EIGHT ecologically vital forest areas along the lower Tana River have been extensively damaged. A report from Tom Butynski, project executant, GEF/ Kenya Wildlife Service Tana River Primate Monitoring Project, makes for disturbing reading.

According to the East African Wildlife Society in 1994 the area of the forests was about 1,422

Today about 769 ha of the forests have been lost.
The Tana River Primate Reserve was established to

endangered primates found in the forests - the Tana River red colobus Pro colobus rufomit-

ratus and the crested mangabey, Cercocebus gale ritus galeritus. In 1994, Nkanjonja Forest covered about 500 ha, making it the largest forest along the lower Tana.

Sadly it was destroyed before s hidden secrets were

Today only three ha. patches remain

Besides cutting forest for farmland, the local people have continued to over-utilize the forests.

In one forest, a single individual has tapped every *Phoenix* reclinata palm for paim wine.

As a result of forest clearance for farmland, the mangabeys have begun to raid crops.

This brings them in direct conflict with the local farmers. Previously, EAWLS have funded several research projects in the area, in particular the primate reserve.

#### THE TANA RIVER 'CONSERVATION'

KFWG is working with KWS, the forestry department and other stakeholders to ensure that the Tana River forests ouside the reserve are well conserved.

- There are about 71 distinct forests along the lower Tana. The area covered by these forests is about 2,616 ha.
- The forests range in size from about 1 ha to 500 ha.
- · The 1975 census of the primates of the lower Tana River indicates that there were 1,200-1,800 red colobus and 1,200-1,600 crested manageys.
- The 1994 census indicates 1,100-1,300 red eolobus in at least 86 groups and 1,100-1,200 crested mangabeys in at least 8 groups.

  • About 63 per cent of the red

About co per cent of the record colobus groups and 44 per cent of the manageys are found outside TNPR on Trust/ government land managed by Tana Delta Irrigation Project.

For most of the time the mountaintop forest is invisible under clouds from the coast. The forest is an important water catchment area for Tsavo National Park, Vol and for the people living around Taita Hills.

### A Very Different Kind Of Father Christmas From Holland For Nguu Tatu Primary School Children

WHILE Father Christmas in his red suit and bushy white beard puts in an annual appearance to distribute gifts, for Theo and Clazien van Helvoort from Holland this is a year-round 'live' operation minus the fancy gear.

They love Kenya and have spent 16 vacations here and such has been their great enjoyment that they felt they would like to give something meaningful in return.

During most of their vacations here they have been doing just

Appalled at the pathetic state of some of the schools on finding the children with no desks sitting on the floor and a teacher using a tree trunk as a seat, they decided that it was in the

educational could give the most help.

Their biggest project so far is at Nguu Tatu, Mombasa Dis-trict, which they started eight years ago with the construction of permanent

So far, eleven have been completed and two are presently under construction which Theo hopes to complete before they return home in January.

The school will then be able to accomnodate more than 500 children. Also included is a Nursery School.

So far, over Shs 10 million has been spent on this on-going project.

Originally, the school was a makuti roofed banda.

There they found ten children sitting on the floor and the teachers perched on a tree trunk giving lessons

She dealt with two separate

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Said Clazien, in an interview at the Reef Hotel "the situation was terrible and no one had a desk".

Over eight years they have not only provided the school with permanent classrooms, but desks, books, also a ten-unit

In addition the Headmaster has been provided with an office which they furnished complete with a typewriter, also built and furnished a Teachers' Room.

They also (they thought) provided the school with piped water

While all the necessary pipes are laid there is no mains water in the area.

Consequently, as a means of keeping construction work going on the two

on the two classrooms Theo has had to spend some Shs 50,000/= so far in buying water from mkokotenis

during his present visit here. In addition they pay the school fees of 100 children from poverty stricken families, as well as equipping them with uniforms, books and re-roof classrooms built earlier when needing repair.

Theo leaves the hotel before seven in the morning, including Saturdays, returning in the

He has selected his own local fundis and despite the present torrid heat is enjoying it very much feeling it a very worthwhile

What they are doing is very much appreciated by the headmaster, teaching staff children and parents.

A desk is provided for each child at the school, the van Helvoorts' buying the wood and getting local carpenters to make them.

