractive.

There have been instances in other countries where levies such as this one have been imposed and have proved counterproductive.

Surely a more acceptable method of curbing travel and at the same time obtaining revenue would be to impose a ten per cent levy on all Kenya residents' overseas travel tickets — a figure which would depend on the distance and therefore value of the ticket utilised.

At the moment it will cost a traveller possibly over one hundred per cent of the value of his fare if he has to travel to a nearby destination — such as the Ethiopia or the Seychelles; while the same applies to a person travelling on a round-the-world ticket.

Such a regulation can only be detrimental to Kenya's airlines and tourism industry.

LET'S NAME IT 'MOI BRIDGE'

THE BRIDGE on the Coast vicariously desire to have the new Nyali Bridge, which is nearing completion, named after our great President, Mr Daniel Arap Moi.

The people of Kenya, and the Coast in particular, might have something to remember our President by. He has achieved himself a great feat in a short time.

I therefore suggest the new bridge should be called Moi Bridge.

THE TAX MEN ARE ON THEIR WAY

ABOUT this time of year many readers will be receiving forms from the Commissioner of Income Tax, demanding a return of income for 1978. The time is opportune, therefore, to consider ways of reducing one's tax bill.

There are two basic methods of reducing the amount of tax which must be paid, tax avoidance, which is legal and tax evasion, which is illegal.

Tax avoidance involves claiming all allowances permissible under the Income Tax Act of 1973 while tax evasion is achieved by dishonestly understating one's income to escape paying tax.

For obvious reasons this article will deal only with the methods of avoiding tax.

If you think that you are paying too much income tax, there are several means of reducing your liability.

For a single person, the easiest way is to get married, since the current personal relief for a married person is Shs. 140.00 per month, compared to Shs. 50.00 per month for a single person.

If you earn a high salary, however, and your wife is working, this gain will be more than offset by the higher rate of tax levied on your wife's income.

For those who prefer to retain their single status, or those already trapped in marriage, an alternative method is to buy a house through a mortgage or bank loan.

All interest paid can be deducted from income tax before tax is assessed, provided the loan does not exceed Shs. 200,000.00, and that the property is occupied by the borrower.

Anyone living in rented accommodation,

and earning a high salary, should seriously consider this method of reducing their tax liability.

Savers can lower their tax bill by saving through a life insurance policy. Any premiums paid, up to a maximum of Shs. 4,800.00 per annum, can be offset against income.

The amount of relief allowed is 10 per cent, so that a person who saves the maximum amount would reduce his tax liability by Shs. 480.00 each year.

The income tax system can also be turned to your advantage if you can persuade your employer to provide benefits such as a car, servants, and water and electricity free of charge.

The Commissioner of Income Tax has laid down a standard scale giving the value of such benefits and an employee is taxed on the basis of this.

Generally, the value of the benefit received far exceeds the tax which must be paid.

NEW POULTRY ASSOCIATION

FOWL and feather farmers have organised themselves into a new organisation called Coast Poultry Farmers' Association.

Following their first meeting it was agreed that egg and chicken prices should be set at a fixed minimum price of 114 per carton of ungraded eggs and ex-farm mixed eggs.

Chicken is set at a minimum price of 16/- a kilo.

The next meeting will be held on February 4, 1979 at 10 a.m. at the Oceanic Hotel.

Kilindini decline

THE total tonnage of dry general cargo handled at the port of Mombasa in December, last year was approximately 169,493 deadweight tons, comprising 107,353 tons of imports and 62,140 tons of exports.

This throughput was a decline from the previous month of November by 23,648 tons and was also lower than that of corresponding month in the preceding year (December 1977) by 9,892 tons.

During the month of December 1977 a total tonnage of 179,385 deadweight tons were handled at the port comprising of 115,629 tons of imports and 63,756 tons of exports.

The approximate notified imports for the month of December 1978 was 158,467 deadweight tons including 4,470 tons of wheat, 16,000 tons of soda ash, 16,500 tons of salt, 490 motor cars, 179 containers and 5,889 tons of steel works.

There were only two ships waiting to berth by end of the December last year.

Both *Saga Maru* and *Jogoo* (which was commissioned by the President, Mr Daniel Arap Moi on January 6) arrived on December 31 and were berthed on January 3.

