## 'OPERATION SMILE' AT THE 'COAST GENERAL'

### AMERICAN EXPERT OFFERS FREE PLASTIC SURGERY FOR KENYAN CHILDREN WITH FACIAL DEFORMITIES

Operation Smile is the greatest humanitarian due to financial constraints affecting the world at large. Operation Smile this year had to reduce its activities to two venues in Kenya - Mombasa and Nairobi.

Meanwhile, the Mission's Mombasa branch has appointed an Executive Committee under

the Chairmanship of Dr Kate Nuthwell, which is presently deeply involved in fundraising and organisational details.

Vice Chairman is Dr J.S. Radol (PhD) a Maxillo-Facial, Dental Surgeon and the founder of 'Operation Smile' Mombasa while its executive Secretary is Dr Kibidje Sitokely, the hospital's

Chief Administrator and Consultant Paediatrician.

It has members from the hospital and 'volunteers' from outside who include businessmen and bankers.

Dr Nuthwell is also Chairman of The Social Service League, Mombasa.

At the beginning of November between 150-170 children from all over the coast province are expected to start arriving for screening on November 2-3.

The 30 selected having their operations over a five day period (Nov 9-12).

They will include several who have been badly burned and need skin grafts for the burn area including a plastic surgeon.

Patients from outside Mombasa who do not have relatives here, stay in the hospital.

They will be the first to be operated upon as they are status four cases.

The operation and hospitalisation are all free of charge.

The young patients remain there for three days after the operation under the attentive care of post-operative nurses and speech therapists before

being discharged.

Their doctors back home will then keep an eye on them.

## Biwott Optimistic On Tourism Revival

MEMBER OF Tourism, Trade Industry, Mr. Nicholas Biwott, seeing about the growth of the tourism we forecast by the World Organisation said that while water arrives to Africa as concerned (which have been lagging behind others) this is estimated to increase from 12 million in 1995 to 40 million by the year 2010 and to 75 million by the year 2025, writes Irena Patel.

There are positive signs of growth and are trying to diversify by introducing cultural tourism, sport and other leisure orientated

packages as well as by promoting cruise tourism.

We need to make our products very attractive, which we are doing, and we have to understand exactly what we

need to do in a global setting in order to share and become participants in that growing market of tourism.

The Minister reported that currently there are 15 charter flights a week from Europe bringing in about 2500 tourists.

This number is likely to increase to about 5000 arrivals per week some time this year, which means that the coast will benefit.

Meanwhile, we have been named by the Chairman of the Kenya Association of Hoteliers and Caterers, Coast, Travel Kamp, that the prospect for the middle of next year appears to be less favourable.

However, declared the Minister "we believe that with this early warning the industry, together with my Ministry, will prepare for that situation, and perhaps look for an alternative source of tourists to even out the dip in that particular time."

Adding I do not think this will be a permanent feature and believe that if we act quickly we might be able to find a solution.

These remarks were made by the Tourism Minister when addressing the 'Harabar' for the Beach Operators Re-Location Trust at Travelers Beach Hotel.

# The Rate At Which 'Matatus' Are Killing 'Wananchi' Must Rank Us Close To Top Of The World League !

ACCIDENT statistics make interesting reading especially when one gets behind why they are skewed in a particular way for the country concerned. Take our own country.

The major cause of fatalities per passenger kilometre is public transport.

The rate at which buses and 'matatus' are killing 'wananchi' must rank us close to the top of the world league.

This statistic is probably common for a lot of African countries.

However, when one comes to damage per kilometre travelled then the countries on our continent go lower down in the scale and countries in the European and Americas rise to the front.

Kachumbari was in the South recently.

Their final destination was a relatively small town.

When they came out of the airport, they were met by a driver sent by their host.

Immediately they left the airport, they hit a motorway.

Due to the mid afternoon arrival, there was very little traffic on the road.

What they first noticed was

that there was a special lane for buses and minibuses which also formed the lane closest to the central reserve in each carriageway.

This was to allow such vehicles rapid passage during traffic jams.

The first query that came to mind was why the lanes were put in the centre as opposed to

and 'matatus' stopped in the fast lane of the motorway to let people off.

Sometimes it was not even done in stalled traffic when vehicles were stopped.

People occasionally get off when traffic is moving and then they have to jaywalk across the lanes to get to the outside.

This happens at times when people feel that the cops are nowhere to be seen.

It is a common ill that has not been stamped on and because there have been very few fatalities, there has been no clamp down.

It is only a matter of time before road fatalities by jaywalking will become a matter of national concern.

