

'MAIDEN CALL' BY 'LEGEND OF THE SEAS'



THE LUXURY cruise ship, MV 'Legend of the Seas' has made her maiden call at Mombasa's Killindini Port. The 37,700-ton passenger ship was carring 1,750 tourists on an Indian Ocean cruise which started in Athens, Greece, and included stop overs in Turkey, Egypt and Kenya. Coast Provincial Commissioner, Mr Samuel Limo, was among senior Government officials who were on hand to receive the vessel. Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) Managing Director, Mr Brown Ondego, also presented the master of the ship with a special certificate marking this first call at the port. She has now salled for Mumbai, India. Ship's agents were Seaforth (Kenya) Limited and the principals are Royal Caribbean International and Celebrity Cruises.

WHERE ARE THE ERNATIONAL **FLIGHTS INTO** MOI AIRPORT

WHYARE no international scheduled airlines flying into Mombasa - now they are allowed to do so?

This is a question many in the tourism industry at the coast are asking for it was their associations which lobbied for some considerable time for this to happen.

A big rush was expected following approval, on July 20, by the Civil Aviation Board to the formal opening of Moi International Airport to scheduled foreign airlines which fulfil the requirements of the Bilateral Air Services Agreements and other operational requirements.

It is considered there is a general shortage of aircraft seats to Mombasa at certain times of the year which has kept many from coming here. However, there is no shortage of hotel beds.

It is estimated there are around 32,000 on the Kenya coast.

With the present upsurge in tourism for the present winter season, and the Kenya Tourist Board's stand being judged the best at the World month, there is mounting interest in

Kenya as a unique holiday destination

However, it is felt that some persuasion might be needed to get international scheduled flights to come to Mombasa.

Once one starts others will follow, but obviously this will not happen unless sufficient demand is there.

It was pointed out that airlines/tour operators usually plan a year ahead and that international scheduled airlines cannot be expected to be landing in Mombasa this winter season and possibly not until winter 2001/2.

POVERTY STRICKEN people FOVERTY STRICKEN people living in the Timbwani area of Shelly Beach on Kenya's south coast are very lucky for in the vicinity is a good samaritan who cares deeply about their welfare and daily struggle to exist.

Mrs. Rukhsana Mughal is an amazing lady who, with the support of her sons Hardeep Singh, Nazir Hussein, Manmeet Singh and daughter-In-law Manjeet Kaur, plus assistance from good friends, is doing much to give a helping hand while to give a helping hand while everyone is waiting for government's action on poverty eradication.

For 31 years they have been providing a 'free' meal every Thursday to some 250 children in an area near Shelly Beach Hotel and continue doing so.

They recently established on this site (near where Rukhsana lives), the 'Shukuru Mungu' camp a multi-purpose makuti-roofed banda for their increasing banda for their increasing

'Shukuru Mungu' in English means 'Thank God'.

It was on finding so many children not attending school because their parents cannot afford the fees that the idea of a Madrassa was born.

It is open seven days a week not only giving lessons in religion but in basic Maths and English

Mungu 'Shukuru The 'Shukuru Mungu' Madrassa was recently officially opened by Sharrif Nassir, Minister for State in the Office of the President, who is also VP for Mvita.

It has 115 students who are going to be provided with uniprovided with uni-forms, slippers, stationery and books - all free of charge

Meanwhile, during Ramadhan many housewives, irrespective of race or religion, who are too poor to buy essential things for their homes are visiting 'Shukuru Mungu' daily at 4.00 p.m. to receive a gift.

Presently, it is mainly plasticware, but it is hoped that some good-hearted manufacturers might donate some Jikos and saucepans as well.

This is driven by the fact that in their main markets, the buyer is more likely to buy a car which has already fitted safety has already fitted safety features rather than one in which they are optional and would end up costing a leg and an arm when added.

The average Kenya buying a car rarely looks at what safety features a car has.

His main concern is whether the vehicle can be driven, has no dents, looks good and can fit the pocket

The issue of the pocket is the major consideration for over ninety percent of the vehicles on the road today.

