Medical Camp In Kwale

A COMBINED effort by the Rotary Clubs of Bahari, Mombasa, and Diani, and The Lions Club of Pwani, Mombasa has organised a Medical Camp in Kwale District to be held on Sunday, 22nd October. The camp is offering free treatment for general medical, diabetic, dental, ear, nose and throat and eye problems. Patients will be treated by qualified doctors in specially set up clinics, and free medicines will be prescribed where applicable. For serious cases which cannot be treated on the spot, advice on where to go for help will be given. Eye patients who require cataract operations will be transferred by bus to Mombasa where they will be operated on and then returned to their area. The venue is Verkaait Pyongwani Primary School, some 13 kilometres from the junction to Kwale off the main Lungu Lungu Road, and then approximately 4.5 kilometres off the main road. The school itself has been assisted in building new classrooms by a Dutch benefactor, Mr. Verkaait. The students and teachers will be involved in providing entertainment for the waiting crowds throughout the day, with various demonstrations of sports, including volleyball and karate, and a play about the dangers of AIDS. "We have held these camps for several years now" said Rotarian Varinder Singh Sur, Joint Camp Co-ordinator, "and they have been very successful. "We choose a site, like this primary school, and involve the staff to obtain volunteers and to publicise the occasion amongst the wananchi. "Kwale district is a big area, with one of the poorest standards of medical care in Kenya." "Clubs like Lions and Rotary (the Rotary motto is 'Service Above Self') see this kind of activity as a needed contribution to the community. "The school is in a very attractive part of Kwale, with plenty of room for parking under big trees.

The chairman of the Kenya Tourism Federation, Mr. Mahmud Janmohamed, told the Minister 'today is a demonstration of our commitment to try and find solutions to our problems.

Karim Chakera Publishes A Specialised Mathematic Book For Primary Students

MR. KARIM Chakera has a span of over 25 years in the teaching profession having taught in various Government schools, the last appointment being the Headmaster at Mombasa Primary School.
 He joined the private

sector as a Sales Representative with Mobil Oil Kenya Limited before starting his own institution of Pwani Academy in Mombasa.

He has been teaching Standard seven (CPE) and Standard eight (KCPE) with specialisation in English and Maths, both being his favourite subjects.

Having seen and used various types of Maths books, he realised the need to have a kind of book to help pupils from the later part of Standard six going up to Standard eight and this is what he has to say:

"This book is written to help pupils in Standard seven and eight to obtain good marks and outstanding results in their final examination at Primary Level.

"It is also intended to help pupils in Standard six

in the later part of their year.

"The test papers without multiple choice are graded simple sums to difficult ones.

"Of these, the first fourteen Test papers are relatively simple and easy to do.

"The rest gradually become difficult.

"The graded questions give an average child confidence to improve his or her ability in Mathematics.

"The first 25 tests should be done within the time limit indicated.

"The rest of the paper that is from 26 to 48 should be done within minutes to twenty minutes.

"The last two papers have figures question and formulae which help the child to secure better marks.

"It is hoped that the pupils who solve the papers with a full understanding of the workings and solutions will secure good marks in Mathematics papers Kenya Certificate of Primary Education" Mr. Chakera.

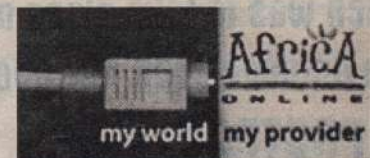

being relocated into beach access roads as an interim measure.

At the Harambee they were also given the opportunity to address the Minister and publicly declare their support.

It is a big effort by tourist associations, together with government, to end the harassment of tourists on the beach so that more will be attracted here which will go a long way towards accelerating the revival of coast tourism.

The Minister told the beach operators this exercise is not aimed at undermining your aspirations but of integrating you into the tourism trade and enhancing your capacity in a much more organised and more credible way.

Adding 'government has decided to formalise and regulate your operations and that is the main reason why we are here today.

We will be beginning a process which will continue and I would like to appeal to all hotel owners / tour operators to continue with their support so that it does not fail.

Once we have started on something it must succeed.

It must give hope to those moving from the beach.'