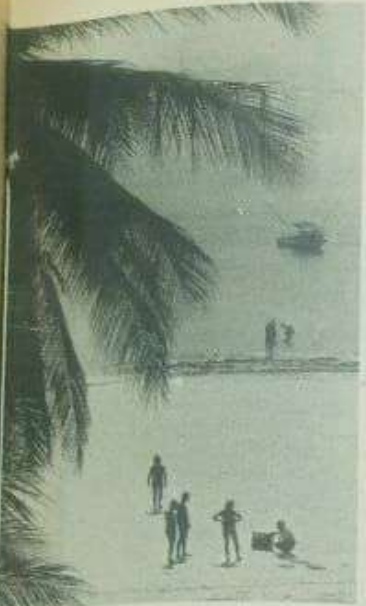

But my resolutions for 1979 are rather special ones and intended for rather special people — Kenya's 'monstrous regiment' (to quote John Knox) of women secretaries. For the past 12 months, I've been waiting for the opportunity to sound off on this subject now I have it.

Though people shouldn't take their domestic problems to work, I suppose, being human, we're inclined to do just that.

Maybe down in Mombasa, you don't have the problem. With constant sunshine and light tropical breezes blowing in from the Indian Ocean, there's probably less petulance.

When you get Lip Country and into the Big Metropolis, you tend to live a bit more on your nerves.

So my No. 1 New Year Resolution is for secretaries to go out of their way in the coming year to be especially nice on the phone to journalists and PR consultants.

Before I finish these New Year remonstrations, do you pick up those personal ads in the Nation — 'A shah boy chartered accountant, elegant,

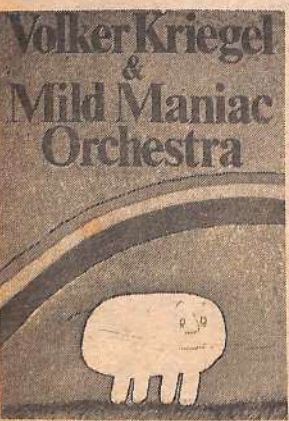

EIN PARADIES FUER ANGLER

DAS Hochseefischen entlang der kenianischen Kueste zaehlt immer noch zu den beliebtesten Urlaubs-Sportarten des Landes.

Spannung, turbulente Handlung, Rekorde: jede einzelne Exkursion hinaus auf den Indischen Ozean bietet ein gewisses Mass an Aufregung, Spannung und Abenteuer.

Ogleich nicht jeden Tag ein Rekord gebrochen wird, so geht doch waehrend der zehnmontaegigen Saison mancher beachtliche Fang, und eine ganze Reihe von Afrika-Rekorden ist regelmassig zu verzeichnen.

Die selteneren Arten wie Breitmaul-Schwertfisch, Saegefisch, blauer, schwarzer und gestreifter Marlin, Makohai und Gelbflossen-Thunfisch, bewohnen diese Kuestengewasser und werden oft innerhalb der 500 km langen kenianischen Kuestenzone gefangen.

Wenn einer dieser kaempferischen Fische angebissen hat, bedeutet das ein aufregendes Schauspiel, ein Gefecht mit grossen akrobatischen Luftspruengen, wobei der Fisch kraftig mit dem Schwanz durch das schaumende Wasser peitscht und es in weisse Gischt verwandelt.

Die kleineren Sportfische, die oft von ansaessigen Anglern gefangen werden, sind aber nicht weniger lohnend. Es handelt sich dabei vor allem um Kobia, Kingfisch, Barrakuda, Wahoo, Felusi, Bonito (kleine Thunfische), Kolkoli, Karambezi und Regenbogen-Rinne. Es gibt auch viele verschiedene Arten von Maion, die aber nicht jedermann Sache sind.

Neben dem monstroesen

In seinem ausgezeichneten Anglerbuch *Crash Strike* (Schlag zu!) schreibt der Anglerveteran Patrick Hemphill vom Pembakana-Fischerklub an der Suedkueste:

EXPERTEN

"Abgesehen vom Mako und Hammerhai, weisen alle anderen an der kenianischen Kueste gefangenen Haie die gleichen Merkmale auf. Sie sind hartnaeckige, eigensinnige Kaempfer, bleiben tief im Wasser unter dem Boot und muessen muessam Stueck fuer Stueck unter armbrecherischen Verrenkungen heraufgewunden werden."

Er erkaert weiter: "Der Hai wird von den meisten Leuten nicht als Jagdfisch betrachtet und wird von ihnen nur gefangen, wenn sonst keine bessere Beute in Sicht ist."