The other thing that Kachumbari noticed was the number of scrapes evident on the massive concrete central division on the road.

The structure is made to deflect cars that would otherwise go to the opposite lane in the event of an accident.

The only place that one finds that one roads in Kenya is on the road leaving Nairobi towards the Rift Valley just past Kangemi.

The central division in this country had a large number of scratch marks of different colours in stark contrast to the one in Nairobi which has gaping holes seemingly caused by a demolition squad.

The difference between in damage to the central reserve is an indication of driving styles and perceptions in the two countries.

In the case of the country in the South of Africa, the scratches and dents on the central reserve has been caused by small cars.

According to local information, most of the cars that have inspected the masonry on the road are the sportish expressions of class.

## IMPACT BARS

The BMWs, Mercs, Porsches Audis and so forth have been the biggest cause of damage.

The myth that the drivers have is that those cars are indestructible.

As a standard most all the cars are fitted with ABS, front airbags, side impact bars, side airbags, sophisticated slip sensors and so forth.

As far as the drivers are concerned, they can drive as they wish and the car will protect them in the event of an accident.

They there fore tend to hog the centre lane of the motorway and drive at speeds in excess of what would normally be expected.

At times, they find that buses



the outside of the motorway.

There was no clear answer but the consensus was that such vehicles on motorways would not be dropping off passengers hence they were allowed the "fast" lane to give them advantage over the other traffic.

The reality was slightly different.

Passengers still wanted to get on and off at the place they were due to get off.

## TWENTY YEARS' AGO ...

COASTWEEK, October 17 - 23, 1980:

MOMBASA Mayor Rajah Sumbi announced that the Municipal Council would build a tourist hotel complex within the municipality area. The hotel was likely to be constructed along Moi Avenue on Uhuru Gardens and would be jointly owned by the Council and the Kenya Tourist Development Corporation.

KENYA Jayvees were to hold their annual convention at the Coast for the first time. About 180 delegates, wives and children would be staying at Jeddah Beach Hotel in Diani for the Jayvees Fifth Convention which would be opened by the Minister of Energy Mr. J. H. Otway.

THE FIRST ever multi-storey car park in Mombasa was to be opened to the public. The car park with six floors, accommodating 260 cars was part of the second phase development of Ambotal House, which had cost the investing company Pan Africa Insurance Company Limited K.Shs. 49 million.

A REVOLUTIONISED industry in boat building at the Coast had been established in Kilifi by the newly formed Ferrocraft Limited, the joint effort by two Kenyan companies. Ferrocraft made boats using steel and cement.

SHARAD Patel's epic "Rise And Fall of Idi Amin" carried on to packed houses at KENYA Cinemas. IN THE same vein, the other real life drama "Operation Thunderbolt" which pictured the Israeli raid on the hijacked plane at Entebbe to rescue their citizens commenced at REGAL Cinema. KURT Russell played a very convincing Elvis in "Elvis - the Movie" yet another true life story about the King of Rock at NAAZ Cinemas. THE PLOT thickened with Dhanendra and Saira Banu at the CHOX Cinema in "Saanish".

LETTER writers included Managing Director Bamburi Portland Cement, L. L. Roberts who explained in great detail the reasons behind the cement shortage; Mombasa's N. G. Nguyo who was sure that "Kano would replace tribal groupings"; M. A. Harunji congratulating educationist Mohamed Kamel Khan on his knowledge about all the mosques in Mombasa; Kano Executive Officer in Mombasa S. R. D. Mwachu who encouraged everyone to join them in the Kenyatta Day celebrations and "Worried Resident" of Ukunda who wanted the residents to be allowed to choose their own Chief.

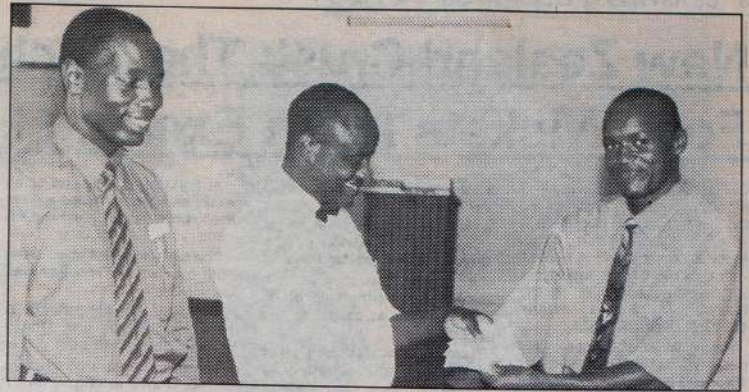

# New Zealand Crush The Much Fancied Indians By Four Wickets In An Exciting I.C.C. Knockout Final

**CHRIS CAIRNS'** unbeaten innings of 102 saw New Zealand win the ICC Knockout Kenya 2000 when they defeated much fancied India by four wickets with only two balls to spare in a very exciting encounter at the Nairobi Gymkhana, writes **QAYAM KASSAMALI**.

