Red Cross Opening 'New Branches' At Lamu & Mpeketoni

KENYA Red Cross Society has launched new branches at Lamu and Mpeketoni on the Kenya North Coast.

A Red Cross spokesman said:

"Headquarters of the Kenya Red Cross Society appointed the Chairman of Development Committee, Mr. A. A. Molu, who is also the Chairman of the Mombasa Branch of the Society, to establish these Lamu District bases.

"Mr Molu has now visited Lamu and Mpeketoni to officially launch the Branches.

"He was accompanied by the Branch Secretary.

"The First Aid Training Officer of Mombasa Branch, Mr Abdalla Athman with another instructor conducted initial stage First Aid Course for Mpeketoni Branch and accompanied the Chairman and be party at the launching of Mpeketoni Branch.

"The International Committee of the Red Cross provided a vehicle for the trip.

"The group left early in the morning when the buses to Lamu depart from Mombasa.

"This was in order to form a convoy from Malindi for the Police security escort all the way to Lamu.

"District Commissioner of Lamu presided over the function which was also attended by several leading local personalities from Government Offices, M.P.'s, Councillors, dignitaries and wananchi.

"Mr Molu and the Branch Secretary proceeded to Mpeketoni where a similar function was held.

SELF-HELP DONATION

"At the same function, the Chairman of Wamucii Self Help Group officially handed over a plot measuring 9.3m x 30m to Mpeketoni Branch of Kenya Red Cross Society being a donation from the group.

"The plot is numbered Lamu/LK/483/2838 in Lake Kenyatta Settlement Scheme, Mpeketoni Division, Lamu District in the Republic of Kenya.

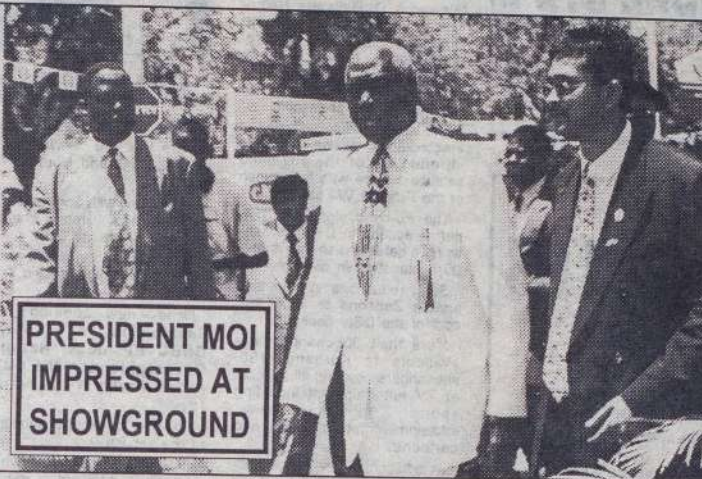
"Mr Molu noted that in the 1970's when there was inferno disaster on Lamu

Island, the Mombasa Branch co-ordinated with the then Provincial Commissioner, Mr Ben Maksewe we tried to respond very fast and took relief materials by aircraft provided by Kenya Air Force.

"With the assistance of the then District Commissioner, Mr Ben Maksewe we tried to launch a Branch in Lamu but there was reluctance by Muslim leaders who misconceived that Red Cross emblem is a Christian religious organisation (the misunderstanding is caused by the swahili word MSALABA) and were unable to establish a Branch.

"Mr Molu likes to express his sincere appreciation that the Interim Committee has been able to convince wananchi that Red Cross is not a religious Society but purely for humanitarian services to the vulnerable."

HEALTH AND SAFETY MANAGEMENT IN THE WORK PLACE - WHY IS IT NEEDED?

THE AIM of Safety Management is to reduce the number of accidents that occur in your workplace.

Those of you reading this article who are managers / supervisors have a responsibility to your fellow workers to ensure that they are not put into dangerous situations that will not only affect them but also their productivity at work.

Another reason to be concerned about safety at work is that it is a legal requirement to ensure safety and we in management and also owners of business can be in serious trouble if we don't comply with the law in Kenya.

The final reason to be concerned about safety at work is for the benefit of the general public who come to visit your place of business who can be hurt in the process.

This will again affect your future as a profitable company.

Accidents at work can lead to tragedy and disruption of the personal lives of the employees injured; to increased costs when the productivity of staff in lost hours is assessed.