No one was more delighted than they to hear that last year Standard Eight at the school had come first in the Kenya Certificate of PrimaryEducation examination

CLAZIEN AND Theo van Helvoort are seen at Mombasa's well

for the Mombasa District, and tenth in the whole of Kenya.

All those helping with its sponsorship in Holland were likewise delighted.

Declared Theo, himself a builder by profession before becoming a restaurateur "depending on the amount of money we can raise in Holland we will continue to assist the school which is in a fast developing area with an increasing number of children needing education".

The school have the same

The school bears the same 'Concordia' as their restaurant/ bar situated in a very old village in Holland which Theo feels is very apt.

They have rented it to others to run and have retired.

However, instead of enjoying However, instead of enjoying the opportunity to take it easy and enjoy their retirement Theo and Clazien enthusiastically continue with their sponsorship of the 'Concordia Primary School' at Nguu Tatu.

In doing this they have ablished a small organisation lled 'Children of Kenya Society'

It is registered in Holland and is assisted by six 'volunteers'.

assisted by six volunteers.

During the interview at the Reef, Theo said he wished to emphasise that the cost of their three month stay at this hotel is paid from his own pocket, as well as transport to and from the school.

He said 'we provide everything and I use my own car each day'.

Meanwhile, Clazien is not having a lazy time of it at the Reef while her husband is out most of the day helping construct classrooms, for she is busily engaged in looking after administrative matters con-cerning their project as well as cerning their project as w keeping donors informed.

Nairobi that they first set eyes on children at school with no desks and doing their studying on the floor.

They were horrified, and immediately provided the school with desks.

Then at the coast they found a similar situation at the Ziwa la Ngombe Primary School at Bombolulu.

That was over eight years ago and since then they have been assisting until now every child has a desk.

They also provided the school with four new classrooms

They then moved on to what has become a major and continuing project, that of the Concordia Primary School at

This is the second year for them to spend three months at the Reef which they find very convenient being virtually the nearest beach hotel to their project at Nguu Tatu.

They also enjoy its relaxing ambience and friendly, helpful service by management and staff.

said that more than 500 patients were screened for different types of Eye ailments and

treated with necessary medicines, over 100 pairs of free reading glasses (spectacles) were dispensed and 19 cases were selected for operative procedures.

The patients who were for operations were brought to Mombasa by Llons' bus, were admitted in the Llons Eye and Blood Centre and after recovery were taken backto Ribe in Llons' bus - all totally free of charge.

As Kachumbari says, we often inflict suffering on ourselves for no good reason.

REMEMBER Tsunza ? We reported about it in Coastweek early in 1999.

The good news is that over a 1,000 ha. of community mangrove forests have been replanted in Tsunza by organized groups of volunteers (youth, women, fishermen).

The Tsunza Conservation and Development Program (TCDP) is working on the

project in collaboration with the EAWLS, Swedish Society for Nature Conservation (SSNC), Coast Development Authority and other institutions. TCDP, started in 1996, is the brainchild of EAWLS

The project is about replanting mangrove seedlings in degraded mangrove areas to combat the decline of fish in the

water and to rais awareness through environmental - education.

Recently, two species of mangroves which were thought to exist only in Sulawesi in Indonesia and in the Maldives, were found in Tsunza.

The species are Excoecaria agailocha and Xylocarpus mollucensis.

 Set up butterfly harvesting and bee keeping programmes. Tata Taveta district covers an area of 16,975 square kilometers of which 62 per cent falls under the vast arid and semi-arid plains of Tsavo National Park.

The remaining area of some 5,975 square kilometres is under ranches, sisal estates, mining and forests.

According to the 1992 census the population of the district was 238,000 individuals with a very high growth rate of 3.6 (three point six) per cent.

Most of the population is concentrated in the hills.

The main forests are Mbold (168ha), Ngangao (92ha), Sagalla (Sha), Vuria (less than I ha) and Chawia (7 ha). They are not protected but managed by the Forest Department under an agreement with the local county council. Forest Department

unfortunately The forests are home to unique

species such as the African violet and the Taita Thrush. Kenya's forests cover less than three per cent of the country's total land area.

Forest and woodlands in Kenya provide social, economic and environmental services to both rural and urban populations.