Having won the toss, on a very new wicket, Kiwi skipper Stephen Fleming did not hesitate when he put the Indians to bat.

At one time he might have regretted his decision as the opening duo of Tendulkar and Ganguly started off with a bang bringing up the 50 partnership in the seventh over.

It did not stop there as the Indians continued to dominate the New Zealand bowling until the 27th over when Tendulkar was run out in a mix up.

## Azharuddin

The first wicket fell at 141, the highest opening partnership of this tournament with Sachin Tendulkar scoring 69 (ten fours, one six) off 82 balls.

When Tendulkar reached 15, he became the highest run-getter in one-day internationals, surpassing former Indian captain Mohamed Azharuddin.

Tendulkar was playing his 253rd international. Ganguly continued, scoring his second century of this tournament, the earlier one being against the South Africans in the semi-finals.

He played some excellent shots clearing the ropes four times, whereas he also hit nine fours.

His innings of 117 was off 130 balls, with his half-century and century coming off 67 and 110 balls respectively.

He was caught at long on by Harris off the bowling of Styris.

With Ganguly out in the 43rd over, India only managed to score 35 more runs of the last seven overs, finishing at 265 for 6.

Styris was the most successful bowler in terms of wickets finishing with figures of 2 for 53, while Cairns was very economical giving away only 40 runs in his ten overs which included two maidens.

New Zealand did not start the

chase well, losing Spearman in the second over.

He was brilliantly caught at point by Yuvraj Singh off the bowling of Prasad for three.

Astle and Twose shared a third wicket partnership of 45 before Astle was caught at silly mid on for 37.

Twose did not last long either being brilliantly stumped by Dahiya for 31.

At the fall of the fifth wicket, Harris joined Cairns at the crease. Cairns was on 32 at that stage.

The fight back began then as both batsmen pushed for singles and at one stage, the Indians looked lost.

It was in the last six overs that India realised that the game was going out of their hands.

By then it was too late, the two Kiwi batsmen were on top of things.

The 47th over permanently changed the match when Kumble was hit for 14 runs, which included a six and a four, hit by Cairns.

Harris was out in the 49th over for 48. Parore, alongside Cairns finished off the game with two balls to spare.

Cairns unbeaten innings of 102 included eight fours and two towering sixes.

Cairns was declared fit to play just before the match after suffering a knee injury during the match against Zimbabwe.

Cairns was declared Man of the Match.

New Zealand earned USD 250,000 for the finals bringing their total earnings to USD 340,000 for the whole tournament.

Yuvraj Singh was next to come in. He was dropped on two and

went ahead to score 41 from 35 deliveries.

He hit Donald for three boundaries in his ninth over.

With 293 on the board after 49 overs, the 300 mark looked definite.

Donald bowled the last over and gave away two runs claiming three wickets, of which one was a run out.

India finished at 295 for 6 with Ganguly carrying his bat for 141 off 142 balls with 12 fours and six sixes.

## Mombasa's Maria Awori And Kim Jin Woo - A Profile On Kenya's Finest Swimmers

**KIM JIN WOO**, a Kenyan of Korean origin, first learned to swim when his big brother pushed him into a pool.

Now he has represented Kenya at the Sydney Olympics I. From the age of five, Kim attended Coast Academy in Mombasa.

When he was nine, the Coast Academy coaches, Hungarian-trained Twalib Ali Yusuf and Abdulmalik Abdulkarim, saw his talent and introduced him to breaststroke and butterfly in addition to the free style and backstroke which he could already do.

Eventually breaststroke became Kim's best.

By the age of 11, Kim was untouchable as a swimmer in Kenya.

He won Victor Ludorum prizes for Coast Academy at regional and national events, and dominated the school's own gala.

He won the Coast Academy gala Victor Ludorum six times I. While his skills developed, Kim broke many national records from the age of 12 onwards.

Kim's first appearance for his country was in the African Juniors Championships in Mauritius in

1996. The following year he went with the national team to Zambia, where he won five gold medals.

At the World Championships in Perth, Australia, in 1998, he broke several national records.

At the African Junior Championships in South Africa that December, he missed a medal by only 0.07 sec.