Viele stellen sich unter Hochseefischen noch immer einen heuren Sport vor fuer Reiche und Experten. Manchmal ist es das auch, aber es gibt heutzutage und hierzulande gutausgeruestete Boote zu guenstigen Bedingungen zu mieten.

Am einfachsten findet ein begeisterter Angler Zutritt zu diesem Sport fuer eine der zahlreichen Bootverleihstellen in Mombasa, Mtwapa, Kilifi, Watamu, Malindi, Lamu, Diani an der Suedkueste und am Pembakana in Shimon.

Sportfischerboote gibt's in allen Grosseen, vom bescheidenen ca. 4m langen Boot mit 30 P.S. Aussenbordmotor bis zum vornehmen aus Glasfaser und Plastik geformten

Boot des 'Coronet' Typs, 10m oder laenger, mit Innen-Dieselmotor und mit erhoheltem Deck als Ausguck.

Bei den meisten Booten ist alles inbegriffen, d.h. erfahrene Besatzung, moderne Angelnuten und Spulen, natuerliche und kunstliche Koeder, beste Anglersitze, Sicherheitsvorrichtungen (auf allen zugelassenen Booten vorgeschrieben) und eine Toilette.

Viele Boote verfuegen auch ueber eine guborsierte Bar mit Kuehlschrank (lueft Stunden auf hoher See geben Durst und Lust auf ein eiskaltes Bier, und bei manchen auch Appetit auf ein Sandwich mit Meeressfruechten).

MARLIN

Fuer Sportfischen ist Aufbruch in der fruhen Morgen-dammerung empfehlenswert mit Rueckkehr um die Mittagszeit, ausser natuerlich, wenn noch ein Kampf im Gange ist (mancher Fisch braucht 8 Stunden, um endgueltig bezwungen und aus Boot gezogen zu werden).

Einmal auf offener See, ist das Fischen reine Gluecksache. Manchmal beginnt die aufregende Handlung schon nach den ersten hundert Metern; ein andermal bleibt dem Kuehnen Angler nichts anderes uebrig, als sich in Geduld und weiser Philosophie zu ueben.

Es gibt auch keinen "garantierten" Fang, ist aber in der Hochsaison hoechst ungewoehnlich, dass ein Boot ohne einige gute Fische zurueckkehrt.

Als sehr guter Fang wird der Breitmaul-Schwertfisch angesehen. Der Mombasa Angler-experte James Adcock (wohl der erfolgreichste Fischer der ostafrikanischen Kueste) klassiert die Fische nach ihrer Bedeutung wie folgt:

- Breitmaul-Schwertfisch
- Blauer Marlin, gefolgt vom schwarzen und gestreiften Marlin
- Saillfisch (Segelfisch)
- Makohai
- Felusi (Goldmakrele)
- Wahoo
- Kingfisch
- Gelbflossen-Thunfisch
- Kobia
- Barrakuda
- Ein guter Hai.

Die meisten Angler sind jedoch zufriden, wenn sie drei oder vier der in obiger Liste

aufgeloehrten Fische mittlerer Grosse gefangen haben.

Der verstorbene H. B. Swann von Malindi (ein Zeitgenosse und Kolege von Ernest Hemingway) wuerde die Klassierung des Breitmaul-Schwertfisches an erster Stelle zweifellosgutheissen abgesehen er durch und durch als "Sailfishman" bekannt war.

In der Tat, mit einem Saillfisch an der leichten Leine kann man seine Erfahrung und Geschicklichkeit voll unter Beweis stellen; der "Mensch im Kampf gegen das Meer" benoetigt seine ganze Gewaendtheit und Entschlossenheit bis zum letzten Zoll, um den Fisch am Haken einzubringen.

Patrick Hemphill, ein international anerkannter Marlin-sportler in Afrika, schreibt in seinem bereits oben erwaehnten Buch: "Der eine oder andere Fischer ruend um die Welt hat sich dahingehend geaeussert, nachdem er einen Breitmaul-Schwertfisch gefangen hat, habe ihm die Welt nun nicht mehr viel Interessantes zu bieten."

Eine Anzahl anderer Fanatiker verfolgt weiterhin ihr Ziel, den gressten Makohai der Welt zu angeln.