Trucks, matatus and cars have been put on the road purely because they are affordable and not because they are the right vehicle to have

The largest single enterprise was to be the proposed Neckemann-Aldiana hotel complex at Vipings for 400 te 800 beds, while on the south coast it would be the 400 ed Dianit Reef Hotel and the 300 bed Golden Bach Hotel. The laxury Leapard Bach Hotel had just completed a 150 bed extension bringing their resort to 300 beds. At Bambur, the Severin Sea Lodge was almost ready to open their new 170-bed Plaza Hotel. The joint Severin Marail Group's nearby 160-bed Meptune Bach Hotel was at an advanced stage of development. Further north, the Seahorse Club at Kliff had just completed a 30-bed extension to their new 70 bed capacity.



Only large cups of 'uji' and lots of 'madafu' at Matsangoni strengthened the resolve to 'walk and not faint' to Chumani was supposed to be a lunch stop.

However such was the state of tiredness that it was decided to spend the night and to leave for Kilifi the next day.

To expect 25 people to lunch and then to find 40 people (including first aiders etc.) on your doorstep for lunch, dinner, sleep and breakfast would probably prove overwhelming for most people but the Rev Emmanuel Pande and his team turned up trumps and all were accomodated.

A 5.30 a.m. start the next day saw the walkers, joined by Rev Pande, in Kilifi by 10.30 a.m. with a short stop at Kwachokwe for

Leaping Sailfish 'Mesmerises' The Entire Samvuke Team Into Temporary Paralysis

THE FISHING was good for a seven-boat impromtu competition held out of The Moorings last Sunday, with three sailfish caught, several others lost or missed on the strike, and another one counted as caught although this was disputed by the angler.

An unusual event that, an angier trying to talk his way out of being awarded a place, but it was a day of unusual events, best of which was the improved fishing after some slow weeks.

The winning boat was Flycatcher fished by Rob Jessop and father and son John and Stephen Webb, with two salfish released, two kingfish, a barracuda of 7.5 kilos, a dorado of seven kilos and one kawakawa

The first of these sallfish, caught by Rob Jessop, leapt clear of the water many times, a spectacle of grace and power, gleaming in the light, sometimes golden, sometimes blue, bill flatiling the

catcher's kingfish, weighing in at ten kilos, was caught after the

closing time of the competition, but Flycatcher had it all wrapped up with the two sailfish anyway.

In the second-place friendly dispute the husband and wife team of John and June Chatwin, new owners of the very successful Mtwapa boat, Oona, were hoping for a first billfish on this boat and John duly hooked a sailfish and brought it to the side, taking the leader in his hand himself, and captain Suedi was leaning over the edge of he boat, hand streehed out reaching for the bill when the fish shook its head and slowly disappeared into the blue.

John counted this fish as lost because he had intended to tag it and it had got away, but the organisers decided to accept it as caught, especially as Flycatcher's sailfish had been released but not tagged, and so adding the sailfish to the four small yellowfin tuna and one rainbow runner that the team also caught, Oona was awarded second place

The competition was very informal, the central idea, as in all events staged at The Moorings, being to have good fishing and lots of fun and it was

all part of the pleasure of the day, although John felt he still had to win his first red flag fair and square.

Another of the unusual events was a lifetime first fish, a red-letter fish if not a red flag one, for June Chatwin, her first fish of any kind anywhere, a three-kilo yellowfin tuna, and she was delighted with it.

Third place went to James Adcock's Sesse cance, Samvuke, with the team of James, Martin Meissner and Neil Reed, with a catch of one sailfish tagged and released, and one kawakawa, both caught by Martin.

It was a particularly pleasing catch for Martin, a very keen fisherman from Germann, as this was his tenth fishing holiday in Kenya, all of them spent fishing with James, and a saliffsh was an excellent beginning.

the first day, prompting him to remark to James, "Next year we'll forget the first day and start fishing on the second!"

Some entertaining conversations took place between the teams on Samvuke and Flycatcher, both on the radio and afterwards in the winddown at The Moorings, since it seemed that every time Flycatcher came near Samvuke they caught a fish.

While Martin was winding hard to bring in his sallfish, which would put Samuke equal with Flycather, there were disturbing signs of activity on the other boat, a rod bending and swinging up and down, and they soon radioed to say they had released their second sailfish.