Kim's first medal came with the Kenya 4 x 100m relay squad at the open African Championship in Nairobi in 1998.

He also represented Kenya at the 1998 Commonwealth Games at Kuala Lumpur.

In April 1999, Kim was awarded an International Olympic Committee scholarship to go and study in Australia.

While there, he has fulfilled a dream by being selected as Kenya's first ever Olympic swimmer.

His coaches, his school, the national swimming authorities and, of course, his family lead all in Kenya who have pride in his achievement.

Early on, coach Twalib Ali had told Kim that he would achieve more as a swimmer than he would in his beloved basketball.

"You've got the brains, height

and strength that you need to make a top athlete," Kim was told, but he hardly believed Twalib's conviction that he would reach Olympic standards.

Kim is a very disciplined young man who copes well with the stresses of intensive training.

The Olympics provide unique exposure to top level competition, and further training should enable Kim to progress and achieve more in future Olympics or in the All Africa Games due in Nigeria.

Kim has more than 30 records to his name, but still has his idols, including Australian superstar Ian Thorpe.

He appreciates the skills of his Kenyan coaches, Twalib Ali and Abdulmalik, who provided him with the foundation at Coast Academy that has got him to Australia.

The Coast Academy community, and all Mombasa are proud of his achievement.

**MARIA AWORI**, a student of Form Four at the Aga Khan Kenya Secondary School was the youngest member of Kenya's Olympic squad.

At the age of 15, she is a swimming sensation.

She is a multiple record holder

in Kenya for freestyle, individual medley and the 100 metres and 200 metres butterfly - a total of ten.

Maria started her swimming career at the age of six and since then has never looked back.

She is a versatile swimmer who has represented her country and school extensively.

She has competed in African Open Championship 1999, All African Games 2000, World Short Course Championship in Athens and the 2000 World Junior Championships in Geneva.

She represented Kenya in the Sydney Olympics in the 100 metres freestyle.

In the school, Maria is a very sincere and obedient student, a perfect role model for the youth, and a shining example of what determination and hard work can achieve.

Maria Awori is at present on a full scholarship given by the Aga Khan Education Service, Kenya.

The entire school community including the Chairperson of the Aga Khan Education Service local committee Mombasa, extend their heartiest congratulations to Maria on being selected to represent Kenya at the Sydney Olympics.

# 'OPERATION SMILE' AT 'COAST GENERAL'

In an interview at the Coast General Hospital, Dr Shikely explained that Medical Officers in each district of the province had been consulted and asked to recommend those most needing such an operation.

Also that before coming to Mombasa they should ensure that they receive treatment for any chest infection, anaemias or mouth disease.

Adding: "We usually make one ward at the hospital completely free for 'Operation Smile'."

"When the children arrive we examine and treat them as necessary before the operation."

"This includes a visit to the Dental Clinic also to a Paediatrician should there be a problem."

"The age range is usually between 1 - 30 years, with particular emphasis on the younger children."

This 47 strong team from America and Nairobi will be

staying at Whitesands Hotel, Bamburi, by courtesy of the Sarova group. It includes surgeons, anaesthetists, nurses with specialised skills, child and speech therapists and nutritionists.

Together with 'Operation Smile' patients, all will be provided with a 'free' lunch each day.

Two surgeons from the coast will be assisting, one being Dr Peter Odour from the Coast General Hospital, who recently returned from America after receiving specialised training under the 'Operation Smile' programme.

Explained Dr Shikely, "In the past we were unable to operate on very young children as we had no intensive care unit."

"Now we can do so thanks to help from the Japanese Government through its Japanese International Co-operation Agency in improving the hospital which now has a well-equipped I.C.U., one of the

best in-public hospitals.

Here Dr Shikely mentioned the help received from City Bank, Nairobi.

Its donation of Dollars 20,000 to 'Operation Smile' coming in the form of four sets cleft lip/cleft palate surgical instruments

These had been distributed by the Ministry of Health to Coast General Hospital, Kenyatta National Hospital, Moi Teaching Hospital, Eldoret and the Kisumu Provincial Hospital.

A condition attached to it was that 'each week one cleft lip or cleft palate operation should be performed free of charge.'

Thus, annually, some 52 children stand to benefit from each hospital.

Declared Dr Shikely, "I think what City Bank has done is fantastic" and went on to describe the bank as a 'real partner in Operation Smile'.

She revealed that following the return of Dr Odour from America the first operation under this CityBank 'condition' had been undertaken at the Coast General Hospital only last week.