Equipment can be damaged, there is bad publicity and finally you risk prosecution.

Doesn't all this need to make us consider the question of safety at work?

We need to consider 3 areas if we are to avoid accidents at work.

• Our working environment • The methods we will use • Our employees attitude and knowledge.

1. Working environment:

Have a look when you are at work particularly 'Entrances' and 'Exits'...

* Is there adequate lighting and ventilation?

* Is there a lack of order or cleanliness?

* What are your storage and stacking methods?

* Do you have dangerous

surfaces and edges?

Inspect regularly (say every month - 3 months) the conditions of your floors, roofs and walls.

Is there access to fire fighting equipment?

(Do you have the correct extinguishers in the correct place?)

2. The methods used:

* What are your tools and materials like?

Are they defective?

Are they properly maintained?

* What methods do we use for handling materials?

Do we have defective guards on the machines

* Do staff wear protective clothing / shoes and other safety equipment?

3. Employees themselves:

* What is their present knowledge and skills on safety?

* What is their general conduct?

* Do they use protective equipment if you provide it? Do they understand why?

* Do they know how to operate the fire extinguishers? And do they know by their colour what type of fire each extinguisher to use on which type of fire.

(If they don't it could kill them).

Finally we as management need to ensure that all our staff are taught and trained properly.

ONE RECENT SUNDAY will be long cherished by the 105 blind and visually impaired children and the staff of the Salvation Army Likoni School for the Blind.

For the first time in the history of school, full scale free medical and dental camp was held together with free medicines being prescribed.

The children were treated with a sumptuous lunch, ice cream, bottled juices and mineral water.

This special ay was culminated with gifts for each child, which included 'hygiene packs' (containing toothpaste, tooth brush and soap), biscuits, sweets and clothes.

The camp was organised by Action in Focus, two doctors, one dentist together with a number of well wishers who generously donated in kind and volunteers who served tirelessly.

The camp would not have been a success without the tireless efforts, deep sense of humility, care and concern extended by Dr. Priti Kotak, Dr. Jaffer and Dr. Makwana who gave their invaluable time and services free of charge.

All the volunteers, especially those manning the pharmacy worked tirelessly.

As described by one of the doctors, this was a unique camp whereby the check-ups are actually being followed up by further referrals for some children.

The overwhelming joy of the children was evident when they sang songs to show their sincere appreciation to all the 'Friends of the Likoni School for the Blind' (c/o Tel.: 224681, 226261, P.O. Box 80638, Mombasa) for this very special day in their lives.

MORE HELP FROM GERMANY

IT WAS good news for several charitable institutions in and around Mombasa when they heard that their benefactor Ernst Günter Strecker from Germany will come again to Mombasa in December this year.

Strecker, a clerk in the Office of the Mayor of the City of Mainz, made his first visit to Kenya in 1991.

He loved the country but was deeply moved by the many signs of poverty he saw, especially street children and orphans.

He decided to help and has come back every year bringing

with him so far a total of DM 280,000 (Kshs. eight Million) which he donated to various charitable projects.

During the year this civil servant is very busy raising money in his home town Mainz.

Among the generous sponsors are his superiors, the past and present Mayors of Mainz, Karl Delorme and Jens Beutel respectively, Chief Minister of State Kurt Beck, Interior Minister Walter Zuber, other politicians, many friends, colleagues and business associates.

In Mainz Strecker is well known as a 'lovable chaser of sponsors' who can be very persistent and persuasive but only to help others in need.

In appreciation of his humanitarian work he has received several official awards from the State.

Last December Strecker visited the WEMA Centre, an institution for young street girls who are rehabilitated, given a home and education;

the Mombasa Children's Home of the Salvation Army and A.C.T.S., an institution paying school fees for children from poor families who would otherwise be unable to go to school.

As a Christmas present Strecker donated to each of the three above-mentioned institutions DM 7000 (Kshs. 260,000) which they considered a godsend and accepted with deep gratitude.

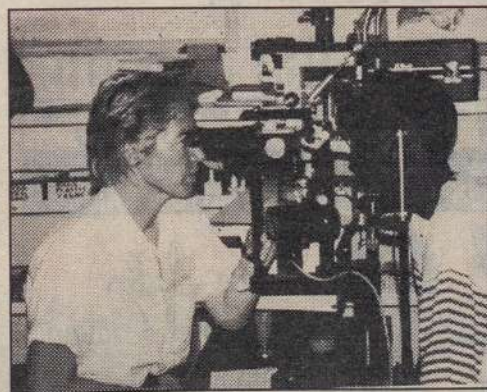
The response to his fund-raising drives this year has been very successful.