Later, an incident took place that had the *Flycatcher* team puzzled and amazed.

They were approaching Samuuke at a time when Martin was bringing in a bonit on his light casting rod and the entire Samuuke team and crewman Salim Fau were all standing looking into the water on that side of the boat, their backs to Flucatcher.

Suddenly a saifish started

leaping about repeatedly between the two boats, shaking its head, obviously to get rid of one of the the balts that had been drifting behind Samruke, that it had picked up while the bonito was being brought in.

What puzzled the Flycatcher team was that there was no response whatsoever from the apparently mesmerized Samvuke team, no movement or recognition that there was a salifish on their line.

In fact no one on Samvuke saw that fish or heard the splashes although according to Rob Jessop they were as loud as those of half a dozen whales leaping about the ocean.

A few minutes later there was a strike on a rod that had been trailing a bait about fifty metres behind the boat and Neil started to freespool when the sailfish appeared, leaping close to the boat and threw the hook, possibly the same fish that Flycatcher had seen earlier.

Moments after this another sailfish splashed on the other side of the boat, head almost touching the tail, a strange flip, and almost immediately there was a strike on the outrigger line on that side, but this fish got off too.

It was a day of lost sailfish too for Detlef Seeland on his self-built boat *Mermaid*, with three of them taking his baits but leaping free, and he had to be content with two bonito and a small trevally.

Sigi Finimento, fishing on James Adoock's other boat, Vuma, had two sailfish at his batts but he missed them on the strike, and came in with a wahoo and a dorado.

Another of Sigi's fish got lost the previous week, dropped out of the computer, not off the hook, and was not reported here although it deserved to be, a good fish any week of the year, a kingfish of 22.5 kilos that he caught while fishing on Vuma also.

Sprang A Leak

Other boats in the competition on Sunday caught good numbers of smaller fish, Bob Brenneisen's Bado coming in with a total of twenty-four fish, caught by father and son Len and Paul Fitzgerald, four yellowfin tuna of about three kilos each, a dorado of nine kilos and nineteen frigate mackerel.

On the same day but not in the competition. Howard Law-rence-Brown's Kipapa was fished by a regular visitor, Steve Riddles from Britain, and he had some work to do on the deck of the big boat, taking each rod in turn to bring in seventeen small yellowfin tuna, ten kawakawa and one dorado.

Howard also brought in something bigger, a whole boat, Catch 22, and its team of Allan and Karl Jennings and Leon and Orit Manor, towed them all in after the boat sprang a leak in its fuel system and lost all power.

Earlier in the week, on Tuesday,

with a party of Dutch anglers on board and they came in smiling with a catch of an excellent sailfish of 43.5 kilos and twenty other fish that included six yellowfin tuna and two dorado.

However, he and James had a moment of excitement when a whole shoal of wolf-herring, locally called panga, shot into the air in formation gleaming silver like polished blades, almost jumping over the prow of Samvuke, and then a thick stock-like object appeared waggling above the waves, the bill of a good sized marlin that was swallowing the pangas it had just stunned with its bill.

These panga are so named because they resemble in size and shape the machete blades called panga in Swahili, and they have some mean teeth in their narrow mouths but make good balt, although this marlin did not fall for any.

What's in a name ? A news item on the British BBC World Service radio programme during the week gives local anglers and whale watchers something to think about in this regard, and smile about.

For some years whale experts in Australia have been evesdropping on the love-songs of hump-back whales, those wonderfully musical sounds that travel so far through the sax and they have discovered that recently there has been a change of tune for amorous Australian bull whales in that they have given up their traditional songs and taken to mimicking the quite different song of Indian Ocean bull whales.

This is because the male Indian Ocean hump-backs have been wooling away the female Australian hump-backs with their song, that has the attraction of the exotic, and the Australian males have had to resort to subterfuge to try and win them back.

So it is not too fanciful to suppose that this provides a reason why nearly all the humpback whales seen in our waters in September and October every year are females with young calves: quite probably the good lob barnacied boys of the Indian Ocean whale world have beer taking the opportunity of the Australia and get in some serious, well, singing.