Adding 'with this surgical equipment we now have the tools and a trained surgeon to undertake delicate operations

throughout the year.

The Coast General Hospital is assisting in every way possible the 'Operation Smile' programme and has already established a Technical Committee to set up areas within the hospital where such operation is can, take place.

### Food And Beverage:

As a team why don't you as the manager support your team by giving an incentive for waiters to sell more.

A glass of wine with a meal or eating in the more expensive (but different) restaurant in the Hotel.

Possibly have a special offer for 2 people to eat there (give a free bottle of wine).

The waiters will try to sell more if we support them as management.

### Housekeeping:

Room service staff can also suggest a special offers that the Hotel can ask them to promote (of course they should be greeting all guests they meet asking them if they are enjoying their holiday.

What improvements can they make to their room etc. instead of just saying 'Jambo'.

We 'all' sell the services of the hotel.

The other departments involved could be cashiers, maintenance, stores, even the gardeners can greet the guests other than 'Jambo'!

All could be involved in 'selling' the Hotel.

Some staff can do this more than others due to the exposure they have in the hotel, but all need some kind of incentive to encourage them to help your business and themselves!

Man denkt dabei natürlich zuerst an die Schwachen unter den Menschen und es sollte noch viel mehr unternommen werden, um ihnen beizustehen.

Aber die wirklich Schwachen und Hilflosen auf unserem Planeten sind die Millionen Tiere, die uns vollkommen ausgeliefert sind und deren Leben wir total beherrschen.

Ungeachtet ihrer Größe werden Tiere getötet, gefoltert, gequält, man kann sie zu Tode arbeiten oder verhungern lassen, ohne dass sie weltweit durch ein wirkungsvolles Gesetz geschützt sind.

Der Welttierschutzverein **World Society for the Protection of Animals - WSPA** (lies WISPA) glaubt, es ist höchste Zeit für die Welt zu erkennen, dass diese Kreaturen, mit denen wir diesen Planeten teilen, mit Respekt und Gefühl behandelt und geschützt werden müssen.

WSPA arbeitet mit mehr als 300 Mitglieder-Organisationen in 70 Ländern zusammen, um Tiere zu schützen und zu erhalten.

Nachfolgend ein Bericht über einige Projekte und das Wirken des Welttierschutzvereins.

In **England** gab es kürzlich ein glückliches Wiedersehen, als Oskar, ein junger Hund (ein Labradormischling) aus seiner sechsmonatigen Quarantäne geholt und mit dem britischen Soldaten vereint wurde, der ihn in den Straßen von Pristina im Kosovo während des Krieges gefunden und adoptiert hatte.

Der Soldat dachte, er würde Oskar nie wiedersehen, als er nach Großbritannien zurückgerufen wurde.

Glücklicherweise lernte er einen Mitarbeiter von WSPA im Kosovo kennen, der für ihn den Transport des Hundes nach England und die Quarantäne organisierte, alles finanziert von der Leserschaft des Magazins "Dogs Today".

Die Wiedersehensfreude von Oskar und seinem neuen Besitzer war für WSPA eine große Genugtuung und ist ein Beispiel von vielen, wie im Kosovo geholfen wurde.

Während des Krieges wurden dort auch Kühe und andere Tiere behandelt, die von Kugeln und Geschützen verletzt worden waren.

Es gab rund 600 streunende Hunde in den Straßen von Prizren und WSPA hat auf einem früheren Bauernhof ein Hundehaus für diese Tiere eingerichtet.

Ein WSPA Mitglied führte eine Operation durch, um die Hunde zu fangen, behandeln und

"neutralisieren", von denen 75 ein neues Heim gefunden haben, andere, die zu schwer verletzt oder krank waren, wurden human eingeschläfert.

WSPA hat Medikamente geschickt, mit denen jeden Tag viele Tiere behandelt werden können.

In der Türkei wurden sechs Braunbären im Rahmen des "Liberty" Projekts in ein separates Gehege neben dem Schutzgebiet für "rehabilitierte" Tanzbären aufgenommen, darunter die zwei Bärenjungen Erol und Guler.

Sie waren die ersten Tanzbären, die im Sommer 1997 in den Straßen von Istanbul konfisziert und in ein Gehege neben dem Bärenreservat von Karachebey untergebracht wurden.

Sie waren von Wilderern gefangen und als Tanzbären verkauft worden und hatten das Glück, einer hatten und oft schmerzhaften Dressur zu entgehen.

Vier weitere Bärenjunge kamen später zu den beiden Geschwistern.