He has collected approx. DM 22,000 of which he decided to donate again DM 7000 each to the same projects and with the balance he intends to sponsor blind children.

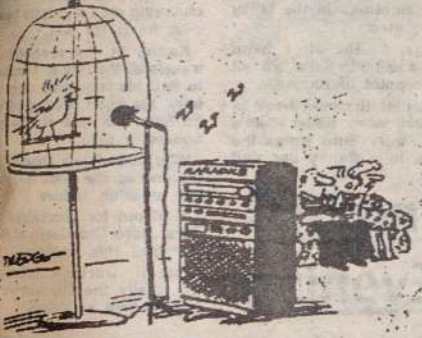

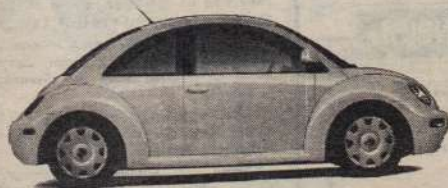

TWENTY YEARS' AGO ...

COASTWEEK, September 5 - 11, 1979:

PRESIDENT MOI officially opened the new S.O.S. Village for destitute and abandoned children in Mombasa. The village, which was built with assistance from Round Table No. 3 at a cost of Shs. 7.5 million, was the second in Kenya.

MINISTER for Local Government slashed a number of capital programmes and projects approved by the Municipal Council of Mombasa. Among the casualties were the purchase of a Road Paver (Shs. 600,000=), Floormaster equipment (Shs. 300,000=), construction of an extension to Raha Leo Market (Shs. 3.5 million) and health services (Shs. two million)

CHAIRMAN Mombasa Show, Enoch M'rabu, warmly commended the press coverage given to the show by COASTWEEK. When he addressed members of the Press at the Jomo Kenyatta Showground on the last day of the show, Mr. M'rabu said "COASTWEEK gave the Show a fitting coverage and we members of the Show committee have appreciated the good work done by your newspaper."

RICHARD Maina was appointed Managing Director of African Tours and Hotels, taking over from Henry Daly who had served the company for several years.

KENYA National Chamber of Commerce and Industry had started an investment company with a view to involving the chamber in various industries. According to Vice Chairman A. O. Cheka, the company had already been registered and would be selling shares to members.

AFTER six years of arduous negotiation, representatives of virtually all the nations of the world appeared close to agreement on a historic treaty that would regulate their use of the oceans and of its riches at the end of the ninth session of the U.N. Law of the Sea Conference.

HEAVENS and Hell came in one parcel at the KENYA Cinemas with Shabana Azmi, Jeetendra, Vinod Mehra, Moushumi Chatterjee in "Swarg Narak". This was followed by "Mad Max".

CLINT Eastwood blasted his way in "Escape From Alcatraz" at the NAAZ Cinema with Bud Spencer and Terence Hill in "Trinity Is Still My Name".

REGAL was screening "Fearless Hyena" and "Heroic Ones" while CHOX had "Do Chor" ("Two Thieves") in Dharmendra to Tanuja.

LETTER writers included A. S. Juma who could not understand how masseurs from far flung places like Japanese, Italian and even Russian could operate from Mombasa; L. B. of Nairobi proclaimed that the New Nyali Bridge was a symbol of development; Malindi's S. Ngala revealed that the Ministry of Health was paying underpaying it's employees; Salim Said Islam of Malindi decried the number of accidents and suggested that "Motorists must take more care".

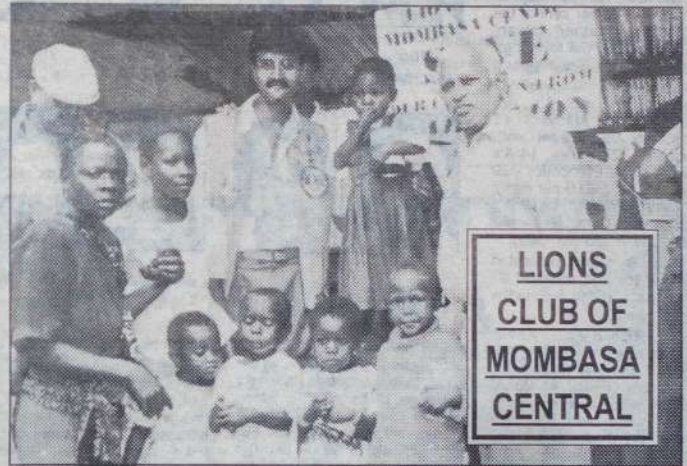

The Minister for State in the Office of the President, Major (Rtd) Marsden Madoka called upon Kenyans to support local investors.