The forests provide people with building materials, hard and soft wood requirements for wood-based industries, 90 per cent of the total household consumption, fodder, honey and fruits

Timber and wood-based industries employ almost 35,000 people

In addition, forests are important water catchment and biodiversity hotspots.

biodiversity hotspots.

The constraints range from inadequate policies, ineffective research and extension services, poor marketing for forest products to over-exploitation of some species, forest excisions and poor private sector investment.

Some of the challenges that

forest conservations must respond to are respond to are people's increasing demands for forest products.

There is need to revise the forest policy, enforce new legislation, commercialize planations to address shortfalls between supply and demand of wood, encourage public participation and seek political goodwill

The way forward is to revise the forest bill (started and at a advanced stage), encourage public debate, involve local communities and the private sector and plough back a percentage of the forest revenue that accrues from forest resources for forest conser-

#### **HOW TO MANAGE 'PROBLEM** PEOPLE AT WORK - (PART II)

1. "They are always like that" (or do they vary?) we all assume at times that the member of staff will always be a problem.

With all situations and with all people but that is not the case.

Behaviour is variable, depending on many situations e.g. sometimes not happy, sometimes happy.

If they are "grumpy" with you they are probably not always "grumpy" with everyone else

So the fact that people are changeable is the clue to your changing behaviour in your staff for the better.

it shows that people are able to vary their behaviour "If they want

It is an easier problem to solve to improve someone's behaviour if they "can't" do it better than if they "don't want" to do it.

So the variability of behaviour gives us hope in handling the person

"It's the person" (or is it the situation ?)

It is easy for us to say or assume that the problem is

If you believe that they are the problem we will focus our attention on "them" and try to change "them" for the better.

The answer is that they are only part of the story.

People always behave within a set of circumstances, they behave based on a reaction to the situation as they perceive it.

The circumstances surroun ding a given situation and therefore the resulting behaviour is the key to understanding why someone behaves as they do and then working out how to improve it.

People always behave in response to something that has happened or might happen.

It would be better to look at the situation in question and our behaviour then at the "problem

\* Change the situation and you change the behaviour

3. "It's all their fault" (or is it sometimes the situation) we all quite understandably blame the member of staff involved however it is fruitless to do this because it doesn't do anything to solve the problem - it can even make it worse!

There is a saying "A good craftsman never blames their

So we can be "A good manager by never blaming the staff" - It





would be better as we have just learned to blame the "situation" rather than to blame the person !

The answer then is that the situation is as much to blame as the person the situation affects the person, the person affects the situation.

Understanding and unraveling the two is part of what is involved "Managing problem people

Finally, people often assume that "Once a problem person, always a problem person".

Some people say things like "they are too old or too senior to change" that is pessimistic and defeatist!

It is "always" possible to manage problems in such a way that the problem is solved or certainly alleviated.

In the next weeks we will examine how we can use different approaches to manage "Problem People".

You will be surprised at how similar elephant behaviour is to that of humans.

The elephant families use neighbouring areas in the Shimba Hills Reserve and Mwaluganje Forest.

On occasion, family groups visit males during the mating season, or cross the sanctuary as they travel between feeding areas.

Once or twice a year several related elephant families come together and move as a unit of up to 200 females and calves of all ages; this is a sight to remember.

These aggregations usually originate in the Shimba Hills and move into Mwaluganje during the rainy season (December, and March/ April).

Such large herds last for only three to four days and are a rare and magnificent sight to see.

Like human families at a reunion, these gatherings are marked by noisy greet-ings with trumpeting.

Sea Breeze

It was great until somebody suggested we do the dishes, (there is always one spoilsport I). Next day we

woke to the sound of the sea lapping on the shore and set up the cookers again for breakfast.

Fresh Oranges, scrambled was time to pack the camp

Like all good campers we followed the advice of the poet "Take nothing but photographs, leave nothing but footprints, thus others may marvel at the beauty you have preserved".

When we left the site we left no signs to say we had been; sad to say that dictum did not apply to some day visitors.

They had thought nothing of scattering orange peels, chocolate wrappers, empty coke tins and even dirty baby's nappies, they then defecated in one of the ancient ruins! We live in an uncaring world.