Das Reservat wurde von WSPA 1993 gebaut und hat rund 40 Tanzbären aufgenommen, die in Istanbul zum Erpotzen der Zuschauer auftreten mussten; es wird nun gemanagt vom türkischen Ministerium für Forstwirtschaft.

Hier leben die jungen Bären in einem Waldgebiet zusammen mit drei älteren blinden Bären, die sich über die Neuankommlinge offensichtlich sehr freuen.

Sie können auf Bäume klettern und in einem Teich planschen und spielen.

Zur gleichen Zeit wurden dem Ministerium für Forstwirtschaft von Jägern drei Bärenbabys übergeben, die sie in den Bergen in der Osttürkei gefunden hatten, nachdem ihre Mütter getötet worden waren.

Die Babys werden ebenfalls in dem Sondergehege gehalten und nach Möglichkeit später in den Wäldern freigelassen, wenn sie groß genug sind.

In **Estland** und in **Kuba** wurden geplante Stierkämpfe abgesagt, nachdem WSPA und andere Tierschutzvereine dagegen protestiert hatten.

In **Spanien** wurde im Zentrum von Madrid ein riesiger Poster aufgestellt zum Beginn der FERIA de San Isidoro, das größte Stierkampf-Festival der Welt, bei dem 160 Stiere gequält und getötet werden während 28 Vorstellungen.

Der Poster, organisiert von WSPA und ALA (Alternativa para la Liberación Animal), sagt: Stierkämpfe sind eine nationale Schande, durch die Spanien ins Mittelalter zurück versetzt wird anstatt näher zum modernen, fortschrittlichen Europa.

## Protestbrief

Stierkämpfe werden in Spanien, Portugal, Frankreich, Mexiko, Kolumbien, Ecuador und Peru abgehalten.

Wenn Sie eines dieser Länder besuchen, sollten Sie den Leuten deutlich zeigen, dass Sie Stierkämpfe verabscheuen und auf keinen Fall ansehen wollen.

Noch besser schreiben Sie einen Protestbrief an die nächste Botschaft dieses Landes, um Ihr Missfallen zu diesem grausamen Spiel auszudrücken.

1999 und 2000 hat WSPA in China umfassende Inspektionen auf Bärenfarmen vorgenommen.

Dabei wurde festgestellt, dass auf den Farmen Bären durch eine Operation verstümmelt werden, damit sie täglich gemolken werden können, um Gallensaft zu gewinnen.

Diese Tiere werden grausam behandelt und gequält, in kleinen Käfigen aus Eisenstäben und oft in einem eisernen Korsett gehalten.

Seit 3000 Jahren werden in der traditionellen chinesischen Medizin Derivate von Bärengalle verwendet, unter anderem um Fieber und Entzündungen zu bekämpfen, als Schutz für die Leber und als Augentropfen.

In den letzten zwanzig Jahren ist der Bedarf für diese "Gallenprodukte" so gestiegen, dass es heute offiziell 247 Bärenfarmen gibt in ganz China mit rund 7000 Bären, die täglich 7000 kg Galle produzieren.

WSPA hat herausgefunden, dass das Überleben der wilden Bären gefährdet ist.

In Südostasien werden die Tiere gefangen und an Bärenfarmen teuer verkauft.

Die auf der Farm geborenen Bärenjungen werden der Mutter nach drei Monaten weg-

genommen und meistens dressiert für Zirkusvorstellungen, sie lernen Boxen, Rad fahren und Seil tanzen.

Nach anderthalb Jahren treten sie nicht mehr auf, sondern werden in kleinen Käfigen gemästet, bis sie drei Jahre alt sind.

Wenn der Bär ausgewachsen ist, kann seine Galle angezapft werden.

Er kommt in einen noch kleineren Käfig, damit das zweimal tägliche Melken einfacher gehandhabt werden kann.

Auf den Farmen, die WSPA besuchte, wurden die Operationen von Leuten ohne veterinärmedizinische Ausbildung vorgenommen.

Die Bären hatten überdies Verletzungen und Narben am Kopf, an den Pfoten und am Rücken wegen zu enger Behausung.

Im Alter zwischen 5 und 10 Jahren hört bei den Bären die Gallensekretion auf und sie kommen in einen anderen Käfig bis sie sterben oder sie werden getötet und die Bärenatzen verkauft, die als eine Delikatesse in Südostasien gehen.

Ursodeoxycholic Acid (UDCA) kann auch synthetisch hergestellt werden und viele chinesische Naturärzte geben zu, dass es mindestens 75 Kräuter gibt, die Bärengalle wirksam ersetzen können.