National Development Party (NDP) Leader Raila Odinga said that "no country's economy can prosper via foreign investors".

He observed that while foreign investors export profits back to their country, a local investor re-invests the profits held for economic development.

He called upon Kenyans to patronise the firm.

Frauen kauften große Kopftücher, genannt "Leso" (vom portugiesischen Wort für Taschentuch abgeleitet) und nähten sechs Tücher zusammen zu einem einzigen rechteckigen Rück Stoff.

Der Original-Leso kam aus Goa, der ehemaligen portugiesischen Besitzung an der Westküste Vorderindiens.

Die neue Mode begann an der Küste und in Sansibar, breitete sich aber bald auf die ganze ostafrikanische Region aus.

Als die Nachfrage ständig zunahm, gaben Stoffhändler in Ostafrika große Bestellungen auf an Webereien und Textilfabriken in Holland, England und Indien, die nun Tücher herstellten, so groß wie früher sechs Lesos, und immer eingrahmt mit einer Bordüre.

Die Kangas wurden jedoch an einem Stück in einem Stoffballen ausgeliefert.

Der Name "Kanga" bezieht sich auf die ersten Leso-Muster, deren Design hauptsächlich aus weißen Punkten auf schwarzem oder dunkeltem Untergrund bestand, was an das Federkleid eines Paruhns erinnerte ("Kanga" ist das Suahelilwort für Paruh).

Perföhrer sind auf dem Lande weit verbreitet und stolzieren herum wie die Pfauen, ständig glückend wie eine Henne mit ihren Kücken.

In manchen Regionen werden die Tücher immer noch "Leso" genannt.

Kangas sind bei den Suahelilfrauen das beliebteste Kleidungsstück und sie werden fast immer als Paar verwendet, im gleichen oder passenden Muster.

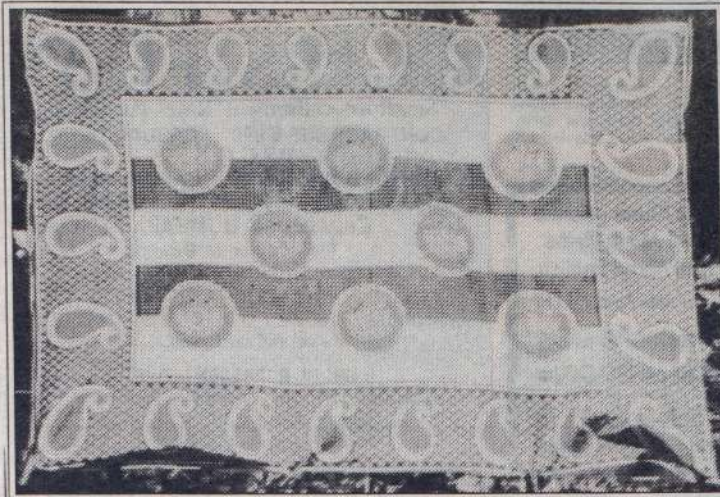
Ein Stück wird um die Hüften gewickelt, das andere um Kopf und Schultern drapiert.

SINNSPRÜCHE

Holland lieferte die ersten Kangas, bis 1920 ohne Inschrift, dann mit Sinnsprüchen in arabischer Schrift bis 1940, später auf Suaheli.

Neuerdings gibt es sie, aber höchst selten, auch mit moderner Beschriftung auf Englisch.

Heute gibt es Kangas aus China, Japan und anderen asiatischen Ländern.



FÜR Kangas gibt es unbegrenzte Verwendungsmöglichkeiten. Die meisten haben, wie dieser, das stilisierte Cashewnussmuster entweder in der Bordüre oder im Mittelstück.

Seit langem werden sie auch in Kenia hergestellt.

Einige Beispiele von Sprüchen, die immer an der Seite entlang der Bordüre aufgedruckt sind:

Furaha yako ni yango - du und ich wir fühlen uns gut.