Adding 'we will be decisive in its implementation.

We will make sure that what we have set up and have regulated will be enforced.'

He emphasised to Beach Operators that 'when allocated a stall or a stand it is for you and you cannot transfer it to anyone else.

To do so will mean you risk losing your allocation.

This was greeted with much applause.

The Minister explained 'a Board of Trustees for the Beach Operators Relocation Programme has been set up drawing its members from the tourist industry, my Ministry, stakeholders, and includes a representative of Beach Operators which will ensure the smooth transfer on a non-discriminatory basis of Beach Operators into Tourist Markets.

He told Board members 'the principle of affirmative action to be taken into account when allocating these stalls is that at least the local community here will feel it is not being marginalised.'

The Minister went on to how pleased he was to hear from a representative of Beach Operators that they no longer regard themselves as Beach Boys, but as 'Wazee'.

Explained the Minister 'Wazee are dignified and do not harass visitors but allow them to enjoy their privacy.'

He told them 'I hope you will continue acting as Wazee'.

LICENCED SAFARI SELLERS

Turning to the question of Safari Sellers, the Minister said 'I think this needs to be regulated, more because we want to be sure that whoever is marketing safaris is accountable.

In other words he must be licensed so that we know who he is.

Adding 'I have received numerous letters of complaint and have read in the press about tourists coming here and being conned.

Consequently, we need to pay special attention to safari sellers operating at the coast.

The Minister continued 'our President has been talking about peace and unity.

We are lucky in this country for

we have survived about 37 years, thanks to the founding Father, Mzee Jomo Kenyatta, who told people to forget the past and concentrate on the future.

Our President has followed that ideal and we shall continue doing so.

It is that need for peace and unity which we must instill in our own people.

We must encourage them to be civilised, law abiding, for when they do so there is peace.

Earlier in addressing the gathering Suleiman Kamolle, MP for Matuga had referred to the civil service retirement programme.

He told the Minister 'we know it must be done, but I believe it should not involve your Ministry.

However, we have already lost James Mwai, the Ag. Provincial Tourist Officer, Coast, who has been instrumental in many ways in helping with the Beach Operators Relocation Programme.

We have also lost our Tourist Officer in Taita / Taveta and one in Kwale, from where I come.'

In appealing to the Minister for help he said 'we know it is not easy, but we know these are the people we need to carry out this programme successfully.

Mr. Kamolle also stressed that tribalism / colour bar are not wanted at the Coast.'

Identifying later the Minister said 'if there are good people who have lost out in the civil service retrenchment programme all I can say is that they should appeal and do so very fast so that their case can be looked into.'

Mike Kirkland, Vice-Chairman, Kenya Tourism Federation and Chairman, Kenya Association of Tour Operators, Coast, speaking as a 'representative of the Trustees' gave details of the recently launched Trust.

He said it had been founded by KTF, KATO, KAHK, MCTA, Ministry of Tourism and represented a true partnership between government and the private sector.

'All members of the Board of Trustees are entrusted to ensure that all monies collected go towards the building of Tourist Markets with as little money as possible going for any administrative duties.'

Said Mr. Kirkland 'we are doing this voluntarily and no one is paid even a 'ndururu' for their hard work.

He went on to thank 'our lawyer, Mr. Atiq Anjarwalla, who very kindly formed the Trust and put in a lot of hard work free of charge, and the Commercial Bank of Africa who have assured us they will provide banking services at cost price.'

Explaining the purpose of a Beach Operators Re-Location Programme, Mr. Kirkland said 'the problem of harassment of our tourists on Kenya beaches is so serious that many have refused to of return.

It not only led to a decline in the number of tourists, but the whole economy in the coast province.'

Adding 'since coast tourism declined we have all suffered.

We now realise what tourism really means to us when today over 50 per cent of coast residents live below the poverty line.

Consequently, the success of tourism at the coast is of paramount importance to the success and well being of all coastal people as we have very few other sources of income.

The Beach Operators themselves stand to benefit for once they have premises of their own they will become serious businessmen and women.

Their social status will be uplifted.'

Said Mr. Kirkland 'once today's Harambee is over the Trustees will sit together and see how much money they have and how best to spend it.