#### Scorching

We were off again at 10.00 hours, setting out for Vipingo, scorching sunshine, a good breeze and away we scudded.

Within two miles Centurio was already a mile ahead of Armilla. Omar and Stephen were having a lazy day and dragging their heels a little.

Seabreeze and Precious decided to throw the anchor the side and take a dip until Omar and Stephen caught up.

It was a sheer delight to be dog paddling around in four metres of water just inside the reef.

The boats teamed up again and we were away, as we proceeded the water was getting lower and lower, five kilometres north of Kikambala both boats were scraping the bottom.

and decided to cross it into th ean and continue onto Vipingo the deep water.

Crossing the reef is fraught in a motor boat, in a sail boat it is twice as fraught, of the four people in the boats only one had done this before.

In order to clear the reef the boats had to sail a very tight 'S' course to avoid the breaking

Centurion led the way but we made a mistake and stuck in a sand-bar, Armilla went past and allowed themselves to be blown off course they turned right instead of left.

Jesus before turning up again
We were shown the area to stay and introduced to the night
This forced them to sail straight into the breakers and they were lost, they simply could not

All they could manage was to sail up to the breaking water and it would hit them so hard they would be knocked back 20

We in Centurion in meantime dragged ourselves clear of the sand-bar and made the left turn which put us between the two lines of breaking waves

We went another 50 metres then swung hard to starboard picked up the wind and were clear in the open water.

Back inside the reef Armilla was struggling and not making headway, every minute lost was another few centimetres less of water as the tide dropped.

The exercise had already taken twenty minutes and they were getting short of water to float in.

On board Centurion the two consulted and agreed Seabreeze would anchor Centurion leaving Precious in the boat then swim ashore and assist Armilla in clearing the

#### <u>Nightmare</u>

We did a circle and were just about to throw the anchor over when a dorsal fin sliced through

As we watched a shark, all of 16 feet long slipped alongside us, it rolled sideways showing a mouth almost two feet wide and two fins broke the surface.

The anchor was hastily dropped back into the boat and nobody mentioned diving over

and we looked over to Armilla breaking clear of the reef and the two boys faces full of smiles of relief.

We all went over to look at the shark and were amazed it was still gently circling, the fish was easily four feet longer than our boats and half as wide as our

number of small white pilot fish the shark seemed unconcerned that the boats were circling, after a few minutes it swam away only to reappear some 30 minutes later just four metres off the starboard bow.

There followed a swift journey in the open water to Vipingo where we had to cross back inside the reef.

Going out over a reef is child's play (as long as you have power and forward motion) coming back inside is a nightmare in a sail boat.

Once you choose and commit yourself there is no turning back, if you select wrong and attempt to return the boat will roll over.

Everybody will be thrown out and the mast will almost certainly hit the reef with enough force to snap in several places.

If your bad luck continues the center-board will be thrown out, the rudder knocked off and even chain plates will be ripped from

weeks Seabreeze had visited the beach at Vipingo to watch the local fishermen crossing the reef so Centurion took the lead and instructed Armilla to hold back until they could see Centurion was clear then follow the same

The physical entry proved to be easier than the mental stress on the approach.

We skirted around the northern edge of the breakers, made a beeline directly for the Vipingo

mast then turned south under the second line of breaking water.

Suddenly in complete calm we sailed into the bay.

We waited for Armilla and floated in like Vasco da Gama then slipped the boats up the sandy beach. (Stage two completed)

The night on Vipingo Beach was comfortable and enjoyable we purchased fresh fish off the local fishermen (even double the price !) pitched our tents, set up the cooking and proceeded to spoil ourselves with more campfire cooking.

#### Salivating

Dinner was over by 8.30 p.m. so we sat chatting in the moonlight and studying stars through binoculars.

For another hour we made up a story each taking turns to add the tale.

We finished up with the tale of a sad old man on a walking stick living in the forest, he had an enormous dog with salivating fangs, red eyes and perpetually

His name was "Fluff" (the dog not the man) from there the story deteriorated until I was not sure who turned into the werewolf and who was salivating

Morning came and the first was to check the boats, two us swam out and looked o the previous night's handiwo


They were both undamage but had a layer of sand in bottom which needed to cleared.