Uliza ujigwiwe - sag es mir und ich sage es dir.

Wer alles will, kann alles verlieren.

Wer kann sich mit einer Mutter vergleichen?

Ein Bauer leidet keinen Hunger.

Lieber eine Panne am Pajero als ein unsteter Freund.

Die frühesten Muster waren schwarz-weißrot.

Am beliebtesten wurden stilisierte Cashewnüsse, aber auch Mangos und Ananas oder Blumenmuster, entweder in der Bordüre oder im Mittelstück.

Cashewnüsse wachsen wie Apfel am Baum und aus der "Fliege" am Ende des Kerngehäuses entstehen die kleinen Nüsse, die im Leso oder Kanga nachgebildet werden.

Es heißt, ohne Cashewnüsse ist es kein richtiger Kanga.

Der Kanga im "Kisuto" Design ist für das Hochzeitsbett bestimmt.

Er ist ohne Text, mit Quer-

streifen in schwarz-weiß-rot und übersät mit kleinen Kreuzen und Rosetten, die Unglück abwenden und Glück bringen sollen.

Das Kisuto Design "Daktari", ebenfalls mit Kreuzen, wurde kopiert von den Quarantäne-Krankenwagen, mit welchen die Kranken eingesammelt wurden, als Sansibar gegen Ende 1800 von der Pest heimgesucht wurde.

Bei einer Kikuyuhochzeit schickt man der Braut mit duftenden Blumen gefüllte Kangas als Geschenk.

Ihre Freundinnen legen singend Kangas auf den Boden vor dem Haus, damit die Braut wie über einen Teppich schreitet.

Kangas werden auch als Vermögen gehortet, 100 bis 300 Stück.

Diese werden nach und nach verkauft, wenn Geld benötigt wird, zum Beispiel um die Schule für die Kinder zu bezahlen.

Kangas werden von Frauen und Kindern, gelegentlich auch von Männern getragen.

Sie finden Verwendung bei Geburt, Hochzeit und Tod, als Geschenk, oft mit ausgesuchtem Sinnspruch für die passende Gelegenheit.

Ein Mann darf einen Kanga nur seiner Frau, seiner Mutter, Schwester oder Tante schenken.

Für besondere Anlässe werden Kangas hergestellt, wie 1952 zur Krönung von Königin Elizabeth II.

Wenn die Mohammedaner mit dem Feiertag "Idd ul Fitr" das Ende des Fastenmonats Ramadan zelebrieren, werden bis zu 10'000 Kangas an einem Tag verkauft!

In einem Büchlein, das man während der Ausstellung im alten Gerichtsgebäude in Mombasa kaufen konnte, sind 101 Verwendungsmöglichkeiten für den Kanga beschrieben.

BETTLAKEN

Als Wickeltuch, gerollt als Turban, als Kopftuch, Tischtuch, Bettlaken, Bettüberwurf, Kissenerüberzug, Vorhänge, Wandbehang etc. etc.

Der Phantasie sind keine Grenzen gesetzt.

Afrikanerinnen tragen ihr Baby in einem Kanga auf den Rücken gebunden.

Kangas werden auch je nach ihrem Muster zugeschnitten und genäht, was attraktive Kleidungsstücke ergibt.

Die Tücher sind sehr angenehm zu tragen, pflegeleicht und nicht teuer.

Die Kanga-Ausstellung, hervorragend organisiert von den Nationalmuseen von Kenia und unterstützt von der Königlichen Niederländischen Botschaft in Nairobi, wurde im alten Gerichtsgebäude abgehalten, das an sich sehenswert ist.

Es ist ein feines Beispiel des frühen Kolonialstils, das 1902 vom britischen Kolonialgouverneur Sir Charles Elliot eröffnet wurde.

1983 wurde das Gericht in die neuen Gebäude verlegt.

Der alte Bau wurde unter Denkmalschutz gestellt und den Nationalmuseen von Kenia übergeben.

Nach gründlicher Renovierung und Restaurierung wird das obere Stockwerk als Bibliothek und Büros benutzt und die unteren Räume dienen seit einem Jahr hauptsächlich als Galerie für Gemälde- und Fotoausstellungen.

Im großen Saal werden überdies Seminare und Workshops abgehalten.

Die Kanga-Ausstellung in Mombasa war ein voller Erfolg und soll im September ins Museum von Gedi an der Nordküste verlegt werden.