Die Mehrzahl der Sport-

fischer stimmt jedoch darin ueberein, dass der aufregendste, faszinierendste, interessanteste Kampf vom plumpen, zackigen Marlin mit seiner hartnaeckigen Ausdauer geboten wird.

Gordon Martin an der Mtwapaucht, bemerkte: "Oft fahre ich mit internationalen Kunden hinaus aufs weisse Meer, deren gresster Wunsch es ist, einen Hai zu fangen, wenn moeglich einen Mako; aber auch ein Tigerhai oder Hammerhai ist ein willkommenes Fang." — Jedem das Seine!

GLUECK

Abgesehen von einem unvergesslichen Anglererlebnis zur See, bieten die verschiedenen Fischerclubs an der Kueste dem Besucher anschliessend in ihren bezaehlig eingerichteten Club-hausern eine wohlfaehrende Atmosphaere der Entspannung und Erholung.

Was immer der Angler sucht, er benoetigt viel Glueck und viel Zeit, um festzustellen, ob sagenhafter Fische sind da... aber leider vom Nebenboot gefangen worden.

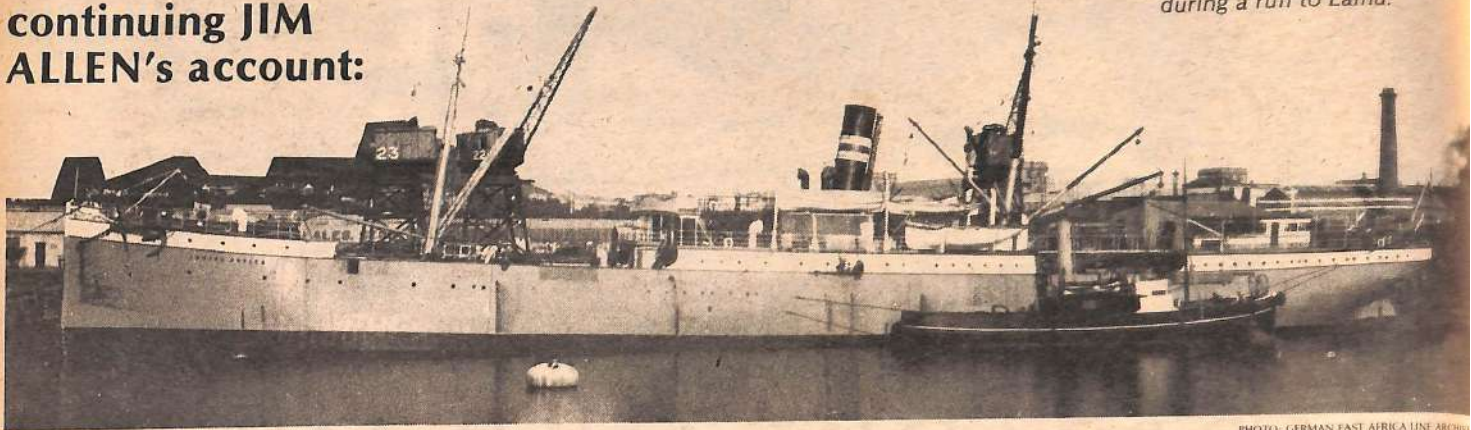

MOST of them set sail on the German steamer *Reichstag* on February 28, 1894, together with luggage weighing 40 tons. As well as the Schindler-Salner Port Said controversy, there was a certain amount of more or less chronic discontent because, although the whole movement was, as Scavenius summed it up, an 'idealistic' one, the passengers were allocated good or bad cabins according to the size of their deposits. This sort of thing tends to

rankle in the Red Sea. The Voyage was fairly swift, however, and on April 1st they disembarked at Lamu under the astonished gaze of Captain Rogers, who was not, as Beachey wrote, Sub-Commissioner of the Province of Tanaland (which was not formed until 1896) but still an Imperial British East Africa Company official.

Rogers must have wondered whether this was some nightmarish April Fools' Day trick played on him by his London superiors, and the wish was no doubt father to the thought when he noted that, in his opinion, the Freelanders would all die "or otherwise meet with a disastrous end" long before they reached their destination.

The temporary euphoria induced by their arrival in Africa quickly evaporated when the Freelanders found out what was in store for them in Lamu.

First of all, they were all to live together in 'Freehouse', described as a large, dilapidated house, very hot under its tin roof, in the centre of town — all that is, except for their Leader, Dr Wilhelm, who had his own cooler house on the seafront.