We will then put the construction work of Tourist Markets out to tender, this to ensure all such transactions are completely transparent.

If we have to start some other sort of fund-raising to reach our target of Kshs. 65 million, then we shall do so for we must reach it by whatever means possible.'

Mr. Kirkland reiterated that hotel shops will stop selling curios to avoid competition with Beach Operators and will advise their guests where to find them.

Adding 'most tour operators have already pledged to include visits to these markets in their city tours.

TOURIST MARKETS

He thanked Dalip S. Dhanjal for Volunteering to build the first Tourist Market, south coast hoteliers for clearing plots, Watamu hoteliers for fencing and putting toilets in on their plots, Whispering Palms Hotel for building toilets and all others who had assisted.

He also thanked the Mombasa, Kilifi, Kwale and Malindi Municipal Councils for their excellent co-operation in making plots available and took the opportunity of pointing out that this initiative is not just for this area but from Lunga-Lunga to Lamu.

He also thanked government for guaranteeing that once these markets are in operation no one will be allowed to trade on the beach, which will only then be available for recreation and not business.

He concluded by conveying 'sincere thanks to the Ministry of Tourism, Trade and Industry for its very hard work, especially to Dr. Rashid Ali, Deputy Secretary, who has worked so hard on this project.

Lastly, to the Minister, Mr. Nicholas Biwott for coming up with this brilliant idea of a 'HARAMBEE'.

When introducing the Minister, Mr. John Egesa Deputy Provincial Commissioner Coast, told Mr. Biwott 'we support your efforts, Sir, and are happy you are here

Leaders in the coast province have said loud and clear that they will make sure that people here do not go in for any violence'.

Adding but when some people from up-country come to do politically motivated clashes they should be identified by the government and stopped.

The Member of Parliament for the area, Emmanuel Karisa Maitha, described the Tourism Minister as a 'pro-active man and that he had liked the way he had wanted everyone to participate in suggesting how tourism at the coast could be improved.'

He said the Beach Operators Relocation Programme involves the local people and seven MPs within the region.

He went on 'this project is not political, but one that will save tourism.'

There has been a lot of incitement against it, but your officers stood firm.'

Said the MP 'let me assure all present that this project will involve all beach operators whether they are from up-country or from here'

He thanked the Minister for his support in getting sponsorship to go to the Seychelles and Indian Ocean Islands to see how governments there were dealing with such matters.

Adding 'it has really helped me in being a non-tribal man and that is why I am going to tell our people whether they are Giriama, Kamba, Kikuyu, Kalenjin or whatever they will have to work together as brothers to

make the Re-Location programme a big success.

He concluded 'although I am in the Opposition, let me be the first to support government's efforts and to congratulate Dr. Rashid Ali, Deputy Secretary who has worked together with all concerned tirelessly.

Beach Operators spoke conveying their happiness with the programme and their support, all delighted to see Dr. Rashid Ali's efforts bear fruit.

Among them was Mr. S. Ochochi, Chairman of the Beach Operators Association on the south coast, who is also a Trustee.

He said 'we thank government for its help which is in line with the President's call for the eradication of poverty.'

CO-OPERATION

Adding 'we have never taken the government to court, have always co-operated and are ready to move.

Commented Hamed Fumo, Chairman of the Coast Boat Operators Association 'we are happy with what government is doing and will always assist'.

He promised that his members would not move around the beach, nor harass tourists.

He concluded with a plea to government 'not to licence glass-bottomed boats to foreigners'.

Entertaining at the Opening of the Harambee were, students from the Mtomondoni Primary School with some lively traditional dancing and singing.

Do the organizers of this public and free for all event hold the right of determining of who shall cover the carnival?

Do the organizers recall why founder members resolved to organize this carnival in the first

place?

What clauses or powers did they invoke to reach this very unpopular decision?

I wish to remind the trustees that Mombasa town is fortunate to have within its boundaries several media houses and firms that are naturally interested in covering this annual public event.

Giving the *Nation Media Group* without due consideration to firms like KTN, KBC, Standard, Baraka FM, FM Metro, BBC etc. clearly exposes the greed of fellow Kenyans in pursuit of stardom.