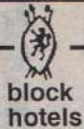

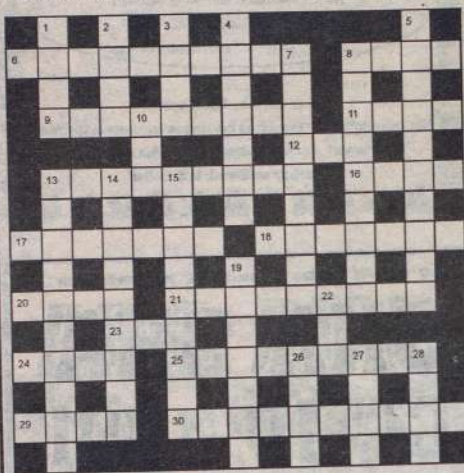

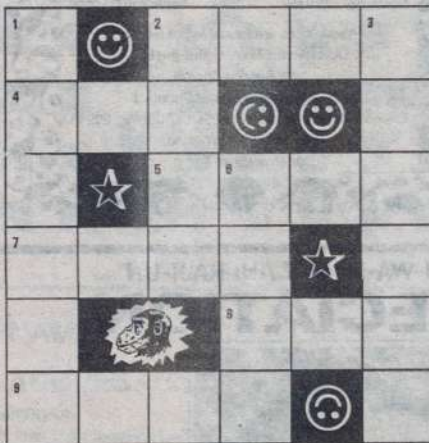

Angler's Dream Comes True For Neil Reed And Nigel Spencer On 'Tengesi'

ONE DEFINITION of a sea-angler's dream could be leaning back against the heavy bend of the rod in the cool of the early-morning breeze while the marlin on the end of the line leaps again and again, gleaming silver and blue in the sunlight, and behind it a humpback whale leaps also, a giant creature



with its long flippers clear of the surface, falling back to send up a white splash like a water-sput.

This double drama was the true situation for Neil Reed and Nigel Spencer on Friday last week when they were out in the *Sesse canoe, Tengesi*.

They had seen two whales jumping earlier, a mother and her small calf, and half an hour later the marlin knocked the line out of the outrigger clip and followed the strip-bait until it was teased into taking it, when the whales started breaching again behind the leaping marlin.

It was a small black marlin, perfect for the light tackle being used, a twenty-pound breaking strain line, and it did the usual black marlin trick of going deep after the acrobatics, to be coaxed up slowly with maximum pressure from the rod.

After thirty-five minutes it

was brought to the boat and wreman Kazungu had a near miss when he had the leader in his hand and the fish jumped again, slashing at the man with its bill.

But it calmed down and was admired, was estimated to weigh forty-five kilos, about a hundred pounds, and was revived and then released without damage, swimming away slowly into the blue depths of the sea.

This was Neil's first marlin of this species, his first billfish taken on twenty pound line, his first fish of the new season, caught on his first outing of the season, and it all took place on the first of September.

If that ain't a good start to the season, what is?

These two anglers went on to catch two yellowfin tuna also, after a lot of chasing as the yellowfin were moving about the ocean at speed tearing into huge shoals of balfish and vast congregations of mantis prawns that looked like rafts of active seaweed.

Another black marlin was caught on the same day, a small one also, by crew members of the *Monarch* airline fishing on *Water Brun's* boat, *Nala*.

The same boat, in its only other outing of the week, had landed another billfish on Tuesday, a sailfish this time, of 25 kilos, caught by Gert Zoeger.

Attacked

Sailfish was also the quarry for Marcel Verwiel, who on Sunday landed one of 28 kilos after attempts to revive it had failed, so it could not be released.

Marcel was fishing on board James Adcock's *Vuma* with his party that included Mtwapa resident Sparky Behrens, and the sailfish was one of two that attacked the baits at the same time.

For *Vuma*, whales were in the limelight earlier in the week when James took out Don Allen in this boat and they

saw six humpbacks in succession, one being a small calf also.

Apart from billfish, with the odd yellowfin tuna thrown in, not many other species of fish have been caught, being probably gorged on the mantis prawns, but, unusually for this time of year, some fair sized dorado have been brought in, with the African Safari Club boat *Sea Lord* having a good catch of fourteen of them on Wednesday, and two whahoo also, with many others lost by the inexperienced anglers, but it all made for lots of fun.

Which is the name of the game for fishing, and there's whole lot of it to look forward to in the months of the season that stretch invitingly ahead.