Gegen eine 3000 Jahre alte Tradition ist schwer zu kämpfen und WSPA versucht, mindestens bessere Bedingungen für die Bären auf den Farmen zu fordern, damit die Tiere weniger Qualen leiden müssen.

## Zementboden

In der **Ukraine** verbrachte ein 18-jähriger europäischer Braunbär die meiste Zeit seines Lebens im Garten eines Museums in einem kleinen rostigen Käfig von 3 x 3 m mit Zementboden, wo er ungeschützt den Naturelementen ausgesetzt war.

1982, als er ein Jahr alt war, wurde Kotya von einem Zirkus zurückgelassen, weil er sich nicht eignete, um Kunststücke zu erlernen.

In dem kleinen Käfig im Museumsgarten konnte er sich nur wenig bewegen und musste sein Fressen von den Zuschauern erbetteln.

Es dauerte mehrere Jahre, bis WSPA von den Behörden die Bewilligung erhielt, Kotya aus der Gefangenschaft zu befreien und nach Ungarn zu bringen in das WSPA-Bärenreservat, wo er nun mit anderen Bären zusammenlebt in einem halb-wilden Schutzgebiet von 7 Acres.

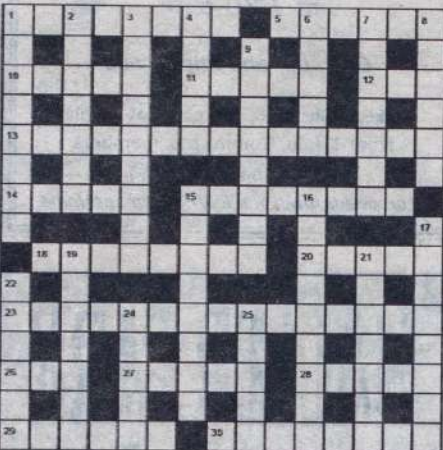

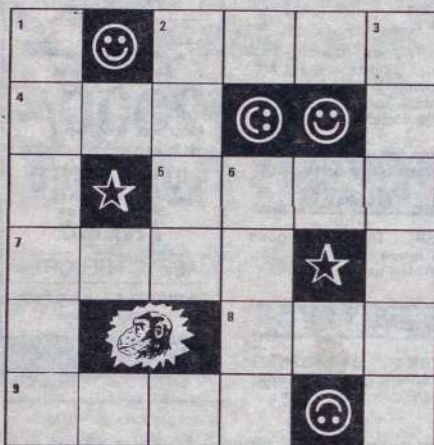

# Anglers Work Hard On The Rods As Shoals Of Tuna In Mood To Bite Baits

WAHOO and yellowfin tuna made up the catches for the few Mtwapa boats that sliced the waves two weeks ago, with some anglers working hard on the rods when they found the shoals of tuna in a mood to bite baits.

First strike of the week, on Monday, fell to **Crispin Sassoon** who went out of his own in his lime-green *Chongolulu* with a casting rod, and he found a shoal not far from the Mtwapa creek entrance and soon there was a fine bend in the long rod as a yellowfin headed for the dark depths.

The line was of only six kilo breaking strain, a mature line, grown unhurried and philosophical through time, and Crispin had to handle the boat himself, and so he took things gently and it was more than an hour before he got the eight-kilo fish in, but pleasing, for fishing is not about the size of the fish but about the unique pleasure of each day.

For others it was frustration time when the surface of the sea was a roiled churn of splash and spray, white as breakers, with the round, dark backs of tuna tunnelling the surface or leaping golden-sided into the light and the baits swinging sweetly through the shoal and now, just now it has to be, but it isn't, not a strike and the tuna are in one of their no-taking moods.

One of the frustrated was visiting angler **Peter Karasek**, fishing on James Adcock's

boat *Vuma* on Wednesday, in the shoals but getting no takes, although he did make up for it with a catch of a good wahoo of 20 kilos.

On the same day **Nigel Spencer** in his *Sesse* canoe, *Tengesi*, caught another wahoo of exactly the same size, and he stayed with the yellowfin shoals until he had a fine additional catch of thirteen of them between seven and ten kilos each.

Saturday was a good day for **Bob Brenneisen** and **Ray Jessop** on Bob's boat, *Bado*, with the fifty-pound reel

suddenly sending up its siren call, and Rob leapt to the order and wielded the rod until he brought in a fine wahoo of twenty-eight kilos.

This was backed up by another wahoo of twelve kilos, a dorado of six kilos and two decent-sized kawakawa.