What a fallacy this in the 21st Century, a century of fair competition and sharing of information!

Finally, in my capacity as a founder member of the Mombasa Carnival I wish to make it clear to all interested parties intending to cover this event to come in large numbers for this is their day and no one should hinder their coverage.

Mombasa residents must be made to enjoy what is rightfully theirs.

Kerep up the Carnival mood and let us all enjoy the party, come 4th November, 2000

MAKING TRAINING COST EFFECTIVE

YOU MAY be asking the question - "But thought training was effective?" yes - to a certain extent that is true!

However let us add another word to the title of this article.

"Making Training Cost Effective" Now this word 'cost' means for all managers of Hotels / Restaurants / Production / Service Organisations in Mombasa to be asking themselves "is it possible I am sending people for training that is Not 'Cost Effective' and what do I have to do to ensure that it is 'Cost Effective'?"

Yes to the first question!

It is quite possible we are sending staff for training that is not cost effective.

By this I mean you are not getting value for your money!

Whose fault is it?

Not the trainers but often your own!

"So I am costing myself money," you may be saying!

Yes sadly this is true. I will show you why now and what you can do to ensure your money is spent wisely.

Before any of your staff attend any training is there an agreed understood objective in your company as to why training is being carried out?

Do we all have a medium to long-term plan for the development of staff?

What are we trying to achieve from this training?

How is it going to help the organisation be more commercially profitable?

What do I have to do as the Manager / Supervisor to ensure that my training of staff is cost effective?

Let us examine them one at a time -

1. Have a clear agreed plan for development of all staff that they all understand.

You do this by involving senior management in that plan and gaining agreement to it by everyone.

2. Before staff attend training brief them to explain why they

are attending a particular course, discuss with them the content of that course and how they will apply these things at work.

Arrange a meeting together to discuss the course following the training.

3. Following training sit with the staff member and ask them to explain what they have learnt and how they will apply these things at work.

Ask how is it going to help them perform their jobs better?

4. Arrange for regular meetings, say every month to

review progress and to evaluate their development in their present job.

It is very important to have a review mechanism in order to evaluate progress of an individual at whatever level in your company.

By following these suggestions you will ensure that training undertaken by staff will be "Cost Effective" and not a waste of time and money!

It will also motivate and encourage your staff because they will see some objective to their training.

Avoid the vague expressions that are so often made "Oh you're back then, did you enjoy the training?"

Were the meals O.K.!

It is this sort of comment that is so valueless and one we are now sure to avoid.

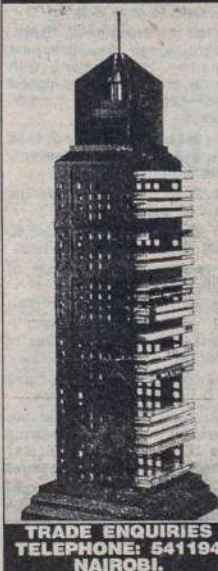

INDIANS SMASH FANCIED AUSSIES AS PAKISTAN CRUMBLE TO KIWIS

WORLD champions Australia were bundled out of the ICC Knockout tournament when they lost to India by 20 runs in the first quarter final played at the Nairobi Gymkhana, writes **QAYAM KASSAMALI from the Press Box at Nairobi Gymkhana.**

Australian captain Steve Waugh called right on the flip of the coin and decided to put India to bat.

With the world's two two batsmen facing the world's two best fast bowlers it was definitely going to be an exciting encounter.

Sachin Tendulkar began the onslaught straight away when he got off the mark by hitting Glen McGrath for a six at point.

It did not stop there. In McGrath's third over, Tendulkar smashed him for 12 runs, which included a six and a four off consecutive deliveries.

McGrath's first spell of six overs cost him 40 runs without any wicket.

Brett Lee managed to keep Tendulkar quiet until the eleventh over when he had him caught at slip by D. Martyn for 38 off 37 balls which included three fours and three sixes.

At this stage the score was 66.

Saurav Ganguly (24 off 42 balls) and Rahul Dravid (nine off 18 balls) did not last longer and India was three wickets down with 90 on the board.