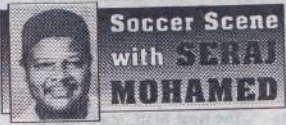

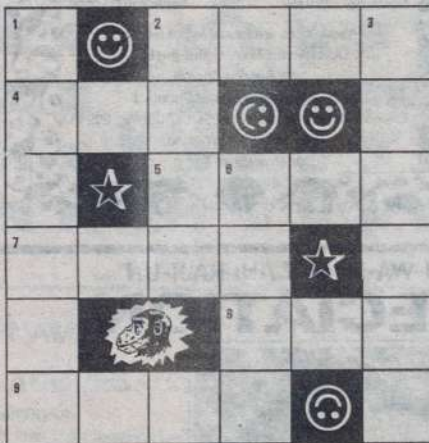

The 420 parade was well behind and led by *Mikono Mingi* who in reality had no serious competition in the whole series.

This race effectively finished the series as Chris Barnes in *Nyekundu* had won three of the four races to collect the 'V' Cup.

Neelam Shah in *Orion* was there with two wins and a second to win the Bosun Whistle.

Omar Mbithi had three out of four wins in the Jorge Cup and that made him unstoppable.

Angler's Dream Comes True For Neil Reed And Nigel Spencer On 'Tengesi'

ONE DEFINITION of a sea-angler's dream could be leaning back against the heavy bend of the rod in the cool of the early-morning breeze while the marlin on the end of the line leaps again and again, gleaming silver and blue in the sunlight, and behind it a humpback whale leaps also, a giant creature with its long flippers clear of the surface, falling back to send up a white splash like a water-sput.

This double drama was the true situation for Neil Reed and Nigel Spencer on Friday last week when they were out in the *Sesse canoe, Tengesi*.

They had seen two whales jumping earlier, a mother and her small calf, and half an hour later the marlin knocked the line out of the outrigger clip and followed the strip-bait until it was teased into taking it, when the whales started breaching again behind the leaping marlin.

It was a small black marlin, perfect for the light tackle being used, a twenty-pound breaking strain line, and it did the usual black marlin trick of going deep after the acrobatics, to be coaxed up slowly with maximum pressure from the rod.

After thirty-five minutes it

was brought to the boat and wreman Kazungu had a near miss when he had the leader in his hand and the fish jumped again, slashing at the man with its bill.

But it calmed down and was admired, was estimated to weigh forty-five kilos, about a hundred pounds, and was revived and then released without damage, swimming away slowly into the blue depths of the sea.

This was Neil's first marlin of this species, his first billfish taken on twenty pound line, his first fish of the new season, caught on his first outing of the season, and it all took place on the first of September.

If that ain't a good start to the season, what is?

These two anglers went on to catch two yellowfin tuna also, after a lot of chasing as the yellowfin were moving about the ocean at speed tearing into huge shoals of baitfish and vast congregations of mantis prawns that looked like rafts of active seaweed.

Another black marlin was caught on the same day, a small one also, by crew members of the *Monarch* airline fishing on *Water Brun's* boat, *Nala*.

The same boat, in its only other outing of the week, had landed another billfish on Tuesday, a sailfish this time, of 25 kilos, caught by Gert Zoeger.

Attacked

Sailfish was also the quarry for Marcel Verwiel, who on Sunday landed one of 28 kilos after attempts to revive it had failed, so it could not be released.

Marcel was fishing on board James Adcock's *Vuma* with his party that included Mitwapa resident Sparky Behrens, and the sailfish was one of two that attacked the baits at the same time.

For *Vuma*, whales were in the limelight earlier in the week when James took out Don Allen in this boat and they

saw six humpbacks in succession, one being a small calf also.

Apart from billfish, with the odd yellowfin tuna thrown in, not many other species of fish have been caught, being probably gorged on the mantis prawns, but, unusually for this time of year, some fair sized dorado have been brought in, with the African Safari Club boat *Sea Lord* having a good catch of fourteen of them on Wednesday, and two whahoo also, with many others lost by the inexperienced anglers, but it all made for lots of fun.

Which is the name of the game for fishing, and there's whole lot of it to look forward to in the months of the season that stretch invitingly ahead.

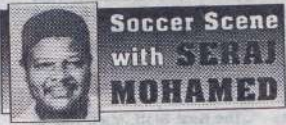