On Saturday also *Lusitania Big Game Fishing's* boat *Utawala* captained by **Hafiz Mangalji** had a catch of two yellowfin.

During the previous week the fishing improved on the weekend also: the report of that somehow did a disappearing trick, so familiar to anglers chasing a likely-looking shoal, so details of that week follow too.

Three British anglers, **Keith Webber**, **Jack Nicholls** and **Keith Warmesley** had their Friday fishing trip on James Adcock's boat, *Vuma*, postponed by rain, but the Saturday turned out to be their lucky day as they had a catch of a sailfish of 28.5 kilos, and two yellowfin tuna.

The sailfish leapt repeatedly above the stormy sea, a drama of fish and waves and spray, with the boat rocking wildly and another sailfish free-jumping nearby, and then the yellowfin were leaping in tight-packed masses too, churning the water white while the fishermen worked the rods to try and get the first two fish up in time to try for more.

With the sea on that day lumpy and unpredictable under a heavily clouded sky and with a fair wind it was uncomfortable fishing in a *Sesse* canoe, and wet too, but **Nigel Spencer** and **Neil Reed** set out in *Tengesi* and, fishing outside Mtwapa waters again, they found that the tuna liked the conditions and they caught nine yellowfin of between an estimated five and nine kilos and a barracuda of about six kilos plus a couple of bonito.

They also had three good-sized fish cut off, maybe by the tuna, maybe by wahoo, and they had a close encounter with a whale shark that brushed against their downrigger wire and sped off with its high fin waving.

**Bob Brenneisen** was above the waves on the flying bridge of *Bado* on the same day, and he hooked a sailfish which stuck on for a couple of minutes only.

**Walter Brun's Nala** was luckier, with two wahoo of eleven kilos each caught on Saturday, and on Sunday a good sized sailfish of 40 kilos plus two yellowfin, one dorado and one wahoo, each of about ten kilos

caught by the Peugeot team. Bob was out in *Bado* on Sunday too, having not intended to go fishing but, listening in the radio chatter with talk of the yellowfin turning the sea alive, he felt the irresistible urge and set off with his crew.

By coincidence a sometime member of Bob's team, **Len Fitzgerald**, was at an upstairs window at home watching the boats on the sea through his binoculars and wondering what was going on aboard *Bado* with two figures moving at the stern and the boat being thrown around like tall stories at a fishermen's ball.

The explanation was that Bob had struck gold, getting to the wild boiling pot of frenzied yellowfin just at the right time and all the four rods he was fishing with bent to the moan of the reels complaining about the line they were giving up.

One crew member, **Robert**, took the wheel while the other, **John**, did some fancy work lifting rods over and passing them under to keep the lines apart while Bob took each fish in turn and brought in three of them, one actually getting off but immediately being replaced by another that was apparently queueing up behind the first and took the lure that Bob was reeling in.

Inspired by his sighting, **Len** set out for the sea in his own boat, the orange-pop coloured *Yamaha* canoe, *Fanta*, with his team of wife **Val** and son **Paul**.

They had no luck at all and no fish either, but while coming back and seeing Bob's crew on the jetty with the yellowfin from *Bado* and a bonito, **Len** immediately hijacked the bonito to take home to his cat, prompting Bob, later at *The Moorings*, to demand restitution in the form of something stronger than orange pop.

Desperate measures indeed, but here too there is an explanation.

Some ships have a ship's cat that exercises tight control over certain areas below decks, but **Len**, it seems, has a cat that exercises tight control over himself and punishes him mercilessly if he comes home fishless; indeed it is rumoured that **Len** often goes fishing just to please the cat causing some fishermen to wish they had such a cat and others to wish they had thought of such a story to tell the family themselves.

This writer has no cat excuses or any other for making an error of the week before in the size of the yellowfin tuna caught by **Bob Henning** on James Adcock's *Vuma* on the Wednesday: it was a sixty pound tuna, which is 27.5 kilos, and that's a good fish for anyone to get on any boat on any day.

Our counterparts up the creek in Mombasa waters, **Tudor Water Sports**, are holding a fishing competition this Sunday, October 22, the **Portland Tyre Retreaders' Kraiburg Fishing Tournament**, which has a 6.30 a.m. start and 3.00 p.m. finish and the entry fee of Shs. 3,000/= per boat includes three lunches for the team of three, with no limit on number of rods per boat.

It should be a good one and it is hoped that some Mtwapa boats will enter.

Our own Eye Go Fishing competition is on November 5, in aid of the **Kwale District Eye Centre**, and until then, keep your eyes peeled.