This might not have mattered so much had they only stayed in Lamu for a maximum of a month, as planned.

MENAGERIE

Already on April 10th they were transporting their stores to Kipini, about 30 miles away at the mouth of the Tana-Ozi River, in preparation for the second stage of the expedition (Watchdog Peter Schmidt was left there in charge of them).

However, the entire party had not been able to fit into the *Reichstag* and the deck-space reserved for the expedition's river-steamer, the *Tana*, had also been appropriated at the last moment by the German Government (according to one version according to others the *Tana* was too large or not ready) so this steamer, together with a few remaining members of the expedition, had to follow on another vessel a week or so later.

On arrival in Lamu, however, the second vessel found that the tides were too high to disembark either steamer or to reach Lamu, which has its highest spring tides at this year

in March-April, and if the Northeast monsoon is blowing hard at the time, the harbour becomes quite unusable for a day or two so the Freelanders had the infuriating experience of seeing both the *Tana* and their colleagues sail away again and on to Zanzibar, from where they did not return until May 8th.

When they did arrive they were accompanied by Dugmore and his menagerie whose presence, as has been noted, was not generally conducive to calm and good order.

Herr and Frau Sasse were also among the latecomers, and their decision not to move into Freehouse but to set up on their

own years' experience of modern conditions, it was never remotely feasible because the Tana is too sinuous and shallow for a boat of that size however shallow-draughted.

In the event the I.B.E.A.'s price of £6,000 for the *Kenia* was too high for the Freelanders, who no doubt felt it smacked of a capitalist plot, and so they had built their own *Tana* instead.

This was much smaller, described as "most foolishly decked so as to leave no room even for necessary hands to work it, cut wood etc", but since the Tana is seldom more than twenty yards wide, often less, the need to cut wood in

both monsoons, but in the early 19th Century visitors like Captain Owen had been able to penetrate up the Ozi as far as Kau, though I know of no record of any vessel ever penetrating the original Tana Delta further south.

This meant, according to Beachey's sources, that there was little or no chance that the expedition would ever get into the main river before August.

I am not clear why this should ever have been, since the rains normally reach the headwaters of the Tana around Mt Kenya in March or April and cover the rest of its drainage-area by late May, so

wrote the Dane, as *Der Herr von Hunger and Liebe* after the eternal topic of these harangues.

The town's only public house, known as *Mabrukki's* became an important focus of attention, and no doubt the scene of many seditious conversations, since Wilhelm alone of the party never went there.

Each member kept his own whiskey-bottle there, together with a small book to account for consumption to its owner, a former missionary who had lapsed from his calling on marrying for a second time.

It was after one particularly long drinking session that James Dunn, the last to leave, fell into Lamu Harbour and was never seen again. 'Freehouse' was the scene of a number of drinking parties too.

Scavenius records what may well have been only a slightly untypical scene one Sunday afternoon when two of the inhabitants of Freehouse, after a particularly fierce argument, fought one another with brooms, poured brandy down one another's necks, and eventually challenged one another to a duel.

Scavenius and Stokkebye, as seconds, took care to load the pistols with blank cartridges without telling anyone; the great drama unrolled, both duellists fired but neither was hurt, and then a massive reconciliation ensued leading to a party which lasted well into the next day.

Other Scavenius anecdotes concern the activities of his enemy, Dugmore.

He narrated how the Englishman spent much of his time writing for three different newspapers on three different typewriters, taking great care to keep the three machines separate: if by mistake he typed an article or even a page on the wrong machine he would start all over again.

When he was not busy with this, he spent time at an upper storey window from where he

could observe the local servant girls drawing water from a well and when they had the full waterpots on their heads they would shoot the pots finding great amusement in the sight of broken postherds and water pouring down over the unfortunate women.

The entire Freehouse party by the Dane's account, was guilty of an even less pleasant 'sport' from the upper storey windows: Freehouse had very inadequate plumbing facilities and none at all upstairs, so they took to aiming at passerby through windows.

It is hardly surprising, under the circumstances, that Scavenius should have reported that the Freelanders found the local people 'not very friendly'.

The other main problem was the financial one. It is nowhere explicitly stated but I judge it highly likely that the people of Lamu of all ranks and social levels were no less skilled in 1894 than they are today in the gentle art of extracting money out of their visitors on all and any pretext: this after all, an attribute of present residents anywhere and large had been a port of centuries.