This brought to the crease 18 year-old Yuvraj Singh who playing his second one day international match but his first innings to bat.

Along with Vinod Kambli they put up a 40 run partnership for the fourth wicket.

Yuvraj played some beautiful shots to show what a classy one-day player he is.

He cut, drove and pulled exceptionally well making the Australian bowlers stranded as to where to bowl to him.

With the departure of Kambli, Robin Singh was the next batsman in and along with Yuvraj, produced India's highest partnership of 64 for the fifth wicket.

At the score of 194 for 5, India managed to get only seventy runs in the last 14 overs.

India finished with 265 for the loss of nine wickets.

Y. Singh was out for 84 off 60 balls, which included 12 fours. His half-century came from 46 balls.

Brett Lee had figures of 2 for 39, while J. Gillespie and I. Harvey finished with figures of 2 for 39 and 2 for 31 respectively. G. McGrath finished with figure of 0 for 61 from nine overs.

Australia were penalized two overs for their delay in finishing the 50 overs in the allocated time. The Aussies had a target of 266 from 48 overs.

Australia did start well as they would have liked with their three top order batsmen inside the pavilion with 86 runs on the board.

Yuvraj Singh

A. Gillchrist had 33 to his credit. This brought Ricky Ponting and one-day specialist, Michael Bevan to the centre.

At one stage the game looked going in Australia's favour but some exceptional fielding by the Indians saw a classy direct throw to Man of the Match Yuvraj Singh to run out Bevan for 42 of 52 balls which included three boundaries.

The crowd saw more excitement when Robin Singh

took a brilliant diving catch at square leg to dismiss Ricky Ponting for 46 of 59 balls, which had five boundaries and one six off the bowling of V. Prasad.

Steve Waugh could not do much to rescue his side, but at one stage Australia looked to have gone on top when sensational young fast bowler Brett Lee came and played a quick knock of 31 of 28 balls which had three boundaries and two sixes off the bowling of Anil Kumble and Zaheer Khan.

The second six he hit Zahir Khan was the biggest ever seen this year which landed on the windscreen of a car parked on the outer boundary wall of Nairobi Gymkhana.

The Aussies never recovered and were all out for 246.

Zaheer Khan had 2 for 40 while Anil Agarkar and Venkatesh Prasad had 2 for 59 and 2 for 43 respectively.

THE SECOND quarter final had Pakistan thrashing Sri Lanka by nine wickets on Sunday.

Sri Lanka having won the toss decided to bat and put a big total for Pakistan to try and chase.

Sri Lanka did not start off well and lost A. Gunawardena and Marvan Atapattu for only eight runs on the board.

A 55 run partnership between captain Sanath Jayasuriya and Mahela Jayawardena for the third wicket rescued Sri Lanka from crisis.

Jayasuriya was top scorer with 39 off 41 balls which comprised of four boundaries and three sixes.

Wasim Akram and Azhar Mahmood shared the spoils as the finished with figures of 3 for 40 and 3 for 52 respectively.

Saqain Mushtaq ably supported with figures of 2 for 30.

Pakistan had an excellent start to their innings scoring 75 runs in the first fifteen overs.

Saeed Anwar and Imran Nazir hit the bowlers all around the park.

Nazir was the first to depart when he was run out with the score on 90.

The snappers and barracudas were very co-operative and by the time morning broke, they had a tally of ten barracudas and 48 snappers.

On their way back they met with the tunas and soon they had five with the biggest one weighing in at 14kg.

One tuna that one of the anglers was fighting, was taken by a very large black marlin near the boatside.

The black marlin effortlessly, nearly stripped the 80pound reel and with very little line remaining on the reel the marlin came out of the water and spat back the mangled tuna.

The tuna remains weighed in at 11kg.

Elegio Battala fishing with clients on Inca also had a good day on Sunday.

Chris Mills from England landed twelve yellowfin tunas with the biggest tipping the

scales at 18kg.

T.T. fished by Mr. and Mrs. Nielson from Finland landed four tunas with Christine Nielson landing a heavyweight of 14kg.

This was her first big fish and after the tussle, she reckoned her arms had stretched by a foot.