Wilhelm handled all the money, apparently in total secrecy, and the accounts published later in the *Freelanders* newspapers were highly suspect; but we can be sure that the cost of transporting 40 tons of stores, and later the six steel boats and other supplies to Kipini was not inconceivable.

The maintenance of Freehouse in terms of food and especially — drink must have been high. Officially the total sum of money collected on the expedition's behalf up to June, 1894 (presumably exclusive of boat fares) was 87,630 Austrian marks and pennings, or approximately 75,000 rupees.

Not all of this necessarily reached Wilhelm, but even if he had it would almost certainly have been insufficient. Already by mid-May the Denhart were pressing for payments, their supplies to the expedition.

After a number of telegrams Wilhelm went off to Zanzibar and returned with rather less than half of what was owed according to Scavenius.

From then onwards, if before, the sharper members of the party began to think about selling up their stores, and the proceeds might be divided if they did.

The Freelanders

own with the faithful Herr Hassemer may also have been a disturbing factor.

Up to this point most though not all of the Freelanders' problems could be attributed to bad luck. With the arrival of the *Tana*, however, bad management has been identified as the major factor.

In my own view, the expedition's planning was probably a great deal better than has generally been conceded, perhaps due to advice from the notorious Denhardt Brothers, one of whom was German Consul in Lamu, who had lived in the region for many years.

The original idea had been to purchase the I.B.E.A. Company's steamer *Kenia* which, according to Beachey, would have been admirable for their purposes, being "a stern-wheeler specially-built for river navigation with very shallow draught, some eighty feet in length and twenty wide with good cargo and passenger accommodation".

Now in 1894 the *Tana* River was in the process of changing its course to join the River Ozi through the newly constructed Belezoni Canal and come out again at Kipini instead of through a delta some miles further south, so it is hard to say with any certainty how feasible the *Kenia* scheme would ever have been — but in my own opinion, based on

midstream was not anyway pressing.

The *Tana* was to tow two smaller steel boats, also brought from Europe, containing the twenty-five or so whites with their stores and, so we are told, "some hundred black auxiliaries" upstream as far as Hargazo or Hameje from where the expedition would proceed on foot.

The plan was by no means perfect and turned out, in the event, to be impracticable, but was not in my own opinion, for what it is worth, wholly unrealistic at all.

It probably stood a far greater chance of success than the *Kenia* plan; and it may be noted that very few western-organised parties have successfully planned how to get up or even down the River Tana right up to the present day.

SAND-BANK

What happened was that, by the time the *Tana* was unloaded the Northeast monsoon, whose last gale had prevented the steamer being unloaded in April, had given way to the Southeast one of which rapidly built up a sandbank across the mouth of the Tana-Ozi which the steamer was unable to cross.

Nowadays this sandbank is more or less permanent during

that the river is in flood by mid-June at the latest. Perhaps, however, the Freelanders felt that they could not risk trying to cross the sandbank until the monsoon had changed again. Or perhaps it was a year of exceptionally low rainfall so the *Tana* did not flood as much as usual.

Whatever the reason, what certainly went wrong with the expedition, at this stage, was a more or less complete collapse of morale.

Boredom was probably the main cause, supplemented by the extreme heat of Lamu during the inter-monsoon period of late April and most of May.

On arrival the first party had been organised for shooting practice by the *Kundk* officer Schindler, but after a few days the British administration very properly put an end to this and locked up most of the weapons in Lamu Fort.

Wilhelm does not seem to have been a very inspiring leader, at any rate according to Scavenius, who wrote that when he was not riding around dressed as an Arab he was making interminable speeches to his followers — generally in the afternoon, which as anyone who has spent time in Lamu will know is not a propitious time.

He soon became known,

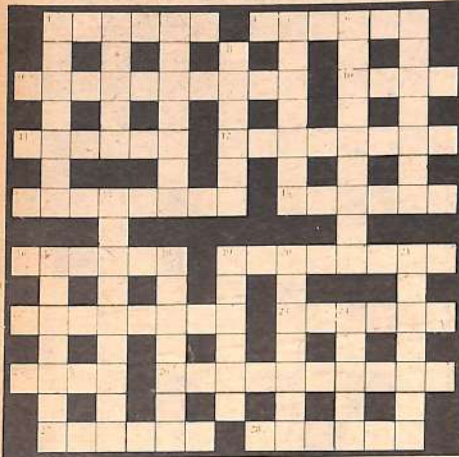
